The Christmas Story in pageant, never was more beautifully depicted and more impressively brought to the people in song, costume and scenery, than on Wednesday and Thursday evenings this week in the high school auditorium by a cast of performers, singers and musicians, all well chosen for their parts, and all being from the village. Mrs. Victor Keiser was director. Mr. Viste, general chairman.

Beginning with the Prophecy when the Shepherd keeping watch in the field was met by the travelers who had come from afar to ask the meaning of the Star they had seen. The costumes and the singing of this group of "Watchman Tell Us Of The Night" and "Beautiful Star", were beautiful. "The Consecration and Coronation" when the people accept Jesus as the Saviour of mankind. The singing of the entire cast "Crown Him Lord of All" in the last Episode was most impressive and inspiring.

The pageant, written by H. Augustine Smith, Boston, has been produced 50,000 times.

The choir, assisted by Marta Ibsen, harpist, Clara Ridell, violinist, Mrs. Victor Keiser, organist, Miss M. Van Biesbroeck, pianist, rendered a full and balanced accompaniment for the singing. Music was directed by Jean Radebaugh, who also appeared as soloist, singing the "Virgins Lullaby". Jacqueline Lockwood sang the obligato in the "First Noel", Beth Kinney sang the solo part - "Beautiful Star." Little Little Lincoln Keiser and Dorothy Fridlund noted the part of cherubs.

The programs done by Mrs. G. Van Biesbroeck were hand decorated, painted candles and holly berries on green background with black lettering.

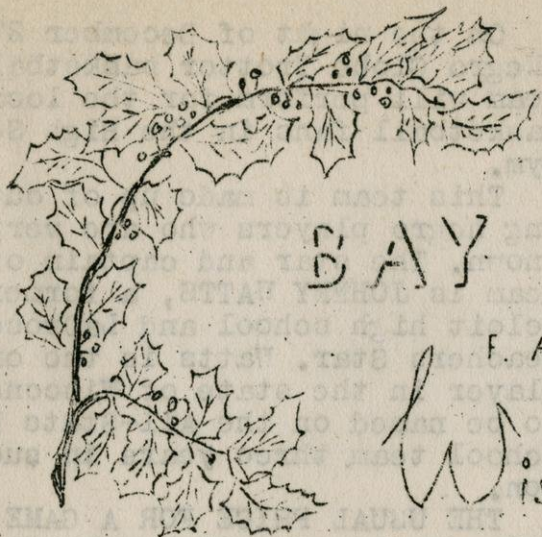
How very apropos that this pageant "Light Of The World" should be shown to the people in America, when in all Europe the "Lights" are out because of war, and in America there is Peace.

members gathered at the spacious and beautiful home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Fridlund, Fontana Road, on Tuesday evening for their annual Christmas party.

A buffet supper of choice delectable foods was served at 6:30, the members being seated at small tables thruout the large rooms.

A program followed-"Christmas In All Lands", showing the Christmas customs and symbols in foreign lands that have come to us as a heritage from our ancestors. From whatever country they came, all had the same ideal, all desired better and happier homes. (The Modern American Home" is the Club's study topic this year).

From Germany we get our Christmas tree. The lighted candles symbolize the stars. It is a creation of Christian thought and sentiment. To Italy we owe the custom of the Christmas wreaths, being an honor conferred on anyone by sending laurel wreaths.

In France, Christmas candles were lighted and placed in the window on Christmas eve, and burned all night.

To Denmark we owe our custom of the Christmas seals, used to decorate our packages and letters. Spain- the Poinsetta. To the flower loving Spanish people we owe the lovely custom of sending flowers at Christmas time.

In "Merry England" it has long been the custom to hang the mistletoe, so that friends might come and share in the festive joy. (Mrs. Wm Phipps recited a verse dramatizing this part of the program).

In Sweden- they would not sit down to the Christmas feast unless the birds were fed first, so everywhere one sees sheaves of wheat or other grain hanging out.

In Holland- the wooden shoes, "Knecht Klobes", were set outside the door for Santa Claus to fill. In America, we hang up our stocking by the fireplace or window for Santa to see. (Donna Elbert, wearing wooden shoes, spoke a short verse about this custom).

In Chzekoslovakia-Carol singers carrying miniature Bethlehem scenes, are very popular, going from house to house singing carols.

Norway- Dry spruce is the favorite wood to burn at Christmas. The many sparks coming from it prevent the witches who ride thru the air on brooms, from coming down the chimneys. Instead of wishing others "Merry Christmas" in the early morning, the members of the family sing a little hymn.

In Belgium- St. Nicholas goes from house to house on December 5, carrying a gilded book in which to write the names of the bad children. Young Belgian maidens still carry the candles to the well at midnight to see the faces of their future husbands.

