

#### **Badgers Host Fighting**

The Wisconsin football team (7-1, 4-1 Big Ten) hosts conference rival Illinois (2-6, 1-3) today at Camp Randall Stadium. Kickoff is scheduled for 11:02 a.m. and the game will be televised by ESPN2. Pam Ward, Mike Gottfried and Jimmy Dykes will handle the commen-

The game will also be televised on a tape-delay basis by Wisconsin Public Television. Mike Heller and former Badger Scott Nelson will handle the commentary. The game will be shown statewide beginning at 10:30 p.m.

Fans can listen to the game on the 53station Wisconsin Radio Network. Locally in Madison the game can be heard on WIBA (1310 am/101.5 fm). Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas are on the call.

The Badgers have won four straight games and are coming off a 24-3 win at Purdue last Saturday. Freshman running back P.J. Hill rushed for 161 yards a two touchdowns and UW's defense limited the Boilermakers to 286 yards of total offense.

UW plays three of its last four games at home. Since the beginning of 2004, Wisconsin has a 15-1 record at Camp Randall Stadium, the sixth-best home record in the country over that span.

Illinois lost at Penn State, 26-12, last week. Since a 23-20 win at Michigan State on Sept. 30, the Fighting Illini have lost three straight games. True freshman quarterback Isiah "Juice" Williams has started the last five games for UI and is one of 16 true freshmen to see action for Illinois this season.

At halftime of today's game, former Badger running back and Director of Athletics Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch will be honored. Hirsch's number 40, worn during his Alf-American campaign of 1942, will be unveiled on the west facade of Camp Randall Stadium.

#### Today's Game at Camp Randall

#### Notable, Quotable and Promotable Our top items for this week ...

With Saturday's victory, head coach Bret Bielema tied the UW record for wins by a first-year head coach. Phil King led UW to a 7-1-1 record in 1896 and William Juneau's 1912 Badgers went 7-0-0.

The Badgers play three of their last four games at Camp Randall Stadium. UW is 20-4 in its last 24 home games. Including a 15-1 mark since the start of 2004. Wisconsin is one of six teams in the country with one or no home losses over that span.

For the 12th time in the past 14 seasons, and a school-record fifth consecutive year, Wisconsin is bowl eligible. Among Big Ten schools, only Ohio State and Michigan can match UW's run of bowl appearances over the last 14 years.

Wisconsin is second in the Big Ten and ranks fourth in the country in scoring defense, allowing just 11.5 points per game. The Badgers' defense has given up just eight touchdowns this season. Purdue's offense did not score a touchdown last Saturday, the third UW opponent that failed to score an offensive TD this season.

The Badgers lead the Big Ten in total offense in conference games, averaging 431.4 yards per game. They are also second in the conference in scoring during league games at 35.6 points per game. UW has converted 19-of-21 red zone opportunities in Big Ten games, tops in the conference.





Wisconsin ranks fourth in the country in scoring defense (11.5 points per game) and seventh in the nation in total defense (245.8 yards per game). The Badgers limited Purdue to three points and 286 yards last week.

UW ranks second in the Big Ten and seventh in the country in total defense, allowing just 245.8 yards per game. The best performance by a Badger opponent this season was 322 yards by Michigan on Sept. 23. That is less than the **AVERAGE** total defense of 66 teams in the country.

Quarterback John Stocco leads the Big Ten in pass efficiency during conference games at 167.2. He is completing 65.0 percent of his passes during league play and his 1,154 yards are second-best in the conference.

Freshman running back P.J. Hill leads the Big Ten and ranks sixth in the country in rushing at 146.5 yards per game. Hill's 1,172 total rushing yards are third-best in the country. UW has had a 1,000-yard rusher in 12 of the past 14 seasons.

Wisconsin leads the country in pass efficiency defense at 84.6. The Badgers have given up just two passing touchdowns (both vs. Michigan), the fewest in the country, and have picked off nine passes (tied for 22nd in the country). The Badgers have at least one interception in five different games this season, including the last three straight.

UW is outscoring its opponents 154-29 this season in the second and third quarters. In the last four games, Wisconsin has given up just five points in the second and third quarters.

Sophomore Travis Beckum is one of just three tight ends in the country with at least 500 receiving yards this season.

#### Wisconsin-Illinois Series Notes:

Wisconsin has won the last three meeting between the teams by an average of 17.3 points ... UW is averaging 268.0 rushing yards in those three wins ... this will be just the third trip to Madison for Illinois since 1997 ... UW head coach Bret Bielema is a native of Prophetstown, Ill. ... the Badgers and Illinois played the last tie game in NCAA Division IA history, a 3-3 deadlock in the final game of the 1995 season.

#### **Short Drives**

After giving up touchdown drives of 80 and 79 yards to Bowling Green in the season opener, UW's first-team defense has not allowed a touchdown drive of longer than 56 yards. Indiana had a 94-yard touchdown drive late in the fourth quarter.

UW leads the Big Ten and ranks fourth in the country in third-down efficiency defense, allowing opponents to convert third down only 26 percent (29-of-110) of the time. In Big Ten play, that percentage drops to 20.3. Purdue entered last week's game converting a Big Ten-best 49 percent of its third downs but converted just 3-of-14 against Wisconsin. Purdue was also 0-for-3 on fourth down. For the season, Badger opponents are 3-of-13 on fourth down, eighth-best in the country.

#### **Filling the Void**

At the start of this season, Wisconsin needed to replace its top six pass catchers, five of whom were chosen in the NFL draft. Among those players was tight end Owen Daniels, a converted quarterack who had 62 catches for 852 yards and eight touchdowns in his career.

