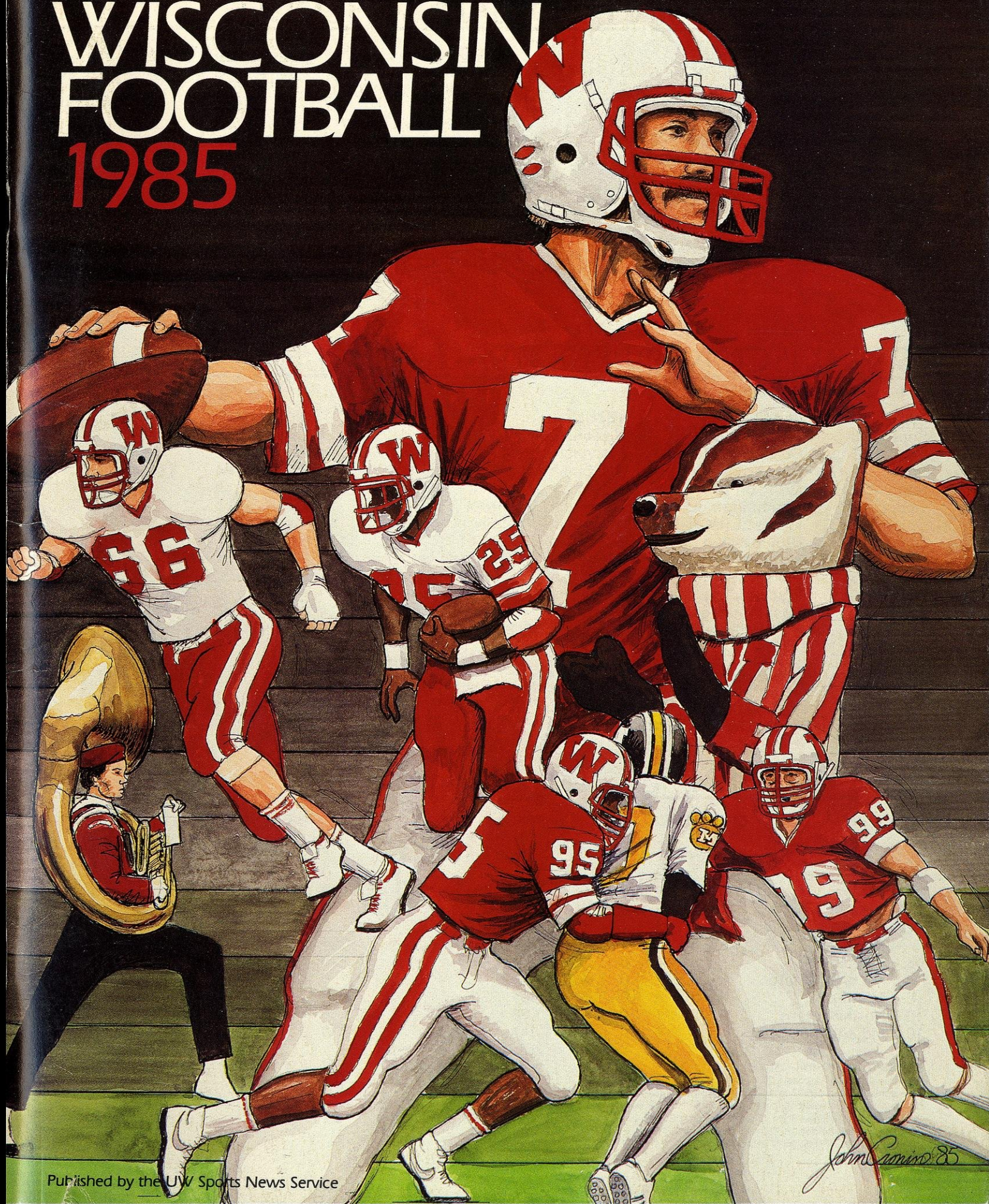

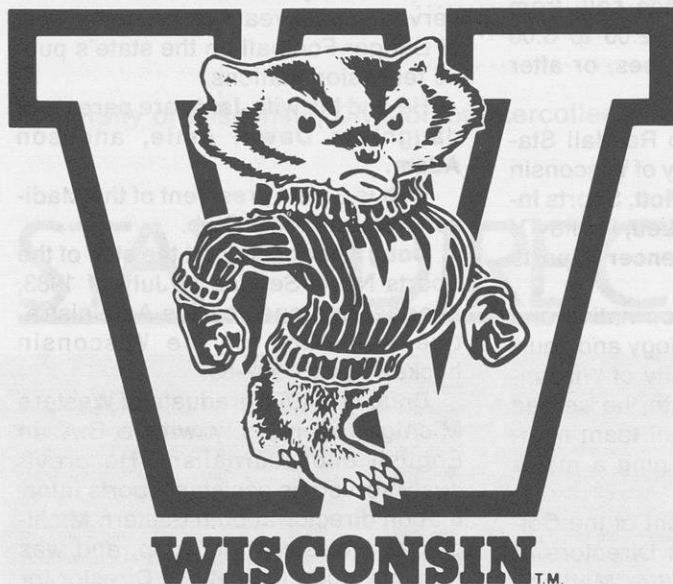

COVERING THE BADGERS

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6.

WORKING TICKETS

All Requests for Communications Center tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at the ground level entrance at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO

Each station admitted for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned and tickets mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Field passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working media only. They will be issued as requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Player interviews will be held in the "W" Club Annex following practice as prearranged with the Sports Information Office. There will be no player interviews allowed on Thursdays and Fridays.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after

each game following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches. All post-game interviews will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

COACHES INTERVIEWS

Dave McClain will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach McClain will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

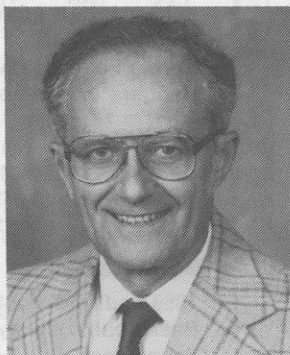
The Media Interview Room on game days is the Wisconsin Weight Training Room directly below the Wisconsin Dressing Room.

Best time to interview Coach McClain is on Mondays at 12 noon during his weekly teleconference call, from 2:30-3:15 Thursdays, or 2:00 to 3:00 Fridays before home games, or after practice each day.

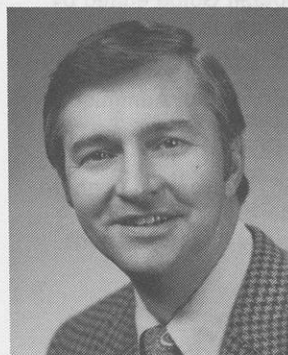

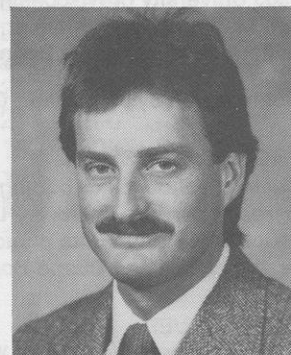

1985 WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

CAPSULE SUMMARY

For 1985, University of Wisconsin Head Coach Dave McClain and his staff face the difficult task of replacing 15 starters and 26 seniors off a 1984 Badger football team that finished with a 7-4-1 overall record and made its third post-season Bowl appearance in the last four years.

McClain must find replacements for four receivers, four offensive linemen, four defensive backs and two defensive tackles for '85, but the 8th-year coach is optimistic nonetheless.

