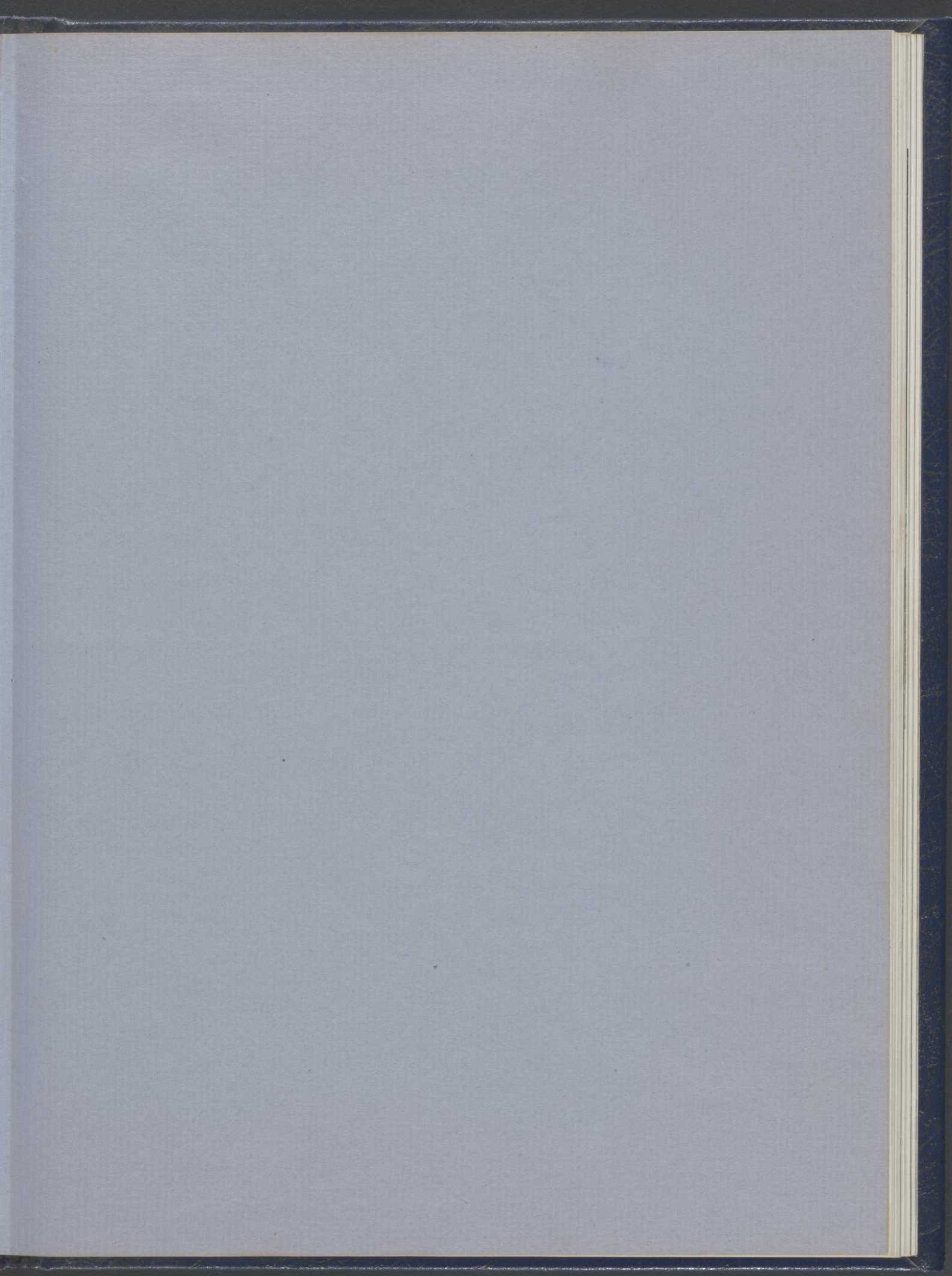

Lieutenant ALVIN ANDERSON

Alvin "Bud" Anderson came to River Falls from the Baldwin High School and attended the college during the years 1939-1941. While here he was interested in intramural athletics and was one of the mainstays of the Falcon tennis team. He was class president, member of the Student Senate, and R Club, and was active on various committees. In May, 1942, he enlisted in the Reserve Signal Corps and served in the Hawaiian Islands from May, 1942, until February, 1943. He sailed to New Guinea in May, 1944, and took part in the invasions of both Leyte and Luzon. On January 29, 1945, he was killed in a plane crash on Leyte. Lt. Anderson's company, the 989th Signal Company, received the Bronze Star for its participation in the Leyte and Luzon campaigns.

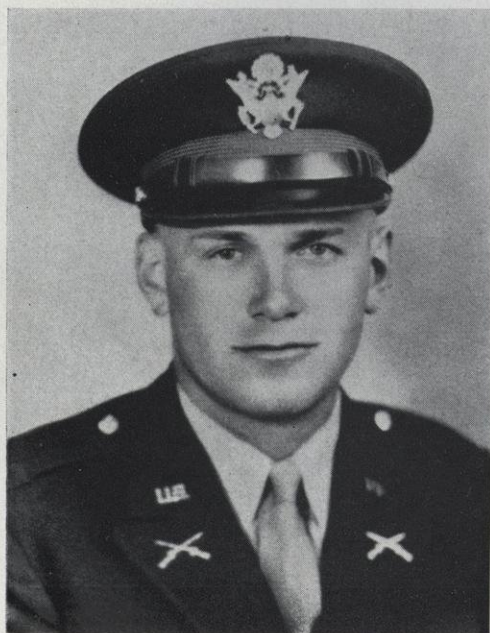
Lieutenant ROBERT E. BOERNKE

Robert E. Boernke enlisted in the Army Air Forces September 25, 1942. He classified as Pilot in May, 1943, and graduated as Second Lieutenant, Fighter Pilot, in March, 1944. After further officers training he flew to India August 2, 1944. In the fall of that year he went over the "Hump" into China. It was while leading a squadron on an important mission over China that he was killed at Hong Kong, December 23, 1944. He attended River Falls in 1938-1939.



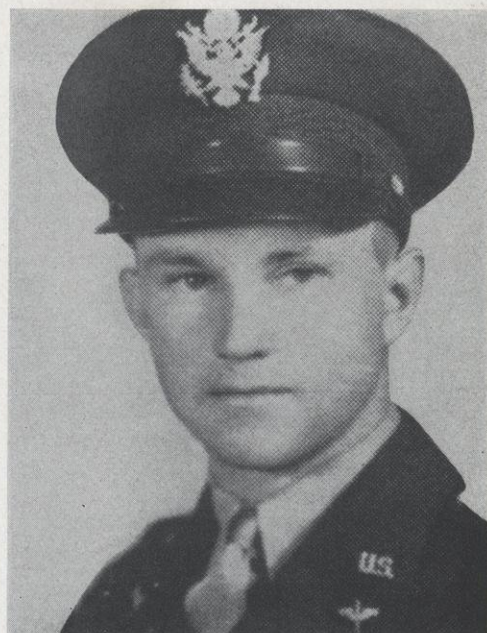
Lieutenant BURTON BOETTCHER

Burton Boettcher of the army was Captain Boettcher of the River Falls 1941 football squad, starring in athletics here as well as in high school at Chippewa Falls and Eau Claire Teachers College, which he attended during his freshman year. He received his B.S. degree from River Falls Teachers College in 1942, entering the army in August of that year. He became an infantry officer after training in the Officers Training School at Fort Benning, Georgia, and was sent for overseas duty in the South Pacific in January, 1944. It was in Arawe, New Britain, that he met his death, April 6, 1944, as a result of an accidental gunshot wound. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Boettcher of Chippewa Falls, and two brothers, who were also in the service: Lt. (jg) Orris C. Boettcher, serving in the South Pacific, and T/Sgt. Vernon Boettcher in England.



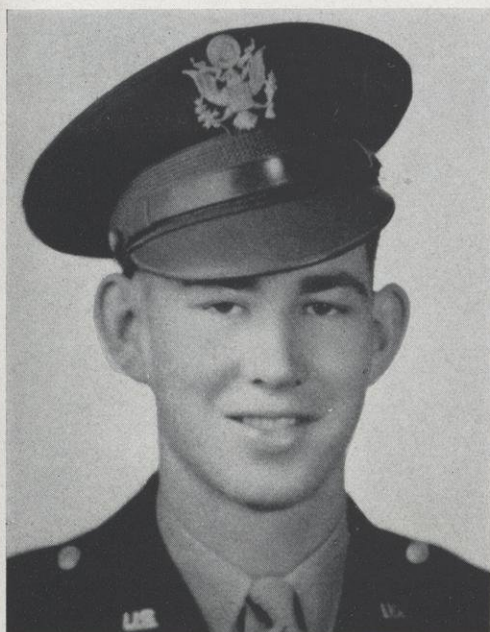
Lieutenant ERYLE BOETTCHER

Eryle W. Boettcher was Burton's cousin; both were born on the same day, September 26, 1917, only a year apart, and both were laid to rest in the same month of April, a year apart. Eryle studied in the Agriculture department at River Falls during the years 1938-1941, entering the Army Air Forces, August 26, 1941. He met his death at Euphrata, Washington, as the result of a bomber crash. He is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Boettcher of Bloomer, Wisconsin, a sister, Helene, and a brother, Warren.



