Sir: We have the honor to submit in compliance with law, our biennial report of the transactions of this department, for the two years ending June 30, 1930.

The policy of withholding state lands from sale, which has prevailed since 1913, has been continued. Nearly all of the land now owned by the state, 179,022.84 acres being lands received under the swamp land grant of September 28, 1850, little of which is of agricultural value, and 158,001.20 acres of purchased lands for forestry purposes, (now under jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission) the continued holding of which is implied by the statutes, there appears to be no good reason for selling.

There have been a few exceptions where some scattered burned over forties were wanted for completing large tracts to be planted in to a forest and for fur farming projects.

Several small areas of blown down timber were sold, also some small scattered areas of ten to forty acres of scattered timber.

Trespass of timber has been investigated during the past two years in increased energy and success.

One of the important duties of the Commission is to keep the school fund earning at least four per cent interest as directed by the statutes, and at the same time "so far as practicable"—as the statutes say—give preference to the school districts and boards of education.

4. REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE PUBLIC LANDS

The income to the school funds nearly all comes in on March 15th, of each year. At that time the cash on hand amounts to approximately \$1,500,000, while school loan applications come in mainly from March to October. If more funds than necessary are held for anticipated school loans, there is a loss amounting to the difference between bank deposit and loan and bond rates. In order that the Commission may more nearly estimate the demand for school loans, as early information as possible should be sent to the Land Department.

The report of the Chief Clerk hereto attached makes it unnecessary that the Commission go further into detail.

REPORT OF CHIEF CLERK

TO THE HONORABLE COMMISSIONERS:

The last two years have demanded a heavy amount of work by the land office force—partly on new work and largely in straightening out old matters. Almost at the beginning of my charge of the office, we were compelled to appeal from decisions of the general land office on four separate matters. We won all of them.

Aside from the wide variety of clerical work, we have, during the last two years, given attention to the many important matters, including the following:

1. Got through the House of Representatives a bill granting to the State all lands between State lands and the water in new surveys of omitted lake shore lands. This bill has assurance of prompt passage by the Senate session that meets in December 1930. It will stabilize the state's title to all its lake shore lands, and terminate the confusion that has long prevailed, and has cost the State thousands of dollars.

2. A year ago I found that certain land lawyers had gathered up an abundance of old Northern Pacific land grant scrip and were proceeding to have it accepted by the general land office for the best lake frontage involved in the re-surveys. As the scrip is applicable to unsurveyed as well as surveyed land, and as these people have ways of knowing that such surveys are going to be made long before we do, the State is at a great disadvantage. I shall attempt to get an amendment to the act of July 1, 1898, making such scrip inapplicable to Wisconsin lands. The importance of this matter is indicated by the fact that in two instances, such scrip was applied to land carrying more than a mile of the finest lake frontage more than four years before the survey. This water front is worth more than \$10,000.

From the conditions prevailing on July 1, 1898, and the wording of the act, I am convinced Congress did not intend it to apply to Wisconsin and I am contesting such application. An amendment will stop the application of scrip to Wisconsin's best water front.

3. For two years I have been endeavoring to secure land as indemnity for school sections lost in the Indian Reservations amounting to more than 11,000 acres. There are numerous obstacles, although I have made some headway. Research discovers that certain western states have six months after survey in which to file indemnity lists before such newly surveyed lands are subject to other disposal. I have had a bill prepared to give Wisconsin such privilege. Aside from the extension surveys around our northern lakes, there are no public lands that can be selected as school indemnity.

4. The railroads are claiming the best water front arising from supplementary surveys in the odd numbered fractional sections within the primary limits of their old land grants. After having long held that "a patent for all of a fractional section conveys only such lands as may be then included within the approved township plat of survey," the general land office hastily decided that those railways are entitled to additional lands shown on recent supplementary plats of new surveys. The decision is being contested. If the foregoing relief measures can be accomplished it will benefit the State probably to the extent of \$100,000.

5. The 1929 legislature appropriated \$15,000 per year for inventory and survey of State land and timber—the last work of this kind being 25 years old. During the fiscal year 1930, \$14,410.54 was spent. This developed approximately \$1,000,000 worth of timber and land in the Menominee Indian Reservation, which is assured to the State under a decision by the U. S. Supreme Court—of which patents to 15,737.54 acres, with a value of \$611,108.85 have been approved. The list of the remaining 10,994.69 acres in that reservation has been tentatively accepted by the Indian Service, with the provision that the legislature agrees that no demand beyond the total of 26,732.23 acres will be made as to that reservation. I approve of such agreement.

