Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on September 10, 1955, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Steiger, recommendation No. 1 listed under Degrees was adopted.

President Fred presented the following recommendation for the acceptance of the special gift to the University of the Thomas E. Brittingham home and five acres of land, located in the Highlands, west of Madison:

That The Regents of The University of Wisconsin accept the gift by Thomas E. Brittingham, Jr., Wilmington, Delaware, of the westerly five acres of his property, known as "Dunmuven", including the house and garage, located in the  $SE^{\frac{1}{4}}$  of the  $SE^{\frac{1}{4}}$ , Section 13, Township 7 North, Range 8 East, Township of Middleton, Dane County, Wisconsin; and that the President of the University convey to Mr. Brittingham the sincere appreciation of The Regents for this generous gift.

President Fred showed the location on a map of the five acres of land and the location of the house and the garage. He stated that this is a very generous and special gift which Mr. Brittingham has given to the University. Regent Werner added that it is not only a generous and very special gift but has added significance because it is a gift from a very great benefactor of this University.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Laird, the above recommendation was adopted unanimously.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in <u>EXHIBIT A</u>, attached, be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Actions by the President, since the September 10, 1955, meeting of the Board of Regents, covering resignations and terminations, appointments, leaves of absence, changes in status or salary of personnel, resignations to accept other U.W. appointments, and resignations of summer session appointments (EXHIBIT B attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

At the request of President Fred, Vice Fresident Little reported on enrollment. Vice President Little distributed copies of a tabulation of University enrollment on the Madison campus for the first semester of 1955-56, including a comparison of enrollments with two previous first semesters, and a tabulation of enrollment at the Extension Centers for 1955 and 1954 (copies attached). He also discussed briefly the changes in enrollment, both as between colleges of the University and between courses.

Vice President Peterson presented the report and recommendation of the Vice President of Business and Finance.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the Reports of Actions Taken numbered I, II and III, listed under the Report and Recommendation of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That Item No. IV., 1., Miscellaneous, listed under the Report and Recommendation of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be ratified and confirmed.

Vice President Peterson reported that the Federal Government has denied the application by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin for transfer of title to the Regents of approximately 1435 acres of land of the Camp McCoy Military Reservation for use as school forests. (See IV. Miscellaneous, 2, EXHIBIT C attached.) He reported that the application was denied because the federal regulations would not permit the University to reconvey the land to the school districts. The government will consider applications for the direct conveyance of the land to the school districts.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That recommendation No. V., 1., listed under the Report and Recommendation of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved.

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of budget transfers for September, 1955, for the information of the Regents. (See Exhibit D appended to EXHIBIT C attached)

Vice President Peterson distributed copies of a report on the University of Wisconsin Parking Fee Revolving Account, dated September 30, 1955, and explained the report which included a summary of the parking fee revolving account and a report of the results of the first athletic event parking for which a special event parking fee was charged.

It was pointed out that the Educational Committee of the Regents, on the day previous, had discussed problems relating to the parking situation on the University campus, but had not presented any recommendations. Regent Renk stated that it was almost impossible to find parking space on the campus and suggested that specific steps be taken to find a solution to the problem. Regent Renk moved the adoption of the following motion:

(Cont.)

That the University administration prepare a study of the parking problems at the University in order that the Regents may submit some concrete recommendations to the 1957 Wisconsin Legislature, including the possibility of legislative appropriations for the purchase of land for the development of parking facilities.

The motion was seconded by Regent Steiger.

Vice President Peterson indicated that consideration should also be given to the problems of a modified lakefill which would require legislative action. He also stated that a meeting was being held the following week with the City Traffic Engineer to consider ways in which the city could work with the University in improving the parking situation.

Regent Watson raised the question of whether the providing of additional parking facilities would be filling a necessary need, or whether it would be filling a convenience need for parking. He stated that the Regents should be careful about asking for a legislative appropriation to provide parking for the convenience of people at the expense of appropriations for needed educational facilities.

Regent Steiger pointed out that the Regents should be realistic about this problem, and stated that he felt that additional parking facilities were necessary, including parking facilities for students. Regent Watson stated that to be realistic the approach to this problem should include expanding the campus south of University Avenue, because every time a new building is built on the campus the problem is further complicated. Regent Gelatt stated that, in designing new University buildings, space should be provided for parking for faculty that would be using the new buildings.

