



### Badgers Open Big Ten Season in Prime Time vs. Iowa

The Wisconsin football team (3-0) takes on lowa (2-1) today at 7 p.m. in the Big Ten opener for both teams. The game will be televised nationally by ABC with Brent Musberger, Kirk Herbstreit and Lisa Salters handling the commentary.

UW is ranked seventh in the *USA Today*/Coaches' Poll and ninth in the Associated Press poll. Iowa is not ranked.

The Badgers are coming off a 45-31 win over The Citadel on Sept. 15 while lowa fell on the road to in-state rival lowa State. 15-13, last Saturday.

### THE SERIES

This will be the 83rd meeting between the two teams and the series is tied 40-40-2 ... Wisconsin leads the all-time series 25-17-1 in Madison, but UW has not defeated Iowa at Camp Randall Stadium since 2001 ... UW's 24-21 win last season in Iowa City broke a fourgame Hawkeye winning streak in the series ... UW quarterback Tyler Donovan made his first career start in last year's meeting ... the winner of this game gets possession of the Heartland Trophy (a statue of a bull that is 30 inches tall. 36 inches long and 18 inches deep). established in 2004 ... head coach Bret Bielema earned four letters as a member of the lowa football team (1989-92) and was an assistant coach for the Hawkeves from 1994-2001 ... UW Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez was also an assistant at Iowa from 1979-86







# Tonight's Game at Camp Randall



Running back P.J. Hill accounted for five touchdowns (four rushing and one receiving) vs. The Citadel, tying a UW school record.

### **Key Notes to Consider**

- ♦ Dating back to last season, Wisconsin has won 12 consecutive games. That is the longest active winning streak in the country. It is the second-longest winning streak in school history, trailing only a 17-game stretch from 1900-02.
- ♦ Wisconsin has more wins (34) than any other Big Ten school since the beginning of the 2004 season. Ohio State is second with 33.

The Badgers have won nine straight games at Camp Randall Stadium, tied for the sixthlongest home winning streak in school history. It is also tied for the seventh-longest current streak in the country. Wisconsin's last home loss came against Iowa on Nov. 12, 2005.

♦ Sophomore running back P.J. Hill tied a UW record last Saturday by scoring five touchdowns against The Citadel (four rushing, one receiving). He is the fifth Badger to score five touchdowns in a game, joining Billy Marek (vs. Minnesota, 1974), Anthony Davis (vs. Minnesota, 2002), Lee Evans (vs. Michigan State, 2003) and Brian Calhoun (vs. Bowling Green and Illinois, 2005).

### **General Notes**

♦ Bret Bielema's 15-1 record as head coach of the Badgers is one of the best coaching starts in Big Ten history. Only three other coaches in conference history won at least 15 of their first 16 games. They are: Fielding Yost (Michigan), 55-0-1 from 1901-05; John B. Eckstrom (Ohio State), 16-0-1 from 1899-1900; and Carroll C. Widdoes (Ohio State), 16-1 from 1944-45. Each of these three coaches lost their next game after the records listed here.

The Badgers have won 19 of their last 20 night games, including nine in a row. This will be only the sixth night game at Camp Randall Stadium in the last 12 years. In its last two night games at home, UW defeated No. 3 Ohio State, 17-10, (Oct. 11, 2003) and No. 14 Michigan, 23-20, (Sept. 24, 2005).

- $lack \$  UW opens its 112th Big Ten campaign on Saturday vs. Iowa. The Badgers are 55-51-4 in Big Ten openers, including 30-24-1 at Camp Randall Stadium.
- ♦ Wisconsin is one of five programs in the nation with no more than one home loss since the start of the 2004 season. The Badgers are 20-1 at Camp Randall Stadium during that time. The others are Boise State (21-0), Southern California (19-0), Louisville (19-0) and Florida (22-1).
- ♦ During its nine-game home winning streak (since the start of 2006), UW has scored at least 30 points seven times. The Badgers are averaging 33.6 points in those games, compared to 12.6 for their opponents.

### Offensive Notes

- Senior quarterback Tyler Donovan is 5 0 in his five career starts. In those games, Donovan is 80-of-125 (64.0 percent) for 1,159 yards, 10 touchdowns and just one interception. His passing efficiency for those five games is 166.68.
- Donovan's main target in his five star s has been senior wide receiver Luke Swa 1. Swan has 24 catches for 483 yards and four TDs in Donovan's starts. Six of Swa 1's receptions have gone for at least 30 yards.

P.J. Hill joined Oklahoma's DeMarco Murray as the only two players in the country to core five touchdowns in a game this season. Hill's 14.0 points per game lead the Big Ten and are tied for fifth nationally.

Hill's 168 rushing yards vs. The Citadel were the third-best total of his career and his best game since running for 249 yards against Northwestern on Oct. 7, 2006. Hill is tied for ninth in the country in rushing, averaging 133.0 yards per game on the ground. As a team the Badgers rushed for 253 yards against The Citadel, their highest output since that Northwestern game.

♦ Wisconsin ranks fourth in the country in time of possession, holding the ball for an average of 33:35 over the first three games. Last year, UW ranked third in the country at 33:26.

