LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL.

To His Excellency, EDWARD SCOFIELD,
Governor of Wisconsin:

The Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture is pleased to herewith submit its first biennial report.

The Board commenced its work under circumstances of a very trying nature. We were absolutely without funds, and the arrangements for the State Fair of 1898 were inaugurated and carried on to completion entirely upon a credit basis, the Board receiving generous consideration whenever asked. The public, to a certain extent, hesitated to give a cordial endorsement of the new management of the State Fair until satisfied of its purposes and aims. And our organization largely unaccustomed to fair work, especially of the extent and character of that confronting it, lacked the assurance that comes from experience and confidence.

We have no reasons for dissatisfaction with the results of the fair, mistakes were made, but these can in the future be avoided.

The weather was unpropitious as at times it must be. But our exhibits were excellent, being uniformly of a high character with no notably weak department, and exhibitors seemed satisfied with treatment received.

The attendance during the early days of the fair was completely satisfactory, and but for unfavorable weather, would undoubtedly have continued so to the end.

The Board is encouraged by the result of its past year's work, we feel that we have demonstrated that we are entitled to the loyal support of the people of the state, and that a State Fair judiciously and honestly run can be made a financial success.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION AND BY-LAWS.

The Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture is created and its organization defined by Chapter 301, Laws of Wisconsin for 1897, which reads as follows:

Section 1. The Department of Agriculture, for the promotion of agriculture, dairying, horticulture, manufactures and the domestic arts, is hereby created, and shall be managed by a board to be styled the Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture to consist of twelve members to be appointed by the Governor of this State, one from each congressional district of the State and two at large, and at least one-third of said board shall be appointed from a different political party than the remainder of said board.

The members of said board shall hold office for a term of three years, except that four of the members first appointed shall hold office for one year, four for two years, and four for three years, from the first day of January, A. D. 1898, the governor at the time of appointment to designate the term for which each member is to serve.

The members of the Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture shall enter upon the duties of their office on the first day of January in each year, and shall hold office as hereinbefore provided, and the governor shall fill any vacancy for the remainder of such unexpired term.

Members of the state board shall serve without salary, but shall receive payment of actual traveling expenses incurred while in the performance of their duties.

Section 2. The state board shall hold its first annual meeting on the first day of June, 1898, and thereafter such annual meetings shall be held on the first Tuesday of March of each year. At each such annual meeting the state board shall elect one of its number president, and one as vice president of said board, who shall perform such duties as usually pertain to such offices.

Section 3. The state board shall annually elect some person, not a member of said board, as secretary thereof, who shall hold his office for a period of one year, unless he shall be sooner removed by the said board.

Section 4. The treasurer of the state of Wisconsin shall be treasurer ex-officio of said state board.

Section 5. The state board shall keep an office for the transaction of

business in such rooms in the capitol in Madison as may be assigned by the governor.

Section 6. The State Board of Agriculture shall have the sole control of the affairs of the department of agriculture, and of all state fairs, and may make such by-laws, rules and regulations in relation to the department of agriculture, and the management of the business of such department in said fairs, and the offering of the premiums, as a majority of said state board shall from time to time determine, not inconsistent with the constitution or law of this state, or of the United States.

Section 7. Whatever money shall be appropriated to the department of agriculture or come to it from any other source, shall be paid to the state treasurer, and paid out on the order of the State Board of Agriculture, and may be expended by it as in the opinion of said board will best advance the interests of agriculture, dairying, horticulture, manufactures and the domestic arts in this state; provided, however, that no officer, clerk or employee of the said state board of agriculture shall have any claim upon the state of Wisconsin for any salary or expenses, except such as may be allowed by said board and paid from any appropriation or funds under its control; provided, however, further, the state of Wisconsin shall not in any manner whatever be liable for any debt, contract or obligation incurred by said board.

Section 8. The state board of agriculture shall make and deliver to the governor of the state, a report of its actions and doings once in two years, on or before the first day of December, next preceding the regular session of the legislature, and the secretary of state shall forthwith print five thousand copies of said report.

