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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, September 18, 1943, 9 A.M.

Vice President Holmos presiding

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Campbell, Cleary, Glover, Holmes, Kleczka, Sensenbronner.

ABSENT: Regents Grady, Hodgkins, Werner.

Regent Grady was present at the informal conference on Friday but had to be in Supreme Court this morning. Regent Hodgkins was prevented from coming to the meeting because of an important meeting in connection with Northland College in Ashland. A communication was received from Regent Werner from Washington in explanation of his absence.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Glover, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the special meeting of the Board held on August 30, 1943, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FRESIDENT

- Administration and General -

- 1. That the following actions of the Faculty be approved:
 - (a) Approved for nomination to the Regents the appointment of Alden W. White to the position of Acting Secretary of the Faculty.
 - (b) Approved, on recommendation of the Athletic Board, the action of the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives taken on May 15 and June 23, 1943. (Exhibit A attached)

It was also voted that the eligibility standards governing competitive athletics which were formerly in force be established at the University of Wisconsin.

- (c) Approved the recommendation of the Faculty of the Graduate School that graduate work in Milwaukee be continued for another two years. (Exhibit B attached)
- (d) Approved as a matter of expediency the establishing of a course of study for the training of Occupational Therapists. (Exhibit C attached) Before the course becomes operative, the approval of the faculties of the School of Medicine and the School of Education will be required.

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Kloczka, it was VOTED, That the action of the Executive Committee giving the Comptroller authority to accept the letter of intent from the War Department for the training of approximately forty WAGs in physical therapy, beginning October 1, 1943, be

Regent Callahan, who was appointed a committee of one to prepare a resolution in re Miss Julia M. Wilkinson, deceased, presented the following resolution:

> "The death of Miss Julia M. Wilkinson of our Prosident's Office staff has left a void in our University community which will be difficult, if not impossible, to fill. During the forty years in which she served the University, she won the respect and admiration and friendship of many students, alumni, and faculty members. Her many friends throughout the University community were shocked and grieved by her death.

Miss Wilkinson had the unique experience of serving as executive secretary to five presidents of the University. Born in Madison in 1875, she graduated from Central high school and then enrolled in several University courses of study. Later she left school to join the staff of the Registrar's office. It was from this position that President Charles R. Van Hise chose her as secretary in his office in 1904.

Miss Wilkinson successively served as secretary to Presidents Edward A. Birge, Glenn Frank, Acting President George C. Sellery, and President Dykstra. Her life of service here has spanned a goodly share of the "growing-up" stage of our University. She watched the University grow from a school of a few thousand students to a large institution with an enrolment of more than 12,000 in normal times. She watched the University's public service program and science research work for our state grow until the statement that "the boundaries of the campus are the boundaries of the state" became a fact.

But she did more than merely watch this progress. In her position in the President's office, she inevitably participated in the entire program, and often aided and abetted the University's progress in ways little known to most of us.

Miss Wilkinson brought to her daily work here great personal charm, a rare sense of humor, unflagging wit and tact, unimpeachable loyalty and integrity, a great amount of just plain common sense, and above all, undying devotion to the University as a whole and its ideals.

To this University's cause, as exemplified in its freely translated motto, "The Light of the World", she gave unstintingly of her good judgment and wisdom; of her great personal courage and tact and sense of humor; and of her rare gift of tolerance and sense of justice.

She will live long in the memories of all of us as an exemplification of this University itself---sincere and honest devotion to high ideals; conscientious and realistic application to daily duties; seeking always to serve and serve well the needs of our great state."

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, it was VOTED, That the resolution be approved, that it be spread upon the minutes of the Board and that a copy be sent to her nearest of kin.

The Comptroller presented the revisions in the budget approved by the Regents on June 26, 1943. Regent Cleary moved, with second by Regent Kloczka, that the revised budget for 1943-44 including the changes listed in Schedules A, B and C of September 18, 1943, all of which have been presented to the Regents, be approved. Copies of schedules attached. A called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Regent Holmes reported for the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee with reference to the consideration of a separate school of commerce and stated that there would be a public hearing in the Joint Finance Committee Hearing Room in the State Capitol on October 15, 1943, at 10:30 A.M. The Secretary was instructed to give notice to the press and to other interested parties.

Regent Kleczka reported upon the legal action regarding University printing started by the Democrat Printing Company and requested that the committee, Regents Grady and Kleczka, be authorized to confer with the Governor and request the appointment of special counsel. Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Campbell, the request was approved.

Regent Kleczka reported that the Educational Committee was not yet ready to report on the matter of scholarship stipends. including the requests in the

letter from Stephen Duggan, Director of the Institute of International Education, dated August 16, 1943.

President Dykstra reported that Professor Hastings and Professor Baldwin are working on the matter of the manufacture and distribution of Bang's disease vaccine and a report will be made later.

Regent Holmes brought up the matter of Senator Freehoff's committee in relation to the building program. It was arranged that a meeting of the Building Committee be held prior to the next meeting of the Board in order that a report can be made to the Board at its next meeting. President Dykstra was requested to fix the date and October 2, 1943, has been agreed upon, the meeting to be held at 10:15 A.M. in the State Architect's Office.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensonbrenner, the meeting adjourned at 10:25 A.M.

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Document 678 - August 1943

The Athletic Board recommends to the Faculty the approval of the following actions of the Intercollegiate (Big Ten) Conference of Faculty Representatives taken on the dates indicated:

May 15, 1943

"The Conference sanctions the use of 1 W students in football games played before the opening of the fall term or semester, for those cases in which the student has presented his credentials and been accepted by the University, has paid or deposited his general fees, and has satisfied the Faculty representative of his intention to become a bona fide student at the institution."