Despite the heavy losses, the University of Wisconsin returns a wealth of talented athletes at a number of key positions - returnees who hope to provide Badger fans with their fifth consecutive winning season in '85. Since 1981, UW teams have compiled an impressive 28-18-1 record, including four successive seven-win campaigns.

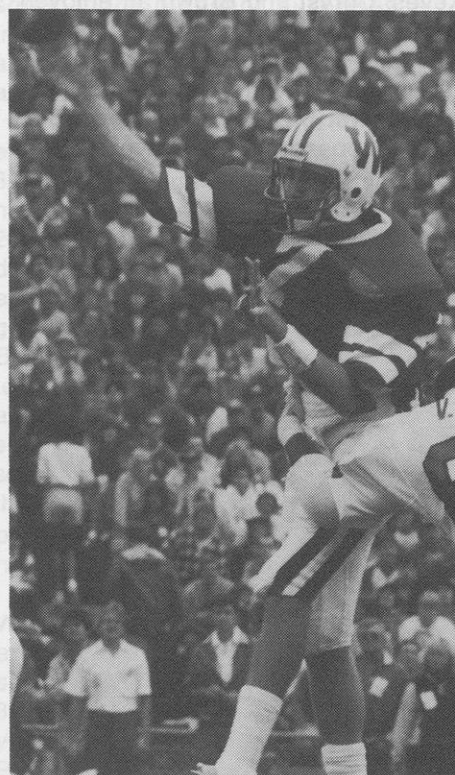
Offensively, Wisconsin will feature strength up the middle with honorable mention All-Big Ten QB and junior Mike Howard, second-team All-Big Ten tailback and junior Larry Emery, and honorable mention All-Big Ten of-

fensive lineman and senior Bob Landsee. Add to that fullbacks Joe Armentrout and Brian Bonner, offensive linemen Bill Schick, Brian Jansen and David Gaatz, and tight end Scott Sharron and you have the makings of a solid unit.

But the real strength for the Badgers in 1985 could be defense, and notably at linebacker. Juniors Rick Graf, Tim Jordan, Michael Reid and Craig Raddatz along with senior Russ Fields give the UW what may be one of the best groups in college football. Graf, Jordan, Reid and Raddatz all earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors as sophomores a year ago, while Fields was a starter prior to being injured in the second game in 1984.

On the defensive line, McClain will look to three experienced juniors in defensive tackles Lance Branaman and Jim Kmet and nose guard Michael Boykins. All three saw considerable action in '84, and all three are two-time varsity letterwinners.

Standout athlete and defensive back Nate Odomes, meanwhile, could be the key figure in a rebuilt defensive

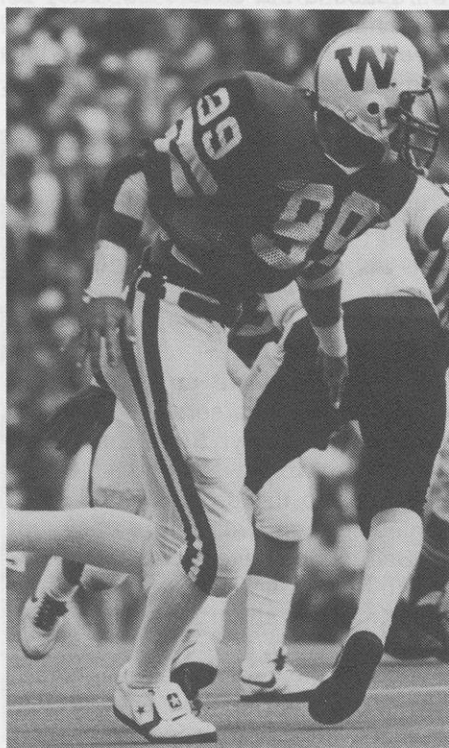
backfield as well as a key member of the special teams.

The kicking game should be another strong point for Wisconsin this Fall, as placekicker Todd Gregoire (84 points in '84) and punter Scott Cepicky (39.6/punt) both return for their sophomore seasons after highly successful freshman campaigns.

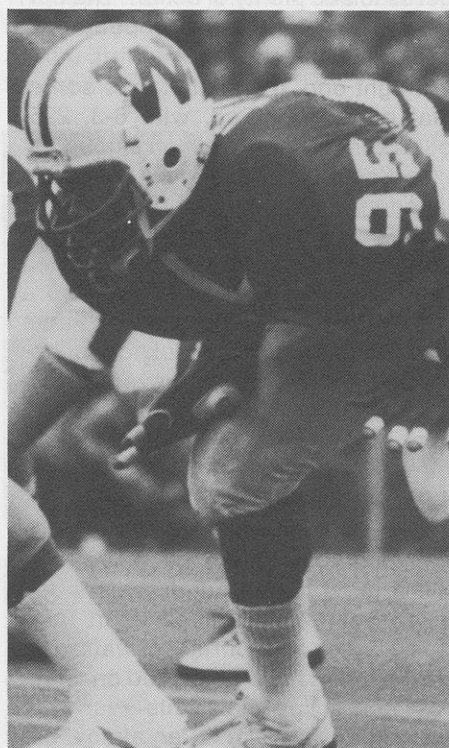
QUARTERBACKS

One of Wisconsin's strengths in 1985 should revolve around the quarterback position. The Badgers return junior Mike Howard along with up and coming challengers Brant Kennedy, Bud Keyes, Paul Chryst and Kevin Brown.

Howard connected on 182 of 314 passing attempts (.580) for 2,127 yards and 11 touchdowns in '84. His passing attempts, completions, percentage and yards all rank among the top three single season offensive totals in school history. In addition to his honorable mention All-Big Ten honor, the "Springfield Rifle" was the AP "Player of the Week" vs. Purdue, the TV "Player of the Game" vs. Missouri,

and Wisconsin's offensive "Player of the Game" vs. Missouri, Iowa and Purdue. As much as anything, Howard proved to be an effective leader for the Badger offense, and that despite being surrounded by seniors.

At the backup spot, Kennedy appears to have the inside track, but Keyes, Chryst and Brown all enjoyed strong Springs and could push him for the No. 2 position. Kennedy is a 6-4, 206 pounder, while Keyes goes 6-3, 195, Chryst 6-2, 190 and Brown 6-5, 205. All possess impressive athletic ability.



LARRY EMERY

RUNNING BACKS

Leading the ground game for the Cardinal and White this Fall will be All-Big Ten candidate and junior tailback Larry Emery and junior fullbacks Joe Armentrout and Brian Bonner. Emery appeared headed for a 1,000-yard season in 1984 as he amassed 675 net yards through the first half of the Indiana game on October 20th, but he was felled by a knee injury and missed the final five games of the campaign. The fleet-footed 5-9, 190-pounder was named to both the AP and UPI All-Big Ten second teams, finishing second in rushing in conference games with 112 yards per game. Overall, he averaged 6.2 yards per carry. Emery missed Spring practice, but his rehabilitation was going smoothly and he figures to be ready to go in September.

Set to backup Emery at tailback is 5-10, 185-pound junior Keith Browning,

who put together an impressive Spring session with Emery sidelined.

At fullback, McClain can call on two talented football players in Joe Armentrout and Brian Bonner. Armentrout rushed for 430 yards and a 4.8 average on 89 carries in 1984, and also caught 15 passes for another 117 yards. Bonner, meanwhile, had 178 yards and a 4.7 average on 38 attempts and caught 11 passes for 79 yards. He is recognized as one of the best blockers on the squad, and will be a key to Emery's success.

