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
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
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

From the fans to the band to the team on the court, there isn't a better atmosphere for college volleyball than the Wisconsin Field House!

Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. Before the doors even open, fans are lined up outside the doors anxious to get the best seats.

When the team takes to the court for warmups, fans are in their seats ready to cheer on their favorite team. Or they may be buying concessions or buying Wisconsin volleyball souvenirs in Bucky's Locker Room.

When the UW band starts playing, the members of the Block Party, the student section, are on their feet. No where else will you find a louder or more enthusiastic crowd!

Badger fans are also loyal. The UW Field House has been home to two of the largest crowds in the nation to ever watch a college volleyball match. Wisconsin annually ranks among the top-three schools nationally in attendance, averaging more than 5,000 fans per match!

And nowhere else will you find more knowledgeable fans. A great play by the Badgers will bring a roar from the crowd but a long rally between the two teams or a great play by either team will bring a round of applause, no matter who wins the point.

Wisconsin volleyball is also a family-oriented event where children of all ages line up to greet Bucky Badger, get ice cream between sets or join the Badgers on the court for autographs after the match.

Children are an important part of two Badger traditions. Kids line the court before each match, anxiously waiting to slap the hands of the UW starters. Many schools have tried to copy this Wisconsin tradition without much success. And children also join the Badgers at the end of the match on the court for the singing of "Varsity" after another win.

o what's a match like in the UW Field House? It's exciting, energetic and loud but why don't you find out for yourself?

When you first approach the UW Field House, you're struck by the majesty of the building. Its history and grandeur make it easy to see why the building is part of the National Register of Historic Places.

Once inside the building, you'll be amazed at how close the crowd is to the court. While the facility seats more than 10,000 spectators, it is also very intimate, making it one of the loudest volleyball facilities in the nation.

The courtside seats are reserved for season ticket holders, those dedicated Badger fans who come back year after year. The south end zone is the

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home of the UW band and the Block Party, the UW student section. You'll recognize them instantly by their wacky dress and enthusiasm! The north end zone is a popular place for families to get up-close-and-personal with the players and Bucky Badger.

Once the Badgers take the court for warmups, the building rapidly fills with enthusiastic fans. The UW marching band starts playing and the facility becomes louder, getting the team and crowd even more pumped up.

Children of all ages line the court to slap the hands of the Badger starters while the crowd starts the "fish" clap, a straight-armed clap used when opponents are introduced. Once the Wisconsin team is ready to be introduced, the band picks up the rhythm and the crowd joins in as the excitement builds.

As play begins, the crowd is often on its feet and yelling "Point Wisconsin!" as the Badgers win another point. Nothing can slow down this UW crowd! The intermission between sets two and three is another way for everyone to get involved. There is always plenty of entertainment to keep everyone on the edge of their seats.

With another Badger win, arms are raised in elation as children join the team on the court and everyone sings "Varsity." After the match, fans of all ages mingle with the Badgers on the court for autographs, photos or just a chance to talk to their favorite player.

Wisconsin volleyball truly is a family-oriented, fun event for fans of all ages!



Wisconsin is Fan-Tastic

A National Leader in Volleyball Attendance

The first time you walk into the UW Field House during a volleyball match, you feel the excitement that is Wisconsin Volleyball. The band is playing, thousands of fans are yelling, Bucky Badger is dancing and the UW team is on the court winning!

Badger fans make the Field House one of the loudest and most intimidating venues for opposing teams in the nation. Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top-three teams in the nation in attendance and Badger fans are known for being very knowledgeable about the sport of volleyball.

Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten Conference title and competed in their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become one of the toughest places to play in the country.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance for the last 18 years including a second-place ranking in 2006. The Badgers have also led the Big Ten in attendance 10 years, including in 2007 when they set the conference record for average attendance in all matches (5,050) and Big Ten matches (5,970).

The UW student section, nicknamed the Block Party, dominates the south end of the Field House. From their dress to their cheers, the members of the Block Party truly show their Badger spirit.

When you look at the student section, in addition to the traditional Cardinal and White gear, you may see students wearing volleyballs or fuzzy red and white hats on their heads. Students also paint their faces or chests with the number or name of their favorite UW player.

If you are looking to start a cheer or the Wave, look no farther than the Block Party. The group has taken a number of traditional cheers from other UW sports and made them volleyball specific. For example, "Sieve, Sieve, Sieve, Sieve" is a famous Badger hockey chant directed at the opposing goalie after the Badgers score a goal. The Block Party uses the chant in their own way, yelling it at an opposing player after the UW team scores a service ace. The group will also try to disrupt an opponent's serve by yelling "Bounce, bounce, bounce, hoooooold" and waving their arms as an opposing player gets ready to serve.

The group also enjoys such traditional songs from the UW marching band as "Roll out the Barrel" and "If You Want to be a Badger." Other traditions include running around the court during a drum riff called "Spaz."

For only \$9, members can sign up for a skills clinic with the UW coaches and players, which includes a free t-shirt and pizza party.



Wisconsin Volleyball Attracts National Attention

ver the past six seasons, 37 of Wisconsin's volleyball matches have been televised. That's an average of more than six matches per season. Networks that broadcast those matches included ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, CSTV, ComCast, FOX SportsNet and the Big Ten Network.


In 2007, 10 matches were broadcast on national or regional television while five matches were carried live on Madison radio stations. National broadcasts included Wisconsin's match vs. Ohio on ESPN2 and five matches on the Big Ten Network.

As part of the Big Ten Conference volleyball package, the Badgers are one of the top draws in the league.

Wisconsin has annually appeared on an ESPN affiliate for the last 11 seasons, dating back to 1997.

Beginning in 2008, all home and away matches will air on a Madison radio station, providing even more exposure for the Badger program,

Wisconsin's reputation as the major athletic program in the state also attracts a lot of media attention. Madison is home to four television stations, 18 radio stations, two newspapers and two student newspapers. In addition, media from around the state, including the Milwaukee area, also cover the Badgers on a regular basis.

ompeting beyond college is the dream of many volleyball players and Wisconsin is rapidly becoming a pipeline for national teams, foreign professional leagues and moving into the coaching ranks.

U.S. National Teams

Seven Badgers have spent time training with the U.S. National team as a participant in the A-2 program or as part of the training team. The players traveled and competed against some of the best teams in the world.

Junior and Youth National Teams

Junior and Youth National teams offer student-athletes many of the same benefits as national team members with travel and competition against the best players in the world. Current Badgers Brittney Dolgner, Katherine Dykstra, Nikki Klingsporn and Kim Kuzma were all part of Junior or Youth National training programs.

