## REGULAR MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Madison, Wisconsin

Wednesday, June 2, 1926, 2:00 P.M.

PRESENT: Regents Olbrich, Kronshage; President Frank, Business Manager Phillips, Secretary McCaffrey.

Director Little and Superintendent Gallistel met with the committee and discussed the matter of additional tennis courts.

Director Little was requested to have a survey made of the land and prepare an estimate for the construction of tennis courts and other improvements in the play grounds near the men's dormitories.

The Business Manager presented a statement of the reductions and changes in the 1926-27 Budget, in accordance with the action taken by the Board on May 13, 1926, involving net decreases in 1-A, Operation, of \$27,839, and net increases of \$17,480; also net decreases in 1-D, Capital, of \$2500, and net increases of \$2445. The statement was approved as presented.

Upon recommendation of President Frank, it was VOTED, That the salary of F. B. Morrison, acting dean of the College of Agriculture for the year 1926-27, be the same as for the present year.

## CORA RODERMUND EVANS LOAN FUND

#### FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS BE APPROVED:

- 1. That the fund be known as the Cora Rodermund Evans Loan Fund for Medical Students.
- 2. That no loans be made for a longer period than one year, but that extensions or renewals may be granted.
- 3. That interest be charged at the rate of 5% from date of note until paid.
- 4. That loans be made upon recommendation of the Dean of the Medical School.
- 5. That the income of the Trust Fund be transferred to the Thesis and Loan Account on July 1st of each year; that the working loan fund then be handled as a revolving fund, the same as the Graduating Class Loan Fund and other loan funds.

The following is a quotation from the Will of Cora Roder-mund Evans:

"Second. I will, give and bequeath to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin the sum of five thousand

dollars (\$5,000) and such other sums as shall come to said regents by reason of the provisions of this will hereinafter set forth, to be held and invested and the income therefrom to be loaned to deserving students in the medical department of the university."

The Business Manager presented the correspondence with Frank Jenks, Madison City Attorney, in re the matter of the gift of the University Cooperative Association property.

It was suggested that Mr. Jenks be asked to take the matter up with the Attorney-General.

The request of Professor E. M. Terry for two additional amplifiers at an estimated cost of \$60, was approved. Charge to Regents' Unassigned. Capital.

Upon request of Professor W. H. Twenhofel, authority was granted to have the State Architect prepare preliminary sketches for proposed changes in Science Hall.

Upon recommendation of the Business Manager, it was VOTED. That the office hours of the business departments in the Administration Building, during the period June 14 to September 11, 1926, be as follows: 8 to 12 Λ. Μ., 1:30 to 4:30 P. M.
