
From the initial class of 17, the student population has grown to a current enrollment of more than 40,000 students, the seventh-largest school in the U.S.


- Wisconsin is one of just 60 members of the Association of American Universities, the most prestigious organization of higher education in the U.S.
- University libraries house more than 5.5 million volumes, 14th-most in the nation according to the Association of Research Libraries.
- The UW had \$415 million in research and development funds in 1995-96, third-most in the nation according to a National Science Foundation survey.
- Wisconsin received \$164 million in voluntary support for the 1994-95 school year, ranking first nationally among public colleges and universities.
- According to a *Standard & Poor's* survey, Wisconsin is one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.
- The 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States reported that 15 departments on campus were rated in the top 10 in the nation.
- The University boasts the top-rated department of education in the nation according to 1990 and 1994 studies conducted at the University of Illinois.
- The Wisconsin Alumni Association is the secondlargest independently financed group in the United States.
- Throughout its history, the UW-Madison has produced 13 Nobel Prize winners, 22 Pulitzer Prize winners, 46 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 15 members of the National Academy of Engineering and two members of the National Academy of Education.
- The University was a runner-up in the 1993 Rochester Institute of Technology / USA Today Quality Cup competition.




The University of Wisconsin Sets the Pace ...

- in discovering Vitamins A and B.
- in discovering the anti-cancer drug, fluorouracil.
- in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharine and cyclamates.
- as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer in 1933.
- in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer.
- with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school.
- in developing tests for phenyl-ketonuria (PKU), a congenital disease of children.
- with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university.
- in finding that the anti-estrogen drug, tamoxifen, can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who previously had cancer.
- finding in 1937 that niacin supplementation prevents pellagra, a deadly disease that killed 5,000 people a year.
- in the synthesizing of genes. Biochemistry professor Har Gobind Khorana synthesized the first gene, for which he later received the Nobel Prize in 1968.
- with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. Today more than 10,000 transplants are performed yearly, giving new hope to patients with leukemia and immune deficiency diseases.

- with the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space.
- as UW Hospitals and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories.
- as Elizabeth and James Miller, UW Medical School professors of oncology, were the first to identify characteristics among chemicals that cause cancer.
- as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of the common cold virus.
- in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound area during brain surgery on a human.
- in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis.
- with the late Dr. Howard M. Temin of McArdle Laboratory and his co-worker discovering reverse transcriptase (independently discovered by Dr. David Baltimore). This enzyme explains how retro-viruses cause cancer and AIDS. Temin's work led to his selection as a co-recipient of the 1975 Nobel Prize in Medicine.
- in organ preservation break-throughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this solution decreases the need for emergency transplants, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers.


The Nation's No. 1 City



Cyclers have more than 150 miles of trails and routes to pedal. Cross country skiers glide through more than 100 miles of trails. Saturdays in the fall are reserved for rooting on UW's revered Badger football team. Another popular May through October ritual is the farmer's market. Around the corner you can catch an earful at the Madison Civic Center where the Chamber Orchestra and Madison Symphony perform, and Pulitzer prize-winning plays are staged."

In the fall of 1993, MTV included UW-Madison as one of four campuses to feature during its "Guide to Higher Education" tour.



UW Madison Rankings

- The School of Education is ranked No. 1 in the nation according to a study conducted at the University of Illinois in 1990. In departmental rankings, Wisconsin placed second in educational administration and policy studies.
- U.S. News & World Report's annual graduate school rankings, published in 1993, ranked the UW-Madison in the top 12 of six science programs. The rankings were: computer science (tied for eighth), biology (tied for ninth), chemistry (10th), nursing (tied for 11th), health services administration (tied for 12th) and engineering (12th). Additionally, the magazine rated the UW's sociology department No. 1 in the nation.
- The School of Business' MBA program ranks in the top five percent among all schools in a 1993 *U.S. News & World Report* survey. The school's real estate program ranks third and the risk management program ranks fourth, the publication added.
- UW Hospitals and Clinics is among the leading transplant centers in the nation. In 1993, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the hospital among the top three percent in the U.S.
- The plant pathology department tied for first with the University of Cal-Davis in a 1986 study by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences.
- The forestry department was the top research department in the country in 1986, according to the Department of Agriculture.


Madison's nearly 40,000 students come from more than 115 countries and every state in the U.S. It has one of the largest international student enrollments of any U.S. university. The UW-Madison is internationally renowned for its research. In recent years it has ranked in the top five among all U.S. universities in terms of funded research, according to the National Science Foundation. Its faculty have won the most highly regarded of awards, including the Nobel Prize, the Pulitzer Prize and the National Medal of Science.

As one of the nation's major research institutions, the university maintains extensive research facilities—more than two dozen libraries, 35 specialized collections, three museums and numerous research centers.

Madison was one of only eight universities nationally chosen for Total Quality Management partnership with top American corporations.

ATHLETICS

Wisconsin Athletics Among the Nation's Best

Participating in athletics at the University of Wisconsin guarantees an opportunity to compete at the highest level. The Badgers have developed a national reputation as one of the top all-around schools in Division I-A.

As a member of the Big Ten and WCHA, Badger student-athletes receive the best in education, coaching, athletic competition, facilities and support.

Wisconsin demonstrated again in 1996-97 that it is one of the NCAA's top all-sports programs. The Badgers once again ranked nationally in the all-encompassing Sears Directors' Cup last year. Wisconsin has placed in the nation's top 20 for all-sports excellence in all four years of the Cup.

The 1996-97 season saw the men's crew team win a national title, while the Badger men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track teams plus the women's soccer team won Big Ten titles. The men's track team crowned three individual champions at the national meet, the most of any school.

Additionally, the football team played in its third bowl game in four seasons and the men's basketball team earned an NCAA tourney appearance for just the second time in 50 years.

chieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities today. The University of Wisconsin is one of the few institutions that has earned praise for its work in the classroom and on the playing fields.

The Association of American Universities (AAU) was founded in 1900 by a group of 14 universities, which included the UW-Madison, offering the Ph.D. degree. Today the AAU consists of 60 American universities and two Canadian universities. Membership is by invitation only.

Balancing the academic requirements of an outstanding institution with the demands of collegiate athletic competition is difficult. However, the University of Wisconsin has attacked the challenge and succeeded.

Inclusion in the Association of American Universities, three recent bowl championships, an NCAA men's soccer championship and eight consecutive appearances in the NCAA hockey tournament from 1987-95 are evidence that academics and athletics do indeed mix at the UW-Madison.

During the 1996-97 season, 130 UW student-athletes were named academic all-Big Ten, with two athletes Bryan Jurewicz (football) and Matt VanderZanden (track and field) earning GTE academic all-America distinction.

LEARNING CENTER



THE FETZER CENTER

The sparkling new Wade Fetzer Academic Learning Center opened last spring to aid Badger student-athletes in the pursuit of their scholastic goals. The fully-equipped facility includes study rooms, a computer facility equipped with 22 computers, a 55-seat auditorium, conference rooms and offices for the academic affairs staff.

Academic Affairs Office

The primary objectives of the Department of Academic Affairs are to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes and to promote the best possible academic experience for those student-athletes. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record of many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to them.

The Wisconsin Student Affairs program is offered to the nearly 700 UW student-athletes. The advising staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments. They are available to assist student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitor progress toward degrees and offer career guidance.

As part of this effort, the Academic Affairs Office coordinates study groups for selected courses, provides access to tutors, and plans a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the academic year. Examples of such events are career nights devoted to resume writing and interviewing skills; freshmen seminars which cover topics of special interest to student-athletes (i.e. nutrition, health and safety issues, dealing with the media); and faculty/advisor night which provides academic program information prior to registration.

For those athletes who request assistance, counseling sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. More than 100 tutors are available for student-athlete utilization.

Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether they be personal or academic.






SPORTS MEDICINE

THE TRAINING ROOM

The Wisconsin sports medicine staff utilizes a wide variety of facilities and equipment to help athletes rehabilitate and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time. Student-athletes have the use of a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters, and Fitron Bicycles, during times of rehabilitation and recovery.







The Athletic Training Staff


The Wisconsin Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals. The UW Sports Medicine staff, headed by Dennis Helwig, employs seven full-time certified athletic trainers, three graduate assistants, and one part-time athletic trainer/physical therapist.

Combined, the athletic training staff brings more than 50 years of experience in providing health care to intercollegiate athletes. Olympic Games, World Championships, Olympic Festivals and extensive foreign travel highlight the varied and unique backgrounds and experiences the staff brings to the University and its studentathletes.

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provides dietary analyses, measures physiological capacity and outlines programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.

The UW is one of a handful of schools in the nationwith an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment and rehabilitation.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING





The Strength & Conditioning Staff

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, the UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game.

During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshman players arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Individual computerized programs are established for each player by hockey strength and conditioning coach Chris Doyle.

Home to Badger Hockey for 30 Years

The Dane County Coliseum marks its 30th season as the home of the Badger hockey team in 1997-98.

Known as one of college hockey's finest facilities by fans coaches and players alike, the Coliseum is furnished with theatre-style seating for more than 8,100. It is the third largest collegiate ice facility in the nation.

Beginning with the '94-95 season, the ice surface was widened to an impressive 200' by 97', making for wide-open, exciting, fast-paced hockey. Capacity was lowered from 8,644 to 8,101 to accommodate that change.