### **Defensive Notes**

- ♦ UW has given up 374 yards in the first quarter of its three games this season (124.7 yards per quarter). In the remaining nine quarters, the Badgers have allowed just 637 yards (70.8 yards per quarter).
- ♦ Sophomore free safety Shane Carter has recorded an interception in each of the last two games. He is the first Badger to pick off passes in consecutive games since Roderick Rogers intercepted balls against Penn State and lowa last season.
- ♦ Wisconsin surrendered just 55 fourth-quarter points (4.2 per game) all of last season and is continuing that trend in 2007. UW has allowed just 13 total fourth-quarter points this season (4.3 per game).

### Special Teams Notes

♦ True freshman David Gilreath was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week after returning four punts for 73 yards and three kickoffs for 75 yards. Gilreath is averaging 14.8 yards on punt returns, second in the Big Ten and 16th in the country.

♦ Wisconsin's average starting field position vs. The Citadel was its own 40-yard line. Conversely, the Bulldogs averaged starting from their own 21-yard line. Despite not recording a touchback for the first time this season, UW held The Citadel to an average of 17.0 yards on kickoff returns.

Taylor Mehlhaff has 32 field goals in his career, just one behind Matt Davenport for fourth place on UW's career list.

♦ Mehlhaff's 51-yard field in the fourth quarter vs. UNLV was his third field goal of at least 50 yards in his career and tied for the second-longest kick of his career (also tied for sixth-longest in school history). It is one of only 11 field goals of 50 yards or longer in the country this season. Mehlhaff's career long is 52 yards against Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl.

# Chancellor John D. Wiley



hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin-Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer. Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Eviue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in

fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a vear at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for Xray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.





# Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez



arry Alvarez is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin and second vithout the additional title of head foot all coach. Alvarez, who began his care r as athletic director in April of 2004, serv d as athletic director and football mac 1 in 2004-05 and in 2005-06.

Alvarez's first year as Director of Athl tics (without the football duties) was am morable one as Wisconsin won four natt nal titles (men's cross country, men's weight rowing) during the 2005–06 athletic campaign. The Badgers also won five ront rence titles.

The UW maintained its winning ways in 2 06-07 with the men's track and field tean winning its first NCAA title. The won en's hockey team repeated as NCAA that upions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed thei capabilities off the field of play during he fall of 2007 when they registered the tighest cumulative grade point average or a fall term in department history. This een teams also finished with recording grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes for 16 seasons (1990–2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl littles (including back-to-back in 1998–99) on route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727)

record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003. Alvarez and his wife Cindy are cocampaign chairs in the effort to bring a Gilda's Club, a free support center for families dealing with cancer, to Madison. Alvarez also serves on the board of directors for the MACC Fund (Mideast Athletes Against Childhood Cancer).

Alvarez and his wife are the parents of three children—daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson; Grace and Jackson Delzer; and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.

Bielema guided the Badgers to a 12-1 overall record and 7-1 mark in the Big Ten (good for a second-place tie with Michigan). Wisconsin capped its recordsetting 2006 season with a 17-14 win over Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl. No previous Wisconsin team had won more than 11 games in a season. In addition, Bielema became just the third rookie head coach in NCAA Division I history to pilot his team to 12 victories.

Bielema's efforts were rewarded when he was named the 2006 Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year. Bielema also was named one of five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and was a finalist for the 2006 Schutt Sports Division IA Coach of the Year Award.

Wisconsin surprised most observers outside the program by setting school records for overall wins (12) and regular-season victories (11), as well as tying the UW mark for conference victories (seven). The Badgers did it with a defensive unit that ended the 2006 regular season ranked among the top three nationally in pass defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. And they

did it with an offense led by a pair of seniors (QB John Stocco and All-America tackle Joe Thomas), a young but talented offensive line, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year (P.J. Hill) at tailback and an emerging corps of receivers, including John Mackey Award semifinalist Travis Beckum.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002–03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in



both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 553 games and guide their teams to 42 bowl games, so the second-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business. The last four teams (2002–06) for which Bielema has coached accumulated a 53-13 record.

Bielema earned four letters (1989–02) after joining the lowa football program as a walk-on. He earned a scholarship after his first year and was a member of lowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.

### Senior Tight End Andy Crooks

ndy Crooks is what people in Wausau, Wis., call their hometown hero. In a city listed with 38,426 resi lents in the 2000 census, everybody is pul ng for Crooks and the 2007 Badgers.

Crooks, who was born and raised in Wa sau, grew up on the northeast side of tow 1 in what he calls a "quieter neighborhoot!."

When he was eight years old, the family of five, including his father Mike, mother lau ie "Fritz", older sister Katie and yellow lab Elvis, moved to Woodland Ridge.

"I lived in the same neighborhood my whole life, just in different houses," Crooks said. "It wasn't out in the wilderness, but wasn't downtown—near the Legion Golf Course."

Growing up, Crooks said some of his bes family memories were made at his grandparents' house on Lake Nokomis in Tomahawk, taking family vacations to places like Florida and having big family Christmas'.

His father, who works for Berbee, a Madisonbased company with a branch in Wausau, said they tried to organize at least one family vacation a year.