Section 9. All annual appropriations heretofore made to the Wisconsin State Agricultural Society shall from and after the passage of this act, be paid to the state board of agriculture, and the said state board of agriculture shall be furnished with stationery, etc., the same as is now furnished to the Wisconsin State Agricultural Society.

Section 10. All act or parts of acts contravening the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.

Section 11. This act shall take effect and be in force on and after January 1st, 1898.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the board, call special meetings, upon the written application of one-third of the members of the board, and have general supervision of the affairs of the board, and shall countersign all orders drawn by the secretary for the payment of money.

2. The vice president shall in the absence or inability of the president perform all the duties of that officer.

3. The secretary shall act under the direction of the board, and it shall be his duty to record the proceedings of all meetings of the board, take charge of all papers or documents pertaining to the business of the board, attend to all correspondence and transmittal by mail of business required in the work of his office.

He shall draw all orders on the treasurer for the payment of money, keeping a full and complete list of all orders drawn, stating to whom, for what purpose, and the amount thereof.

He shall attend to the preparation of premium lists ordered by the board and arrange all other books or material required for the running of state affairs.

He shall submit to the board at its annual meeting in each year, a report of all orders drawn upon the treasurer by him, in favor of whom, for what purpose, and the amount thereof.

He shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by the board.

The salary of the secretary shall be \$1,200, payable in monthly payments at the end of each month.

4. The treasurer shall receive and hold all moneys belonging to the board, keeping the same in a separate fund, and pay out the same only upon orders drawn by the secretary, and countersigned by the president of the board.

He shall in person or by deputy, establish an office upon the fair grounds during each annual fair held by the board, and under the direction of the board arrange for the sale of all tickets of admission to the grounds or grand stand.

Ticket sellers shall be under his direction and accountable to him.

He shall render a full report to the board at its annual meeting in each year, of all moneys received by him, and the amount paid out upon orders, which report in connection with that of the secretary, shall at that time be duly audited by the board, and from time to time, as required by the board, report the amount of funds in his possession belonging to the board.

5. At the annual meeting in March of each year, the board shall elect three members, who in conjunction with the president and vice president shall constitute a board of managers.

The board of managers shall be charged with the carrying out in detail all affairs provided for by the board at its regular or special meetings, have general oversight and direction of the annual fair, during its progress, and at its close shall settle all bills, arrange for payment of premiums, and settle with the various officers of the fair. It shall also from time to time consider and allow or disallow all bills

for expenses and services not regulated and provided for by the rules of the board.

It shall render a report of its transactions to the board at its annual meeting in each year.

Special meetings of the board of managers shall be called by the president at his discretion.

OFFICERS OF THE FAIR.

6. The state board of agriculturé shall at its annual meeting in each year arrange for the holding of its annual fair, by the preparation of a premium list, arrangements for advertising, and obtaining all necessary books, blanks, tickets, etc., needed in operating its fair. It shall also elect the following officers to hold their positions during the arrangements for and holding of the annual fair in that year:

A Marshal, a Superintendent of Gates, a Superintendent of Forage, a Superintendent of Transportation, a Superintendent of Privileges, and superintendents of the several departments classified in the premium list.

These supernitendents shall be chosen on account of fitness for the several positions and may or may not be members of the board.

They shall each receive five dollars per day as compensation for their services during the time they may serve the board.

Each superintendent shall be entitled to one assistant, and the marshal to two assistants, and the compensation of assistants is fixed at \$3.50 per day.

The employment of clerks and other helpers, and the fixing of their compensation shall be left with the board of managers.

7. The Marshal shall arrange for and have charge of all police, under the direction of the board of managers.

It shall be his duty to see that order is preserved, that the rules of the board are enforced, and he shall aid the superintendents and judges in live stock departments in their work.

He shall at close of fair render a report to board of managers, showing the number of police employed, their names, and the amount paid each for service.

8. The Superintendent of Gates shall have direct charge and oversight of all gate keepers, and see that their work is properly done, in accordance with directions of the board of managers. He shall, at close of fair, render a report to the board of managers, giving the names, time of service, and amount paid each for service.

