





You'll want to be there!

omen's collegiate basketball attendance has risen every year over the past 20 years and Wisconsin is one of the reasons. UW has ranked among the Top 20 in attendance nationally since 1995.

The 1997–98 Badgers set cumulative and conference-only games attendance marks with a record-average 12,474 in eight Big Ten games. UW set its first five-figure average with 10,455 per game also in 1998.

But numbers are one thing, experiencing a loud, vibrant crowd is another. Once inside the Kohl Center, you'll be happy to see how close the crowd is to the court. The architects wanted to emulate the tight feeling of the former playing facility, the UW Field House, so they kept the seats close and the balconies cantilevered so the sound is reflected back into the bowl.

Courtside seats are reserved for season ticket holders, The end zones are a popular place for families to get up-close-and-personal with the players and Bucky Badger.

Once the Badgers take the court and the band starts playing, the crowd enthusiasm starts building. The introductions are accomplished in a darkened arena with the spotlight focused on center court and the Badgers. When the lights come on, it's game time!

At halftime, many people don't even leave their seats. The game day promotions are exceptional whether it be musical chairs, trike races, a gymnastics troop, the hilarious 'Battle of the Mascots,' or the Red Panda, there is always plenty of entertainment to keep everyone involved.

Once the UW team

returns to the court, the crowd is ready for another win and the Badgers don't disappoint. After a win, the team throws "Victory Balls" to the fans, and remains on the court as everyone sings "Varsity."



Rourth year coach Lisa Stone welcomes a plethora of new talent with eight newcomers joining five returning letterwinners for the 2006-07 season. The Badgers have no senior class, ensuring the success that looks promising this season will continue for some time.

Wearing the uniform for the first time is junior college transfer Ivana Mijalcevic (pronounced me AL cha vich) from Colby Community College in Colby, Kan. The native of Serbia played two years for the Trojans last year.

Help in the post will also come from 6-2 freshman Brittany Heins of Postville, Iowa. Local fans will be familiar with Mariah Dunham, a 6-1 guard from Watertown, Wis., who played all five positions in high school.

UW's backcourt will be substantial with the addition of Sarah Ingison, a 5-7 guard from Roseville, Minn.; Teah Gant, a 5-10 guard from Oswego, Ill., and Rae Lin D'Alie of Waterford, Wis. Local fans will remember D'Alie as the 5-foot-3-inch point guard who quarterbacked her Waterford, Wis., prep team to the 2006 WIAA girls state basketball tournament finals.

Also joining the Badgers as walk-ons are Ericka Engen, a 5-6 guard from McFarland, Wis., and Annie Crangle, a 5-7 guard from Piedmont High School in Piedmont, Calif. And the Badgers welcome a new assistant coach in Ty Margenthaler, who came to Wisconsin from Bradley University.

The Badgers return their top three scorers and rebounders including junior starters Jolene Anderson (Port Wing, Wis.), Janese Banks (Indianapolis) and Danielle Ward (Milwaukee) who form the nucleus of what should be a break-through season for the Badgers.

Anderson led Wisconsin for a second season in scoring and conluded her sophomore year as the fastest UW male or female player to score 1,000 points. She won her third international gold medal with the USA Basketball U20 team.

Banks is another two-year starter who led the team in assists and was second in scoring and third in rebounding. The 6-4 Ward has the best field goal percentage on the team and became a regular starter at post at the end of the season.

The returning sophomore class is composed of 6-4 center Caitlin Gibson (Jefferson, Wis.) and 6-1 guard Chris Spencer (Traverse City, Mich.). Gibson started 13 games as a true freshman then joined Spencer who played as a reserve in 23 games.

any UW games are televised each season. The Badgers will appear nationally on Fox Sports Net several times and on Comcast Sports as part of the Big Ten Conference package. The Badgers have also appeared in the past on ESPN, ESPN2 and CBS.

Wisconsin also has the opportunity for most of their games to delayed broacast around the state by Wisconsin Public Television and local cable channel UPN14. Wisconsin Public Television is entering its 15th year of broadcasting Badger Women's Basketball on its statewide network. The WPT announce team features veteran announcer Ken Syke, and former UW player Karie Cattanach. Syke has been calling play-by-play on television for more than two decades at the high school and collegiate level.

When the Badger home games are not televised, they will be live video streamed on uwbagers.com, the offical Web site for Wisconsin Athletics. The games will also be archived on the site for later viewing by fans.

Wisconsin's reputation as the major athletic program in the state also attracts a lot of media attention. Madison is home to four television stations, 18 radio stations, two daily newspapers and two student newspapers. In addition, media from around the state, including the Milwaukee area, also cover the Badgers on a regular basis.

