Regent President Lyon extended congratulations on behalf of the Board to Regent Gundersen, who recently had been awarded the Greater La Crosse Chamber of Commerce's highest honor--the Chairman's Award--for the outstanding contributions he had made to enhancement of the quality of life. He was honored, particularly for his significant contributions to quality medical care and to education.

Summarizing the previous day's Council meeting, Regent Gundersen noted the resignation of Trustee Eugene O. Gehl, Madison. Nomination of a successor will be submitted in the near future.

It was reported by Superintendent Derzon that financial results for the first six months of the 1990-91 fiscal year had been very favorable, with a net income of more than \$15 million resulting from net patient revenue which exceeded the budget by 13.5 percent. The favorable results were a direct consequence of increased admissions, which were 7.8 percent over budget, and increased outpatient visits, which were 6 percent over budget. Finance Director Peter Christman added that the Hospital recently had experienced its highest patient volume since July 1982.

Mr. Derzon reported smooth progress of the Hospital's several construction projects, including the new ambulatory surgery facilities, which will free space for conversion to inpatient facilities.

The Council heard from Steven Weber, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Neurology and Director of the Wisconsin Sleep Disorders Center, who described the multidisciplinary team of specialists who diagnose and treat a wide variety of sleep-related behavior disorders, including narcolepsy and sleep apnea; circadian rhythm disorders such as those experienced by shift workers or people who work at night; and other unusual conditions such as chronic behavioral disorders of REM (rapid eye movement) sleep. Dr. Weber said the Sleep Disorders Center expects a 20-30 percent increase in activity during the current fiscal year and is hoping to add two more patient beds.

Dr. Jay Noren, Vice Chancellor for Health Sciences, gave a report to the Council on plans for construction of a new module for Medical School Departments of Rehabilitation Medicine and Psychiatry, which will provide 13,000 square feet of space in an area that otherwise would have been an outdoor courtyard beneath the new Trauma and Life Center (TLC). Because the TLC area requires structural support, the area can be enclosed during the same construction period, resulting in 50 percent savings compared to usual costs. About half the \$2.9 million project will be paid for by Hospital program revenue, with the remainder paid by the Medical School Departments of Psychiatry, Rehabilitation Medicine, and Neurosurgery.

Dr. Noren also provided an update on Center for Health Sciences relationships to Milwaukee educational programs. Following two years of negotiations with Aurora Health Care, owners of Sinai Samaritan Medical Center in Milwaukee, the Medical School is in the process of phasing out its affiliation with Sinai Samaritan, which for 16 years has provided education opportunities for medical students, residents and fellows, while offering important clinical services in Milwaukee's inner city. Because of shortfalls in Medicare/Medicaid reimbursements, and Aurora's inability to support the Medical School programs at a sufficient level, the affiliation must now be restructured. Dr. Noren reported that intensive negotiations are under way for a new affiliation relationship.

Dr. Noren also clarified recent published reports regarding comparative levels of state support provided to the UW Medical School and to the Medical College of Wisconsin. While both medical schools receive state support, UW Medical School receives more state funding, principally because the Medical College of Wisconsin is a private institution, not a part of the University of Wisconsin System.

It was reported that the Hospital recently received notification of full three-year accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations, a very positive distinction received by only a minority of hospitals in the country. Details of the Joint Commission accreditation report will be reviewed at the April Council meeting.

Revision of Bylaws, Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics

Presenting proposed revisions to the Council bylaws, Regent Weinstein explained that the amendments would change the number of trustees from eight to a minimum of eight and a maximum of twelve, the purpose being to enable the Board of Regents at its discretion to increase the number of trustees in order to provide better geographic representation. One half or a majority of the Council is to consist of Regents. Other changes responded to an accreditation requirement as to the role of the Council in monitoring quality control programs.

Upon motion by Regent Weinstein, seconded by Regent Flores, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents.

Resolution 5687: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Chancellor of UW-Madison, and the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics, the revisions to the bylaws of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics be approved as proposed.

Report of the President of the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education

Regent Hassett, President of the State VTAE Board, supplemented his written report by noting first a review of the state aids system, which provides about 30 percent of the VTAE school funding. All 16 institutions were objecting to the existing distribution formula.

Regarding the Governor's budget, the VTAE System had requested a 7.2 percent increase but received 2.5 percent plus minority funding and some special funds for economic development. The System had received a report showing that in the preceding year the VTAE schools had 4,907 economic development contracts, affecting 75,276 employees.

Regent Hassett also noted that students are requesting membership on the State VTAE Board.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

Report of Nonpersonnel Actions

Resolution 5688 was unanimously adopted upon motion by Regent Schilling and seconded by Regent Vos.

Noting that this accelerated 18-month nursing program for those students already holding baccalaureate degrees exemplifies recent innovations made in nursing programs, the impressive spirit of cooperation being shown in terms of articulation and encouragement for the nursing field, President Shaw introduced UW-Parkside Chancellor Kaplan.

Chancellor Kaplan stated that the UW-Milwaukee/UW-Parkside Consortial Nursing Program quells thoughts about program duplication and lack of System institutional cooperation and career ladder opportunities for students. Established in 1979, the Program provides opportunity for students at UW-Parkside to complete a nursing degree by taking general education, science and professional nursing courses offered at UW-Parkside by the faculty of UW-Milwaukee; and the quality of the program is verified by the 100 percent pass rate of graduates on the state board examinations. Another recent agreement has been signed with Gateway Vocational and Technical College, to permit graduates of the two-year Gateway Nursing Program to move into the UW-Parkside/UW-Milwaukee Consortial Nursing Program without a loss of credit, thus providing a career ladder from Gateway all the way through a degree from UW-Parkside and UW-Milwaukee. This demonstrates the prudent use of institutional resources. The Chancellor then introduced Dr. Joan Wilk, of the UW-Milwaukee Nursing School, who serves at UW-Parkside as the Program's coordinator.

Dr. Wilk, a UW-Milwaukee Associate Professor, said that this program grew out of a response to a community need because, when the program began in 1979, there was a severe shortage of nurses in Kenosha, Racine and Walworth counties; and closing of the St. Luke's Hospital School of Nursing in Racine at that time made the problem appear even more acute. Prior to installation of this Program, students desiring baccalaureate degrees in nursing had to leave the community to find nursing programs, rarely returning once their education was complete.

Legislators, university administrators and nursing faculty all agreed to this program, which makes it possible for the students to enroll in the UW-Milwaukee School of Nursing, take their classes at UW-Parkside and perform all clinical work in the Kenosha, Racine and Walworth area. The UW-Parkside faculty teach pre-nursing courses and the UW-Milwaukee School of Nursing faculty travel to UW-Parkside to teach the nursing and clinical courses. This keeps students in one place, with the program revolving around them. A less acute nursing shortage remains because of the 170 graduates of this program.