9. The Superintendent of Forage shall purchase all needed hay, straw, and grain at prices most advantageous possible to the board

and sell the same to exhibitors for cash at such prices as will make the department simply self supporting.

He shall keep books showing forage bought, of whom, and price paid, and also amount sold, to whom, and for what price, and at close of fair render his report, and turn over his books in settlement with board of managers.

10. The Superintendent of Transportation shall, under the direction of the board of managers, have sole charge of transferring exhibits from trains to places of exhibit, and at close of fair from places of exhibit to trains, and shall arrange such rates of transportation as to make the department simply self supporting.

He shall keep books showing cost of teams and labor employed: also amounts received, when and from whom, for services rendered, and at close of fair, shall submit his report and turn over his books to the board of managers, in settlement.

11. The Superintendent of Privileges shall have charge of all grounds or space set apart by the board of managers for rent during the fair, and by it platted and appraised; and shall rent such space or grounds to persons requiring the same for purposes approved by the board.

He shall keep a record of all lots or spaces rented, to whom, for what purpose, and the amount received in payment for the same.

All space shall be rented for cash, in advance.

He shall submit his report, with books kept, to the board of managers, in settlement at close of fair.

12. The Superintendent of Speed shall have charge of all track exhibits of speed or otherwise.

He shall, in consultation with the board of managers, arrange purses to be offered for races, the aggregate amount to be offered having been first fixed by the board of agriculture.

He is also authorized to expend such an amount as the board may direct in the advertising and promotion of the interests of his department.

He shall, under the direction of the board of managers, have charge of speed barns, at time of fair, and attend to collection of rent for stalls therein; and at close of fair render a full statement of receipts and expenditures of his department, to the board of managers.

13. The remaining superintendents shall have charge of their respective departments, the arrangement of exhibits, and the presentation of the same to judges for award of premiums.

They shall render a report in writing, of their several departments, during the fair, with such recommendations as they may deem proper, to the board at its annual meeting.

14. Judges of the several departments shall be selected by the super-

intendents of the respective departments and the board of managers, such judges being appointed in season for publication of names in premium list.

15. At all meetings of the board of which the members have had five days' notice, seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a less number may adjourn to a stated time.

Three members of the board of managers shall constitute a quorum, all members having first been given two days' notice of meeting.

16. The articles may be amended or repealed at any regular meeting of the board of agriculture, by a two-thirds vote of the board.

During the two days of good weather we had an average of 12 starters with an average of $4\frac{1}{2}$ heats to each race and every heat below 2:20. The September meetings were financial failures all over the country. Therefore it is gratifying to report that our two days' races cost the association less than \$700 and had it not rained Thursday, the grand stand receipts would have paid the expense of the entire meeting. I was in favor of getting special attractions, but the past season did not produce anything sensational enough to attract a crowd. I would recommend to my successor that the association join the Grand Western Circuit and offer large purses providing we secure dates not in conflict with other members. Should stakes be offered, make the nominations transferable thereby securing more starters and better races.

I would also call your attention to the grand stand which, in my opinion, has never been properly handled. First, there should be competent gatemen and ticket sellers. Second, there should be a statement of each day's receipts, for if this department is to be charged up with the entire shortage of the fair then it should get credit for the receipts of the grand stand.

I would also recommend that the track be rented to some reputable horseman (subject to the control of the board and their rules) so that the horsemen from the state would come and train their horses during the season. This should be done for several reasons. First, it would keep the track in first class condition without expense to the association. Second, it would keep a larger number of horses in training and swell the entry list at the fair meeting. Third, it would be a source of revenue in place of expense. Our track is naturally very fast, but it has never been in proper shape for harness racing owing to lack of work previous to fair week, and there is not sufficient water available in case of dry weather to put the track in proper shape for fast work. In closing I wish to add that the superintendent of this department should be a resident of Milwaukee or some place adjacent to the grounds, as there are many things that come up during the year that require his attention, and besides it would be much easier for him to keep in touch with horsemen in large centers.

