



### THE RIVER FALLS STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Founded 1874, the fourth normal school to be established in Wisconsin by the Board of Regents of Normal Schools.

Opened 1875 with a faculty of nine and a student body in the Normal Department of 104.

1897—The Normal School building destroyed by fire.

The school opened at one o'clock the next afternoon in buildings offered by citizens of River Falls, and "continued during the year without the loss of a single student and but one half day's loss occasioned by the fire."

1898—South Hall erected and opened September 6.

1909—First summer session held.

1912—Department of Agriculture established.

1914—North Hall constructed.

Two tracts of farm land, aggregating about forty-five acres, purchased.

1917-1920—Further purchase of farm lands.

1918—Barracks built in 1917 for a unit of the Student Army Training Corps transformed into shops for the Agricultural Mechanics department.

1920—Athletic field purchased.

1926-1927—Four-year courses leading to the degree of bachelor of education established. The River Falls Normal School becomes the River Falls State Teachers College.

1927—The Training School Building constructed.

1930—Industrial Arts Building completed.

1935—River Falls State Teachers College granted accreditation in the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

1945—Appropriation of \$347,000 by the state legislature for the construction of new buildings. A part of this fund used to construct the Campus Apartments for married veterans and to purchase houses which have been converted into residences for students, especially a dormitory for freshman girls.

1948—Completion of addition to the Industrial Arts Building.

1948-1949—College enrollment breaks all-time record with an attendance of 831.




The most important factors in a college are the students and the faculty. The college is in the class-rooms where the student meets the teacher. In every year of its history the student body at River Falls has been characterized by a spirit of loyalty to the college and a cooperative attitude toward the faculty and the administration. Outstanding records have also been characteristic in the various activities of the school in which students have taken a leading part—athletics, forensics, publications, dramatics and other fields. The brilliant record of River Falls athletic teams in intercollegiate competition is well known. This department has been fortunate in the character and ability of the men who have directed its program. Many of these men have received appointments to responsible posts in athletic departments of some of the leading universities.

The achievements of members of the faculty in class-room work has established a reputation which reflects great credit on the college. Evidence of this high standard of scholarship and teaching skill is found in the records made by graduates of the college in the graduate departments of many universities. Members of the River Falls faculty, in every period of the school's history, have been called to important positions in other institutions of higher learning, some to the presidencies of other colleges, and some to positions on the instructional staffs of leading colleges and universities.

ERECTED IN 1927




Important contributions to the progress of the college have been made by loyal alumni. Graduates of the college in teaching positions widely over the state have directed the attention of prospective students to the facilities at River Falls. The support of the local community in making River Falls "a good place to go to school" has played an important part in the growth and progress of the college throughout its history.

World War II took a heavy toll of both students and faculty. Over 1000 students and graduates entered the armed forces. Eight members of the faculty took leaves of absence to engage in the war effort. The college, however, maintained its standards and the usual activities with some curtailments. With the close of the war many veterans returned to college, and the enrollment rose to the high of 831 in the fall of 1948.

To promote the future expansion of the college there was organized in 1947 the River Falls State Teachers College Foundation, with Edward Rock of Hudson as president of the board of directors. Contributions were made to the fund at once, and an intensive drive was carried on during the last of 1948 and the early part of 1949. \$250,000 is the goal, and the fund is well on the way to that goal. "The Foundation," says President Kleinpell, "will assure the future progress of the college, for it will provide that extra spark so necessary to our future building requirements."

The foregoing account was compiled from a history of the River Falls State Teachers College written by J. H. Ames, former president.

John Wild played "The Sabre Dance."



The River Falls Falcons, defending conference Champs, remained in the 1948 football title chase until the final week of the season, but a long string of injuries to key men took its toll, and the fighting Falcons dropped their last two conference starts, thus giving the Blugolds of Eau Claire the state championship.

With the loss of such sterling performers as Burkhard, Vanderhoof, Werndl, Levenick, Teske, Jansen, Tobias, and Schuman from the '47 squad, Coach George Schlagenhauf and assistants Kolberg and Hoy were forced to rebuild the River Falls eleven. Optimism ran high as the '48 Falcon squad reported for the first practice session September 1st, despite the loss of the afore-mentioned gridmen. This optimism quickly changed to pessimism, as one by one highly regarded players suffered serious injuries. As the season opened against Hamline, veteran players such as quarterback Gordon Olson, all-conference backs Schock and Feiler, regular guards McCardle and Glauner were all missing from the lineup due to injuries. After the opening loss to Hamline University, the Falcons came back to win four successive games, but with the championship hanging in the balance the old injury jinx struck again and the Falls aggregation went down to three successive defeats.