RECEIVERS

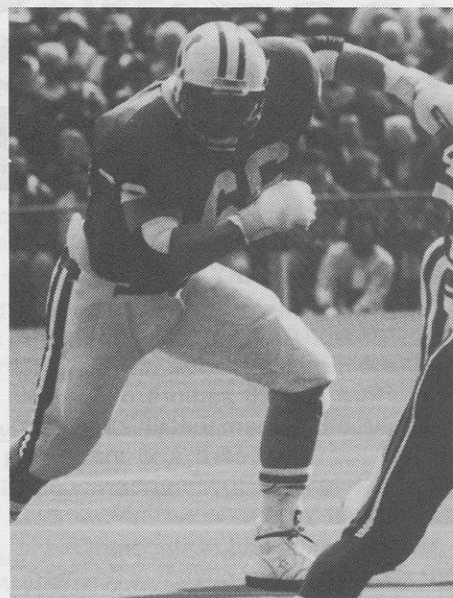
One of the areas hardest hit by graduation was the receiving corps. The Badgers lost standout receivers Al Toon, Michael Jones and Thad McFadden along with tight ends Bret Pearson and Dave Arneson.

Waiting in the wings, however, are several players who appear ready to step in and take over. At wide receiver, the UW will have juniors Reginald Tompkins and Jeff Sanford, and sophomores Tim Fullington, Frederick Bobo and James Ross. Tompkins was the understudy to Al Toon in 1984, but missed Spring practice to play with the Wisconsin baseball team. Bobo was named "Most Improved Freshman" on offense after a standout Spring practice, and he could challenge for a regular position. Fullington, a player with great ability, has been waiting for his opportunity and could be a starter while Sanford also figures to see plenty of action. The battle for playing time will undoubtedly continue throughout the Fall.

At tight end, the situation is somewhat more solidified, with 6-3, 225-pound senior Scott Sharron a good bet to settle in as the starter. Sharron played sparingly in '84, but one of his catches was a 46-yarder late in the game at Michigan State that helped the Badgers to a 20-10 victory and a post-season bid to the Hall of Fame Bowl. Behind Sharron, look for sophomore Brian Anderson, converted fullback and junior Drew Timura, senior John Taulien or sophomore Michael Smrekar.

OFFENSIVE LINE

One of the strengths of Wisconsin's team in 1984 was the offensive line, built a good part around seniors Jeff Dellenbach, Kevin Belcher, Dan Turk, Dave Mielke and Chris Osswald. But those players have all moved on to the pros, and accordingly, this year's offensive line will take on an almost entirely new look.



BOB LANDSEE

Keys to the success of the offensive line in '85 could center around four returning veterans in senior guards Bob Landsee and Brian Jansen and senior centers Bill Schick and David Gaatz. The 6-5, 260-pound Landsee is the only returning starter on the offensive line and is a three-time letterman. He is a solid candidate for post-season honors after earning honorable mention All-Big Ten accolades a year ago. He was presented with the Wayne Souza Memorial Trophy as Wisconsin's "Most Improved Offensive Player".

Jansen has battled injuries his last two seasons but should be ready to take charge, while Schick and Gaatz have both seen substantial playing time and both have earned two varsity monograms at Wisconsin.

At the tackle positions, Wisconsin will probably call on sophomores Paul Gruber (6-5, 272) and Glenn Derby (6-7, 278). These two players, along with Landsee, Schick and Jansen, would give the Badgers a five-man unit that averages 6-5 and 265 pounds.

DEFENSIVE LINE

On the defensive line, Wisconsin will be without the services of stand-out tackles Darryl Sims and Scott Bergold — two players who have also moved on to the professional ranks. Replacing them will not be easy, but the Badgers do have two, two-time letterwinners in Lance Branaman and Jim Kmet. Branaman, at 6-3, 260, played at noseguard in '84 but enjoyed good success at tackle throughout Spring drills. Branaman had 34 tackles in '84, including six for losses of 17 yards and three QB sacks. Kmet,

meanwhile, has filled in as a starter on a number of occasions the past two seasons, and should have no trouble moving into a No. 1 slot.

At noseguard, two-time letterwinner Michael Boykins (6-0, 250) figures to be a key performer for the Badgers. Boykins saw a great deal of playing time in 1984 between Sims and Bergold — splitting the noseguard duties with Branaman — and was credited with 41 stops, including five for loss.

Others who should see action throughout '85 are tackles Dick Teets (Sr., 6-3, 255), David Sparger (So., 6-6, 260) and Keith Peterson (So., 6-5, 250). At noseguard, other candidates include senior Mark Helt and sophomore Scott Benzschawel (6-7, 285).

LINEBACKERS

If there is a group of position players on the 1985 Wisconsin Football Team that figure to be the backbone, they will probably be the inside and outside linebackers. Despite the loss of tackle leader Jim Melka to graduation, the Badgers have seven lettermen returning at linebacker, including six who have started at one time or another.

Four of those players — juniors Rick Graf (6-5, 230), Tim Jordan (6-4, 215), Michael Reid (6-2, 210) and Craig Raddatz (6-3, 230) — were accorded honorable mention All-Big Ten honors in 1984. Graf, nicknamed "Thunder", and Jordan, nicknamed "Lightning", led the Badgers and were among the leaders in the Big Ten in tackles for loss with respective totals of 11 for -64 yards and 12 for -78 yards. Graf had 71

tackles on the year while Jordan had 68. Reid finished second on the team in total tackles with 79 while Raddatz had 60 stops and also led the Big Ten in interceptions with five. (He has nine career interceptions in two seasons.) Another key player who was a starter up until separating his shoulder in the second game of 1984 is senior Russ Fields (6-3, 230). Fields had 83 tackles in 1983.

Other returnees include letterwinners Charlie Fawley and Brian Hoffman, along with Joe Marconi, Aaron Swopes and Matthew Joki.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Another area which will feature a new look for 1985 is the defensive backfield. All four starters from '84 are gone, leaving McClain and his staff with a major rebuilding job.

The Badgers do, however, have three letterwinners returning in junior cornerback Nate Odomes, senior strong safety Robb Johnston and junior cornerback Bobby Taylor. Odomes saw action in 10 of 12 games a year ago, missing two to injury, and started at Michigan. He will also be a key performer on Wisconsin's special teams. Johnston has good size at the strong safety spot at 6-3, 200 and also has good experience after playing in all 12 games in '84. At free safety, sophomore Eric Sydnor (6-2, 200) appears to have the inside track, despite missing all of 1984 with a broken foot. And at the other cornerback position, senior Troy Spencer — who was named the team's "Most Improved Junior" in Spring drills — could be the starter for the season opener.

Also challenging for playing time in the defensive backfield will be cornerbacks Bobby Taylor and Robert Williams, and free safety Jeff Wagner.

KICKING GAME

Another area of the 1985 Wisconsin Football team that inspires confidence is the kicking game. Two of last season's more pleasant surprises — freshman placekicker Todd Gregoire and freshman punter Scott Cepicky — are both back.

Gregoire wound up as the fifth highest scoring kicker in the Big Ten with 6.5 points per game. Over 12 games he had 84 points, including a flawless 24-24 on extra points. In the field goal department he was 20-26 with a longest of 51 yards. He set Wisconsin single season records (not including Bowl games) for most field goal attempts (22), most field goals made (16) and his 71 regular season points rank second best all-time. He also set a school record with four field goals in the Hall of Fame Bowl, while his kick-offs were returned by Badger opponents for an average of only 9.7 yards.

Cepicky, meanwhile, handled 62 of Wisconsin's 65 punt attempts and averaged 39.6 yards per punt. He was sixth among Big Ten punters with a 39.4 average and had a longest of 69 yards in the Badgers' win over Purdue.