Professional Leagues

Three former Badgers have competed on the Association of Volleyball Professions (AVP) tour, including 2002 graduate Erin Byrd, who is currently ranked among the top 50 players this season.

Five former Badgers have traveled overseas to continue their playing careers overseas. In 2007, Sherisa Livingston and Sheila Shaw were both members of professional teams in Europe and Asia.

Coaching

Several former Badgers have joined the college coaching ranks after their playing careers. Included in that list is: Lizzy (Fitzgerald) Stemke—Nebraska assistant; Arlisa Hagan Williams —Georgetown head coach; and Colleen (Neels) Bayer—UW assistant.





Every season, the volleyball team works together on a community service project to give back to Madison. The Badgers also host an annual Family Fun Day, offering many free activities for children and families.



Badgers on the Road

UW Travels the Country

The Wisconsin volleyball team travels across the country for numerous non-conference tournaments and NCAA postseason play. In addition to all of the great college towns and facilities around the Big Ten Conference, the Badgers' non-conference schedule is filled with exciting road trips to all regions of the country.

Over the past few seasons, the UW has made trips to California, Colorado, Kansas, Montana and Texas for early-season tournaments. Coming up on the Badgers' schedule for this season are tournaments in Lexington, Ky., and Las Vegas.

Wisconsin has also made a number of great trips for postseason competition. The Badgers have hosted first and second-round matches in the UW Field House four of the last five years. The UW advanced to NCAA regional action in its own backyard of Green Bay, Wis., in 2004, while traveling to College Station, Texas, in 2005 and Austin, Texas, in 2006.

The Badgers also typically travel during the spring season, spending their spring break in sunny climates. In 2006, Wisconsin traveled to Honolulu while the team went to San Diego in 2008.



Wisconsin Field House

A Historic Landmark

It's a landmark building in a number of ways. From being listed on the National Register of Historic Places to the record-setting attendances and the momentous wins, the Wisconsin Field House is a memorable place steeped in a rich history.

Since it was built, the Field House has been the site of numerous sporting events including basketball, boxing, track and field and wrestling. It also hosted UW commencement exercises, speakers including John F. Kennedy and even a carnival.

The first volleyball match was played in the Field House on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin hosted the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship on Oct. 29.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to two tournaments. Wisconsin's

play in the Field House was sporadic until 1986 when it became the permanent home of the volleyball team. With the construction of the Kohl Center in 1998, the volleyball team took over sole possession of the Field House in the fall. The building is also used as the competition site for the UW wrestling team.

As the sole occupant of the UW Field House, the Wisconsin has made the building one of the finest volleyball facilities in the country. A dynamic cardinal red and black Sport Court provides the perfect background for the winning UW team during matches. The Badgers have two full Sport Courts for practices.


The Badgers also moved into new locker room facilities with a ready room, for relaxing, studying and watching video, separate from the team's home locker room. A complete renovation of the locker room area, including a photo display of Big Ten championship teams, was completed in the summer of 2003.

The ready room was remodeled in 2006 and features a projection television and large screen, leather sofas, pub table and chairs and wireless internet access.

The renovation of Camp Randall Stadium also included improvements to the north end of the Field House including updated restrooms as well as a new media room and opponent locker rooms on the lower level.

The All-America wall on the west side of the building features life-size photos of the Badger greats while banners from the UW's Big Ten championships and NCAA tournament appearances hang over the playing court.

Fans also enjoy the full-service concessions stands and can shop for UW souvenirs in the Bucky's Locker Room store in the facility.



UW Volleyball Offices

The Wisconsin volleyball offices are located on the third floor of Kellner Hall, the UW Athletic Department office building. The offices offer an excellent view of the exterior of the UW Field House and are conveniently located so that players can drop in at any time to meet with the coaches or to watch game tape.

The volleyball offices were completed in the summer of 2004 during the renovation of Camp Randall. The Badgers share a trophy case with women's hockey just off the lobby area of the third floor. The case commemorates both outstanding programs with a display of trophies, autographed jerseys and other memorabilia. Two of the UW's Big Ten Conference championship trophies as well as the second-place NCAA trophy from 2000 are on display in the case.


As you approach the offices, an etched glass wall, featuring athletes in action, accents the entrance to the reception area. The reception area features a comfortable seating area as well as large photos, recognizing the volleyball and women's hockey programs.

The coaches' offices overlook the UW Field House, offering an upclose view of the historic building. It's a short walk to the practice and competition facility for the Badgers.

The volleyball offices are the base of operations for the staff, offering a central locale for the coaches to break down film and construct game plans. The coaches are surrounded by the rich history and tradition of the program as they work to bring in the next Big Ten title and mold the next Badger legend.




Volleyball Locker Room and Ready Room







Office of Academic Services

The Office of Academic Services, which is located in the Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the satellite Kohl Fetzer Center, provide for the academic needs of more than 750 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The state-of-the-art centers, named after Wade and Beverly Fetzer, are home to the academic advising, learning support, life skills and career development staffs.

The original Fetzer Center is a 15,000-square-foot facility. The center is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The Kohl Fetzer Center was opened in October of 2006 to serve the needs of the student-athletes who practice and compete on the southeast end of the campus. The 5,000-square foot KFC, as it is fondly called, features five

classrooms, an open study area and a computer lab. An academic advisor and a learning specialist are available full time for the teams that use the KFC.


The two academic centers feature a staff of seven advisors, three learning specialists, a life skills coordinator, tutor coordinator and a career development coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses and access to tutors. The office also hosts a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jill Hadfield. Kelli Richards, David Sedor, assistant director Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator David Mattison work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Denise Kalscheur to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. Richards also coordinates the career development of the student-athletes. Bridget Warren, the director of inclusion and life skills programming, oversees events in diversity and inclusion, community development and community outreach.

The staff, including program assistants Nancy Kreklow and Laurel Holgerson, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level.



UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

HAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Bridget Warren, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence


The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.
- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues of transitioning to college such as career interests, diversity on campus, as well as identity development.
- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for studentathletes continuing their education. The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our studentathletes.

Personal Development

- The UW CHAMPS program requires all student-athletes to attend three personal development activities each year.
- Workshops are offered for teams and larger groups on topics such as safe sex, fiscal responsibility, alcohol, peak performance, multiculturalism and many others.
- Opportunities for team and individual leadership development are also available through both the UW and the NCAA.



2007-08 CHAMPS Cup

The CHAMPS Cup is an all-sport competition, rewarding teams who exemplify all aspects of the studentathlete. Student-athletes earn points for their teams in six categories: academic achievement, athletic achievement, personal enhancement, community outreach, Badger pride and SAAC participation. One men's and one women's team is recognized as the overall winners. The men's and women's teams with the highest GPA as well as the team with the most community service points are also recognized.

- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.

- UW Athletics hosts Career Night every January. This event is a networking dinner and career fair for all junior and senior student-athletes.
- Corporations also host information sessions and screening interviews within the Fetzer Center for studentathletes.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 13 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.


Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Fulltime athletic trainers Tricia DeSouza, Bill Gierach, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jesse Donnenwerth, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Ashley Parr, Jen Pepoy, Holli Schaible and Kristy Walker as well as graduate assistant athletic trainers Ryan Dean, Lindsey Otte and Gretchen Wagnitz utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Katie DiPiazza, RD, provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the Mc-Clain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physicians Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Geoffrey Baer. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care Dr. Greg Landry and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.


Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Stephanie Housh, Jim Snider and Greg Young work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The recently completed Kohl Center weight room is equipped with eight custombuilt free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has 15 pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.




Student Life



The Lakeshore Path is a pedestrian and bicycle-only trail that runs from the Union to Picnic Point, a peninsula that juts out into Lake Mendota. Along the way are numerous beaches or spots to stop and enjoy the beautiful lake views.

Spend an hour alone with your thoughts walking the trails of the UW Arboretum, a 1,262-acre nature preserve right in the middle of the city. Or visit Wisconsin's majestic State Capitol building only minutes away from campus.

And if ever you find yourself with a free afternoon, you may wish to enjoy lunch or a latté with friends at one of the many restaurants lining State Street in the heart of downtown Madison.






Must-See Attractions

- The historic Washburn Observatory, which sits atop Observatory hill, overlooking Lake Mendota, is open to the public for viewing the evening skies.





A Winning Athletic Program

The winning never stops at the University of Wisconsin. In 2007-08 the Badgers kept the winning tradition alive with two national championships, six conference titles and record-breaking seasons.

The Wisconsin rowing teams closed out the 2007-08 athletic season with a bang by winning two national championships. The men's rowing team capped off an undefeated season by winning the 2008 Intercollegiate Rowing Association National Championships, which was its first championship since 1990. The women's lightweight rowing team gave Wisconsin yet another national championship by winning its fourth national title in the last five years.

The Badgers also found success within in the Big Ten Conference this season. The men's track and field team hosted the 2008 Big Ten Indoor Championships and used the home track to its advantage to win its eighth-straight indoor title. The men's cross country team also took home the conference crown by winning it's Big Ten record ninth-straight conference title.

The Wisconsin men's basketball team also had a historical season, winning a school-record 31 games and capturing both the Big Ten regular season title as well as the Big Ten Tournament title. This was the first time in school history the men's basketball team won both conference honors.



The Wisconsin football team went 7-0 at Camp Randall Stadium during the 2007 season. The Badgers are nearly unbeatable at home, compiling a 25-1 home record since the start of the 2004 season.

A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.
- The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.





Big Ten Champions

Badgers Have Won Four Conference Titles

isconsin has won four Big Ten Conference championships, including back-to-back titles in 2000 and 2001. The Badgers won their first title in 1990 with a 16-2 record. Wisconsin won eight-straight matches during the middle of the season to hold a one-match lead over second-place Purdue. Wisconsin clinched the title on the road with 3-0 wins at Michigan and Michigan State the last weekend of the conference season.

Wisconsin shared the 1997 Big Ten title with Penn State as both teams finished with 19-1 records. The Badgers and Nittany Lions split their season meetings with both teams winning at home. The UW won its last nine matches of the season and clinched a share of the title with a 3-0 win over Iowa at home.

Wisconsin won its third Big Ten title in 2000 and its second outright championship. The Badgers battled Minnesota all season long for the league title with the two teams sharing the conference lead most of the year. The Badgers won 11-straight matches during the season, including two wins over the Golden

Gophers. Wisconsin won its last four matches to end the season and clinch a share of the title. A Minnesota loss at Ohio State the last match of the season gave Wisconsin the title outright with an 18-2 record.

The Badgers won their first backto-back titles by winning the 2001 championship with a 19-1 record. Wisconsin opened the conference season with 11 wins in a row. Its only loss was a five gamer at Penn State. The Badgers won the remaining eight league matches to clinch their fourth Big Ten title.

UW has appeared in 16 NCAA Tournaments

ualifying for the NCAA tournament is the goal of every college team but in volleyball, only 64 of the 312 schools that sponsor division I volleyball make it to the tournament. And of those 64 teams, Wisconsin is one of only 23 teams that has appeared in NCAA play 15 or more years. The Badgers are also one of only 10 teams who have appeared in the "Big Dance" the last 10 years in a

Wisconsin made its first NCAA tournament appearance in 1990. The Badgers won the Big Ten Conference that season and advanced to the Sweet Sixteen. The UW returned to the Sweet Sixteen the following year.

Wisconsin advanced to the NCAA championship match in 2000 and has made four other appearances in the Elite Eight, including in 2005 and 2006.

The Badgers have advanced to at least the second round of tournament play in 15 of 16 years and have played in regionals nine times. Wisconsin has an impressive 29-16 record in tournament play, ranking second among Big Ten teams in wins.








Top: The Badgers celebrate a win over undefeated and second-ranked Hawai'i in the 2004 NCAA Regional semifinal.

Dolgner became the first UW sophomore to be named an All-American, earning the honor during the 2007 season. The 6-0 outside hitter led the Badgers with 4.63 kills per game, which ranked third on the Big Ten and fourth on the UW season record lists. She also added 2.34 digs and 0.55 blocks per game.

Dolgner is a two-time first-team All-Big Ten and AVCA All-Mideast Region honoree. She has also earned three all-tournament honors in her career.



Reineke finished up her career as a Badger by earning third-team All-America honors in 2007. In the same year, Reineke was named AVCA All-Mideast Region and became just the third Badger to earn three first-team All-Big Ten honors. Reineke also excelled in the classroom as two-time ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree and a three-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree.


The 6-3 Reineke left her mark on the UW as one of the best blockers in Badger history. She ranks first in career blocks per game (1.55), second in block assists (604) and total blocks (671).





Odenthal earned third-team All-America honors in 2004, only the second UW right-side hitter to be honored.




During her four years, Byrd aided Wisconsin to two Big Ten Conference titles, four NCAA tournament bids including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish.

Shields ranked fourth in the nation and led the Big Ten Conference with 13.91 assists per game. She was also among the nation's top servers averaging 0.52 aces per game.





6-1 Maastricht switched to left-side hitter as a senior.



