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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, October 14, 1939, 9:30 A.M.

President Glover presiding

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Cleary, Ekern, Glover, Hodgkins, Holmes, Kleczka, Sensenbrenner, Vergeront, Werner.

All Regents present.

Upon motion of Regert Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meetings of the Board held on July 11, 1939, and September 20, 1939, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Comptroller -

1. That the Comptroller be authorized to endorse and make payable to Mr. E. E. Schwarztrauber a check for \$300 received from the Carnegie Corporation of New York in partial payment of an appropriation for study of content and techniques of workers' education which was made payable to the University of Wisconsin in error. (Confirming verbal approval by the Executive Committee.)

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, adopted.

The President's recommendations together with the supplemental recommendations which are attached to these minutes identified as $\underline{\text{EXHIBIT}}$ F, were then considered item by item.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Ekern, the recommendations included in EXHIBIT F were adopted. After discussion of the Offer of the United States of America to amend the contract created by the acceptance by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin on October 14, 1938, of the Offer made by the United States of America and dated September 22, 1938, the following Resolution was proposed by President C. A. Dykstra, and read in full:

> A RESOLUTION ACC. PTING THE OFFER OF THE UNITED STATES TO THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN TO AMEND THE CONTRACT CREATED BY THE ACCEPTANCE BY THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN OF OCTOBER 14, 1938 OF THE OFFER MADE BY THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICAN AND DATED SEPTEMBER 22, 1938.

Be it resolved by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin

Section 1. That the Offer of the United States of America to amend the contract created by the acceptance by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin on October 14, 1938 of the Offer made by the United States of America and dated September 22, 1938, a copy of which Offer reads as follows, be and the same is hereby in all respects accepted:

The United States of America hereby offers to amend the contract created by the acceptance by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, on October 14, 1938, of the Offer made by the United States of America and dated September 22, 1938, by (1) striking out, in Line 9 of Paragraph 1 of said Offer, the figures "\$78,750" and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "\$82,638", and (2) by striking out Paragraph 2 of said Offer and inserting in lieu thereof a paragraph to read as follows: "2. By acceptance of this Offer the Applicant covenants to complete the Project with all practicable dispatch, and in any event by January 5, 1940."

The President of The Regents of the University of Visconsin thereupon declared said Resolution carried and the President of The Regents of the University of Visconsin thereupon signed said Resolution in approval thereof.

The matter of the bequest of \$1000 for scholarships provided in the will of Zona Gale, which was accepted by the Executive Committee of the Regents on July 29, 1939, was brought up for confirmation. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was

VOTED, That the action of the committee be confirmed and that the bequest be accepted.

Mr. Arthur Roberts, Sr., of Belleville, Wisconsin, appeared before the Board to appeal for relief from payment of <u>non-resident tuition</u> of his son who reached his majority before entering the University and who did not have a year of residence in the state. No action was taken.

Upon motion of Regent Holmes, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, the following resolutions were adopted:

> A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR A REVISION IN THE ESTIMATE OF THE COST OF THE HEATING STATION PROJECT, PWA DOCKET WIS. 1594-F, AND RELATING TO THE AVAILABILITY OF SUFFICIENT FUNDS

WHEREAS, the estimate of the cost of the construction of an addition to, alterations of and replacements in a heating plant, including necessary heating plant equipment and appurtenances (FWA Docket Wis. 1594-F), of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin needs to be revised by reason of the following:

- 1. To reduce the estimate on Item 1, Preliminary Expense
- 2. To increase the estimate on Item 4, Engineering, on account of the extension of the period of construction
- 3. To record the reduction in the amount of Owner's Funds Available and the reduction in the total cost of the project.