"We went to Washington, we went to Atlanta, we tried to go and teach them something when we took them on vacation," said his mom, who works for the Family Resource Center, helping with the Fast Start program in Marathon County.

"We tried to give them a little more culture," added his dad.

Back at home, his mom said Andy loved to push his dad's and his sister's buttons.

"My sister and I didn't get along when we were younger," Crooks said. "A lot of fighting, which my dad didn't like, but we get along really well now."

His mother agreed that her two children did fight a lot, but said things were the worst after Andy got his drivers license.

"It wasn't as bad until they had to share a car," his mom said. "Katie is two years older, so she had full use of it for two years before he got his license."

Of course, she added that she was nice enough to always throw her car in for use just to keep peace in the house.

It is little things like that, that make Andy's mom the nicest person he knows.

"(My mom and I) are really close," he said. "She is the most loving person I know. I know she puts up with my dad and me and my sister, so she has to be pretty understanding. She is just an angel."

And when football season arrived every year, Andy's mom was not just dealing with the family anymore, she had an entire crew of Andy's friends to take care of.

"He had a great bunch of friends and it was all the guys who played sports, really," his mom said. "Every Friday before their football games, there'd be at least six guys over for lunch. I'd have a huge meal all ready and waiting for them when they walked in the door—of course dessert too."

Andy, who started switch-hitting with a plastic bat at two years old and playing flag football when he was five, was what his parents call a "natural" athlete.

When he was in eighth grade he won the "Punt, Pass and Kick" competition locally and went to compete at the state level, taking third.

Today, his parents still come to all his games and haven't missed one since sophomore year.

"They missed the Penn State game, and after that they said they never wanted to miss any more because they just felt real bad about it," Crooks said. "They've been to all of them ever since."

His mom solidified that by saying she'd "have to be hospitalized" to miss a game.

The "hometown hero", who used to play baseball, football, basketball, run track, dance in talent shows and sing solos in the choir, has not forgotten his roots.

"Last year after the bowl game he came back to his old junior high school and spoke to the eighth graders about what it was like to be a football player at Wisconsin," his dad said. "He made quite a huge impression."

"He's a good kid," added his mother.
"He's got a great heart."

Andy thinks they both do too.









# Cameday at Wisconsin ...

### There's Nothing Else Like It

n 2005, Sports Illustrated on Campus said that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the oftenimitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 in every game since the 1993 season-opener, a span of 14 years and 88 games. Seventy-eight of those games have been sellouts, including the last 25 in a row. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Roooonnn Daaaynnnel," from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

"But the thing that really stands out about Wisconsin

is how the team is just such an integral part of the community there. In a lot of ways, Camp Randall is what college football is all about."

ne of college football's finest facilities

Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.







## **Wisconsin Traditions**



#### **Badger Nickname**

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides,

#### **Bucky Badger**

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

#### **Bud Song**

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

#### **Fifth Quarter**


The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

#### On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

#### Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former studentathletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a number of community service projects to give back to Madison.



Lewis enjoys drawing in his sketchbook.


"It helps pass the hours when everything get a little hectic," Lewis said. "I can just escape for an hour with drawing."  $\,$ 


The junior tight end began drawing in high school, but never took it to the next level. Today, the life science communications major doesn't take art classes anymore, saving his special talent is just a pastime.

And his ideal "dream job?"


"(To be) General Manager of my favorite football team, the Minnesota Vikings."



Travis Beckum has excelled after making the switch from linebacker to tight end by Amy Ogburn, UW Athletic Communications

ven before Travis Beckum came to the University of Wisconsin, he was viewed as one of the nation's top players in his position. Rated as the No. 1 player in the state of Wisconsin and the No. 6 player in the country, Beckum began his football career as an outside linebacker. Now a tight end for the Badgers, he has taken on the challenge of stepping into a new role.

The Badgers recruited Beckum from Milwaukee, Wis., as a five-star linebacker coming out of high school. During his freshman year at Wisconsin, Beckum saw action in 10 games as a reserve on defense and special teams. Beckum recorded

two tackles in those limited minutes.

It was mid-way through his freshman season when Beckum began thinking about the possibility of a position switch.

"I knew that the following year, both of our starting tight ends were leaving." said Beckum, who tested out the tight end position a small amount in high school. "I thought about it in college, and I told Coach Bielema that I wanted to switch. He thought I was kidding at first."

But Beckum was serious. Head coach Bret Bielema renembers officially approaching Beckum, who "jumped at the opportunity" to play tight end. By spring practice, Beckum

had decided he was ready to make the change.

In comes fellow tight end, senior Andy Crooks. Like Beckum, Crooks joined the Badgers as a heavily recruited im backer. The two switched to tight end in time for the start of the 2006-07 season; Beckum, as a sophomore, and Crooks ajı nior. Together, the two had to learn the "ins and outs" of being on the offensive side of the ball.

"It was extremely difficult to come from the defensive side of the ball and transition over to offense," said Beckum. "It is a totally different ball game. All the lingo and all the plays were new to me. I was learning everything from scratch."

Crooks agreed. "We didn't really know what to do with the offense. It was a learning process."