Boyd was the pioneer for UW volleyball. She was the first All-American, earning second-team honors in 1990, while guiding the Badgers to their first NCAA tournament appearance. She was also the first UW Big Ten Player of the Year, leading Wisconsin to its first conference title in 1990.

The 6-0 middle blocker ended her career ranking among the top 10 in very category except assists. She still ranks third in block solos (113), sixth in total blocks (523), eightth in block assists (410) and tied for eighth in digs (1034).

Boyd was a unanimous All–Big Ten selection in 1990 and an AVCA All-Region honoree. She led the Big Ten in blocking in 1989 and 1990, and was a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Boyd was named the most valuable player of the inaugural NIVC in 1989 as the Badgers won the team title. She was also named the UW's Female Athlete of the Year for 1990-91.

In 2000, Boyd became the first volleyball player inducted into the UW Athletic Hall of Fame.

Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship

hen Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend, an outstanding coach and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger Volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first postseason appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, its first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball All-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors.

Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.


Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten home opener is designated "Steve Lowe Night" in honor of the former coach. This year's match is Friday, Oct. 3 vs. Michigan.

In addition, a Badger volleyball player who exemplifies Steve's love of the game is named the recipient of the Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship. This year's recipient is senior Audra Jeffers.



2007 Year in Review

Head Coach Pete Waite


native of the Madison area, Pete Waite is happy to be home and the Badgers are happy he returned. Ever since he became the UW's head coach, Wisconsin has reached a new level of success.

In nine years at the UW, the Badgers are an impressive 228-67 (.773) with nine 20-plus win seasons. Waite is the all-time winningest volleyball coach in UW history, both in number of wins and winning percentage. He is also the only Badger volleyball coach to win 100 Big Ten Conference matches. Overall, Waite ranks 15th among active Division I head coaches with a .745 winning percentage (494-169) in his 20th year. He also ranks 24th in total number of wins.

With nine straight NCAA tournament appearances, Waite has done what no other UW coach could accomplish. Wisconsin made its first-ever appearance in the NCAA championship match in 2000, finishing second. The Badgers finished among the top eight teams in the country in 2004 and 2005, made sweet 16 appearances in 2001 and 2006, and advanced to second-round action in 1999, 2002, 2003 and 2007.

On the Big Ten level, Wisconsin won league titles in 2000 and 2001 with identical 19-1 records. In 1999, 2002, 2005 and 2007, the Badgers finished second in the conference. The UW has never placed lower than fourth in the league during Waite's tenure. He is 139-41 (.772) in Big Ten play.

Waite was honored by his colleagues by being named the Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Regional Coach of



the Year in 2000 and 2001. He was also honored in 2006 as the Big Ten Coach of the Year.

At Wisconsin, Waite has coached 10 All-Americans, 14 AVCA All-Region first-team selections, two Big Ten Players of the Year and 20 first-team All-Big Ten honorees. He has also coached one Big Ten Freshman of the Year and eight members of the Big Ten All-Freshman team. Wisconsin has placed one player on the Big Ten All-Freshman team eight of the nine years that the award has been presented.

Waite came to Wisconsin from Northern Illinois University where he was the winningest volleyball coach in program history. He had an 11-year record of 266-102 (.723 winning percentage) including nine 20-plus win seasons. The Huskies were 81-19 (.810) in his last three years including three consecutive NCAA tournament bids. NIU appeared in four NCAA tournaments under Waite, advancing to the second round three times including in 1997 when it lost to national runner-up Penn State. The Huskies also appeared in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1991, '92, and '94, and declined an invitation to the NIVC in 1995.

Northern Illinois won eight regularseason conference titles and six conference tournaments under Waite. Three times he was named the conference coach of the year. Individually, Waite coached four AVCA all-region players, four conference players of the year, 14 first-team all-conference honorees, one conference newcomer of the year and four members of the conference all-newcomer team.

Prior to being named the head coach at Northern Illinois, Waite spent two years as an assistant coach at Illinois State. In 1984 and 1985, he was the head coach at Moraine Valley

Community College in Palos Hills, Ill., leading the Cyclones to the 1985 North Central Community College Conference championship. Waite was named the conference coach of the year in 1985.

Waite spent one year as the director and coach of the Chicago Power Volleyball Club in Orland Park, Ill., and two years as a coach with the 2nd City Volleyball Club in Chicago. He started his coaching career in 1981 at Muncie (Ind.) Northside High School and spent the next year as a junior varsity coach at his alma mater, Monona Grove (Wis.) High School. Waite also coached one year at Bremen High School in Midlothian, Ill.

Waite played volleyball and graduated from Monona Grove High School. He played volleyball at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., from 1977–81 with a team that consistently ranked in the top 10 nationally. The 1979 Cardinal squad finished fourth in the NCAA tournament after winning the Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title with a perfect 14-0 record. Waite received All-MIVA honors his junior and senior years, and was named team co-captain and co-MVP in 1980. He received his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1981.

In 2008, Waite was honored by his alma mater, receiving the Don Shondell Lifetime Achievement award for 25 years of outstanding volleyball coaching.

Waite and his wife, Carrie, have two sons, Ryan, 24, a 2006 graduate of the UW, and Eric, 21, who is a junior at UW-Oshkosh, where he plays volleyball.

ete Waite will celebrate his 10th year as the head coach of the Badgers in 2008. He is the longest tenured volleyball coach in Wisconsin history and also has the highest winning

Waite has led the Badgers to a 228-67 (.773) record in nine years. During his tenure, Wisconsin has advanced to the NCAA tournament all nine years and won two Big Ten Conference championships. The UW is also 139-41 (.772) in league play under Waite.

Individually, he has coached 10 All-Americans, 14 AVCA all-region honorees and 17 first-team All-Big Ten players.

"I never really imagined that I'd come back home to Madison to coach the Badgers and now I'm part of a department that gives it's team the chance to be the best in the nation.



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

I expect a lot from my players while at the same time, I work hard to help them enjoy their time at the UW. It's a game; it should be fun. I offer them a lot of variety in practices so that time flies by. I want players to love the game, play from their hearts and dare to dream. When they do that, the wins come.

You have more than 20 years of coaching experience. What have you learned in your years of coaching that you bring to the UW program?

I've learned that patience pays off. I enjoy seeing a player learn a new skill just as much as I enjoy the championships. I bring the philosophy that building a quality program means taking care of the players, not taking short cuts and leaving players in your wake.

I know that developing winners is not just about me. There has to be a great staff and we have that. The players need to believe, trust and try. I'm here to guide them and give them the freedom to blossom when they're ready to grow.

What strengths does your coaching staff bring to the UW program and athletes?

Colleen brings the knowledge of having been a Badger volleyball player. She has walked this campus, played in front of these fans and set for a team that went from fifth to first in the Big Ten. She has won a Big Ten championship and she wants to help this program win it again.