Regent Rennebohm commented on the fact that it had not been possible to sell the faculty on the proposal for providing adequate parking by filling in a portion of Lake Mendota, as was authorized by legislation passed by the 1953 Legislature and which was subsequently repealed. Regent Rennebohm indicated that it would be necessary to convert previous opponents to the previous lakefill proposal before attempting to obtain legislative authority for a modified lakefill for parking purposes.

Regent Watson stated that the University is forced into this problem because of the present geography of the campus and that the Regents should face up to the long-range problem which is not limited to space for parking.

Regent Renk and Regent Steiger agreed to amending the above motion to include a study of traffic problems and of the need for expansion of the University campus.

The question was put on the motion to read as follows and it was voted unanimously:

That the University administration prepare a study of the parking problems at the University in order that the Regents may submit some concrete recommendations to the 1957 Wisconsin Legislature, including the possibility of legislative appropriations for the

purchase of land for the development of parking facilities; and that such study include a study of the traffic problems and a study of the need for expansion of the University campus to provide space for both parking facilities and future buildings.

The Secretary reported that two communications had been received commending, and expressing appreciation to, the University and the School for Workers for the Machinists Institute held during the past summer - one from the Midwest State Conference of Machinists and one from United Lodge No. 66 of the International Association of Machinists (copies on file).

Regent Laird presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

- 1. That Eloise Gerry, Lecturer in Forest Products, be granted emeritus status, effective September 1, 1955.
- 2. That Louis W. Bridgman, retired editor in the Extension Division, be employed on a special service contract to assist with the instructional load in Mechanical Engineering 99 (Technical Writing), on a part-time basis (1/4 to 1/3 time), for the first semester of 1955-56; salary \$600 for the semester; to be charged to salaries 1A-1B, instruction, Mechanical Engineering.
- 3. That Hans F. Kirchberger, Emeritus Lecturer in Political Science, Extension Division, be employed on special service contract to teach a part-time schedule of classes at Manitowoc and Sheboygan for the academic year 1955-56; salary \$2,700 for the year; \$1,350 to be charged to 1A-1B, Manitowoc-8-Instr.-Staff, and \$1,350 to 1A-1B-Sheboygan-16-Instr.-Staff.
- 4. That Burr A. Beach, Emeritus Professor, Veterinary Science, be employed on special service contract to teach a short course on disease prevention, during the first five-week period of the Farm Short Course, November 14 to December 17, 1955, salary \$500 for the period; charge to item for Morse 20-2 (500).
- 5. That Albert J. Cramer, Assistant Professor of Dairy Husbandry, be retired, effective October 31, 1955; and that he be granted the title Emeritus Assistant Professor, Dairy Husbandry, beginning November 1, 1955.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the present plan (Faculty Document No. 880, January 3, 1949, approved by the Regents February 12, 1949) requiring fraternities to have either a housemother or a resident counselor selected in accordance with the standards and procedures of the Office of the Dean of Men, be continued until such time as changes are deemed warranted, in the light of future experience.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the amendments to the Student Court Constitution, as set forth in Faculty Document 1159 (copy attached), be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, the State Historical Society be authorized to erect an historical marker on the Lower Campus at a location approximately two feet from the balustrade south of the east steps of the Historical Society building.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, approval be given for the preparation of preliminary plans for enlarging the Union Cafeteria area, in substantial agreement with the November, 1954 studies, with the understanding that the architect is to be asked to present sketches of the various exterior treatments of the addition; that authority be granted to employ architectural services chargeable to funds provided by the Memorial Union Building Association; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract for architectural services.

Regent Laird moved, and Regent Watson seconded, the motion for the adoption of the following recommendation of the Educational Committee:

"That, upon the recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, approval be given to the location of the Home Economics Pre-School Laboratory, northwest of the Home Management House and northeast of Agricultural Hall, as shown on the plans dated September 1955, at an estimated cost of \$125,000, chargeable to the allotment of \$356,000 for the Home Economics Department improvements."

(Cont.)

Regent Werner reported that he had looked at the proposed site for the Pre-School Laboratory with President Gelatt and Regent Renk on the previous evening, and stated that they were disappointed in the site because it would result in crowding of the buildings. Vice President Baldwin showed a map of the location, and sketches and floor plans, of the proposed Pre-School Laboratory. In answer to a question, he stated that after allotting \$125,000 for this project the balance remaining of the original allotment of \$356,000 for Home Economics improvements would be adequate for remodelling the Home Economics Building. The Regents suggested that they defer consideration until they have had an opportunity to inspect the site. Regent Watson withdrew his second to the motion, and Regent Laird moved that the recommendation be deferred. The motion to defer was seconded by Regent Steiger and voted unanimously.