Despite the disappointing finish of the team many of Coach Schlagenhauf's stars reaped individual rewards. The Falcons placed more men (four) on the All-State eleven than any other team in the Wisconsin State Teachers College Conference. Halfbacks Cardinal and Schock along with Wilson at center and McCardle at guard made the honorary team. In addition to this the veteran Cardinal led the conference in scoring as "scat-back Bunny" tallied six touchdowns and added eight P. A. T.'s for 38 points.

Highlighting the past season's grid activities was the stirring 27-18 triumph over Superior State at Ramer Field. It was the peak effort of the season for the Falcons. Following this sensational win, River Falls ran into the big, bad Blugolds of Eau Claire in the Falcons homecoming clash. After a terrific struggle Eau Claire emerged the winner 13-7, and an injury riddled River Falls squad could not regain enough strength to come out victorious against La Crosse and Gustavus Adolphus in the season's finals. The River Falls eleven had good personnel but seldom could field their strongest line due to recurring injuries.



#### RIVER FALLS 0—HAMLINE 20

In the opening game of the 1948 grid season a hard driving Hamline University team from St. Paul rolled over a makeshift River Falls eleven 20-0 at Ramer Field. With five regulars on the 1947 championship team out with injuries, Coach Schlagenhauf was forced to start a relatively inexperienced lineup. The first quarter was scoreless and both teams had difficulty in getting their offense to click. However, in the second period the Pipers intercepted a Falcon pass to score the initial points of the game. The Falcons struck back with their best offensive spurt of the game with Cardinal, Gordon Grilley and Feiler leading the way. A fumble halted the advance and the locals never threatened again. In the second half the Falcons wilted in the heat and the Pipers scored twice to rack up a 20-0 triumph. Willis Castle and Sam Richie were the Hamline stars while Gene Cardinal and Bob Wilson did yeoman work for River Falls.

#### RIVER FALLS 28—WHITEWATER 19

The opening conference game saw a revitalized Falcon team come from behind to soundly defeat the visitors from Whitewater. Still handicapped by numerous injuries the Falcons fell behind 12-0, as speedy Don Erickson raced 65 yards with a River Falls punt in the first quarter for a T. D., and later in

the second quarter a blocked punt gave the Whitewater boys their second six points. The Falcon "T" showed signs of life in the first quarter and finally in the second canto a varied running and passing game gave the locals their first T. D. of the '48 season. A five-yard pass from Cardinal to DeLong climaxed a 72-yard scoring drive. In the second half the Falcons broke loose with a strong running and passing game which enabled them to go into the lead. A 45-yard drive ended in a scoring pass, Cardinal to Gibbs. Later guard Norb Studelska blocked a Quaker punt for a safety and just a few plays later another Falcon drive ended successfully with Harkness pitching to big Nate DeLong for another T. D. Whitewater came back to tally on a pass, but little Gene Cardinal scooted 18 yards in the fourth quarter to clinch the win. Cardinal, running and passing, was the outstanding feature of the game along with some nice pass receiving by the Falcon ends. Freshmen Harkness and Linehan showed up well in the contest.

#### RIVER FALLS 26—STOUT 7

A visiting Falcon grid team gave their hosts, the Blue Devils of Stout Institute, a neat 26-7 trimming in a night game at Menomonie. The Falcon line with McCardle and Glauner getting back in action stopped Stout's rushing attack cold and at the same time opened gaping holes for the speedy River Falls

backs. Acting Captain Gene Cardinal raced 55 yards for the first Falcon score and early in the second period quarterback Harley Harkness sneaked over the double line for the second score. Gordon Schock was back in action for the first time and his powerful running sparked the Falcon offensive surge. Along with "Card," Schock tore the Blue Devil line to shreds to tally again in the fourth canto. Everett "Nook" Grilley swept end for 48 yards and the final Falcon score. The Blue Devils' passing attack finally accounted for a Stout tally in the final minutes against the River Falls reserves. It was the best all-around game played by the Falcons thus far in the season.