FOOD CUSTOMS-

The American Indian brought the wild turkey. It is our national feast bird.

The Swedish and Scandinavian people serve the lingon berry, corresponding to our cranberry.

NORWAY brings us cookies, Denmark brings us Julekagn.

GERMANY- The German-Hausfrau must have a bowl of "Pfeffer-Nuesse" with her Christmas dinner.

POLAND- The Polish bride offers "Chrusciki" or unleavened bread.

This is served on Christmas morning after a Christmas meal is served.

LITHUANIA-On Christmas eve a layer of hay is placed on the table under the cloth in memory of the night in Bethlehem, and a wafer symbolizing the love and harmony of the season is shared by all present.

RUSSIA- The father presides over the punch bowl. Babuska (Grandmother) is the dispenser of gifts at Christmas time. An old legend is that she refused to accompany the Three Kings on their journey and misdirected them to Bethlehem. Regretting this, she goes about on Christmas Eve looking for the Christ Child and distributing gifts. In modern Russia observance of Christmas is of course against the law.

MORAVIA- The children of Moravia are quite happy with baskets of ginger cookies at Christmas time.

BULGARIA- In Bulgaria the Christmas feast is preceded by a fast beginning on St. Andrews Day, almost a whole week before Christmas Eve. On that night the father officiates at a service in the home where the entire family participates, gathering about the fire-place while the father carrying burning incense, asking God's blessing on them.

JUGO-SLAVIA- They must have a "Venec" (a wreath-shaped cake)

ITALY- Brings us the fruits.

SPAIN- Of course our dinner would not be complete without Spanish olives.

FRANCE-The French prefer light pastry, and we all know how popular French pastries have become in this country.

HOLLAND- The Holland mother will always have her "banket" ready for the guests.

IRELAND- The placing of lights in the windows has become very popular in our holiday festivities. It originated in Ireland. The Irish place lighted candles in their windows on Christmas eve, as a guide and an invitation to all, who like Mary and Joseph may be wondering about unable to find shelter for the night. The

favorite dishes are plum-duff and onion pie. (Mrs. Wm Phipps danced the Irish Jig, dressed in costume)

SCOTLAND- Scotland has contributed much to our country in religion, education and thrift. The Scotch will provide short-bread for our Christmas feast. (Donna Elbert danced the Highland Fling, dressed in appropriate costume)

ENGLAND- In "Merry England" the blazing plum pudding is quite the proper thing to top off the Christmas feast. (burning candles are placed on top of the pudding) when brought to the table.

And now when countries are at war with each other, it is altogether fitting that we thank God that we are at peace with the whole world, and it permits us to place the "Dove of Peace" on our table at this Christmas time.

BAY SCIENTISTS DISCOVER HEAVY STARS

Discoveries recently made at McDonald observatory at Fort Davis, Texas, operated by the staff of Yerkes observatory, Williams Bay, may upset present theories now held by astronomers.

Five stars belonging to the group known as "white dwarfs" have been found to make a total of 24. Dr. Gerard P. Kuiper, Wms Bay, has discovered 13 of them through the 82 inch reflector of the telescope at McDonald observatory.

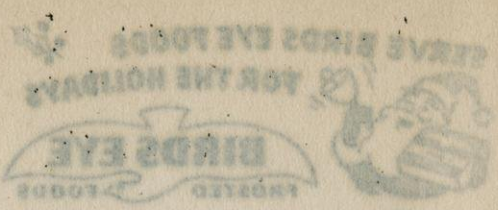

these stars are approximately as large as the earth, but their weight is more like that of the sun. "Their densities in some cases exceed 1000 tons per cubic inch."

Dr. Kuiper's work shows that hydrogen is fairly abundant in the stars investigated.

LOTS OF ACTIVITY SCHEDULED FOR THE SKY IN 1940

So says Dr. Oliver Justin Lee, director of Dearborn observatory of Northwestern University, Evanston; and a former member of the staff of Yerkes observatory, Wms Bay.

Consulting his astronomical calendar for next year, Dr. Lee says the transit of Mercury would be visible in the middle west from 2:05 p.m. until sunset on November 11. An annular eclipse (one which occurs when the moon is so far from the earth that it does not cover the entire disk of the sun) would occur April 7 next. There will be a total eclipse October 1, Dr. Lee said, but you will have to go to northern South America or southern Africa to watch it.

Annual meteor showers thru which the earth passes will be visible on the nights of January 3, April 20, May 2, July 28, August 12, October 20, Nov. 14, 24, and Dec. 10.

So look up, and not down in 1940.