Into that pass catching role has stepped sophomore tight end Travis Beckum, who played defense as a freshman. Beckum leads the Big Ten in receiving yards per game during conference games (83.2 yards per game). His 16.0 yards per catch are also the best among the top 10 receivers in the league. Over the past four games, Beckum is averaging 5.3 catches for 90.8 yards.

Beckum is one of only three tight ends in the country with at least 500 receiving yards this season. Besides Beckum (501 yards), the other two are Darius Hill of Ball State (585 yards) and Dustin Keller of Purdue (546 yards).



#### Chancellor John D. Wiley





hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Visconsin–Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university areer. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the miversity since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive offier, Wiley is responsible for the overall ision and direction of the university. He epresents the institution for a variety of onstituents, including alumni groups, hambers of commerce and service clubs, he state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of
Presidents and Chancellors and the board
for the Council on Higher Education
Accreditation, and is a member of the
National Security Higher Education
Advisory Committee. He also serves on
several local and community boards,
including the William T. Evjue Foundation
and the Greater Madison Chamber of
Commerce. He also has been deeply
involved in fundraising from individual
and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW–Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.





#### Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez





arry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of head football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He biloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in chool history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big fen history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer) and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet Alvarez.

- Grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999
- A finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and was the only one still at the school that hired him when he retired in 2005.
- Got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship.
- Named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by Hispanic Business in October of 2001
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, gave \$100,000 to support the opening of Gilda's Club of Madison, a free support center for families dealing with cancer.
- Numerous former Alvarez assistants at Wisconsin have gone on to success on the
  professional level, among them Bill Callahan (former Oakland Raiders head coach, now head
  coach of Nebraska), Brad Childress (Minnesota Vikings head coach), Jay Hayes (Cincinnati
  Bengals defensive line coach) and Jay Norvell (former Oakland Raiders tight ends coach,
  now with Nebraska)



#### Head Coach Bret Bielema

Pret Bielema is in his first year as head football coach at the University of Wisconsin. The second-youngest head football coach in the Division I-A ranks, he brings a remarkably strong background to the position.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the

high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002-03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas
State, Bielema spent nine seasons
as an assistant coach at his alma mater,
Iowa, where he worked for head coaches
Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997
Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and
ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring
defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr
(first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins
and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 547 games and guide their teams to 41 bowl games, so the first-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business.

Bielema earned four letters (1989–92 after joining the lowa football program as a walk-on. He was a member of lowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bach elor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.



#### "Crazylegs" to be Honored Today



Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch was an All-American for the Badgers in 1942 and served as UW's Director of Athletics from 1969-87.

lroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is one of the most recognizable figures in Wisconsin sports history. The former running back and longest-tenured Athletic Director in school history will finally accompany the greatest Wisconsin football legends as his retired number 40 will be unveiled on the north end of the stadium façade today.

Hirsch came to Madison from Wausau, Wis. A standout on his prep football and basketball teams, he was inducted into the National High School Sports Hall of Fame in 1988. As a 19-year-old freshman on the 1942 Wisconsin football team, Hirsch was considered a "triplethreat halfback." During that 1942 season, a season in which the Badgers were ranked as high as third nationally, Hirsch rushed for 786 yards, passed for 226 yards and also gained 390 yards receiving.

As the season progressed, so too did Hirsch's legend. When the Badgers faced top-ranked Ohio State, Hirsch accumulated more than 200 yards in total offense and threw one touchdown pass as the Badgers defeated the Buckeyes 17-7.

Later that season, with World War II looming and President Roosevelt's announcement that the minimum age for the military draft would be lowered, many of the Badgers knew that their time on campus was coming to a close.

So there it was, on a Saturday in mid-October, in front of a crowd of 60,000 at Soldier Field in Chicago that Wisconsin faced the Bluejackets of the Great Lakes Naval Training Station. Early in the third quarter, with Wisconsin trailing by a touchdown, Hirsch broke a 61-yard touchdown run to even the score. Led by Hirsch's unbelievable touchdown run,

Wisconsin went on to win that game 13-7. It wasn't until after the game, however, that Hirsch's illustrious nickname was founded.

Francis Powers of the Chicago Daily News wrote that Hirsch "ran like a demented duck. His crazy legs were gyrating in six-different directions at the same time." It was here that the legend of Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch was born.

The Badgers finished the
1942 season with a record of 8-11. Hirsch, who was Wisconsin's
leading rusher, ranked as the
sixth-leading rusher nationally.
Six interceptions, a single-season
record at the time, as well as nine
touchdowns (five rushing and
four passing) helped Hirsch to
earn All-America honors.

Unfortunately, the 1942 season was Hirsch's first and only as a Badger. Hirsch was sent to Ann Arbor, Mich., to train for the Marines. While at Michigan, Hirsch not only played football, but lettered in basketball, track and baseball as well. To this day, he is the only person to ever accomplish this feat at Michigan.

After college, Hirsch was chosen in the first-round of the NFL draft by the Chicago Rockets. After three seasons in the short-lived All-American Conference, Hirsch was signed by the Los Angeles Rams. While with the Rams, Hirsch was split wide as a receiver and an end, establishing him as football's first flanker. Behind Hirsch's record 1,495 yards receiving on 66 catches and 17 touchdowns, the Rams won the 1951 NFL Championship.

At the conclusion of his Hall of Fame NFL career, Hirsch returned to Wisconsin in 1969 to become UW's seventh Director of Athletics. Hirsch immediately turned around a program that sported a 0-19-1 football record in the previous two seasons. After his initial four years on the job, Hirsch saw attendance at Camp Randall grow from 43,000 to more than 70,000 per game.

Hirsch's greatest feat, however, may have been restoring pride in Badger Athletics. Today we honor and recognize Hirsch as his name stands among other Badger legends in Camp Randall Stadium.


For many of the UW Children's Hospital patients and their families, this is their first visit to Camp Randall Stadium.