Together, the two took on the challenge of a difficult thange. Both played in all 13 games in their first season as ight ends, with Beckum recording 10 starts. He led the Bargers with 61 receptions for 903 yards; enough to set the school receiving record for tight ends. Beckum also ranked second nationally among tight ends in receptions per game. Additionally, Beckum tallied three 100-yard performances last season.



That performance earned him second-team All-America honors from the Walter Camp Foundation and SI.com. Entering this season, Beckum is one of the favorites for the 2007 John Mackey Award, an annual honor given to the nation's top tight end. He is on multiple preseason watch lists, including the Maxwell and Walter Camp Awards. Beckum is also a preseason first-team All-American by Blue Ribbon College Football Yearbook and Lindy's.

Tight end coach Bob Bostad came to the University of Wisconsin as an assistant coach two years ago, the same year Beckum transitioned to a tight end. Bostad has been working with both Beckum and Crooks as they have adjusted into their

new positions. Although both have put forth tremendous effort, the journey to perfection is never-ending.

Luckily Beckum understands that he can improve every day. After the first game of the 2007 season, Beckum saw gaps in his performance.

"There is a lot of stuff left on the field that I saw from [the Washington State] game; stuff that we could pick up and change so easily," Beckum explained. "We could have put up plenty more points had we run the route right, or put up the correct block. There is a lot of stuff left on the field and I think it can be good and bad."

But  $\stackrel{\textstyle \cdot}{\text{Bielema}}$  has seen Beckum's commitment day in and day out.

"The big thing he realized during his first year was that he needed a little more strength to hold up at the line of scrimmage. That actually made him faster in his routes [as a tight end]. Everything he has done from last year to where we are now has shown how he is committed to becoming a better football player."

Beckum knows that with a hard-working mentality, forward progress is achievable. He proved this as a top-ranked linebacker, and still does today, as a top-ranked tight end.

"It feels good to know that you can accomplish so much if you work at it. I am happy with where I am at."



#### Calhoun Sets Up Game Winner

Det oit running back **Brian Calhoun** continued his solid play since returning from an *ICL* injury suffered last year as the liors' defeated division rival Minnesota, 20-7, in overtime.

The second-year back rushed five times for 1/2 yards, a team high in the Lions' past-oriented offense. Calhoun also contributed three catches for 19 yards and returned three kickoffs for 49 yards.

Calhoun set up the game-winning field (a) by taking a handoff from quarterback J.T. O'Sullivan at the Vikings' 36-yard line and sweeping around the right end for 17 rards before being knocked out of bounds.

"Just followed my reads," Calhoun told The Detroit News. "It was simple. If the end crashed in, I was supposed to go outside. If he bounced outside, I was supposed to cut inside. When I bounced mobody was there."

Calhoun will be counted on to improve a Lions' rushing attack which currently averages 82.0 yards per game, 26th in the NFL.

## Thomas Paves Way for Cleveland Offense

Cleveland rookie left tackle **Joe Thomas** helped pave the way for a Browns' offense that racked up 260 rushing yards while not yielding a sack in a 51-45 shoot out win over in-state rival Cincinnati.

It was the first time the Browns' offensive line had not allowed a sack since Dec. 7 of last year against the Steelers and the most rushing yards for the club since racking up 264 against the Bengals on Dec. 28, 2004.

After signing guards Eric Steinbach and Seth McKinney during the offseason, the Browns drafted Thomas with the third overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft. The hope was to turn around an offensive line that was considered among the worst in the NFL in 2006.

However, in the Browns' season-opening 34-7 loss to Pittsburgh, the line looked eerily similar to the '06 version, yielding six sacks while leading the way for only 46 yards rushing.

"Last week was a disappointment for us but you have to put games like that behind you and learn from your mistakes and that's what we did," Cleveland center Hank Fraley told ClevelandBrowns.com.

Thomas and the Browns will try to keep the momentum going in Week 3 against an Oakland defense that is currently yielding 144.5 yards rushing per game and has four sacks on the season.

#### Leonhard Starts for Buffalo

Making his first start of the season and second of his career, Buffalo free safety **Jim Leonhard** provided a bright spot in an otherwise dismal outing as the Bills lost to Pittsburgh 26-3.

The third-year veteran had seven tackles, good for third on the team, and recorded his second interception of the season, against Pittsburgh's standout quarterback Ben Roethlisberger.

Leonhard's 20 tackles through the first two games of the season are more than he recorded during his first two years in the league. The Bills are currently without three defensive starters from opening day and two key reserves.

"Not having all our guys on defense was a challenge, but I thought we played hard," Leonhard told *The Buffalo News*. "We have to get off the field on third downs because eventually a good offense will score if you don't stop drives."

#### **Weekly Roundup**

Kansas City running back Michael Bennett had seven rushes for 14 yards and three catches for 20 yards in the Chiefs' 20-10 loss at Chicago ... Buffalo defensive tackle Jason Jefferson had a tackle in the Bills' 26-3 loss at Pittsburgh ... Bills' wide receiver Lee Evans also contributed two catches for 17 yards in the game ... Houston running back Ron Davne rushed 18 times for 44 yards and also caught a 10-yard pass in the Texans' 34-21 victory over Carolina ... ## What's Happening on Campus?

