Approval of the Minutes

Upon motion by Regent Dreyfus, seconded by Regent Vos, the minutes of the April 6, 1990, meeting of the Board of Regents were approved.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Welcome to Regents Krutsch and Steil

Regent President Schilling welcomed new Regents Phyllis Krutsch and George Steil, who had been appointed to the Board to succeed Camilla Hanson and Frank Nikolay.

Regent Krutsch, who received B.A. and M.A. degrees from UW-Madison, is a member of the Washburn School Board and a civic leader in the Washburn area.

Report on Visit to Japan, Pp 2-4

Regarding the recent visit to Japan by the delegation he headed, Regent President Schilling called attention to a thorough report on the visit prepared by Dr. Richard Carter, Assistant Chancellor at UW-Superior who also was a member of the delegation.

In his cover letter transmitting report to the Regents and President Shaw, Regent President Schilling recommended further pursuit of the idea of expanding UW System activities in Japan. President Shaw is to appoint a working committee charged with determining the feasibility and desirability of such activities, including possible establishment of a branch campus in Japan.

In response to a question by Regent Dreyfus, Regent Schilling explained that UW System faculty would go to Japan at that country's expense for brief periods of time. While there also would be some local faculty, the great majority would be from the UW System.

Replying to a question from Regent Nicholas, Regent Schilling indicated that the Japanese are interested in the whole range of disciplines. Students would begin at a branch campus in Japan and then come to the United States to complete their education. There is particular interest in relationships with University Systems which would allow students the full spectrum of choice among programs and institutions.

Vice President Trani added that the branch campus of the Minnesota State University System has enrolled 250 Japanese students a year. They study English the first year and general education for the next two years, after which they have the opportunity to transfer to any of the Minnesota State System institutions. Eventually, Minnesota will send 120 students to the branch campus each year.

In response to a question by Regent Gelatt, Regent Schilling indicated that faculty and students throughout the UW System would have an opportunity to teach and study at the branch campus. Noting that the visit was exploratory only, he emphasized that such a venture would be undertaken only if it would not draw resources away from the UW System.

If the effect might be to increase the number of tenured faculty, Regent Gelatt asked if the Japanese would continue to carry the cost of those faculty members' tenure if the branch campus were to close.

Regent Schilling indicated that the experience of Temple University might be helpful as a guide to the care with which such arrangements must be made.

Vice President Trani added that Temple is establishing an endowment to cover the potential closing of that campus. The Minnesota State System does not plan to hire additional tenure-track faculty; rather, the branch campus will serve as a faculty development opportunity for existing faculty, whose duties at their home campus would be covered by temporary appointments.

Replying to a question by Regent Dreyfus, Regent Schilling indicated that UW System faculty would teach in Japan for one or two years.

Regent Dreyfus explained that when he was Chancellor at UW-Stevens Point, that university had programs in a number of different countries which were taught by regular UW-Stevens Point faculty and by faculty of the foreign institutions who were hired on short-term contracts. Expressing interest in the rationale for the Temple University program, he commented that it seemed to him inadvisable to hire new long-term faculty to teach in another country.

Regent Schilling stated that the intent of any UW System program would not be to hire new faculty but to give existing faculty the opportunity to teach at the branch campus and then return to their home institutions. Admission standards would be the same for the Japanese students as for other students, and proficiency in English would be required before they could start their baccalaureate courses.

OW-Milwaukee Presentation on the Center for Teacher Education, pp.4-7

Summarizing the history of the UW-Milwaukee Center for Teacher Education, Vice Chancellor Schroeder explained that the Center had been designated as one of UW System's 50 Centers of Excellence, with professional development schools as a primary focus.

Vice Chancellor Schroeder next introduced Samuel Yarger, Dean of the School of Education; Dr. Suzanne Pasch, Professor of Educational Psychology and Director of the Center for Teacher Education; Dorothy St. Charles, Principal of LaFollette Elementary School in the Milwaukee Public School System; and, Mark Tenorio, a kindergarten teacher at LaFollette Elementary School.

Dr. Pasch explained that the Center was established to reflect the national education reform movement and had a three-prong mission: 1) reforming teacher education programs; 2) developing more effective partnerships with schools; 3) studying teacher education, teaching, and learning principles and reporting research results. She added that the principles guiding the Center's efforts had been implemented by an interdisciplinary group of UW-Milwaukee faculty members working together with colleagues—teachers and administrators—in the Milwaukee Public School System.

With a focus on training effective urban teachers, the goal of the Center for Teacher Education was creating well-prepared teachers who could function well in metropolitan schools with long-term success. To fulfill this goal, these teachers needed the ability to teach diverse cultural and socioeconomic groups across a range of individual differences, which required preservice teacher training in urban environments.

Dr. Pasch described the Center's emphasis on the creation of beginning teachers with the idea of a long career perspective as, "looking at people from the moment they say, 'I think I would like to be a teacher,' to the moment that they carry all of us who love to teach out screaming at the end of our long careers." Monitoring education students at several points throughout their training, the Center connects preservice education with the experience of being a teacher in the field, with special emphasis on urban teaching, instructional methods and teaching models, and well as heightened professionalism.

The Center for Teacher Education, in partnership with the Milwaukee Public School System, designated four public schools (two elementary schools, one middle school, and one high school) as professional development sites. Analogous to teaching hospitals in medicine, the Center's professional development schools allow education students to go into the field, interacting with actual teaching practitioners—those best able to teach how to teach.

The choice of four Milwaukee schools as professional development schools reflected the Center's commitment to urban teaching. While the sites exemplify successful collaboration between university faculty and teaching professionals, the schools are not considered "model schools," but schools typical of those in which many new teachers will begin their professional teaching careers.

Mr. Tenorio, a graduate of UW-Milwaukee's teacher education program, described his sometimes unrealistic expectations when he began teaching. He expressed hope that the Center's programs devoted to early field placement of prospective teachers would familiarize students with different cultures and socioeconomic groups, helping them to understand the complexities of the social factors involved in teaching.