Lieutenant ROBERT BUSBY

Robert Busby graduated from the River Falls High School in 1938 and attended the Teachers College until 1940 when he left with the National Guard in October. He transferred to the Army Air Forces, and was piloting one of the Army's fastest planes, the P-51 Mustang, on a special mission, staging a "recognition school" for ground forces when the accident occurred which caused his death at Muskogee, Oklahoma, September 19, 1943. He is survived by his mother, father, and sister, Ione. His brother Marvin, Quartermaster 1/c of the USNR, has been missing in the Pacific theater of action since January, 1944.



Staff Sergeant DUANE C. CORNELL

Duane C. Cornell graduated from the high school at Eau Claire and attended the Teachers College in that city two years, 1939-1940. He came to River Falls in 1941 and from here went into the armed forces in November. He served in the Field Artillery in the European theatre of operation and received the Purple Heart decoration. He was killed in action at St. Lo, France, July 27, 1944. A brother, Jack, was also a Corporal in the army in France. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Cornell who live near Eau Claire.



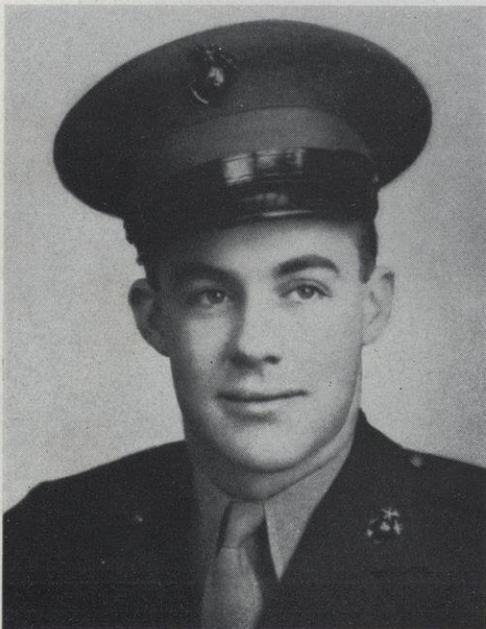


Pfc. CARL G. DAHL, JR.

Carl G. Dahl, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl D. Dahl of Baldwin, graduated from the Baldwin High School with the class of 1942. He attended the Teachers College at River Falls in 1942-43, entering the army March 5, 1943. He served in the infantry and was sent overseas, where he was killed in action in Normandy, July 31, 1944.

A/C DUANE LEON DOOLITTLE

Duane Leon Doolittle, son of Editor and Mrs. H. F. Doolittle of Ellsworth, met his death together with a friend, Donald L. Harlander, in an airplane crash near Ellsworth, Memorial day afternoon, 1944. Duane had just completed his basic training at Wold-Chamberlain field May 22, and was to have reported at Corpus Christi, Texas, for advanced training, June 2. He enlisted in the Navy V-5 program in 1943, after completing his sophomore year at River Falls. While in high school and at college he played on the basketball teams and, after enlisting, played with the Mankato Teachers College five while training there. He played drums in his home school band for eight years, was a member of the college band, and was drummer with the Navy band at Northfield, Minnesota. He was an Eagle Scout. Duane's sister, Audrey (Mrs. Graydon C. Wood), also attended the River Falls College and his brother, T/Sgt. Stanley E. Doolittle, was with the army in Korea.

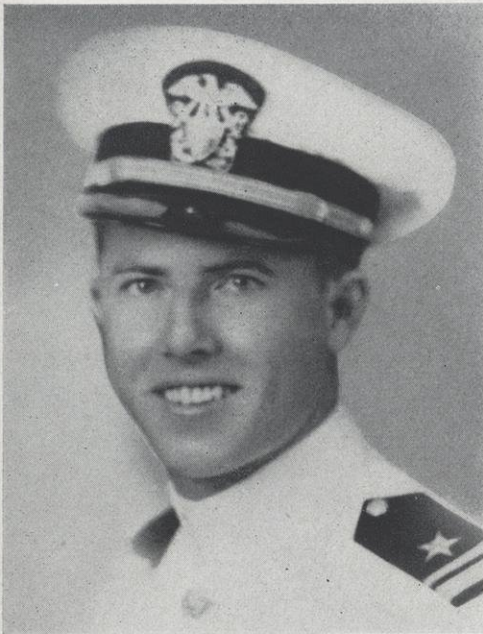


Lieutenant LESTER E. DYER

Lester Eugene Dyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Dyer of Fond du Lac, spent four years, 1939-1943, at River Falls, and in looking over the college annuals of those years one finds that he participated in almost all college activities. He was class president, member of FFA, Student Senate, Honor Society, numerous committees and active in athletics. He graduated with the degree of B.S. in agriculture in 1943. He entered the service that year in the Marine Corps and served in the Central Pacific theater. His death occurred February 24, 1945, at Iwo Jima, when he was killed instantly by a sniper. All officers in his company were killed except one, and he was wounded. Lieutenant Dyer received the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon, Sharp Shooter's Medal, and Purple Heart.

T/5 JAMES GORDON FLATHE

James Gordon Flathe was born in Winnipeg, Canada, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Flathe, who came to the South Fork district near River Falls in 1938. He had entered the Teachers College in 1937 from the Pepin High School and remained until 1939. He entered the army in January, 1943, and served in the Reconnaissance division—armored Cavalry. He was sent overseas and fought on the fields of Normandy, where he was wounded July 4, 1944, and succumbed to his wounds the next day. His brother, Staff Sergeant George Flathe, was killed in action in Belgium, January 31, 1945, after having been in service five years. Another brother, Gerard, was in the Royal Canadian Air Force in England.



Lieutenant (jg) JOHN D. FRANK

John D. Frank of Phillips came to River Falls in 1939 and spent two years at the Teachers College in the Agriculture department, enlisting in the Naval Reserves in August, 1941. He received his wings at Pensacola, Florida, and was assigned to patrol duty at Panama and later at Jamaica. He was transferred to a fighter plane, and his training continued until the carrier USS Kaason Bay was sent into action in July, 1944, in the invasion of Southern France. He flew a carrier-based navy fighter plane in this invasion, and was reported missing August 17, 1944. He had been awarded the Air Medal and received the Purple Heart. A brother, Bernard, served with the armed forces in the South Pacific. In 1944, Lieutenant Frank married Miss Eleanor Curtis at Pleasantville, N. Y. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Dismas E. Frank of Phillips, Wisconsin.

Private CHARLES L. GANSKE

Charles L. Ganske, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ganske of Chetek, graduated from the Chetek High School and came to River Falls in 1939. He remained here through 1939-1940, majoring in science. September 29, 1941, he joined the armed forces and thus was in service before Pearl Harbor. He went overseas and served in the Philippine Islands. He was missing at Bataan and died in Cabanatuan prison, September 28, 1942.



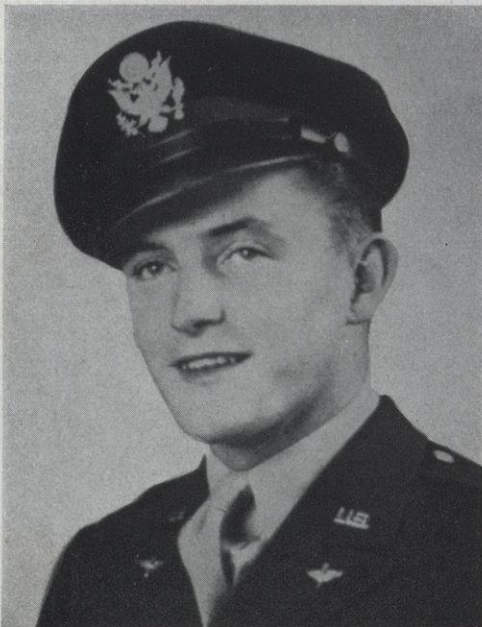


Second Lieutenant THOMAS H. GILL

Thomas Hopkins Gill was the son of Lieutenant Colonel and Mrs. Dewey R. Gill of Wauwatosa, Wisconsin. He attended River Falls Teachers College during 1939-1940. He enlisted in January, 1942, and served in the Army Air Forces in the European theater of operation. He received the Purple Heart and recognition of the excellent way in which he handled his plane, saving the lives of all crew members. He met his death September 26, 1944, in a B-24, probably over Holland. Lieutenant Gill married Dorothy Jane Taylor in 1942, and they had one daughter, Nancy Taylor Gill.