Brian has been a fantastic addition to our staff. His experiences as a player and a coach range from the east coast, through the Midwest to the west coast. The time he spent in the Big Ten gives him a great knowledge of the teams, coaches and venues we'll be facing. He has a charismatic personality that welcomes recruits to our program and he has an unending initiative that brings new ideas and challenges to our program every day.

Dave is a real bonus for us. He is a great trainer in the gym and he's coached teams at the highest level. Dave knows how to challenge our players in the gym and they feed off of his love for the game. He knows how to challenge our players to bring out the best in them and I feel very lucky to have Dave in the gym with us.

I think we have some great variety and experience on our staff. Everyone's goal is for our players to make phenomenal improvements in their game and win championships.

What goals have you set for the Wisconsin program and each individual player?

Some goals we set are private, between the players and the staff. That's important in order to keep everyone focused on the task. In general, we ask each player to leave her comfort zone and grow as a person and as a member of the team. We will always aim to be the top team in the Big Ten along with being one of the top teams in the country. Our ultimate goal is to win a national championship and annually be considered one of the premier programs in the country.

The Big Ten Conference is one of the toughest leagues in the nation for women's volleyball. What does it take for student-athletes to compete on the Big Ten level?

Players have to battle and fight to stay on top. That's what makes it great. You have no choice but to play your best because there are so many good players and teams. Those are the players we want to become Badgers; those who love a challenge and are ready to fight. To be the best, you have to play the best.

Wisconsin has appeared in the NCAA tournament 12 straight years. How does the UW continue to be among the top teams in the nation?

It's the combination of bringing in the right players and teaching them to play great as a team. Great players don't guarantee great results. Coaching and creating team chemistry give players the chance to reach their true potential. Badger players and coaches work hard to improve every day and that hard work has paid off over the years.

Wisconsin continually rates among the top teams in the nation for attendance. To what do you attribute this?

We have a great venue to play in and the perfect city to live in. Madison has three television stations, two newspapers and several radio stations that do a great job covering our team. Fans in Madison know our players and they consistently come out in big numbers to support them. The Field House is one of the most electric places to play in the nation and once someone comes to watch, they keep coming back and bringing friends!

What does the city of Madison offer student-athletes that can't be found anywhere else?

I would have to say the lakes and State Street. I don't know of any other campus that has their student union, dormitories and library right on a beautiful lake. Only one block away from the lake is State Street where students can find a wide variety of shops and restaurants.

Our players work hard in the classroom and on the court. Madison lets them enjoy their free time and it really helps them re-energize. Madison is an exciting city next to a great campus.

What do you enjoy most about coaching at the University of Wisconsin?

The players, the staff, the support, the Field House, the band, Bucky, the huge fan turnout, all the other great sports and coaches, the lakes, State Street, the Capital, the zoo, the Big Ten, my family nearby . . . You name it, I love this place!

Coach Waite on the 2008 Season

What athletes do you expect to step up this year and play a bigger role on the team?

I expect every single one of them to take on bigger roles. Most of the returning players have a lot of playing experience so this won't be a big shock to them.

They'll all have to raise their offensive, defensive and serving numbers to make up for the loss of the five seniors.

What are the strengths of this year's team?

Their passion and dedication to the game. It was noticeable immediately in the spring when they made extra efforts to train on their own outside of our regular practices. They want to make their mark on this program and they have organized their efforts during both the spring and summer months.

They have some great talents in all areas of the game but it's their passion that makes the difference. It allows us as coaches to challenge them and we know that they'll give us their best and play the roles that the team needs from them.

How did your spring season help the team prepare for this fall?

This was the most unique spring season that I've had in my 20 years of coaching. Our players had the opportunity to play in the Collegiate Nationals Beach Volleyball Championships in San Diego in April so we structured much of our training aiming for that. We built an indoor sand volleyball court for them so they could practice every other day, playing the doubles beach game. After a month and a half of that, we took our spring break trip to San Diego so they could practice on the same courts they would be playing on in April.

On top of that, each day they did physical training to strengthen their bodies and improve their balance. We saw some great improvements in their fitness and their volleyball skills.

When we are into the fall season, I know we're going to see them making better defensive moves, hitting new shots and playing with more confidence. They all worked hard and I'm looking forward to seeing it pay off for them.

What do you hope to get out of the many nonconference tournaments?

We've structured this non-conference season in a way that allows this team to evolve and grow as it works through each week. We'll be playing a number of teams that are coming off strong seasons where they set many program records. We'll be going into some great environments that will help us prepare for the Big Ten season and we want to be hitting our stride as conference play begins.

We'll take the early season as an opportunity to work on different line ups, allowing our players to prove themselves and earn their roles on the team. It's also a great time to build team chemistry since we are bringing five new players into the fold.

How does the Big Ten look this year especially with the defending NCAA champions returning almost their entire team?

The conference looks stronger than ever. Penn State is the team to beat after their national championship so we know the high standards we have to set as a team. Iowa and Ohio State have new coaches who will bring in more energy and raise the level of their teams. A number of the teams brought in some great recruiting classes so we're expecting a lot of exciting matches as usual.

The strength of the Big Ten is what motivates us every day in the gym as we train and prepare. It also gives us the incentive to bring in more great players to our program who love to play great competition in an amazing environment.

What can you say about breaking the Big Ten attendance record last year?

Our fans are phenomenal! They have been following the Badgers in big numbers since 1990 and they continue to raise the roof.

When I got here in 1999, we averaged just under 2,000 people per match and in 2007 we averaged over 5,900 in Big Ten play. Almost 6,000 per match! Team day last season drew over 10,300 fans and many were teams that came in on over 130 buses. The doors had to be opened early and people were cheering for us during warm-ups—it was crazy.

Our student section has become one of the most entertaining and notoriously distracting sections in the country. I know our players love to see their classmates in the stands pulling for them. Rain or shine, our fans will come from hours away to be part of the Field House environment. The best part is that we still have room to bring more people in to add to the fun.

What does Audra, as your captain, bring to the team?

Audra comes in as our super senior. Since she redshirted her freshman year, she is entering her fifth season and brings a great deal of experience to the table. She has experience playing on the right side and the middle so she knows about being open minded and doing whatever the team needs. She's one of the most positive players I've ever coached and she just earned the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award over the summer.

Audra is focused on being the leader and role model that this team needs as it navigates though the 2008 season.

What are your expectations for the season, considering there will be several new faces in the starting lineup?