Mr. Tenorio commented on the value of having the university people present at the schools, collaborating with field teachers and administrators to better prepare the students choosing a career in teaching. He indicated that interaction with university teacher education faculty has greatly enhanced the professionalism and collegiality of the field teachers, making them feel like valued members of the teaching profession. In addition, the inservices and updates on teaching methodology provided by the university have proved to be important learning opportunities for the field teachers.

Next, Dr. St. Charles described LaFollette Elementary, one of the Center's professional development schools, as a neighborhood inner city school with an enrollment of 660 students. The staff, representing a broad range of experience, enthusiastically embraced their opportunity to influence the professional education of student teachers at LaFollette. Dr. St. Charles and her staff recognized the chance to reduce the culture shock often experienced by student teachers coming from a nonurban setting to teach in an inner city school.

Crediting the professional development program with LaFollette's ability to hire past program participants as new teachers, Dr. St. Charles indicated that the program allows LaFollette to help train the student teachers and ultimately hire some of them as professional members of the staff. Early experience at LaFollette familiarized the students with the school, enabling them to make an informed decision before accepting an urban teaching position. Dr. St. Charles found that many student teachers at LaFollette wanted to stay on as faculty members.

Regent Dreyfus asked about the level of urban elementary or secondary teaching experience of university faculty participants.

Professor Pasch responded that most Center faculty had substantial urban teaching experience. The Center draws on faculty from disciplines outside the School of Education, and those not experienced in urban teaching usually have an urban emphasis in their own research work.

Responding to Regent Dreyfus' question on the use of childhood intervention in the Center's programs, Dr. Pasch stated that childhood intervention as well as family and community involvement were priority issues. Currently, Center initiatives included reform of K-12 preparation of teachers in both regular and special education, as well as professional development of teachers. In addition, the program had identified schools as community sites where parenting classes could be given and families could gather to share experiences and counsel each other.

Commending the presenters for their enthusiasm, Regent Clusen asked how the Center was funded.

Dr. Pasch replied that some financial aid had been received from the Joyce Foundation in Chicago and similar funding was being sought, but that finding funds for the Center had been difficult. However, the professional development schools represented a full fiscal partnership between the Department of Staff Development at Milwaukee Public Schools and the UW-Milwaukee School of Education, using funds from the School of Education as well as outreach funding. Finally, university faculty had given their time generously to do the staff development work in the schools, recognizing the value of the university-school partnership.

Regent Clusen asked how the Center planned to evaluate the project, and Dr. Pasch replied that the project was undergoing constant evaluation. As the result of a three-year internal self-study as well as an external assessment, the School of Education recently had adopted the Center permanently. The ultimate assessment of the program's success would be the quality of teachers produced by the program as well as decreased faculty turnover.

Dr. St. Charles added that she intended to study student achievement as well as staff professionalization and openness to new ideas as measures of program success.

Regent Krutsch asked which new methodologies were proving most effective.

Dr. St. Charles replied that, although the success of teaching strategies can be teacher-dependent, staff at LaFollette had expressed great interest in cooperative learning strategies involving team teaching as well as programs where students help their peers.

Dr. Pasch added that UW-Milwaukee teaches prospective teachers three different ways of teaching: inquiry teaching, direct instruction, and cooperative learning. The professional development program would provide a natural adjunct for the field teachers to learn the new strategies themselves, enabling them to work more effectively with student teachers.

Perceiving professional development as a two-way learning experience, Dr. St. Charles reiterated that often a student teacher will have a university assignment involving an innovative teaching strategy, resulting in a modeling of the new technique for the field teacher.

Regent Grover asked the percentage of student teaching experience taking place in the Milwaukee Public School System.

Dr. Pasch responded that prior to the Center, School of Education practica took place in 128 schools in the Milwaukee metropolitan area. The Center has placed larger numbers of education students in cluster schools, which provides the student teachers a stronger sense of collegiality and professional support. In order to provide an urban emphasis, every education student has some level of field experience in a metropolitan school. There are some placements in suburban schools, and a plan has emerged to pair schools in Milwaukee with suburban schools. Dr. Pasch estimated that between 50 to 60 percent of UW-Milwaukee practica are in Milwaukee public schools.

In response to Regent Grover's question as to how many of the eleven Center professors have teaching experience in urban elementary and secondary schools, Dr. Pasch replied that, due to the interdisciplinary nature of the Center faculty, all did not necessarily have urban teaching experience. Some had worked in urban settings as counselors and psychologists.

Regent Grover asked about the possibility of a teacher exchange program, and Dr. Pasch replied that such potential trades were being studied. In addition, the Center would like field teachers to teach education students, so the possibility of clinical adjunct professorships enabling field teachers to teach at the university would be examined. In Fall 1990, the School of Education will be conducting its "Introduction to Teaching" class in four Milwaukee Public Schools and placing all of the students in those schools.

Regent Grover asked if UW-Milwaukee faculty members were currently in the Milwaukee Public School System teaching on a semester basis. Dr. Pasch said such a plan had been arranged in the past but was unsure of the plan's vcurrent status.

Presentation of Annual Student Government Award

He had been particularly impressed with student initiatives, including a legal services program, new campus lighting, and assistance for the intramural program, in addition to which the student government demonstrated a very productive and service-oriented interest in the community beyond the university through their involvement with the local government, local landlords, and the Red Cross. Stating that the UW-Stout Student Government Association had demonstrated a highly commendable maturity and community-mindedness, he presented the traveling plaque to President April

Farewell by Jim Smith and Robb McGinnis of United Council, pp7-8

In his farewell remarks as President of United Council, Jim Smith commented that Wisconsin is the envy of students in other states because students here have real input in the governance process.

Recalling that the first Regent meeting he attended was a hearing on Planning the Future, he said it was then that United Council realized that, to be effective, students must not just express opinions but must make the effort to research those opinions and write documents supporting their That strategy had been successful. He recognized the efforts of United Council staff members Sandy Eschmann, Erik Brogerding, Lance Walter and Mary Martin, who performed research, as well as students on campus who helped in obtaining needed information.