#### RIVER FALLS 12—PLATTEVILLE 0

The Platteville Pioneers took on the River Falls Falcons in their homecoming fray and in turn the obliging Falcons "took" the Pioneers into camp 12-0. At the kickoff an aroused Pioneer aggregation stopped the Falcons' offensive efforts and quickly generated a drive of their own. They carried to the Falls five-yard line only to be halted by a stirring defensive stand by the Falcons. Schock then carried


for ten after River Falls gained possession. Cardinal streaked for another 20, Schock and Feiler blasted for short gains to the Platteville 38-yard line. Here Feiler powered his way through the line and literally exploded into the clear for the first score. The second quarter saw another Falcon offensive display, with Schock and Feiler accounting for most of the yardage. Gordy cut through tackle for the final eight yards and the Falcons had a 12-0 lead for the half. The final 30 minutes was played largely in mid-field as neither team could get rolling. Platteville fired pass after pass, but an alert secondary defense and a rushing Falcon line erased the temporary threat.

#### RIVER FALLS 27—SUPERIOR 18

After three consecutive conference wins the Falcons ran into their stiffest competition of the year in the Superior Yellowjackets. A courageous comeback enabled the hard-hitting Falcons to score a 27-18 triumph. Walter "Doc" West, Superior quarterback, uncorked a series of beautiful passes which gave the Yellowjackets two first period tallies. Swept off their feet by the Superior aerial game, River





Falls couldn't get going until the second period. After the second Superior score, Gene Cardinal and Gordon Schock carried 60 yards in three plays to give the fighting Falcons their first score. Cardinal streaked 28 yards for the big six points. Another Superior threat was checked and the Falcons immediately drove 80 yards for the second T.D. Again Schock and Cardinal were the big guns in the drive. Gordon Olson scored the touchdown on a sneak over center. Cardinal's perfect placement gave the Falcons a 14-12 half-time lead. However, River Falls wasn't through yet, as they received the second half kick-off and promptly marched to their third counter. Schock blasted over the goal for the score after he, Cardinal and Feiler tore off the yardage. The Falcons turned to the air to account for their fourth score as Gordy Olson flipped a pay-off pass to end Nate DeLong. Superior came back on West's passes to score again, but this was the Falcon's game and the aroused locals scored an impressive 27-18 win over a worthy foe.

#### RIVER FALLS 7—EAU CLAIRE 13

The annual River Falls homecoming game saw the unbeaten Blugolds of Eau Claire smash headlong into the unbeaten Falcons of River Falls.


Played before the largest crowd ever to see a game at Ramer Field, the game was hard fought throughout, but Eau Claire scored in the last quarter to break a 7-7 tie and thus emerge the winner. A big and active Eau Claire line played havoc with the Falcon "T" and with the exception of Gordon Schock the River Falls backs had trouble getting anywhere. An early Eau Claire surge was halted short of the goal and play see-sawed back and forth until mid-way in the second period, when Harley Harkness heaved a beautiful aerial into the waiting arms of "Bunny" Cardinal who ran to score. The play covered 52 yards. The lead was short-lived, as Eau Claire took advantage of a fumbled punt to score just before the half ended. Gordon Schock injured a shoulder in the first-half play and was forced to leave the game. His departure meant the beginning of the end for the Falcons, as their offense failed to click without the explosive running of Schock. The Falcons battled valiantly, but Eau Claire's powerful line took its toll and finally fullback Bob Schaaf was sprung loose for 52 yards and the winning touchdown.

### RIVER FALLS 13—LA CROSSE 39

Obviously down after suffering the heartbreaking defeat to Eau Claire, the River Falls Falcons fell before a vengeful La Crosse eleven 39-13 at La Crosse. Again the old injury jinx cropped out and the Falcons manpower was seriously limited. The game began badly for River Falls, as La Crosse blocked Cardinal's punt and recovered for a touchdown. Little Gene quickly righted that as he streaked around end for 66 yards for a score and added the point after to give the Falcons a 7-6 lead. However, this was the Indians' night and they really went on the warpath to grab a 19-7 half-time lead. Ace Loomis, Mirsch, Evans and Dohr led a powerful running game which shattered the sluggish Falcon line. River Falls rallied in the second half to cut the margin to 19-13 as an Olson to DeLong pass resulted in a 20-yard scoring thrust. Another Falcon aerial offensive fell short and La Crosse broke loose for three touchdowns in the last quarter to swamp the Falls eleven 39-13.