Staff Sergeant ELDON GILLES

Eldon Gilles attended River Falls Teachers College in 1938-1939, following his graduation from the Plum City High School. He entered the service in October, 1942, and was sent overseas in October, 1944, in the Army Air Forces. Staff Sergeant Gilles was an armor gunner on a B-24 in the Eighth Air Force and was stationed in Shipdam, England. He had completed all his missions and was awaiting passage to the United States when he was killed in an aircraft crash over Gairloch, Scotland, June 13, 1945. He had received the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters.



Lieutenant DEAN W. GORDON

Dean W. Gordon entered the service in December, 1943, and became a pilot in the Army Air Forces in the Pacific theater. He had flown around 1200 hours overseas, making trips to Australia and almost all the islands in the South Pacific. His plane moved supplies and troops to the forward areas as soon as they were taken. It supported the Eighth Army's drive into Mindanao and helped carry all the supplies used in the operation—the first time an engagement had been supported entirely by air. His death occurred July 17, 1945, when his plane crashed on Mt. Calavite on the island of Mindora on a mail run. He received the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with five battle stars, the Philippine Liberation ribbon, and was eligible for the Air Medal. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Gordon, and two brothers, one of whom, Dale Gordon, is attending college.

Technical Sergeant EUGENE GOSSEN

Eugene Gossen, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Gossen of Bessemer, Michigan, graduated from the River Falls Teachers College with the degree of B.E. in 1937. He taught in the River Falls High School until his induction in February, 1942. He served in the Army Air Forces in the 394th Bombardment Squadron in the Asiatic-Pacific Area. Shortly after his arrival at his base in the Pacific he was killed in a crash landing with live bombs which exploded. He received the Purple Heart and Citation of Honor. Sergeant Gossen was much interested in Boy Scouting and the River Falls Scout home has been named the Eugene Gossen Lodge in his honor. In June, 1943, he married Marian Tracy, also a student of the college.



Lieutenant WALTER GUINN

Walter Guinn attended the Teachers College from 1933 to 1936, majoring in history and the social studies. He was especially active in YMCA and in the men's chorus and a cappella choir. He enlisted in the Army Air Forces in January, 1942, and was commissioned lieutenant. He met his death December 29, 1943, at Deming Field, New Mexico, where imperfect ventilation and heating facilities in their trailer home caused his death by asphyxiation, together with that of his wife, Genevieve Kondrasuk Guinn, and their five-year-old son.

Lieutenant HOWARD E. HINES

Howard E. Hines enlisted in the Army Air Forces September 29, 1942, after attending college one year, 1940, and became a pilot of a B-24 Liberator in England, where he engaged in combat over Germany with the 445th Bombardment group. He had completed more than twenty-eight heavy bombardment missions over Germany, had been shot down twice, but had each time brought his plane back to England. On April 22, 1945, he was killed in a plane crash near Honington, England, while on a non-combat mission. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters. Lieutenant Hines was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest M. Hines of Ellsworth. A brother, T/5 Willard L. Hines, served in the Pacific in Okinawa. In 1941 he married Frances A. Brookshaw of Ellsworth.



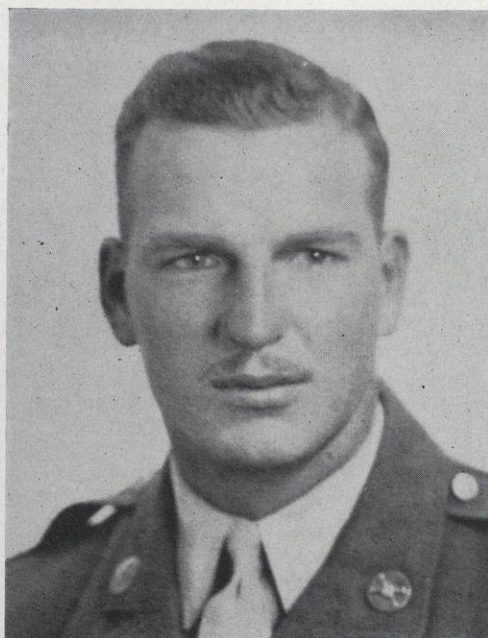


Pfc. RICHARD M. R. HYLKEMA

Richard M. R. Hylkema, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Hylkema of Turtle Lake, graduated from River Falls in 1934 in the three-year group. He entered the Army in December, 1943, serving in the Infantry. He was sent overseas and fought in France, Belgium, and Holland with the "Timberwolf" Division. He was killed in November, 1944, in Holland close to the birth place of his parents. Pfc. Hylkema wore the European Theater ribbon with two battle stars and received the Purple Heart. Two sisters, Mary (deceased) and Gertrude, and a brother, Bernard, were also students at River Falls.

Sergeant RUPERT ISAACSON

Rupert Isaacson was in the Agriculture department from 1938 to 1941. He was active in athletics, playing on the football team during the three years. He was inducted in June, 1941, and served in the Field Artillery. He went overseas in September, 1944, and fought in southern France where he was killed in action against the enemy November 22, 1944. Sergeant Isaacson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Isaacson of Nye.

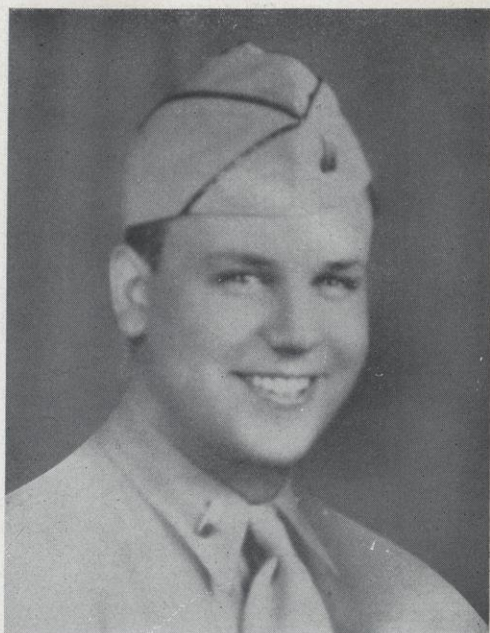


Lieutenant GORDON JACKMAN

Gordon Wayne Jackman of River Falls left with the National Guard in October, 1940, after attending college one year. He was chosen for officers training and was graduated as a lieutenant in the Field Artillery. He went overseas in September, 1944, and served in the European theater as forward observer in a Field Artillery unit. He lost his life at Krinkelt, Belgium, in the Battle of the Belgian Bulge in action against the enemy, while with extraordinary heroism he protected the withdrawal of a friendly infantry battalion until his position was overrun. He was cited for bravery and awarded the Distinguished Service Cross. Lieutenant Jackman was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Jackman. Two brothers were also in the service, Lynn in Italy and Duane in the United States. In December, 1942, he married Lois Webb, a graduate of River Falls in the class of 1942.

Lieutenant DONALD E. JOHNSON

Donald E. Johnson also left River Falls with the National Guard in October, 1940, after spending two years in college. He was commissioned a lieutenant in the Field Artillery. He left the United States for foreign service in June, 1943, and fought in France, where he was mortally wounded at Vire, August 10, 1944, dying August 11. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry C. Johnson of River Falls. In August, 1943, he married Dorothy J. Parrish of Ellsworth, a former student at River Falls.



Private ROY JOHNSON

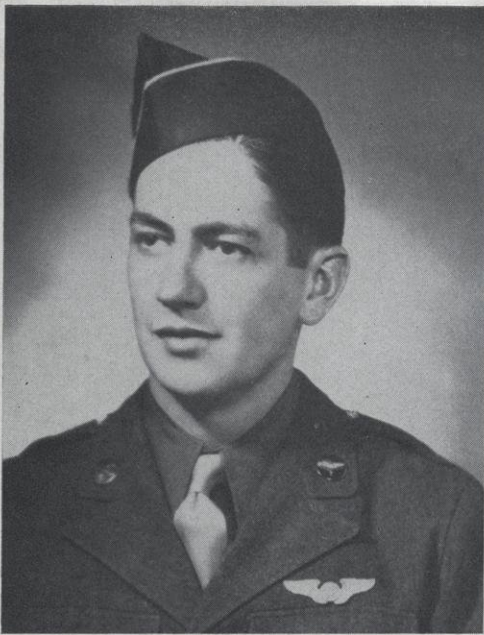
Roy Johnson attended the college from 1931-1933, taking the Principals course. At the time of his induction he was assistant field supervisor of Warner Brothers Motion Pictures, working out of the Minneapolis office. He enlisted in the Army February 15, 1945, and was sent overseas from the West Coast just before peace was declared. He was on his way to the South Pacific when he died aboard ship of illness—cerebro-spinal fever meningococcic. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Flora Johnson, his little daughters, and one brother, Private Louis Johnson, with the army in Texas. His wife, LaVonne Ringdahl Johnson, died in 1940.