In its thirtieth year, he noted, United Council is the oldest state student association in the nation, with 22 member campuses, the highest membership in the country.

On behalf of United Council, he expressed appreciation to President Shaw and Vice President Trani for bringing students into the process. "We haven't always agreed, but we always have been there and that is a big step: when you open up communication, only good things can happen."

In conclusion, he commented that the intent in Planning the Future was that tuition should be no higher than the midpoint of the Big Ten institutions -- not necessarily at the midpoint.

Farewell remarks then were presented by Robb McGinnis, Shared Governance Director of United Council, who stated that during his tenure the goal had been to bring students closer to the Board of Regents, and that goal had been achieved.

It was his hope that the Board would keep in mind the impact on students of special fees as well as tuition. Such fees, he noted, are rising faster than tuition in areas such as special fees for utilities, for business programs, for library acquisitions, for municipal services, and for centralized service charge-backs.

In closing, he cautioned against a continued policy of enrollment management because of its emphasis on quality at the expense of accessibility.

> Awards Received by the UW System "Do College" Campaign , PP

President Shaw announced that the UW System Office of University Relations had received three significant awards as a result of the "Do College" media campaign which was designed to encourage middle and high school minority students to consider college as a realistic option.

Mingrition - (sere) In a nationwide competition sponsored by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE), the "Do College" program was entered in two categories with the following results: (1) In the area of public relations projects, the campaign won the grand gold medal award as the best of all 71 entries. The award brought with it a cash prize of \$1,000, which had been assigned for use in increased minority outreach efforts. (2) In the area of video public service announcements, "Do College" won one of three gold medal awards out of the 90 entries in this category.

In addition, the Milwaukee Chapter of the International Television Association recently awarded the "Do College" campaign with a Spotlight Award in recognition of its production quality and impact.

The President congratulated those who made possible this innovative media campaign: Vice President Ronald Bornstein and his staff; Dr. James Sulton; the Minority Information Center and campus minority coordinators;

the production talents of RW Video and producer John Roach; and the generous contributions from Miller Brewing Company, Wisconsin Bell, and the Wisconsin Power and Light Foundation.

Audit Subcommittee

Des Papers

Regent Nicholas reported that the Audit Subcommittee heard a Valenmittee presentation by UW-Madison Athletic Department Finance Director Al Fish on the report to the Legislature regarding the financial status of the Athletic Department. He indicated that the department expects to end the 1989-90 fiscal year with a \$457,000 positive balance. While the originally proposed 1990-91 budget had predicted a balance of \$190,000, to ensure that a positive balance is built the Department had identified an additional \$400,000 of contingency spending reductions which could result in a surplus of \$594,000.

The subcommittee noted that the financial information presented is in line with the Athletic Department's five-year plan. Committee members encouraged UW-Madison to remove the \$10 student fee as soon as possible and to build an operating reserve.

Suggested Activities for the Audit Subcommittee

Guidelines to formalize the role of the Audit Subcommittee were discussed. It was decided that the subcommittee will review and approve the policies and standards by which the internal audit functions of the UW System will be governed. It will be involved in the audit plan and will review summaries of audits conducted, as well as the significant findings and problem areas.

The subcommittee will also review the findings and comments of independent auditors, as well as those of the state and federal auditors. Reports and all supporting data submitted to the subcommittee will be available to all members of the Board. Reports of subcommittee actions will be presented to the full Board. Finally, the subcommittee concluded that it would be appropriate to recess into closed session as allowed by Wisconsin Statutes, if consideration of discipline, dismissal or demotion is involved.

Issues Paper: Education Costs and Resources—Trends and Comparisons, PP 17-18

Regent Nicholas reported that, at a portion of the Business and Finance Committee meeting to which all Regents were invited, President Shaw presented the Issue Paper on Education Costs and Resources--Trends and Comparisons. The paper identified the difficult decisions which will have to be made in balancing GPR-support, fees, enrollments, and existing allocations in the coming years.

In the discussion which followed, Regents stated that the UW System biennial budget request should reflect actual GPR needs and that alternative courses of action should be identified for implementation if the GPR request were not met. It was emphasized that under any combination of financial support, educational quality must be maintained.

Gifts, Grants and Government Contracts

The Business and Finance Committee unanimously voted to approve acceptance of the monthly list of gifts, grants and contracts, which brought the total received to \$345.5 million for the ten-month period ending April 20, 1990.

It was moved by Regent Nicholas, seconded by Regent Gelatt and carried that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents. Regent Davis abstained from the vote.

The annual rental cost for the first and second year of the lease is \$118,720 (\$13.10/SF). The rental rate for each of the subsequent three years includes a 3% annual rate increase. These terms are reflected in the following

Rental payments will be provided from the University's Operating Budget (GPR leasehold budget).

The lease provides for three, successive two-year renewal options from May 1, 1995, provided notice is given in writing at least 120 days before the then-current lease term expires. The rental rate for the renewal terms will be negotiated between the lessor and lessee 90 days before the end of the initial lease term (1995) or each subsequent renewal term.

Regent Gundersen presented Resolution 5500, which was intended to reflect the Board's consensus relating to appropriate funding of university facilities capital costs.

This resolution was presented for initial consideration in April and had been modified to reflect the comments and suggestions made at that

Robert Late - (serve)

Reporting that the Committee unanimously approved the modified resolution, Regent Gundersen noted the Committee's view that it is important for such a policy also to be supported by the State Building Commission. The Committee felt that the proper course of action would be to adopt the policy as presented but that there be further discussion among President Shaw, Regent President Schilling, Vice President Brown and the Chairman of the Physical Planning and Development Committee. The discussion would be designed to determine the best strategy to accomplish this goal.