#### Exhibits Reveal Famous Patrons of the Arts Also Loved Science

A Florentine family that reigned over plorence and Tuscany is the subject of a natural books exhibition in the pepartment of Special Collections in the UW-Madison Libraries, as well as an art exhibit at the Chazen Museum of Art.

The Medici was a clan known not only for its ruthless politics and business acumen, but also for its patronage of great Renaissance artists such as Botticelli and Michelangelo. The pursuit of the arts and sciences was common, says art history professor Gail Geiger, who points out that Leonardo da Vinci is remembered as much for his scientific ideas as for the masterworks of High Renaissance art he created. And Galileo — who, after discovering the moons of Jupiter, dubbed then the "Medicean Stars" to secure the family's patronage — wrote poetry that is still taught today.

The rare books exhibit "Under the Medicean Stars: Medici Patronage of Science and Natural History, 1537-1737" will be on display on the ninth floor of Menorial Library until Friday, Oct. 26.

The art exhibition "Natura Morta: Stil -Life Painting and the Medici Col ections" can be found in Brittingham Gal eries VI and VII at the Chazen Museum of Art until Sunday, Oct. 21.

#### Basic Research Robust in Face of More University Patenting

In inversities continue transforming scientific discoveries into potentially lucrative patents, many wonder how this might transform academic science itself. Some writes contend that commercial interests are changing university research from a publicly funded enterprise performed for the social good into one pursued for private purposes and monetary gain.

A UW-Madison study of more than 1.800 U.S. life scientists indicates this may not be true. Despite an explosion in loademic patenting in recent years, most die science professors still do research the old-fashioned way," by winning federal grants, publishing results in scientific ournals and graduating Ph.D. students, ay agricultural and applied economics professors Brad Barham and Jeremy both.

In an online survey of agricultural, medical and other life scientists at the nation's top 125 universities for biological research, the economists found that 90 percent of researchers held one or fewer patents, and just 8 percent had received patent revenues. Moreover, federal funds from agencies such as the National Institutes of Health (NIH) made up 67 percent of the group's total research budget, while industry funding contributed just 5 percent.

In fact, 53 percent of scientists reported no commercial ties whatsoever, such as invention disclosures or company board memberships. In short, says Foltz, "the connection to commercialization appears to be marginal in terms of funding the overall research enterprise."

The findings should reassure those concerned with preserving the country's longstanding model of basic, publicly supported and openly shared research. But they also come amid flattening budgets at NIH and other funding agencies, a trend that has some officials — including the U.S. presidential science adviser — suggesting that scientists must learn to rely more on industry and other nonfederal sources to support their work.

## Badgers Enjoy Benefits of Whey Sports Drink

A sports recovery drink made by UW-Madison's Babcock Dairy Plant helps the Badger football team bounce back from strenuous workouts and practices.

The drink contains protein from whey, a byproduct of cheese production that is known to help muscles recover from hard exercise. Team members drain bottles of the drink after weightlifting sessions and practices.

"It's been great for us," says Ben Herbert, assistant strength and conditioning coach for the football team who also was a Badger defensive end from 1998-2002. "A lot of these supplements don't taste very good. This gives us what we need, and the guys really like to drink it."

For years, farmers used whey to fertilize fields or feed hogs. Then scientists figured out how to isolate and dry the protein contained in whey, making it a promising dietary supplement for athletes in training. Weightlifters began using it in the 1980s to promote muscle recovery and repair, and the protein has emerged as a mainstream health-promoting nutritional supplement.

A nutritionist working with the UW-Madison football team proposed the idea for a campus-made recovery drink. The Babcock Hall Dairy Plant began supplying the beverage to the football team and the men's and women's basketball and hockey teams in 2006.

## Bowling with the Badgers ...

UW consistently plays in - AND WINS - major bowl games!



This second-quarter touchdown catch by tight end Travis Beckum gave Wisconsin a 17-7 lead over Arkansas in last year's Capital One Bowl. The Badgers went on to win the game 17-14, their second consecutive Capital One Bowl victory.

ver the last 14 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' nine bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College for the most in the nation. UW has participated in 12 bowl games over the past 14 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made eight appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its third consecutive January bowl game, defeating 12th-ranked Arkansas, 17-14, to capture its second straight Capital One Bowl. The win gave UW its school-record 12th victory of the season.

The Badgers had won just one bowl game prior to 1994. Since then, UW is 9-3 in postseason play, including 6-2 in January bowl games. Wisconsin has defeated teams from the Pac 10 (four times), SEC (twice), Big 12 (once), ACC (once) and WAC (once) during the last 14 seasons.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.



## Award Whoners ...

#### **Badgers Recognized Among the Nation's Best!**

very great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

In 2006, many UW individuals were recognized for their contributions to the school-record 12 wins. Chief among those players was offensive tackle Joe Thomas. Thomas was a consensus first-team All-American and became the first UW player to win the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top lineman.