Regent Steiger presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the University Administration submit a recommendation to the Executive Committee for the construction of the Married Student Apartments on the University Cabins site, on the basis of the proposals received on September 26, 1955; and that the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in approving the award of contracts and schedule of costs for this project, subject to the necessary approval of the Governor and the State Chief Engineer. (Costs of this project to be charged to University Trust Funds per Regent Action of June 16, 1955, Minutes, Page 6.)

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That subject to the approval of the Governor, the University Cabin Camp property in the 2900 block of University Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin, be purchased from the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for a site for Married Student Apartments, for a consideration of approximately \$40,000. (Chargeable to University Trust Funds per Regent Action of June 16, 1955, Minutes, Page 6.)

Regent Steiger moved, and Regent Rennebohm seconded, the motion for the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee:

"That the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands be authorized to act for the Board in taking any actions necessary to effect changes deemed appropriate by the Committee in the names of streets in the Plat of University Hill Farms Subdivision."

(Cont.)

Regent Rennebohm reported that the names of the streets in the Plat of University Hill Farms, which had been approved by the Regents, were the names of deceased, outstanding members of the faculty of the College of Agriculture. He reported that Dean Froker has since requested reconsideration of the street names with the suggestion that they be named after counties of the state. He indicated that the above recommendation would authorize the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands to take the necessary steps to accomplish such changes in the street names as the Committee deems desirable and feasible.

The question was put on the above motion and it was voted.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to approve a contract for grading approximately 14,500 lineal feet of street serving 200 lots in the University Hill Farms Subdivision.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That Carl L. Gardner, Chicago, Illinois, be employed as consultant to replan the shopping center area and the section to be reserved for a State Office Building in the University Hill Farms Subdivision, at a cost not to exceed \$500.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That Requests to the State Building Commission for Permanent Improvement Funds be approved in accordance with the "Summary of Requests to the State Building Commission for Permanent Improvement Funds - 1955-56", dated September 30, 1955, copy attached.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That, subject to the allotment of the necessary funds by the State Building Commission, and subject to the approval of the Governor, the property located at 307 North Orchard Street, Madison, Wisconsin, described as Lot 7, Block 5, Brooks Replat of part of Block 5, Brooks Addition to the City of Madison, be purchased from Miss Ellen Gilder for a consideration of \$13,400.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the action of the Regents on January 8, 1955, relating to payment of infirmary fees by students registered on a per-credit basis, be amended to exclude enrollments in courses conducted by the Extension Division and enrollments in courses conducted outside of Madison; that this amendment be made effective July 1, 1955; and that infirmary fees paid for the first semester of 1955-56 by students enrolled in the above mentioned exclusions be refunded.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the President of the University be authorized to approve increases in budgets for instruction within the limits of additional funds received from increased enrollments above budget estimates, in order to provide the necessary staff and supplies for the instruction of the additional students enrolled this school year; and that the State Director of Budget and Accounts be requested to authorize the use of the additional funds as provided by statute.

Regent Rennebohm, reporting on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands, stated that they had expected to place the lots in the University Hill Farms Subdivision on sale the previous week, but that they were about two weeks behind schedule because of delays encountered in the survey for the streets. He reported briefly on a number of the problems encountered by this Committee, including a request from the City of Madison for space for a fire station. He reported that the Committee is considering granting discounts to builders on lots purchased in a group, and stated that the Committee has decided that it was not necessary to take such detailed matters to the full Board for approval.

Regent Werner as Chairman of the Special Regent Committee on Problems of Public Higher Education in Wisconsin stated that that Committee had been appointed to confer with the Governor on problems of higher education as a result of legislation on integration in the 1955 Legislature; and he stated that the function of this Committee could properly be handled by the Joint Regents' Special Committee on Coordination. He suggested that the Special Regent Committee on Problems of Public Higher Education in Wisconsin could properly be discharged. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was

VOTED, That the Special Regent Committee on Problems of Public Higher Education in Wisconsin be discharged.

Regent Laird, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Selection of Dean of Women, reported that the Committee had held one meeting but did not have a report to make to the Board at this time.