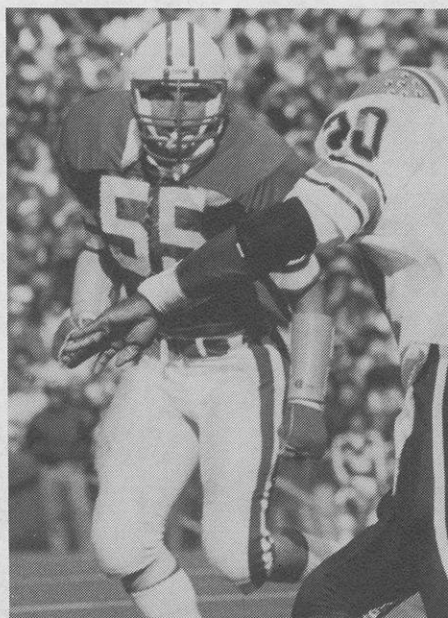
THE SCHEDULE

For the second year in a row, the Badgers' Big Ten schedule is anything but hospitable. Wisconsin has road dates at Michigan on October 5th, at Illinois on October 26th, at improving Minnesota on November 9th, and at defending Big Ten champion Ohio State on November 16th. The UW's only non-conference road game will be at Wyoming on September 28th.

At Camp Randall Stadium, where Wisconsin established an all-time record home attendance average of 74,681 in 1984, the Badgers will play six games. The UW hosts Iowa in the 100th Anniversary celebration of Wisconsin Music and Bands on October 12th, Northwestern for Parents' Day on October 19th, Indiana for Homecoming on November 2nd, and Michigan State for "W" Club Day on November 23rd. Wisconsin's non-conference home opponents are Northern Illinois for Band Day on September 14th and Nevada-Las Vegas on September 21st.

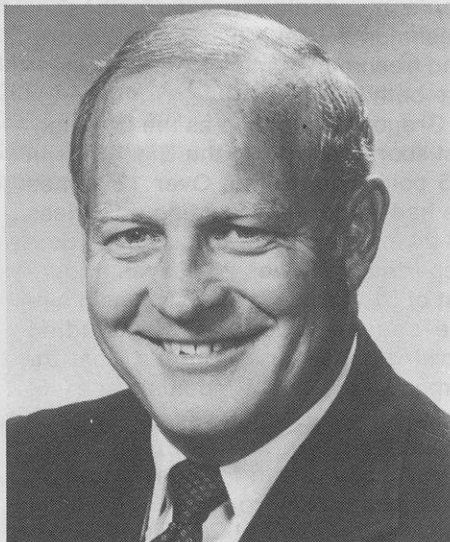

HEAD COACH DAVE McCLAIN



DAVE McCLAIN

One of the most successful coaches in University of Wisconsin football history, Dave McClain enters his eighth season at the helm of the Badger program in 1985.

Named as Wisconsin's 24th head coach on December 16, 1977, McClain has led his Badger teams to four consecutive seven-win seasons, including a 1984 record of 7-4-1, and to post-season Bowl games in three of the past four years. He is the first coach to post four consecutive winning seasons at the UW since Ivan Williamson in 1949-54.

Since 1981, the Cardinal and White own a 28-18-1 overall record and a .620 winning percentage, while in Big Ten play the UW has fashioned a 21-14-1 mark over the last four campaigns for a .597 mark.

Wisconsin's 1984 Hall of Fame Bowl appearance was the Badgers' third post-season Bowl game in the past four years. The others were a 1982 invitation to the Independence Bowl and a 1981 date in the Garden State Bowl. McClain was the first coach in Wisconsin history to guide the Badgers to back-to-back Bowls and in 1982 Dave became the first Badger coach to win a post-season Bowl game.

In seven seasons at the UW, the Upper Sandusky, Ohio native owns a 41-36-3 record for a .531 percentage. In Big Ten play, he is 30-28-3. **His overall 87-61-6 record for 14 seasons as a head coach ranks him among the nation's top twenty coaches with a winning percentage of .584.**

A 1960 graduate of Bowling Green State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, McClain came to Wisconsin from Ball State University. He coached seven seasons at the Muncie, Indiana campus and posted a 46-25-3 record (.642). He was named Mid-American Conference "Coach of the Year" in 1975 following the Cardinals' 9-2 season. His three-year MAC record of 13-4 included the 1976 conference championship.

McClain started his coaching career at Crestline (Ohio) High School with an 8-1 record and then returned to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant in 1961, where he served as freshman offensive coach under Doyt Perry (his father-in-law) and earned his Master's Degree in Education.

He then served as an assistant coach at Cornell University under Tom Harp in 1962; at Miami (Ohio) University under Glenn E. "Bo" Schembechler from 1963-66; at Kansas under Pepper Rodgers from 1967-68; and at Ohio State under W.W. "Woody" Hayes from 1969-70 before accepting the head coaching job at Ball State.

In his first season with the Badgers in 1978, Dave became the first coach since Ivan Williamson in 1949 to post a

winning mark in his initial campaign. The 1978 Badgers opened with four straight wins and finished at 5-4-2 — the first winning season since 1974.

In 1981, Wisconsin was 7-5 including the first Bowl appearance for a Badger team since 1962. Their 6-3 Big Ten record was good for a third place tie, and included victories over national powers Michigan and Ohio State. In the Garden State Bowl, the Badgers were beaten by Tennessee 28-21.

In 1982, Dave became the first coach in Wisconsin history to guide the Badgers to back-to-back Bowl games and accomplished what no other Wisconsin coach was able to do — win a post season Bowl game. The Badgers won a 14-3 decision from Kansas State in the 1982 Independence Bowl to cap a second consecutive 7-5 season, which included the first victory over Ohio State in Columbus since 1918.

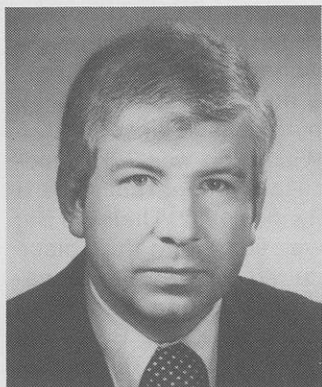
In 1983, the Badgers posted their third consecutive seven-win season under McClain with a final mark of 7-4. Wisconsin also turned in its third consecutive winning Big Ten campaign at 5-4.

McClain has also served as an assistant coach in the Hula (1982) and Japan (1983) Bowl games, and was an assistant coach in the Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, AL in 1983.

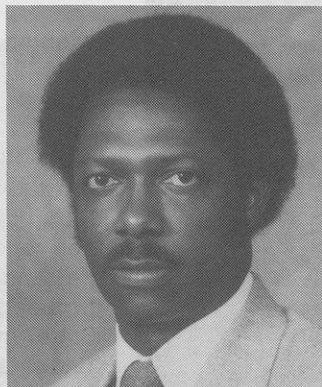
Dave played football at Upper Sandusky (Ohio) High School and Bowling Green State University, where his team went 45-5-4. He played both quarterback and safety at BGSU.

Dave and his wife, the former Judy Perry, have three children — son Tom and daughters Mindy and Marcy.