Two returnees, junior tight end Travis Beckum and sophomore running back P.J. Hill also garnered national recognition last year. Hill was named national Freshman of the Year by Rivals.com and also earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors. Beckum, in his first season as a tight end, was a second team All-American and John Mackey Award semifinalist.

In his first year at the helm, UW head coach Bret Bielema was named Big Ten Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the

Bear Bryant national Coach of the Year Award.

The most decorated former Badger is running back Ron

Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.

In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the Rimington Trophy

(best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarik Award (defensive player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and Ronnie Lott Trophy

(defensive player). In addition. Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's best defensive back while Kevin Stemke won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's best collegiate punter.

This year a number of UW players are in contention for major awards. Beckum and Hill are both on the Maxwell Award Watch List. Linebacker Jonathan Casillas was named to the Chuck Bednarik Watch List while center Marcus Coleman is on the Rimington Award Watch List.



These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.

Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.









Alan Ameche (elected in 1975) was the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner and a multi-year All-American in the classroom and on the field.



### This Week in Badger History



Eiro Hirsch's nickname came about on Sept. 26, 1942, following a 80-y ard touchdown run vs. Notre Dame.

**Sept. 26, 1929** — The official groundbreaking for the UW Field House took place. It cost \$453,756 to build, and was a state-of-the-art facility that was comparable in merit to any of its kind in the country.

**Sept. 26, 1942** — Elroy Hirsch was first tabbed 'Crazylegs' on Sept. 26, 1942, after a 60-yard touchdown run vs. Notre Dame prompted a local writer to say, 'His crazy legs were gyrating.'

**Sept. 27, 1998** — The Wisconsin men's golf team captured first place at the Hawkeye Invitational, winning its first team tournament in four years.

**Sept. 28, 1991** — Tony Lowery hooked up with Lee DeRamus on an 89-yard touchdown pass against Eastern Michigan for what was then the longest pass play in school history. It now ranks second to Jim Sorgi's 99-yard TD pass to Lee Evans vs. Akron in 2003.

**Sept. 29, 1962** — The football team set the school record for most points scored in a game with a 69-13 win over New Mexico State. UW has only scored 60 or more points four times in the modern era (most recently, 65 vs. Temple in 2005).

#### **SI:PTEMBER 22-29**

Sept. 22, 2001 — Women's golfer Malinda Johnson ties a school record by shooting a 69 at the Lady Northern Invitational in Champaign, Ill. Johnson later breaks that record with a 66 at the Legends Shootout on Oct. 8, 2002.

Sept. 23, 1989 — Badger quarterback Sean Wilson rushed for 134 yards and passed for more than 100 yards as well (130 yards) against California.

Sept. 24, 1994 — The football team set the total offense record for most yards in a game with 632 372 rush., 260 pass), on their way to beating Indiana, 62-13. That record was later broken when UW racked up 705 yards against the Hoosiers in 1999.


## Meet the Iowa Hawkeyes



### Behind the Scenes With ...

#### How long have you been doing this?

This is my 13th year. 1995 was my first season.

#### How did you get started?

I had been doing women's basketball for a couple of years and then Jack Ring passed away in December of 1994. I split the men's basketball season with Brian Posick that first year. After that, I was offered the opportunity to do a variety of sports, football being one of them as well as hockey. As the season went on, they asked me what sports I wanted to continue doing. I said men's basketball and football. You would have to pretty much pull my body out of the press box at this stage for me to not continue doing those sports.

#### Did you have any prior experience?

Not public address announcing but I had done some radio shows. In 1991-92 I had a radio show on WTSO, kind of a point-counterpoint type of show, called "Madison Nightline." So that's probably the closest thing to it but I've always loved sports. I had never done any public address announcing prior to starting with women's basketball in 1992.

## Do people recognize your voice or your face when you're out in public?

Actually, no. From football certainly not my face. From basketball they probably recognize the back of my head. I'm sort of this anonymous, faceless entity. And that's ok.

#### What is you "real" job?

I'm the vice president/creative director at Roundhouse Marketing. We're currently in Waunakee but we'll be moving to Verona soon. I've been there for 22 years. So you add 13 years as a P.A. announcer and 22 years at Roundhouse and you can tell I'm in for the long haul.

## Does anyone randomly come up to you and ask you to say "Roooon Daaaaaayne?"

Not as much anymore but periodically some old-timers will ask, "Can you just say it for me?" It's hard to believe that it's been eight years already. People don't ask as much as it was back then but every once in a while I'll get a request.

## What would be your most memorable game as a P.A. announcer?

From football, definitely the "Ron Dayne Game" (Nov. 13, 1999 vs. Iowa). All the planets aligned, winning the Big Ten, going to the Rose Bowl and Dayne setting the record. That was probably the high point of being a Wisconsin football fan. Basketball, there are certainly a lot of high points, especially the last couple of years. I can't even select one there are so many.



Mike Mahnke is in his 13th season as the Badgers' public address announcer for football and men's basketball.

#### What are your game days like?

Like most Badger fans, I have my routines and superstitions on game day. I get up and do the same thing on game day. I put on my Wisconsin class ring (BA, '84). I take the exact same route to the stadium. I need to be in my seat two hours before game time I usually stop and talk to the same people. I say hello to Rufus right in front of the arch. I walk through the arch. I say hello to Eric selling programs. I walk through the gate. I walk through the end zone and walk across the W in the same route every time. Jog up the stands, hop in the elevator and then to my seat.