The Badger women's basketball program has received national recognition for its community service projects. The entire team has helped by contributing their time and efforts for Habitat for Humanity, Hoops for Hope, or by dishing out food at the Salvation Army soup kitchen. Many other team and individual service projects are arranged by the basketball players and

Coach Lisa Stone also lends her name and time to a number of projects including events with Special Olympics, Junior Achievement, Sunshine Food Pantry, Susan G. Kommen Breast Cancer Foundation events with Hospice, United Way, the Tellurian UCAN, Inc., and the YMCA.

The variety of service projects in which UW players participate include visiting sick children in area hospitals, reading with Bookin' with Bucky, and participating in the Big Sister program. In addition, the team also regularly puts on several free basketball clinics for grade school children.

The basketball coaching staff annually recognizes the athlete or athletes who have shown a great interest and invested the most time in community service.




The non-conference schedule contains two home exhibition games in early

November, followed by a number of home and away games designed to prepare the team for the rigorous conference schedule.

The non-conference schedule usually contains a challenging tournament in some warm weather location such as Florida, Texas, California, Hawaii, or some other tropical place.

On the road, the team stays in hotels convenient to the competitive venues. The Badgers are served catered meals at the hotel. Travel arrangements are made so that the players miss a minimum amount of class time.

The Kohl Center

UW's Basketball, Hockey and Convocation Center

From its opening in January of 1998, the Kohl Center has become the happy home for the UW basketball and hockey programs. From lounge areas to lockers and training areas, the Kohl Center provides a competitive floor, practice and study areas for the student-athletes. The coaching offices are also located at the Kohl Center.

New Additions

An enlarged strength and conditioning area was finished in 2006 in time for the preseason. A second "Fetzer Academic Center" is being constructed and is scheduled to open at the Kohl Center in October of 2006. This fully-staffed learning lab will host computers, study areas and academic advisors for all of the sports which operate out of the Kohl Center, as well as those student-athletes who live close by. The newly finished Kellner Club located on the second concourse and overlooking the Wisconsin State Capital serves as the dining facility for student-athletes.

Seating Capacity

The Kohl Center seats 17,142 for basketball. That figure includes 7,500 seats in the lower seating bowl and 4,500 in each of the two balconies. The unique design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be close to the playing floor with excellent site lines. The facility seats approximately 14,000 for hockey, and between 15,000 and 17,000 for concerts.

Practice Pavilion

The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion houses three full-size basketball courts to be used for basketball practice sessions when the Kohl Center main floor is booked for other events.

The area is naturally lit, and has its own restrooms and loading dock. It can be set with a stage and often is utilized for pre-event functions, luncheons, and other large-group gatherings.



Checklist of Team and Fan Amenities

- For the student-athletes: huge locker rooms that include attached lounges, video/meeting rooms, staffed academic services, computer and study areas, dedicated practice facility attached.
- For the coaches: spacious offices with westward views of the campus including the Field House and Camp Randall Stadium.
- For the support areas: sports medicine, strength and conditioning, sports information, concessions/catering, and physical plant have ample and convenient work areas.
- For the fans and suites: a state-of-the-art sound system has been implemented in the Kohl Center and TV
 monitors are wired to the suites and above concession stands throughout the building. A new video-replay
 scoreboard and exciting ring beam were added in 2004.
- For the fans: extra-wide concourses (two), a number of food courts on both levels, numerous restrooms and merchandise outlets.
- Also for the fans: the cantilever design replicates the overhang effect of the Field House without the obstructions. Site lines are tremendous from every seat. At center court, you can look up at three ascending, cheering spectator areas—an awesome and intimidating sight for opponents.



Basketball Offices

The UW women's basketball offices are located on the second floor of the Kohl Center in a suite with the men's basketball and hockey offices.

The offices offer an excellent view of campus west and are conveniently located so that players can drop in at any time to meet with the coaches or to watch game tape.

The assistant coaches and head coach meet as a staff almost daily to discuss players, strategies, travel, and the myriad of other details involved with operating a Division I basketball program.

The assistant coaches have duties involving budgets, scheduling, team travel, recruiting, community service, and scouting. Some are liaisons with support services such as sports medicine, strength and conditioning or equipment.

The office features a large reception area that includes photos of athletes in action and beautiful scenes of Madison and the campus. The basketball offices are the base of operations for the staff, offering a central locale for the coaches to break down film and construct game plans.

Together with the director of basketball operations and head coach Lisa Stone, the staff forms the directional center of the UW women's program.

Basketball Locker Room

he Kohl Center includes lockers for UW men's and women's basketball and hockey. Four other locker rooms are also available for multiple teams attending events such as the WIAA state tournaments, also held here.

The 2,200-square-foot, state-of-the-art locker areas have been designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind, including team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area, and study carrels. The athletes have a lounge area with sound system, video room and, of course, a spacious dressing and shower area complete with multiple outlets and lighted mirrors.