Staff Sergeant VOYLE JOHNSON

Voyle Johnson attended River Falls Teachers College two years, 1938-1940, before entering the service, January, 1940. He went into the Army Air Forces and was sent to the Philippines, where he fought in the Battle of Bataan. He was reported missing in action in May, 1942, and no further word was received until July, 1944, when he was declared officially dead and awarded the Purple Heart posthumously. At the end of the war it was learned that he had died June 2, 1942, in a Japanese prisoner of war camp—Camp O'Donnell in the Philippines. He is survived by his father, Axel Johnson, of Grantsburg and one brother and three sisters.





Staff Sergeant ROBERT R. McCABE

Robert R. McCabe, son of Mr. and Mrs. William McCabe of Hammond, received his B.E. degree in science and mathematics from River Falls in 1937. He had been active in basketball and debate and served on many committees while in college. He entered the service July 15, 1942, in the Army Air Forces and was sent overseas to the New Guinea area. Here he was a radio gunner on a B-25 bomber. He was shot down September 3, 1943, over Wewak Bay after a terrific enemy attack. All five members of the crew were missing. He was awarded the Silver Star, Presidential Unit Citation and the Purple Heart.

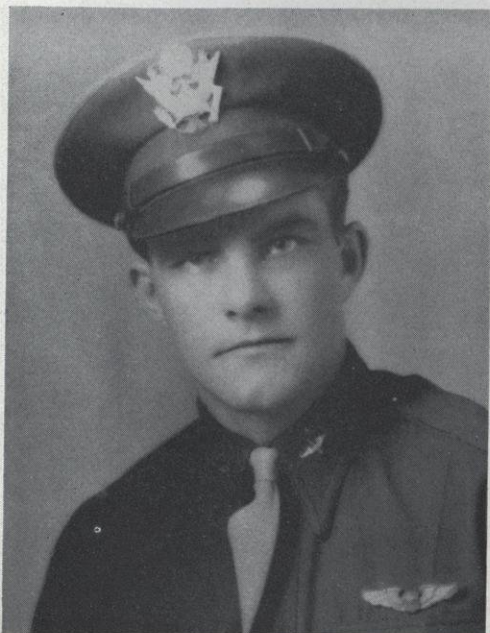
Lieutenant STANLEY L. MORLEY

Stanley L. Morley majored in science and mathematics during his four years at River Falls, receiving his degree, Bachelor of Science, in 1940. One of his extra-curricular activities was photography, and he was photographer for the 1940 Meletean. He entered the service in February, 1942, in the Army Air Forces and was sent to the European theater of operation. He was on a bombing mission over Germany when he was shot down over Duren, November 29, 1944. He had received the Air Medal and was awarded the Purple Heart. Lieutenant Morley's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Roy Morley of New Auburn.



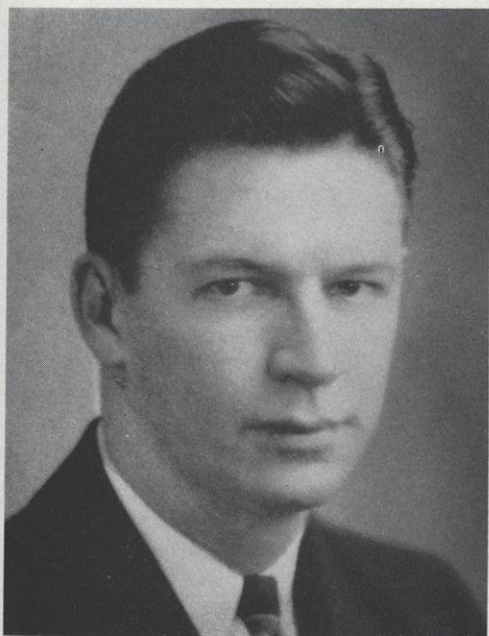
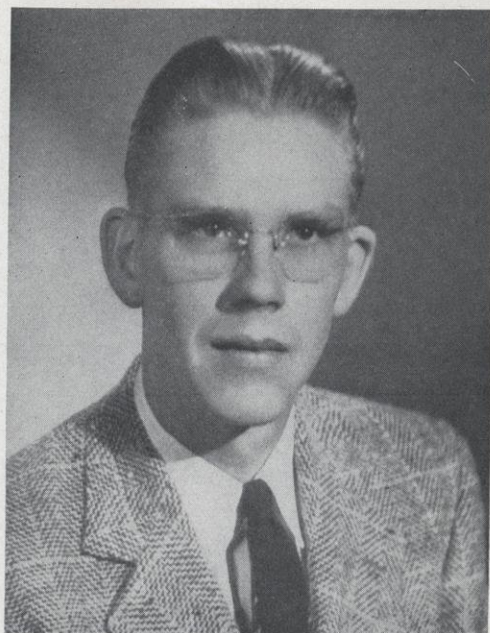
Lieutenant ROBERT L. MRAZ

Robert L. Mraz enlisted in the Army Air Forces in January, 1942, while in his sophomore year at River Falls. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in September and was sent to the Alaskan area at the end of the year. It was while on patrol duty in the Aleutian Islands that his plane was caught in a propeller wash, and he was killed January 21, 1943. Lieutenant Mraz was an outstanding athlete, receiving the American Legion award as the outstanding athlete of his class upon his graduation from the Algoma High School, where he played football, basketball, and baseball. He continued his football career at River Falls, becoming a varsity letterman. During his vacations he played baseball on the Algoma city team. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Frank Mraz of Algoma. A sister, Lieutenant Elaine Mraz, was an army nurse at O'Reilly General Hospital, Springfield, Missouri.



Private BURTON OLSON

Burton M. Olson came to River Falls Teachers College after his graduation from the River Falls High School and took a pre-engineering course from 1937 to 1939. He enlisted in the infantry, July 28, 1944, and served in the Pacific on Okinawa. He met his death there April 20, 1945. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Manley Olson of Beldenville. In July, 1941, he married Fern Struble and left one son.



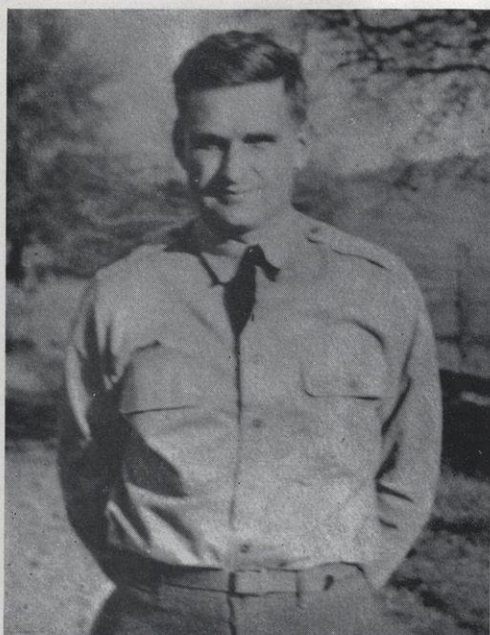
Private STANLEY PALM

Stanley V. Palm, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Palm of Milltown, entered the River Falls Teachers College in the fall of 1937 and received his B.S. degree in 1941 in mathematics and science. Among his extra-curricular activities were basketball, which he played during his entire four years at college, and tennis. He enlisted in the Army in August, 1942, and was sent to Greenland. While being transported to this area he lost his life in the sinking of the transport Dorchester by a German submarine when within fifty miles of its destination, February 3, 1943. In 1942 Stanley Palm married Ruth Davidson. A brother, Captain Irvine L. Palm, was also in the service.

Lieutenant ELMER PARNELL

Elmer Parnell received his B.E. degree from River Falls in 1932 in mathematics and science. He also attended Marquette University and received his Master's degree in 1942. Previous to this he had been a member of the faculty of the Somerset High School for ten years, teaching mathematics and science. He was their first coach of basketball and also coached boxing and other sports. He entered the service in April, 1944. He received an assignment to the Air Transport Command and completed his training at Las Vegas, New Mexico. He was awaiting his assignment to overseas service when the news came to his mother that he had died quietly in his sleep at Camp Luna, Las Vegas, November 17, 1944.