Speaking for the program, Debbie Keefer, a 29-year-old senior nursing student, explained that she is married with two children. Firmly rooted in Bristol in Kenosha County, she said that this May she will graduate from a class of approximately 60 nursing students, 40 from UW-Milwaukee and 20 from UW-Parkside. Her classmates' average age is the same as hers, they have been in the Program approximately four-five years, and 25 percent of them are married with children. If patterns of the graduates since 1983 continue, seven percent will work within Kenosha, Racine and Walworth Counties and about half will be employed in acute care settings, with a little less than half employed within the community settings. If this program did not exist at UW-Parkside, Ms. Keefer said, she would not have been able to further her nursing education, because it would have been impossible to leave her family to commute to Milwaukee.

Heidi Pflugrad explained that she had graduated from Gateway Technical College and now works as a registered nurse while enrolled in the Program. Married with an eight-month-old baby, she will graduate in May with a baccalaureate degree in nursing that she feels will enable her to take advantage of career opportunities over a lifetime. She, too, feels that she could not have succeeded if this program had not been available in her home area.

Dr. Norma Lang, UW-Milwaukee Dean of the School of Nursing, lauded the Program for making a nursing career accessible, and she paid tribute to those who work to make it the success that it is: faculty, administrative staff and System Administration.

In reply to questions from Regent Vos on the nursing shortage, Dr. Lang stated there still remains a critical shortage, not only in the Racine/Kenosha area, but in the entire state. Recent publicity has helped to encourage participation in this Program among university graduates who majored in other fields.

Regent Davis asked about the statistics that show a shortage of nurses and at the same time show 500,000 more associate degree nurses than needed by the year 2000.

Stating that is the current prediction, Dr. Lang explained that, because of the increasing complexity of patient care, the use of baccalaureate-degree-prepared people will become a necessity.

Regent Hassett asked what salaries could be expected by a baccalaureate degree nurse, and Dr. Lang answered that, after three or four years, they could expect to earn between \$25,000-\$35,000, with increases to \$35,000-\$50,000 or more, depending on the level of responsibility.

Regent Gundersen expressed his concern for filling nursing positions during variable hours and nights, but he thought the ladder concept for credit transfer was absolutely essential to nursing.

President Lyon thanked the presenters for the interesting program.

Campus Changes Due to the Persian Gulf Conflict, PP 6-7

President Shaw reported that students called to active military duty receive a 100 percent refund of all fees, except for room and board. If the student is called to active duty before the beginning of the academic term, 100 percent of the room and board fee also is refunded. After the beginning of the term, the refund is prorated, based on the unused portion of the fee.

In the classroom, faculty members are working individually with affected students to provide them with reasonable alternatives for completing their work and receiving grades.

Special steps are being taken to maintain open lines of communication with the students and their families by, for example, sending letters to students who were called to active duty and to their families, and by sending them a gift package and greeting cards that can be completed and sent home to their families.

UW-Madison and other campuses are providing individual and group counseling for affected students and family members. The campuses also are sensitive to the need to protect Middle Eastern students from potential harassment.

University faculty and staff who have been called up also have received special attention. During his State of the State address, Governor Thompson announced that state and university employees will be eligible for up to two months of full salary and continued state support of full health benefits for up to one year.

Most international programs are continuing, including those in Israel. In a typical year these programs serve about 2,500 students in 63 countries. Students in UW programs abroad are being advised to take additional precautions, and have been given the option either of continuing their studies or returning home. They also have been assured that financial and other adjustments will be made for those electing to discontinue their study-abroad programs as a result of the war. UW-Eau Claire had cancelled its program in Rosenheim, Germany. A joint program of UW System schools at Edinburg, Scotland, will continue, although 10 of 61 students had dropped out because of the war.

President Shaw had communicated to the campuses and to the general public five fundamental principles that must be acknowledged and respected: (1) the university must be a place where all issues can be discussed; (2) to allow for individuals to pursue and speak the truth as they see it, institutional neutrality must be maintained; (3) strong dissent and protest are an accepted part of the democratic process, and it should be expected

that such expressions will occur on our nation's campuses; (4) while permitting dissent and protest, the university community must encourage its members to obey campus policies and local, state and federal laws; and (5) the university's commitment to its ongoing responsibilities of teaching, research and public service must continue regardless of war or other external conflicts.

President Shaw stated gratification for the way that UW System institutions have responded to the special circumstances created by the war. He also was pleased that the five principles have been embraced widely by campus leadership, with a firm resolve throughout the UW System to maintain a strong and steady course in serving the educational needs of and the larger society.

Streamlining of Operations

President Shaw noted that tight fiscal times in the 1990s will require examining all operations to get the most from available time, people and resources. While expectations for high performance and quality must not be lowered, the scope and number of functions might well have to be reduced.

Examination of streamlining in System Administration and Board activities included: (1) streamlining data collection and reporting; (2) reducing the volume of paper produced for Board agenda materials and System communications with the institutions; and (3) delegation and increased flexibility in handling some routine tasks now carried out centrally. The review was to include the 40 statutorily required reports and the 58 reports required by this Board each year, to identify ways that these might be consolidated, modified or eliminated. Beginning in March, monthly tifts and grants lists, will go only to Regents and selected others, saving of about \$400 per menth.

Review of 1991-93 Governor's Budget, pp 7-9

President Shaw reported that, overall, the Governor's budget increases GPR spending by less than one percent in the first year and 6.3 percent in the second year of the biennium. Within this amount, 27 of the 50 state agencies took base GPR cuts in the first year. Forty five of the 50 were held below inflation in the first year and 27 of 50 in the second year. The UW System is among those held below the rate of inflation.

The UW System received a 1.4 percent GPR increase in the first year, and an additional 1.1 percent in the second year. However, taking into account a forced lapse of 5 percent of GPR supplies, expense and equipment funds, the increase is reduced about 1 percent in both years.

Try Budget - (san a)

The Governor funded a portion of the UW System's top priority, providing a 1 percent catch-up increase in the second half of the second year of the biennium for faculty and category B academic staff. This is about 20 percent of the biennial need of 4.8 percent.

The only other items funded in the enrollment-driven category of the Board's budget request were \$6.4 million of the \$11.9 million of the Engineering and Technology initiative; the UW-Madison increase in nonresident undergraduate fees to cover improvements in undergraduate education; and the Law School fee increase. All these initiatives, including catch-up, would be totally funded by fees, with no GPR contribution. The engineering initiative would be funded by a fee increase for all students—not just those in engineering. No other enrollment or service category items were funded.

Program revenue requests are funded in part, primarily to cover inflation. The Hospital is granted only an inflationary increase; auxiliary operations received funding for approved buildings coming on-line but no programmatic increases. Gifts and grants are funded at the level requested. Extension program revenue is largely funded. While the program revenue for remedial education is funded, the existing GPR positions and base dollars for current remedial efforts are taken from the base budget.

The GPR one percent increase is in cost-to-continue items, such as funding for the final installment of 1989-91 catch-up, fringe benefit cost increases already incurred, and debt service for already authorized building projects.

