I do not think Mrs. Brown desires union regardless of what she says, she thinks it is a popular demand and she desires it to appear that we are not willing to unite. I am inclined to think it would be fun to accept their terms and unite and then we could easily control the next convention. What do you think about it? Mrs. Brown does not think we will accept their terms. Have a meeting as soon as possible and let me know the verdict. What shall we do about the convention?

I am enclosing a letter from Mrs. Stewart thinking possibly y you san get copies of our letters at the office, I think they are in one of the drawers or the file.

I f lled those orders for literature you sent me. You did not say whatyou thought of my proposal to cancel the thirty-seven dollars due me.

I wish you were up here and we could have a heart to heart talk. I had a letter from Misss/ Shaw and she thinks we waught to introduce a bill in this legislature.

Well I must get letters off to Mrs. Youmans and Miss Sames I will also write to Mrs. Morris, but will leave mrs. Lyman and the others to you.

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### POLITICAL BOUALITY LEAGUE OF SISCORSIN

MILWAUKEE WIS. Jan. 12, 1913

To the officers and members of the Wisconsin Woman's Suffrage Ass'n:

Dear Fellow Buffragists,

On Saturday, Jan. 11, 1913 a meeting of the Board of the Political Equality League was held in Milwaukee to consider the proposal for union outlined in your letter of Jan. 4 to our Fresident. Miss Ada James. The following conclusions were reached unanimously by the members of the Board present.

We a ppreciate the spirit of fairness manifested in your suggestion that the two existing societies be equally represented on the Board of the future organization, but we believe that no real union would be accomplished in this way, since the action of this new Board would be continually hampered by the thought in each members mind that she must be loyal to the organization hat elected her to effice.

We understand and sympathize with your desire to preserve the identity and continuity of your organization in homor of its splendid traditions, and we are therefore willing, as stated before, to lave a tacit understanding among us that the new organization shall adopt the name, "WISCONSIN WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION". For the same consideratio we are glad to have a similiar tacit understanding in regard to your retiring President, the Nev. Olympia Brown being made Ponery President of the new organization.

These you will realise are important consessions on the part of the P.W.L. which we was glad to make to your lider society, without asking any equivalent consessions from you. But it is our unanimous judgment that a formal dissolution of both societies is absolutely assential to the harmonious and effective work of the future organisation

Our final proposition for union, therefore is this:The W.W.S.A. and the P.B.L. shall formally dissolve. A mass meeting shal then be held to which all suffragists in the State shall be welcome d, for the purpose of forming a new State Suffrage organization. The constitution of the new organization, the election of officers, and all questions of future policy and method shall be left in the hands of this body. Every person taking part shall have one vote, and shall act as a citizen of Wisconsin interested in Woman Sufrage, not as a member or delegate of any organization. The only limitation when the action of this body shall be the tacit understanding that neither Wrs. Brown nor Miss Willis nor Miss James norWrs Benedict shall be active officers, the Mrs. Brown shall be elected Honary President, and that the name of the organization shall be "THE FISCONSIN WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION"

With the sarnest hope that you will agr e with us as to the wisdom of this plan, and that we may work together harmoniously for suffrage, we are

Orystal Bastman Benedict Acting Secretary Dear Miss Shaw; -

Anticipating the "hundreds of questions " you say you would like to ask me, here are the answers at least to some of them.

I am also enclosing copies of some of the letters that have passed between the W.W.S.A. amd us since last I wrote to you.

Mrs. Brown through the Citizen and other channels has continually bewailed the fact that there were two organizations which as she said were "duplicating the work and doubling the expense." Letters were received by us from people who knew nothing of the histories of the two organizations, urging us to unite.

November 7th Mrs. Benedict and I sent Mrs. Brown the enclose letter (this was two days after election and three days before the W.W.S.A. convention) I told Crystal I was sure she would not bring our letter before the convention. In order to let the people generally know we had this letter we ran off on the mimeograph copies whichwe sent to all the chairmen and W. .S.A. officers.

November 10th I received the enclosed reply from Mrs. Brown refusing to present our letter. (Mrs. Chynoweth of Madison said all she said in the letter to which Mrs. Brown refers wasthat she hoped the might be one organization in he State.)