Thanking you for the universal good will and hearty co-operation the state board has given me in the past, I respectfully request that you assign me the most subordinate position within your gift and relieve me of a task I have held the past four years against my judgment. I would have resigned the past year had it not been against the wishes of his Excellency Governor Scofield and your Honorable body, for I feel that I can no longer spend the time, energy and money necessary to make the department a success. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DEPARTMENT A.

Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture.

Gentlemen—I have the honor to herewith present my report of Department A for the year 1898.

The exhibit of horses at this year's State Fair was very satisfactory. Not only were the entries in numbers equal to any in recent years, but in point of quality no fair exhibit in the state was ever better. I am pleased to report that most of the classes were fairly well filled and some crowded, and the contest for honors was a close one. Among the many exhibitors in my department I am pleased to mention C. E. Clark of St. Cloud, Minn., with a large exhibit of Clydesdales, and McLay Bros. of Janesville, Wis., also exhibiting Clydesdales. Without question these two exhibitors have strings of horses equal to any in the country.

H. A. Briggs of Elkhorn was the largest exhibitor of Percherons, and showed a fine line of stock. Fred Soper of Ripon, Wis., Moffat Bros. of Paw Paw, Ill., and W. J. Pierce of Dodgeville, Wis., also made creditable showings.

In the Coach, Roadster and Pony classes I am pleased to mention the names of August Uihlein of Milwaukee, C. M. Clark of Whitewater, Geo. Harding & Son, Waukesha, Frank R. Pierce, W. E. King, John Smith, Jr., Geo. Brew, George McKerrow, Alex. Galbraith, John Sleep, C. E. Baker, Chas. Hill,

Geo. F. Carroll, Samuel Breese & Son, W. T. Pilgrim, Thos. Edwards, David Morris, Geo. Troutwein, A. Wardell and Robt. Barlass, all of Wisconsin, and C. E. Cook & Son of Illinois.

There was a greater variety of breeds shown than usual, and new additional classes were opened for grade horses, designed for the benefit of the farmer rather than the large breeder.

I am sorry to say that this classification failed to be satisfactory, and I am inclined to think that if this classification is continued, it will be necessary to protect it by more stringent rules against those interested in professional breeding.

I am not in favor of giving up the attempt made by the board in the interests of the farmer breeder.

The judging was done by Mr. Griffith Richards of Racine, Wis., and I think very general satisfaction was given.

In conclusion, I wish to call the attention of the board to the necessity of grading a one-fourth mile ring, in front of stables for the exhibition especially of roadsters and saddlers, also the arrangement of seats for the benefit of those who wish to witness the exhibition of horses in the ring when being judged.

With these improvements it seems to me one of the most interesting features of our fairs would become more fully patronized than it is reasonable to expect under present conditions.

I desire to extend my thanks to all exhibitors and horse men in my department, for the generous and courteous treatment received from them during the Fair of 1898. I was ably assisted in my work by H. S. Weil, Assistant Superintendent.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DEPT. B.

Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture.

Gentlemen—I have the pleasure of presenting to you my report as Superintendent of Department B, Wisconsin State Fair of 1898. Never before has a larger or better display of cattle been seen at a Wisconsin Fair. The show of Jerseys and Hol-

steins was very fine, and I believe as good as was ever before seen at any show ring in the United States.

I would recommend to the board the erection of a suitable pavilion with proper seating capacity, same to be used in making awards. Such a building would exclude from the show ring the hot sun and storms, and add greatly to the comfort of the public and the exhibitor.

I am of the opinion that we shall need more stall room in the near future, as we were forced to make use of several vacant stalls in horse barns during last Fair. This is a matter, however, that can be left until other improvements that are perhaps more necessary are made.

Some kind of pavement in front of stock barns is very necessary. The nature of the soil, together with continuous travel of people, stock and vehicles, often produces very undesirable conditions.

Another most necessary improvement would be some kind of metal or iron water tanks. Those now in use shrink badly during the long time not in use and it is almost impossible to tighten them sufficiently to hold water. The result is an insufficient supply of water and a bad mud-hole about each tank. We have been obliged in the past to resort to the use of shorts in order to check the leakage, and in such cases many of the animals refuse to drink the water, thus causing much dissatisfaction among exhibitors.

