ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

PRESENT: Regents Birge, Buckstaff, Butler, Eimon, Faast, Hirschman, Kohler, Kronshage, Mahoney, Miller, Nace, Seaman, Waters.

ABSENT: Regents Callahan and Horlick.

The secretary reported that word had been received from Mr. Horlick's office that he was not expected back from Europe until July 10, and therefore would not be able to attend the meeting.

The secretary reported that Mr. Callahan was in the northern part of the state delivering commencement addresses and would not be able to attend the meeting.

On motion of Regent Miller, seconded by Regent Eimon, it was VOTED, That the reading of the minutes of the last meeting of the regents be dispensed with and that they be approved as sent out to the regents.

President Birge made verbal report on his conference at New York City with the Carnegie Foundation relating to the matter of Carnegie pensions at the University of Wisconsin.

President Birge made verbal report in the matter of the arrangement between Dr. Ely and the Institute for Research in Land Economics for conducting investigations in land economics, and stated that this matter would come up for action in November.

The secretary reported that a check for \$1000 had been received from Professor Edward Kremers of the Pharmacy Department to be added to the Wisconsin Pharmaceutical Research Fund.

The secretary was instructed to notify the donors of the acceptance of this gift by the regents and to express their appreciation of the donation.

On motion of Regent Butler, seconded by Regent Eimon, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings, held on May 1 and May 27, 1922, as sent out to the regents, be ratified, approved, and confirmed.

On motion of Regent Butler, seconded by Regent Miller, it was VOTED, That the following action of the Executive Committee, taken on June 12, 1922, be approved:

The business manager presented a statement of work to be done on balances in the appropriation for maintenance for 1920-21 and budget items for the current year. (Copy on file.)

On motion of Regent Butler, seconded by Regent Eimon, the following action of the Executive Committee, taken on June 12, 1922, was approved:

The business manager reported that A. H. Schubert is about to construct a building on the lot adjoining the Badger Pharmacy.

On motion of Regent Kohler, it was

VOTED, That the Executive Committee deems it necessary to condemn the

consisting of the Badger Pharmacy and the adjoining lot and the business manager is authorized to commence condemnation proceedings, subject to the approval of the Governor.

Regent Butler as chairman of the Finance Committee presented the

He explained that the Finance Committee had spent two full days considering the budget, that several amendments had been made, and that copies of the budget as amended by the Finance Committee had been sent to each regent ten days prior to the meeting, and that the committee now recommended the budget to the board for adoption.

PENINSULAR BRANCH EXPERIMENT STATION

(Door County)

When the Finance Committee of the Regents considered the budget it was stated that the budget for the Peninsular Branch Station would be submitted when the question was finally determined as to the exact status of this fund. All of the available unexpended balance existing June 30, 1922, up to \$7500, will be used toward the purchase of the farm which is to be the station base on which the agronomic and live stock work will be carried on. The exact amount of this balance cannot be determined until June 15, but it is quite certain that \$7500 will be available as fund now stands on June 9 at \$8758.98. The \$7500 with the \$5000 from the county will purchase the farm proper. We have already purchased all of the personal property as per inventory for \$3500.

For the coming year (1922-23) there will be available the continuing appropriation of \$12,000 for the operation and maintenance of this work.

It is impossible to forecast without more experience just how we can most wisely use these funds, but the following tentative schedules are submitted for Regent consideration:

So far as practicable the work will be centered at the Station farm. Much of the work in Pathology and Entomology will necessarily be done elsewhere. Also, if the proposition of the Door County Fruit Growers Union goes through, to turn over a bearing orchard for horticultural investigations, a considerable part of this work will need to be done on this tract. No specific arrangements have yet been worked out but it is highly probable that the Growers' association will give us the use of 10 acres of apples and 10 acres of cherries for treatment and experimentation without cost to us except scientific oversight.