There remains the Lac du Flambeau, Bad River and Court O'Reiles reservations, with a total of approximately 32,630 acres of lands subject to the swamp land grant of September 28, 1850. Owing to the fact that the timber was cut on these reservations by the government under an agreement that the value be held in escrow awaiting the determination of title, our cruisers have not been sent there and will not be until the fall of 1931. In the meantime it is hoped that the records of timber cutting will be obtained in shape to permit a satisfactory settlement. Otherwise we will be compelled to make such estimate as is possible from the badly decayed and fire eaten stumps. This is a bad enough task when the stumps and tops are intact, and inadvisable if the records of the cuttings can be used. Under the latter plan only the land will need to be cruised. It is not probable that the total value of State land and timber on the three last named reservations will be about \$200,000 to \$400,000.

At the close of the cruising season of the fall of 1930, it is expected that all of the State lands, aside from the 32,630 acres in the remaining Indian Reservations, the islands in the Mississippi River and the scattered lands in a few counties, will be covered. Of the \$15,000 appropriated for the fiscal year 1931, it is thought (owing to the less concentrated tracts and the greater difficulty in supervision) that not more than \$12,000 can be used effectively and economically.

I have prepared a budget asking for only \$10,000 per year during the next biennium, for the reason that the conditions will not require greater disbursements for the best results.

6. What will develop from our investigation of the unsurveyed islands in the Mississippi River cannot now be even approximated. The men in charge of the upper Mississippi Wild Life and Fish Refuge

attempted to claim these islands as having been made a part of the refuge by executive order of the president. In one instance they ordered the local people to keep their cows off an unsurveyed island of more than 1,500 acres. Under orders by the Commission I investigated the situation, with the result that the Fish Refuge people receded from their position to the great relief of the local people, who are poor and in great need of the pasturage—in fact can hardly exist without it. The government surveyed this island in June 1929, but has not yet issued the plat. How many unsurveyed islands there are and how many will come to the State under the Swamp Land Grant of 1850, remains to be determined. Apparently there are numerous such islands.

7. The inventory and survey work provided for by the 1929 session, has discovered several tracts of state land claimed by individuals. Three of these are in Shawano county—two of these with choice lake frontage. Without action by the state, these would eventually ripen into title by adverse possession. Another instance is in Marinette County, where 80 acres of escheated land was seized and sold by Alien Property Custodian, Thos. W. Miller. This was done on the claim that there were heirs in Germany. After twelve years no heirs have been found. The custodian is asking more time. The state is demanding surrender of this land.

The inventory and survey has found many instances of timber trespass that otherwise would have escaped.

An interesting matter that has developed is an island of several acres in a lake in Racine county. This island was a part of the bottom of the lake at the time of the government survey and was caused by the lowering of the water by a drainage operation. Three cottages have been built on it by individuals. The government holds that it belongs to the State.

8. As a result of our successful appeal from decisions of the general land office, January 2, 1929, about 1,200 acres of land have come to the state and much more will follow. In one instance \$1,520 worth of trespass was obtained—in others smaller amounts.

In another case three descriptions of land were patented to individuals in face of the fact that government surveyor said in his field notes that the land inured to the State under the act of 1850. A grantee of the patentee has cut hundreds of dollars worth of timber and is anxious to settle. The government, however, refuses to correct the situation and it is apparent that the State will have to take action in its own courts.

9. Two years ago I recommended an amendment to the statutes to the effect that a copy of all decrees in escheat cases be supplied to the land office. I now recommend that there be added a provision that the bond of the administrator be not discharged until the State has an opportunity to examine his account. County Judges should be required to keep index to escheated cases.

10. During the biennium of 1931-1932 the school funds handled by this department are expected to reach \$15,000,000. These funds are

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handled under a very strict and elaborate statute, involving great care.

Since our last report the purchase lands have been returned to the jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission, but there remains about 200,000 acres and many miles of lake frontage under the land department.

Under an ill-advised enactment in 1925, 2,600 patents were erroneously issued, which on application, are being corrected and new ones issued. This involves a large amount of research to avoid error. Certified copies of patents and field notes occupy much time. Copying worn and faded field note books will occupy any otherwise idle hours for several years to come.

This office is made a clearing house by other departments for all inquiries directly or indirectly touching the subject of land. This adds materially to the work.

In view of the foregoing we are asking for a modest increase of \$1,500 in our appropriation of \$9,000.