Adoption by the Board of Regents of the following resolution was moved by Regent Gundersen and seconded by Regent Dreyfus:

Resolution 5500: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following is expressed to reflect the consensus of the Board of Regents relating to appropriate funding of university facilities capital costs:

- (1) The Board of Regents reaffirms its position that students should not be requested nor allowed to commit money via segregated fees for use in academic capital budget expenditures. This philosophy extends beyond strictly instructional space to include other capital expenditures that are necessary in support of the primary mission of the University System. It is expected that secondary, non-curricular student use of facilities will occur, in an effort to maximize the use of facilities and meet the needs of students.
- (2) Capital costs related to the various auxiliary enterprises and/or revenue-generating activities should generally be funded by user fees. It is likely that some projects will involve use of segregated fees, such as student unions, recreation facilities, etc., in addition to or instead of user fees.
- (3) Extramural funds such as gifts and grants can be used to replace or supplement any other source(s) of funds that would typically be prescribed for capital expenditures. The Board of Regents reaffirms its position related to the use of outside funds for capital projects:

- a. Such projects should not be initiated without an opportunity being provided for the Regents to determine the appropriateness of the proposed funds and/or project(s) to System needs.
- b. The need for a project that also requires a GPR contribution, or a project that would otherwise utilize GPR as a prescribed funding source, should be evidenced by its inclusion in long-range campus plans that reflect overall needs.
- (4) The funding of capital costs need not necessarily be the same as the funding of operating costs for the facility/program. Appropriate funding sources for facility/program operation are documented elsewhere.
- (5) The following list, based on the above funding source parameters, represents the criteria that will be used by the Board of Regents to evaluate the appropriateness of funding proposed for the capital costs of facilities within the University of Wisconsin System:

In response to a question by Regent Gelatt, President Schilling indicated that the proposed resolution had been discussed with and agreed to by staff of the State Building Commission but not with the Commission itself. It was concluded by the Physical Planning and Development Committee that the resolution could be adopted at this time, but that the next step should be a meeting with Building Commission members.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5500 was adopted unanimously.

UN System: Approval of 1991-93 GPR Capital Building Program Priorities R5501

Pp 25-29

Reporting unanimous Committee approval of categories for prioritizing projects for the 1991-93 Capital Budget, Regent Gundersen explained that the purpose of the resolution is to establish the ground rules to be used in the priority ranking of projects by the Chancellors, System staff, and the Board. A new category had been added to formally recognize the infrastructure and maintenance problems facing the UW System.

In response to concern about erosion of the value of the UW System physical plant, staff had developed reports, operating budget decision item narratives, and an Issues Paper on Infrastructure. Therefore, it seemed appropriate to address the issue directly in the Capital Budget rather than depending solely on the "all-agency" appropriations that were used in the past to obtain funding.

The Committee felt that this approach would establish a position for the Board of Regents and the UW System regarding the commitment to management of the \$3.6 billion in assets that are represented by the physical plant. When adopted by the Board, the categories would be the basis for development of the 1991-93 Capital Budget.

Resolution 5501 was moved by Regent Gundersen and seconded by Regent Dreyfus.

Resolution 5501: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following categories be adopted as the basis for prioritizing and categorizing projects for inclusion in the System's 1991-93 Capital Budget:

I. Fulfill Prior Formal Commitments

Projects in this category are those for which funds were released for planning during the 1989-91 biennium in anticipation of construction funding during the 1991-93 biennium, and projects/expenditures which are required by statute.

II. Infrastructure

This category recognizes the importance of projects and activities that protect, maintain and enhance the quality of the infrastructure that exists in support of the mission of the University of Wisconsin System. Within this category, the following priorities will be followed:

- a. Health/Safety and Environment: This category includes projects related to the University System's legal and moral obligations to provide a safe environment for students, faculty and staff. It includes compliance with federal and state codes, and such activities as asbestos abatement and underground fuel storage tank removal.
- b. Maintenance of Facilities: This category includes projects for the repair and renewal of structural systems, utility services, exterior building envelopes, and building support systems such as mechanical, electrical, heating, ventilating, and other support systems necessary for a building or campus to function.
- c. Telecommunications Cabling: This category includes all remaining systemwide needs for the installation of inter-building fiber optic cabling, and intra-building wiring of GPR facilities to meet electronic communications needs.
- d. Total Facilities Performance: This category includes projects that extend the useful life of existing facilities through a comprehensive, "Total Facility" approach. It includes projects that address multiple categories of work in a single building, e.g., maintenance, energy conservation, handicapped access, health and safety, and associated remodeling/renovation. It does NOT include stand-alone projects within a building that are eligible for funding under another funding category. Note: These projects will require specific enumeration in the 1991-93 biennium.
- minor projects: This category includes projects under \$250,000 each that address needed remodeling and provide facilities that are suitable for programmatic needs. Added emphasis will be placed on minor projects in the 1991-93 biennium in order to maximize the usefulness of existing facilities and to update obsolete facilities throughout the System in a timely way, and to address site development needs.

- f. <u>Energy Conservation</u>: This category includes projects that reduce energy consumption such as installation of energy management systems, insulation, etc.
- g. Removal of Architectural Barriers: This category includes projects that improve facility accessibility to individuals with physical disabilities.
- h. Land acquisition: This category includes funds needed for the purchase of additional parcels of land within the established campus boundaries. However, land needed for specific building projects should be included in the costs of the building projects.

III. Facilities Required to Provide Basic Program Needs

Projects in this category are those which modify, reconfigure and renovate existing facilities and/or provide additional space which is needed to deliver existing high priority programs that do not have appropriate space. This category also includes enhancements to central campus utilities such as additional primary electrical service, heating or cooling capacity, etc., which require specific enumeration.

Projects in this category will either be funded for construction, or will be enumerated for design in the 1991-93 biennium, and constructed in the 1993-95 biennium. It is intended that projects authorized and implemented for planning in 1991-93 will become "Prior Commitments" for available funding in 1993-95. This concept emphasizes the importance of ongoing space management activities and long range facilities planning.