Lieutenant JOHN HENRY PERSON

John Henry Person was a navigator on a bomber operating in the African theater. He has been missing ever since two planes failed to return from a mission early in 1943. He enlisted in 1940, in the Army Air Forces, following two years at River Falls, and was sent to the Mediterranean theatre. His death apparently occurred April 18, 1943, in Sicily. He married Jane Erickson in 1942, and had a son whom he had never seen. He received the Air Medal with four oak leaf clusters and the Purple Heart.

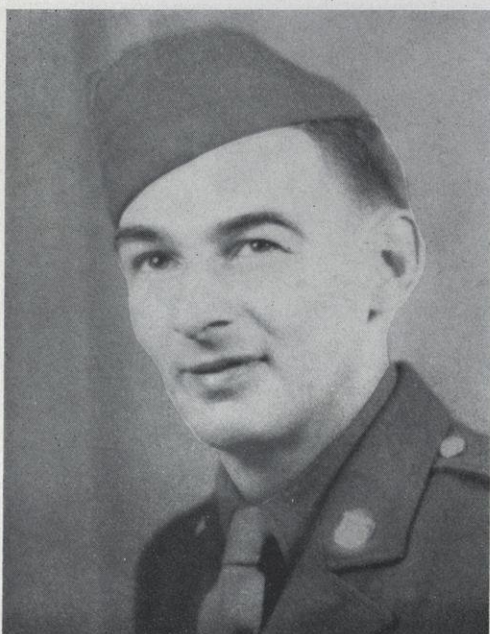
T/Sgt. WARD RANGLES

Ward Randles came to the college from Alma Center and while here was a Falcon basketball star. He received his degree in 1939. He enlisted in the Army Air Forces in 1942 and served in the Europe-Africa-Middle East area. He flew in the famous raid over the Ploesti oil fields in Rumania in August, 1943, as Flight Engineer on a B-24 bomber. He had been missing since December 22, 1943, when on a flight over Holland, but was not officially declared dead until September, 1945. He received the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Purple Heart. He married Beatrice Cornell in 1943. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Earl Randles of Alma Center.



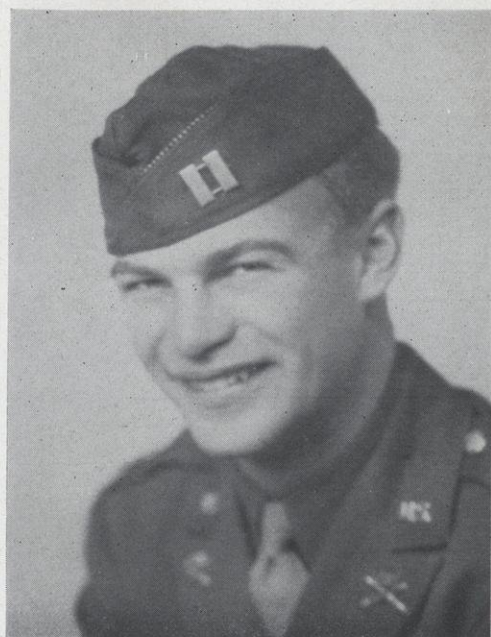
Pfc. JOHN W. ROCKWELL

John W. Rockwell enlisted in July, 1943. He was sent to the European theatre, where he served with a demolition corps. He met his death near Le Havre, France, October 19, 1944. He was awarded posthumously the Purple Heart and the Soldiers' Certificate of Merit for performing exceptionally meritorious service in daily exposing himself during the period before his death, September 5 to October 19, 1944, on his hazardous mission, part of it under fire. Private Rockwell is survived by his wife, two children, and his mother, Mrs. Winnona Rockwell. His brother, Malcolm, also lost his life in the service.



Captain MALCOLM H. ROCKWELL

Malcolm H. Rockwell attended the college during 1937-1938 and Marquette University during 1938-1940. He enlisted in the service November 26, 1941, a few days before Pearl Harbor. He served in the Artillery and fought overseas in the European theater. He lost his life in Germany, December 17, 1944. He received the Bronze Star Medal and the Purple Heart. Captain Rockwell was the son of Mrs. Winnona Rockwell and is survived by his wife and his mother. His brother John died in France two months before his own death.



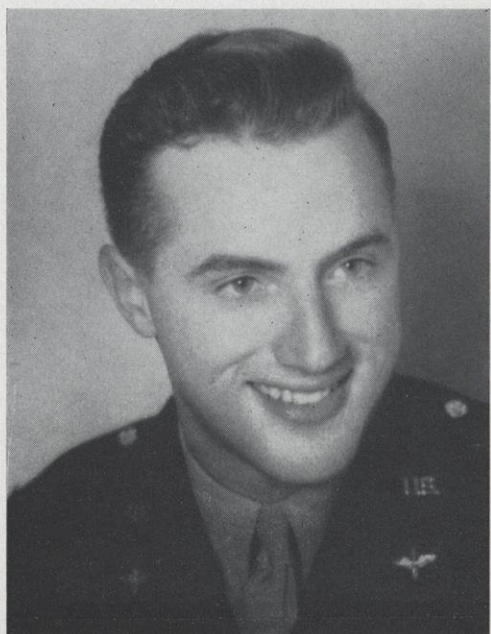
Lieutenant OLIVER R. SCHULTZ

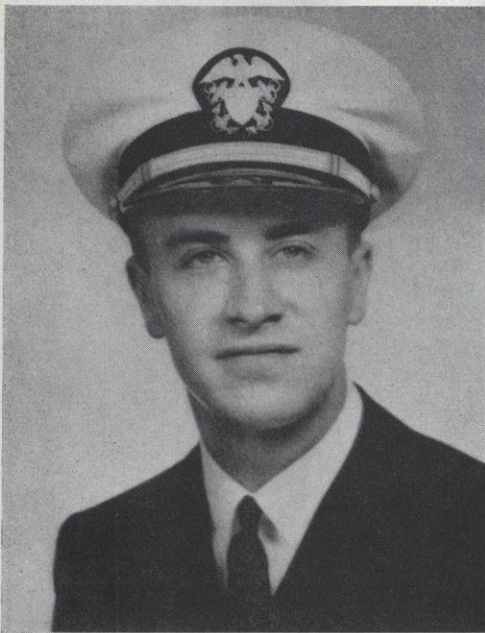
Oliver R. Schultz was a student in the Agricultural department at the college in 1940-1941. He then entered the University of Wisconsin and enlisted while there in February, 1942. He left for overseas in December, 1943, going first to Africa and then to Italy. He was missing in action May 26, 1944. Lieutenant Schultz received the Air Medal and was awarded the Silver Star for attack on a concentration of enemy motor vehicles in Italy in which he set fire to and damaged thirteen trucks before his plane burst into flames and he parachuted to sea near enemy land.



Lieutenant RICHARD SHEA

Richard Shea attended the Oshkosh Teachers College in 1940-1941 and entered River Falls the next year in the Agriculture department. He enlisted in the Army Air Forces in December, 1942. He left the United States for overseas service and became a Pilot in a P-51 plane, engaged in combat duty in England. He lost his life November 1, 1945, in Karlsruhe, Germany. He was awarded the Air Medal and the Purple Heart. Lieutenant Shea was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Shea of Pickett.





Ensign JEROME SOBOTTA

Jerome Sobotta graduated from River Falls in 1940, with the degree B.S. in agriculture. He taught agriculture two years in the Channing, Michigan, High School. In February, 1942, he enlisted in the Naval Reserve and received his commission in the fall of that year. He was assigned on the seas the next year and saw action in the South Pacific until July 18, 1943, when his ship was torpedoed as it was nearing the island of Rendova in the Solomon Sea. Among those who lost their lives on the ship was the famous artist and illustrator, Lieut. Commander McClelland Barclay. Ensign Sobotta is survived by his mother, Mrs. Emma Sobotta. His brothers served in the Pacific also.

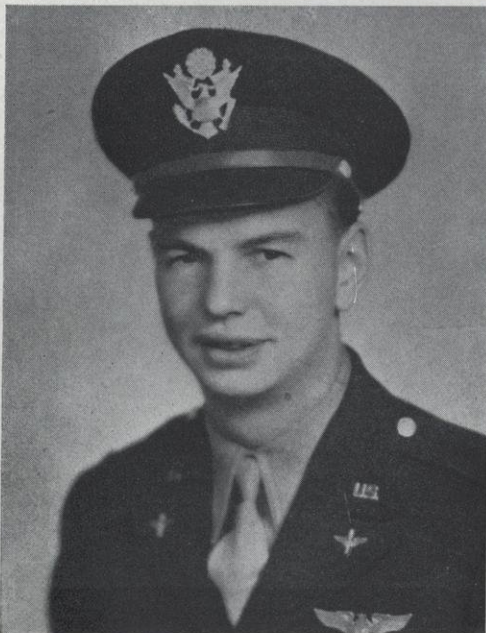
Pfc. RUSSELL SOLHEIM

Russell Solheim, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oswald J. Solheim of Hudson, graduated from River Falls in 1927. Music was one of his chief hobbies and he was a singer of unusual ability. At the time of his enlistment, October, 1943, he was working for the Cudahy Packing Company as a salesman. Private Solheim served in the Infantry and was sent to the European theater. He fought in the battle of St. Lo and lost his life in France on the fields of Normandy, July 11, 1944.



