The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on June 18 and the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on July 29, 1927, were approved, ratified and confirmed.

The budget for the Law School for the year 1927-28, as amended by the finance committee, was discussed, and it was VOTED, That the increases recommended for Messrs. Rice, Page and Brown be not approved. (This leaves the salaries in the Law School for instruction the same as for 1926-27).

Memorial Union Fee

16. That a Memorial Union fee be approved, such fee to be collected by the Bursar at the time of collecting the incidental fee, to be used for the operation and maintenance of university buildings devoted to men's and women's all-university social activities, -- chiefly the Memorial Union, -- and to be collected in sums as follows:

- \$5.00 per semester for each student registering in the regular session, beginning with the first semester of 1928-29.
- \$1.50 for each student registering in the Summer Session, beginning with the session of 1928.
- \$1.00 for each student registering in the Agricultural Short Course or Dairy Course, beginning in 1928-29.

FURTHER, That a portion of the regular session fee collected from women (such portion being estimated at \$2.50) be made available for the operation and maintenance of women's all-university social rooms and activities outside the Memorial Union Building, chiefly Lathrop Hall.

FURTHER, That the student who pays, or has paid, an aggregate of \$50 in fees or in payments on a subscription, or both together, be entitled to the regular life membership, and that the holders of such life membership be entitled to the privileges of the building without the payment of further fees.

AND FURTHER, That the detailed plan for the collection and administration of the fee be referred to the Business Manager to be developed by him in conjunction with the University Committee on the Union and submitted to the Regents for approval.