Prior to the 1996-97 season, eight luxury suites were added to the south end of the rink. These suites, with room for 12, feature buffet bars, private restrooms, dimmable lights, TV monitors and private entrances.


Recognized as the home of the nation's best collegiate hockey fans, the Dane County Coliseum hosted the nation's largest crowds for 24 years straight (1970-93).

The Badgers played their first game at the Dane County Coliseum on Nov. 24, 1967, beating Superior State 11-3. Since then, the UW has played in front of millions of avid hockey fans. On Oct. 19, 1996, the 5,000,000th hockey fan passed through the turnstiles at the Coliseum to witness the Cardinal and White on home ice.

For the past three years, the Badgers have sold out 42 of 48 home dates, including all 16 home dates during the 1995-96 season. In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set the all-time NCAA season record. The 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 set an NCAA and UW record.

The Coliseum has also played host to college hockey tournaments. In March of 1995, the Dane County Coliseum hosted the NCAA West Regional Hockey Championships. The Coliseum will also be the site of the 1999 NCAA West Regional. This year it is the site of the inaugural Team Cheerios Ice Breaker Invitational, which will signify the start of the college hockey season. The tournament takes place on Oct. 10-11.

THE BOHL CENTER-



A World-Class Facility

The future home of the Wisconsin hockey team will be the Kohl Center. Designed and built as one of the premier facilities in the country for intercollegiate athletics, the Kohl Center will accommodate 16,500 for basketball, 14,145 for hockey and 15,000 for campus and community events.

The Kohl Center is named for U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl (D-Wisconsin), a 1956 graduate of the UW-Madison, who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history.

Former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, gave \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's practice gymnasium will be named the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion.

Another financial boost to the project came in the form of a \$2.5 million gift from the Kellner family — Jack F. and his sons, Ted and Jack W. — of Milwaukee.


The facility will cost \$76 million with \$45 million coming from private gifts and \$27 million in state program revenue bonds.

The Kohl Center will encompass 450,000 gross square feet rising 90 feet about ground. The building includes two full-service concourses, with the main concourse ceiling measuring 23 feet high. The unique design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be close to the action with excellent sight lines.

The facility also includes 36 suites (28 in the lower concourse and eight in the upper concourse). Each suite is designed to hold 12 individuals.

Badger Outlook

Senior Leadership Will Key Badger Success in 1997-98

The topic of goals is part of many preseason team meetings and no doubt one of the goals in the minds of this year's Badger squad is a return to the NCAA Tournament. With a good nucleus of returning players, the 1997-98 Badgers will rely on the experience of their senior-dominated team to accomplish that goal. With 19 letterwinners returning, eight of whom are seniors, the biggest key to the success of this year's Badger squad will be the play of the senior class. Wisconsin will depend heavily on the leadership that group of seniors needs to provide if the UW is to achieve its goals.

"You look to your older players for strength and leadership," said head coach Jeff Sauer. "We have a lot of guys up front who have experience and we obviously will look to those guys to score goals and lead the team offensively."

Wisconsin lost only five players off last year's team that went 15-21-2 overall and 15-15-2 in WCHA play. With nine of the 10 top scorers back from the '96-97 team, offensive production should be a strength of this year's squad.

On the blueline, the Badgers have five returning lettermen in addition to four newcomers, including redshirt freshmen Alex Brooks and Jeff Dessner.

Sophomore Mike Valley returns to stake claim to the starting spot in goal, as he saw action in 10 games last season, with starts in five games.

A solid recruiting class includes six newcomers, three forwards, two defensemen and one goaltender. "We brought in a great freshmen class," said Sauer. "If you look at what we needed to shore up, we brought in six quality players who will have the opportunity to contribute in their rookie seasons."

FORWARD

Letterwinners Returning — 12 Letterwinners Lost — 2 Newcomers — 3

The Badgers return seven of their top eight scoring forwards from 1996-97, led by a group of five seniors — Joe Bianchi, E.J. Bradley, Brad Englehart, Rick Enrico and Mark Smith — who accounted for 57-76-133 (over 40 percent of total scoring) last season. Combine that with captain Erik Raygor's return after missing most of the '96-97 season following knee surgery, and the Badgers appear to have the tools to make an offensive

impact this year.

Raygor, who tallied 13-17-30 in his junior season (1995-96), has 31 career goals at the UW and will be counted on to lead the offensive charge. Englehart and Bianchi ranked first and second, respectively, in team scoring in '96-97, registering season-best totals in goals, assists and points. Both have the potential of being 20-goal scorers for the Badgers this year.

Englehart, a draft pick of the Mighty Ducks of Anaheim, scored in 23 of 35 games last year, including scoring hat tricks on two occasions. Bianchi leads his teammatés in virtually every career offensive category, including goals (36), assists (46), points (82), game-winning (9) and shorthanded (7) goals and is tied for the team career lead in power-play goals (11, with Raygor).

Other returning letterwinners at forward include Bradley, Enrico and Smith. All three are coming off their




Senior Erik Raygor returns to captain the Badgers after taking a medical redshirt in 1996-97.

best seasons as Badgers. Bradley enters the season with the longest games-played string on the team (42), coming off a season where he nearly tripled his scoring output from his sophomore year. Enrico finished last season with 114 shots on goal, second only to classmate Bianchi. He is one of four returning forwards to score in double-figure goal totals last season. Smith contributed 19 points in '96-97 and has the potential to increase that output in his senior campaign.

Joining the senior class of forwards is a talented sophomore group that held their own last year, gaining invaluable experience in the process.

Dustin Kuk, T.R. Moreau, Steve Reinprecht and Niki Siren, arguably the most talented group of rookie forwards in the WCHA last season, enjoyed very productive first-year campaigns and will be another factor in the Badgers' success this season.

Kuk finished fifth among WCHA rookies in points (5-17-22) and Reinprecht (11-9-20), who ended the year 10th among WCHA rookies in scoring, was one of just six league

rookies to break the double-figure mark in goals. He is also one of four returning UW players to score in double figures in the goal category.

Adding support at forward are junior winger Yuri Gusak, the team's plus-minus leader last year and sophomore forward Dan Bjornlie, a walk-on who contributed five assists in 28 games in his rookie season.

Three rookies — Kevin Granato, Chad Stauffacher and Andy Wheeler — look to break into the lineup after coming to the Badgers from successful junior and prep programs.

Both Granato and Stauffacher helped lead the Green Bay Gamblers to two consecutive regular-season and national junior championships in 1995-96 and 1996-97. Granato and Stauffacher were first and second, respectively, in scoring for the Gamblers last year.

Andy Wheeler, a walk-on, played high school hockey for Duluth (MN) East, the same high school of former UW all-American defenseman Sean Hill.

The Badgers lost two forwards to

graduation, Darren Haley and Chris Exarhos. Haley finished his senior year as the team's third-leading scorer with 14-13-27.

DEFENSE

Letterwinners returning − 5 Letterwinners lost − 2 newcomers − 2

The Badgers possess experience on defense, returning five of six letterwinners — Craig Anderson, Luke Gruden, Matt Peterson, Tim Rothering and Steve Sabo—who have combined to play in 328 games at the UW. The defensive corps will need to improve on its offensive contribution as those five combined for 15 goals in 1996-97.

Juniors Tim Rothering and Luke Gruden will be looked to to spark the UW's attack from the blueline. Rothering, the Badgers' offensive leader on defense tallied 5-14-19 in '96-97, despite missing five of the last 10 games hampered by an injury to his wrist. That injury held Rothering to just one point in the last six weeks of the season.

'97-98 Outlook

Seniors Matt Peterson and Steve Sabo and junior Craig Anderson round out the returning defensemen. Peterson is the Badgers' experience leader pacing his defensive teammates with 73 games under his belt. Sabo, a versatile defenseman who has also played forward at the UW, chipped in 4-8-12 last season.

Much will depend on the healthy return of redshirt freshmen Alex Brooks and Jeff Dessner, who missed all of last season with back injuries. Both Brooks, 6-2, 190, and Dessner, 6-2, 195, possess the size and physical play that could make them impact players.

Two rookies join the defensive group. Rob Vega, a Madison native, played prep hockey at Madison Edgewood before spending the '96-97 season with the Victoria Salsa of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League (BCJHL). Vega left Edgewood as the Crusader's all-time defensive scoring leader and paced Salsa defensemen in scoring with 8-24-32.


Rick Spooner also played junior hockey in Canada with the Pickering Panthers of the Metro Junior A Hockey League (MJAHL).

The biggest loss will be felt in goal with the departure of second-team all-American Kirk Daubenspeck. The Madison native finished his career at the UW as the all-time save leader with 3,517 career stops. Daubenspeck set numerous records in his senior year including the UW and WCHA mark for most saves in a game with 75 versus Colorado College in the first round of the WCHA playoffs.

His understudy, sophomore Mike Valley, would like nothing better than to step into the regular starting spot vacated by Daubenspeck. After a freshman season in which he played in 10 games and earned five starts, Valley

went 2-3-0 with wins over conference opponents Minnesota-Duluth and Michigan Tech. Valley sported a 3.39 goals-against average and an .892 save percentage.

Challenging Valley for playing time will be junior Jake Soper, who redshirt-

ed the 1996-97 season. Soper has seen action against five WCHA teams including a victory over St. Cloud State during the 1994-95 season.

Freshman Graham Melanson, who played with the Omaha Lancers of the USHL last season, was 19-5-1 with a 2.84 goals-against average and an .890 save percentage.