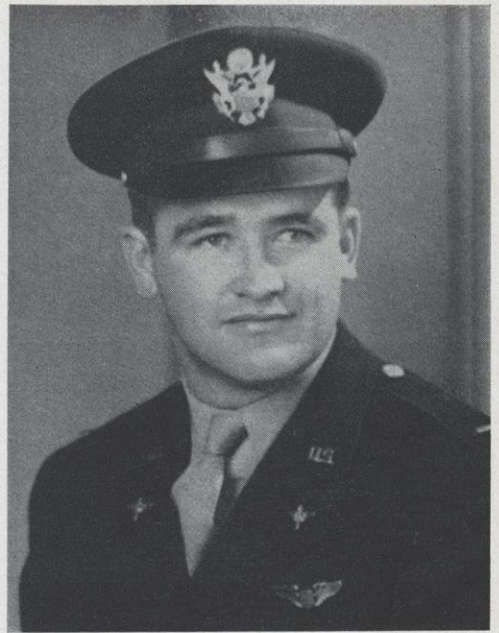
Lieutenant KEITH SOLVESON

Keith Soveson entered the Army Air Forces February 24, 1942, after attending the college from 1937 to 1941. He became bombardier for the crew of the "Sky Wolf," accounting for more than twenty German fighters before going down over Oschersleber, Holland. Lieutenant Soveson lost his life August 20, 1943. He was awarded the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters and the Purple Heart.



Lieutenant PETER STENE, JR.

Peter Stene was a student in the college from 1936-1940, enlisting in the Army Air Forces in June, 1941. He served in the European theater and was in the assault on Regensburg, Germany, in August, 1943. He met his death while returning from a bombing mission to Frankfurt, Germany, February 17, 1945. Just off the coast of Ostend, Belgium, the aircraft of which he was Command Pilot caught fire from an explosion in the nose of the plane. It crashed into the sea, and only one survivor was rescued. The Air Medal with seven oak leaf clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross were awarded to him.

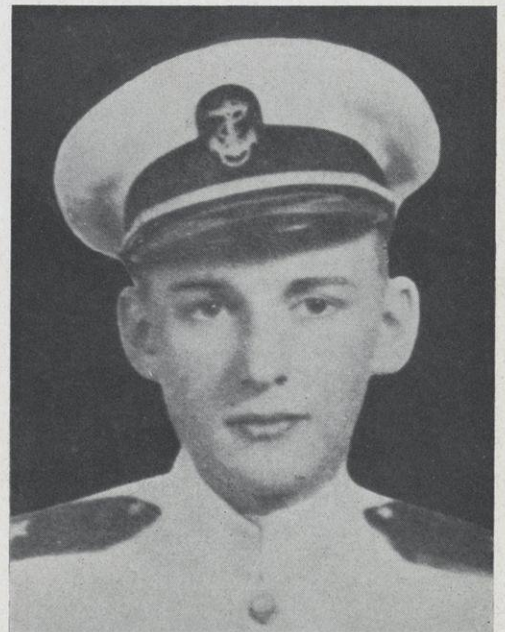


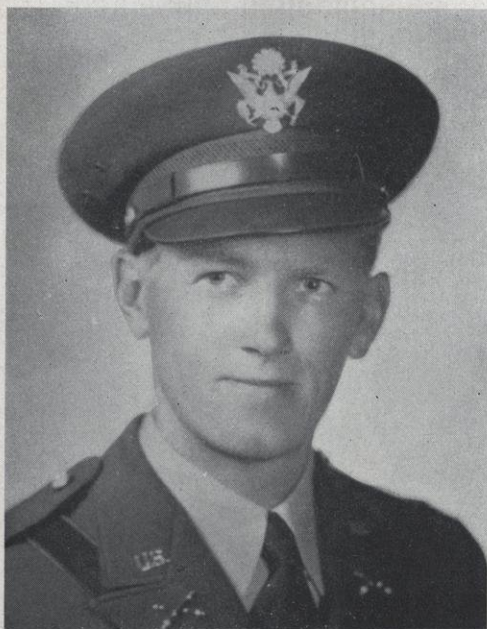
Lieutenant DARRELL KEITH STOYKE

Darrell Keith Stoyke came to River Falls from Chetek, studied here in preparation for a business course, 1939-1940, and then went to the University of Minnesota, which he attended from 1940 to 1942. He enlisted in July, 1943, in the Army Air Forces. He became a Fighter Pilot and was sent to the European theater. On August 19, 1944, he was killed in action in Southern France. He received the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters. Lieutenant Stoyke was the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Stoyke of Sheldon.

Ensign ROBERT THORESON

Robert Thoreson enlisted in the Naval Reserve as an aviation cadet in December, 1940. He was in his senior year at the college, majoring in agricultural education and science. He had been active in college life and was business manager of the Meletean at the time of his departure. He was commissioned an ensign in 1941 and assigned to duty as a naval flying instructor with the patrol bomber squadron at the Naval Air Station at Pensacola, Florida. He continued at this duty until his death, due to a landing crash, September 7, 1942. His father, Toby R. Thoreson, lives in River Falls. A brother, Kenneth, was with the Army Air Forces in India.



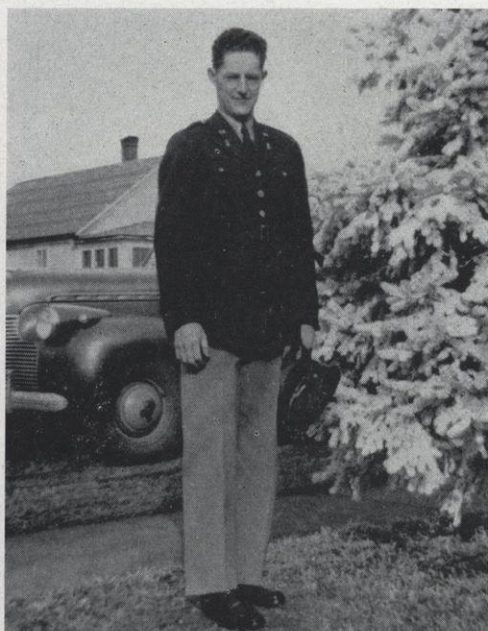


Lieutenant STANLEY TORGERSON

Stanley Torgerson graduated from River Falls in 1939 and taught in Hammond and later in Hudson. He was an honor student, an outstanding athlete and a teacher of unusual ability. He enlisted in the Field Artillery in 1941 and served on the Italian front. He was killed in action at the Battle of Salerno, September 14, 1943. Only a few days before he had been cited for heroic action on the Salerno front, where a pocket of American artillery had no infantry covering and Lieutenant Torgerson braved death by standing on a fuse box to direct blank fire.

Lieutenant WALTER BRUCE WALKER

Walter Bruce Walker was born in Canada and came to Hayward with his parents in 1919. He attended Fletcher College, Iowa, in 1936 and then River Falls Teachers College, from which he received his degree in agriculture in 1941. He taught at McMillan, Michigan, before entering the service in August, 1942. He went overseas in April, 1945, in the Pacific area. Word was received in August that he had died on Ie Shima of injuries received in an accident, July 30, when a truck got out of control and crashed through the tent where he was sleeping. He was to have been elevated to the rank of captain in the near future. Lieutenant Walker was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John K. Walker of Hayward. A brother, Keith Walker, was with the armed forces in Germany.



Sergeant FRANK E. WINTERLING

Frank E. Winterling was a student at River Falls in 1936-1938, attending Stout Institute the next year. He enlisted December 8, 1941, in the Marine Corps and was sent overseas to Guadalcanal. He met his death there October 14, 1942. His brother, Joe Winterling, lost his life in the service as a Marine in the Philippine Islands, May 6, 1942. After the death of his two only sons, the father, Frank W. Winterling, enlisted in the Marines himself and served with credit and honor.