A large back-lit W greets you as you enter the 2,200-square-foot Badger women's basketball locker room. The space is comprised of five areas including a lounge and adjacent study area; locker room, team meeting room, and a coaches lounge and locker. The area is a home away from home for student-athletes and is equipped with the latest in sound, television, and video equipment.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high-quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Karen Bloch is the full-time trainer who works with women's basketball. The training staff measures physiological capacity and outlines programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

There are several Sports Medicine facilities including the McClain Center, which features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, a Bod Pod for measuring body mass, and an onsite X-ray facility. The Kohl Center sports medicine area also has therapeutic equipment and rehabilitative apparatus, and is conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. Strength and Conditioning

he Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coach Greg Young is the dedicated advisor for women's basketball. "We train our athletes year-round. Inseason, typically, we will train two times a week based off game and travel schedule, off-season it is usually four days a week," says Young.

"The college athletic season is both physically and mentally demanding so it's important that our athletes have the strength and stamina to be as strong at the end of the year as they were at the beginning of the season. The focus of most of our training programs is the Olympic lifts: the clean, the jerk, and the snatch, which develop explosive strength, starting strength to help our athletes out on the field and out on the court. The result is a pretty well-rounded program that caters to the individual strengths and weaknesses of all our athletes."

Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center located in the McClain Athletic Facility provides for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The center is home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-theart facility is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access the online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.


The center features a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors, and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff, tutors and learning specialists render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/ Life Skills Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees programs in career and personal development as well as community outreach. The staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Opening in October of 2007 will be a similarly fashioned academic facility at the Kohl Center. This fully-staffed area will contain computers, advisors and learning specialists and will cater to those student-athletes who operate out of the Kohl Center, or who live in proximity to that arena.

Student-athletes can drop in to either facility before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a oneon-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring over 200 athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.





UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

HAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence

• The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.
- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues that most incoming college students face in their transition, such as time management, alcohol abuse and nutrition.
- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.
- The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our student-athletes.


Personal Development

Career Development

- Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.
- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.
- UW Athletics partners with the National W Club and the Wisconsin Alumni Association as well as local corporations to assist student-athletes in finding jobs and internships as well as assisting in networking and career opportunities.
- UW Athletics hosts Career Night every January. This event is a networking dinner and career fair for all junior and senior student-athletes.
- Corporations also host information sessions and screening interviews within the Fetzer Center for student-athletes.

Community Service

- The CHAMPS coordinator organizes individual and team community service requests.
- Opportunities for involvement through one-time events as well as on-going volunteer opportunities in the Madison area.
- UW has structured programs, such as Bookin it with Bucky. Through this program, athletes are scheduled to read in fourth grade Madison classrooms to encourage literacy and continued learning.

CHAMPS Cup

The CHAMPS Cup is an all-sport competition, rewarding teams who exemplify all aspects of the student-athlete.

Student-athletes earn points for their teams in six categories:

Academic Achievement

Teams receive points for their team GPA, scoring at least 925 mark in the Academic Progress Rate (APR) as well as points for individual academic all-conference honors.

Athletic Achievement

Teams that place in the top three of their conference are awarded points based on their finish. Conference champions—100 points; second place—90 points; third place—80 points.

Personal Enhancement

Teams or individuals earn points for attending any CHAMPS/Life Skills on-campus event related to personal development.

Community Outreach

Community service done as a team, with other student-athletes or individually will be rewarded.

Badger Pride

Points are awarded to teams that go the extra mile to support their fellow student-athletes by attending each other's sporting events. Each team will choose one competition in their traditional season that it will label as Badger pride night. Any athletes who attend this competition will receive points, individually or as a team.

SAAC Participation

Teams will earn 10 points for each meeting they have two representatives in attendance.

The Scoring System

Individual Points—Individuals will earn 100 points for their team for each individ-

ual effort. At the end of each week, the points will be divided by the number of student-athletes on the active roster for each sport.

Team Points—Team efforts, defined as 70 percent participation or 20 members, for all categories earn 100 points per event. All mandatory events require 100 percent participation in order to receive points.

Reward

One men's and one women's team will be recognized as the overall winners at the Academic Excellence Banquet in April. The men's and women's team with the highest GPA as well as the team with the most community service points will also be recognized at the banquet.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.


Student Life



- Madison is one of only a few cities in the world built on an isthmus. Downtown Madison is set on a narrow strip of land between two glacial lakes—Lake Mendota and Lake Monona. A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.
- The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.
- State Street, a one-mile pedestrian mall linking the Capitol Square to the beautiful lakeside campus of the University of Wisconsin, is lined with diverse ethnic eateries, eclectic boutiques, galleries, coffeehouses and more.
- Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright spent his childhood years in Madison and returned to live in the area at the height of his international fame. The Madison area is home to a generous selection of Wright-designed buildings.

Head Coach Lisa Stone


Wisconsin native from nearby Oregon, Lisa Stone began her career with the Badger program in April, 2003. She came to Wisconsin from Drake University where she served as head coach three years, taking the Bulldogs to the 2002 NCAA Sweet 16.

