

As soon as a new editor is appointed, your paper will be reviewed and considered for publication.

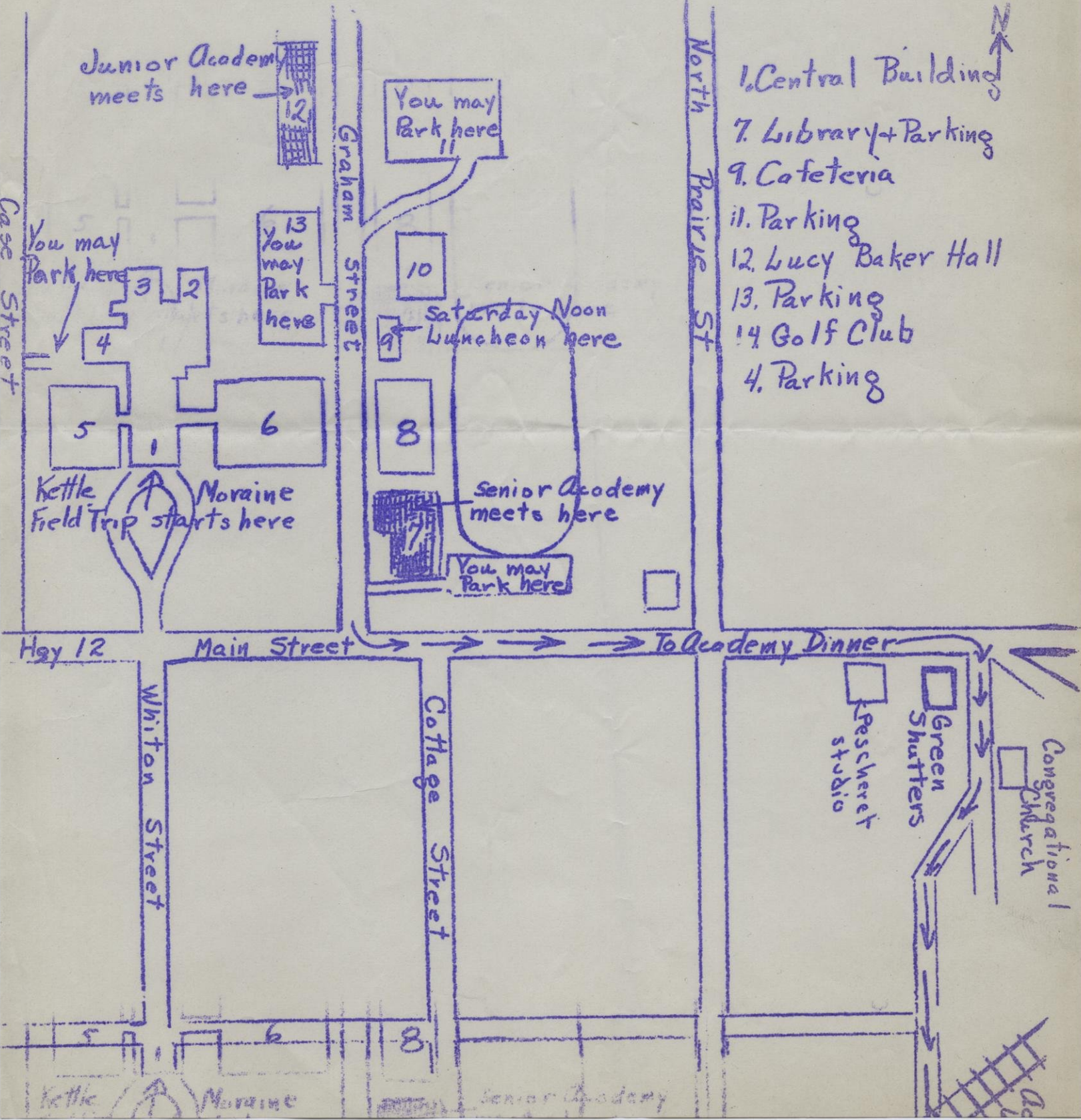

Dear Mr. Larson:

In reply to your mimeographed letter of the 23rd I am sending herewith a revised and enlarged copy of the abstract of the paper which I am scheduled to present to the Wisconsin Academy on 3rd May.

Many years ago I concluded that to read a technical paper before the Academy is a waste of time. Very few geologists ever attend these meetings so that you are reading something which is way over the heads of the vast majority of those present. I simply felt very cheap to do this. I did agree to present a few remarks of apopular nature provided the 35 mm photos of the illustrations turn out suitable to project. This is doubtful for the camera I used has unexplained failures when no picture at all results. I might find out this fact when it is too late to try again. In that case I did not agree to show up for the drive on U. S. 12 is an undertaking of hazard not to be undertaken lightly.

I think the failure of geologist to attend Academy meetings is due first to interest in problems distant from Wisconsin and second the availability of places to publish their results which have wider circulation than do the

Transactions.

Dear Mr. Thwaites:


I see from the Wisconsin Academy program that you are scheduled to take part in the formal presentation of papers.