The women who went to the W.W.S.A. convention (I was told there were 38 at the convention) brought our letter to Mrs. Brown before the convention. Mrs. Brown was very angry and said that Mrs. Benedict and I were tricky, and that we were planing to get a high salary for Mrs. Benedict. Well our letter proved a bomb in the convention. Mrs. Brown resigned and Miss Stearns was elected president. (Miss Stearns was not present and really knows very little of the situation)

Nov. 13th I received the letter (see enclosed copy) inviting u to unite with them accepting their name, officers and constitution.

Instead f replying to this letter I went to Madison and proposed to Miss Stearns that we call a convention of all the suffragists in the Sta te, includint the College League and the Mens League, and that all the presidents be asked to sign the call. At this convention we would adopt name constitution and officers, as far as the name was concerned I felt sure all would be ""tly willing to accept the name

Wisconsin Womanes Suffrage Association, however to make it representative we must elect new officers and virtually make it a new organization under the old name and charter. Miss Stearns fell in with this plan, but evidently had a talk with Mrs. Brown later, for she wrote that she did not think it was best to have reports from our county organizations, or in fact to have any reports or suggestions, she was elected upon a plat form that did not stand for salaried workers etc. It was apparent that Mrs. Brown was not willing our organization should report on work we had done or make recommendations for the future. There plan was to have speakers from abroad tell why we aught to have the ballot. I knew our Board would not agree to any such convention, we are tired to death of the arguments for suffrage what e want to know is how we are going to get it.

As soon as Mrs. Benedict returned we sent out a call for a State Board meeting, which was held in Milwaukee last Saturday.

Our Board meeting was held in the morning and Miss Stearns had telegraphed me to meet her there in the afternoon.

Our Boardvoted unanamously to form one organization under the following conditions:-

Discontinuation of W.W.S.A. and P.J.I.

Form new organization under name of W.W.S.A .

Neither Miss James, nor Mrs. Benedict, nor Mrs. Brown, nor Miss Willis to hold office, in the new organization.

That our National President be urged to attend the coming convention and confer with us.

That the convention consider business methods and be not inspir at halonly.

That County Organizations be recognized and permitted to re-

We also wish to have it known we stand for paid workers and automobile campaigns.

In the afternoon Mrs. Thanhouser and I met Miss Stearns and laid these conditions before her. Miss Stearns asked if they would be allowed as many delegates and we thought delegates must be apportioned according to members. We agreed to one delegate to every 20 members.

Miss Stearns says while she will agree to these conditions personally and do all she can to bring about the union, she will have t bring it before their Board. She is she could do this and let me

know very soon so I remained over Sunday. Sunday night she phoned me that Miss Williswas in New Yorkand could not re urn before Saturday. so she ould not let us know what their decision would be. However she said she was not at all optomistic, she said she did not believe they would go into a convention and let these questions come to a vote she said "Miss James, can't you see that the larger society would litterally swallow up the W.W.S.A.?" I replied "Miss Stearns it is simply agreeing to abide by the will of the majority, we are willing to take the name of the older society and leave the rest to a vote of the delegates, and if the W.W?S.A. refuses it is because they are undemocratic, insisting on a minority rule.

If they refuse these terms our plan is to call a State Convention, tell why we can not unite, and then forge shead.

We are undecided what to do about introducing a bill this winter, personally I am anxious to do so. There seems to be no doubt but that it will go through.

The most essential thing is to get a strong legal committee that will prosecute violations of the law and we also need to emplodetectives election day. There was crooked work done in Wisconsin at the polls.

What would you advise concerning introducing a bill?

Will it be possible for you to attend our convention if we hold it January22 and23 ? I think it is important that you should know our women and that they should know you. Whatever feeling there is against us and aga inst the National, aught to come out now.

There is much more I should like to tell you, but this is enough for the present.

It was extremely amicable and conciliatory. concessions were made on the part of those who wished to adhere to the old regime. Personally, I regret extremely that there should have been any conditions laid down from the outset, as I have found them extremely hard to meet. I have done the very best that I could with our organization to try to effect the proposed union. Neither Miss Willis nor Mrs. Brown was at our meeting, as Mrs. Brown is spending the winter in New York State, and Miss Willis could not return in time to attend, but I gave Miss Willis an account of the entire meeting before forwarding it to you, to which she has subscribed.