I sincerely hope the state board will be in position to soon consider these improvements.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DEPT. C.

Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture.

Gentlemen—There is not much to be said in report of my department. There was a good exhibit. The entries, however, would have been more numerous but for the fact that some of

our largest breeders and exhibitors were holding off and resting their flocks for the great battle at Omaha.

I met these men at the western show and expressed my regret at not having them with us during our late Fair. They all said, "We will be at the Wisconsin Fair in 1899 in full strength."

The many who were with us this year spoke highly of the treatment accorded them by the board, and were well pleased with the management of the Fair. General satisfaction was expressed with Prof. Shaw's work as judge. His method of handling sheep, his explanations, and unbiased decisions won the respect and confidence of all.

I desire to compliment the state university exhibit of experimental sheep as being of very high quality. They were well shown, and the shepherd in charge was most efficient.

I would recommend to the board the erection of a suitable building with proper seating capacity for use in making awards in the sheep department. Such a building would facilitate matters very greatly and bring more closely to the public the lessons to be derived from a battle for supremacy among the great flocks of America. A crowded show ring in the hot sun is not an inviting place. If we could arrange more comfort for the public in this respect the lessons to be learned at the ring side would be much more closely studied.

I also recommend that premium list for sheep be revised so as to make it more attractive to all breeders and exhibitors.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DEPT. G.

Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture.

Gentlemen—The large and creditable display of dairy products should be ample assurance that the dairymen of Wisconsin fully appreciate the action of the State Board of Agriculture, in increasing the money award for this department, and changing the awarding of premiums to the pro rata system, which more evenly and justly distributes the money offered among all the exhibitors whose products are of a high merit.

But it is to be regretted that the dairy implement manufactories did not make a better exhibit; there are several reasons given for this want of interest, which no doubt will never happen again, as several firms have already written they will exhibit at the next Fair.

The Wisconsin Dairy School, under the supervision of Prof. W. A. Henry, made a very fine display of butter, cheese, and pasteurized cream and milk, showing the different style of packages made and used; also, some pictures of the students at their work, all of which served to give a good illustration of the instruction given at the Dairy School. Nothing in this exhibit was entered for a prize, and was in charge of Prof. E. H. Farrington, who also kindly acted as assistant superintendent of this department and rendered very efficient service.

In the creamery butter class there were 63 entries, 58 of

which scored above the minimum of 90 points, and the two hundred dollars offered was pro rated among the 58 exhibitors. The highest score was $96\frac{1}{2}$ points, which received \$7.67 in cash, one calometer, offered by Cornish, Curtis & Green, and a gold medal to maker, by Wells, Richardson & Co.

In the dairy butter class there were 24 entries, 21 of which scored about the minimum of 88 points. The one hundred and twenty-five dollars offered in this class was pro rated to the 21 exhibitors. The highest score was $95\frac{1}{2}$ points, which received in cash \$10.73, a 4-bottle Babcock milk tester, offered by Cornish, Curtis & Green of Fort Atkinson, Wis., and a \$15.00 gold watch from the Worcester Salt Co. of New York.

In print butter there were 15 entries, 13 of which scored over 88 points. In granulated butter there were 15 entries; in the class of butter of novel forms there was but one entry, which was awarded the first prize of \$10.00.

In Cheddar cheese there were 13 entries, of which 6 scored over the minimum of 90 points. The highest score was 96 points, which was awarded \$25.00; the lowest scored 91 points and was awarded \$5.00. In Flats there were 28 entries, 18 of which scored over the minimum. The highest score was 98 points, and was awarded \$16.39. The lowest score was 91 points, and was awarded \$1.49. In Young Americas there were 5 entries, and three scored over 90 points; the highest scored above the minimum of 88 points. The one hundred and points, and was awarded \$5.85.

In Brick cheese there were 5 entries, and three scored over 90 points; the highest drew \$15.00, scoring 97, and the lowest \$3.32, scoring 92 points. In Swiss cheese there were only 3 entries. One scored over 90 points, and was awarded \$15.00 on a score of 97 points.