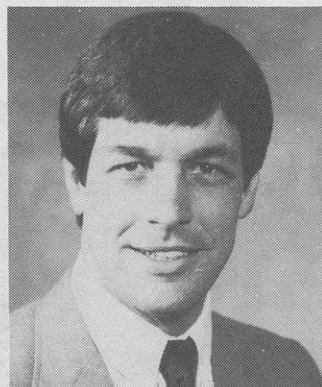

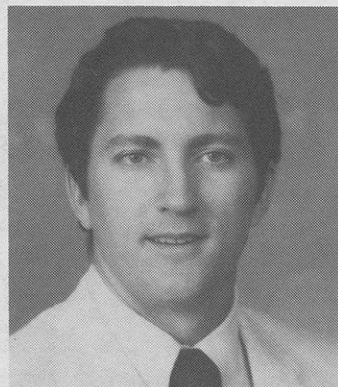

BILL DUDLEY **Offensive Coordinator** **Quarterbacks/Running Backs**

Entering his eighth season at the University of Wisconsin and as a member of Dave McClain's staff is Bill Dudley, the Badgers' offensive coordinator.

Under Dudley's guidance, the Wisconsin offense has set a number of season records during the McClain era including most passes attempted and completed, best percentage, most net yards, most touchdowns and most points. In 1983, the Badgers ranked 5th nationally in scoring and 17th nationally in total offense.

Bill came to Wisconsin with McClain, after serving as Dave's assistant at Ball State from 1976-77. From 1973-76, Dudley was an assistant at the University of Dayton. He was defensive secondary coach for the Flyers in '73, then added defensive coordinator duties his final three seasons.

Prior to his arrival at Dayton, the 40-year-old Dudley was a graduate assistant at Northwestern University for two years, assistant coach at Glenbard West High School in Glen Ellyn, Illinois for one season, and assistant coach at his alma mater — Riverside Brookfield High in Riverside, Illinois — for two years.

Bill is a 1967 graduate of Western Illinois University where he lettered in football twice as a quarterback, safety, and place kicker. He also earned a pair of letters while playing the same positions in high school.

Bill received his Master's Degree from Northwestern in 1972. He and his wife, Diane, reside in Madison.

FRED JACKSON **Receivers**

In his third season with the Wisconsin football program as receivers coach is Fred Jackson, who came to Dave McClain's staff in 1983 after three years as an assistant coach at the University of Toledo in the Mid-American Conference.

Jackson is credited for being instrumental the past two years in the development of standout Badger receivers Al Toon, Thad McFadden and Michael Jones. Toon was selected in the first round of the 1985 NFL Draft.

A native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Jackson coached both the quarterbacks and wide receivers at Toledo after entering the collegiate ranks in 1980 from the head coaching position at Southwestern High School in Flint, Michigan. At Southwestern, the 36-year old Jackson produced such outstanding collegiate stars as Michigan's Rich Leach and Rodney Feaster, Purdue's Jerome Oliver and Ron Moore, Michigan State's Darryl Turner, Penn State's Booker Moore, and Toledo's Emmanuel Cole and Capus Robinson.

Fred was an all-state quarterback at Scotlandville High in 1965 and 1966 and after his 1967 graduation from high school, he went on to star at Jackson State University from 1968-70. He was a 12th round NFL draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1971.

Jackson received his bachelor's degree from Jackson State in 1971 and earned his Master's Degree in Educational Administration from Eastern Michigan University in 1976.

He started his coaching career as offensive backfield coach at Southwestern High in Flint, Michigan in 1971 and became head football and track coach in 1972. Fred has also coached the semi-pro Flint Sabres and played quarterback for the Detroit Wheels in the World Football League in 1974.

He is married to the former Teresa Al-Khoury.

SCOTT SEELIGER **Offensive Line**

Scott Seeliger enters his second season with the Wisconsin Football staff in 1985 and coaches the offensive line, tight ends and special teams.

For five years prior to his arrival in Madison, Seeliger served as an assistant coach at Bowling Green State University. In 1983, Scott was the offensive coordinator for a Falcon team that posted a 8-3 record and a No. 2 ranking in national passing statistics. He also coached the offensive line at BGSU and had been an administrative assistant as well.

A 1972 graduate of Iowa State University, the 35-year old Seeliger played football there under Johnny Majors and was a starter at tight end in 1971 when the Cyclones went to the Sun Bowl. He earned a B.S. degree in Mathematics in 1972.

In 1973, Scott became head coach at Sauk Prairie High School and his

teams put together a three-year record of 28-8, including a 9-0 mark and the South Central League Championship in 1975. In 1976, Sauk Prairie was 8-1.

Familiar with the Wisconsin high school football scene, Scott graduated from LaFollette High in Madison in 1968, where he played football under current University of Wisconsin Associate Athletic Director Otto Breitenbach.

Seeliger and his wife, Karen, have two daughters — Keri, 12 and Kori 9.

JOHN O'GRADY

Offensive Line/Special Teams

John O'Grady, 30, joined the Wisconsin Football staff in March of 1985.

He was the offensive coordinator and line coach at Kent State University in the Mid-American Conference in 1984 and 1985 under former Wisconsin assistant coach Dick Scesniak.

Prior to going to Kent State, O'Grady had served as graduate assistant for two years at Wisconsin, working with the tight ends.

A graduate of Sullivan High School in Chicago, John graduated in 1979 from UW-River Falls with a B.S. degree in Physical Education. He obtained his Master of Science degree from UW-River Falls in School Administration in 1983.

O'Grady played at UW-River Falls from 1972-75 as a linebacker, and following completion of his eligibility, coached five years at the school under

the guidance of Mike Farley from 1976-80. He coached the linebackers four years and the defensive secondary one season. The Falcons won the Wisconsin State University Conference (WSUC) titles in 1976, 1979, and 1980.

John came to Wisconsin as a graduate assistant in 1981, and after the 1982 season joined Dick Scesniak at Kent State. Wisconsin's 1981 and 1982 football teams played in the Garden State and Independence Bowls respectively.

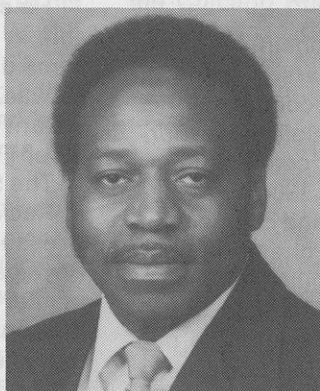

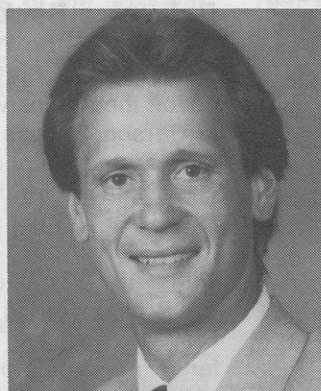

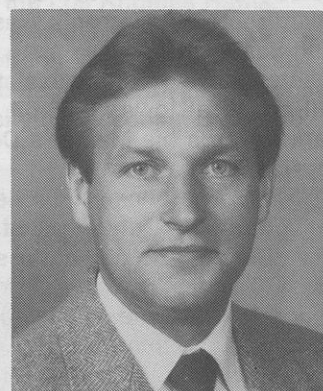

Defensive Coordinator Inside Linebackers

The man primarily responsible for molding the aggressive and hard-hitting Badger defenses of the late 1970's and 1980's is Jim Hilles, who enters his eighth season with the Wisconsin Football staff.

The Badgers ranked 16th nationally in total defense in 1984 and 17th nationally in rushing defense. In the Big Ten, Wisconsin was second in total defense, second in scoring defense, and second in passing defense.

A native of Warren, Ohio, Hilles came to Wisconsin from Ball State

University with Head Coach Dave McClain in 1978 and has been the Badgers' defensive coordinator ever since. He made his collegiate coaching debut at Ball State in 1972 after coaching in the high school ranks for a number of years.

Hilles coached the Western Reserve football team in Warren to a 17-3 record against top Buckeye competition during the 1970 and 1971 seasons.