A proven winner in four different programs, Stone's 21-year career collegiate record of 408-169 (.707) ranks 22nd in overall winning percentage among active Division I coaches.

Stone had the first losing season of her career in 2003–04, as she faced a refurbishing project at Wisconsin. With the addition of just one recruit, she took a team that finished 7-21 in 2003, to a 10-17 record in 2004.

Armed with five new recruits and an insatiable energy and desire to succeed, her second season with the Badgers showed a team that improved by leaps and bounds over the previous season. The Badgers had more wins, and better statistics across the board while finishing with a 12-16 mark including their first win at the Big Ten Basketball Tournament since 2002. The 2005–06 team suffered through an injury-laden season to an 11-18 record and a ninth place Big Ten finish.

Just as important to Stone as a winning record is having student-athletes who are accomplished in the classroom. Stone's 2004 Badger team boasted seven Academic All-Big Ten honorees and the team had a cumulative grade point average of over 3.0. The 2005 team had four



and the 2006 team had five Academic All-Big Ten honorees.

While at Drake University, her 2001 team ranked sixth nationally, and her 2002 team ranked 15th nationally in the Women's Basketball Coaches Association's Academic Top 25.

Stone's basketball record at Drake was also successful, posting a 64-27 (.703) record in three years. With a 25-8 record, her 2002 team had the best record

and the highest national ranking (20th) at the school in 20 years. Drake was 23-7 in Stone's first season before bowing out in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

She was recognized for her coaching success in 2002 with an invitation to join Team USA as an assistant coach to Marsha Sharp of Texas Tech. Team USA won the gold medal at the 2002 World Championships for Young Women Qualifying Tournament in Ribeirao Preto, Brazil.

Prior to Drake, Stone built one of the top NCAA Division III programs in the nation at UW–Eau Claire. The two-time Division III national coach of the year and five-time Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) coach of the year, took a program that had only one winning season in its history, and guided 11 squads to 20-win seasons and 11 appearances in the NCAA Division III tournament. She compiled a 277-59 (.824) record in her 12 seasons, which ranks second all-time for most wins in the league's history.

In each of Stone's last nine seasons at UW-Eau Claire, the Blugolds won at least 22 games and never lost more than six. UW-Eau Claire completed its best season in 1999–2000, winning its first 28 games before falling in the Division III NCAA Sweet 16 to the eventual national champion.

Stone began her coaching career at Cornell College (Mount Vernon, Iowa) where she had a 34-32 record in three years as head coach from 1985–88. At 23, she was the youngest four-year college

coach in the nation when she led the Rams to three consecutive Southern Division titles in the Midwest Conference.

As a player, Stone (then Lisa Anderson) earned four letters each in tennis, basketball and track during her high school career. She led the Class A Oregon Panthers to the Wisconsin state basketball tournament in 1979 and 1980, earning first-team all-state honors as a senior and second-team recognition as a junior.

She played her collegiate ball at the University of Iowa from 1980–84, where she earned her bachelor's degree in 1984. She added a master's degree in athletic administration from Iowa in 1986. At Iowa, Stone played for one of the country's outstanding coaches in C. Vivian Stringer. She was a four-year standout at point guard, scoring 1,129 points, which ranks 14th in Iowa history.

Stone is tied for sixth on Iowa's career steals chart with 177, ranks seventh in career assists (322) and 23rd in career rebounds (331). She also owns a share of the Hawkeye record for steals in a game (nine). Three times Stone served as Iowa's captain and twice was the Hawkeyes' MVP. She won the 1984 Big Ten Medal of Honor recognizing her as one of the top scholar-athletes in the conference.

Stone and her husband Ed, a certified public accountant, are the parents of Allison (14) and Tyler (11).







Assistant Coach Donna Freitag

ssistant coach Donna Freitag returned to Madison as an assistant coach with Coach Stone in 2003, after coaching positions at Bradley University and Drake University. A native of Oregon, Wis., and lifelong friend of head coach Lisa Stone, Freitag began her basketball coaching career at the University of Wisconsin serving as an assistant women's coach from 1986-94. She followed Stone to Wisconsin after three years as the associate head coach at Drake University.

The former head coach and assistant coach at

Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., Freitag serves as the recruiting coordinator and top assistant. Taking over the Braves program after two years as an assistant coach, Freitag compiled a 37-69 record during four seasons as Bradley's head coach. In her initial campaign in 1996–97, the Braves won seven consecutive games, finished fourth in the MVC and won the school's first-ever MVC Tournament game by upsetting host Southwest Missouri State.

"Donna is a highly respected Division I coach," said head coach Lisa Stone. "Her vast experience as a player, assistant and head coach at the Division I level are extremely valuable to me and to the Wisconsin program. She is very knowledgeable, honest and trustworthy. These qualities coupled with her experience and her familiarity with the State of Wisconsin, make her an outstanding recruiting coordinator."

