# SUNBURST CHAIRS RETURN TO TERRACE

The sunburst pattern chairs on the Memorial Union terrace are as much a part of the UW-Madison campus as Lincoln's statue on Bascom Hill. The sturdy seats have hosted people since the early 1930s, as they lounge along the tranquil shores of Lake Mendota.

The familiar sunburst pattern cut into the seat and back conjures up vivid memories of times past: struggling over a calculus problem, sipping coffee, or just relaxing in the afternoon sun. The same chairs have seated those listening to bands play on the terrace from polka to punk and still they endure — a symbol of the Wisconsin Union.

But over the years, the chairs have worn down or rusted out and the Union has searched in vain for a comparable replacement. The last company to manufacture them went out of business in 1976 and destroyed the tooling, which ended all hope of reordering the durable sunburst pattern chairs again, until now.

Thanks to a recent development, terrace chair lovers can relax. The Memorial Union Building Association (MUBA) approved the spending of \$7,800 in gift money to purchase new, redesigned tooling for the chairs from Wisco Industries of Oregon, Wisconsin. This not only insures their availability but gives the MUBA ownership of the sunburst pattern.

After the tooling was completed, Wisco Industries, as low bidder, was awarded the job of manufacturing the 300 chairs which are scheduled to arrive by June 15. There will be 100 each in red, green and yellow, all sporting the unmistakable sunburst pattern and notable circular base.

## HERMAN AWARD TO HAMDU AL-AMIN

The annual Henry B. Herman Award, given to an outstanding undergraduate student at the University of Wisconsin-Madison who comes from New York City or its metropolitan area, has been given this year to Hamdu al-Amin.

Amin is a senior in Communication Arts specializing in film. He has played a part in the Law School's Legal Assistance to Institutionalized Persons program, and has authored his own program for ex-offenders. He also aided in program planning for African American History Month 1981, and has been active in the Muslim Students Association.

The Herman Award is given yearly in honor of the late Henry B. Herman, who was Director of Program and Associate Director of the Wisconsin Union from 1965 to 1971, to a student who has shown concern for his or her fellow human beings consistent with Herman's own devotion to humanistic principles. The award is coordinated through the Wisconsin Union Directorate.

# KITTY KOCOL RECEIVES PORTER BUTTS AWARD

The Porter Butts Creative Arts Award for 1981 has been given to Kitty Kocol, a senior majoring in fine arts at the UW-Madison. Ms. Kocol has distinguished herself as chair of the Wisconsin Union Directorate's Art interest area during the past year, coordinating such programs as the Undergraduate Art Show, Art-O-Rama, and the 53rd Annual Student Art Show. Her duties also included planning and over-seeing receptions with the art department faculty and with visiting artists.

Kocol becomes the sixteenth recipient of the Porter Butts Award, which is given yearly to an individual student or staff member at the University of Wisconsin who has shown outstanding talent in the arts and expressed their creativity through the program of the Wisconsin Union.

The awards were set up by the Memorial Union Building Association in the name of Porter Butts with funds contributed by his friends and former associates when he retired after 40 years as Wisconsin Union Director.

#### ANNIE'S COMING TO TOWN

Little Orphan Annie has been entertaining children of all ages since she first appeared on the comic pages in 1924. In 1977, "Annie" came to Broadway where the story of the little girl, her beloved dog Sandy and her guardian, Daddy Warbucks, achieved record-breaking success. This Christmas, "Annie" and her friends will be in Madison for special holiday performances sponsored by the Union Theater and the Madison Civic Center. The musical, which will be presented in the Civic Center's Oscar Mayer Theatre, will be performed at 8 p.m. Dec. 21, 22, and 23 and at 2 and 8 p.m. Dec. 26 and 27, with a special Christmas Day performance scheduled for 5 p.m.

The show, honored as the Best Musical of 1977, earned seven Tonys, seven Drama Desk Awards, and five Outer Critics' Circle Awards. Now in its fifth year on Broadway and with three national touring companies on the road "Annie" continues to delight audiences with music such as "You're Never Fully Dressed Without a Smile", "I Don't Need Anything But You", and "Tomorrow".