In addition, the Governor's budget contains a number of base budget cuts, some of which evidently are one-time reductions. First, \$5.4 million GPR/Fees in turn-over savings is removed from the base for the 1991-92 year, but is built back in for the second year. Second, a 5 percent annual forced lapse is required from the GPR base for supplies and expenses and for permanent property. Third, a special 2.5 percent reduction, or \$200,000 annually, is made to the System Administration GPR base.

On the national level, numerous university systems around the country are facing either zero increases or sizeable base cuts, such as the Massachusetts System, which had to take two 4 percent cuts within a month and lay off a considerable number of staff. Virginia institutions already have had two base budget cuts this year. In California, annual base budgets took a 2 percent cut in August, and tuition was raised 10 percent. Florida is expected to order a 3 percent spending cut.

President Shaw then outlined his initial reactions to the budget situation. First, the budget level presents serious concerns and challenges, which will be reported to the Board in March. Second, he was pleased that the Governor's budget message acknowledged the quality of UW System programs and the need to continue to emphasize quality and maintain the state's investment in the UW System. Third, it would be premature to go into more detail on the budget at this point because there had not been time

to conduct an extensive analysis. Fourth, he intended to present to the Board in March a specific analysis of each item affecting the UW System. His intention is to effectively respond to a difficult situation—not to create a crisis. Fifth, his March analysis will be based on the planning document which the Regents approved as part of the November biennial budget request. That plan emphasized the principle of preserving quality first and foremost. Guided by that principle, the effort would be to avoid personnel lay-offs and program disruptions and to provide as much student access as possible within available resources.

In response to a question by Regent Weinstein, President Shaw indicated that the student share of the total cost would go up slightly under the Governor's budget.

Regent Weinstein commented that the whole issue of program evaluation should be revisited, since what was decided several years ago might no longer be relevant in view of current budget constraints.

REPORT OF THE REGENT TASK FORCE ON SUPPLIES AND EXPENSES FUNDING

Adoption of Recommendations, R 5689, pp 9-14

Regents Gelatt and Steil, Co-Chairs, presented the report.

Regent Gelatt began the presentation by noting the Task Force had been established in July, 1990, by Regent President Lyon to examine supplies and expense items in UW System. The mandate of the Task Force was to examine in a thorough, systematic, and objective manner the supplies and expense needs and ways for addressing those needs in a more efficient, cost-saving manner.

Chaired by Regents Gelatt and Steil, the Task Force was composed of representatives from the UW System, the Department of Administration, the Legislature, and the private sector.

On behalf of Regent Steil and himself, Regent Gelatt expressed appreciation to the Task Force and to the Working Group for the time and attention they gave to this effort. The accompanying final report and technical report were approved unanimously by the Task Force.

Regent Gelatt then described the methodology of the Task Force and the background of its establishment, which grew out of the difficulty in assessing S&E needs and a concern that S&E needs were not being fully met.

The category of supplies and expenses is defined as encompassing salaries, fringe benefits, and permanent property items. Because it includes a wide range of diverse expenditures, there is no single methodology for assessing the budget requirement that can be applied to the category as a whole. In addition, S&E needs and priorities fluctuate as the environment changes. The problem of assessing S&E needs in the System is

additionally compounded by the level of funding directed to S&E in recent years. In the most recent biennia, the UW System has placed a higher priority on salaries than other areas. During the same period, the increase for the S&E category in the biennial budgets approved by the Legislature and the Governor were less than the rate of inflation and less than the Regent request. For these and other reasons, S&E needs went unmet and an S&E deficiency has evolved.

The methodology of the Task Force was first to select what portion of the S&E budget to consider, and it was decided to include both GPR and other funded portions of S&E. Secondly, the Task Force chose to exclude the Hospital and auxiliary operations from consideration. With those exclusions, the annual S&E budget is approximately \$200 million.

The Task Force focused attention on ten subcategories, which were chosen on the grounds that there may be either pressing unmet needs or real opportunities for savings in these areas: classroom and lab supplies; maintenance of buildings and grounds; repair and maintenance of data and word processing equipment; travel; postage and mail services; telephone and telecommunications; repair and maintenance of equipment other than telephone and telecommunications; printing; professional services; and data and word processing services and software. Expenditures in these ten subcategories comprise about 70 percent of the total S&E expenditures.

At an early stage in its deliberations, the Task Force found that general management policy and budget allocation decisions at three different levels affect the end use of S&E funds: (1) the allocation of funds between S&E and other budget areas; (2) the budget allocations made by System Administration and the Board among the UW institutions; and (3) the local campus budget allocations to the different departments and operating units. Given the importance of this allocation process, the Task Force broadened its examination to look at general management and budgetary allocation practices as well as the ten S&E categories.

While the Task Force developed a number of management recommendations and recommendations regarding specific S&E categories, the majority of the Task Force members considered one of these recommendations to be particularly important. In the long run, this measure has the potential to produce profound changes in productivity, cost savings, and improvements in quality. Management practices of the UW System and state government regulations were considered important to create a framework that encourages employees at all levels to identify and initiate measures that enhance the operation of the university by reducing costs, raising productivity, and/or improving the quality of services. The Task Force recognized the depth of knowledge and expertise of UW employees at all levels and considered it important that this resource be tapped to help design ways to strengthen the organization. For these reasons, the centerpiece recommendation of the Task Force was:

the formation of a management philosophy that supports the establishment of user teams at each UW institution to identify and institute improvements in specified areas.

Noting that the private sector has had considerable experience with this user team management approach, Regent Gelatt introduced Robert Bush of Schreiber Foods, and a member of the Task Force, to describe his experience with application of this management philosophy at his firm.

Mr. Bush began by stating that the user team approach would be an effective means of addressing budget problems, which are similar to fiscal problems that many industries have confronted. Those that have survived have adopted this concept of employee empowerment, which means giving every single employee in the organization an opportunity to help improve efficiency, reduce costs, and improve quality. His company is in a much better position today than five years ago, solely for this reason. He then provided several examples of remarkable productivity improvements effected by the employee empowerment approach.

Employee empowerment means giving the employees the tools they need to determine the problems and to use their intelligence to solve them. It means turning for answers to the people who actually are doing the jobs, not to managers or consultants.

In closing, he emphasized that this type of program is not a quick nor easy fix. It takes a long time and much training to change a culture. However, on the basis of his experience, he felt a ten percent cost reduction would be possible by use of such a program in the UW System.

In reply to a question by Regent Nicholas, Mr. Bush explained that the key incentive is employee recognition.

Regent Davis commented that it will take more than a management philosophy to make the program work. It will take cooperation from the state as well in the form of refraining from demotivating employees by taking back the savings that are generated. He also thought the degree of empowerment granted to university managers by statute would have to change, since it would be difficult to empower people at a lower level if it is not also granted to those at a senior level.