#### **Bob Bostad Tight Ends**

Bob Bostad (pronounced BO-stad), a state of Wisconsin native who coached the offensive line at New Mexico from 1999-2005, is in his first season as an assistant football coach at Wisconsin.

Bostad coaches the Badgers' tight ends.
Bostad's 2005 offensive line featured a
pair of first-team all-conference selections,
including center Ryan Cook and guard
Robert Turner. New Mexico averaged 200
yards per game on the ground in 2005. Cook
was a second-round draft choice of the
Vikings, while tackle Terrance Pennington
was a seventh-round pick of the Bills.

During Bostad's tenure at New Mexico, 14 Lobo offensive linemen earned all-conference mention. Among the players Bostad coached at New Mexico were: tackle Claude Terrell, a third-team A.P. All-American and fourth-round draft choice of the St. Louis Rams (he started as a rookie for the Rams in 2005) and tackle Jason Lenzmeier, who became the first offensive lineman in conference and school history to earn MWC offensive player of the week honors in 2003.

Bostad was offensive line coach (1997-98) and offensive coordinator (1998) at San Jose State prior to his years at New Mexico.

Bostad coached the offensive line at Cal State Northridge in 1995-96 and spent three seasons (1992-94) as an offensive line graduate assistant at Minnesota under head coach Jim Wacker.

Bostad got his coaching start at his alma mater, UW-Stevens Point, where he coached the offensive line from 1990-91.

Bostad graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1989 with a degree in physical education. He was a four-year starter as a linebacker for the Pointers and earned all-conference mention each year. Bostad earned a master's degree in kinesiology from Minnesota in 1994.

Bostad, 39, is a native of Pardeeville, Wis. He and his wife, Cara, have three daughters: Rachel, Bryn and Annika, and a son, John Robert.

#### Paul Chryst Off. Coordinator / QBs

Paul Chryst is in his second consecutive season at Wisconsin and his third overall as an assistant coach for the Badgers.

Chryst, UW's co-offensive coordinator and tight ends coach last season, is now the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Chryst, the Badgers' tight ends coach in 2002, returned to Wisconsin in 2005 and his impact on the UW offense was immediately evident. The 2005 Badgers set school records for points scored in a season (446) and for season scoring average (34.3 ppg). The Badger passing game was much improved, with QB John Stocco setting school season records for passing yards, passing TDs and pass completions.

Chryst was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon State in 2003-04. He helped the Beavers rank No. 6 nationally in passing yardage per game and 10th in total offense in 2003. The 2003 Beavers became the first team in Division I history with a 4,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers.

Chryst came to Wisconsin in 2002 after serving as an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers, where he developed Freddie Jones into one of the NFL's top tight ends.

Previously, Chryst was an assistant coach at Oregon State (1997-98), the Saskatchewan Roughriders (1996), Illinois State (1995), the Ottawa Rough Riders (1994), UW-Platteville (1993) and the World League's San Antonio Riders (1991-92). He was a graduate assistant at West Virginia (1989-90).

Chryst was a three-time football letterwinner at Wisconsin, where he earned a degree in political science in 1988. He added a master's degree in educational administration from West Virginia in 1990. Paul's late father, George, was a longtime head coach at UW-Platteville and a former Badger player and assistant coach.

Chryst and his wife, Robin, have three children: Katy, JoJo and Danny.

#### **Kerry Cooks Defensive Backs**

Kerry Cooks, defensive backs coach at University of Minnesota last season, is first year as defensive backs coach at Wisconsin.

Cooks was a four-year letterwinner two-year starter as a strong safety at 16 from 1994-97. He was a team captain a senior and earned All-Big Ten honors a spot in the East-West Shrine Game. A round draft choice of the Minnesota Vilin 1998, Cooks also played for Green B Atlanta and Jacksonville before retiring the NFL in 2001. He also played for the Chicago Enforcers of the XFL in 2001.

Mike Hankwitz is in his first season as Wisconsin's defensive coordinator.

Hankwitz spent the past two seasons as defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Colorado. He served as the program's interim head coach for the Buffaloes' 2005 Champs Sports Bowl appearance against Clemson. Hankwitz went to Colorado after serving as Arizona's defensive coordinator (and later interim head coach) in 2003.

Prior to his stint at Arizona, Hankwitz was the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Texas A&M (1997-2002) where he guided the Aggies' famed "Wrecking Crew" defense. Among Hankwitz's standout players at Texas A&M was Dat Nguyen, who won the Lombardi and Bednarik Awards, as well as being named Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year.

Hankwitz spent two seasons (1995-96) as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Kansas after enjoying a highly successful 10-year run as defensive coordinator at Colorado from 1985-94. Colorado put together the nation's fifth-best record (58-11-4) from 1989-94, including a national title in 1990, three Big 8 titles, two appearances each in the Orange and Fiesta Bowls and six national top-20 rankings (including three top-five finishes).

Hankwitz was defensive coordinator at Western Michigan from 1982-84 and outside linebackers and punting coach at Purdue from 1977-81. Prior to his time at Purdue, Hankwitz was the outside linebackers and secondary coach at Arizona from 1973-76.

Hankwitz began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1970-72) at his alma mater. Michigan, under head coach Bo Schembechler.

The 58-year-old Hankwitz is a native of Ludington, Mich. He was a three-year football letterwinner for the Wolverines and started on the 1969 Big Ten championship squad. Hankwitz earned a B.S. in education in 1970. He and his wife, Cathy, have a son, Jacob, 12.

### **Henry Mason Wide Receivers / Assistant Recruiting Coordinator**

Henry Mason is in his 12th season coaching wide receivers at Wisconsin.

Under Mason's guidance, Wisconsin has consistently produced some of the nation's best pass-catchers since the mid-1990s.