IV. Facilities Required to Enhance Programs, Outside Funding, and Economic Development Opportunities

These projects involve the construction and/or advance planning of additional space to provide enrichment or expansion of programs, take advantage of non-GPR sources of funds to meet the mission of the University, or have a visible impact on the economic development of the state.

Supplemental Information on Major Project Ranking

Requests for additional space must clearly demonstrate, through a long range space use plan, that needs cannot be met in existing facilities.

Instructional facilities that have a direct student-related benefit will be given higher priority by System Administration than non-instructional facilities.

At all stages of the project evaluation and systemwide priority setting process, University project priorities as established by each Chancellor will be honored.

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Clusen commented that she considered it a step forward to give recognition to the infrastructure as an essential priority. With regard to the category titled "Fulfill Prior Formal Commitments," she was troubled by the fact that, over time, so many projects were promised for future years that there was hardly any funding left to distribute among the other priority categories.

Vice President Brown noted that the category on "Fulfilling Prior Formal Commitments" recognized that in the last Capital Budget the Building Commission established an enumerated planning category, which approved projects for planning through the design stage and ready for construction in 1991-93. Immediately after passage of the budget in 1991-93, they could go into construction. The first category in the resolution recognized the large expenditure of time, effort and money already made on those projects by making them the first priority for funding in the next biennium.

Regent Clusen asked if the commitments already made would consume a substantial amount of the funding authority for 1991-93, and Vice President Brown replied in the affirmative.

Regent President Schilling recalled that in meetings he and Vice President Lyon had with the Governor and others, the Governor had set forth a new two-pronged commitment, which included enumerated planning. He asked if this categorization dovetailed with that plan. Vice President Brown replied in the affirmative.

Regent Dreyfus observed that today's infrastructure needs were largely history driven. From 1965 to 1975, there was an incredible amount of expansion and construction at state university systems all over the United States. The oldest of these buildings are now 25 years old and in need of repair. This key cost priority might now result in a decade with very little new building construction.

Regent President Schilling pointed out that the Governor had told him and Vice President Lyon that his priority for the next Capital Budget will be maintenance and rehabilitation—not new buildings.

Regent Gelatt noted that all available funding might be committed to the first two categories, with nothing left for other categories. He asked if the Board would be unduly restricting itself by adopting these priorities without knowing what the projects themselves might be.

Regent Schilling explained that the resolution would establish guidelines by which the institutions would assess their capital needs, which would be the basis of the list of specific projects brought to the Board for approval or revision. At that point, it would not be known how much might be provided in the Governor's Capital Budget.

Regent Flores asked if the proposed categories had been discussed at the institutions.

Vice President Brown replied that the guidelines were reviewed by the chancellors but he did not know the extent to which other campus groups had discussed them.

Regent Flores asked what impact the guidelines would have on institutional projects related to new program priorities. Vice President Brown replied that such projects would fall into the third category, "Facilities to Provide a Basic Program Need."

Noting that all institutions already had done long-range capital planning, Regent Schilling indicated that this resolution would provide a systemwide prioritization of needs that are already identified and known.

Regent Clusen added that institutions were given guidelines each biennium prior to submitting their capital requests. The only major change in these guidelines was introduction of the infrastructure priority.

Regent Grover inquired as to the magnitude of the telecommunications cabling needs and how they related to the statewide study being conducted.

Vice President Brown replied that the need for backbone wiring and wiring in the buildings on the various campuses was estimated to cost about \$14 million. It would dovetail into the larger study of connections from campus to campus and would be compatible with anticipated recommendations of the statewide study.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5501 was adopted unanimously.

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Air Quality in UW System Buildings, p. 29

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Continuing the report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee, Regent Gundersen noted a report from Vice President Brown relating to the distribution of guidelines for resolution of indoor air quality complaints. This policy statement was the outcome of deliberations of a Systemwide working group, and was reviewed by the chancellors and System Administration staff before being issued. The policy was intended to assist all campuses in determining the proper steps to take when confronted with concerns of building occupants over the quality and safety of air in the building.

Regent Gundersen stated that he was very pleased that this initiative had been taken.

WW System's Proposed Small Projects Pilot Program

The Committee was advised of the status of the System's proposed small projects pilot program, which had been submitted to the Acting Administrator of the Division of State Facilities Management for his consideration. The response which Vice President Brown received denied the request. However, the basis of the denial did not persuasively argue that there is not considerable merit to this proposal.

Vice President Brown responded by suggesting additional items of value to the program and additional provisions that could be incorporated into the draft agreement. Mr. Brown had received an encouraging reply to this letter and had scheduled a meeting to pursue the matter further.

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Appreciation for the Tour of the Great Lakes Research Facility, P. 30

Regent Gundersen expressed appreciation for the interesting visit to the Great Lakes Research Facility and commended all involved in arranging for and conducting the tour of this excellent facility.

Comments by the Chair of the Physical Planning and Development
Committee on Safrastructure, pp 30-3)

Noting that the Physical Planning and Development Committee members are stewards of the physical plant of one of the finest university systems in the country, Regent Gundersen stated that the State of Wisconsin and the UW System must share this stewardship through a relationship based on trust. He was concerned that such a relationship was not apparent at this time.

In a previous action, the Board had approved a new roof for the Great Lakes Research Facility. This project was denied by the State Building Commission which, nevertheless, approved \$750,000 for a renovation project inside the building. The renovation was completed without the roof being repaired.

Regent Gundersen then displayed pictures taken the previous day in this newly renovated space. They showed ceiling tiles falling out, pails set out to catch water, manuscripts and carpets damaged by water, and sheets of plastic placed over equipment to protect it. Even so, some sophisticated analytical equipment had been destroyed. In one laboratory, Regents had seen workers standing on a rubber mat surrounded by water, operating a metal lathe, with the electrical cord running through the water.