### RIVER FALLS 13—GUSTAVUS ADOLPHUS 39

A stubborn but crippled Falcon team journeyed to St. Peter to meet the powerful Gusties and fell victim to the well-manned Minnesotans 39-13. The tricky, speedy Falcon "T" formation gave the Gusties considerable trouble, but River Falls with several players on the injury list, just couldn't muster the man-power to keep on even terms with Gustavus. Big, fast-moving Red Malcolm moved for yardage almost at will and personally accounted for three of the six Gustie touchdowns. Gene Cardinal made the first Falcon score in the first half and continued his fine play. Harley Harkness intercepted a wild Gustie pass late in the ball game and sped 30 yards for the final Falcon T.D. Meanwhile Gustavus pounded through and around the Falcons for six touchdowns, enabling them to emerge as 39-13 winners. The non-conference fray with Gustavus ended the college careers of end Dave Ruhsam, tackle Wayne Sinnen and guard "Butch" McCardle.



#### RIVER FALLS 68—Augsburg 42

A veteran Falcon basketball squad opened the 1948-49 cage season by trouncing an outclassed team from Augsburg College 68-42. River Falls rolled to a 32-20 half-time lead and the "Auggies" never threatened in the ragged contest. Big Nate DeLong meshed 15 points in the first half and added two in the second half to lead the scorers. Newmen Benson gave a brilliant exhibition of passing and shooting and shared scoring honors with DeLong and sharp-shooting Harry Gibbs. Captain Johnson led the Augsburg quint with 11 markers.

#### RIVER FALLS 59—STOUT 49

In the opening conference game of the season the defending champions, River Falls, edged Stout 59-49 on the Blue Devils' court. A tight zone defense failed to stop the Falcons, as DeLong hit for 19 points with Benson peppering the nets for 16 tallies. River Falls engineered a 33-23 half-time lead and controlled the game throughout. Nylund led Stout with 12 points.

#### RIVER FALLS 80—NEWBURG STUDIO 69

A visiting Newburg Studio team from Minneapolis found the great Nate DeLong too much to handle

and the giant scoring ace rippled the nets for a 42-point total to lead the Falcons to an easy 80-69 victory. Benson and Gibbs came up with excellent floor games and the final result was never in doubt. Lefty Gilleland, former Minnesota ace, led Newburgs with 17 points.

#### RIVER FALLS 68—EAU CLAIRE 57

The Blugolds from Eau Claire became the Falcons fourth straight victim, as the Falls team scored a neat 68-57 triumph. Four men did all the scoring for River Falls, as DeLong hit for 30, Benson slipped in 17, "Itch" Lindholm garnered 12, and Harry Gibbs added nine. Musolf, Emanuel and Proctor led the Eau Claire cagers who found it impossible to cope with the scoring antics of DeLong and Benson.

#### RIVER FALLS 48—ST. THOMAS 70

A blazing St. Thomas quint ran away from the Falcons on the "Tommies" floor to roll up an impressive 70-48 win. "Big Nate" kept River Falls in the contest for a time, but a well-balanced St. Thomas offensive surge gave the "Toms" a 42-25 half-time lead. DeLong tallied 25 points in the contest, which found him the only Falcon who could locate the basket. Bury, Mauer, and Shonka were the big guns for the "Tommies."

### RIVER FALLS 49—SUPERIOR 52

Ted MacGregor led a last minute Superior rally which enabled the Yellowjackets to eke out a 52-49 win over the Falcons. The game was close and hard fought throughout with neither team gaining a decisive lead. Again DeLong was the only Falcon able to score consistently, as the great center tossed in 26 points while his teammates were decidedly cold. Milt Krznarich and MacGregor sparked the Yellowjackets to the close triumph.


### RIVER FALLS 48—DULUTH 46

Brilliant Newmen Benson stole the ball and arched in a push shot in the last minute of the game to give River Falls a sweet 48-46 victory over the Duluth Branch of the University of Minnesota in a contest

### RIVER FALLS 62—GUSTAVUS ADOLPHUS 42

Back on their home court after a three game road trip, the River Falls Falcons trounced a rough "Gustie" team 62-42. The visitors used football tactics in trying to stop the high-powered Falls team, but it was to no avail, as DeLong shoved in 21 points, with Benson, Lindholm, and Gibbs tossing in 12, nine, and eight points respectively. No "Gustie" could garner more than nine markers against the tight Falcon defense.

Before retiring from the game, the blonde scoring ace had scored 26 points. Hot shooting "Benny" added 18 to the Falcons total with Lindholm getting nine in the last half. #### RIVER FALLS 63—MANKATO 56

The great scoring duo of DeLong and Benson kept the Red and White cagers in the lead, although Augsburg threatened several times. #### RIVER FALLS 62—PLATTEVILLE 58




Young and center Jim Bos were the Eau Claire hot-shots.