Mason's most recent standouts were Brandon Williams and Jonathan Orr, both of whom were selected in the 2006 NFL Draft. Williams, a 2005 second-team All-American, finished his career ranked first in receptions (202) and second in yards (2,924) at Wisconsin. Orr is third all-time at UW with 19 touchdown catches and eighth in school history with 1,824 receiving yards.

Mason also coached Bedford, Ohio, products Lee Evans and Chris Chambers. Evans, a 2001 Biletnikoff Award finalist and first-team All-American, is UW's career leader in receiving yards (3.468) and touchdowns (27) and was a 2004 first-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills. Chambers, a second-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 2001, is fourth on the school's list for career receiving yards with 2.004.

Early in Mason's career at Wisconsin, Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes developed into standout receivers and eventual NFL draft picks.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin in 1995, Mason coached receivers at Western Michigan from 1991-94. Mason was head coach at Smith-Cotton (Mo.) High School from 1982-90. His 1988 team became the first in 13 years at the school to post a winning record. Mason also was an assistant coach at Baker University (1981) and was an assistant coach at Lexington (Mo.) High School (1979-80).

Mason, who has coached in nine bowl games with the Badgers, is a 1979 graduate of Central Missouri State, where he lettered in football and baseball. He was drafted by the Baltimore Colts and played one season with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mason's wife's name is Debbie.

McCray earned a bachelor's degree in munications from Appalachian State in 91 and a master's degree in higher education South Carolina. A native of proe, N.C., McCray and his wife, Michelle, to a son, Matt (4).

#### **Bob Palcic**Offensive Line

Bob Palcic, an assistant coach in the National Football League from 1994-2005, is in his first season as Wisconsin's offensive line coach.

Palcic coached tight ends for the New Orleans Saints from 2000–05. Prior to that post he was offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns (1999), tight ends coach for the Detroit Lions (1997–98) and offensive line coach for the Atlanta Falcons (1994–96).

Palcic went to Atlanta after spending 19 of the previous 21 seasons coaching offensive linemen at seven different universities, including Wisconsin. He coached the 1993 UCLA offensive line that matched up against the Badgers in the 1994 Rose Bowl. Palcic tutored the Southern California offensive line in 1992 and helped the Trojans to a Freedom Bowl appearance. He was offensive line coach at Ohio State from 1986–91.

Arizona's offensive line was under Palcic's direction from 1984–85 (the Wildcats played in the Sun Bowl during that time). A two-year stint (1982–83) with the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts (1983 Grey Cup title) was preceded by a four-year (1978–81) stop as Wisconsin's offensive line coach under head coach Dave McClain.

Palcic was Ball State's offensive line coach in 1976–77 (he went to Wisconsin with McClain, who was Ball State's head coach) and Dayton's linebackers/offensive line coach in 1974–75. He got his college coaching start guiding Ball State's linebackers as a graduate assistant in 1973.

Palcic, 58, is a native of Gowanda, N.Y., and has a bachelor's degree in education (1971) and a master's degree in education (1974), both from Dayton. He was a line-backer for the Flyers from 1968–70. He and his wife, Theresa, have three children: Joe (currently the defensive coordinator at Indiana); Amy (an assistant in the Cleveland Browns media relations office) and Monica, who is married to Philadelphia Eagles LB Mark Simoneau.

#### John Settle Running Backs

John Settle is now in his first season as running backs coach at Wisconsin. Settle most recently served eight seasons as running backs coach at Fresno State, where he tutored six 1,000-yard rushers, including Wendell Mathis, who rushed for 1,313 yards and 15 touchdowns along with making 19 catches for 156 yards and a TD for the Bulldogs last season. Rodney Davis set the school rushing record with a 1,586-yard campaign in 2002. Settle also developed Derrick Ward, the 1999 team rushing leader, freshman All-American and current New York Giant. In addition, Settle coached 1998 WAC Pacific Division Offensive Player of the Year Jamie Kimbrough.

Settle went to Fresno State after a three-year stint (1995-98) as an offensive assistant with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens franchise under head coaches Bill Belicheck and Ted Marchibroda. Settle began his coaching career at his alma mater, Appalachian State, where he assisted with running backs in 1994.

Settle was a four-year letterman (1983-86) as a running back at Appalachian State. Settle finished as the school's career rushing leader with 4.409 yards (then third-most in NCAA Division I-AA history) and 43 touchdowns. He was the Southern Conference Player of the Year as a senior after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 TDs.

Settle signed with the Atlanta Falcons as a free agent and played a total of six seasons in the NFL, four with Atlanta (1987-90) and two with the Washington Redskins. He accumulated 1,594 yards of total offense in 1988, becoming the first free agent in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He was named to the Pro Bowl and the All-Madden Team in 1988. He also played for the Redskins' Super Bowl championship team in 1991.

A 1989 graduate of Appalachian State with a degree in criminal justice, Settle and his wife, Karen, have three children:
Jonathan, Leighton and Devynn.

Sports Illustrated on Campus said last fall that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

Since 1992, Wisconsin has compiled a 62-23-3 (.722) record at Camp Randall Stadium. In 2004 and 2005, the Badgers put together an 11-game home winning streak, the school's longest in the modern era.

Since the expansion of Camp Randall Stadium prior to the 2004 season, UW has averaged 82,460 fans at its home games. The Badgers have ranked 13th nationally in attendance in each of the past two seasons. bers (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 for 81 consecutive home games and 71 of them have been sellouts. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game. A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Roooonnn Daaaynnne!", from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez. #### **Badger Nickname**

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

#### **Bucky Badger**

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a

cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-māché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

#### **Bud Song**

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

#### **Fifth Quarter**

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.


#### On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

#### **Hall of Fame**

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

## Camp Randall Stadium

## AMECHE 33 DAYNE

ne of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.

#### Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst







One of the Badge<mark>rs' elder statesmen,</mark> two-year captain Mark Zalewski shares a love of fishing with his family

ark Zalewski almost didn't make it to the University of Wisconsin.

Long before the two-time Badger captain ever dreamt of wearing the cardinal and white for the UW football team, Zalewski had a scary moment while ice fishing with his father.

"Somebody had cut a huge hole in the ice and I guess I fell in it," Zalewski said. "I don't remember it at all because I was really small but I went under water and luckily my Dad kept a good eye on me."

Cindy Zalewski, Mark's mother also remembers that incident well.

"I was always nervous about ice fishing," Cindy said. "I was nervous when Dick was gone with Mark all day and he thought I was silly to be nervous. After a few days, he told me how he had this 'harrowing' experience with Mark and that had he not been there, he would have gone under the ice."

If that was not enough to drive a Mom crazy, Mark's fishing mishaps did ot end there as he sustained another painful injury from the sport while growing up.

"I got a hook stuck in my knee one time," Mark recalls. "Me and my brother

rere playing around and we tripped and fell on it. I remember my Dad had to poke the hook through the other side and get it out."

Despite these painful experiences, fishing still remains one of Mark Zalewski's favorite pastimes. Growing up in Wausau, Wis., the Badger linebacker has been around fishing ever since he can remember and had plenty of opportunities to enjoy the sport with his family's cabin in the Tomahawk area (Northeastern Wisconsin) and with other family members also owning cabins throughout the area. Mark recalls catching the biggest fish he ever hooked, a 28-inch, 14-pound walleye, when he was eight at his cousin's cabin.

"We are a fishing family, I like to fish, my husband likes to fish and we've had a lake cabin probably since Mark was two or three,"

Cindy said. "All of our vacations that we went on, we'd go fishing even if it was just for a day. It was a good bonding moment for the family."

One thing Mark rarely left behind when fishing while growing up, aside from all his gear, was his older brother Zach, who Mark regards as his role model and best friend. The December 2003 UW graduate also has the best stories of their fishing trips while growing up.

Zach recalls an instance where Mark had an unappetizing experience with a minnow when he was about 4-years-old.

"We went fishing with my dad and his buddies and afterwards one of my dad's friends convinced Mark to pull a minnow out of the minnow box," Zach recalls. "It was squirming in his hand and for some reason it really made (Mark) mad. So (my Dad's friend) started provoking Mark and said 'Just bite it Mark, just bite it!' and Mark ended up actually biting the head off this minnow—everybody couldn't believe it."

These two brothers still share their love of fishing with one another. After graduating, Zach moved out to Montana and spent a year fly fishing and even lived out of a tent in the mountains for six months. Mark visited Zach twice in Montana but now that Zach is back in Madison, the two have more time to continue fishing with one another.

"We go fishing an awful lot," Zach said. "During the season he really doesn't have time to do a whole lot but in the summer we go and we have a pretty good time just sitting and catching blue gills all day long just entertaining ourselves."

Aside from his brother, Mark also enjoys fishing with Badger teammates Mark Gorman, Joe Monty and Joe Stellmacher on Madison's Lake Monona

"A bunch of us go ice fishing out there and have some fun," Mark said. "A couple times it's been a little dangerous because you may fall in. There was open water probably a couple hundred feet away from us but we went anyway. We had a good time."

Zach also recalls another story when the Badgers traveled to the 2004 Outback Bowl in Tampa, Fla. The whole family went deep sea fishing but this time, the embarrassment wasn't for his brother Mark, but for

defensive lineman Mark Gorman.

"Almost any spot we stopped at everybody in the whole boat would be catching fish except for Mark Gorman," Zach recalls. "He kept putting it off as he had the bad spot on the boat which I don't think was possible. I think everyone in the boat caught a fish but Mark Gorman. All he caught was an octopus all day."

While Mark Zalewksi's fishing career can live on forever, his days remaining as a Badger football player are few. As a three-year starter, Zalewski finished third on the team in 2005 with 83 total tackles and heading into today's game, his 57 tackles ties with Jonathan Casillas for most on the team. As the season winds down, Zalewski has much to reflect on from his five years at the UW.

"I'll miss being around everyone," Mark said. "Practice gets hard sometimes but I think a lot of us guys are really close and struggle through the hard times and you build a lot of great relationships."







#### **Vincent Makes Debut**

Troy Vincent was picked up Monday by Washington after being released by Buffalo. Vincent, a 15-year veteran and a five-time Pro Bowler, contributed three-and-a-half tackles in his first action as a Redskin.

However, his presence was not enough to help slow down Peyton Manning and Indianapolis as Manning threw for 342 yards and four touchdowns in the Colts' 36-22 victory.

Vincent, who was pursued by numerous teams after being released by Buffalo, chose Washington in large part because of the potential he believes the Redskins defense has.

"I didn't want to go to a place where I was the answer," Vincent told The Daily Press. "In many situations, free agents go to places where they have to be the answer. This is a good core defensively. I believe that I can contribute. I just want to be one of the pieces to the puzzle."

Despite the Redskins current 2-5 record, Vincent has stated he has a gut feeling this team is much better than its record would indicate.

"I really believe this team has a chance to win," he said.

Lee Evans of the Buffalo Bills had one catch for 11 vards in a 28-6 loss to New England ... Jamar Fletcher (Detroit) had one tackle while teammate Brian Calhoun ran three times for 10 yards and added an 18-yard reception in a 31-24 loss to the Jets ... cornerback Scott Starks of the Jacksonville Jaguars had two tackles while linebacker Nick Greisen notched one-and-a-half tackles in the Jags' loss to Houston ... Oakland Raiders' defensive tackle Anttaj Hawthorne had a tackle in the Raiders' 22-9 victory over Arizona, their first win of the season ... Miami Dolhhins' wide receiver Chris Chambers had two catches for 29 yards in his team's 34-24 loss to Green Bay ... Washington Redskins kicker John Hall was placed on injured reserve by the team Tuesday after suffering a groin and thigh injury, ending his season.

