Upon recommendation of the President the following action was taken:

Moved, that the temporary budget adopted by the Regents on June 22, 1935, pending action by the Legislature on state appropriations, be extended for a period of sixty days, or until such time within this period that the Regents approve a final form for the 1935-36 budget.