We're always striving to be at the top of the Big Ten Conference and this year will be no different. We have a great group of new players entering the program and we'll blend them in with the returning players as soon as possible. The most exciting part will be the fact that we can try a variety of line ups during preseason to find out which one is the strongest. This will probably be a season in which we are evolving as a team from month to month.

How will the rest of the team fill in the roles of last year's senior class?

As soon as our spring training began we saw the returning players moving into the space that opened and they realized that they had to improve as individuals and as a group. That senior class had played together for four seasons and they did a great job of showing the underclassmen what it takes to be a great team.

olleen (Neels) Bayer, a former twotime All-Big Ten Conference setter for the Badgers, is in her third year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.





Assistant Brian Heffernan

Prian Heffernan is in his first year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Heffernan comes to the Badgers from Washington State, where he was 39-87 in four years as the head of the Cougar program. He coached four athletes to Pac-10 All-Freshman team honors while the Cougars led the league in blocks per game in 2005. Heffernan's athletes were outstanding academically with one Academic All-American, three all-region academic honorees and 12 members of the Pac-10 All-Academic teams. His team also recorded the highest grade



point average in program history in 2007.

Prior to Washington State, Heffernan was an assistant coach and associate head coach at the University of Minnesota. The Golden Gophers claimed the 2002 Big Ten Conference championship and reached the 2003 NCAA Championship semi-final match. The 2002 and 2000 Minnesota teams made NCAA Sweet Sixteen appearances along with a second-round appearance by the 2001 squad. In addition to his coaching duties at Minnesota, Heffernan assisted Minnesota head coach Mike Hebert and the U.S. National Team in their training for the 2003 Pan American Games in the Dominican Republic.

In addition to his coaching duties, Bayer also served as the store manager of The Volleyshop at the Great Lakes Center in Aurora, Ill.






Chancellor Biddy A. Martin

Incoming Chancellor Carolyn "Biddy" Martin will begin serving as the University of Wisconsin's chief of staff in September 2008.

As provost of Cornell University from 2000-08, Martin acted as the president's first deputy officer and reported to the president as the chief educational officer and chief operating officer of the university. She was responsible for overseeing all academic programs, with the exception of those programs reporting to the provost for medical affairs in New York City.

Martin received her Ph.D. in German Literature in 1985 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. That same year, she joined the Cornell University's faculty full-time as an assistant professor of German studies and women's studies. In 1991, she was promoted to associate professor in the Department of German Studies with a joint appointment in the Women's Studies Program. She served as chair of the Department of German Studies from 1994-97, and in 1997 was promoted to full professor in the department. In 1996, she was appointed senior associate dean in the College of Arts and Sciences. Martin was appointed Cornell University's Provost effective July 1, 2000.

Martin is a distinguished scholar of German Studies and author of numerous articles and two books—one on a literary and cultural figure in the Freud circle, Lou Andreas-Salome, and the other on gender theory.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez is in his fifth year as Director of Athletics.

Under Alvarez's leadership, Wisconsin has won 10 national titles, including five NCAA championships, and 19 conference regular-season or tournament crowns. The Badgers have also had record-setting season academically, with UW student-athletes recording a record-high grade point average in the fall of 2006. The UW has prospered in its facilities with the renovation of Camp Randall Stadium, additions to the Kohl Center and a new facilities master plan.

Alvarez was appointed in the spring of 2008 as one of the chairs of the NCAA's Football Academic Enhancement Group.

From 1990-2005, Alvarez guided the UW football team to a 118-73-4 record, making him the winningest football coach in school history. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles. Alvarez was the 1993 national coach of the year and a two-time Big Ten coach of the year.

He received his undergraduate and master's degrees from Nebraska, where he played linebacker. Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.





Badgers Go Dancing Yet Again

Wisconsin makes its 12th-straight NCAA appearance

Badgers Wrap Up Another Successful Season

▶ Wisconsin wrapped up the 2007 season with a 26-5 record, advancing to the second round of the NCAA tournament. The Badgers recorded their 16th overall and 12th-straight NCAA tournament bid, advancing to at least the second round for the 15th year.

The UW finished second in the 2007 Big Ten Conference standings at 17-3, behind NCAA champion Penn State. It marked the third-straight season that the Badgers have finished among the top-three teams in the league.

Wisconsin Ends Season Ranked 14th in Coaches Poll

► The Badgers ended the 2007 season ranked 14th in the final CSTV/American Volleyball Coaches Association poll. It was the fourth-straight year and 10th overall season that the Badgers ended their season among the top-15 teams in the nation.

NCAA and Big Ten Conference champion Penn State (34-2) wrapped up its season with a first-place ranking, picking up all 60 first-place votes. NCAA runner-up Stanford (32-3) was ranked second while national semifinal participants Southern California (29-5) and California (26-8) were ranked third and fourth, respectively.

In addition to Penn State and Wisconsin, the Big Ten had three other teams that were ranked or received votes in the final poll. Michigan (24-11) and Michigan State (21-14) were ranked 19th and 20th, respectively. Purdue (19-14) received votes in the final poll.

Wisconsin was ranked among the top-14 teams in the nation all season.

Other National Rankings

▶ Wisconsin ended the 2007 season ranked 13th in the *Volleyball Magazine* media poll and 12th in the RickKern. com online poll.

The Badgers were also ranked sixth in the final NCAA RPI.

The UW played six teams that were ranked or received votes in the final AVCA coaches poll during the season. The Badgers played 10 matches against five Big Ten teams who were ranked or received votes.

Badgers Earn AVCA Honors

Sophomore Brittney Dolgner and senior Taylor Reineke were named to the 2007 American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-America teams. Dolgner, a 6-0 outside hitter, was named to the second team while Reineke, a 6-3 middle blocker, was named to the third team. Senior Jackie Simpson, a 6-0 setter, earned honorable mention All-America honors.

It is only the fourth time in UW history that the Badgers have picked up two All-Americans in the same season.

▶ Dolgner, Reineke and Simpson were named to the 2007 AVCA All-Mideast Regional team. Dolgner and Simpson earn their second all-region honors while Reineke was named to the team for the first time. Senior Jocelyn Wack, a 5-11 libero, earned honorable mention all-region honors.

Four Honored by Big Ten

▶ Dolgner, Reineke and Simpson repeated as members of the 2007 All-Big Ten team. Wack earned honorable mention honors.

Reineke, who earned her thirdconsecutive All-Big Ten honor, is only the third UW player to earn three firstteam honors. Dolgner and Simpson both earned their second consecutive All-Big Ten honor. Dolgner is only the third sophomore in Wisconsin volleyball history to earn All-Big Ten honors. Wack earns her first honorable mention honor.