Regent Gundersen pointed out that this was another example—and a costly one—of the difficulties caused by the cumbersome and overly bureaucratic building program process. Vice President Brown informed the Committee that the roof replacement project again had been placed on the State Building Committee agenda for the May 29 meeting. It was Regent Gundersen's hope that the Regents' concern over lack of support for such an obvious need would be made clear to the members of the Commission so that the problem can be corrected.

There is no acceptable alternative, he remarked, to properly replacing roofs in order to protect the substantial investments which have been made in renovations, in sophisticated equipment, and to prevent the damage of research materials.

Noting that this type of project would be placed in the Priority 2 infrastructure category of the capital budget guidelines, Regent Flores asked if it is likely that funding will be available for such projects after Priority 1 projects have been funded.

Vice President Brown expected that funding for maintenance projects will be available. Noting that such projects currently are funded from an all-agency account, he added that in this biennium, the UW System had requested \$90 million from that account. The Building Commission provided \$50 million for all state agencies, from which amount the UW System received \$30 million. Virtually all of the \$50 million for this biennium had been committed. For the coming biennium, the intent is to include infrastructure needs on the priority list rather than just making application for monies from the all-agency account.

Regent Gundersen added that part of the reason for the pilot project is that problems such as leaky roofs can be repaired immediately through a decision made at the campus level, with appropriate supervision provided by the university. He inquired as to the adequacy of supervision for the \$20 million Lapham Hall project at UW-Milwaukee.

In reply, Vice President Brown indicated that supervisory time is inadequate, since one state inspector supervises four or five projects and thus could not provide needed daily supervision of this large project.

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REPORT OF THE SPECIAL REGENT COMMITTEE ON THE UW-EAU CLAIRE STUDENT
GOVERNANCE APPEAL - Report on meeting april 6, 1990, R 5502, pp31-35

Regent Flores, Chair, presented the Committee's report.

The case involved an appeal by the President of the UW-Eau Claire student body of the decision by President Shaw which sustained Chancellor Schnack's decision to remove cigarette vending machines from residence halls and the student center.

In their appeal, the students alleged that they were denied the right to formulate and review a policy concerning student life, services and interests for which they had primary responsibility, and that they were denied the right to be active participants in immediate governance and policy development for UW-Eau Claire, in violation of Wisconsin Statutes.

At the April 6 meeting of the Regents, the Board approved the recommendation of the Special Regent Committee that the request for Regent review be granted. The Committee met later that same day to conduct the review. Present were the Special Committee members: Regents Flores, Clusen, Gelatt, President Schilling and Vice President Lyon. Regents Nikolay, Nicholas, and Vos also attended the meeting.

Oral presentations were made by the students, by President Shaw, and by Chancellor Schnack.

The Committee then deliberated the matter, and after thorough discussion, the majority reached the conclusions set forth in the written majority report which had been distributed. Regent Flores voted in opposition to those conclusions and had filed a dissenting report which also had been distributed.

It was moved by Regent Clusen and seconded by Regent Lyon that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5502: That the Board of Regents adopts the majority report of the Special Regent Committee on the UW-Eau Claire Student Governance Appeal.

Stating his agreement with Regent Flores' dissent, Regent Vos commented that students tend to have a cynical attitude regarding their ability to prevail in disagreements with the administration. By adopting the resolution, he felt the Board would be reinforcing that cynicism.

Regent Schilling pointed out that, while the UW-Eau Claire students had not been involved as they should have been early in the process, they did become involved later, and the Chancellor withheld a final decision on removal of the machines for a year while the dialogue occurred.

Statements by both the students and the Chancellor made it clear that there has been an excellent relationship between the administration and the students at UW-Eau Claire. Therefore, this was not a bitter dispute; rather, it was a test of the meaning of s. 36.09(5) of the statutes. The Committee intended its decision to be an opportunity for a significant precedential statement as to Regent interpretation of that statutory provision. For that reason, the Committee's report was lengthy and had been written with particular care. While the majority felt that Chancellor Schnack and others on campus had cured the initial defect, the decision was expansive in discussing the Board's expectation of meaningful student involvement in shared governance.

Referring to page 12 of the majority report, Regent Gelatt called attention to the statement that "the Committee affirms and the students agree that, under the statutory authority invested in his office, the Chancellor was the ultimate decision-maker on campus" It was the Committee's intention, he pointed out, to make a strong statement that the Regents do expect the chancellors to be the decision-makers. Through shared governance, they are expected to consult with the other constituencies on campus, but the Board holds them responsible, which means that their decisions will carry weight with the Board.

Regent Flores commented that, although the Chancellor has ultimate responsibility for making decisions, in this case the state statute, Board policy, and campus policy had been violated. The initial decision was made without student input, except for there being one student member of the Wellness Committee. After the decision was made and the students objected, the Chancellor agreed to consultation, which then took place.

Regent Flores felt that the appearance of what occured was of critical importance. Reading from his dissent, he stated that "the spirit of shared governance was violated and no corrective action can repair the harm done The appearance of having violated the spirit of shared governance is as damaging as a violation in fact. Here, campus and Regent policy were violated when the Chancellor made his initial decision unilaterally and without student input or consultation. At that point, the damage was done and we can never convince students that thereafter their input was seriously considered and that, coincidently, the same conclusion as the original was reached. Which is not to say that errors can never be corrected. However,

here it smacks too much of 'Let's give students their say, so we can remove the machines.' That may sound too cynical. However, if we continue to talk about shared governance with students and continue to ignore real or apparent violations of that elusive concept, then we will have rampant cynicism on all campuses."

President Shaw commented that he did not think adoption of the majority report sends a message that student input does not matter or that there is no consequence for violation of the guidelines or the law. On the other hand, he thought that failure to approve the majority report would send the message that chancellors are accountable for their institutions, but that they do not have authority commensurate with that accountability.