The plan of having a meeting of the Association rather than simply the Executive Board worked well with us and I am hoping that you will bring our letter before your League as a whole, or as many as you can reach through correspondence, as I think you will find a strong sentiment inffavor of uniting, and also in favor of making concessions if need be. We got our people together within a week, and also secured valuable opinions through correspondence, and I am hoping you will be able to hurry the matter along with your organization, so that we may know where we are "at", and may proceed to business. You know it was six weeks after our letter was sent your organization, in response to your first letter, before we had a reply.

We shall. therefore, greatly appreciate the favor of an early response.



Dear Miss James:-

I wrote you a little short note by hand the other day, as soon as I received your letter of January 1st., in order to tell you that I hoped you would not wait too long before getting your question resubmitted. I think the sooned we can keep up that fight and get it going the better, so as not to lose the enthusiasm and the work of the last campaign.

Now - am going to read through your nice long letter, which tells us so many things in regard to the Wisconsin work. I believe in harmony, but I don't believe in wasting one's whole life trying to get harmony rather than doing work, and I just from your letter in regard to the attitude of Mrs. Brown and her society, that that is about what they expect you to do, and if I were in your place I would not waste much time doing it. Since they refuse all reasonable co-operation, then I would go ahead and do my work the very best way I could without them. Primarily I believe it is better to work harmoniously together, but if you cannot work harmoniously together then the best way is to work harmoniously apart, and that seems to be the kind of harmony you will have to work for in Wisconsin. You certainly did take a great deal of pains to try to make things right, and I think it is a shame for any woman to try to keep up the old antagonism. Perhaps the request to keep the name the Wisconsin Woman Suffrage Association is reasonable, because I believe there is a good deal in what people call continuity of organized efforts, particularly we women who change our names on every possible occasion, but to have when they held their Convention, elect their officers and decide on what to do and then merely to give you the opportubity to join, is certainly not

co-operation. Anybody can join any suffrage association at any time, I suppose, but that does not mean co-operation.

I don't wonder that you are tired to death with arguments for suffrage. Sometimes I wish I could never hear any. I have been arguing it for forty years and there is not a new argument to-day. Every one of them worth while was made before I was born and we have only had to robe t them in varying and different words from that time, and I have the greatest possible sympathy with your desire to do something, rather than to hear about the thing that ought to be done.

I am very sorry that it will be impossible for me to attend a public meeting now, because my time is so filled that it would be impossible for me to get to you until March and you want to get to work before then, and I do hope that Miss Addams and Mrs. Bowen can come to you. I heard Mrs. Bowen speak in Chicago, only for a short time, however, but her speech was one of the fullest of real good meat that was worth while that I have ever heard, and if she can make such a good short speech I am sure she could make a better long one. She did not waste a single word, she did not say anything she ought not to have said and she tried to make the people see their personal responsibility in the matter. I liked it immensely.

I think I told you in my letter that if I called a State Convention, I would not say anything about why we could not unite, I would not mention the fact but go ahead as if yours was the only organization on earth and pay no attention to the other society. That would make less comment than if you were to explain matters. I have a little motto pasted on my desk at home which is "Never explain, your friends do not need it and your enemies don't believe you if you do, so don't waste time at it". I believe the most important thing is to get a strong local committee to watch the opposition. Michigan has literally been stolen from us by corrupt work and I have no doubt there was some corrupt work done in Wisconsin and we have got to meet that kind of work with the tools that will unearth it and expose it.

I agree with you that it is important that I should know the women personally and I should be glad to meet them . I hoped that last year then I went to Wisconsin for the campaign, I hoped that my first meeting in Wisconsin would be a gathering together in Milwaukee of the real workers at a public mass meeting and I must confess I was greatly disappointed that my work was not started that way. I think it would

have been of much more importance to the campaign and would have done a great deal more too. However, that is all passed and if we have to do it again we will do it in a different way.

In regard to Miss Wagner. I think Minnesota is a good place for her. She will meet a lot of congenial people there and I don't think she will be able to do any harm. These people, whom she will meet, are as bitter as she is and for about the same reasons. I don't think I should take any trouble to warn them, they know her and probably it is because they do know her that they want her and that she has gone there.