Badgers Set Attendance Record ... Again

▶ Wisconsin shattered its own Big Ten Conference record for attendance in 2007, averaging 5,050 spectators per match. The UW held the previous Big Ten best of 4,328 per match set in 2006. The Badgers also set a record for total attendance as 75,750 fans attended 15 matches, breaking the previous UW best of 73,576 fans for 17 matches set in 2006.

The Badgers also shattered the conference attendance record for Big Ten-only matches, averaging 5,970 fans for 10 league matches. Wisconsin also held that record of 4,711 spectators per match, set in 2006. The UW drew 59,704 fans to 10 Big Ten matches, shattering the previous total of 47,110 set in 2006.

Can't Ace These Badgers

▶ The Badgers gave up only 87 service aces in 2007, an average of 0.79 aces per game. The average led all Big Ten teams and was the lowest ever by a UW team, breaking the previous season best of 0.99 service aces per game given up during the 2000 season. Three opponents failed to score a service ace on the UW in a match.

Wisconsin nearly doubled up its opponents in service aces, averaging 1.49 per game on the year. The Badgers recorded at least one service ace in 30 of 31 matches.

Successful Senior Class

▶ The five-member UW senior class graduated with a four-year record of 103-23 (.817), the third-highest winning percentage in a four-year period. The 2007 Badgers trailed only the graduates of 2000, who were 115-22 (.839) from 1997-2000, and the 2001 graduating class, which was 112-23 (.829) from 1998-2001.

Badgers' Balanced Offense

▶ The 2007 Badgers featured a balanced offensive attack with six players averaging 2.00 or more kills per game. Wisconsin averaged 16.38 kills per game, which tied for eighth on UW season record list and ranked 26th nationally. The UW also connected on .270 percent of its attacks, which ranked sixth on the UW season record list and 17th among division I teams.

Wisconsin hit over .200 in all but two matches and over .300 in nine matches.

20 Wins Again

▶ With its win over Northwestern on Nov. 3, Wisconsin recorded its 12thstraight 20-plus win season. Since 1994, the Badgers have won 20 or more matches in each of the last 12 seasons. The record for most wins is 33, set in 2000. Wisconsin has also won 22-or-more matches in Coach Pete Waite's nine years as the Badgers' head coach.

Wack is Badgers' Iron Woman

▶ Senior Jocelyn Wack did not miss a game in her four years at Wisconsin, becoming the first UW player to see action in every single game of her career. The 5-11 libero played in all 454 games and 129 matches of her career. Wack's 454 games ranks her as sixth on the UW career record list while her 129 matches ties her with teammate Taylor Reineke for 12th on the all-time list.

Wack and her sister Allison, a freshman outside hitter, made up the first UW sister duo since the 2000 season. The sisters competed together for the first time since Jocelyn was a senior in high school.

Road-Proven Badgers

▶ Wisconsin spent the entire month of September and the first weekend in October on the road. After opening their season at home with the InnTowner Invitational, the Badgers played 10-straight matches on the road. Wisconsin went 9-1 on its road swing with its only loss a 3-2 defeat to then-No. 15 BYU on Aug. 31.

The road trip helped the UW as it wrapped up the road portion of the Big Ten season with a 9-1 mark, tying the UW record for the best conference road record.

Badgers on the Air

▶ Wisconsin made 10 television appearances in 2007, including six matches in front of a national audience.

The Badgers took on Ohio State on ESPN2 on Oct. 19 in the UW Field House. Wisconsin also made five appearances on the new Big Ten Network and four appearances on Wisconsin Public Television.



Amanda Berkley

Amanda Berkley started out as a walk-on for the Badgers but her hard work earned the 5-5 defensive specialist a scholarship in 2006.

Berkley was a key player off the bench for Wisconsin, serving and playing in the back row. She played in 112 matches, starting 15, and 352 games during her four years. In 2006, she played in all 33 matches, starting 10.

The Racine, Wis., native averaged 1.87 digs in her career, including a career-best 2.03 as a senior, ranking third on the team. She had a career-high 18 digs vs. Michigan in 2007. Berkley also totaled 46 service aces in her career, tying for second on the team with 23 service aces as a senior.

Berkley was also active off the court, participating in Relay for Life and Bookin' It with Bucky.

Megan Mills

Megan Mills provided a spark in the back row for Wisconsin. The 5-6 defensive specialist served as a key back-up player for the Badgers during her four years.

Mills played in 116 matches during her career and started 13. She accumulated 509 digs in her career, finishing with a 1.48 digs per game average. Mills averaged a career-best 1.69 digs per game as a senior. The Portage, Wis., native had a career-high of 18 digs in 2005 against Notre Dame.

Off the court, Mills was a three-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree and a 2007 Athletic Board Scholar.

Taylor Reineke

Taylor Reineke left Wisconsin as one of the best blockers in school history. The 6-3 middle blocker set the UW career record for blocks per game (1.55) and ranks second in total blocks (671) and block assists (604).

Reineke was a four-year starter, playing in 129 matches and 434 games. She is only the third Badger to earn three first-team All-Big Ten honors. The Naperville, Ill., native was also a third-team All-American in 2007 and also earned all-region honors.

Reineke averaged 2.29 kills per game in her four years and had a hitting percentage of .317, which ranks as third all-time on UW's career list. She finished just six kills shy of 1.000 for her career.

Reineke was a two-time *ESPN The Magazine*/CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree and a three-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree.

Jackie Simpson

Jackie Simpson leaves the UW as one of the best setters in school history. The 6-0 Downers Grove, Ill, native finished her career second on UW's list for assists (5,235) and third in assists per game (12.70).

Simpson was a four-year starter, playing in 123 matches, starting 116, and 411 games. She averaged a career-best 13.16 assists per game as a senior, which ranked third in the Big Ten. As a freshman, Simpson had a career-high 75 assists against Minnesota in 2004.

Simpson was a second-team All-American in 2006 and earned honorable mention honors in 2007. She was a seventime all-tournament team selection and was named to the 2004 Big Ten All-Freshman team. In 2006, Simpson became just the third UW player to be named AVCA National Player of the Week.

Jocelyn Wack

Jocelyn Wack cemented her name in the UW record books throughout her four years. The 5-11 libero has four records to her name—career digs (2,182), digs per game (4.81), digs in a season (567) and digs per game in a season (5.17). Her 2,182 career digs also ranks as second on the Big Ten record list.

Wack holds the NCAA record for consecutive matches with double-figure digs. She went 80-straight matches with 10-ormore digs from Sept. 4, 2004 through Oct. 13, 2006.

A native of Salem, Wis., Wack was a four-year starter and played in every single game throughout her career. She totaled 434 games and started 125 of the 129 matches. Wack tallied a match-high 36 digs against Notre Dame in 2005.