#### **Center of Attention**

Last season, his first season in Washington, Casey Rabach started all 16 games at center and helped running back Clinton Portis rush for a single-season team record 1,516 yards. This season, Rabach again has led the way for the powerful Redskins' rushing attack that currently ranks seventh in the NFL in total yards.

Prior to joining the Redskins, Rabach spent his first four seasons in the league with the Baltimore Ravens. They selected the Sturgeon Bay, Wis., native in the third round (92nd overall) of the 2001 NFL Draft. After failing to see the field during his rookie campaign, Rabach proved himself over the next three seasons to be one of the Ravens' most consistent performers on the offensive line, playing in 30 games and starting 23 of them.

In 2003, he helped Ravens' running back Jamal Lewis set the single-game NFL rushing record with 295 yards against Cleveland. Lewis would go on to rush for 2,066 yards that season, the second highest mark in NFL history behind Eric Dickerson's 2,105 for the Rams in 1984.

### **Daniels Continues to Make Catches Count**

Houston starting tight end Owen Daniels continues to make the most of the opportunities he is given. Despite having only nine catches on the season, three of them have gone for touchdowns. His three touchdown catches tie him for the team lead with wide receiver Andre Johnson.

Daniels' 14-yard touchdown grab was part of a 27-7 upset victory over Jacksonville on "Battle Red Day" in Houston, where the Texans sported alternative red jerseys. Despite a 20-40 record since joining the NFL as an expansion team in 2002, Houston is 4-2 on "Battle Red Day."

After three starts, running back Ron Dayne was not activated this week, in part because of a bruised knee he suffered last week. In his place, rookie Wali Lundy rushed for 93 yards, the best performance by a Texan running back this season.

The most well-known of those players is former running back Ron Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points, As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.


Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.

In addition, Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's best defensive back while Kevin Stemke won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's best collegiate punter.

This year a number of UW players are in contention for major awards. Offensive tackle Joe Thomas, a preseason *Playboy* All-American, can be found on both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy watch lists. Punter Ken DeBauche was a second-team All-American last year and is one of the top candidates for the Ray Guy Award. QB John Stocco is on the Maxwell Award watch list and DE Matt Shaughnessy is on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list.



#### Icohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may r sult in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

#### **Emergencies**

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.


#### **Items Not Permitted**




#### Oct. 29, 2005 - Wisconsin 41, Illinois 24

Last year, the 15th-ranked Badgers rolled into Champaign with just one loss and came away with a 41-24 victory over the Fighting Illini. Running back Brian Calhoun rushed for five touchdowns, tying a school record for the most scores by an individual. Calhoun finished the day with 197 yards on 25 carries. Quarterback John Stocco completed 13 of his 22 passes and threw a 62-yard bomb to Brandon Williams for

Wisconsin scored a touchdown in each quarter, beginning with two scores in the first period; a 6-vard run by Calhoun and the Stocco-to-Williams TD, Calhoun's second touchdown was a 2-yard run in the second quarter. In the third stanza, Calhoun scored twice for the Badgers, both from six yards out. The junior running back then capped off the game with a 46-yard run with just under four minutes to play in the fourth quarter.

In 1993, Wisconsin put up 523 yards of total offensive and limited Illinois to just 227 yards, coming away with a 35-10 win in Champaign. The Badgers had two running backs rush for over 100 yards with a 139yard performance from Terrell Fletcher and another 126 yards from Brent Moss. Quarterback Darrell Bevell also had a solid day, completing 17 of his 22 passes for 222 yards and three touchdowns.

Wisconsin put up a score during each period of play, starting with a 1-yard run from Moss to take a 7-0 lead after the first quarter. After a Fighting Illini field goal, the Badgers put up two touchdowns in the second stanza to lead 21-3 at the half. Illinois once again put points on the board with a blocked punt that was returned for a touchdown. The Badgers then responded with two more Bevell touchdowns, a 23-yard pass to Mike Roan and a 2-yard pass to Lee DeRamus.

#### Nov. 25, 1995 - Wisconsin 3, Illinois 3

In 1995, Wisconsin closed out a 4-5-2 season with a 3-3 tie to Illinois in front of 76,750 fans at Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers put up 283 offensive yards while Illinois mustered 260. Neither team was able to put the ball in the endzone as both the Illini and Badger defenses were solid.

The Badgers scored first after a nine play, 54-yard drive set up a 29-yard field goal by John Hall to take a 3-0 lead. The lead held until the 8:13 mark in the fourth quarter, when Illinois tied the game. After just four plays and only seven yards gained, Bret Scheuplein was sent on the field to attempt a 51-yard field goal. The ball split the uprights and the Fighting Illini tied the game.

The 3-3 draw was the final tie in Division IA history as overtime was put into place beginning in 1996.

The Badgers jumped out to a 28-7 lead at halftime and continued its dominance to tally a 35-15 win over Illinois in Champaign during the 1996 season. Freshman running back Ron Dayne scored four touchdowns. including a 54-yard score in the second quarter, to lead the Badgers.

Quarterback Mike Samuel put UW on the board with a one-yard score. Later in the first quarter, Dayne tallied his first of four TDs with a 30-yard run. After Illinois scored early in the second quarter, Dayne had back-to-back touchdown runs of 54 and 19 yards, respectively, to put Wisconsin up by three touchdowns. Dayne capped off his day with a 23-yard touchdown run in the third quarter. The future Heisman trophy winner racked up 289 yards on the ground vs. the Fighting Illini.