Regent Weinstein commented that in some areas departments should not continue to operate independently, and that consultants will be needed. For example, money could be saved on travel by scheduling conferences in such a way as to take advantage of reduced air fares on certain days of the week. While he agreed with the need for consultants, Mr. Bush cautioned against bringing them in to solve the problem. Instead, their purpose should be to give employees the understanding they need to solve the problem themselves.

Regent Vattendahl commented that it was comforting to see top management coming to the realization that the people doing the job know more about it than a manager who has never done it. In his experience, there were two keys to success. One is that consulting is needed to adjust from the authoritarian system and overcome resistance to change. Secondly, word empowerment must mean just that. Ideas must be implemented unless they can be proved wrong.

For this philosophy to be successful, Regent Gelatt stated, it must be endorsed by the Board and by President Shaw, and must be accepted by the entire System. To be successful in operating with restricted budgets, it will be necessary to make use of all of the talent of the System. While there was a temptation for the Task Force to set rules to save money, the members came to the realization that the people who best know the job should make those decisions.

Recognizing, however, that implementation of this program will take years, the Task Force made a number of recommendations for shorter term changes.

Regent Steil reported the Task Force conclusion that there are serious unmet supplies and expense needs at UW institutions. The second major management recommendation calls for development of a long-range plan to address not only the current deficiencies, but ones that are bound to appear in the future.

One area of acute unmet need that should be addressed in the long-range plan is the area of classroom and laboratory supplies. Lack of adequate resources in this area directly impairs the ability of the university to carry out its instructional mission, as students face inadequate, inoperable, and obsolete classroom equipment. Specifically, the Task Force recommended:

that the UW develop a long-range plan for redressing the S&E deficiency by doing further technical work to estimate the deficiency; to establish at each institution long-range plans for S&E replacement and procurement needs consistent with program goals; and develop a plan to eliminate the S&E deficit through a combination of GPR, base budget reallocations, and cost efficiencies.

The third management recommendation, Regent Steil continued, relates to budget allocation policies. The current environment of limited resources makes it particularly important that systemwide higher priority needs be funded before lower priority needs. The Task Force concluded that it is important for the UW System to continue, to the extent possible, expanding base budget reallocations for this purpose. Likewise, the Task Force concluded that any new budgetary funds should be allocated among UW institutions and among the units in a way that fully meets missions and policy priorities rather than on historical bases. In the area of budget allocation policies, the Task Force recommended:

that the university undertake base budget analyses periodically to provide more comprehensive information for budget requests and priority-setting; to reallocate savings that occur for external reasons, such as phone rate reductions; and to indicate alternatives, including base budget reallocations, if the budget requests are not funded.

The Task Force also developed a number of recommendations in the specific S&E categories: (1) requiring university employees to engage in comparative shopping for airfares over \$500 by contacting more than one travel agent; (2) expanding the use of teleconferencing to substitute for travel and expanding the use of electronic mail to substitute for mail; (3) seeking ways to reduce the cost of software, including the negotiation

of site licenses, pooling purchases, and avoiding purchases of overly-sophisticated software packages; and (4) consideration of pilot projects using external contractors for buildings and grounds maintenance.

The Task Force recommended that Vice President Poellnitz be assigned responsibility for implementing all of the recommendations in the report and the technical report, with the exception that Vice President Paul Brown be given the responsibility for considering establishment of pilot projects utilizing external maintenance contractors. The Regent Co-Chairs discussed all of these recommendations with Vice Presidents Poellnitz and Brown and both expressed their enthusiastic support for implementing the measures. The Task Force recommends that Vice President Poellnitz report on a regular basis to the UW System President and the Board of Regents regarding the progress of implementation.

As a result of its examination, the Task Force recognized that the UW System already is undertaking initiatives to save costs and improve quality in the supplies and expense area. The Task Force recommendations are designed to introduce a number of additional specific quality improvement measures, and most importantly, to help create a structure that will stimulate cost savings and quality improvement initiatives on an ongoing basis.

Thanking the Co-Chairs and the members of the Task Force, President Shaw stated that he found the recommendations to be very helpful. With regard to the primary recommendation, which he fully supported, President Shaw noted that higher education institutions had some experience in this area through the shared governance structure. As called for in the UW System's Academic Quality Program, each department will need to identify program goals, conduct evaluations, and effect improvements.

Even so, he agreed that it will take time and some outside help to change those aspects of the culture which currently may not be compatible with the user team approach. It will be done in a measured way that empowers employees and provides the necessary experience and training.

With regard to the other recommendations, President Shaw understood from his discussions with the Co-Chairs that those initiatives should be evaluated in terms of how they fit with the primary recommendation. Some might be modified as the process evolved.

Emphasizing the point made by Regent Davis regarding the state government role, President Shaw said there is a need to ensure that, at a minimum, there are no disincentives for cost-saving activities.

With regard to implementation, he noted that there are experts within the university and the state who can be helpful. For example, the American Society of Quality Control is located in Milwaukee, and UW-Madison is the base for the Center for Quality and Productivity, its research director being one of the leading quality improvement statisticians in the country. Marilyn and Robert Hart at UW-Oshkosh also are leaders in this approach.

Finally, as directed by the Task Force report, President Shaw had asked Vice President Poellnitz to establish an advisory council of private and public sector experts to assist in implementing the program. Progress on implementation will be reported to the Board on a regular basis, in accordance with a schedule to be provided later.

Regent Davis stated his strong belief that this type of effort must be directly controlled by the chief executive and cannot be delegated to subordinates.

Regent Vos suggested student involvement in identifying cost efficiencies. He thought that as consumers of university services, they are in a position to see ways in which resources might better be used to their full capacity.

It was moved by Regent Gelatt and seconded by Regent Steil that the following resolution be adopted by the Board:

Resolution 5689: That the Final Report and Technical Report of the Board of Regents Supplies and Expense Task Force, including all of the recommendations, be adopted.

The Task Force recommends:

the formation of a management philosophy that supports the establishment of user teams at each UW institution to identify and institute improvements in specified areas; and

a number of other management measures and measures regarding specific Supplies and Expense categories to generate cost-savings and quality improvements.

President Lyon noted that the idea for the study had been initiated by Regent Schilling during his presidency of the Board. The Task Force, appointed by Regent Lyon in July, had moved expeditiously to address substantial issues and completed its report within six months. He thanked all participants from the UW System, the Legislature, the Department of Administration, the private sector, the Board's Executive Assistant and staff.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5689 was adopted unanimously.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Regent Davis, Vice Chair, presented the Committee's report.

Regent Davis presented Resolutions 5690-5697, which had been unanimously approved by the Education Committee, as consent agenda items, for action by the Board of Regents.

