POSTPONED MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, August 27, 1927, 10 A. M.

President Grady presiding.

PRESENT: President Frank; Regents Callahan, Cashman, Faast, Gale, Grady, Hirschman, Nace, Nelson, Olbrich, Richardson, Runge, Schmidtmann, Waters, Wild

ABSENT: Regents Bachman, Gundersen.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on June 18 and the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on July 29, 1927, were approved, ratified and confirmed.

The budget for the Law School for the year 1927-28, as amended by the finance committee, was discussed, and it was VOTED, That the increases recommended for Messrs. Rice, Page and Brown be not approved. (This leaves the salaries in the Law School for instruction the same as for 1926-27).

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BUSINESS MANAGER

1. That the contract with the West Kentucky Coal Company, Paducah, Kentucky, for 15,000 tons 7/16 x 14 nut (base price \$1.60, freight \$3.00, total \$4.60), 10,000 tons 2" screenings (base price \$1.15, freight \$3.00, total \$4.15), and 100 tons $1\frac{1}{4}$ x 2 stove (base price \$1.65, freight \$3.42(Verona), total \$5.07), for the year 1927-28, be approved, and that the Business Manager be authorized to sign the contract. Adopted.

2. $^{\vee}$ That upon the recommendation of Mr. Halbert, State Chief Engineer, Van Ryn and DeGelleke, Milwaukee, be appointed architects for the Extension Building in Milwaukee, and that the Business Manager be authorized to sign the agreement. Adopted.

4. That the action of July 29, 1927, relative to the extension of the lease with the West Side Realty Company of Milwaukee be modified to read as follows:

> That upon the recommendation of Dean Snell, the lease of the West Side Realty Company's property located at 137 Second Street, Milwaukee, occupied by the University Extension Division, be extended to June 30, 1929, with no change in rental, and with the understanding that the lease may be cancelled on or after June 30, 1928, by giving six months' written notice in advance of such cancellation, and that the Business Manager be authorized to sign the lease. 5. That authority be granted to construct a <u>high pressure</u> <u>steam line</u> to the <u>Memorial Union Building</u>, subject to the approval of the governor. Appropriation \$18,000. Adopted.

6. That authority be granted to have <u>plans</u> and specifications prepared for two additional boilers and equipment at the <u>Central</u> Heating Station, subject to the approval of the governor. Appropriation \$88,500. Adopted.

7. That authority be granted to have plans and specifications prepared for the rebuilding of the tank house, subject to the approval of the governor. Appropriation \$60,000. Adopted.

8. That upon the recommendation of Director Goodnight, Mr. Kenneth Scott, a member of the department of classics, be permitted to elect cash for teaching in the summer session of 1925 in the amount of \$300. Adopted.

9. That upon the recommendation of Director Goodnight, Professor M. V. O'Shea be permitted to elect cash for teaching in the summer session of 1927 in the amount of \$675. Adopted. 10. That the following rebates be granted:

That the form of lease (Exhibit Two), The <u>Regents of</u> the University of Wisconsin to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation, for 50 years, of Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, Block 2, City of Madison, be approved; that the President and Secretary of the Board of Regents be authorized to sign the lease. Adopted.

13. That the form of lease (Exhibit Three), The Wisconsin University Building Corporation to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin of the buildings to be known as the Memorial Union Building and Tripp Commons and constructed on Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, Block 2, City of Madison, be approved; that the President and Secretary of the Board of Regents be authorized to sign the lease. Adopted.

14. That the plan of the Wisconsin University Building Corporation to borrow \$400,000 on first mortgage at 41% interest, pay- See lac able annually, from the Commissioners of Public Lands of the State Actin of Wisconsin, to provide for decoration, furniture, fixtures and equipment of the Memorial Union Building and Tripp Commons, be approved, the amount of the loan to be amortized through a fifteen x +t6/: year period.

That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to contract for decoration, furniture, fixtures, and equipment for the Memorial Union Building and Tripp Commons in an amount not to exceed \$400,000 and in accordance with the revised schedule of such equipments as estimated by the State Architect and totalling \$399,033. 16. That a Memorial Union fee be approved, such fee to be collected by the Bursar at the time of collecting the incidental fee, to be used for the operation and maintenance of university buildings devoted to men's and women's all-university social activities, -- chiefly the Memorial Union, -- and to be collected in sums as follows:

- \$5.00 per semester for each student registering in the regular session, beginning with the first semester of 1928-29.
- \$1.50 for each student registering in the Summer Session, beginning with the session of 1928.
- \$1.00 for each student registering in the Agricultural Short Course or Dairy Course, beginning in 1928-29.

FURTHER, That a portion of the regular session fee collected from women (such portion being estimated at \$2.50) be made available for the operation and maintenance of women's alluniversity social rooms and activities outside the Memorial Union Building, chiefly Lathrop Hall,

FURTHER, That the student who pays, or has paid, an aggregate of \$50 in fees or in payments on a subscription, or both together, be entitled to the regular life membership, and that the holders of such life membership be entitled to the privileges of the building without the payment of further fees.

Detailed for AND FURTHER, That the detailed plan for the collection and administration of the fee be referred to the Business Manager to be developed by him in conjunction with the University Committee on the Union and submitted to the Regents for approval. That candidates for the bachelor's degree who enter with advanced standing must obtain in residence in this college a minimum of 30 credits and 30 grade points, 15 of which must be in the advanced part of the major field. If the credits are not secured in semester residence, but in summer session residence, the student must attend at least six summer sessions and secure thereat at least 30 credits and 30 grade points; the minimum elected in any such session shall be four credits. All other types of residence credit whatsoever are "hereby wiped out.

Regent Schmidtmann presented the matter of a possible relocation of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul tracks in the west end of the city, and also the matter of providing space for the Library School at the University.

Both matters were referred to a committee of three, Regents Olbrich, Schmidtmann and Gale, for further study and report.