As an assistant at Wisconsin (1986–94), Freitag was an integral part of a rebuilding process that turned a struggling Badger



program into a nationally recognized team that received its firstever bid to the NCAA Tournament in 1992.

Freitag grew up in the same neighborhood as Stone, and the two played high school and college basketball together. Stone was a standout point guard at the University of Iowa, and Freitag joined her for her final two seasons after earning MVP honors in two years at UW-Platteville.

At Iowa, Freitag was named the Hawkeye's' team captain and most valuable player during her senior season in 1982–83. She went on to play two seasons of professional basketball for Team Tivoli in Dublin, Ireland, from 1983–85.

"Returning to Wisconsin with (head coach) Lisa Stone is a dream come true," said Freitag. "The opportunity to work with Lisa and build on the basketball tradition already established at Wisconsin is outstanding."

asha McDowell joined the Badgers as an assistant women's basketball coach in 2005. McDowell came to Wisconsin from UC–Santa Barbara where she served as an assistant from 2000–05.

McDowell served as the Gaucho's recruiting coordinator the past three years. She has also been responsible for coaching the UCSB defense, and helped coordinate the offense in her final season. Sweet 16 appearance in 2004, the Gauchos finished the 2004-05 campaign with a 21-9 record, and made the NCAA Tournament for the ninth consecutive year and 11th time in program history. The Big West Conference champion for the 10th year, UCSB garnered a No. 13 seed in the Tempe Regional, and lost 61-51 to Notre Dame in the first round.

McDowell began her coaching career as an assistant at St. Ambrose in 1997.

A native of Moline, Ill., McDowell played three years of collegiate basketball, the first two of which were spent at Illinois Central College. After graduating from ICC, McDowell attended Southwest Missouri State before transferring to St. Ambrose. In her lone season with the Queen Bees, the team posted a 27-7 record and advanced to the NAIA National Tournament. A point guard, McDowell averaged 13.4 points, 5.1 assists and 3.6 steals as a senior, all team highs.






Tasha McDowell helps coach the guards at Wisconsin. Other duties include recruiting and arranging community service for the team.



Chancellor John D. Wiley

Chancellor John D. Wiley has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea and build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the University of Wisconsin so rich in accomplishment and tradition.


Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant artsand-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an National Science Foundation Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of head football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004–05, Alvarez served as A.D. and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet Alvarez.





Huff's Number 21 Is Retired

Theresa Huff, who played at Wisconsin from 1979–83, is the only woman player to have her jersey retired. Although only 5-11, the lithe center/forward became the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder completing her career with 1,879 points and 1,201 rebounds.

Robin Threatt broke Huffs 11-year-old scoring record with 1,901 points in 1993, and Barb Franke surpassed both Huff and Threatt completing her career with 1,994 points in 1996. But no one has ever reached Huffs incredible 1,201 rebounding mark.

A Milwaukee native, Huff's career spanned the transition period from the AIAW to the NCAA governance. She led Wisconsin to its first post-season appearance reaching the quarterfinals of the 1982 AIAW National Championship. She was a member of the first official Big Ten Conference team in 1981–82. Huff distinguished herself as Wisconsin's first professional woman basketball player and was also the first female American chosen to play professionally in Spain in 1983-84. She was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletics Hall of Fame in 1998.





Big Ten Conference Basketball

ne of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the arena of athletics. The 2006-07 season marks a special year for the Big Ten, which is celebrating its 25th anniversary of women's championships.

Big Ten women's athletics programs have led the nation in both women's basketball and volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 200 conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

The Big Ten Conference began its conference basketball tournament to decide the automatic qualifier for the NCAA championship in 1995. Purdue has won six of the last nine titles and became the Big Ten's first NCAA champion in 1999. The Boilermakers were the NCAA runners-up in 2001 and also took part in the Final Four

in 1994. Ohio State and Iowa advanced to the Final Four in 1993. Penn State was a Final Four team in 2000, while Minnesota was a national semifinalist in 2004.

Michigan State, who won its first Big Ten tournament in 2005, continued its run in the postseason, and advaced all the way to the national title game but fell to Baylor, 84-62. A Big Ten team has been to the Final Four five of the past eight years. The league title is based on the final regular season conference standings. All teams play a total of 16 games. Schools play six teams twice and four teams once.

The 2007 Big Ten Conference tournament is set for March 1-5 at Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. The tournament is a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top five seeds, determined by standings, receive a first-round bye. The other six teams play each other in the first round, with the winners participating in the quarterfinal round on Friday.

The winner will receive the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.

Looking Back at Last Season

In a season of 'what could have been', the Badgers were 2-8 in games decided by six points or fewer and 0-4 in games decided by three-points or fewer.