President Gelatt, on behalf of the University Regents on the Joint Regents' Special Committee on Co-ordination, reported that that Committee had approved revisions in the recommended plan for co-ordination of higher education, which had been approved at the joint meeting of University and State College Regents in Milwaukee on August 30, 1955. He stated that these revisions had been sent to each Regent. Regent Renk moved, and Regent Watson seconded, the adoption of the following motion:

That the revised Recommended Plan For Co-ordination of Higher Education (copy attached) be approved.

Regent Rennebohm inquired whether, for the record, the Regents should indicate what they really think about this proposal, which might be quite different from what is indicated by their vote. For historical purposes, he asked whether it would be desirable to record what the actual thinking was and what the real reasons were for approving this plan for coordination. He stated that, if in the future the opportunity should occur to do so, both boards of regents would vote for the present system of management for the institutions of higher education.

Regent Gelatt agreed that it was desirable, at all times, to make one's position clear.

Regent Watson stated that he was happy to second the recommendation for approval of the revised plan of coordination of higher education.

Regent Werner stated that the proposal now before the Board did not vary considerably from the proposal that was presented at the joint meeting of the Boards in Milwaukee, the changes being mainly for the purpose of clarifying certain provisions, such as the tenure of the faculty at Milwaukee State College and the administration of the merged institutions in Milwaukee. He indicated that he still had the same feeling of opposition to the proposal that he had before. He pointed out that, when the Regents voted on the proposal in Milwaukee, the faculty had not approved it and he felt compelled to vote against it. Because the faculty has now indicated its approval, he stated that he would go along with the Regents in voting for it. However, he stated that he agreed with Regent Rennebohm regarding the desire of the two boards to maintain the present system.

Regent Steiger stated that it was his belief that this proposal is not in the best interest of the University; but that, since it is a compromise, he would go along with it,

Regent Renk stated that this plan is going to do a good job for higher education in Wisconsin. He was pleased to meet with members of the faculty regarding it, and indicated that they thought it would give the University the protection it needs. He said there would still be separate boards, and, in addition, a

coordinating committee on which the University Regents would have five representatives. It was his belief that, if five Regents could not be found who could do a good job on the committee, they could not do a good job before the legislative committees under the present system. He said that the great number of students going on to school in the future makes it necessary to plan for the best use of the tax-payers' money. He indicated that he was happy toapprove and vote for the plan.

Regent Steiger, to further clarify his position, said that, in the best interests of higher education, he did approve compiling a coordinated budget and filing one budget with the Legislature for all the boards; and that, in this respect, it is a step forward.

Regent Watson asked whether the Regents were making the record clear. He said he trusted his record was clear in seconding the motion. He said that, in the best interests of the State of Wisconsin solving its problems of providing education for the young people of the state, there will have to be at least this much coordination, and that, in the future there will have to be more, if we are to provide the maximum educational opportunities with the funds that will be available.

Regent Gelatt said that this proposal, and the revision of it, is something in which almost everyone could see something they would like changed. He said that, as it has had more and more study, it has this advantage - no one has any illusions about it, and we are all going ahead more or less with some reservations and with our eyes wide open. He believed more good would come of it under these circumstances than if it had met with cheers and shouting.

Regent Laird said that this is at least an approach to the solution of a complicated problem, and that she was glad that there is provision for coordination and cooperation.

The question was put on the above motion and it was voted. Regent Watson requested a roll call. A called vote was taken, with all Regents present voting "Aye" - Regents Gelatt, Laird, Renk, Rennebohm, Steiger, Watson, Werner. There were no "Noes". The motion was declared carried.

Regent Rennebohm presented the following memorial resolution in memory of the late George Ives Haight:

#### IN MEMORIAM

#### GEORGE IVES HAIGHT

#### 1878-1955

WHEREAS death has taken the University of Wisconsin's "Number One Alumnus," George Ives Haight, who demonstrated, perhaps more than any other graduate in the University's history, his gratitude for the gifts which a Wisconsin education had bestowed upon him;

WHEREAS this son of Wisconsin exemplified the best products of this University by devoting his learning to the welfare of others;

WHEREAS he gave generously of his time and unsurpassed legal talent in creative projects which helped lift this University to its present high standing, as president of his class and of the Wisconsin Alumni Association, as key member of the Memorial Union Building Committee, organizer of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and president of its Board of Trustees, Chairman of the Board of the University of Wisconsin Foundation, and in many other ways;

WHEREAS his driving enthusiasm, personal humility, creative mind, warm personality, eloquent voice, and great generosity benefitted this University in ways which will remain his monumemt in this institution forever;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Regents of the University of Wisconsin hereby record in their official proceedings, their intense gratitude for all that George Ives Haight has done for his alma mater, and their deep sorrow at his death; and transmit this resolution to his bereaved family.

Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Werner, the above resolution in memory of the late George Ives Haight was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:45 A.M.

## DOCUMENT 115# - December 6, 1954

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO STUDENT COURT CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE 3, Section 1

The Court shall consist of a panel of <u>nine</u> judges, <u>five</u> of whom shall be law students.

#### ARTICLE 3, Section 2

Judges shall be selected as vacancies occur by a vote of the Student Board from a list containing at least sixteen law students and at least twelve non-law students. This list shall be made up each fall by the Student Life and Interests Committee from persons nominated by department heads and shall become void at the beginning of the subsequent fall semester. During its existence, this list may be added to in the same manner whenever there are not at least four persons on the list eligible and available for each vacancy that occurs. One of the judges shall be selected as Chief Justice and one judge shall be selected as Assistant Chief Justice by a vote of the Student Board whenever such office becomes vacant.

#### ARTICLE 3, Section 3

Judges, Assistant Chief Justice, and Chief Justice shall serve throughout their enrollment at the University with the following exceptions:

#### ARTICLE 5, Section 1

For the trial of cases, the Court shall consist of three of the <u>nine</u> judges. With the advice of the Court Advisor, the Chief Justice shall determine which three of the <u>nine</u> judges shall sit at each session of the Court. Two of the three sitting judges shall be law students.

#### ARTICLE 7, Section 2, Sub-section a

Preside at all meetings of the Student Court, xcept that whenever the Chief Justice shall feel in regard to a particular controversy that some personal interest makes it unwise for him to preside, or whenever he is prevented from doing so by illness or other like exigency, the Assistant Chief Justice shall then preside. If neither Chief Justice nor Assistant Chief Justice is able to preside then the Chief Justice may, after consultation with the Court Advisor and the selection by them of a temporary Chief Justice, be excused along with Assistant Chief Justice from presiding over the trial of the particular controversy.

#### ARTICLE 7, Section 2, Sub-section b

Perform all functions assigned to him in these by-laws or in rules regularly prescribed by the Student Court, and in his absence the Assistant Chief Justice shall perform such functions.

#### ARTICLE 8, Section 2

Balances of over \$500.00 existing in the Court Fund at the end of each fiscal year shall be credited to a Student Board Scholarship Fund which shall be administered jointly by the University and the Student Board.

#### RECOMMENDED PLAN FOR CO-ORDINATION OF HIGHER EDUCATION

To create 39.024 of the statutes, relating to the establishment of a co-ordinating agency for institutions of higher education.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

39.024 of the statutes is created to read:

- 39.024 CO-ORDINATING COMMITTEE. (1) PURPOSE. The purpose of this section is to provide for the co-ordination of the activities of the university of Wisconsin and the state colleges and institutes by providing a permanent joint committee to make a continuing study of the state-supported institutions of higher education under their jurisdiction, the relation thereto of the needs of the people of Wisconsin, to recommend necessary changes in programs and facilities, to provide for a single, consolidated, biennial budget request for all of such institutions, and to report the results of its studies and recommendations to the governor and the legislature.
- (2) COMMITTEE. (a) Composition. To carry out the purposes of this section, there is created a co-ordinating committee of 15 members, h from the regents of the university of Wisconsin, 4 from the board of regents of state colleges, 4 citizens, the president of the board of regents of the university of Wisconsin. the president of the board of regents of state colleges, and the state superintendent of public instruction. The appointive regent members of the committee shall be selected by a majority vote of the board of which they are members and shall be selected each year at the annual meeting of the board. The first selection shall be made by the respective boards within 90 days after the passage and publication of this section, and notice of such appointment to the committee shall be given forthwith to the state superintendent of public instruction, who shall call the first meeting of the committee within 30 days of certification of appointment of the appointive members. The citizen members shall be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate. The governor shall first appoint one each for 2, 4, 6 and 8 years, within 90 days of the effective date of this act and thereafter for eight years.
- (b) Chairman. The chairman of the committee for the first year of its existence shall be the president of the board of regents of the university of Wisconsin. The chairman for the second year of its existence shall be the president of the board of regents of state colleges. Thereafter the chairmanship of the committee shall be alternated annually in the same order.