Wack was a three-time InnTowner Invitational All-Tournament honoree and a two-time NCAA Regional All-Tournament team member. She earned honorable mention All-Big Ten accolades in 2007 and was a two-time honorable mention for the AVCA All-Mideast Region.

Badgers Look To Build On Strong Core


hange is sometimes be hard but change can be a good thing. This year, the Wisconsin volleyball team undergoes major changes after the loss of five seniors, including three starters. With several new faces in the starting line-up and many players ready to step up, the 2008 Badgers may look a little different but the goals remain the same.

"We're always striving to be at the top of the Big Ten Conference and this year will be no different," UW head coach Pete Waite says. "We have a great group of new players entering the program and we'll blend them in with the returning players as soon as possible.

"The most exciting part will be the fact that we can try a variety of line ups during preseason to find out which one is the strongest. This will probably be a season in which we are evolving as a team from month to month."

Waite plans on using a mix of his nine returning players and five new freshmen during the season.

"I expect every single one of them to take on bigger roles," says Waite. "Most of

the returning players have a lot of playing experience so this won't be a big shock to them. They'll all have to raise their offensive, defensive and serving numbers to make up for the loss of the five seniors."

Strong Schedule

One thing that won't change this season is the tough competition on schedule for Wisconsin. The Badgers play in four non-conference tournaments, including the InnTowner Invitational at the UW Field House, facing four teams that played in the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

"We've structured this non-conference season in a way that allows this team to evolve and grow as it works through each week," Waite says. "We'll be going into some great environments that will help us prepare for the Big Ten season and we want to be hitting our stride as the conference play begins."

Of course, the Big Ten season will be tough yet again as it features defending national champion Penn State, four other teams that played in the 2007 NCAA Tournament and two other teams with new head coaches this year.

"The conference looks stronger than ever," says Waite. "The strength of the Big Ten is what motivates us every day in the gym as we train and prepare. It also gives us the incentive to bring in more great players to our program who love to play great competition in an amazing environment."


Four Starters Return

The Badgers return four starters, including left-side hitter Brittney Dolgner, who earned second-team All-America honors in 2007. The 6-0 Dolgner hopes to lead the Badger attack for the third-straight season. In 2007, she tallied a team-best 4.63 kills per game and became the first UW sophomore to be earn All-America honors.

At the other left-side hitter position, junior Caity DuPont, who started 15 matches last year, and sophomore Allison Wack, who started eight matches, return and vie for playing time.

Also in the front row, the Badgers look to Audra Jeffers, Katherine Dykstra and Morgan Salow in the middle and right-side positions. Jeffers and Dykstra started for the Badgers in 2007 while Salow played a key role off the bench as both a middle blocker and right-side hitter.

Waite is depending upon Jeffers, who is a fifth-year senior, to lead this year's young squad.



Junior Caity DuPont started the last nine matches of the 2007 as an outside hitter.

"She has experience playing on the right side and the middle so she knows about being open minded and doing whatever the team needs," explains

Freshman Elle Ohlander, who at 6-6 will be the tallest player to ever put on a Badger uniform, and the multitalented Janelle Gabrielsen could also step into starting roles this season.

Newcomers Kelsey Maloney and Katie Schill provide additional depth in the front row.

Wisconsin's backcourt defense will see the biggest makeover with the loss of four-year starting libero and record holder Jocelyn Wack.


Sophomore Kim Kuzma is the leading candidate to replace Wack but senior Faye McCormack and freshman Sally Shumaker should also see playing time as defensive specialists.

The Badgers will also have a new quarterback this season as sophomore Nikki Klingsporn paces the Badger offense at setter. Klingsporn played in 11 matches in 2007 and has the athletic ability to immediately step into the starting role.


"They have some great talents in all areas of the game but it's their passion that makes the difference," says Waite of his 2008 team.

- ▶ Wisconsin returns nine letter winners and four starters from 2007. The Badgers have three seniors on this year's squad—Faye McCormack, Audra Jeffers and Morgan Salow.
- ▶ Brittney Dolgner needs just 48 kills to become the 17th UW player to record 1,000 kills in a career. She will be the fastest player to achieve that milestone.
- ► Head coach Pete Waite is in his 10th season as Badgers' head coach. He needs just six wins for career victory No. 500.
- ▶ Wisconsin faces six teams that were ranked or receiving votes in the final 2007 CSTV/AVCA poll. Those teams are: No. 1 Penn State, No. 12 BYU, No. 19 Michigan, No. 20 Michigan State as well as Purdue and UNLV, that received votes in the final 2007 poll.
- ➤ Senior Audra Jeffers will serve as the 2008 team captain.

- ▶ Wisconsin looks for its 13th-straight and 17th-overall appearance in the NCAA tournament in 2008. The Badgers have advanced to at least the second round of play in 15 out of 16 appearances.
- ▶ Wisconsin's recruiting class was ranked the ninth best in the nation by *Volleyball Magazine*. Elle Ohlander and Janelle Gabrielsen were named Volleyball Fab 50 selections. Also joining the Badgers will be Kelsey Maloney, Katie Schill and Sally Shumaker.
- ▶ Audra Jeffers returns as one of the best blockers on the team and in the Big Ten. She averaged 1.25 blocks per game last year, which ranked second on the team ninth in the Big Ten in 2007.
- ▶ At 6-6, freshman Elle Ohlander will be the tallest Badger to ever put on a volleyball uniform.
- ▶ After leading the Badgers in kills as a freshman and sophomore, Brittney Dolgner could become just the fourth player to lead the UW three straight seasons. She averaged 4.63 per game as sophomore, which ranked fourth in the Big Ten, and 4.12 kills per game as a freshman.

In just two years, Dolgner is averaging 4.37 kills per game, which ranks first on the UW career record list.

➤ Wisconsin goes for its 15th-straight season with 20-or-more wins in 2008. The Badgers have won at least 20 matches dating back to the 1994 season.

- ▶ The Badgers have finished among the top-three teams in the Big Ten Conference the last three years in a row.
- ▶ Brittney Dolgner became the first Badger sophomore to earn AVCA All-America honors, earning second-team accolades during the 2007 campaign.
- ▶ For the first time in program history, all of the 2008 UW volleyball matches will be broadcast on the Madison airwaves. Clear Channel radio will also broadcast all of the UW matches at the Field House and on the road this year.
- ▶ Wisconsin returns five of its top six hitters from 2007—Brittney Dolgner (4.63 kills per game), Audra Jeffers (2.51), Caity DuPont (2.51), Katherine Dykstra (2.49) and Allison Wack (2.21.