Regent Davis remarked that it would be unfair of students to conclude that shared governance works only if their position is accepted. Observing that issues often do not come neatly packaged as being a policy decision or an administrative decision, he did not accept the view that, if an issue is not correctly identified as policy in the first instance, the opportunity for the chancellor to make the decision is lost. Chancellors are hired to exercise their judgment and are held accountable for their judgment, he noted. While it might be the case that student input should have been a greater factor in the initial decision, he felt the Chancellor went to the appropriate lengths to incorporate that input when its lack was brought to his attention. Therefore, he urged that the Board vote to sustain the majority report.

Regent Clusen remarked that there were principles in the majority report from which both administration and students could learn. While one such message was the Regent commitment to meaningful student participation, another was that students who serve on campus committees have a responsibility to attend meetings and to keep their student governments informed. She called attention to a statement in the majority report's executive summary which read as follows: "Committee members recommend that the President's decision be sustained because they conclude that, in the facts here, students were in the end not denied the right to formulate or to review a policy Nor were they denied the opportunity to be active participants in institutional governance." While their input should have been sought sooner, the conclusion was that in the end their rights were not violated.

Regent Krutsch stated her agreement with the comments made by President Shaw. Regarding points made by Regent Flores, she did not believe that adopting the majority report would promote cynicism on the campus, particularly in view of the positive relationship between the students and the administration. As a general principle, she believed that decisions should be based on merit rather than on appearance. If the majority report reflected the merits of this case, she felt the decision should affirm that report.

Regent DeLong thought many felt uneasy regarding this case. What was violated here, he pointed out, was not only a Regent policy—but a state law. Although the violation was not intentional, he considered it a problem that there was no sanction for what had occured. He felt that the procedure was fatally flawed and did not think the flaw could be corrected by going through the procedure again. With respect to student membership on the

Wellness Committee, he noted that the one student member could not have changed the Committee's decision whether or not he or she attended meetings. Expressing agreement with Regent Flores, he did not believe the Board in good conscience could adopt the majority report.

Regent Schilling said he would agree with Regent DeLong if this were a clear-cut case of a law being knowingly violated. He thought the Chancellor argued forcefully, however, that he did not view his decision as being a policy decision. When it became evident to him that the students felt that it was, he stopped implementation and spent a year going through a process of consultation. The majority felt that cured the defect in the process. The majority report contained a strong statement on the importance of adhering to s. 36.09(5). The long-range implication of that decision is the expectation that students will appeal to the Board when they believe that either their primary responsibilities are not being honored, or they are not enabled to actively participate in shared governance. "The principles were brought forward; the students lost the battle, but they won the war."

Regent Flores commented that the majority report was inconsistent in upholding the Chancellor's decision, while at the same time finding deficient the process by which he reached that decision. Referring to the statutory requirement that the students shall be active participants in the immediate governance of and policy development for the institution, Regent Flores stated that, because of the broad statutory right to participate in governance, it did not matter whether removal of the machines was a policy affecting student life and interests. In such areas, students have primary responsibility -- a higher level of participation. In this case, policy or not, they were not active participants in governance, in contravention of the statute. Noting that campus rules state that only the student senate can speak for the students, he considered it unfair to place on the one student member of the Wellness Committee the responsibility for informing the student government. Rather, it was the responsibility of the administration to go to the student government formally prior to making a decision, and it was his position that the administration should be held accountable for not doing so. He agreed with Regent DeLong that, if there is a violation and there is no sanction, then there is no law. To approve the majority report, he felt, would be to take a step toward sending a message that all which must be done to cure a violation of the law is to reopen the process.

Making an analogy to the legal process, Regent Steil noted that a trial court is usually given an opportunity to correct a mistake which is found on appeal.

Regent Dreyfus disagreed with President Shaw that a negative vote would send a message that chancellors have responsibility without authority. Instead, he thought the message would be that this kind of issue should not come to the Regents and the President, but should be handled properly on the campus. While he did not question the ultimate authority of the Chancellor, he thought that, after the initial procedural error was made, it became imperative that the Chancellor have overwhelming evidence of danger to the students to make this decision in the face of majority student opposition and in the face of the initial mistake. He saw nothing in the report to indicate that the presence of the machines was an overwhelming danger to the students and the environment of the campus. Secondly, he was concerned that adoption of the report would present a danger of trivializing the statute on the student role in governance. Therefore, he intended to vote against the majority position.

With regard to the Chancellor's responsibility for the campus environment, Regent Clusen thought it reasonable for the Chancellor to consider that the health of the students and the general campus environment was a sound base for his decision. Pointing out that the Committee had worked very hard on this case, she commented that if the Board felt there should be a standing Committee to hear student appeals, she asked what kind of a message would be sent if the first time the Committee did not have unanimous agreement, the Board decided that the majority recommendation had no validity.

Regent Flores noted that the Chancellor did not consider removing the machines to be a policy issue in itself; rather, he viewed it as implementation of a wellness policy. However, the students were not consulted about that policy either. Regent Flores did not believe a unilateral decision about what constitutes a healthy environment complies with the meaning of shared governance.

The question was put, and <u>Resolution 5502 was adopted</u> on a roll-call vote with Regents Clusen, Davis, Gelatt, Grover, Gundersen, Krutsch, Lyon, Nicholas, Schilling and Steil voting "Aye" (10) and Regents DeLong, Dreyfus, Flores and Vos voting "No" (4).

PERSONNEL MATTERS REVIEW COMMITTEE - Committee monders! Regart Davis (Clar) &

Regent President Schilling reported that the Committee had been reconstituted with the appointments of Regents Dreyfus and Steil to succeed Regents Emeritus Hanson and Nikolay. Regent Davis was appointed to serve as Chair.

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Regent Davis presented a status report on the petition of David Iaquinta, a probationary faculty member at UW-Oshkosh. During 1988-89, his department and a college-level committee recommended him for tenure, but the Dean, the Vice Chancellor, and the Chancellor declined to accept this recommendation. The Chancellor's decision not to recommend tenure in May of 1989 resulted in a notice to Dr. Iaquinta that his appointment would terminate at the conclusion of the 1989-90 academic year. Under provisions in the Administrative Code, Dr. Iaquinta exercised his appeal rights at the institutional level. At the conclusion of the appeal, on December 19, 1989, the Chancellor issued his final decision affirming the nonrenewal. On March 8, 1990, Dr. Iaquinta filed a petition for review of his nonrenewal with the Board of Regents. Under Chapter 3, section 6 of the Board Bylaws, the petition was referred to the Regent's Personnel Matters Review Committee.