SCHEDULE

Wisconsin's 36-game schedule includes 16 games against teams that made the NCAA tournament in 1996-97. With Northern Michigan re-joining the CCHA this season, four non-conference games were added to the Badger slate. The UW added home and home contests with Nebraska Omaha (coached by former UW assistant Mike Kemp) and Notre Dame (the first regular-season series with the Fighting Irish since the 1980-81 season).

The Badgers open the 1997-98 hockey season hosting the inaugural Team Cheerios Ice Breaker Invitational. Boston University (Hockey East), Clarkson (ECAC), Michigan State (CCHA) and Wisconsin (WCHA) make up the first-year field in college hockey's preseason tournament.

Other highlights on the Badger schedule include games at Michigan and Michigan State for the fifth annual College Hockey Showcase and the ninth annual Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown, held this year on December 27-28. This year's Bank One Showdown features Northern Michigan (CCHA), Harvard (ECAC) and Boston College (HEA).

Wisconsin opens its home season this year against league-rival Minnesota on Nov. 7-8. It will mark the 200th and 201st meetings between the two schools.

The North Dakota Fighting Sioux, the defending NCAA Champions, come to Madison on Dec. 5-6. It will be the first series between the two teams in Madison since February of 1996.



JEFF SAUER 16TH YEAR AT UW 27TH CAREER YEAR

"Dean" of WCHA Coaches

Jeff Sauer begins the 1997-98 season on the verge of adding two more prominent milestones to his long list of coaching achievements. This year, Sauer enters his 27th year of coaching in the WCHA, the longest coaching stint in league history. It also marks his 16th year at Wisconsin, the longest ever for a Badger coach. (The late John MacInnes, who previously held the league's longevity mark, coached Michigan Tech for 26 seasons from 1956-82.) In addition, Sauer is 11 wins away from becoming the league's all-time winningest coach, currently trailing MacInnes who holds the WCHA coaching mark with 555 career wins.

Sauer begins the '97-98 season with an overall record of 545-456-43 and a UW mark of 379-230-32. He has coached 641 games as the Badgers head mentor, the most of any UW coach, and 1,044 career games as a coach in the WCHA. He enters this season sixth on the NCAA college hockey coaches all-time win list.

An Elite Club

With a 3-1 victory over Alaska-Anchorage on Jan. 6, 1995, Sauer became just the seventh coach in NCAA history to win 500 games. He is one of only four active Division I coaches to surpass the 500-win mark. During the 1995-96 season, Sauer reached another milestone coaching in his 1,000th game on Feb. 17 at Northern Michigan. He is the third coach in NCAA history to win 500 games and coach in 1,000 games. Only Ron Mason (Michigan State) and Len Ceglarski (Boston College) have more wins and games. Sauer has 545 wins entering this season in 1,044 games.


At Wisconsin

Sauer has coached 15 seasons at the UW and holds Badger records for most games (641), most wins (379) and now holds the record for coaching longevity (16 years). Under Sauer's guidance, Wisconsin has flourished. He has guided two Badger squads — the 1982-83 and 1989-90 teams — to NCAA titles. He has recorded three 30-win seasons (1982-83, 1987-88, 1989-90), the most of any UW coach. In WCHA play, the UW has finished in the league's top three 12 times.

Sauer's teams have averaged 25 victories per year and posted at least 24 wins 11 times. Compiling an impressive 379-230-32 record (.616), his Badger teams have earned NCAA tournament bids eight of the last 10 years.

The Playoffs

The Badgers have been very successful in the playoffs, amassing a stellar 59-29-2 (.667) mark in postseason play under Sauer. Noted for their second-half surges, the Badgers own a cumulative 205-117-18 (.629) record from Jan. 1 through the playoffs since 1982-83. That record improves to 127-69-12 (.639) from Feb. 1 through the playoffs in that same time period.



On International Ice

From the United States to the Soviet Union, from Sweden to Finland, Coach Jeff Sauer has left his mark around the world. In addition to being one of college hockey's top coaches, Sauer has been a noticeable presence on the international scene as well. He is very active in USA Hockey and dedicated to its commitment to the development and promotion of hockey at all levels in the U.S. Sauer has been chosen frequently to coach U.S. teams in international competition.

In August of 1997, Sauer was one of two coaches chosen to coach the U.S. Select Team at the Tampere Cup in Finland. The team, made up of 20 of the top American-born collegiate players, competed against top international teams. In the spring of '95, Sauer was head coach of the U.S. National Team for the World Championships in Stockholm and Gavle, Sweden. The U.S. team finished first in Group B emerging from first-round action with a 3-0-2 record. With wins over Austria (5-2), Norway (2-1) and the Czech Republic (4-2) and ties against Sweden (2-2) and Finland (4-4), the United States advanced to the medal round. before losing its first game to Canada (4-1).

Sauer was a finalist for both the 1992 and 1994 U. S. Olympic coaching jobs. In April of 1992, Sauer was an assistant coach for the U.S. at the World Tournament in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

He was head coach of Team USA in the 1990 Goodwill Games. Prior to the Games, Team USA beat the Soviet Union's National Team in an exhibition contest at the Oakland Coliseum. It was the first time since 1980 that a U.S. squad had beaten a team from Russia.

SAUER MILESTONES

- Sauer's first win as a Badger head coach was on Oct. 15, 1982, in a 4-3 win at Bowling Green State.
- On March 26, 1983, Sauer won his first NCAA title in a 6-2 win over Harvard in Grand Forks, N.D. He became the first coach to win an NCAA title in his rookie season with a team.
- On Jan. 6, 1995, Sauer recorded his 500th career victory with a 3-1 win over Alaska Anchorage. He became one of only two active Division I coaches to win that many games. At Wisconsin, no other coach in any sport had ever won 500 career contests.
- Sauer coached in his 1,000th career game on Feb. 17, 1996, at Northern Michigan, a 5-4 victory. He is one of only three coaches in college hockey history to win 500 games and coach in 1,000 games.
- With the start of the 1997-98 season, Sauer will begin his 27th year of coaching in the league, the longest stint of any coach in WCHA history.

Under Sauer's guidance, Team USA advanced to the gold medal game against the Soviet Union, losing a 4-3 decision in a shootout at the end of sudden death.

In 1989, Sauer coached the USA Select Team at the Pravda Cup in Leningrad. In the spring of 1985, he served as an assistant coach to Dave Peterson for the USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague.

Sauer has also coached at the Olympic Festival (1987), served on the U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee (1984) and been a member of the Rules Committee.

In the Off-Season

During the summer, Sauer works various hockey camps throughout the country, including his own Wisconsin hockey schools which are located in Madison and St. Louis.

He also assists at Bob Johnson's school in Aspen (Colo.) and works as a counselor for Stan Mikita's hockey camp for the hearing-impaired in Chicago.

As an Assistant

Sauer began his coaching career at Colorado College as an assistant to the legendary Bob Johnson in 1966. In addition to his coaching duties with the hockey program, Sauer was an assistant baseball coach.

In 1968, he followed Johnson to Wisconsin becoming his first full-time assistant at the UW. Sauer was an assistant coach for the Badgers in 1970, when the UW made its first ever appearance in the NCAA tournament. He served in that capacity until 1971, when he accepted the head coaching job at Colorado College.

At CC, where he served as head coach from 1971-82, Sauer won 166 games and was twice named WCHA Coach of the Year. His first award came following his rookie season, and the second followed the 1974-75 campaign when Colorado College posted a 23-16-0 record and finished third in the WCHA.

Personal

Sauer is a 1965 graduate of Colorado College, where he earned a bachelor's degree in sociology. During his undergraduate years, he competed in both varsity hockey (winger) and baseball (pitcher/outfielder) for the Tigers, earning four letters in baseball and three in hockey. He served as an assistant captain for hockey in his senior season. He attended Washington High School in St. Paul, Minn., lettering nine times in hockey (3), baseball (3) and football (3). He

earned all-city (hockey and baseball) and all-state honors (hockey).

His father, Ted, coached high school hockey at St. Paul (Minn.) Central and was inducted into the UW-Platteville Hall of Fame in 1993.

Jeff and his wife, Jamie, have a son, Chip, a senior at the UW, and a daughter, Beth.

Yearly Highlights

1982-83 — In his first year at Wisconsin, Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach had ever done. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history (33-10-4).

Four members of that team—Pat Flatley, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend—also played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia.

1987-88 — The Badgers won their first-ever WCHA playoff championship, defeating North Dakota (2-1) and Minnesota (3-1) to claim the Broadmoor Trophy. Earlier in the year, Wisconsin won the Great Lakes Invitational Tournament with wins over Michigan (6-0) and Michigan State (4-3). The Badgers finished the season with a 30-13-1 mark and Sauer's second 30-win season at Wisconsin.

1989-90 — In one of Wisconsin's finest seasons, the team posted a 36-9-1 record, en route to capturing the school's fifth NCAA Championship and the second of Sauer's tenure. The Badgers won both the WCHA regularseason and playoff championships. The WCHA regular-season title was only the second in UW history. The Badgers' 36 victories in '89-90 marked the third time under Sauer that a Wisconsin team won 30 or more games. No other Badger coach can claim that distinction.

