Upon recommendation of the President the following action was taken:

Upon recommendation of President Frank it was VOTED, That the infirmary fee for short course students be increased from \$2.50 to \$3.75 for the 15 weeks course and that the laboratory fee be reduced from \$6.50 to \$5.25.

The Business Manager filed a report of requests by the University for PWA projects for 1935-36. (Copy on file.)

President Frank presented a communication from Director Goodnight explaining that through oversight Professor R. O. Roeseler had not been paid his summer session salary for the portion coming from Letters and Science. It was

Upon recommendation of the President it was VOTED, That the \$3 fine for late payment of fees be waived in the case of graduate students whose registration is late because of the unavoidable delay in assigning NYA grants, as recommended by the Dean of the Graduate School, effective for the first semester of the academic year 1935-36.