As a player, Jim lettered three years in football at Ohio University in the Mid-American Conference. He was selected as team captain and received Mid-American Conference special mention as a senior, and earned his bachelor's degree in 1958.

Upon graduation, Jim coached two seasons at Wilmington, Ohio and later moved on to Toledo for five years of coaching at Libbey and Macomber High Schools. While in Toledo, he also served as player-coach for the Toledo entry in the Continental Football League.

Hilles returned to Warren in 1966 as defensive coordinator before being elevated to the head coaching spot in 1970 at Western Reserve High School.

Jim and his wife Ellie are the parents of three children: Jeff, 28, Jody, 25, and Jim, Jr., 24.

ARNOLD JETER

Defensive Line

One of the senior members of the Wisconsin coaching staff is Arnold Jeter, who enters his ninth season with the Badger program in 1985. Jeter is the Badgers' defensive line coach.

Two of Jeter's 1984 players — defensive tackles Darryl Sims and Scott Bergold — were selected in the first and second rounds respectively of the 1985 NFL draft.

Arnold came to Wisconsin from Marshall University in June, 1977, and worked with the Badger defensive ends. When McClain arrived at the UW in '78, Jeter became the defensive line coach.

A native of Steubenville, Ohio, Arnold is a 1962 graduate of Kent State University where he was a running back on the Golden Flashes' football team. He received a B.S. degree in Secondary Education.

He started his coaching career as an assistant at Warren G. Harding High School in Warren, Ohio in 1962. Two years later he became the head football and track coach and the athletic director at Warren's West Junior High School.

Jeter was a graduate assistant football coach at Iowa, 1966-67, and did work towards his Master's Degree in Physical Education.

In 1967, he became the head football coach at Delaware State and served the school for eight seasons. His 1970 and 1971 teams ranked No. 1 among NCAA College Division teams in rushing and total defense.

Following the 1974 season, he left Delaware State to become an assistant coach at Marshall University where he coached the outside linebackers.

He and his wife Lillie are the parents of three children: Jay, 26, Carl, 24, and Zina, 20.

DAVE ANDERSON

Outside Linebackers

1985 will mark the third season at Wisconsin for Dave Anderson, who returned to the Madison campus in 1983. He coaches the outside linebackers.

Dave has been instrumental in the recent surge of the Badgers' outside linebackers as some of the top athletes in the Big Ten.

Prior to his arrival in Madison, Anderson was the defensive coordina-

tor for Montana State's 1982 Big Sky Conference championship team.

A 1976 graduate of Wisconsin and a three-time letterman (1973-75) on the school's football team as a defensive tackle, Dave was honored with the Ivan B. Williamson and Russ Winnie awards for athletic and academic excellence following his senior year of competition.

After graduating from the UW, Anderson was an assistant football coach at D.C. Everest High School in Schofield, Wisconsin for three seasons before joining Dave McClain's staff as a graduate assistant in 1979.

He completed his Master's Degree in Physical Education before leaving to serve as an assistant coach at UW-Eau Claire during the school's 1981 Wisconsin State University Conference (WSUC) championship season.

Dave prepped at Kaukauna High School where he was a two-way all-conference, all-state and all-American football player.

He and his wife, Pat, are the parents of son Jay and daughter Erika.

STEVE CARSON

Defensive Backs

New to the Wisconsin coaching staff in 1985 is Steve Carson, who will coach the defensive secondary.

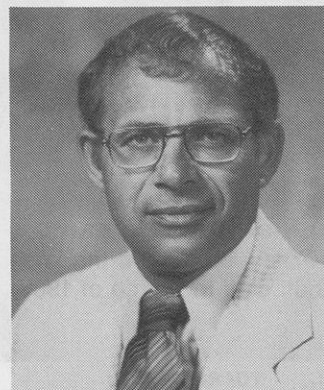
Carson, 34, was the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Montana State University in 1984. The Bobcats were 12-2 overall and claimed the NCAA Division 1-AA championship with a 19-6 win over Louisiana Tech.

Prior to going to Montana State, Steve had served three years as defensive coordinator at UW-Eau Claire of the Wisconsin State University Conference. The Blugolds' defense in 1981 and 1983 helped UW-Eau Claire to conference titles while the 1982 team placed second.

Carson began his coaching career in 1973 as a graduate assistant at Eastern Illinois University. After two seasons with the Panthers, Steve moved on to Titusville High School in Titusville, Florida, serving as the school's defensive coordinator. He earned his first head coaching position in 1978 when he took over the reins at Melbourne High in Melbourne, FL.

associate degree in Business in 1971, then moved on to Drake University where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Education in 1973. He earned his Master's Degree in Physical Education from Eastern Illinois University in 1975.

Assistant Coach - Recruiting

Jerry Fishbain is the recruiting coordinator for the University of Wisconsin football program.

He came to Wisconsin from Minnesota in 1980, where he performed the same duties for one year. Prior to that he was defensive head coach and Assistant Admissions Director at UW-River Falls.

The 50-year-old Fishbain is a native of Racine and a 1955 graduate of LaCrosse with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He received his master's degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1960 and was enrolled in the Educational Administration doctoral program for four years.

Following US Army service, Fishbain started his coaching career in 1957 at Colby High School, where he coached all sports. He moved to Racine Horlick High School in 1959 and became head football coach in 1961. He also served as Athletic Director for two years 1966-68.

In 1970 he became assistant football coach at UW-Milwaukee and took over the head job a year later. During the 1972-73 school year he served as athletic business manager and from 1973-75 served as assistant Athletic Director in addition to his football and business manager duties. Jerry and his wife Janet are the parents of three children — Jason 16, Sarah, 14 and Rachel, 11.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR ELROY HIRSCH



ELROY HIRSCH

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is in his 17th year—longest tenure in the school's history—as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

Wisconsin's men's and women's athletic programs have consistently ranked in the Big Ten's first division during his tenure over the past 16 years.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director — slated to end in 1979 — was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor Irving Shain, upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as a triple threat halfback on **Harry Stuhldreher's** 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus nine touchdowns, five by rushing and four by passing.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but also basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as a halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-American Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

It was at Los Angeles that "**Crazylegs**" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes — like **Otto Graham** and **Sam Huff** and **Gino Marchetti** — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

In 1951, **Hirsch** displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by **Bobby Mitchell** of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and **Hirsch** had only twelve games to set the record, not 14 like **Mitchell**!

That same season **Hirsch** caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by **Don Hutson** of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

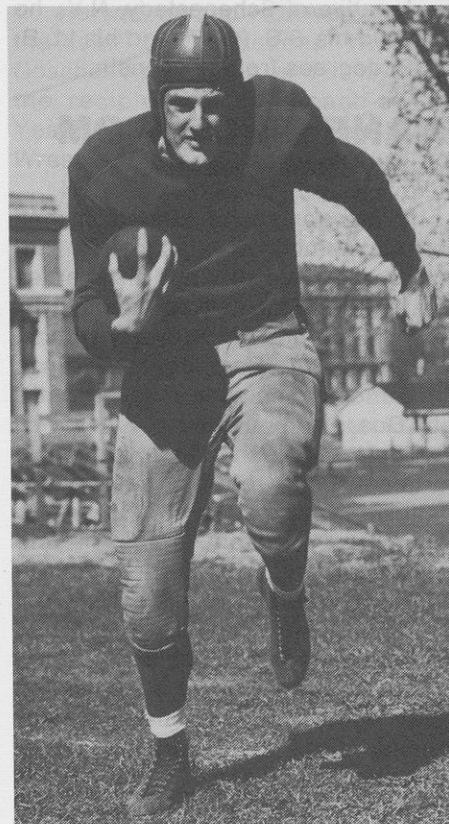
Elroy compiled a total of 343 passes caught for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdown catches during his career with the Rams before retiring from NFL play following the 1957 season.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker during his nine year career with the Los Angeles Rams.