Let me hear from you when you decide what to do.



Will you kindly send me the exact wording of the clause in the Wisconsin Constitution or in the statutes, which bear upon the Suffrage amendment, and tell me also if the bill you are going to introduce this year will be in just the same form as that used in the last campaign?

We are making a new compilation of the method for submitting the Suffrage question in each one of the States and need exact information. I hope I am not seriously inconventioning you, but I do wish that you could send this information to me by return mail.

Our great haste is because we are getting out a schedule, which we want printed in the next issue of the "Woman's Journal" and else-where, showing the whole luffrage outlook over the country between now and 1980. It is very important for the press work that we get this schedule printed as soon as possible, for we are planning now a great Carnegie Hall meeting for the evening of Febrai 17th, it is going to be illustrated by slides showing every stage of Suffrage possibilities between now and 1980.

I am enclosing a copy of the amending of the Wisconsin Constitution taken from the last compilation available either in the New York Public Library or the New York University Law Library, also a copy of the "Woman's Journal" on the method

"Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the legislature and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendments or amendments shall be entered in their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published for three months previous to the time of holding such election; and if, in the legislature so next chosen, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people in such manner and at such a time as the legislature shall prescribe and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments by a majority of the electors voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution"

In a letter which has just appeared in the Woman's Journal rates for large contingents were offered at \$1.00 apiece a night without meals. This has proved to be too low an estimate for comfortable accommodations. These cannot be secured for less than \$2.00 apiece.

The Bureau of Social Requirements of this city, at 924 17th St., agrees to place large parties in comfortable dormitory accommodations at the rate of \$2.00 apiece a night, without meals.

If a large contingent is planning to come from your locality could you let me know as soon as possible and just how large the number of people will be. Such parties will be located and comfortably housed at the rate mentioned above by the Bureau of Social Requirements.

There is still a considerable amount of board ing house accomodation for parties of two, four, eight and ten at rates ranging from \$1.00 up, without board.

So glad to get your letter. Glad to read what you wrote about the Socialists and have asked Mrs. Bloor to look in to things and give us all more information after she has been in Wisconsin. Mrs. Bloor is a good Socialist and a good suffragist and she ought to be able to help both of us. Yes men can resolute and endorse and do all kinds of things is but when it aquestion of beer or no beer then that makes a difference.

I was so glad that you said what you did about our Ohio workers and I have copied that little paragraph and sent it to the five women. It will do them good and it does us good. I was glad to have you say what you did about Helen Todd and Margaret Haley. I feel that Margaret Haley by disobeying orders really lost us one county. I do not think, now, that she meant to do it but she just got in a state of mind and knew only Cincinnati and would not come to Youngstown where there was a banquet of single taxers awaiting her and where there was a Catholic. German picnic. A difference of only a little over two hundred votes would have carried that county and she easily could have made that. As for Helen Todd, I think she was the biggest jack-ass, I don't know any other word to express it, that we had in the campaign. She was incompetent, impudent and all kinds of things. You see she had sort of lost her head by her success in California. Anyway we had such a lot of speaking and

so much help and we had very little that was troublesome so I do not think about it at all. Of course it sometimes tease me when I hear that Miss Todd says that I did not know how to run a campaign. However that all goes in with the battle. Yes, I know that Illinois gave lots of money and help to Wissensam I sometimes felt as if they might have given us a little something but Mrs. Stewart gave us some time and that with Margaret Haley was about all we got from them. Yes we do need a confidential bureau and yet I declare semetimes people work well for one person or under certain circumstances and do not for another so I wouldn't be sure of it even if I did say that some were good and some were bad. It sort of is like recommending cooks or workmen, it doesn't always work.

I do wish something could be done to get his Brown out of the harness. The poor soul, I feel sorry for her, I know just exactly how she feels and yet I do not believe that you will ever get suffrage in Wisconsin until there is some other method and some other things done there. But of course if you cannot manage it yourselves nobody can manage it so there is the end of it, too bad.

We are getting on first rate in Ohio and really are starting quite a little campaign. If we only could win and get the thing done it just seems to me I would do something desperate.