- Wisconsin (11-18, 5-11) concluded its season with an 80-73 loss to Penn State in the first round of the Big Ten Basketball Tournament in Indianapolis. UW was the ninth seed after finishing the regular conference season alone in ninth place with a 5-11 record. It was the fourth straight year UW played in the 8/9 game slot.
- ▶ UW had its first win over a nationally ranked opponent on Feb. 19, beating No. 17/16 Minnesota, 67-61, in front of a season-high crowd of 14,697.
- ▶ The win was Lisa Stone's second biggest come-back victory after being behind by 14 points in the first half. The crowd was the fifth largest Badger

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Since the award was initiated in 1986, Wisconsin has garnered 80 Academic All-Big Ten honors, which ranks first among Big Ten basketball teams for the most academic honorees in the history of the conference. The Badgers had five Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2006.

crowd and the largest in the Big Ten. UW's 6,016 attendance average ranked fifth in the Big Ten and 16th nationally.

- ▶ The Badgers were first in rebounding in the Big Ten averaging 40.0 per game. The Badgers outrebounded 19 of 28 opponents and tied one other opponent last season. UW was also the conference leader in offensive boards with 16.34 per game.
- ▶ The Badgers set a Kohl Center record with eight turnovers vs. Minnesota Feb. 19. It was the second fewest turnovers in a game in UW history (seven is the record). The Badgers tied the mark with eight turnovers against Penn State at the Big Ten tournament final.
- ♦ Sophomore Jolene Anderson (Port Wing, Wis.) was the fastest male or female Badger to earn 1,000 points. She hit the figure exactly in her 57th career game with 24 points to end the season vs. Penn State at the Big Ten tournament. UW men's all-time leading scorer, Michael Finley, scored his 1,000th point in his 59th and last game of his sophomore season.

Anderson was the leading scorer for the Badgers for a second year averaging 17.3 points per game, which ranked fourth in the Big Ten in overall stats. Anderson earned All-Big Ten second team honors by a vote of the conference coaches and the media. Her 29-game double figure scoring streak was the longest in the Big Ten.

◆ Sophomore guard **Janese Banks** (**Indianapolis**) missed five games with a left foot injury. The second-leading scorer on the team, she ranked 15th in

the Big Ten in scoring with 12.8 points per game including a career-high 25 points vs. Idaho State Nov. 25. She led the team and ranked second in the Big Ten in assists (4.42) and 10th in steals (2.0).

- ♦ Sophomore 6-4 center **Danielle Ward (Milwaukee)** became a regular starter at the end of the season and had a career-high 23 points vs.

 Northwestern Jan. 1. She ranked third on the team in scoring (10.2) and was second in rebounding with 5.7 per game. She had the best FG percentage at 48.4 percent, and ranked fifth in blocks in the Big Ten with 1.55/ game.
- ♦ Senior Ashley Josephson (Onalaska, Wis.) was the fourth leading scorer with 9.0 points per game including a season-high 23 points at Michigan Jan. 29. She finished her career No. 1 in career 3-point shooting hitting 146-or-372 for 39.2 percent and is also No. 1 in career free throw shooting hitting 99-or-119 for 83.2 percent.
- ♦ Senior Jordan Wilson (Naperville, III.) stepped into the starting lineup for the injured Annie Nelson and started the last 15 games. Wilson was a parttime starter during her sophomore (12 starts) and junior (16 starts) seasons. She completed her career having never missed a game or practice, appearing in 112 consecutive games, which ranks fifth all-time.
- ◆ Freshman 6-4 center **Caitlin Gibson (Jefferson, Wis.)** hit double figures in three of 13 career starts and averaged 5.1 points per game average.

WISCONSIN'S RECORD ATTENDANCE

Wisconsin led the Big Ten in cumulative attendance four years, and has ranked among the top 20 in the nation in attendance since 1995. Wisconsin is home to several Big Ten Conference attendance records including the all-time best average with 10,455/game in 1998. UW set a league record with an average of 12,274 attending Big Ten games that same year.

Badgers Look to NCAA Tournament

he Badgers return their top three scorers and rebounders, all of whom accounted for 57.5 percent of the scoring and 42.9 percent of the rebounding from last year's 11-18 season. Junior starters **Jolene Anderson** (Port Wing, Wis.), **Janese Banks** (Indianapolis) and **Danielle Ward** (Milwaukee) form the nucleus of what should be a breakthrough season for the Badgers.

Anderson led Wisconsin for a second season in scoring with 17.3 points per game (fourth in the Big Ten), and led UW in rebounding with 7.0 per game. The two-year starter was the fastest UW male or female player to score 1,000 points. She was a member of the 2006 USA Basketball U20 team that won a gold medal in Mexico City. It was the second straight USA Basketball tour for Anderson, who also won gold with the 2005 U19 team.

Banks, another two-year starter, was

second in scoring with 12.8 points and third in rebounding with 5.4 per game. She played point guard by necessity leading the team in assists with 4.4 per game.

