Articles of a treaty made and concluded at
the Sault de Ste. Marie in the Territory
of Michigan between the United States
of America by their Commissioner Lewis
Cass and the Chippeway tribe of Indians

Article 1. The Chippeway tribe of Indi-
ans cede to the United States the follow-
ing tract of land. Beginning at a
big rock in the river ^{the} ~~main~~ ^{mouth}
on the boundary line between
the United States & the British Pro-
vince of Upper Canada, ~~and~~ ^{and} ~~running~~
~~down~~ ^{and} ~~running~~ ^{running} thence down the
said river with the middle thereof
to the little rapid, and from there
north running back from the said
river so as to include fifteen square
miles of land.

Article 2. The Chippeway tribe of Indians
acknowledge to have received a quantity

of goods in full satisfaction of the pre-
ceding caption.

Article 3. The United States will secure
to the Indians a perpetual right
of fishing at the falls of the St. Mary
and at the ~~same~~ place of encampment
upon the tract hereby ceded, con-
sent to the fishing grounds, which
place shall not interfere with the
defense of any military work, which
may be erected, nor with any private
rights.

Article 4. This treaty, after the same
shall be ratified by the President
of the United States, by and with
the advice of the Senate thereof, shall
be obligatory on the contracting parties.

In testimony whereof the said Lewis
Cap. Commissioner as aforesaid &
the Chief & Warriors of the said Chip-
peway tribe of Indians have chosen
to set their hands at the place
aforesaid this fifteenth day of June
in the year of our Lord 1822