The editors realize that this roster of the service men and women of the River Falls State Teachers College is no doubt incomplete and perhaps inaccurate in some details. Such omissions and inaccuracies are due to the inability or failure of some to respond to the questionnaires which were sent by Dean Stratton to all men who had attended the college since 1931. This list is compiled from the replies received and from Dean Stratton's records. Only abbreviations which are commonly known have been used, and at the suggestion of servicemen themselves the more general awards (Victory Medal, Good Conduct Ribbon, etc.) have been omitted. However, a sincere effort has been made to make this a true and valuable record of the part taken by our men and women in World War II. Additions and corrections will be appreciated by the editors.

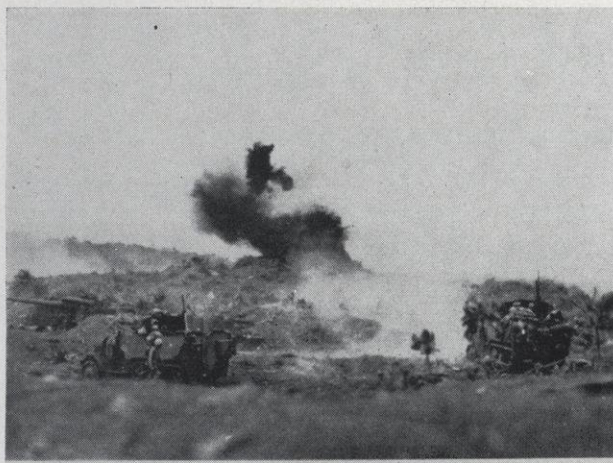

It has been said that an institution is but the lengthened shadow of a great man. If this be true, River Falls State Teachers College represents the contribution of J. H. Ames to teacher education. For twenty-nine years he has been president of this college and has seen it grow from a normal school largely concerned with professional subjects to a degree granting institution of high reputation in the state. Indeed, it is in no small way the lengthened shadow of this man.

J. H. Ames was the son of a father whose life was spent in Wisconsin's great timber areas. He was educated first in the rural schools of Outagamie County and later graduated from the normal school at Stevens Point. In this area he started his teaching career. The administrative field soon interested him and he became supervising principal of Cumberland, Ellsworth, and Stanley before turning to the University, where, under Frederic Jackson Turner and Carl Russel Fish, his first love for history was kindled. This field of study had a strong hold on him throughout his whole life, even though most of his energies have been spent in administration. In 1909 Mr. Ames joined the social science staff at River Falls Normal, but soon left it for a position with the University Extension at Eau Claire. However, in 1914 he was recalled to River Falls where he became superintendent of the Training School, a position he held until appointed president in 1917.

In these twenty-nine years of service, President Ames has directed the institution through nothing short of a revolution. He regards the metamorphosis from a normal school to a college, and the recognition of the new stature of the institution by the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities, as the principal historical fact of the last twenty-nine years. Plant expansion has followed, not led, the growth of the school over the years. In this period has been added a new wing to North Hall, a new Manual Arts Building, the college farm, Ramer Field, and the infirmary; now in process of construction is an apartment building for veterans.

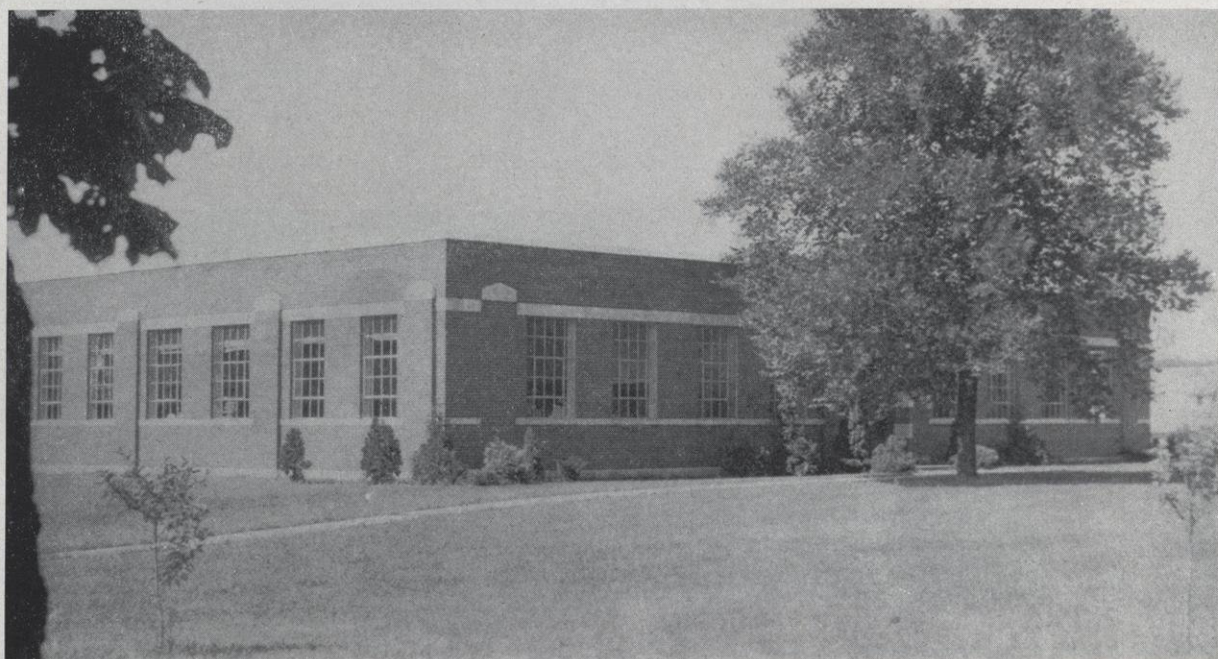
The transition from normal school to college is better shown in the training of the faculty. In 1917 one-third of the teaching staff did not have the bachelor's degree, over one-third had the baccalaureate, and less than one-third had the master's hood. To-day nearly all of the staff have the master's degree and most of them have graduate training above that. The curriculum of twenty-nine years ago had in it 194 courses below college grade offered to students who were not high school graduates. When, in 1927, the four-year course of study leading to the bachelor's degree was established, an important break was made with the past; and since then standards of admission and quality of teaching have steadily risen.

It is no accident that President Ames had the complete confidence of the governing board in those years when the college was being built. His long experience in teaching and administration, his great interest in one field of learning in particular and of learning in general, his creative drive that has caused him to become the coauthor of four American history texts and one volume on education in Wisconsin, these factors explain much about how the solid basis upon which he has slowly built here has been recognized by the governing regents. Faculty and students who have lived and worked with him will always remember that his counsel was good and his attitudes not subject to whim or fancy. The college, let it here be recorded, is in a large sense the result not only of historic forces that affected all institutions of higher learning in this period but also the result of wise stewardship for over a quarter of a century.

The administration of J. H. Ames is now committed to history. It should be a comfort to him in his remaining years to know that future administrations are not likely to tear down that which he built, but more probably will build on from where he left off.

The 1946 MELETEAN
To the Memory of Jennie Wiesenthal
A Tribute

In this, its thirty-fifth volume, the MELETEAN pays tribute to the memory of Jennie Wiesenthal, the editor-in-chief of the 1912 MELETEAN, the first issue of the annual. Miss Wiesenthal passed away last February at her home in St. Paul. She graduated from the River Falls Normal School in 1912 and, after a year in the high school at Alma, Wisconsin, accepted a position in the grades of the St. Paul public schools. Later she completed a course at the University of Minnesota and taught successively in Central and Murray high schools in St. Paul. She organized the business department in the latter and was carrying on that work at the time of her death.

She compiled the material for the penmanship manual of the St. Paul schools and had charge of the high school paper at the Murray school. During her entire teaching career she was always one of the instructors selected to have practice teachers, seniors from the University of Minnesota and other Twin Cities colleges, working under her supervision—"a splendid reflection on her early training received at River Falls," her sister says.

Miss Wiesenthal was also active in club, church and charitable organizations. She was interested in art and completed many interesting pieces of work. Among her personal effects was found a sum of money, twenty-five dollars, the proceeds of a reunion banquet of River Falls graduates held in Minneapolis some years ago and marked to be kept for some worthy cause. Her sisters have given that money to the MEMORIAL MELETEAN, and the editors gratefully acknowledge that gift.

Associated with Miss Wiesenthal on the staff of that first MELETEAN were Robert Moser as business manager and Homer Elertson as one of the art editors. Homer Elertson became one of the most distinguished artists in the United States, with his work widely exhibited. Professor J. H. Ames, now President Ames, was the faculty adviser. A sister of Miss Wiesenthal, Gertrude, now Mrs. John P. Gunderson, was also on the staff. Harvey Fletcher, who later gave his life in the service as a reconnaissance officer in France in World War I, was an athletic editor and gave the annual its name. A weekly paper, the Badger, had formerly been published by the school, and the year book was in a way an outgrowth of this. However, the staff did not wish to keep the name, since it was that of the annual published at the University of Wisconsin, so the Latin word for badger, and the scientific name of the European badger — *meles* — was chosen, and from it was formed —

The problems presented in the question, "Resolved: That the Foreign Policy of the United States Should Be Directed Toward the Establishment of Free Trade Among the Nations of the World," challenged the debate students throughout the season. Norris and Charles were rated third in reference to the fifty teams debating in the contest.