## Bowling with the Badgers

ver the last 13 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' eight bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College, Nebraska and Ohio State. UW has participated in 11 bowl games over the past 13 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made seven appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its second consecutive January bowl game, trouncing seventh-ranked Auburn 24-10 to capture the Capital One Bowl. That contest marked the final game in the head coaching career of Barry Alvarez.

It was fitting that Alvarez's last game was a bowl victory since he led UW to an 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games. That is the best bowl winning percentage in NCAA history among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.


In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a community service project to give back to Madison.


Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.


Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.




Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.



# The Big Ten Conference

# This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$89 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2005-06, the Big Ten distributed over \$117 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

 Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.

- Big Ten Universities have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- Big Ten Universities house on their campuses nine of the nation's 30 largest academic libraries. Conference libraries hold more than 66 million book volumes and institutions freely share their materials with other league members.
- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2.000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Based on the federal graduation rate average for the 1995-98 freshman classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 70 percent compared to 62 percent for all Division I student-athletes. As a conference, student-athletes tend to graduate at rates consistent with the general student body (71 percent). In 2006, the NCAA also introduced a new calculation—the Graduation Success Rate (GSR)—that accounts for transfer student-athletes.
   The Big Ten's GSR was 81 percent compared to the Division I average of 76 percent.

- The Big Ten recognized 1,992
   Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2005-06 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged nearly 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- The Big Ten has claimed at least four team national championships in seven of the last nine full seasons, including six national titles during 1999-2000 alone, the most for the conference in more than a decade. Big Ten national champions in 2005-06 included Northwestern women's lacrosse and three national crowns for Wisconsin in men's cross country and men's and women's ice hockey.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.
- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2005–06, more than 8.2 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

### **BIG TEN INSTANT REPLAY FACTS**

Beginning with this season, all Division-I conferences and independent institutions will have the option of using a version of instant replay standardized by the NCAA – a system based upon an instant replay model created by the Big Ten Conference three years ago.

The objective of football instant replay is to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during games. Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of <u>indisputable video evidence</u> is met can a play be overturned. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

Head coaches may now utilize a timeout to request a review of a play no more than once per game. A coach initiates this challenge by taking a timeout before the ball is in play and informing the official that the ruling on the previous play is being challenged. If the ruling is overturned, the timeout will be returned to the team. If the ruling is not overturned, the team will lose that timeout. A team must have a timeout in order for the coach to challenge a play and a coach can only challenge one play per game. Head coaches may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped by the Technical Advisor and a decision has already been made on that specific ruling. If a head coach requests a timeout to challenge a ruling and the play is not reviewable, the team will lose that timeout. The Technical Advisor will continue to examine all reviewable plays during a game.

The Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game can initiate reviews throughout the game. The head coach can initiate one review per game by calling a timeout. Game officials may not ask for a review.

# **NCAA** Guidelines





# /hat Every Badger Fan hould Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite studentablets to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

 b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

 c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

 d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

### What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

### **Extra Benefit Rule**

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services:

 b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect; d) providing use of an automobile;

 e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above:

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

# **Employment**

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:


 Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;

 Compensation for only work actually performed; and

Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 

# UW Program Keeps an Eye on Election News

In the closing weeks of the 2006 elections, politics are on the minds of many people around the country. But how much play do they get on local news? A unique UW-Madison research effort offers some surprising answers.

The brainchild of political science professor Kenneth Goldstein, the UW-Madison NewsLab actively monitors local news in television markets across the country. The lab has equipment that captures and clips thousands of hours of broadcast news, which are then coded and analyzed by research staff, creating an in-depth look at how much time television news devotes to specific topics.

In one recent study, the NewsLab team found that in the run-up to next month's elections, television stations in nine Midwest markets devoted an average of 36 seconds to campaign coverage during the typical 30-minute local news broadcast. In contrast, those broadcasts contained more than 10 minutes of advertising, more than seven minutes of sports and weather, and almost two and a half minutes of crime stories.

"Although it is the single greatest source of news information for most Americans, scholarly studies have consistently shown that citizens learn little from local news," Goldstein says. "The results from this study show why. There must be significant substantive content for learn-

ing to take place. This study, consistent with previous studies conducted by at UW NewsLab, show that there is relatively little coverage of campaigns and elections on local news."

The study captured up to one hour per night of the early and late-evening broadcasts on 36 NBC, CBS, ABC and Fox affiliates in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Illinois and Ohio. More than 1,800 broadcasts that aired between September 7 and October 6 were analyzed, including 1,629 stories related to elections. The average story devoted primarily to elections lasted 68 seconds.

Goldstein says that the lab will continue to monitor and update its report on Midwestern news coverage, which is the first time the NewsLab has focused a study on a particular region. Previous studies have analyzed campaign coverage prior to the 2002 and 2004 elections, as well as studies of other subjects. Last year, researchers from the UW and the University of Michigan made use of the NewsLab's data to publish findings about how television news covers topics related to health and medicine.

"We've consistently heard about the need for additional spaces for events for students who want to have a different Halloween experience," says Dawn Crim, assistant director of community relations in the Office of the Chancellor.

To accommodate student demand for non-State Street events, Union South is hosting gatherings organized by registered student organizations. For five dollars (the same price of a ticket to enter State Street), students can attend a Halloween Party and Creature Contest Saturday night in the facility's Games Room, including free bowling, pool, table tennis, popcorn, prizes and candy. The party, scheduled to run until 2 a.m., is limited to UW-Madison students, faculty, staff and Union members, and alcohol service will not be permitted after 9 p.m.

In addition to Union South events, numerous Badger athletic events will take place on campus, including the volleyball team's Sunday match against Ohio State, which features free admission to anyone wearing a Halloween costume, and hockey games versus Boston College. # Helping Kids Learn About Career Choices

What kind of work does an auditor do? Are there jobs for people who like to be around animals? These are the kinds of questions that kids ask when they start thinking about the various things people do for a living. Now, a new workbook published by a UW-Madison research project helps teachers and school counselors answer them — and get young students thinking about what careers may best suit them.

