
N. Wayne Taylor, Chairman Department of Art

Since 1974 it has been the pleasure of the Elvehjem Museum of Art to present every four years work by the faculty of the Department of Art. These quadrennial exhibitions serve a vital function, as Professor Wayne Taylor points out. Many of the faculty have national reputations and are shown in a variety of museums and galleries across the country, and several among them exhibit at the Madison Art Center and in galleries in town; but only at the Elvehjem do the university and community have the occasion to view recent works by *all* of the Department of Art's faculty. It should also be noted that the quadrennial exhibitions offer the numerous University of Wisconsin-Madison students enrolled in art classes the unique opportunity of seeing the work of their faculty as a whole, the exhibition facilities available to the Department in the Humanities Building being inadequate for this purpose.

Each artist in the Department of Art acted as his/her own juror, selecting the works to be exhibited, and, moreover, providing a short biography for the catalogue. The extensive logistics of the exhibition were engineered by a coordinating committee from the Department of Art and by members of the Elvehjem staff. We extend our appreciation to Professors Wayne Taylor, Bruce Breckenridge, Gibson Byrd, Warrington Colescott, and Philip Hamilton from the Department of Art, and to Assistant Director, Stephen C. McGough, and Curator of Collections, Carlton Overland for the time and effort they gave to the realization of the exhibition and the publication of its catalogue. We likewise wish to thank Professor Hamilton and Earl J. Madden of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Publications Office for the handsome design of the catalogue. 


Man anderson

Donald M. Anderson was educated at the University of Iowa studying with Philip Guston and others. He has taken advanced work in drawing at Mexico City College. Professor Anderson taught one year at the University of Minnesota, Duluth before becoming an illustrator for an army unit in the Pentagon Building in Washington, D.C. Then came three years of service in the army during World War II. Out of service, Anderson worked as a three-dimensional designer for the Civil Aeronautics Bureau in Washington, D.C. He came to the University of Wisconsin-Madison in the fall of 1947. He is the author of Elements of Design (Holt, Rinehart & Winston, N.Y., 1961) and the Art of Written Forms (Holt, Rinehart & Winston, N.Y., 1969). This work was given a four-page illustrated review in Publishers' Weekly. Anderson's A Renaissance Alphabet, was published by the University of Wisconsin Press in 1971. This volume was reviewed in the London Times and the Royal Journal of Art.




Swingin' Ink Drawing




Brus Bredtensige

Bruce Breckenridge was born the day of the market crash, October 29, 1929. He attended public schools in various parts of the country, and this early stint as a traveler became a way of life. In 1952 he received the Bachelor of Science degree in Art Education from Wisconsin State College, Milwaukee, although previously he had attended Michigan State University, Western Michigan College, and the Summer School of Painting, Oxbow. The following summer he was awarded the degree of Master of Fine Arts from the Cranbrook Academy of Art. Since 1954 he has taught at a number of colleges and universities: Olivet College, the California College of Arts and Crafts, Hunter College of the City University of New York, the University of California-Berkeley, and since 1968 at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He also has extensive museum experience with the Richmond (California) Art Center, the Museum of Modern Art, and the Museum of Contemporary Crafts, New York City, where he served as Assistant Director. He has exhibited both paintings and ceramics regionally and nationally.

Mel Butor's formative years were in Cleveland, Ohio, where he graduated from the Cleveland Institute of Art and took advanced degrees from Kent State University. He exhibited widely in the Cleveland, Akron, and Youngstown, Ohio area. Prior to moving to New York City, where he actively painted and exhibited, he traveled and studied in Europe and North Africa. Gallery affiliations while living in the New York City area were with the Kornblee Gallery, Amel Gallery, Waddell Gallery, and the East Hampton Gallery. Among the more significant shows he had at that time were: "The Square in Painting" and "Pop And Op" - both traveling shows sponsored by the American Federation of Art — and a solo show in Washington, D.C. More recently and in the Midwest he did a commission for the Johnson Wax Company, produced an environmental piece for the Madison Art Center entitled, "Isoceles Red," and had shows in Ripon, Appleton, and Sheboygan. Locally works are in the permanent collections of the Elvehjem and the Madison Art Center.

A native of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Gibson Byrd has been a member of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Art Department since 1955. A painter and educator, he has served as Department Chairman, Graduate Chairman, and Undergraduate Chairman. He received his B.A. from the University of Tulsa and his M.A. from the State University of Iowa in Iowa City. Prior to coming to Madison. Byrd was the Director of the Kalamazoo Art Center, lectured with the University of Michigan Extension Division, and taught art at Central High School in Tulsa, Oklahoma. During the academic year 1965-66 he was Visiting Lecturer at the School of Art Education of the Birmingham College of Arts and Crafts in Birmingham, England. For many years Byrd's painting has reflected his interest in figurative imagery; his recent work emphasizes landscape. His paintings have been exhibited in competitive, invitational, and solo exhibits since 1949. Public collections that include his paintings are: The Butler Institute of American Art; the John Nelson Bergstrom Museum of Art, Neenah, Wisconsin; the Madison Art Center; the Philbrook Art Center, Tulsa. Oklahoma; the University of Tulsa; the Wright Art Center of Beloit College; the University of Wisconsin campuses at Green Bay, LaCrosse, and Parkside, and the UW Centers at Fox Valley and Waukesha. 