- (c) <u>Secretary</u>; <u>meetings of committee</u>. The committee shall select a secretary from its membership. The committee shall hold regular meetings at least once every 3 months at such time and place as may be determined by the chairman. Special meetings may be called at the request of a majority of the committee or on the chairman's own initiative upon 5 days' notice. Members of the committee shall be compensated for their services on the committee in the manner as provided for their services under chs. 36 and 37.
- (3) <u>POWERS</u>. Without limiting because of enumeration the committee is authorized and directed to make studies and recommendations in the following fields:
- (a) Educational planning. The committee shall determine what over-all educational programs shall be offered in the several units of the university and the state colleges to avoid unnecessary duplication and to utilize to the best advantage the facilities and personnel available for instruction in fields of higher education. No educational program for which the legislature shall have made an appropriation existing at any institution of higher education shall be abandoned except with legislative approval.
- (b) <u>Physical plant</u>. The committee shall adopt a co-ordinated plan for the integration and most efficient use of existing facilities and personnel, and an order of priority for the construction of new facilities at all institutions under its jurisdiction.
- (c) <u>Budget requests</u>. The committee shall review the separate budget requests of the university and the state colleges and shall recommend a single, consolidated, biennial budget request to the governor for the support of all institutions under its jurisdiction, retaining the identity of the appropriation sections contained in ch. 20 relating to said institutions.
- (d) <u>Grants to institutions</u>. The committee shall establish a plan which will encourage and promote grants by private individuals and agencies to all such institutions.
- (e) <u>Legislative recommendations</u>. The committee shall continuously study the needs of the people of Wisconsin for state-supported higher education and recommend any legislative proposals needed to carry out its decisions resulting from such study.
- (f) <u>Personnel</u>. The committee is authorized to use the services of the administrative and technical staffs of the institutions of higher learning to aid in the studies and activities of this committee as authorized by s. 14.65, and the compensation for such services shall be paid by the respective board or institution regularly employing such personnel.
- (g) Report. Semiannually the committee shall issue reports of its findings and recommendations, which reports shall be delivered to the board of regents of the university of Wisconsin, the board of regents of the state colleges, the governor, to both houses of the legislature when in session, and to the secretary of the legislative council when the legislature is not in session. The first such report of findings and recommendations shall be made 6 months from the date of first convening of the committee.

- (h) Merger of Milwaukee Institutions. On or before January 1, 1957, the committee shall merge the state facilities and programs for higher education in Milwaukee into a single institution of higher learning, offering a four-year program of undergraduate instruction. Such merged institution shall be operated as an integral part of the university and shall be under the government of its board of regents. This unit of the university shall be under the supervision of a provost reporting directly to the president, with the same degree of self-government by its own faculty as is vested in other units of the university. All degrees granted upon the completion of prescribed courses shall be issued by the board of regents in the same manner and with the same status as degrees based upon work done in other units of the university. Upon the taking effect of the merger herein provided, the state college at Milwaukee and the university extension center in Milwaukee shall cease to exist as separate institutions, and the board of regents of the university shall succeed to all rights and duties, properties and obligations of these institutions. In validation of prior agreements and understanding, all teachers who are employed in the state college of Milwaukee immediately pricr to the merger shall have the same status with regard to tenure which is provided for in s. 37.31. No employe of the state college or of the university extension center in Milwaukee shall be separated from the state service or suffer any loss of salary by reason of the consolidation of these institutions. All educational programs now carried on by either of the two institutions consolidated shall be continued, enriched, and strengthened on an integrated basis, subject to such changes as the board of regents of the university may deem advisable.
- (i) <u>Duties and Functions of Existing Boards</u>. The co-ordinating committee shall have final authority in determining the single, consolidated, biennial budget requests to be presented to the governor and shall have full responsibility for such presentation. The over-all educational programs offered in the state-supported institutions of higher learning shall be those determined by the co-ordinating committee and facilities and personnel shall be utilized in accordance with the co-ordinated plan adopted by the committee. The boards of regents in the discharge of their duties shall observe all decisions of the co-ordinating committee made pursuant to this section. Except as expressly provided in this section, nothing herein shall be construed to deprive the board of regents of the university and the board of regents of the state colleges of any of the duties and powers conferred upon them by law in the government of the institutions under their control.