He had 15 points for the game while Henry Gibbs tossed in 16 to lead the Falcons. Haskins broke the Falcons' back with 24 counters.

#### RIVER FALLS 56—LA CROSSE 42

The champion River Falls cagers toyed with La Crosse as the Falcons won an easy 56-42 victory. The game meant nothing to either team as River Falls had already clinched their third straight conference championship. DeLong slipped 20 points through the net to lead both teams. "Itch" added 13 to the Falcons' total as the Falls ended the conference season with a 10 won 2 lost record.

#### RIVER FALLS 69—BELOIT 75

For the second consecutive year Beloit defeated the River Falls quintet for the right to represent Wisconsin in the NAIB tournament at Kansas City. This game was played at Stevens Point, and the fast-breaking Beloit "Golds" edged the Falcons 75-69. All-American Johnny Orr led the Mid-West Conference champs with 22 points while Ron Bontemps garnered 20. DeLong gave the Beloit boys all the trouble they wanted until he fouled out with three minutes remaining in the game. "Itch" Lindholm came through with a sparkling 20 point performance to tie Nate for high point honors. As was the case last year, the Falcons had trouble with the pressing defense used by Beloit.

#### RIVER FALLS 86—SUPERIOR 39

It was sweet revenge as the Falcons routed the Yellowjackets 86-39 in a game highlighting the annual River Falls Winter Carnival. Besides avenging the 52-49 defeat suffered earlier at Superior, the victory clinched at least a tie for the conference championship. The Yellowjackets made it close for awhile, but DeLong started on another of his scoring sprees and it was no stopping the red-hot Falls cagers. Nate connected for 37 points in this contest while Gibbs found the basket for 20 markers. Benson, Lindholm, and Most played their usual brilliant all-around game. Fine defensive play by the Falcons stopped the Superior offense cold.

### RIVER FALLS 59—SIOUX FALLS 40

In a game played at Spring Valley for the Falcon Fieldhouse Fund, the River Falls Falcons ended their regular season by trouncing Sioux Falls College of South Dakota 59-40. It was no contest as the South Dakotans were completely outclassed by the veteran Falcons. Jerry Healy, a member of the 1947-48 Falcon squad, gave a good account of himself as starting center for the Sioux Falls cagers. DeLong and Benson paced the River Falls team, as they have done all season.

### RIVER FALLS 64—IOWA STATE TEACHERS 65

Receiving a last minute invitation to play in the NAIB tournament at Kansas City, the Falcons drew

Iowa State Teachers, a team they had previously defeated, as their first opponent. The great Nate DeLong was never better as he led the Falcons to a 37-31 half-time lead. However, the Iowa boys played very aggressive ball, and the lead changed continuously during the last half. DeLong fouled out with 11 minutes remaining after tallying 29 points. Despite the loss of their great scorer, the Falcons battled furiously and led 64-61 with a minute remaining. Van Combs, a hot-shooting Iowa guard, cut the margin to 64-63, and as the Falls attempted to stall the remaining seconds Iowa stole the ball and went ahead 65-64. River Falls missed a free throw with 11 seconds left and that was the ball game.

Track was added to the River Falls Falcons' athletic program this past spring and Coach George Schlagenhauf's thin-clads made an impressive debut, placing well in several invitational meets and finishing fourth in the state meet at Milwaukee.


The Falcons were paced by Wayne "Pete" LaBorde, former Fond du Lac high school prep ace, who scored 39 points out of the total of 129 tallied by the Falcons during the season. At the state track meet "Pete" tied a conference record by racing the 120-yard high hurdles in 15.7 seconds. In addition to this record-breaking performance LaBorde placed fourth in the 220-yard low hurdles and second in the high jump. Other team members who placed at the state meet were: Jim Van Tatenhove, third in the mile event; Gordon Schock, fourth in the 100-yard dash; Lyle Levenick, second in the discus; and the 880-yard relay team finished third in their specialty. In all the Falcons amassed a total of 22½ points in the state meet, a total which placed them behind the host school, Milwaukee, with 83½ points, LaCrosse with 71¼ points, and Oshkosh with 28¾ points.

In addition to their state meet performance, the River Falls inaugural track team competed in several invitational meets, Winona, Mankato, and St. Thomas. The Falcons won the Winona event as they outscored Winona and Eau Claire teams.

Track and field made an auspicious start in the athletic program and the sport promises to be a very popular one in the future. Coach Schlagenhauf has several lettermen returning for the 1949 season and prospects look good for another creditable team.


## Basketball