1991-92 — Sauer's Badgers surprised the college hockey world, finishing as the NCAA runners-up. Receiving the sixth seed in the West, Wisconsin was an underdog to advance to the final four. The UW proceeded to upset the No. 3 seed New Hampshire (4-2) and the No. 2 seed St. Lawrence (5-2) to qualify for the NCAA Championship. In the semifinals, Wisconsin

knocked off Michigan (3-2) before losing to Lake Superior State (5-3). It marked the second time in three years Wisconsin played for the NCAA title.

1992-93 — The Badgers advanced to the NCAA tournament after a second-place finish in the WCHA. The Badgers came within seconds of advancing to their third final four appearance in four years but fell to Michigan 4-3 in overtime at Joe Louis Arena.


1994-95 — Wisconsin claimed Sauer's fourth WCHA Playoff title with wins over Denver (5-4) and regular-season champion Colorado College (4-3, ot) at the St. Paul Civic Center. The Badgers fell one game shy of earning a trip to the NCAA finals. In the NCAA West Regional at the Dane County Coliseum, Wisconsin beat Michigan State (5-3) before losing to Michigan (4-3).

1995-96 — Despite entering the month of January with a 6-13-1 mark, the Badgers put on a second-half surge that few fans will not soon forget. On Jan. 27, a 6-6 tie at Michigan Tech started an 11-game unbeaten streak (9-0-2) that ended with a 4-3 overtime loss to Minnesota in a WCHA Final Five semifinal game. During the unbeaten streak, the UW recorded sweeps over Minn.-Duluth, Minnesota and North Dakota (twice). The sweep over Minnesota was the first over the Gophers since 1985-86. The 11-game unbeaten string was the longest since the 1982-83 season when that team won 11 games in a row.

PAT FORD begins his fourth season with the Badger coaching staff. He works with the Badger forwards and special teams and is also recruiting coordinator for the program.

He is a member of the American Hockey Coaches Association (AHCA) and USA Hockey. Ford is actively involved with USA Hockey and Hockey Canada sponsored events.

In the off-season, he is involved in numerous hockey schools throughout Canada and the United States. He has been a head instructor for UW hockey schools for the past seven years.

Prior to Wisconsin: Ford served as an assistant coach at Northern Michigan for two years (1992-94) before returning to Wisconsin, where he was a graduate assistant coach in 1991-92.

As a player: He was a four-year letterwinner at Wisconsin, playing under Coach Sauer from 1984-88 and scoring 48-78-126 in 155 career games as a Badger center. He was a member of the UW team that won the first-ever WCHA Playoff Championship in 1988.

Personal: The 33-year old native of Saskatoon, Sask. received his B.S. degree in bacteriology from the UW in 1990.

Pat and his wife, Cammi, have two sons, Jason (3) and Keegan (1) and are expecting their third child. They reside in Waunakee, Wis.

MARK JOHNSON starts his second season as an assistant coach for the UW hockey program in 1997-98. He is the third Johnson to coach at Wisconsin after his father, the legendary Bob Johnson, was the UW head coach from 1966-82 and his brother, Peter, was an assistant under Jeff Sauer from 1987-91.

Prior to Wisconsin: Before joining the Badger staff, Johnson was the 1995-96 Coach of the Year in the Colonial Hockey League as the head coach of the Madison Monsters. In Madison's inaugural season, he guided the Monsters to a 37-30-7 mark and a playoff berth.

As a player: Johnson became the school's second all-time leading scorer with 125-131-256 in three seasons (1976-79) at the UW. He still holds Wisconsin records for most goals in a career (125) and season (48). In 1978-79 he tallied 41-49-90 setting the school mark for most points in a season which still stands. He was part of the '76-77 NCAA Championship team and earned two first-team all-America distinctions (1978 and 1979). He is one of only three UW players to be selected twice to the all-America first team.

Johnson was the leading scorer (5-6-11) at the 1980 "Miracle on Ice", when the U.S. Olympic team won the Gold Medal in Lake Placid, N.Y.

After the Olympics, he enjoyed an 11-year career in the NHL, amassing 219-317-536 in 669 games.

Personal: He has a B.S. degree in kinesiology from the UW. He and his wife, Leslie, are the parents of Douglas (13), Christopher (12), Patrick (9), Mikayla (2) and Megan (1).

BILL HOWARD, a veteran of all five UW NCAA titles, has been a key figure in the Badgers' continued success in goal and begins his 25th year with the UW coaching staff this season.

During the off-season, Howard is actively involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including intensive goaltending schools in St. Louis and Madison. He teaches high school classes (business law) on a full-time basis at Madison Memorial. Howard has also served as color commentator, both radio and TV, for Badger hockey.

At Wisconsin: During his tenure at the UW, Howard has helped develop all-Americans Julian Baretta (1977), Roy Schultz (1980), Duane Derksen (1992) and Kirk Daubenspeck (1997) and NHL standouts Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (Edmonton Oilers) and Jim Carey (Boston Bruins).

Prior to Wisconsin: Before joining the UW staff, the 53-year-old Howard coached high school hockey at Madison Memorial for 10 years. His Spartan hockey teams won two state titles and posted a 136-72-1 (.653) mark.

As a player: Howard enjoyed a distinguished career at Colorado College as a goaltender, where he played for Bob Johnson.

Personal: Originally from Grand Forks, N.D., Bill and his wife, Bonnie, have two sons, Troy, who lettered four years (1992-96) at the UW, and Casey, who played collegiate hockey at UW-Stevens Point.

CHRIS DOYLE, starts his first season as the head strength and conditioning coach for the Badger hockey team and his second year on the Wisconsin strength and conditioning staff.

At Wisconsin: In addition to hockey, Doyle also serves the UW football program, overseeing all of the computer operations for the Badger football squad. In that capacity he is responsible for developing, administering and monitoring all individualized training programs. Other duties in his current position include main floor supervision, evaluation of athletic profiles, research, reconditioning injured athletes as well as being a clinician for UW athletic camps.

Prior to Wisconsin: Doyle came to the Badgers from the College of Holy Cross where he served as an assistant coach (offensive line) from 1992-95. During the 1991-92 season, he was a graduate assistant coach with the offensive line and also an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Notre Dame. 

MIKE JOHNSON begins his 10th year as a staff certified athletic trainer at Wisconsin and his eighth season as the head athletic trainer for the UW hockey team. In addition to the hockey team, he also provides care for the men's and women's golf teams.

A native of Minneapolis, he did his undergraduate work at Minnesota, receiving a B.A. in sociology (1985). Johnson attended graduate school at Michigan State, serving as a graduate assistant (1985-87), and earning a master's degree in physical education with an emphasis in athletic training.

He was hired at Wisconsin in 1988 and has worked with the football, hockey, men's and women's track and field, cross country, crew and tennis programs.

Johnson has worked a number of national and international events, including the '91, '92 and '95 Ice Hockey World Championships with the U.S. National team in Finland, Czechoslovakia and Sweden, respectively. He took a temporary leave of absence from his duties at the UW-Madison from July of 1993 to March of 1994 to work with the '94 U.S. Olympic hockey team. Last August he went with the U.S. Select team, along with head coach Jeff Sauer and team manager Rob Malnory, to the Tampere Cup in Finland.

In addition to his sport responsibilities, Johnson coordinates athletic trainer coverage for all summer camps on campus, coordinates pre-participation physical exams for all student-athletes and is responsible for the ordering and inventory of all supplies for the UW Sports Medicine program.

ROB MALNORY, a veteran of three Badger NCAA Championships, marks his 18th year with the UW hockey team and his seventh season as the administrative assistant to Coach Jeff Sauer.

A native of Waupun, Wis., Malnory's duties include the planning and coordinating of all hockey road trips and serving as equipment manager.

Malnory was equipment manager for the U.S. Select Team, which played for the Tampere Cup in Finland. During the summer of 1993, Malnory served as equipment manager for the USA Hockey Select 17 team, which competed in Tokyo, Japan.

In the fall of 1992, he served as equipment manager for USA Hockey's Over-20 team, which took part in tournaments in Finland. He was also manager for the 1989 USA Select Hockey Team, earning a trip to Leningrad, USSR, for the Pravda Cup.

In the summer of 1987, he was the assistant equipment manager at the U.S. Olympic Festival in Greensboro, N.C., and he also worked with the 1988 USA Hockey Team at a training camp in Lake Placid, N.Y.



Chancellor



DAVID WARD UW CHANCELLOR

David Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in June 1993, becoming the 25th individual to serve as the university's chief executive. Ward had served as interim chancellor since January 1993.

For the past eight years, Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education. Changes inspired by Ward include: enhanced student advising, particularly for freshmen and sophomores; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

The next step, says Ward, is to redefine undergraduate education, not simply through improvements of existing programs and processes, but by developing new ways for learning to occur on college campuses. To that end, he recently published a comprehensive strategic planning document, outlining priorities for the next decade as the university works toward balancing its teaching, research and outreach missions. One

way the university can unify its activities, Ward says, is by emphasizing learning as a central goal.

This development of campus learning communities recently was echoed by the Kellogg Commission on the Future of State and Land Grant Universities. In its first report, the 25-member group of university chief executives, on which Ward serves, called on public institutions to become "genuine learning communities" that are student-centered, support and inspire learners of all kinds, and sustain a healthy learning environment.

During his tenure, Ward has given new expression to The Wisconsin Idea, the venerable philosophical framework for the university's public service role. The Wisconsin Idea is embodied by a vast array of partnerships between the university and both the public and private sectors, says Ward, from economic development activity and sharing of faculty expertise, to educational collaborations with K-12 schools.