The local cast of the national honorary dramatic fraternity has not been very active, principally due to small membership during the war. Prospects look better for next year as eight new members were initiated in April.

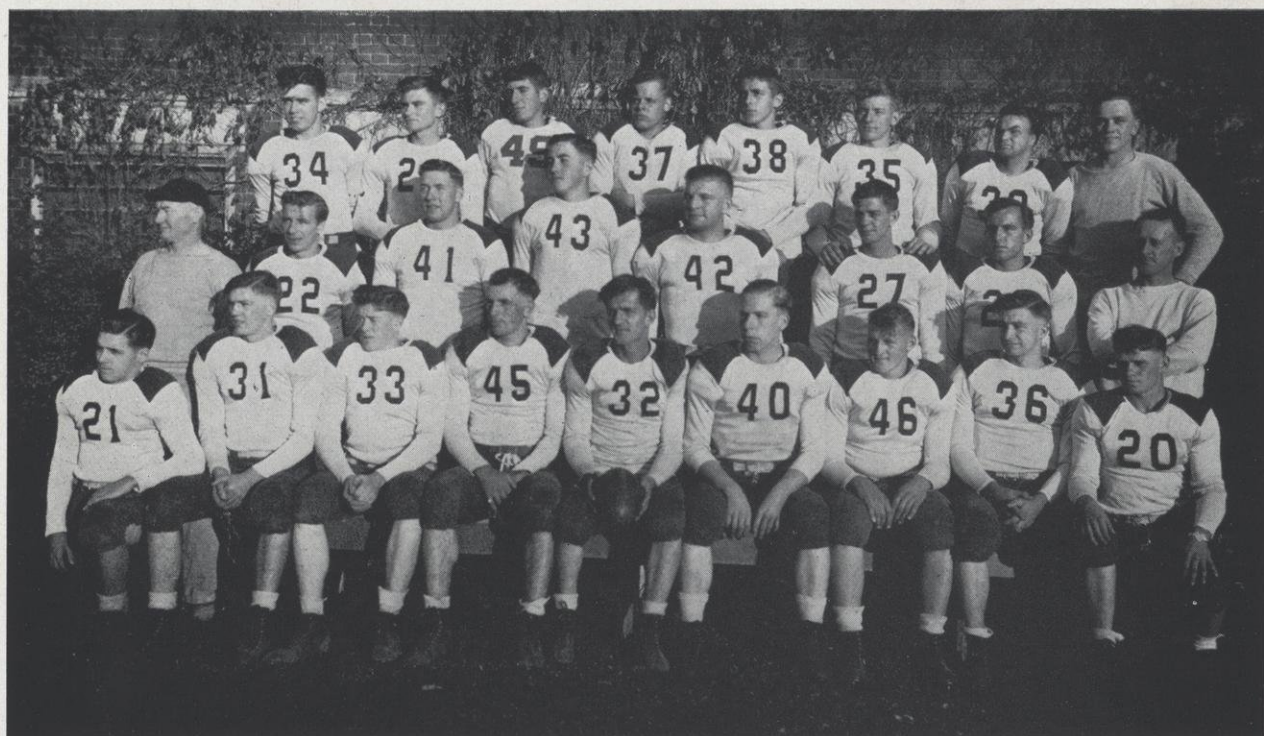

Despite the critical manpower shortage last fall, River Falls was represented on the 1945 gridiron. Under their new coach, George K. Schlaugenhauf, the boys played remarkable ball, considering that several had not even high school experience. Mr. Schlaugenhauf comes to us from St. Croix Falls where he was coach for eighteen years, excepting for one year at Madison East High. He is a graduate of Lawrence College, where he participated in athletics.

The first game of the season found River Falls nosing out a powerful Eau Claire eleven by a 6-0 score. Gordon Schock paced the Falcons. The following week-end the Falcons found themselves on the short end of a 19-6 score at Hamline University of St. Paul.

Over at Menomonie the Falcons won their second game of the season by beating Stout Institute, 14-6. The game was more decisive for the Falcons than the score indicates, as Stout was totally outplayed. Walter Wirz did a beautiful job of ball carrying for the Falcons.

The homecoming game found Superior nosing out River Falls, 14-6, in an evenly matched game. Superior had a rugged, well-balanced team, while River Falls had the speed. The Falcons lost a heartbreaker at Eau Claire the following week, by the close score of 7-6. The Bears' score came on a quick play through the line good for 75 yards and a touchdown. The Falcons, lead by Wirz and Schock, put on a sustained drive in the final minutes but were on the Bears' 30-yard line when the game ended. The final game of the season was played at Luther College of Decorah, Iowa. Luther outplayed the Falcons during the first half and led, 6-0, but River Falls roared back to score 13 points in the second half to win, 13-6. This was their best played game. offensively and defensively, of the entire season.

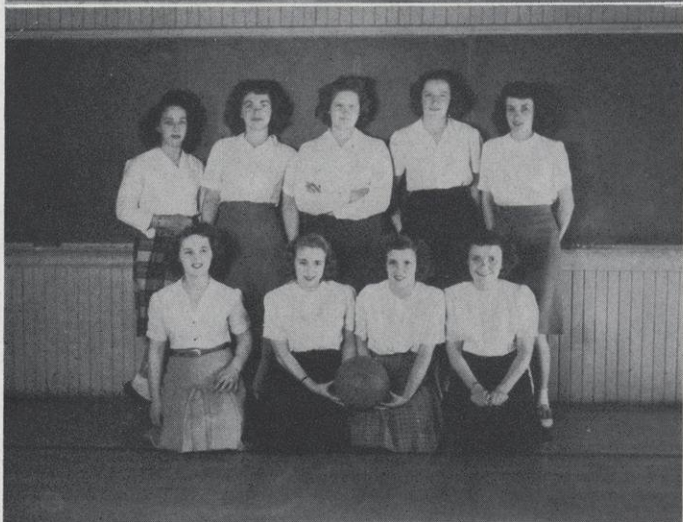

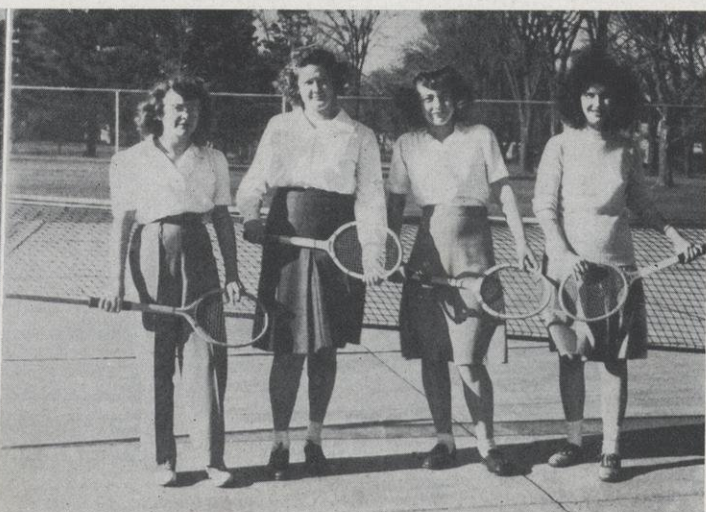

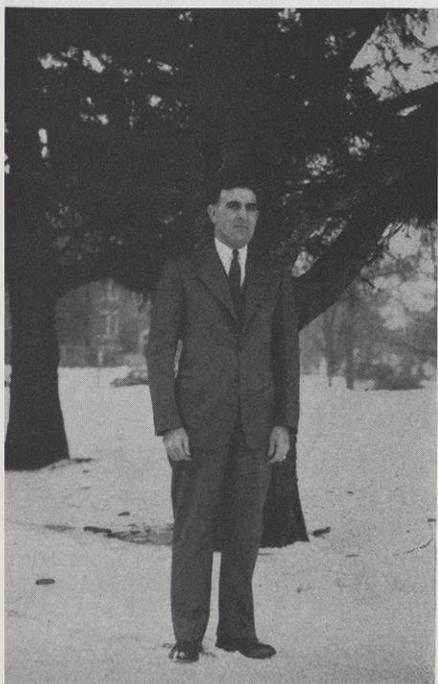