Upon motion by Regent Davis, seconded by Regent Weinstein, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Board of Regents:

Report on Admissions Criteria and Exceptions p.17

Regent Davis reported Committee receipt of the annual report on admissions criteria and exceptions, including institutions admitting more than five percent of its students below admissions standards. Regents considered the various listings of admission in the report to be confusing and requested different options for the way this information can be presented. Regent Weinstein asked for retention information on each of the different categories of the freshmen cohort of three years ago. It was agreed that by the March meeting System Administration will inform the Chair of the time and effort needed to generate that information.

Conflict of Interest >

Report on Conflict of Interest Policy P.17

In a report to the Committee on the conflict of interest policy, Executive Vice President Lyall stated the report's conclusion that UWS 8 is a sound policy and possible improvements have to do with its implementation.

Regent Weinstein asked System Administration to make recommendations to the Board with regard to the recent Legislative Audit Bureau (LAB) report on UW-Madison outside activity reporting; to advise the Board of the reasons faculty should not file the same report as the Regents; what the penalty is for false reporting or failure to report; and who supervises the supervisory review of the reports.

Regent Lyon stated his interpretation of the LAB report is that the intent of UWS 8 has not been implemented by those who are to report and by those who should be accountable for supervising such activities. Others cited comments from some in the business sector who say the UW System policy is too stringent and may impede the technology transfer process.

Regent Lyon asked System Administration to report to the Board within three or four months on: (1) steps taken to correct the implementation problems alluded to in the LAB review; (2) efforts made to enforce the intent of UWS 8 throughout the UW System; (3) recommendations of any changes believed necessary to strengthen the enforcement of UWS 8; and (4) to bring to the Board copies of the conflict of interest policies of UW-Madison peer institutions.

A discussion paper on undergraduate education was presented to the Committee, after which Regent President Lyon described plans for public hearings, the establishment of Regent working groups, and the schedule of the study.

Adoption by the Board of Resolution 5698, which was approved unanimously by the Committee, was moved by Regent Davis and seconded by Regent Weinstein.

Resolution 5698: That an in-depth study be undertaken of the state of undergraduate education in the University of Wisconsin System:

> that as part of the work program for this study a series of public hearings throughout the state will be held in the Spring of 1991 to hear views from students, faculty and staff from all University of Wisconsin System institutions and interested members of the general public regarding all aspects of undergraduate education:

> that ad hoc Regent committees will be created to function as Working Groups to examine the major issues of undergraduate education and identify areas for policy consideration:

that it is expected the study will culminate in a package of policy recommendations to improve the quality of undergraduate education.

President Lyon stated that within the next three weeks he would be asking each Regent to serve on one of the Working Groups. The hearings will be held in April, and preliminary recommendations will be discussed in June. Final recommendations to System Administration for policy development will be made in September. The timetable calls for recommendations by President Shaw for any proposed policy changes to be brought to the Board in December. The study is intended to focus attention on undergraduate education and to provide a means of involving all interested people in the effort to make improvements in that area.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5698 was adopted unanimously.

Recommendations on Assessment of Verbal and Quantitative Proficiency
Skills, R 5699, PP 18-19

The Committee heard a thorough presentation by President Shaw on the subject of assessment, which was followed by statements from ten faculty and students, all of whom indicated opposition to standardized tests.

After lengthy discussion, the Committee unanimously approved a resolution, endorsing an approach responsive to the concerns which had been articulated: (1) implementing assessment provisions of the "Academic Quality Program"; (2) publishing a "Consumer Guide" to provide comparative information on UW System institutions to students and their parents; and (3) conducting a pilot feasibility study of use of ACT's Collegiate Assessment of Academic Proficiency to measure minimum performance in basic skills systemwide. The pilot study only would be a sample and would not be applied to the entire student body. The System President endorsed this approach.

It was moved by Regent Davis and seconded by Regent Schilling that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5699:

That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents endorses an approach which consists of 1) implementing the "Academic Quality Program" (AQP) to obtain assessment information useful for improving teaching and learning, 2) publishing a "Consumer Guide" to provide comparative information on UW System institutions to students and their parents, and 3) by the Spring of 1992, the UW System, using the joint UWS/DPI ACT College Readiness Study's 1989 data base, will complete a pilot feasibility study of the use of ACT's Collegiate Assessment of Academic Proficiency to measure minimum performance in basic academic areas systemwide. The President of the UW System will report the findings to the Board of Regents in September 1992.

Regent Krutsch commented that much of the impetus for assessment seemed to result from lack of a coherent core curriculum, and that the Board should take a leadership role in identifying areas important for undergraduate students to know. It seemed to her this issue should be addressed before the assessment program goes forward.

Put to the vote, <u>Resolution 5699 was adopted</u>, with Regent Vos abstaining.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Regent Gelatt, Chair, gave the report function of Bus, Humana Committee of Bus, Humana Committee

The Chair established a subcommittee to review the endowment structure and investment manager performance and to develop a request for proposals. The existing contracts are for three years with a one-year option to continue. This option expires in October of 1992.

Regent Gelatt presented Resolutions 5700-5702, which had been unanimously approved by the Committee, as consent agenda items for action by the Board of Regents. It was noted that Regent Steil abstained from voting on Resolution 5700.

Regent Schilling requested that Resolution 5702 be removed from the consent agenda. As an important reaffirmation of policy, he felt it should have a separate unanimous vote.

Upon motion by Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Vos, Resolutions 5700 and 5701 were adopted by the Board, with Regents Davis and Steil abstaining from the vote on Resolution 5700.

Approval of Gifts, Grants and Contracts

Communication of the Educational Communications Board

> Commenting on the recent Legislative Audit Bureau (LAB) audit of the Educational Communications Board, Vice President Bornstein indicated to the Committee that although the UW System agrees with many of the findings and recommendations of that report, they are opposed to the suggestion that responsibility for the state's public broadcasting be placed under one agency. A resolution was approved reaffirming the position taken by the Board when the same idea was put forward six years previously.

> Adoption by the Board of Regents of the following resolution was moved by Regent Schilling and seconded by Regent Gelatt:

Resolution 5702:

Whereas Legislative Audit Bureau (LAB) Report 91-2 advances valid and appropriate recommendations for improvement of cooperative public broadcasting

Lagrantica Qual Burgar efforts between the Wisconsin Educational

Communications Board (ECB) and the University of

Wisconsin-Extension, the University of Wisconsin

System pladges cooperation and good faith effort improvement of cooperative public broadcasting System pledges cooperation and good faith effort in working with the ECB and other involved agencies toward further improvement of public broadcasting services through effective inter-agency planning and coordination.

Whereas the University of Wisconsin System questions the LAB assertion that designating a single agency to be responsible for the State's public broadcasting efforts is necessary or appropriate for full accountability, the Board of Regents does not support assigning sole responsibility for the operation of Wisconsin Public Television and Wisconsin Public Radio to the Educational Communications Board.

Therefore, be it resolved that, consistent with its record and mission of public service by extending the resources of the university through the electronic media, the University of Wisconsin System stands ready to participate fully in discussions designed to identify acceptable alternatives for achieving the goals of increased coordination and cooperation for state funded public broadcasting and related facilities within and outside the University of Wisconsin System.