"The university's commitment to the citizens of Wisconsin is stronger than ever as we approach the 21st century," says Ward, who looks forward to marking the university's sesquicentennial in '98-99.

Ward was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963. Ward served as chair of the geography department from 1974 to 1977 and as an associate dean of the Graduate School from 1980 to 1987. He became vice chancellor for academic affairs at UW-Madison in 1989, and in 1991, he was also named provost, chief deputy to the chancellor. His UW-Madison faculty career spans more than 30 years, and he holds the Andrew Hill Clark Professorship of Geography.

As a scholar, Ward is a recognized authority in historical urban geography and has pioneered research on English and American cities during their rapid growth of the 19th and 20th centuries. He is a past president of the Association of American Geographers. He has authored two books, edited two books and contributed many articles in leading academic journals. In recognition of his postdoctoral research, Ward was awarded the degree of Litt.D. by his undergraduate alma mater.



Athletic Director



PAT RICHTER
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Director of Athletics Pat Richter, the former Badger all-America gridiron star, three-sport letterman and successful business executive, is the man in charge of one of the NCAA's most thriving athletic departments.

During a time of budget tightening, presidential reform and gender equity concerns, the dean of Big Ten Athletic Directors (named to the position in 1989) has built a model intercollegiate program.

As Director of Athletics, he is responsible for 21 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes and more than 160 employees.

As a student-athlete, Richter earned all-America (1961-62) and academic all-America (1962) honors as an end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and set a game-record with 11 receptions.

In the first ever college football game between the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams, Richter and his Badger teammates dropped a 42-37 decision to USC at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor.

He earned all-league honors in baseball and led the UW in hits, homers and RBI three times. The 6-5 center received his scholarship for basketball.

Richter was recognized for his gridiron exploits last year with his induction into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture (1964), Richter was a first-round draft pick of the Washington Redskins. He played from 1963-71.

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After working at a Madison law firm, he climbed his way to vice president of personnel at the Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was enshrined into the Athletic Department and Rose Bowl Halls of Fame in '91 and '94, respectively. In 1995, he became the second Badger to gain induction into the GTE Academic all-America Hall of Fame.

Pat and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim. Barry is a member of the NHL's Boston Bruins.

THE RICHTER NOTEBOOK

- After inheriting a division that was \$2.1 million in debt in 1990, Richter eliminated the red ink on the ledgers in less than four years. That recovery came during a time when three-quarters of the Division I programs in the United States were losing money.
- The football, basketball and hockey squads have set season attendance marks during his administration. Football attendance has placed in the top 10 nationally the last four years.
- He has overseen plans for significant facility improvements, most notably the construction of the \$76.4 million Kohl Center. This state-of-theart facility will open in January of 1998.
- Under Richter, Badger teams have been highly successful with the football team enjoying unparalleled success under Barry Alvarez and the men's and women's basketball teams, under Dick Bennett and Jane Albright-Dieterle, making postseason play the standard instead of the exception.
- The UW has placed in the top 20 for total sports success in all four seasons of the Sears' Director's Cup.
- The Badgers have claimed three — hockey (1989-90), soccer (1995) and crew (1996-97) — NCAA championships during Richter's tenure.

She is the Badgers' primary women's athletic administrator to the Big Ten and NCAA.




A 1977 graduate of Slippery Rock State, Marra received her M.A. from Ohio State in 1983.

1996-97 Review

THE SEASON

The Wisconsin hockey team finished its 1996-97 season with a 15-21-2 mark overall and a 15-15-2 mark in WCHA play. The Badgers ended the season with 32 points in league play, good for a seventh-place finish.

The win total (15) were the fewest under Sauer and the lowest total since the 1979-80 season when that UW squad was 15-20-1. In league play, the Badgers improved on their 14-15-3 WCHA mark from 1995-96.

THE PLAYOFFS

Wisconsin travelled to Colorado Springs for the first round of the WCHA playoffs to take on Colorado College. The Tigers won the best-of-three series, 2-0, winning 9-3 and 1-0 (four overtimes).

The first-round exit by the UW was the earliest since '79-80. It also marked the first time in the history of the WCHA playoff championships (started in 1987-88), that a Badger team did not advance to the league semifinals.

MAKING HISTORY

Wisconsin and Colorado College set an NCAA record at the Air Force Academy's Cadet Ice Arena in Colorado Springs, Colo. On March 8, 1997, the Badgers and Tigers played 129:30 of scoreless hockey before CC scored the game's only goal in the fourth overtime.

The game is the longest collegiate men's hockey game in history, shattering the old record of 102:09 set by North Dakota and Minnesota on Dec. 21, 1968. The Sioux defeated the Gophers 5-4 in five overtimes during the Minnesota Holiday Classic Championship in Bloomington, Minn.

BOOKSMART

Three UW hockey players were named to the WCHA all-academic team for the 1996-97 season. Senior Kirk Daubenspeck and juniors Rick Enrico and Mark Smith represented Wisconsin.
Requirements include having completed at least one year of schooling at your current institution, maintaining a 3.0 GPA or having a 3.0 GPA for the previous two or three semesters and playing in at least half of your institution's hockey games.
Goaltenders must

have played at least 33 percent of the team's minutes during the season.

For Enrico and Smith it was the second straight year they have been named to the WCHA all-academic team. It was Daubenspeck's first all-academic honor.

ALL-AMERICAN

Senior Kirk Daubenspeck's second-team all-America selection was the first for a Badger goaltender since Duane Derksen in 1992. Daubenspeck became the sixth UW goaltender to earn all-America accolades. Previous all-America Badger netminders were first-team selections Julian Baretta (1977) and Roy Schultz (1980) and second-team honorees Dean Anderson (1988), Curtis Joseph (1989) and Duane Derksen (1992).

The last Wisconsin player named firstteam all-America was defenseman Brian Rafalski in 1995.

ROOKIE RECAP

Wisconsin's rookie forward class of Dustin Kuk, T.R. Moreau, Steve Reinprecht and Niki Siren was arguably the best in the WCHA last season. The four combined to score 33-40-73, making them the highest scoring group of UW rookies since 1988-89 when Doug Macdonald (23-25-48), Sean Hill (2-23-25), Brett Kurtz (4-9-13) and Chris Nelson (1-4-5) combined to score 30-61-91. Kuk finished the year fifth among all

Kuk finished the year fifth among all WCHA rookies with 9-17-26. His 17 assists

Reinprecht, who tallied 11-9-20 (10-7-17 WCHA), was one of just six league rookies this season to break the double-figure mark in goals scored in WCHA play. He finished tied for 10th in overall scoring.

SHORTHANDED SNIPER

Junior center Joe Bianchi scored his seventh career shorthanded goal during the 1996-97 season. He ranks tied for fifth on Wisconsin's career shorthanded goal list.

Bianchi had three shorthanded scores last season, including back-to-back mandown tallies at Alaska Anchorage. The record-holders are Norm Cherrey (1969-72) and John Johannson (1980-84) with nine each. Listed below are the Badgers' top 10 career shorthanded goal scorers.

A Year for the Record Books

Senior goaltender Kirk Daubenspeck ended his stellar UW career in 1996-97. He not only excelled on the ice, but also in the classroom, breaking a 40-year-old WCHA record and earning academic all-league honors. Listed below are a few of the highlights from Daubenspeck's senior year.

Jan. 25, 1997 — With his 62-save performance, including 26 in the second period, Daubenspeck tied a Wisconsin record for saves in a game (Jim Makey made 62 saves against Michigan State on Jan. 12, 1973). He set the UW record for saves in a period, breaking Terry Kleisinger's mark of 25 set vs. Minnesota on Nov. 29, 1980.

Feb. 7, 1997 — Daubenspeck made his 3,223rd save as a Badger in the third period against Colorado College, making him the Badgers' all-time save leader. He passed Duane Derksen who held the previous record (3,222).

March 8, 1997 — After a record 129:30 minutes of play, the Badgers lost 1-0 in four overtimes to Colorado College, but Daubenspeck established a WCHA and UW record with 75 saves, while breaking the record for most minutes played in a game (along with CC goaltender Judd Lambert). The previous record of 73 saves was set by Ed Schiller of Michigan State on Feb. 6, 1954.

March 14, 1997 — Daubenspeck was named to the all-WCHA second-team and also to the all-academic all-league team. He was selected by the players in the WCHA as the College Hockey USA/WCHA Players' All-Star first team goaltender.

March 27, 1997 — Voted second-team all-America by the American Hockey Coaches Association (ACHA). He is the first UW goaltender since Duane Derksen in 1991-92 to earn all-America status.

April 4, 1997 — Named the team MVP for the second year in a row and also the recipient of the Ivan B. Williamson Scholastic Award at the annual UW hockey awards banquet. Daubenspeck became just the second player in UW history to receive both awards in the same year (Mike Eaves in 1975-76). He is the first Badger to earn MVP honors in back-to-back years since goaltender Gary Johnson was chosen the team MVP three consecutive years from 1964-67.

Badger hockey was dropped as an intercollegiate sport in 1933, due to the depression which affected athletic incomes and crippled many Wisconsin sports programs. The UW hockey team continued to play in the WIHL until 1935 when the players disbanded. After a 28-year absence, hockey was reinstated as an intercollegiate sport by then athletic director Ivan B. Williamson at an athletic board meeting in March of 1962. The first teams consisted of players who were recruited by posting flyers around campus, asking for those interested to report to a meeting in Agricultural Hall. Although practices and scrimmages were held during the 1962-63 school year, the first full season of the modern era of Wisconsin hockey was 1963-64.



isconsin played all-out hockey for the first two periods, then really turned it on in the third period to outskate Denver, 4-2, and win the 1973 NCAA Hockey Tournament at the Boston Garden.