Elroy and his wife, Ruth, are the parents of son **Win Stephen**, Los Angeles, and daughter **Patricia Caroline**, a University of Wisconsin graduate.

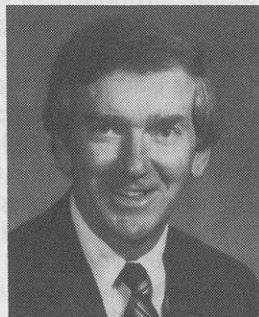

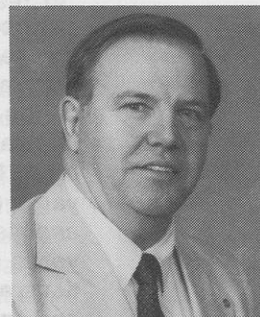

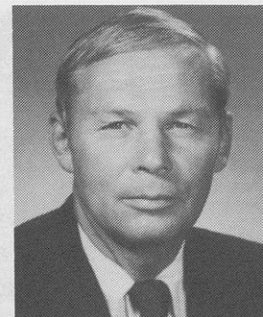

Hall.

Lindstrom is a 1966 graduate of Alfred University where she earned a B.A. In 1969, she received an M.A.

from the University of Delaware and then earned a Ph.D. from the same institution in 1974.

DAVID TARR Chairman, Athletic Board

Professor **David Tarr** was named to the Wisconsin Athletic Board in 1978 and has served as chairman the past six years.

He became board chairman in 1979.

Tarr has served as a member of the UW-Madison faculty since 1963 and is a former chairman of the political science department. He has published in the fields of international relations, politics and government, and national defense and arms control of strategic weapons. He has served on the faculty's Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) policy committee.

He received his B.A. degree from the University of Massachusetts in Amherst and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Chicago.

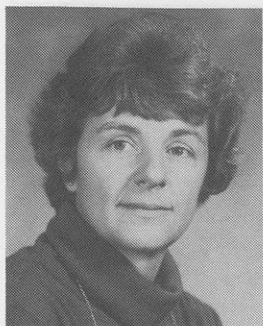

He and his wife **Janis** are parents of two children, **Scott**, 21, and **Ann**, 19.

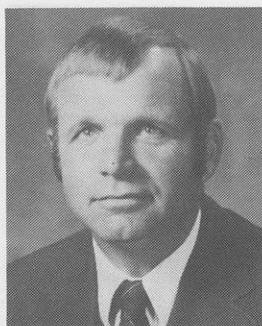
OTTO BREITENBACH Associate Athletic Director

Otto joined the Wisconsin Athletic staff July 1, 1973 following a very successful tenure as athletic director, football and track coach at Madison's LaFollette High School.

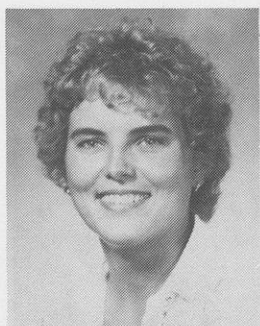

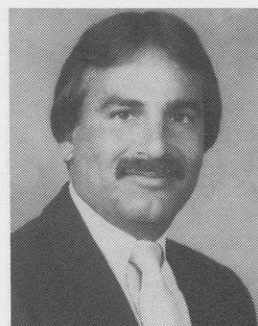

He was named to the Wisconsin Football Coaches and the Madison Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

He and his wife **Pat** are the parents of married daughters Sarah and Jane, and a son, Bill.

KIT SAUNDERS

Associate Athletic Director

Katherine "Kit" Saunders joined Wisconsin's Athletic staff in 1974 as its first director of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics.

As a member of the management team, **Kit** is responsible for the non-income sports in the Wisconsin Athletic program.

A native of Teaneck, N.J., she is a 1962 graduate of Trenton (NJ) State College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Health and Physical Education.

Assistant Director

Men's Non-Income Sports

Duane Kleven was named to the position of Assistant Director of Intercollegiate Athletics for Men's Non-Income Sports on April 1, 1984. **Kleven**, 44, was the Director of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. He had served in that capacity since June, 1982.

Duane is a native of Stoughton, WI and a 1961 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He also earned his master's degree in Physical Education from Wisconsin in 1963.

Prior to taking the job as Director of the "Shell" — as the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center is popularly known — Duane had been a highly

successful head wrestling coach for 13 years, starting at UW-Oshkosh in 1969-70 (10-7) and moving to Wisconsin-Madison in 1970.

His 13-year dual record showed 142 wins, 55 defeats, and five ties for a winning percentage of .715.

In Big Ten championship meets under Kleven's guidance, the Badgers placed in the top three nine times (four seconds and five thirds) in twelve years.

During his tenure as Wisconsin's head wrestling coach, the Badgers had a total of 25 All-Americans in the sport, and seven individuals won nine NCAA titles. From 1975 through 1980, the Badgers placed in the top seven schools of the NCAA tournament each year — as high as third in 1977; 4th in 1976 and 1978; 5th in 1979, 6th in 1975, and seventh in 1980.

He was named NCAA "Coach-of-the-Year" by the National Wrestling Coaches Association, and in 1976 was the recipient of the Coach-of-the-Year" award from the United States Wrestling Federation (USWF).

He was named to the Wisconsin Wrestling Coaches Association "George Martin Wrestling Hall of Fame" in 1980.

Duane is married to the former Mona Jacobson of Stoughton and they are parents of a married daughter Charlotte, a 1982 graduate of the University of Wisconsin, and a son Kurt, a student at Madison Business College.

He received a Master's degree in Educational Administration in 1962 from Wisconsin-Madison.

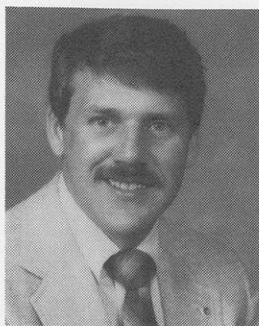
Wayne served the UW as Director of Admissions and Registration until 1968 when he joined the Wisconsin Alumni Association.

HUSKIE OUTLOOK

Northern Illinois will have a new look in more ways than one for 1985. First, there is new Head Coach Jerry Pettibone, and secondly, there is the installation of the Veer offense. The Huskies finished at 4-6-1 in 1984, but return 37 lettermen, including eight starters on both offense and defense. Top offensive players look to be QB candidates Darryl Taylor (62 of 132 for 938 yds and 7 TD's) and Pete Genatempo (94 of 171 for 916 yds and 5 TD's), honorable mention All-America guard Todd Peat (6-3, 285), tailback Darryl Richardson, and receiver Curt Pardridge (20 for 301 yds). Defensively, HM All-America tackle Scott Kellar (87 tackles, 20 tackles for loss) and second team All-MAC noseguard Doug Bartlett (112 tackles) will head up the Huskie unit. OLB Rob Wicinski (85 tackles) and LB Tim Griffin (129 tackles) are other key personnel along with returning secondary starters Rich Tremblay and Mike Hollingshed. NIU faces a tough schedule with road games at Iowa, Wisconsin and North-western in addition to its eight-game MAC slate.

GOPHER OUTLOOK:

UM has an attractive schedule, with seven home games including Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio State, Purdue and Oklahoma.