## What goes on in your announcing booth?

We typically have six people in our booth. There's myself and two spotters, John Buhler and Tom Knoche. That is one of the most enjoyable things about doing P.A. is the guys I'm working with. They're the reason I keep coming back and doing it. That and because it's the best seat in the house! Luke Collins handles the red phone, the "Bat Phone," to the SOC booth. The four of us are on one level and then above us are Kevin Kluender and Briar Chullino from Marketing. There are six of us in there and somehow we don't get in each other's way.

## Any embarrassing mistakes while on the mike?

I've never let anything slip that has actually made it to the public So far, knock on wood, I haven't made a blunder that's going to put me back in the stands. Not that we use any foul language or anything up there. We just have a periodic tendency to "editorial ize." It's a good thing sometimes that "what's said in the booth... stays in the booth!"

## A Great Time to Be a Badger!

n 2006–07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. UW has now won five national titles over the last two seasons. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns last year:


Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

In addition, five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19). The football team captured its second consecutive Capital One Bowl title while the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the country on Feb. 19, a first in school history.

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

#### **Big Ten Universities**

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries.
   Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

#### **Big Ten Athletics**

 Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates-the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years, and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR). which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes. Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I studentathletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006–07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.

The Big Ten Network will provide unprecedented access to an extensive schedule of conference sports events and shows; original programs in academics, the arts and sciences; campus activities; and associated personalities. Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.



- · The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey, Minnesota wrestling, Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country. field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball, synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.





#### 35 AMECHE

#### #35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#### #40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#### #88 Pat Richter

Pat Richter, who led the nation in receiving as a junior, was a consensus All-American in 1962. A two-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, he paced the conference in receiving in 1961 and 1962. A member of the Washington Redskins for eight seasons, Richter later returned to UW to serve as director of athletics (1989-2004).



#### **#80 Dave Schreiner**

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.



#### #83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shawas fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafe is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.

#### ALL-TIME TEAM

In conjunction with the centennial celebration of college football in 1969, Wisconsin fans selected the school's all-time team. The 11-man unit features 1954 Heisman Trophy winner Alan Ameche, who was voted "All-time Greatest Player."

**DAN LANPHEAR** (1957-59): Madison native was a 1959 All-American before pro career with Oilers

**ARLIE MUCKS, SR.** (1914): All-American on gridiron and silver medalist at Olympics (discus)

**PAT RICHTER** (1960-62): Hall of Fame inductee both on field and in classroom ... former Badger A.D.

**DAVE SCHREINER** (1940-42): First two-time All-American ... three TD catches in one quarter still a school record



To gain admittance to the Hall, student-athletes must be former Academic All-Americans who distinguished themselves off the playing field after graduation.



# **NCAA** Guidelines



# What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...

You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

 c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

# What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

### **Extra Benefit Rule**

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost ser-

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

 e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus

 h) offering student-athletes, or their relatives or friends, the opportunity to purchase items, even at face value, not adequately publicized as available for sale to the general public; or

i) promising to provide any of the

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

# **Employment**

A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

 The student-athlete's compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletic ability;

 The student-athlete may receive compensation for only work actually performed; and

• The student-athlete's compensation must be at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 

# Camp Randall Stadium Policies



# **Conduct Code**

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

# **Smoke-Free Facility**

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

# **Entry / No Re-entry**

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

# **Express Lines**

Fans are encouraged not to bring any carry-ins. Fans with no carry-ins will enjoy the use of Express Lines at all gates, with the exception of the student entrance at Gate 5.

# Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

# **Guest Services Center**

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

# **Emergencies**

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

In case of an emergency it is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

## **Lost and Found**

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Service Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

### **Items Not Permitted**

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.

# Jim Temp Baseball 1952–1955

Football 1952-1955

The University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame welcomed Jim Temp in August. Temp was a two sport standout at UW from 1952 to 1955 in baseball and football.

As a freshman, Temp hit .294 and was a starter at first base. Temp had a career batting average of .303. In 1955, Temp was named team captain of the UW squad and went on to represent the United States in the Pan-American games.

Temp also wore the cardinal and white on the gridiron for Bucky. During his career, Temp played on both sides of the ball and was a starter on the 1953 Rose Bowl team. In 1955. Temp was named a starter on the College Football All-Star Team. Temp was named the 1955 UW Athlete of the Year.

In 1955, Temp was the second overall draft pick of the Green Bay Packers. After his NFL career, Temp went on to serve on the Packer's Board of Directors. In 2004, Temp was named director emeritus of the Green Bay Packers.

# **Inside the Program**

At every Badger home game, more than 80,000 fans in Camp Randall Stadium and millions more watching on TV witness the UW coaching staff and players in action.

What they don't see is the behind-the-scenes workings of the UW Athletic Department that makes the games enjoyable for the fans and the teams.

There are hundreds of UW Athletic Department employees that work all week and long hours on Saturdays to make Badger football games the events they have become.