It was an almost perfect game for the Badgers, a continuation of the stirring finish that gave them an overtime victory over Cornell in the semifinals.

Wisconsin was the team with the pressure defense this time. The alert Badgers always seemed to jam a stick or a body in the way of Denver passes and get to the loose

pucks first.

Although Denver's second goal came on a power play, the Badgers followed with two great penalty killing efforts in the second and third periods. In the second period, Jim Johnston almost got a shorthanded goal when he hung back to scoop up a poke into the neutral zone and charge down on DU goalie Ron Grahame alone. But Johnston jammed the puck into Grahame's body.

In the third period, with 14:18 gone, the Badgers did another great job down a man as Denver made a last ditch attempt to get close. When the penalty elapsed, there

were less than four minutes to play.

Wisconsin opened the scoring when Dave Pay whacked a shot past Grahame 3:05 into the game on a centering pass from Johnston, who had scooped up a loose puck to the right of the cage and carried it around behind before feeding Pay. Denver tied the score at 13:55 when Jim Miller came in from the right side, took a pass from Pete McNab, and fired low under Makey's stick.

The Pioneers took a 2-1 lead on power play goals 54 seconds into the second period. Three defenders converged on McNab as he skated down the middle, but Rich Preston broke in from the right side, took McNab's pass and skated unmolested across the goal mouth, leaving Makey sprawling after his fake. All Preston had to do

was dump it into an open net.

Tim Dool tied the score on a power play at 4:17 of the second when Bentley passed across the rink to Norm Cherrey on the left wing. Cherrey poked a shot which bounced off Grahame's pads and rolled across in front of the net where Dool

Dean Talafous made it 3-2 on a pass from Bob Lundeen behind the cage 8:30 into the second period and Johnston scored the winner to start the third period. Winchester wound up with a good shot on Grahame which the goalie caught then fumbled. Johnston raced up and lifted it in.

teve Alley slammed in a rebound off Tom Ulseth's shot 23 seconds into overtime to give the weary Badgers a 6-5 victory over Michigan and the 1977 NCAA hockey championship.

If Wisconsin was off balance in Friday's overtime victory over New Hampshire, the Badgers came out clicking against the Wolverines in the title game.

The UW passed crisply and confidently and played strong defense, with the forwards coming back to backcheck consistently. Julian Baretta played confidently and positively in the net, even coming 30 feet out of his goal in the first period to knock away a loose puck and stop a potential Michigan breakaway.

Wisconsin jumped to a 3-0 lead on goals by Alley, Dave Herbst and Mark Johnson. Alley scored on a power play 2:29 into the game when he fought off a man in the slot and deflected a Craig Norwich slapshot from the center blue line past goalie Palmer. Herbst scored on a breakout off a beautiful pass from Norwich at 9:27. The two Badgers steamed down the slot, Norwich on the left side and Herbst ahead of him on the right. Norwich slid a pass through traffic to Herbst at the goal mouth who flicked it in.

Johnson scored on a rebound off an Alley shot on a power play at 15:12. Norwich, at the blueline, passed to Eaves in the left circle who forwarded it to Alley, who shot from the slot. The rebound hopped out to Palmer's left and laid there until Johnson roared in from the right circle to flip it over Palmer.

In the second period, Mike Meeker carried the puck down the right wing boards, stopped and deked a defender at the top of the circle then skated a stride and floated a backhander which hit the bottom of Palmer's glove and fell into the net. Johnson scored his second goal of the night at 1:10 of the third period. Twenty-six seconds later, Michigan started its three-goal comeback, tying the game, 5-5, at the 14:22 mark. The game culminated with Alley's goal in overtime.

Baretta, a sophomore, was named the tournament MVP. Baretta, and defensemen Norwich and John Taft were members of the all-tournament team. Wisconsin became the first team to win the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season.

hey were playing for the national championship; playing, without question, the biggest hockey game of their young lives. But they forgot how to act. For three days, you see, everyone had been telling them how to act. They said that they didn't belong in Duluth — these Back Door Badgers. They said they didn't belong in the same building, the same county or the same state with a team of the stature of Minnesota.

Yet, before taking the ice in the title match against the Gophers, they somehow forgot where they were, how they got there and who they were playing. They forgot how to act.

Whenever the discussion got too serious in the locker room, a freshman winger by the name of Ted Pearson would crack a joke or taunt a teammate.

They were not cocky, but they were confident. They were not frivolous, but they were loose. And, in the end, they were the 1981 NCAA Champions by virtue of a stunning 6-3 victory over Minnesota in the tournament finals at the Duluth Arena.

"We proved that were are the No. 1 team in the country, and no one can tell us anything differently now," said junior Ron Vincent. "We beat a bunch of all-Americans with a bunch of no-names."

"We showed a lot of character and poise," said captain Jay McFarlane. "We did it with 20 players, not just one or two."

And, of course, they did it the hard way, which, it would seem, is the only way that this team knew how to do things.

The Badger trifecta included wins over Clarkson College (the ECAC champion and the No.1 seed in the East); Northern Michigan (the CCHA champion and the No. 2 seed in the West), and Minnesota (the WCHA champion and the No. 1 seed in the West)

Two weeks after they had been eliminated by Colorado College in the first round of the WCHA playoffs and one week after they had been chosen as an at-large entry to the tournament by an NCAA selection committee, the Badgers defeated Clarkson in the quarterfinals in Potsdam, N.Y. to advance to the finals.

In Duluth, the Badgers whipped Northern Michigan, 5-1 in the semis to set up the showdown with the Gophers, who had beaten the Badgers three out of four times during the regular season.

isconsin won its fourth NCAA hockey championship, defeating Harvard, 6-2, with a finalperiod flurry in which the Badgers scored four goals. More than any other person, goalie Marc Behrend won the game with still another spectacular performance in the nets.

Behrend was tough in the first two periods, when Wisconsin nursed one-and two-goal leads. In the final period, Wisconsin blew the game open with goals by Paul Houston, Bruce Driver, Houston and John Johannson. Johannson scored his goal in an empty net.

It was particularly a sweet victory for Coach Jeff Sauer, who really should not have been expected to produce a winner in his first year.

As he waited for the trophy, he mopped his face the same way his predecessor, Bob Johnson, used to. Sauer, in a quick interview, said once his team was ahead, 2-0, "we wanted to play a good defensive game."

Behrend, who seemed to save his best hockey for postseason play, was named the tournament's most valuable player, the same honor he won when the Badgers won the title in 1981 in Duluth, Minn. He declined to differentiate between the victory he orchestrated in 1981 and this one. "They are both pretty special," Behrend said, but he admitted this run for the national roses was a bit of a surprise. "There is no way I thought at the start of the year that we would go all they way," he said. "I thought that this would be a transition year and that I would simply have to be happy with it."

Sauer, pausing long enough to analyze the victory, said: "We were stronger and bigger, and we were able to use that strength to win."

While Behrend was named the tournament's MVP, Paul Houck, Chris Chelios and Pat Flatley were also named to the all-tournament team.

Flatley got Wisconsin off to a first-period lead on a power-play goal 7 minutes, 9 seconds into the game, and for a while it looked as if the final might be another 1-0 struggle like the Badgers went through with Providence in the semifinals.

But at 16:09 of the second period, Flatley grabbed the puck in a melee in front the Harvard net and fired it in for the 2-0 lead. Things looked even better when Houston pushed in a rebound only three minutes into the final period.

It looked like a piece of cake.

But Harvard was playing like it wanted to win a national championship, too, and when it closed the margin to 4-2, the issue was still in doubt. The big goal was scored by Houston on a power play at 18:36, which put the Badgers ahead, 5-2.

hey sat in their cramped, hot dressing room at Joe louis Arena with lumps in their throats, tears in their eyes and a sense of determination so profound that their innermost feelings simply could not be disguised.

"I just walked around the locker room and looked in everyone's eyes," said Tom Sagissor, the outspoken senior wing. "I saw a lot of heart, saw a lot of dignity, a lot of pride. I saw guys who wanted to

One man's vision has never been more keen. Spurred on by the combination of talent, a strong spirit of friendship and a firm belief that they would not be denied after two near misses, the Badgers whipped Colgate, 7-3, to win the NCAA title.

A season that began on Labor Day and ended on April Fool's Day produced a 36-9-1 record and the

fifth national championship in school history.

John Byce scored three goals, the once-comatose playoff power-play clicked four times and an overall constitution that was both tougher, quicker and more experienced than the opponent were the primary reasons the Badgers won the second national title under Coach Jeff Sauer.

Chris Tancill, the tournament's most valuable player, Gary Shuchuk, Dennis Snedden and Rob Andringa accounted for the other goals for Wisconsin, which surged to a 4-1 lead after one period and kept its distance

Duane Derksen recorded 21 saves and got considerable assistance from a seemingly fearless set of defensemen who limited the Red Raiders (31-6-1) to 10 shots on goal in the first two periods.

The championship culminated a season that started with seven seniors — Sagissor, Byce, Tancill, Shuchuk, Rob Mendel, Mark Osiecki and Steve Rohlik - designating Sunday as their target date. Along the way they won the Western Collegiate Hockey Association regular-season and playoff titles

and responded to the pressure by winning 18 of their last 20 games (18-1-1).