Regent review of this case is discretionary.

Under the Bylaws, the first issue to be addressed is whether or not to recommend to the full Board that the matter be considered on its merits. If the Committee recommends that the matter be heard, and if the Board agrees, the Committee would then conduct the review on the record and bring

recommended findings and conclusions to the Board for final action.

(uf) VW-Oshlar Status report on appeal of Band Sequents to Board Parameter On March 29, 1990, the previous Chair of the Personnel Matters Review Committee, Regent Nikolay, notified Dr. Iaquinta and Acting Chancellor David Ward of a timetable to file briefs on the question of whether the Committee

should recommend to the full Board that Dr. Iaquinta's petition be granted. Dr. Iaquinta was asked on March 29 to file his brief by April 20. The Chancellor was to file his brief by May 11. A representative for Dr. laquinta protested filing a brief and the timetable for the process. timetable subsequently was reaffirmed. To date, no brief had been received. Regent Davis did not intend to convene the Committee unless or until a brief is received from Dr. Iaquinta or his representative stating why in their view the Regents should review this case.

In reply to a question by Regent Dreyfus, Regent Davis stated that the intent was to move in an expeditious manner, based on Dr. Iaquinta's expressed concern regarding termination of his employment at the end of May 1990. The schedule set forth by the Committee would have allowed a recommendation to be made to the Board in June. However, without a brief from Dr. Iaquinta, the Committee was not prepared to proceed.

Regent DeLong suggested that a finite time period be established for filing the brief so that the matter could be brought to closure.

Regent Davis said there would be further contact with Dr. Iaquinta's representative to ascertain their future plans. If they did not wish to file a brief, he would not ask the Committee to go through the full record in order to come to a conclusion on whether or not the case should be accepted for review.

In reply to a question by Regent Flores, Regent Davis said the Committee ultimately would make a recommendation.

Whereas, with his leadership the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee gained a much needed increase in funding to enhance the institution's research programs; and

Whereas, his guidance and direction were instrumental in enhancing the institution's efforts to recruit and retain minority students and resulted in a significant increase in the number of minority faculty members at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System hereby commends Clifford V. Smith, Jr., for his exemplary service to the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, the University of Wisconsin System, and the people of Wisconsin; and

Be it further resolved that the Board of Regents extends its sincere appreciation to Chancellor Smith and his wife, Nina, for their outstanding contributions, and wishes them happiness and success in all future endeavors.

Thanking the Board for its resolution, Chancellor Smith stated that he and his spouse have considered it an honor to head UW-Milwaukee for the last four years. They enjoyed their relationships with the Regents, Presidents, Chancellors, and all the people who make up this great system. Noting that academic excellence both in teaching and research had been his motto from the time he arrived on campus, he stated his conviction that the quality of education delivered to students is directly proportional to the quality of the faculty and their willingness to establish and sustain high standards in the classroom. Any deviation from that course, he warned, would bode ill for the future of the universities in this country.

With regard to UW-Milwaukee students, he noted that more than 90 percent come from Wisconsin, 80-85 percent come from the greater Milwaukee area, and approximately 75-80 percent remain in the state and in the area after graduation. It is UW-Milwaukee graduates who fuel the major industries in the Greater Milwaukee area and the success of UW-Milwaukee graduates is intimately tied to the economic vitality of the area.

In closing, the Chancellor remarked that he and Mrs. Smith leave with a sense that they made a difference and had been able to accomplish much, none of which would have been possible without the help of many fine people—in this room, on the campus, and in the larger community. He concluded by stating that "UW-M is an outstanding university, and we all should be very, very proud of it."

Thanking Chancellor Smith for his outstanding service to UW-Milwaukee and the Milwaukee community, Regent Nicholas stated his respect for the Chancellor's ability, integrity, and commitment to excellence.

B. The IW-Madison Vice Chancellor for Administration, on February 1, 1990, signed, on behalf of the Board of Regents, an Extension of Agreement with the University of Wisconsin Foundation for use of farm real estate. An earlier Memorandum of Agreement, dated March 4, 1985, permitted the University's College of Agricultural and Life Sciences to use approximately 470 acres of land near Hayward for the five-year period ending January 31, 1990, The donor's restrictions prohibited the Foundation from disposing of the land during this five-year period; however, the Foundation has since been attempting to sell the property. In the interim, the College will continue to use the property. This Extension of Agreement extends the period of the original Memorandum of Agreement through January 31, 1991, or until the property is sold by the Foundation, if earlier.

C. The UW Oshkosh Acting Chancellor, on March 26, 1990, signed, on behalf of the Board of Regents, a Memorandum of Agreement with the UW-University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh Foundation, Inc. for the use of the Oviatt House, 842 Algoma Boulevard, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, for Foundation-related business. The University agrees to provide services such as janitorial, groundskeeping, and utilities. In exchange for being assigned to this facility, the Foundation agrees: to assume the cost of making any necessary changes, repairs for modifications before relocating Foundation activities to Oviatt

House; to use Oviatt House exclusively to conduct Foundation business and to support and advance the interests of the Foundation and the University; and to assume the cost of renovation of the

Oviatt House, consistent with its historic character.

D. The UW-Stevens Point Vice Chancellor for Business Affairs, on March 12, 1990, signed a letter to St. Michael's Hospital to give notice of renewal of the agreement developed between the University and the Hospital for the sale of steam to the Hospital by the University, A representative of St. Michael's signed their approval on March 28, 1990. This agreement may be renewed annually by mutual agreement of both parties per Regent Resolution 5232.