This week we profile the facilities partment.

ow many people does it take to operate a facility like Camp Randall Stadium? Director of facilities 3arry Fox knows the numbers better than anyone. Fox's staff heads include Kay Coleman, custodial operations man ger; Glenn Betts, superintendent of C mp Randall Stadium; Dan Wyatt, building and grounds superintendent; Mar Petranyi, building and grounds superintendent of Kohl Center; and Ed Molter, associate director of facilities. The numbers don't stop there. Each of the staff heads have multiple people worling for them, with Fox as the overall supervisor and Molter as his associate.

Fox oversees a variety of projects for the acility grounds and buildings that represent 23 acres and an estimated two mill on square feet, while Molter is the lais on between Fox and everyone else.

"I am a tool for the managers to determine what needs to be done in order to keep the facility safe, clean and comfortable for the patrons," Fox said. "It is a tremendous task. There are a lot of things that if you miss can lead to a lot of problems, so we are forced to prioritize."

Kay Coleman knows about the details. She is in charge of at least 140 people who work together cleaning Camp Randall Stadium before, during and after sames.

On game days, approximately 50 people stock the restrooms, suites, boxes and locker rooms with toilet paper, soap and roll towel. Coleman's staff also cleans and takes calls during games. In all there are 62 restrooms and four family restrooms at Camp Randall, not including the suites.



The UW Athletics Facilites Department ensures that Camp Randall Stadium and its surrounding areas are safe, clean and properly prepared for Badger gamedays.

In addition, Coleman oversees the cleanup of Camp Randall at the conclusion of games, which includes spraying the entire seating bowl with a fire hose and cleaning the streets outside the stadium within a two-block radius.

"It takes about 120 people and between four to six hours to clean the seating bowl and other areas used, like the concourse and locker rooms," Coleman said.

Facing different challenges, Glenn Betts likely has more varied responsibilities than all the staff heads. As superintendent, Betts' to-do list is pages long and is constantly updated with new tasks, just as others are crossed off.

Betts has approximately 14 daily staff members who take care of stadium repairs and clean-up that Coleman's crew does not get to. Additionally, Betts works with everyone from Associate Athletic Director for Operations John Chadima, to the event manager, to building contractors, to police officers and per mar security, to coaches and other department heads.

On game day, Betts has to make sure every detail is taken care of, from the set-up of ticket stands, to preparation at entrance/exit gates, to cleanup, to making sure lights are changed and working, to handling heating and cooling issues, to hanging up banners and signs, to converting the volleyball court for tailgating, among dozens of things. "We work with everybody when it comes to game days," Betts said. "All the different entities are involved here. There literally are pages of things to do to set-up for game days. Some things we can set up early and leave the entire season, but other things we have to set up and take down each week."

Working outside the stadium is Dan Wyatt's responsibility, whose forte is athletic playing surfaces. As the building and grounds superintendent, Wyatt also maintains all outside grounds, mainly by mowing, watering and landscaping.

Inside the stadium, outside, around or near—every detail is paid attention to.

One of the goals of the UW facilities staff is to do their job so well that fans and other patrons have nothing else to think or talk about but football. The staff, whose game days begin at 5:30 a.m. for an 11 a.m. kickoff, work to ensure everyone attending a football game at Camp Randall Stadium stays safe, enjoys the event and the overall experience of game day.

So the next time you see someone changing a garbage bag, sweeping the floors or making sure the area is secure, take the time to smile or give a word of thanks to the people who make game day at Camp Randall Stadium so special and one of the best in the nation.






Last Saturday morning, on my way to Camp Randall for our game with The Citadel, I stopped to grab a coffee to go at the Victor Allen's on Monroe Street. It was a few minutes before 7 a.m. and, just as I got out of my car and walked toward the coffee shop, one of the store employees was unlocking the doors.

Nonetheless, when I got inside it looked like they'd been open for hours. The morning's newspapers were there. Doughnuts and scones gazed at me tantalizingly from the shelves (I didn't gaze back). And the coffee was ready when I ordered. I left thinking that someone got that store ready long before the doors were unlocked for me. It's like that at Camp Randall for our home football games.

I usually arrive at our home games about four hours before kickoff. When I drive up Engineering Drive to drop off media credentials, security personnel and UW Parking and Transportation employees are already there. There are security people checking the contents of my bag when I enter the stadium. Our marketing staff is often meeting when I pass the conference room on the second floor of Kellner Hall on the way to my office. Once inside the stadium, I can immediately hear UW Band Director Mike Leckrone barking out instructions to the UW Marching Band, which is always on the field practicing, most often in shorts and t-shirts regardless of the weather. I can smell food being prepared in the stadium kitchen (the Food and Beverage staff was at the stadium at 4 a.m. that day). Event Management, Technical Services, Telecommunications, Spirit Squad, Facilities, Maintenance ... all of these people are here hours before kickoff.

Those are just some of the folks I see on my way to the Evjue Communications Center. I know there are many others. Just as it is on the field during a game, it's a team effort for all of the support staff units to help make the gameday experience at Camp Randall one of the best in the nation. It's pretty cool to be part of it.