"We knew we had one more goal to finish, and if we didn't do it, it would be an unfinished season. We didn't want that to happen." Rohlik, the captain, choked back tears as he talked about what

he and his teammates had overcome.

"There was pressure every night," he said. "Everyone would say, 'Is Wisconsin that good or aren't they?' That was the big question all year long. "We came into the season, we set our goals straight, Coach had us working hard, we went from one step to the other and we had one more step on that ladder and we reached it," said Rohlik.

They did so by jumping on the slower, less experienced (three freshmen) Colgate defense early

and victimizing Dave Gagnon who finished with 13 saves.

Byce converted on the power play 1 minute, 30 seconds into the game, then struck again at 3:23 when he took a bounce pass from Mendel and zoomed in alone for a shorthander. Joel Gardner answered with the first of three power play goals for the Red Raiders at 4:58, but Tancill and Andringa came through on man-advantage situations before the end of the period and Wisconsin was off and running

Colgate Coach Terry Slater admitted his team was affected by the announced crowd of 15,034, more than half of which were very loud UW rooters. Sauer said his club was also affected by the

crowd. "Just like playing at home," he said.



Edwin "Spike" Carlson coached the Badger hockey team for one season from 1930-31 after serving as an assistant coach under John Farquhar in 1929-30 and playing for the UW in the years 1922-23. Carlson was a strong proponent of hockey returning to Wisconsin in the 60's. The Badgers' annual team MVP Award is named after Carlson.

19205

1922—Hockey officially becomes an intercollegiate sport at the UW. Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota form the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL).

January 14, 1922—Wisconsin's first hockey game is a 4-1 loss to the Milwaukee Athletic Club.

January 20, 1922 — With a 1-0 decision over visiting Michigan, the Badgers notch their first victory.

January 21, 1927 — The Badgers play their first international game, losing to the University of Manitoba, 7-0.

March 4, 1927 — Wisconsin and Michigan play in the first American intercollegiate hockey game ever played outside the United States.

1928-29 — Under head coach John Farquhar, the UW records its first and only 10-win season of the pre-modern era with a 10-7-2 mark.

19305

1931 — Art Thomsen takes over as head coach of the Badgers, leading the team until the 1935 season. Nearly 30 years later, Thomsen becomes a cocoach for the 1963-64 UW squad when hockey is reinstated at Wisconsin.

1933 — Due to the depression, hockey is dropped after 12 years of existence as an intercollegiate sport. The Badgers continue to play in the WIHL until 1935.



CONFERENCE CHAMPS

The 1925-26 UW team, coached by Kay Iverson, posted the school's first winning season with an 8-3-4 mark and a first-place finish in the WIHL.

THE MODERN ERA BEGINS

The 1963-64 Badger squad was co-coached by Bill Riley and Art Thomsen and was the first team in the modern era of Badger hockey.

March, 1962 — Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announces the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence.

November 29, 1963 — Wisconsin suffers a 13-6 loss at the hands of St. Mary's (MN) in the first game played in the modern era of Badger hockey.

December 6, 1963 — A rebound goal by Chan Young gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate victory, a 3-2 ot decision over Macalaster.

December 11, 1964 — To upgrade the program, the Badgers schedule eight games against WCHA teams, but lose all eight.

February 22, 1966 — After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers post a 5-4 overtime victory over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scores on a breakaway two minutes into overtime.

April 1, 1966 — Following John Riley's retirement, Bob Johnson is named head coach.

March, 1968 — Bert DeHate, a sophomore center, wins the national scoring title with 77 points (47 goals and 30 assists). DeHate has seven hat tricks.

March 30, 1969 — The Badgers join the WCHA.

March, 1970 — Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA, and third at the NCAA Championship in its first NCAA appearance. Defenseman John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, becomes the first Badger to earn all-America honors.

March, 1972 — The Badgers make their second appearance at the NCAA Championship in three seasons. The team finishes third.

March 16, 1973 — Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6-5 in overtime, to advance to the finals of the NCAA Championships. A goal with five seconds left in regulation by Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

March 17, 1973 — With a 4-2 victory over Denver, Wisconsin clinches the 1973 NCAA Championship for the first time in school history.

February 19, 1977 — Wisconsin captures the MacNaughton Cup. With a 6-4 win over Minnesota-Duluth, the Badgers clinch their first WCHA regular-season championship.

March 25, 1977 — The Badgers make it to college hockey's final four. Les Grauer scores the tying goal and Mike Eaves gets the game-winner over New Hampshire (4-3, ot) in the NCAA semifinals.


March 26, 1977 — Steve Alley culminates the Badgers' finest season with a goal 0:23 into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA Championship. Wisconsin finishes the season at 37-7-1, and is the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in one season. Bob Johnson is named national coach of the year, while his son Mark is named freshman of the year. Three players are named to the all-American squad — defenseman Craig Norwich, goaltender Julian Baretta and center Mike Eaves.

March 25, 1978 — Wisconsin fans take Providence, R.I., by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championship, and are proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans" by the city. Mike Eaves concludes his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earn all-America acclaim.

March, 1979 — The Badgers play before 21 sellout crowds. The average crowd of 8,654 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum is eight short of a sellout. Mark Johnson, the collegiate player of the year, closes out his Badger career as the top goal scorer (125) in UW history.

March 27, 1981 — Wisconsin returns to the NCAA Championships for the sixth time since 1970 after defeating the best team in the east, Clarkson, 9-8 in a total goal series at Potdam, N.Y. After a 5-1 win over Northern Michigan in the semifinals, the Badgers advance to the finals for the third time in history.

March 28, 1981 — The Badgers win the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 decision over Minnesota. The Badgers defeat the No. 1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota). Goaltender Marc Behrend is named tournament MVP.

March 27, 1982 — Wisconsin makes its seventh NCAA Championship appearance, finishing second to North Dakota.

June 1, 1982 — Bob Johnson resigns after 15 years at Wisconsin. He guided the Badgers to three NCAA titles, seven NCAA tourney appearances and the best attendance of any program in the country.

July 8, 1982 — Jeff Sauer, former assistant to Bob Johnson, is named the school's fourth coach.

March 5, 1983 — Sophomores Chris Chelios and Paul Houck score the tying and game-winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota, 6-5, in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff Championships. It is the longest game in school history.

March 12-13, 1983 — The Badgers sweep past Minnesota, 5-1 and 3-2, in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West.

March 24-26, 1983 — Wisconsin advances past St. Lawrence in the NCAA Quarterfinals to make its third straight appearance in the NCAA

championships. In Grand Forks, N.D., the Badgers claim their fourth NCAA title beating Providence (2-0 in the semifinals) and Harvard (6-2 in finals), both of Hockey East. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend is named the NCAA tournament most valuable player for the second time in his career.

January 7, 1984 — Wisconsin becomes the only American college team to defeat the 1984 U. S. Olympic team (4-2) on its preparation tour.

November 23, 1985 — Wisconsin records its 500th victory since reviving hockey in 1963 with a 6-2 victory over North Dakota in the Coliseum.

December 30, 1987 — Wisconsin beats CCHA members Michigan and Michigan State to win the 23rd annual Great Lakes Invitational tournament before 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena.

March 6-7, 1988 — Wisconsin defeats UND (2-1) and Minnesota (3-2) to claim the first WCHA Playoff Championship.

December 28-29, 1989 — Wisconsin hosts the inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. The Badgers defeat Notre Dame (9-3) and Boston College (6-5) to capture the Pettit Cup.

February 16, 1990 — Wisconsin plays its 1,000th game since 1963 in a 6-3 victory at Minnesota.

February 24, 1990 — Wisconsin defeats North Dakota 5-4 in overtime on Chris Tancill's goal in front of a sellout crowd of 8,644 at the Dane County Coliseum. The Badgers' league title is the school's second since 1977.

March 12, 1990 — Wisconsin defeats Minnesota, 7-1, to claim the 1990 WCHA Playoff Championship. It is the UW's ninth WCHA playoff title and second in three years.

March 24, 1990 — Wisconsin completes an NCAA quarterfinal sweep of Maine with a 4-3 overtime win. The win sends the Badgers to Detroit for the 1990 NCAA Championships.

March 30, 1990 — The Badgers down Boston College, 2-1, in an NCAA semifinal game in Detroit as Chris Tancill scores both goals. More than 8,000 Badger faithful make their presence felt in the Motor City.


April 1, 1990 — Coach Jeff Sauer's Wisconsin Badgers whip Colgate, 7-3, to claim the school's fifth NCAA title. Senior John Byce records the hat trick in front of 15,034 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit. The Badgers finish with a 36-9-1 record, the second most wins in school history. Gary Shuchuk is named first-team all-American, while Chris Tancill is the tournament MVP.

April 2, 1990 — More than 5,000 enthusiastic Wisconsin hockey fans turn out at the UW Fieldhouse for a pep rally to honor the 1989-90 NCAA Champions.

December 29, 1990 — The Badgers claim their second Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown title, defeating North Dakota (3-2). The contest drew 17,671 fans, setting a WCHA record for attendance.

December 28-29, 1991 — Wisconsin wins its third straight Bank One Badger Showdown title. The Badgers defeat No. 1-ranked Maine (3-2) for the title.