Regent Davis commented that the content of the LAB report did not lead him to the conclusion that sole responsibility should be assigned to the Educational Communications Board.

Regent Weinstein commented that he found disturbing the suggestion that dissemination of information should be controlled by one source.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5702 was adopted unanimously.

AB Report on Building Maintenance and Construction Supervision

In discussion of the Legislative Audit Bureau report on building maintenance and construction supervision, it was pointed out that limited resources have resulted in necessary priority setting by the chancellors, the Board and the Legislature, leaving maintenance unfunded. The UW System supports the recommendations for additional delegation by the Department of Administration and additional funding for the UW's building program. However, there is disagreement with the recommendations that positions be reallocated from other activities and that separate internal budgets for maintenance and physical plant operations be established.

Audit Status Report P. 2/

Audit Director Brunkow provided a status report on audits in progress along with findings from a number of recently completed audits. He indicated that a contract has been entered into with the Legislative Audit Bureau to perform the federally required OMB A-133 audits. The UW System will pay \$435,000 for the audits which will cover the period from July 1, 1989 to June 30, 1991. The Subcommittee asked that the executive summaries of all System audits be provided to the Audit Subcommittee.

Annual Update on Implementation of the Competition Policy

The Committee received the annual update on implementation of the policy on competition with the private sector. The report indicated that six of the institutional competition review committees had met to discuss various competitive issues. Decisions ranged from stopping sales of non-educational toys at the UW-Eau Claire bookstore to continuing to offer computerized data bases by the library at UW-Madison.

GPR Budget Freeze

Regent Gelatt summarized a report to the Committee on the GPR budget freeze and the UW System's spending plan submitted to the Department of Administration. That plan, which allows some management flexibility while meeting DOA's overall objectives, was approved by Secretary Klauser in January.

The institutions had been given a target amount to be saved. It is estimated the \$7 million of savings will come from salary savings of \$3.3 million, associated fringe benefits savings of just under \$1 million; reduction of S&E budgets, including out-of-state travel of \$.7 million; and reduction in capital equipment budgets of \$2.1 million. The Committee was assured that the first priority is to preserve the educational mission.

Annual Report on Non-Commercial Educational Broadcast Activities of UW System Radio and Television Stations

Vice President Bornstein presented to the Committee the annual report on non-commercial educational broadcast activities of UW System radio and television stations. He discussed the balancing of needs by the broadcast stations in determining their programming—educational benefits to students being the common objective. The radio stations provide: a non-commercial educational program service to their listeners; student training and experience in support of academic programs; and outreach information to the public regarding university programs and activities. WHA—TV provides continuing education, including discussion of public policy alternatives and cultural programming. Vice President Bornstein stated that the broadcast stations offer a diversity and quality in their services.

Quarterly Financial Reports

Regent Gelatt reported presentation to the Committee of the quarterly financial reports for the period ending December 31, 1990. Anticipated collections in program revenue funds are being reviewed for adequate spending authority levels to meet increased program demand. First semester academic fee projections indicate collections in excess of budget of about \$4.5 million, or 1.5 percent. In accordance with Regent policy, any excess collections will be applied to reduce future academic fee increases.

Gifts. Grants and Contracts Mailing secondary of gifts + quants, for vice President Poellnitz reported that, beginning with the March Regent

agenda mailing, the gifts, grants and contracts report will be mailed under separate cover, with a copy of the summary included in the agenda materials. Fewer copies of the full report will be mailed in order to reduce the cost of printing and distributing this material.

Tax Sheltered Annuity Report - Update to Registe, P. 27

Professor James Egan, Chair of the Tax Sheltered Annuity Review Committee, gave the Committee an update on the criteria changes which were adopted by the Board in 1988. One problem had surfaced regarding contributions made to unapproved products. New contributions of this type had ceased, but the question remained as to what should be done with the employee balances that were transferred in the past. The Committee deferred the issue to the March meeting, after the review committee has obtained legal advice.

Teaching Assistants Association Potition - Regular Hat

Regent Davis asked if the proposed amendments represented any change in the Committee's duties.

Regent Gundersen explained that the amendments primarily were intended to set forth the Committee's duties in a more orderly form. Items were added to state specifically the Committee's responsibility for physical safety and removal of architectural barriers. Reports on items within the Committee's areas of responsibility are to be presented on a monthly basis. At the previous day's meeting, for example, there was a report on removal of barriers to people with disabilities. The amendments also removed the figure of \$30,000 for delegated projects.

Regent Flores asked if the Committee had any control over the design and location of buildings constructed by outside groups and later donated to the university.

Vice President Brown replied that, when such facilities are built on university land, the land transaction would have to be approved by the Board, which also would trigger a review of specifications. If the facility were not built on university property, there would be no formal role for university input in the building process.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5709 was adopted unanimously.

Resolution 5709: That the Duties of the Physical Planning and
Development Committee as presently stated in Section
4. of the Bylaws of the Board of Regents of the
University of Wisconsin System be rescinded and the
following duties and responsibilities be adopted for
submission to the Board for approval:

Milwaukee: Approval of Design Report and Authority to Construct

Academic Facility for School of Architecture and Urban Planning, R 57/0, pp

Regent Krutsch presented a resolution which had been amended in Committee upon motion by Regent Dreyfus, who expressed reluctance to take final action to authorize construction of a new \$18 million facility in view of concern about the infrastructure needs of the System. Emphasizing that he did not question the need for this particular project, he said he would have the same view of any other requests for final approval of major new construction. The Committee accepted the proposed amendment which would allow for completion of the design and taking of bids, but which would require the request to be brought back to the Board for authority to construct.

It was moved by Regent Krutsch and seconded by Regent Doughty Luckhardt that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Interim Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Design Report be approved and authority granted to complete the design and bid the 1989-91 Academic Facility for the School of Architecture and Urban Planning project, returning it to the Board for approval to construct at an estimated total project cost of \$18,000,000, using 1989-91 General Fund Supported Borrowing.

Regent Krutsch indicated that she had voted for the amendment in order to allow Regent Dreyfus' concerns to be considered by the full Board. He had felt that, in the climate of the LAB audit which implies that the UW System had been remiss about building maintenance, this is not the time to approve \$18 million to build a new facility for a program that is already housed elsewhere, although inadequately. Withholding final approval until after the design and bid process is completed will not delay the project if the Board later decides to proceed. By this summer, there should be a better idea of the state of the economy and the impact of the war in the Persian Gulf. He thought there was much to be gained by showing that the Board is serious about repairing existing buildings before constructing new ones.

Stating his disagreement with the amended resolution, Regent Gundersen commented that the effect would be to add one more step to an already overlong and complex bureaucratic process. He did not think the Board should make a judgment based on the economy of the moment, but should look instead at the long-term importance of the facility, to excellence of the School of Architecture and Urban Planning, and to UW-Milwaukee as a whole. The project had received Building Commission approval in 1989, and money already had been spent on design and architects. He thought the resolution should be amended to approve construction at this time.