A RESOLUTION WAIVING LIQUIDATED DANAGES AND EXTEND-ING THE TAME FOR COMPLETING THE SPRINGFIELD BOILER COMPANY CONTRACT OF THE FEATING PLANT ADDITION, PWA DOCKET WIS. 1594-F

WHEREAS, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, (hereinafter referred to as "Owner") and the Springfield Boiler Company, (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor") have entered into a contract for performance of certain work, in connection with the construction of the Heating Plant Addition Project of the Owner:

WHEREAS, It is provided in the said contract that, in the event the said work in not completed by the first day of October, 1939, the said Contractor shall pay to the Owner as liquidated damages an amount computed on the basis of \$100.00 for each day the said work remains uncompleted after the aforesaid date: and WHEREAS, For the reason hereinafter enumerated, it has become impossible for the Contractor to perform the said contract within the contractual date for completion; viz:

> Delay in the progress of the work on other contracts on the project provented the said Contractor from progressing rapidly enough to complete the said contract within the contractual date for completion. The delay on other contracts was beyond the control of the Contractor.

WHEREAS, It appears the said Contractor is not legally responsible for such delay in the completion of said contract and, accordingly, liquidated damages should not be assessed:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE AND IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin (1) that the contractual date for completion of the said contract be extended to the 21st day of December. 1939; (2) that the Regents of the University of Wisconsin waive any and all claims for liquidated damages arising out of the failure of the Contractor to complete the work prior thereto; and (3) that said contractual provision providing for liquidated damages shall otherwise remain in full force and effect provided, however, that liquidated damages may be hereafter assessed in accordance with the terms of the contract only from and after the aforesaid extended date for completion of the work.

President Dykstra reported upon the gift from A. W. Schorger of Madison of the Snyder collection of mammals. Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Holmes, it was

VOTED, That the gift be accepted and that the Secretary express the appreciation of the Regents to Mr. Schorger.

President Dykstra reported to the Regents upon the University of Wisconsin Press, which was established in 1937, and stated that sample volumes that had been brought out by the press would be mailed to the Regents.

Upon recommendation of the President, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callaban, it was

The President again brought up for consideration Bill No. 924, A, setting aside the increases to civil service employees and requiring the approval of the Emergency Board for all such increases. After considerable discussion and upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That the President of the Board, the President of the University and the Comptroller be authorized to appear before the Emergency Board to urge that the salaries for the staff now provided for in the budget be maintained.

(Note: The President explained that these increases in the University amounted to \$30,769 and that \$10,938 of this amount would come from revolving funds and \$10,111 from hourly increases of crafts allowed by the Personnel Board, leaving \$9720 to come from increases of staff on the monthly basis. Only three-fourths of these amounts are affected by Bill 924,A, since one-fourth of the year has elapsed. It is understood that the Finance Committee is available for consultation if necessary or if so desired by the Emergency Board.

President Dykstra reported to the Regents upon a letter received from the Emergency Board informing him of the possibility of a 25% cut from University appropriations for the second half of the current year.

Upon recommendation of the President, and upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, there is pending before the Federal Communications Commission an application authorized by the Board of Regents for improved broadcasting facilities for the state radio service, and

WHEREAS, the vigorous and successful prosecution of this application is dependent upon an appropriation of funds by the Wisconsin Legislature which adjourned before the enabling bill was voted on by the Senate:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents, the State Board of A_t riculture concurring, instructs the Attorney General to file a request to withdraw, without prejudice, the pending application (Docket No. 5373).

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee of the Regents held on July 20, July 29, August 7, August 29 and September 30, 1939, as sent out to the Regents, be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Secretary called attention to the following action taken by the Executive Committee of the Regents on August 29, 1939:

"Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED, That the Executive Committee approves and recommends to the incoming Board of Regents that the Summer Session School for Workers in Industry be maintained in 1940 on the same basis as it was in 1936." Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, it was VOTED, That this matter be referred to the Educational Committee to report at the next meeting of the Board.

The Secretary presented communications from Given Couse, Secretary of the University Cooperative Council, Madison, Misconsin, dated October 12, 1939; Arthur Garfield Hays, General Counsel, American Civil Liberties Union, New York City; and David M. Fromstein, President of the University Progressive Club, Madison, Wisconsin, with reference to the action taken by the Regents regarding the distribution of handbills on the University campus. These communications were placed on file. The Comptroller distributed mimeographed copies of a statement with reference to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation. (Copy on file.)

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it

VOTED, That the next meeting of the Board be held on Saturday, November 18, 1939, at 9:30 A.M.
