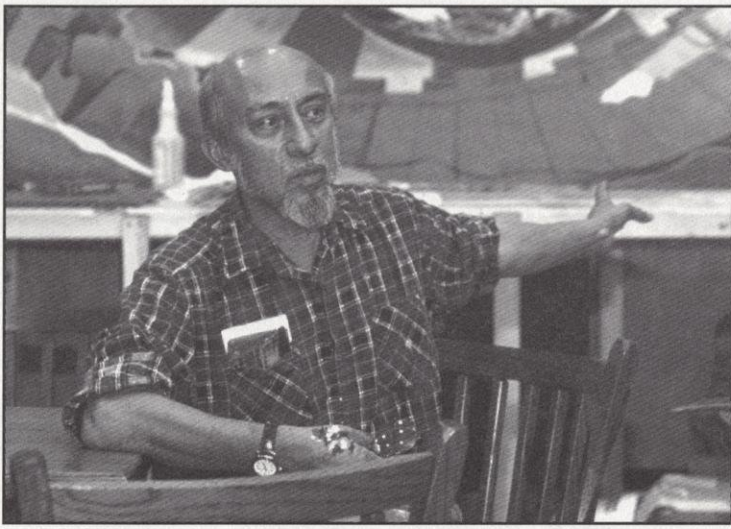

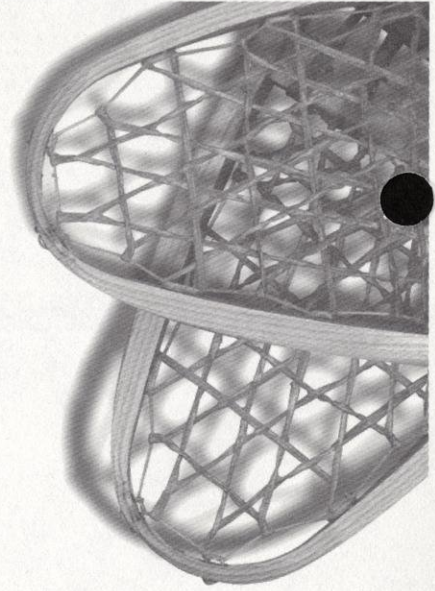
Through the use of state-of-the-art scanners, the Wisconsin Union launched a new debit card program last fall, WISCARD, which allows students, faculty and staff to use their UW ID card for purchases and deposits. Soon, WISCARD will be offered to Union members, as well.

In the Trophy Room at Memorial Union, internationally known artist Leo Tanguma put the final brush strokes to his two mural creations entitled, "The Nourishment of Our Human Dignity" and "The Inheritance of Struggle." The works are the result of student interest to both beautify the Union and increase awareness of social issues that affect us all.

Harry Wu — China: Yesterday, Today & Tomorrow

February 11 • 7:30 pm

Human rights champion and former Chinese political prisoner Harry Wu continues to return to his native country in order to document slavery and human rights abuses. His lecture will apply these experiences to the politics of the People's Republic of China.

Sarah Weddington — The Constitutional Implications of Roe v. Wade

February 25 • 7:30 pm

The attorney who successfully argued the Roe v. Wade case of 1973 has continued to be a political leader since the landmark decision. Weddington served as special assistant to President Carter on women's issues and is currently a professor at the University of Texas at Austin.

Hoofer Lounge Renovated

Since 1939, the Harold C. Bradley Hoofer Lounge has served as home to the seven Hoofer outdoor clubs. Not surprisingly, after many years of use, the lounge began showing signs of its age.

In 1995, a fund raising effort to restore the Hoofer headquarters was begun. In the spirit of camaraderie, a Hoofer alum extended a challenge to all Hoofers past and present to unite as one family to renovate the lounge. He promised to match one dollar for every two dollars raised for the refurbishing project.

In response to this challenge, over 200 people donated, many, more than once.

With the renovation now close to completion, the lounge looks better than it has in 30 years. With new carpeting, cabinets, windows, furniture and room dividers, the renovations have aided Hoofers by creating more classroom and meeting spaces.

Next year, the Hoofers hope to continue by renovating the Hoofer entrance corridor and the outdoor programs and student leadership offices. Assuming the necessary funds are received, construction will begin later this year.

Hoofer Youth Sailing Classes Enrolling Now

Though the winter lakes have frozen over, it's not too soon to sign your child up for the 1997 Hoofer Youth Sailing Program.

Every summer, some 150 youths between the ages of 10 and 17 take to the water of Lake Mendota as part of the Hoofer Youth Sailing Program. Students learn the basics of sailing including rigging, launching, recovering from a capsized, maneuvering a boat, and landing, all while having a good deal of summer fun. As head instructor Jim Roger notes, "Students learn to treat sailing, the marine environment, other boats and their own equipment with respect."

Classes are offered for a variety of different sailing skill levels, including racing. Sailboarding classes are also available.

Youth instruction begins June 17, 1997 and runs through August. All classes are taught by experienced instructors and last approximately two weeks. The program is available to the children of Union members, and the average fee is \$90.

Classes fill quickly so early registration is recommended. Call Youth Sailing Program Coordinator Jim Rogers at 262-1630 for more information or to receive the 1997 Youth Sailing registration packet.

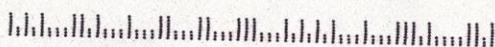

Travel Center Offerings For Union Members

The Wisconsin Union Travel Center, located on the 4th floor in Memorial Union, offers many services for Union members. Members receive substantial discounts on round-trip bus tickets between Chicago and Madison on the Van Galder line. In addition, the Travel Center offers instant passport photos at a competitive rate and an extensive resource library for travelers.

Travel advising appointments are available, and foreign and domestic travel materials on immigration, customs, and cultural information are provided. If you're interested in river rafting, cooking schools or other overseas short-term learning vacations, the Travel Center is the place to look for assistance.

The Travel Center also offers educational programs like **A Saturday in Europe**. This general orientation for travelers to Europe will be presented on April 12, 1997 in the Memorial Union. The program includes information on travel and cultural awareness, and features skits, panel discussions and workshops. There is no charge for this program, but advance registration is required.

The **Escape to Nakina** trip remains a Travel Center highlight for Union members. For beginning and experienced voyagers, the trip begins in Nakina, Ontario. Participants spend a week paddling in the land of unspoiled wilderness. Choose between the weeks of August 2-9 or August 9-16. All meals and most equipment are included for \$349.