Regent Weinstein agreed with Regent Gundersen and stated his intention to vote against the resolution.

Regent Vos stated support for the resolution and urged careful review of the project.

Regent Nicholas agreed with Regents Gundersen and Weinstein that decisions like this should not be made on the basis of short-term conditions. In addition, delays almost always result in cost increases. He also pointed out that such action would be precedent-setting in terms of how capital budget projects are handled.

Regent Schilling stated that he would offer a motion to authorize construction to proceed, following action on the resolution which was on the floor.

The question was put, and the resolution was defeated on a voice vote.

Upon motion by Regent Schilling, seconded by Regent Flores, Resolution 5710 was adopted, with Regents Doughty Luckhardt and Vos voting "No."

Resolution 5710: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Interim Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Design Report be approved and authority granted to complete the design and bid the 1989-91 Academic Facility for the School of Architecture and Urban Planning project, and to construct at an estimated total project cost of \$18,000,000, using 1989-91 General Fund Supported Borrowing.

Vu-Parkside - Blaget Kard

IN-Parkeides Approval of Student Housing Acquisition, R 5711, pp 29-3/

Continuing the report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee, Regent Gundersen summarized review of requested authority to accept conveyance of title for student housing facilities and approximately 8.3 acres of land from the UW-Parkside Benevolent Foundation, subject to inclusion of \$6 million of program-revenue-supported borrowing authority in the 1991-93 Capital Budget. The university will utilize state bonding authority to satisfy \$5.4 million of outstanding debt for construction of the facility and to undertake \$600,000 in necessary facility repairs.

The 1991-93 Capital Budget approved by the Board included the request for \$6 million program-revenue-supported borrowing authority. The information presented in December outlined several alternatives to ensure that affordable housing continues to be available for UW-Parkside students. The best alternative appeared to be for the state to assume ownership of the facilities and refinance the debt through self-amortizing state general obligation bonds. This alternative assumed that the interest rate could be reduced from the existing 9.1 percent to about 7 percent. With the resulting annual savings, it was felt that the operation would become financially viable.

Since the December meeting, System Administration staff, in cooperation with Chancellor Kaplan and her staff, had conducted a thorough review of the financial and programmatic issues involved in the potential acquisition of the Parkside Housing Complex by the state. The conclusion of this review was that state acquisition of the housing complex, and the associated refinancing of the debt structure, will create a viable operation that will be financially sound and will allow the strong demand for student housing to be met by UW-Parkside. There was extensive discussion by the Committee as to the wisdom of this course of action. However, the proximity of the development to the core of the campus and the potential adverse impact of having its use and management be outside university control led to the conclusion that state ownership was the most prudent course to take. After discussion, the Committee adopted Resolution 5711, with Regent Doughty Luckhardt voting "No."

It was moved by Regent Gundersen and seconded by Regent Vos that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5711: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Parkside Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to accept conveyance of the title for student housing facilities and approximately 8.3 acres of land from the UW-Parkside Benevolent Foundation, subject to the inclusion of \$6 million Program Revenue Supported Borrowing authority in the 1991-93 Capital Budget, when enacted. The University will utilize the state bonding authority to satisfy the outstanding debt for construction of the facility (\$5.4 million) and to undertake necessary facility repairs (\$600,000).

Regent Doughty Luckhardt stated that she was uncomfortable with the \$6 million expenditure and felt other parties might have responsibility for some of the burden.

Regent Vos stated his full support for the project, which would reduce the interest costs and not expend GPR dollars or add programs.

Regent Weinstein asked what would happen if revenue projections were not realized.

Chancellor Kaplan expressed confidence that numbers projected through 1995 will result in a surplus to be used in paying off the bond. Projections were not done beyond 1995, but there was no reason to believe that the numbers would change appreciably. The facility always had operated at capacity and had a waiting list.

Vice President Brown added that there had been situations on other campuses where the dorms had not been fully occupied. Systemwide actions had been taken to rectify those problems.

President Shaw stated that the UW System would be accepting the liability if financial projections were not realized.

Regent Gelatt commented that the UW System essentially would be indemnifying those who took on this project. The market feedback mechanism is that those who make bad economic judgments suffer some consequences. If the Board did not have advance control over projects, he did not believe it to be good policy to bail out those who undertake them.

Regent Schilling noted that the consequence of the university not coming to the rescue would be that the bonds would go into default and the trustee then would own the building. The university would have to negotiate with the trustee and might not be the high bidder. The process would be complex because of the involvement of both a bond trustee and bond holders. The bond holders would be the losers in any default.

In response to a question by Regent Doughty Luckhardt, Chancellor Kaplan explained that neither the county nor the Benevolent Foundation has any equity interest. She added that the facility was reviewed in 1985 by the Board of Regents, with the understanding that after 30 years the project would revert to the state.

Regent Flores expressed concern about foundations and other groups undertaking projects outside of the normal building process controls. He felt a way should be found to prevent situations in which such groups construct buildings near university land without Board control, with the Board then being asked to rescue them from bad financial decisions.

Regent Davis said he would be satisfied, from an economic standpoint, with taking over the property, since it is a \$7.5 million asset in good condition and with a solid cash flow. While he agreed that it should not be the Board's policy to bail out failed projects, he thought economically attractive opportunities should be taken.

President Shaw commented that the project had not been financially viable from the beginning, and the Board had not received good advice at that time. From a policy standpoint, he felt the university has a responsibility when it makes an arrangement with a foundation or other group. In this case, the project is a liability, but not to take action on it would damage the university's good name.

Regent Nicholas agreed, on the basis that the project is viable and accepting title maintains the university's integrity. He considered that reputation to be more important than the relatively few dollars that might be spent in this situation.

Regent Weinstein said he would vote against the resolution because he was not convinced there had been an attempt to negotiate the best deal for the taxpayers. Instead, the bond holders were being held harmless for their own errors.

Put to the vote, the resolution was adopted, with Regents Doughty Luckhardt, Flores, Gelatt, and Weinstein voting in opposition.

PApproval of the WISTAR Program, R 5 7/2, Pp 3/- 34

Regent Gundersen presented Resolution 5712, which had been unanimously approved by the Physical Planning and Development Committee. At the December meeting, there had been a special presentation describing the program by Regent Emeritus David Beckwith, Chair of the UW-Madison Chancellor's Council. The decision had been made to defer the matter to the February meeting, to allow time for Board officers and System Administration staff to confer with the Governor and members of his staff to determine the level of support he would lend to the proposal. Regents Lyon, Nicholas, Gelatt and Gundersen met with the Governor and also with Robert Brandherm, Administrator of the Division of Facilities Management, regarding conditions that would be required for endorsement of such a program for the System. These discussions resulted in the recommendation presented at this meeting.