Titled "Prepare ... For Your Future," the workbook is published by Wisconsin Careers, a program in the UW-Madison's Center on Education and Work. Featuring self-assessments and interactive guides, it helps students match their interests with different occupations and think about lifestyle planning. It also links to career-related curricula such as WISCareers and CareerLocker, two online resources that allow students to explore career options in more depth, begin building resumes and cover letters, and research colleges and job opportunities.

"Too many youth have no idea where they want to go because they have no sense of their future," says Kara McCarty, who co-wrote the new guide for Wisconsin Careers. "This workbook helps students become more directly involved in making their own career decisions and become aware of how success in school really prepares them to achieve their own career aspirations."



# Excerpts from "Don't Flinch"



l arry Alvarez and Ron Dayne address the media at the post-game news conference following the ladgers' 41-3 win over lowa on Nov. 13, 1999, the day Dayne became college football's all-time lading rusher.

e finished the 1995 season with a 4-5-2 record. Some people wanted to blame Darrell Bevell. Eut he was never a quarterback who was going to win games by himself.

One of the low points was a home loss to Iowa that eliminated us from bowl contention. We ran the ball 20 times for a minus-18 net yards.

That weekend we had a recruit on campus — a highly-touted running back out of New Jersey.

Most schools were recruiting him as a fullback. We wanted him to play tailback.

I asked him, "Do you like carrying the ball?"  $\,$ 

He nodded his head, and grinned "Well, I'll give you the damn ball as many times as you want it."

I kept my promise to Ron Dayne.
\*\*\*

When I first saw Dayne on high school film, I saw him lining up as a full-back about a yard or two behind the quarter' back. He would take two steps, get the ball and kind of disappear at the line of scrimmage.

And, then, you'd see the pile move. There were times when he would line up much deeper in the backfield, and you could see that he had great vision and patience. Most big runners are just going to try and run through the pile.

Each week the Badger Football Gameday Program will print an excerpt from "Don't Flinch - Barry Alvarez: The Autobiography" written by UW Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez with Mike Lucas of the Capital Times. Not Ron. He would allow things to develop.

Once he got into the secondary, you could tell that guys weren't crazy about tackling him, and he had the speed to outrun people. That's when I said, "He can play tailback."

That was one of our recruiting pitches. "We're not just going to put you at the position, and forget about you," I said. "You're going to get your shot to be our tailback."

He liked that.

What wasn't there to like about Dayne? He had vision, strength, and burst. He used his size to his ability and nobody caught him when he came out the back end.¶

As the game wore on, he got stronger. And he loved to play in the winter, he loved to play when it was cold. I couldn't have drawn it up any better.

I never worried about Dayne's weight. He was really thick as a freshman — 270pounds — but he handled it well.

John Dettmann, who coordinated our conditioning, said Dayne was beating the other tailbacks by a step-and-a-half in the five-yard sprints.

When you have a running back like Dayne, you have to have a quarterback who isn't worried about his numbers, his statistics. Mike Samuel was perfect.

When we recruited Samuel out of Philadelphia, we knew that he could play some other positions, other than quarterback. But I've always liked quarterbacks who can run.



And I really liked Sammy's toughness. He was as tough of a competitor as we've ever had.

Ask the kids, "Who on this team would you walk down a dark alley with?" Mike Samuel would be the No. 1

He was serious and all business. Not that I didn't get upset with him. Every practice, he would do something to upset me whenever he tried to pass.

I've never seen the football come out of anybody's hand like it did Mike's.

It wasn't like he wasn't trying. He just couldn't throw very well. At least not consistently.

That was the irony. When you needed a big throw, he could make it.

He was clutch, not pretty, but clutch. And we played to his strengths.

We needed someone to take the pressure off Dayne, someone who could burn people when they went to their blitz package. That someone was Samuel.

People would come up to me and say sarcastically, "Great coaching job — you just hand the ball to Ron Dayne. We know your next play before you're going to run it."

True. We were like Woody Hayes and his "three yards and a cloud of dust."


It wasn't hard to figure out who was going to get the ball.

But you still had to tackle Dayne and you had to deal with Samuel when we ran the option.¶

"Why don't you throw on first down," I was asked repeatedly.¶

"I don't like second-and-10?" I answered.

We did what we had to do to win.



# **Badger Billboard: Four Big Ten Trophies Up For Grabs**



Wisconsin has won eight consecutive Big Ten men's cross country championships, including last year's event in Minneapolis.

Four UW athletic teams are hoping to add Big Ten hardware to their trophy collections in the next couple of days.

Tomorrow, the men's and women's cross country teams compete at the Big Ten championships hosted by Indiana. Thursday, the men's and women's Big Ten soccer tournaments begin. The women's tournament is hosted by Penn State. The men's is hosted by Ohio State.

The men's cross country team is gunning for its eighth consecutive Big Ten team title. The Badgers have also produced seven of the last eight Big Ten individual champions. UW won last year's title with a near-perfect and meet record

The women's soccer team is looking to win back-to-back Big Ten tournament titles. The Badgers were seeded seventh a year ago, but knocked off second-seeded Purdue and third-seeded Michigan State before beating Michigan on its home field to claim the crown.

The women's cross country won six consecutive Big Ten championships from 1995-2000. UW leads the Big Ten with 13 team titles and 10 individual champions. Bethany Brewster was the last Badger to claim the individual title. She won in 2001.

The men's soccer team hopes a strong performance in the Big Ten during the regular season translates into postseason success. The Badgers last won a tournament title back in 1995 when they shared the championship with Indiana.