April 2-4, 1992 — Wisconsin defeats Michigan (4-2) to move into the NCAA championship game against Lake Superior St. The Badgers lose (5-3) but become the lowest seeded team to advance to the title game. It is the UW's second final four appearance in three years.

March 26-27, 1993 — Wisconsin receives its sixth straight NCAA bid, traveling to Detroit for the NCAA Regionals. The UW defeats Miami (3-1) before dropping a 4-3 overtime decision to Michigan.

March 25-26, 1994 — With its seventh consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament, Wisconsin travels to Albany, N. Y. for the East Regional. The Badgers handle Western Michigan 6-3, but lose to top-ranked Boston University, 4-1.

March 17-18, 1995 — With victories over Denver and regular-season champion Colorado College, the Badgers claim the 1995 Broadmoor Trophy and the WCHA Playoff title. The championship earns Wisconsin its eighth straight NCAA appearance and 12th league playoff title.

March 8, 1997 — Wisconsin and Colorado College make college hockey history playing in the longest collegiate men's game ever. The game lasts 5 hours and 24 minutes, starting at 7:35 and ending at 12:59. The teams play until the 9:30 mark of the fourth overtime before the Tigers score to win 1-0. The Badgers' Kirk Daubenspeck sets a league and school record with 75 saves.

The Bradley Center



Introduction

The Bradley Center is a multi-purpose, public assembly facility located in downtown Milwaukee. A \$90 million venue which opened October 1, 1988, the construction of this showcase for sports and entertainment was a gift from Jane and Lloyd Pettit to the people of the State of Wisconsin. The two city blocks which serve as the site for the Bradley Center were provided by the City of Milwaukee.

The building is named in honor of Jane Pettit's father, Harry Lynde Bradley, industrialist, inventor, philanthropist and cofounder of the Allen-Bradley Company.

The Site

The Bradley Center neighborhood was part of Kilbourntown, one of three 1835 settlements that united in 1846 to form the city of Milwaukee (the other two were Juneautown and Walker's Point). Early residents of

Kilbourntown included many German immigrants. Usinger's and Turner Hall, neighbors of the Bradley Center, still house the work of several members of the German Panorama painters who had studios in the area in the late 19th century.

The Bradley Center site is approximately six acres and is within walking distance of such luxury hotels as the new Hilton Hotel (formerly the Marc Plaza), the Wyndam and the Hyatt Regency, tournament headquarters for the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown.

The Design

The Bradley Center features the integration of classical architectural elements with state-of-the-art engineering and technology. The building integrates polished carnelian granite, sandblasted textured concrete, gray glass and black aluminum creating a modern, yet functional building which blends into and complements the eclectic architecture of the buildings surrounding it.

Seating

Seating in the Bradley Center is comfortably arranged in an oblong octagon, which provides spectators with an unrestricted view of the playing surface and the centrally-located four-sided Sony JumboTron scoreboard.


The Lower Level (200 level) begins behind the hockey dasherboards and extends 21 rows up to the Suite Level (300 Level). The Upper Level (400 Level) extends to a maximum of 21 rows up from the Suite Level. Fans reach the three concourses via 16 escalators and two elevators. In addition, there are 12 concession stands, four merchandise stands, and 28 public restrooms. The arena houses separate team facilities for the IHL's Milwaukee Admirals, the NBA's Milwaukee Bucks and the Marquette Golden Eagles.

The seating capacity for hockey is approximately 17,800.

College Hockey at the Bradley Center

The Bradley Center is the site of the nation's premier collegiate hockey holiday tournament, the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. In the eight-year history of the tournament, more than 250,000 fans have witnessed Badger hockey at the Bradley Center. Twenty-three teams, representing all four collegiate hockey conferences, have taken part in the two-day event.

The Bradley Center has also hosted both the 1993

Bank One Showdown

The 1997-98 season marks the ninth year of the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. The brainchild of head coach Jeff Sauer, the Showdown has grown into one of college hockey's showcase events.

schools were NCAA postseason participants. Colorado College made it to college hockey's final four.



THE LONGEST GAME

Wisconsin and Colorado College not only set school records for the longest game during the 1996-97 season, but the two teams also set the collegiate men's mark. In a four-overtime WCHA playoff game on March 8, 1997, at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo., the Badgers and Tigers played 129:30 minutes of scoreless hockey shattering the previous mark of 102:09 set in 1968. The game lasted five hours and 24 minutes.

SHUTOUT STREAK


Wisconsin went nearly seven years — 316 games — without being shut out from Jan. 14, 1972, through Dec. 28, 1979. The longest streak without being shut out against WCHA competition is 276 games from Jan. 8, 1972, to Jan. 29, 1982.

CONSECUTIVE GOALS

The record for most consecutive games scoring at least one goal is held by Steve Alley and John Byce. Alley scored in nine straight games from Oct. 15, 1976, through Nov. 19, 1976. Byce accomplished the same feat from Jan. 6, 1990, through Feb. 3, 1990.

SCORING STREAK

Mike Eaves scored at least one point in 21 straight games during the 1977-78 season. The senior center tallied 18-28-46 in 21 games from Nov. 12, 1977, through Feb. 3, 1978. Eaves scored in 39 of 43 games (90.7 percent) that year. That streak included back-to-back five-point games on Dec. 9-10, 1977, against Michigan State.

isconsin has had 24 individuals earn 27 all-America honors since 1970. Defenseman John Jagger from Sault St. Marie, Mich. was the first Badger to earn all-America status. Since then, 23 other Badgers have been selected to the first and second teams.

Only three players in Wisconsin history have been honored on two occasions. Craig Norwich was the first Badger to receive the honor twice (1976-77), followed by Mike Eaves (1977-78) and Mark Johnson (1978-79).

Six forwards, nine defensemen and two goaltenders have earned first-team all-America distinction. Wisconsin has had the most honors at the blueline with 10 individuals earning 11 all-America awards.

The last Badger to be selected to the all-America first team was defenseman Brian Rafalski in 1995. Following the 1996-97 season, Madison-native Kirk Daubenspeck became the sixth Badger goaltender to earn all-America distinction.





INTERVIEWING COACH SAUER

UW head coach Jeff Sauer will hold a press conference with the media following the game after a short postgame session with the team. Sauer's press conference is conducted in the players' lounge near the Badger locker room. During the week, the best time to interview Sauer is between 10 a.m. and noon at the UW hockey office or before (approx. 2:45-3) or after (6-6:30) practices.

INTERVIEWING PLAYERS

During the week—Media wishing to interview specific players should call the Sports Information Office to check on their availability. Practices are held at the Coliseum from 3-6 p.m., on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays and from 3-5 p.m. on Thursdays of home weekends. Occasionally, practice will be held at the Arena on the grounds of the Dane County Expo. For exact practice times and locations, contact the SID Office. Players are available for interviews AFTER practice (approximately 5:30-6:00). Player availability is also dictated by class schedules.

Post-Game—Player interviews will be conducted in the players' lounge following Coach Sauer's post-game conference.

Wisconsin has a closed locker room policy. No media are permitted inside the Wisconsin locker room.

Area Map





WISCONSIN PUBLIC TELEVISION

Wisconsin Public Television enters its 20th year of Badger hockey broadcasts in 1997-98. WPT televises all UW home games on a tape-delayed basis across the state of Wisconsin on its seven-station network. In addition to its on-ice coverage of Badger hockey, WHA-TV created the 7th Man Award in 1980, which is voted on by the viewers and given to a UW player each year. The award was recently re-named the WHA-TV Jim Santulli 7th Man Award in honor of the late producer who initiated Badger hockey broadcasts on WHA.

WPT's announce team features veteran radio announcer Michael Bahr and former Badger defenseman Rob Andringa. Bahr is starting his 10th year at WIBA Radio and brings a wide breadth of sports experience to the broadcast. He is the sports director and program director at WIBA AM and hosts the morning talk show. He has been calling play-by-play for hockey, football and basketball at the collegiate and high school levels for more than 15 years.

Andringa starts his second year as color analyst for WPT. As a defenseman for the Badgers (1987-91), he was part of the 1990 NCAA Championship team and was selected to the NCAA all-tournament team that year. After graduation, he played hockey with the Pittsburgh Penguins' affiliate team before returning to Madison. He is currently an investment officer with Robert W. Baird & Co. Andringa's close association with and insight into the UW hockey program adds a unique perspective to WPT's telecast.

RADIO COVERAGE

Exclusive radio coverage of Wisconsin hockey is heard on WIBA (1310 AM). The University Athletic Department and Point Communications entered into a three-year agreement for radio broadcast rights in 1996. WIBA-AM is also a Madison affiliate for Badger football and basketball.

The announce team features two long-time Madison media members. Paul Braun, who calls the play-by-play, enters his 25th year of broadcasting Badger hockey. He has been at the mike for four of the five UW NCAA hockey championships. He started the statewide tape-delayed telecast of Badger hockey in 1973-74 along with WHA-TV Assistant Director of Radio and TV Jim Santulli. He has called the action for both radio and television hockey broadcasts, as well as working as play-by-play announcer for WHA-TV for delayed UW football and basketball telecasts.

Bill Brophy starts his 20th season covering the Badgers and his eighth as the color analyst on UW hockey broadcasts. He has served as the color analyst for UW hockey broadcasts with WTSO (1990-95) and the Wisconsin Radio Network (1995-96). Brophy was the sports editor of the Wisconsin State Journal from 1984-96, before stepping down to become Communications Director for the Diocese of Madison. Brophy has covered the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) for 22 years.