The resolution requested approval of a program to improve the quality and quantity of facilities to advance state technology. An additional emphasis is promotion of public/private partnership which the Governor's budget message identified as WISTAR and which was added to the second page of the resolution as a revision. WISTAR would incorporate the UW-Madison's Facilities for Advancement of State Technology program. Consistent with the Board's position in December that the program may have application at other System universities, the resolution clearly states that this program is to be expanded to include projects and facilities at other universities in the System for research and applied technology programs as they are identified.

Those involved in the negotiations related to this endeavor felt that the program embodied in the proposed resolution will prove very advantageous to the System in the long-term and to UW-Madison as it advances the projects identified for the FAST program. Chancellor Shalala considers the resolution consistent with the goals of the Chancellor's Council which developed the FAST initiative.

Adoption by the Board of Regents of Resolution 5712 was moved by Regent Gundersen and seconded by Regent Nicholas.

Resolution 5712: Whereas, Wisconsin enters the last decade of the 20th century having assumed a stronger, more diverse economic character and, in many respects, is considered to be the new economic powerhouse of the Great Lakes region; and

Whereas, this position rests on traditional Wisconsin strengths in business and industry as well as new efforts to capitalize on the state's investment in high-technology; and

Whereas, a key element of the effort to reinforce Wisconsin's economic resurgence and maintain its high quality of life has been the state's outstanding support of higher education; and

Whereas, as the University of Wisconsin System continues to be a significant influence over Wisconsin's economic and social well-being, and with its \$285 million-a-year research enterprise, UW-Madison is ant important and most diverse high-technology endeavor; and

Whereas, the majority of the money attracted to University of Wisconsin System programs of research is federal or private and contributes substantially to the vigor of the state's economy; and

Whereas, taking well-accepted economic impact multipliers into account, University of Wisconsin System programs of research infuse more than a billion dollars a year into the state's economy whereby, in its programs of scientific and engineering research alone, it employs more than 7,000 individuals, making it unequivocally the state's largest high-technology employer; and

Whereas, by the year 2000 it is anticipated that new research dollars brought into the state would equal the state's investment in the new and renovated research and technological facilities; and

Whereas, the public research universities of the nation, including those in the University of Wisconsin System, are facing a crisis in quality and quantity of research space; and

Whereas, the Board of Regents wishes to express its desire to maintain the ability of the System to attract federal and private research funds which enable the state to engage in high technology endeavors which expand the economy, promote public/private partnerships, and influence the ability to compete in an increasingly complex world; and

Whereas, in light of these many concerns, and in view of the great potential inherent in a healthy scientific research enterprise;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System to adopt a university—state partnership program, i.e., WISTAR, which would incorporate the UW—Madison new Facilities for Advance of State Technology (FAST) program, under which the state would use \$150 million of its General Fund supported bonding authority to help finance a special \$225 million research facility initiative, with the remaining \$75 million to come from gifts, grants and sources other than state general purpose revenues. This program is to be expanded to include projects and facilities at other universities in the System for research and applied technology programs, as they are identified; and

Be It Further Resolved by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System to request that the necessary statutory language to implement the program be forwarded for consideration by the State Building Commission and Wisconsin Legislature.

Regent Schilling noted that one concern had been whether every dollar gained for the FAST program would be lost from priorities identified in the Capital Budget. He asked if discussions involved any assurance by the administration that these dollars would be viewed as supplemental. He expressed the hope that the result would not be two Capital Budget programs—one developed through methodical, long—term planning; and the other, a special program developed outside of that process.

Regent President Lyon replied that the program should be compatible with the Capital Budget request and the ten-year plan. It had been extended from a five-year to an eight-year program, with some opportunity to accelerate as private funding becomes available, and also opportunity for other campuses to become involved if they meet the same requirements for private matching funds. He felt comfortable that other building projects would not be jeopardized.

President Lyon thanked Chancellor Shalala, her staff, the Committee under the leadership of David Beckwith, and Robert Bush who served on that Committee. The Regents involved believed the agreement worked out with the Governor and other state officials to be one that is fair to all parties.

In reply to a question by Regent Vos, Regent Lyon indicated that private funds raised from projects at other institutions would be in addition to the \$75 million specified for the UW-Madison program.

Responding to a question by Regent Nicholas, Regent Gundersen said it will be mandatory that the required private funding be in hand before projects are initiated.

Regent Nicholas expressed appreciation to Governor Thompson for his support and commitment to this program and to all the others involved in working out the agreement.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5712 was adopted unanimously.

ADDITIONAL RESOLUTIONS

Support for those Serving in the Persian Gulf War, R 5713, pp 34-35

Presenting Resolution 5713, Regent Vos said the intent was to support the students and staff who were serving in the war, but not to endorse any policy, since the university should be a place where all views are discussed. Currently, there were 24 students from UW-Stevens Point in the Gulf area; 30 from UW-Platteville; a number of students from the UW Centers; 26 students from UW-Eau Claire, as well as one faculty and one staff member; 15 students and one academic staff member from UW-Whitewater; 47 students and one faculty member from UW-Oshkosh; 6 students from UW-Superior; 12 from UW-Parkside; 30 students from UW-LaCrosse; 25 students from UW-Stout; over 100 students and 36 faculty and staff from UW-Madison; 7 students from UW-River Falls; 97 students and some staff from UW-Milwaukee; and 8 students and one faculty member from UW-Green Bay.

Xnef Persian Gulf Conflict - Isam

Upon motion by Regent Vos, seconded by Regent Schilling, the following resolution was adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5713: Whereas, there are approximately 380 University of Wisconsin System students and a number of faculty and staff who have been called to duty in the Persian Gulf War; and

Whereas, these faculty, students and staff are undertaking great risks and sacrifices in the service of our country;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents states strong support and gratitude for the valor and dedication of all those in the University of Wisconsin System who are serving in the war effort; and further states the commitment to doing everything possible to ease their transition when they return to the university.

In response to a question by Regent Schilling, President Shaw said the reinstatement process for returning students would be done as quickly as possible. If a student had to leave in the middle of a semester, opportunities would be provided for make-up work. If it were near the end of the semester, professors might give early and make other provisions to help the student complete the semester examinations.

At 12:00 noon, the following resolution, moved by Regent Nicholas, was unanimously adopted on a roll call vote, with Regents Davis, Doughty Luckhardt, Flores, Gelatt, Gundersen, Hassett, Krutsch, Lyon, Nicholas, Schilling, Steil and Weinstein voting "Aye" (12), and no Regents voting "No."

Resolution 5714: That the Board of Regents recess into closed session to consider personnel matters, including appointment of Dean, UWC-Rock County, and annual evaluations, as permitted by s. 19.85(1)(c), Wis. Stats.; for honorary degree nominations at UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee, and naming of a baseball field at UW-Superior after a person, as permitted by s. 19.85(1)(f), Wis. Stats.; and to confer with legal counsel, as permitted by s. 19.85(1)(g), Wis. Stats.