Walking Over Oil, 32" x 40"


Warrington Colescott is a frequently exhibited artist in national and international print shows. He holds the Leo Steppat Professorship, and has been an Art Department faculty member since 1949. His teaching responsibilities include the etching-intaglio classes, and he has served in the past as Chairman of the Department and of the Graphics Area. He received his A.B. and M.A. in art from the University of California, Berkeley, and did further study in Paris at the Academie de la Grande Chaumiere and in London at the Slade School of Art, University College under a Fulbright grant. He had a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1965, National Endowment for the Arts Printmaking Fellowship in 1977, and an N.E.A. Artists Fellowship in 1979. His color etchings are represented in most major public collections and recent invitational exhibits including the 1981 International Print Exhibition at Ljubljana, Yugoslavia, the 1981 Biennial Americana de Artes. Colombia. and the 22nd National Print Exhibition at the Brooklyn Museum. Complete sets of his "History of Printmaking" folio have been acquired by the Portland Art Museum, the Brooklyn Museum, the Museum of the Carnegie Institute, the Madison Art Cener, and Syracuse University, among others.





Jack Damer, born in Pittsburgh, has been an active member of the Madison faculty since 1965. In addition, he has taught at Indiana University and at Concordia in Montreal. After receiving a B.F.A. degree from Carnegie Mellon University, he served in the United States Army and worked as a graphic designer in Washington before coming to Wisconsin. During his teaching career he has exhibited in more than 100 national and international graphics exhibitions, and he has visited over 25 universities and organizations as a guest artist. In 1970 he was Lithography Director of the U.S. Print Workshop at the Venice Biennale, and in the following years he traveled extensively in Europe, Mexico, Canada, and the U.S. He has been awarded nine University research grants, a MacDowell fellowship, and for 1982, an N.E.A. Grant. His work is represented in over 35 collections, including the Brooklyn Museum, the Museum of the Carnegie Institute, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the Library of Congress.

Patricia Fennell was born in 1952 in Brooklyn, New York. She received her B.F.A. cum laude in 1974 from the Marvland Institute College of Art in Baltimore. While enrolled at the Maryland Institute she was the recipient of the Fergueson Merit Scholarship and the Evergreen Foundation Grant. In 1976 she was awarded her M.F.A. in painting from the Pennsylvania State University. As a part of her graduate training. Ms. Fennell was selected to serve as an apprentice to Ellen Lanyon in her studio in New York City (February-March 1975). Her M.F.A. monograph was devoted to the career of John Graham. Previous to her current appointment as lecturer at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Ms. Fennell lived in Bloomington, Indiana with her husband. There she continued her painting and drawing while working at a part time job. Consistent elements of her work are satire and fantasy. The theatrical presentation of situations and environments and the juxtaposition of incongruous images are also important concerns to her. She has exhibited widely, with a forthcoming solo exhibition at the Center Gallery, Madison, Wisconsin.

Fred Fenster has been active as a metalsmith for the past twenty-five years. Since obtaining his M.F.A. degree in 1960 at the Cranbrook Academy of Art, he has maintained a personal studio as well as teaching and conducting workshops. Currently a Professor of Art, University of Wisconsin-Madison, he is the recipient of numerous honors and awards. including an N.E.A. grant in 1977. 

Lobert Shilley

Robert L. Grilley was born in Beloit, Wisconsin, November 14, 1920, and has been a Wisconsin resident since then, except for Air Force duty during World War II. He received degrees from the University of Wisconsin and became a faculty member in 1945. Figures and portraits have provided his main pictorial content both in drawing and painting, executed in a considerable range of scale and with varying approaches. He has had a number of solo exhibitions in New York, Chicago. and Los Angeles, and he has been included in national and invitational shows. Grilley teaches advanced life drawing, undergraduate painting, and graduate painting, where he serves as major professor to a substantial number of graduate students, some who have been students of his former students - in several cases third generation. His wife, who is a brain research scientist, is Japanese, and together they have traveled in Japan, where he has been able to observe both art and life in that culture. Grilley has been a pilot for 42 years and has developed the rather unusual hobby of making close range aerial photographs of some of the highest rocky mountains. This has not, to this point, entered into the world of his painting, since he does not ordinarily work from photographs. The mountains, however, may yet make their demands for painting, and the figures may have to share his attention.