Anderson and Banks, UW's best defender, will be moved to the wing this year making room for one of a plethora of new point guards to emerge.

The 6-4 Ward became a regular starter at post at the end of the season and contributed 10.2 points and 5.7 rebounds per game. She had the best field goal shooting percentage on the team hitting 48.4 percent.

The Badgers graduated four seniors and had two reserve sophomore players transfered, but return two sophomores in 6-4 center **Caitlin Gibson** (Jefferson, Wis.) and 6-1 guard **Chris Spencer** (Traverse City, Mich.). Gibson started 13

games as a true freshman contributing 5.1 points and 3.2 rebounds per game. Spencer played in 23 games averaging 2.3 points per game.

The Badgers welcome eight newcomers and gained some added experience with community college transfer **Ivana Mijalcevic** (pronounced me AL cha vich) from Colby Community College in Colby, Kan. The native of Serbia played two years for the Trojans last year averaging 9.6 points and 6.7 rebounds per game.

Help in the post will also come from 6-2 freshman **Brittany Heins** of Postville, Iowa. Heins returned from successful knee surgery to lead her team to the Iowa basketball state finals in 2006. She averaged 25 points and 15 rebounds per game while hitting 68 percent of her shots.

Mariah Dunham, a 6-1 guard from Watertown, Wis., played every position in high school averaging 16.8 points, 12.0 rebounds and six assists per game.

UW's backcourt will be substantial with the addition of **Sarah Ingison** a 5-7 guard from Roseville, Minn. Regarded as an exceptional


defensive player she averaged 16.3 points, three rebounds, five assists and 4.5 steals per game. **Teah Gant**, a 5-10 guard from Oswego, Ill. and a 2006 McDonald's All-American candidate, averaged 24 points per game as a senior.

A third point guard joined the team

A third point guard joined the team in the spring in Wisconsin first-team all-stater **Rae Lin D'Alie**. The 5-foot-3 point guard quarterbacked her Waterford, Wis., prep team to the WIAA girls state basketball tournament finals. She averaged 15 points, 6.4 assists, 6.3 rebounds and 3.8 steals per game as a senior.

Joining the Badgers as walk-ons are **Ericka Engen**, a 5-6 guard from McFarland, Wis., and **Annie Crangle**, a 5-7 guard from Piedmont High School in Piedmont, Calif.

The Badgers finished last season blacing ninth in the Big Ten with a 5-11 record, and were 11-18 overall losing 80-73 to Penn State in the first round of the Big Ten Tournament.

Chat with Head Coach Lisa Stone

ow in her fourth season, Badger Coach Lisa Stone expects this to be the break-through year for her young Badger team. Here are some of her preseason thoughts on the upcoming year.

What do you consider your primary accomplishments last season?

STONE: Our biggest accomplishment last year was our victory over nationally ranked Minnesota at the Kohl Center. The largest crowd of the season witnessed what we expect more of in the 2006–07 season. The atmosphere that our Badger fans provided was exceptional and helped us rank among the nation's best in attendance.

Secondly, I felt our experience in Hawaii helped establish a foundation for the rigors of the Big Ten season. To beat the University of Hawaii on its home floor and to advance into the championship game versus a top 20 team like DePaul was a boost of confidence for our players

What motivation have you seen in the players this spring and summer?

STONE: This summer, our entire team, with the exception of Ivana (Mijalcevic) who spent time with her family in Serbia, committed itself to improving individual skills along with daily strength and conditioning. This time spent together developed team chemistry and the intense desire to win this coming season.

What are the team goals this season, and what are the team strengths?

STONE: Our team goals for the 2006–07 season are to reach post-season play. With that, I want to make sure our players have fun, are focused, and have the freedom to demonstrate their abilities. I want for this team to grow individually, and experience team success. Our goal is to improve every single day.

Our team strengths are the return of three talented juniors. Jolene (Anderson), Janese (Banks), and Danielle (Ward) return with a great deal of experience. Jolene and Danielle both competed overseas last summer, and helped lead their respective teams to another gold medal for Jolene; and an undefeated record for Danielle.

Janese guided our newcomers as they adjusted to college life, and lead them in summer workouts. Returning sophomores Caitlin Gibson and Chris Spencer worked extremely hard this off-season. They have matured and provided leadership to our newcomers. We expect Caitlin to be a dominating factor inside and that Chris will continue to be a threat from the perimeter.

What do you project this season for USA basketball player Jolene Anderson?



Junior Danielle Ward (shooting) was the top rebounder with the Big Ten European Tour team this past summer. She averaged 7.3 rebounds per game.



Janese Banks will have a new position this season after playing point guard for most of 2005–06. She ranked second in the Big Ten in assists with 4.4 per game.

What do you think Danielle Ward gained from the Big Ten tour?