Total number of entries for regular premiums, 171.

Total number of entries for special premiums, 114.

Total amount of premiums awarded, \$614.67.

Total special premiums awarded were:

Three gold medals by Wells, Richardson & Co., Burlington, Vt.

Three gold watches by Worcester Salt Co., of New York.

Fifty dollars in money, divided into 3 prizes, by Vermont Farm Machine Co., of Bellows Falls, Vt.

One calometer and one four-bottle Babcock milk tester by Cornish, Curtis & Green, of Fort Atkinson, Wis.

Total number of exhibitors that were awarded premiums, 121.

All the exhibits were sold or reshipped, according to the instruction received from the exhibitors, the next day after the Fair, so there were very few complaints. One firm in New York denied receiving a 60-pound tub of butter until the express company produced their receipt for it. Another party who shipped a 60-pound tub, on which was a tag to "State Fair Park, Milwaukee, Wis. Please sell and remit," with nothing else to designate whom or where it was from; this butter was sold and money held until November before a claim was put in for it. Another exhibitor wrote, "Ship to Nelson & Co." This firm name was doubtless a very familiar one to the party dealing with them, but the superintendent had no means of knowing where this Nelson & Co. was doing business.

Such oversights on the part of exhibitors were exceptions, but as they do happen especial care should be taken to distinctly label or tag each package, and write to the superintendent stating plainly what disposition they wish him to make of their exhibit.

In the creamery butter exhibit there were two points which were particularly noticeable.

First. There was a surprising amount of mottles in the butter when it was examined as critically as exhibition butter should be, and was by the judge. By pressing the finger along the tryer of butter, a mottled or wavy surface was shown in altogether too many packages.

This wavy appearance of the butter can be worked out, and many of the scores would have been a point or two higher if the butter had been worked so as to give it a solid, even color. The surest way to do this is to work the butter more than once and let it stand in a cool place between workings.

Second. The style and neatness of the packages was uniformly commendable. The tubs were clean, hoops in good shape, covers fastened well, and the top of the butter under the cover was neatly finished.

Creamery butter was sold at from 19 to 20 cents per pound, and cheese at 8 cents.

I am sorry to say the judge of cheese neglected to write any special defect in the score cards, which should have been done as a matter of instruction to the exhibitor.

Dairying is one of Wisconsin's greatest industries and I believe the board would be warranted in still increasing the money awards of this department, continuing the pro rata plan of awards, but have one sweepstake prize in each class and the winner of this prize not to be entitled to any of the money offered in the pro rata classes.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF ART DEPARTMENT.

Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture.

Gentlemen—Early in the spring I corresponded with artists and exhibitors at former fairs. When premium list was issued, the secretary kindly furnished me with one thousand slips of the premiums offered in the art department. The exhibit in this department this year was, I think, equal if not better, than any former fair. The exhibitors were well pleased and everything seemed satisfactory. To show the business of this department, I give the figures for several years past, viz.:

The display in fine art (paintings in oil and water colors) was larger and better than ever before, the pictures being of a finer grade and many original. The Art classes of Milwaukee have taken a great deal of interest this year, and, if called on, they will help and add much to the attraction in this department. The itemized bill of expenses has been given to Secretary Everett, who has the same on file.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

There should be more judges. Three judges one day will cost no more than one judge three days, and it will give better satisfaction if there are different judges in the classes.

The matter of helpers should be left to the superintendent so

as to have more help the first and last day, and less the other days, as the exhibits in this department are all small goods and the utmost care has to be taken to see that everything goes to the right owner. Your superintendent doubts the good of a premium on collection or sweepstakes in this department. The same amount of money offered in additional premiums would, I think give better satisfaction. The clerk who has the books of this department should be in the building during the fair, as there are constantly questions that refer to entries and much trouble can be saved by having the books there. A rule should be made that no goods would be received that are not tagged. Many come in with an armful or even trunk of goods, put them up without a tag and then go and leave them, and the next day send the tags in a bunch to the superintendent with the request he put them on.