Walter Hamady

Walter Hamady: "Writing one's own biography is a difficult task. The fact of being born on a Friday the thirteenth in Flint, Michigan is a ho-hum matter. Getting degrees doesn't imply getting educated, the B.F.A. from Wayne State and M.F.A. from Cranbrook signal little. Measuring accomplishments is dubious. What is accomplished in a year varies, like a day — some are wonderful, others awful. Years pass as days, are too short to really measure, but a decade begins to show something and a lifetime is more like it. Participating in this show or that isn't really that meaningful as all are at the whim of the planners — so over the years one loses count of those things. I do continue to be grateful and encouraged by confidence put on my various ideas, proposals, projects from outside. That is to say, my self-confidence has been reassured via the Guggenheim & Howard Fellowships, The National Endowment and by The Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, all of whom have been a pivotal assistance in granting the time to think freely and work toward surprising unknown discoveries. To evaluate forty-two years of life in 150 words or less is of no interest at this time. My family and my work with words, pictures, books, trees and stones continues to keep me fully aware of human finiteness, and I don't know how to conclude."


Phil Hamilton, graphic designer and educator, has been teaching typography and graphic design at the University of Wisconsin-Madison since 1964 and currently holds the position of Professor of Art. He has served as Department Chairman, Graduate Chairman, and Chairman of the Graphics Area. He studied at the University of Cincinnati, where he took a B.S. in design, and at Indiana University, where he received an M.F.A. His graphic design commissions include books, corporate and institutional publications, logos, posters, and architectural signage. He has exhibited and won awards in over forty national shows, including those conducted by Typomundus 20. Type Directors Club of New York, American Institute of Graphic Arts and Society of Typographic Arts. His work appears in over thirty collections of museums and libraries. 






Nanjone Kreitick






Luxoria Acrylic/rhoplex, 55" x 108½"



Harvey K. Littleton, professor emeritus, works in his glass studio in North Carolina since leaving teaching in 1977. He was the leader of the new or studio glass movement, offering the first course in glassblowing for the artist in 1962 at the University of Wisconsin. Since 1978 he has had four to seven solo shows per year in Europe and America, and is represented in the collections of 70 museums and public collections. 


270° Red Amber Rotation Glass, 171/42 x 4" x 41/2" and 21/42 x 7" x 4"












Dean Meeber








Kenneth Day








Richard Ruse

Don Reitz, artist/educator, has been teaching at the University of Wisconsin-Madison since 1962. He holds the B.S. and M.F.A. degrees. He has given lectures and workshops in virtually every state in the Union, including Alaska and Hawaii. as well as Canada, Ireland, Australia, and New Zealand. He has been artist-in-residence at universities in Ohio, Texas, Indiana, Iowa, Colorado, and Hawaii. In 1969 he received the First Ceramic Artist award by the American Ceramic Society. He was cited by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1970 for outstanding achievement in the arts, and received the Wisconsin Governor's Award in the Arts in 1971. Past president of the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts, he was made a Fellow of N.C.E.C.A., the American Crafts Council, and Trustee Emeritus of the World Crafts Council. He has been symbolically carved by the Maori people of New Zealand on their totem in their meeting house. He was honored in 1981 as one of the twelve foremost living ceramic artists worldwide.




Guardian Storage Jar Referring To Them Salt glazed stoneware, 50" x 20"




Susanne Slavick



N. Wayne Taylor, artist, born Nampa, Idaho, 1931, grew up in Northern California. He received his first fly rod at age seven. Later, he developed an interest in art and participated in the First International Exhibition in the 1939 San Francisco World's Fair (as he recalls, the piece was a cravon drawing of flamingos). Shortly after this auspicious start the international art world turned on him. Therefore, after four years in Hawaii saving the free world from the North Koreans, he reentered college at Sacramento State, receiving an A.B. in Art (painting) in 1957. He then received a Trustee Fellowship for graduate study in ceramics at Mills College. He received the M.F.A. degree in 1959, and since very few college level jobs were available at that time, he took a job at Encina High School outside of Sacramento. After three years he left California and made his first trek east of the Rockies, spending nine months in cultural shock at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb. He began his career at the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1963, received tenure in 1968, and immediately went on leave of absence to be Visiting Sculptor at Rutgers University. While at Rutgers he lived and worked in Manhattan in a loft on the Bowery. Upon returning to Wisconsin he purchased an old school house in Pleasant Springs. In 1975 Taylor returned to California for one semester as Visiting Professor at California State University-Sacramento. He is currently serving an apprenticeship as Departmental Chairman.









David Willard has been directing the glass program within the Art Department since 1977. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Cranbrook Academy of Art in 1974, where he studied under sculptor Michael Hall, and in 1976 he completed his Master of Fine Arts degree at Tyler School of Art in Philadelphia.