STONE: Danielle grew as a person and matured as a player. She was able to travel oversees for the first time and learned about various cultures. She also led the team in rebounding and performed very well. The timing for Danielle to represent the Big Ten was perfect. She had to relate to new teammates, which is what we expect of her this season; to provide leadership and guide our newcomers.

What kind of different coaching demands are there when more than half of your team is comprised of freshmen?

STONE: The number one key is patience. Our five freshmen bring a great deal of ability, and expectations for them will be very high. However, one must remember this is their first year playing at the college level, and in the Big Ten Conference. My coaching style will remain the same. I will demand a great deal from them because each has the skill set and the knowledge required to be a successful collegiate player. I believe in this group and am extremely excited about their future as Badgers.

How will your youth affect your style of play this season?

STONE: First of all, we will be deeper in each position, starting with two new point guards, Rae Lin D'alie and Sarah Ingison. Both Rae and Sarah are fundamentally sound, very competitive, and are driven to win. I will look to both Rae and Sarah to be an extension of me on the floor and quarterback this team.

Also on the perimeter are guards Teah Gant and Mariah Dunham, who will add scoring depth. Teah is very intelligent and eager to learn new terminology and improve her skills. Mariah has always wanted to wear Badger red, and looks forward to playing at her very best in the Kohl Center.

Newcomers who will play the forward positions are Brittany Heins and Ivana Mijalcevic. Brittany's solid work ethic will take her to great heights. She is athletic, provides size, the ability to run the floor, and is capable of scoring inside and out. Ivana puts a smile on your face each time she steps onto the court. She's not afraid of contact, and finds ways to get to the foul line. She also gives us a solid inside and high post presence. She will only continue to improve.

Overall, our depth provides many options within our system. It allows us to be versatile offensively and defensively. I strive for our team to be "un-scoutable", meaning our players are able to read their defense and make plays. The fact they are bonding off the court, more than they ever have, this connection will be brought onto the court and demonstrated each contest.

Now that you have more depth at the guard position, how will you utilize the talents that Jolene Anderson and Janese Banks bring to the team?

STONE: Jolene and Janese have been playing out of position their whole career thus far. This year we have the good fortune to have two true point guards in Sarah Ingison and Rae Lin D'Alie. I believe Janese and Jolene are excited about this season because they are in a position where they will not have to create each shot, but be put in a position where shots are created for them within our offense.

You mentioned that Jolene and Janese will now be playig their "true" positions, what type of impact do you expect from your two freshmen point guards?

Sarah (Ingison) and Rae (Lin D'Alie) have demonstrated their fundamental skills and we look forward to watching them grow. My expectations for each are to be an extension of me on the floor and run this team. I am very confident that both will be able to lead this team in the direction that we want to go. I have high expectations for them, however, I also want each to realize that they have support of great teammates and returning players to help guide them. Both are extremely competitive and complement each other very well.

You had a change in your coaching staff this year. What will Ty bring to the program?

STONE: I have known Ty for quite some time. He is a talented recruiter and is very connected to numerous coaches and AAU programs. He comes from a basketball family. His dad is a retired head coach and his brother is a current head coach. Both found success at the college level. Ty is extremely loyal and driven. He does a tremendous job of sharing and selling the

great things the University of Wisconsin has to offer prospective student-athletes.

What do you think of the Wisconsin schedule this season?

STONE: I like our schedule. We have a full schedule (all allowable games) for the first time since I've been here. We will be tested early on the road in our first game at U.S. Air Force Academy. We also will be challenged in our holiday tournament in Las Vegas, our first game against reigning WNIT champion, Kansas State.

From there we will compete against 2006 NCAA participant UC-Riverside. We look forward to state rival games versus UW-Milwaukee and UW-Green Bay. Kansas is a team from the Big 12 that we lost to last year in double overtime.]We are looking to have them come back. Kansas will be a lot like the Big Ten teams we play. Our non-conference schedule challenges us for another tough Big Ten Conference schedule, but also puts us in a position to be successful.

I'm excited about the Big Ten season. We will be tested early on the road, but I believe our preparation puts us in position to break into the upper echelon of the Big Ten Conference.

What are your expectations for the Badgers?

STONE: I expect my team to be focused, have fun, and have freedom to play basketball. This means we are able to stay healthy, avoid adversity as much as possible, but persevere and stick together as a team if an adverse situation is brought before us. We are a unit, and we will win together and go through tough times together. This is what my philosophy of "Team Unity" means. Each season, question marks arise as to how successful your team will be. I believe in this young team, and only want what's best for them. They deserve success, and have worked in the off-season to obtain this. We will have fun, and we will smile each day because our goal is to improve as a unit every single time we step onto the court.

Finally, we will keep our eye on the prize. We will enjoy each moment spent together. Each member of my program is driven and passionate for success. With our hard work ethic we will obtain this, and at the end of this season, we will look back without regret because we gave our very best each day. Our goal is to have the 2006–07 season be our best yet.


