HOW TO COOPERATE IN HOME MAKING

The American housewife can no longer remain apart from world affairs. Today, every garment she buys and every meal she cooks has some bearing on international markets and relations. The home of today must face new and difficult problems. What they are and how the housewife may meet them—from the standpoint of both economy and of well-being for the family—are suggested in this short course.

How to reduce the cost of products in the home by the greater use of cooperative stores, laundries, and kitchens figures in the short course as a possible solution of the home problems.

How the wiser use of public markets and wider use of parcels post in direct buying from the producer may be an aid will be discussed.

Efficient and scientific planning of meals are considered as factors which may aid in reducing the cost of home-keeping.

The possibility of reducing labor in the farm home will be demonstrated with labor-saving equipment and power machinery. Intelligent reference to saving time for living and playing with the children will be emphasized.

Cutting the cost of clothing by using short-cut methods in making new garments, and simple renovation and dyeing in preserving the old, will be the subject of several demonstrations.

The value to the state of maintaining health, especially that of children in the pre-school age, is emphasized in lectures and demonstrations. These deal with the underlying principles of child feeding and the practical importance of the hot school lunch—in city and in rural schools—and of feeding clinics. In connection with this subject we are very fortunate in securing the services of Miss Amy L. Daniels of the Child Welfare Research Station of Iowa.