- June 23, 1943

"Whereas, it has become obvious that for the duration of the war intercollegiate athletic programs are to be essentially activities of the armed services, and

Whereas, it is the sense of the Conference that the widest possible opportunity for participation by the student bodies of the member institutions in competitive sports should be made available, particularly as a means of preparation for their most effective contributions to the war effort, and

"Thereas, many of the Conference rules of eligibility are the outgrowth of considerations which have little, if any, force during the present emergency.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved in order to effectuate the foregoing objective, that competition during the war period sponsored by any college or university shall not be deemed 'intercollegiate' as such term is used in the Conference rules and regulations.

"Provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall be deemed to waive any requirements for eligibility (1) in respect to regular enrollment as a student, or (2) non-receipt of compensation for athletic participation as a member of a team thus sponsored. "Provided further that while this resolution suspends the existing rules regarding academic requirements for eligibility for the time being, so far as they are prescribed by the Conference it is expected that each member institution will continue to maintain and enforce standards in such respect suitable to its condition in the current emergency."*

*As a corollary to the last resolution, the Faculty Representatives voted that the waiver of rules passed on February 21, 1943, which has already been approved by this Faculty should be considered a part of it. This waiver provided, for the duration of the war, "that all eligibility rules shall be waived with respect to any student in the armed forces of the United States on active duty assigned to any member institution, under contract or otherwise, the major part of whose instruction is given by members of the institution's faculty."

The effect of the resolutions the approval of which is here recommended

is to:

- 1. Suspend Conference rules regarding academic requirements for eligibility for the time being.
- 2. Permit any regularly enrolled student and any student who is in the armed forces on the campus to compete in University intercollegiate athletic competition.
- 3. Fermit new students in the fall term to compete in fall sports provided their credentials have been accepted and they have deposited the general fee.

EXHIBIT B

August, 1943

The Faculty of the Graduate School recommends:

That graduate work in Milwaukee be continued for two years in accordance with the following regulations -

All instruction is to be given by regular staff members of the University or by staff members of other institutions who have been approved for the status of graduate lecturers in our University by the Administrative Committee of the Graduate School upon the nomination of the University department concerned.

1. All graduate courses given in the graduate center will carry graduate credit applicable to both course and residence requirements of the University for the master's degree, but the present requirement of a minimum of one semester in residence on the campus at Madison for the master's degree shall be met.

2. The courses to be given must be recommended by the University department concerned and approved by the Administrative Committee of the Graduate School under whose supervision the program is to be organized and administered.

3. All new courses must also be approved by the appropriate Faculty Division or by the Course Committee of the University.

RECOMENDATIONS FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF UNIVERSITY WORK

IN OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

The function of the occupational therapist

The practice of occupational therapy consists of remedial treatment in the form of supervised activity for persons injured in body or mind by accident or disease. This treatment is administered by occupational therapists who are trained to work under the direction of physicians. The occupational therapist uses handcrafts, recreational activities, educational pursuits, and pre-industrial training as they help toward the physical, mental, social, and economic adjustment of the patient. He should, also, be capable of suggesting programs designed to recreate specific functions or to encourage restoration of impaired functions.

The need for occupational therapists

Occupational therapists are needed both for the present war emergency and for post-war rehabilitation. The hospitals of the Army, Navy, the Veteran's Bureau, civilian hospitals, and day school classes for physically handicapped are now asking for over six hundred occupational therapists. In 1942 there were only six approved schools of occupational therapy from which 140-160 students were graduated in each of the last two years. It appears that the demand for occupational therapists will continue to increase.

Standards for training of occupational therapists

The Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Education Association and the American Occupational Therapy Associations have prescribed the requirements by which schools may be approved for the training of occupational therapists, and by which students trained in the schools may become eligible for listing in the Directory of Registered Occupational Therapists.

The university facilities for training of occupational therapists

The University of Wisconsin is able to meet the course requirements for the prescribed training of occupational therapists through its existing courses, with the exception of 13 credits in the theory of technical aspects of occupational therapy. Courses in which these credits may be earned can be provided by the Medical School, which can also provide facilities for the required hospital practice training.

(Over)

The recommendations:

- I. That the University Faculty recommend to the Board of Regents:
 - 1. That a program of courses and training be established which will lead to the degree Bachelor of Science (Occupational Therapy).
 - 2. That the degree be recommended by the Faculty of the School of Education after the completion of a curriculum which meets these general and specific requirements:

General

- a. A minimum of 124 credits of work.
- b. The satisfaction of the general requirements of the Ph.B. or the B.A. course or of any one of the sequences leading to the B.S. in Education degree.

Specific (as prescribed by A.M.A.)

- a. A minimum of 30 semester hours of theoretical instruction, to include anatomy, kinesiology, physiology, physics, psychology, sociology, and the theory of occupational therapy.
- b. A minimum of 30 hours of technical instruction, to be selected from the fields of education, art education, physical education, and home economics, in accordance with one of the following fields of concentration:
 - (1) Therapeutic Arts and Crafts
 - (2) Educational Therapy
 - (3) Recreational Therapy
- c. One year (36 weeks) of hospital-practice training.
- 3. That the students entering work for this degree register in the College of Letters and Science during the first two years of work and transfer to the School of Education 'for the third and fourth years of work.
- 4. That the direction and supervision of the complete program be in collaboration with the Medical School, which will provide the clinical training and grant the certificate and diploma in occupational therapy.
- II. That the University Faculty recommend that the Medical School be authorized to grant a diploma or certificate in occupational therapy to such students as complete the requirements for such certification, as prescribed by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals and the American Occupational Therapy Association.
- III. That the recommendations here made become effective only after their approval by the Faculties of the School of Education and the Medical School.
