Estimate of open debts for the Indian
Department at Detroit for the half year
ending at the different agencies under
the representation of the Governor of the
Michigan Territory for the last year
ending December 31. 1820.

For the pay of the officers of the Department
including artificers & labourers - - - - - 2180

For contingencies including presents,
expenses, ^{iron, coal, magazine} incident, fees, stationery, & translations,
and a variety of miscellaneous claims, which
are continually arising, & which cannot be
previouisly enumerated. \$1655

For the ~~pay~~ of a blacksmith at large
now agreeably to the treaty concluded at
that place - - - - - \$ 182

For the pay of a person charged with the
concerns of the Ottawa at the Miami \$ 75

Article of a treaty made and concluded at
the Sault de Ste. Marie in the Territory
of Michigan between the United States
of America by their Commissioner Lewis
Cass and the Chippeway tribe of Indians

Article 1. The Chippeway tribe of Indians
cede to the United States the follow-
ing tract of land, beginning at a
~~point~~^{the} big rock in the river St. Mary's
~~point~~^{on} the boundary line between
the United States & the British Pro-
vince of Upper Canada, and extending
as far as running thence down the
said river with the middle thereof
to the little rapids, and from those
points running back from the said
river so as to include fifteen square
miles of land.

Article 2. The Chippeway tribe of Indians
acknowledge to have received a quantity

of goods in full satisfaction of the pre-
ceding cession.

Article 3. The United States will leave
to the Indians a perpetual right
of fishing at the falls of the St. Mary
and at ~~a~~ ^{any} place of encampment
upon the trail hereby ceded, conve-
nient to the fishing ground, which
place shall not interfere with the
defences of any military work, which
may be erected, nor with any pri-
vate rights.

Article 4. This treaty, after the same
shall be ratified by the President
of the United States, by and with
the advice of the Senate thereof, shall
be obligatory on the contracting parties.

In testimony whereof the race of Lew
Cap Commission as aforesaid &
the Cheifs menors of the said Chapt-
heway take of Indemnity have been
to set their hands at the place
aforesaid this sixteenth day of June
in the year of our Lord 1820

True & present