TWO BADGER NUMBERS RETIRED

Two football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's football history. They are No. 80, worn by All-American end **Dave Schreiner** when he was an All-American end in 1941 and 1942; and No. 83, worn by quarterback **Allan J. Shafer** in 1944. **Schreiner** was killed in action with the U.S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa, June, 1945. **Shafer** was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa football game and died shortly after Wisconsin had defeated the Hawkeyes 26-7 in Camp Randall stadium, November 11, 1944.

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

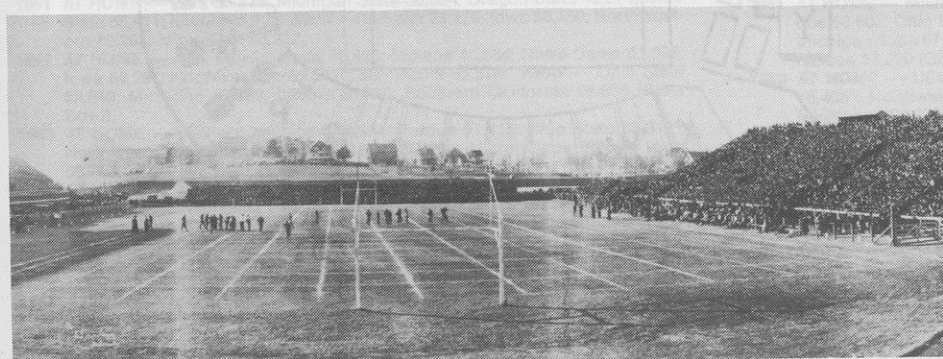
In its 92 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs

attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later, he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years

later even the Dane County Agricultural Society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the 1966 addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

There have been three enlargements to Camp Randall Stadium since the end of World War II. The first, in 1950 and 1951, saw the completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium.

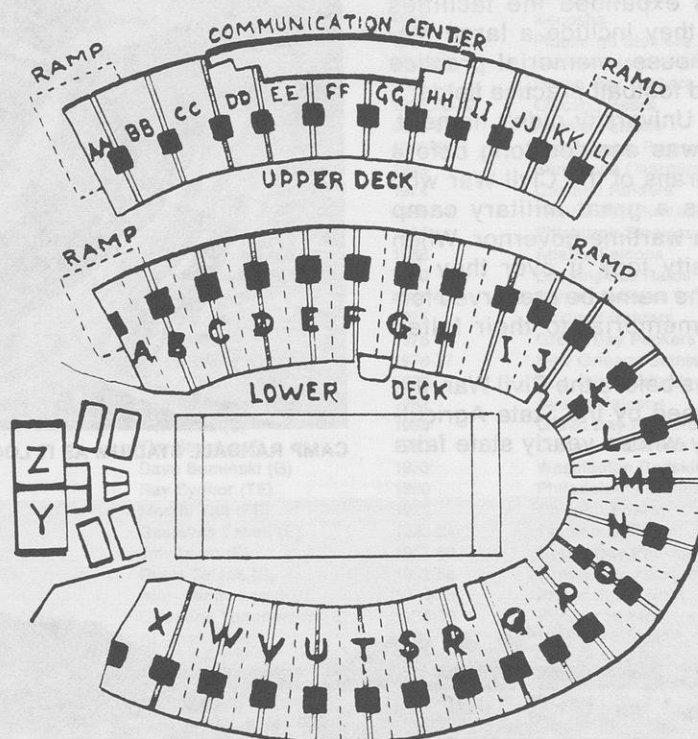
The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at the time.

The addition of the second deck on the west side of the stadium in 1966 added almost 13,000 prime viewing

seats, including the modern Communications Center.

The current capacity of 77,280 makes Camp Randall Stadium the seventh largest college owned stadium in the United States—exceeded only by those at Michigan, Stanford, Ohio State, Tennessee, Penn State, and Georgia.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 12,204 following renovation in 1976.

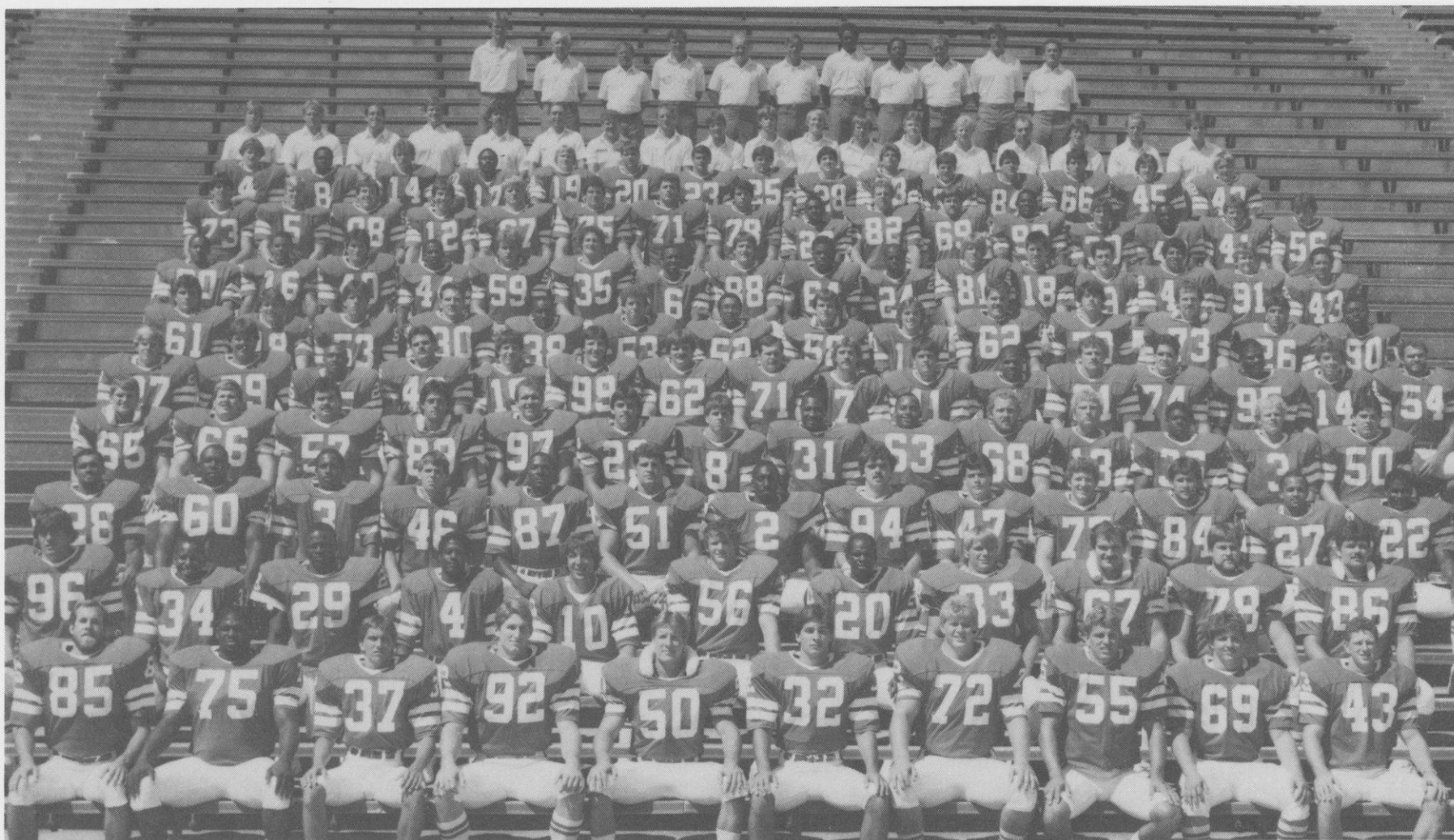