Another. Superintendents will do all they can to help in every way, but exhibitors must attend to the placing their own display or pay for having it done.

Articles and pictures should be classified, and the board should furnish the superintendent printed cards before the fair, with names and number of collection. These cards would be good for several years. All exhibits in this department should be confined to residents of Wisconsin. A class for old ladies' work would be quite attractive, and many articles will be exhibited in such a class.

The children's department has not been very successful, and should be dropped, as there have been but few entries.

BUILDING.

The building (Art hall) should be painted inside a dull color, (or calsomined). The roof leaks in a number of places and should be attended to before the next fair. If it were possible to enlarge the hall, it should be done, as it has been crowded for three years past. If this cannot be done, a partition should be built over the China case which would give back ground for many more pictures, and might do. This building is certainly one of the most attractive on the grounds, as seen by the report is self sustaining as to running expenses. If the board should have the superintendent of this building send in statement in June of

what is needed, the board could act on it and have everything ready before the fair. At the close of fair, there were quite a number of articles uncalled for. Our department was kept open all day Saturday, and at night all articles uncalled for were turned over to the secretary's office, I getting a receipt for the same, and I think everything has been returned before this date.

REPORT OF PRESS AGENT.

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 23, 1898.

Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture.

Gentlemen—I desire to report to your honorable body that as your press agent, I have caused to be inserted in Milwaukee newspapers display advertising for the state fair aggregating a total of 574 inches of space, had it all been published at one time in one newspaper. It has been published in the various papers of Milwaukee and distributed to the best of my judgment, always having in view the benefits likely to be derived from the expenditure contracted.

The total gross cost of this advertising, at rates agreed upon is \$542.25. In accordance with my instructions, I set out to keep the expense within \$500. The space which I could use daily was carefully scheduled at the start and Thursday morning was reached with the schedule unbroken. The rain Thursday changed conditions and seemed to justify and necessitate a little swelling of expense in the hope to make Friday's fair result satisfactory. I assumed the responsibility to meet the seeming exigencies of the situation, full of faith that results would justify the means. Upon this you are to judge.

Friday morning, the advertising having been finished, I visited the various newspaper offices to obtain their bills. Notwithstanding the fact that most of the Milwaukee newspaper publishers had, at the outset, given a reduced rate for the State Fair advertising, I appealed to the patriotism of the publishers for a special reduction, because the rain of Thursday had enforced a reduction in State Fair receipts.

The result of this appeal was the securing of a net reduction upon all of the bills of \$119.98, leaving the net amount of advertising bills payable, on account of my placing the work, of \$442.27. With but one exception, The Milwaukee Journal, the publishers appealed to cheerfully granted the reductions requested.

It is but just to state that all of the Milwaukee newspapers have been most generous in their gratuitous support of the State

Fair. Their daily reports have been most full, fair and encouraging. Their advance work was equally commendable.

Of those dailies having weekly issues in connection, Mr. Aiken, of The Evening Wisconsin Company, cheerfully gave space for nearly a column advance writeup in his weekly and published the same matter in a large number of other papers throughout the state which are partly printed in The Wisconsin office. Mr. Huegin, manager of The Sentinel, gave an extensive writeup in his weekly as well as a full two column display advertisement. Mr. Boyd, manager of The Journal, kindly consented to give a quarter column of reading matter in his weekly. For these contributions of space I furnished copy.


While it will be regarded as a most generous act on the part of the various publishers to have reduced the aggregate of their bills in the sum of \$119.98, in aid of your efforts to establish a genuine agricultural Fair, with its home at Milwaukee, it is also safe to assume full assurance that their action and efforts are no over-representation of the general sentiment of the good citizens of Milwaukee. Not only the newspapers of the city, but the business men and the citizens as a whole, are in most hearty sympathy with the work in which your board is engaged, the establishing of a genuine Farmers' Agricultural State Fair to be held every year at Milwaukee.

It is my belief that had I asked these generous-hearted publishers of Milwaukee newspapers to contribute another 25 per cent. of their bills, fairly earned, to your board, in the interest of the State Fair, they would have granted the request. But I had not the heart to ask it.
