Peace in the peopled vales.

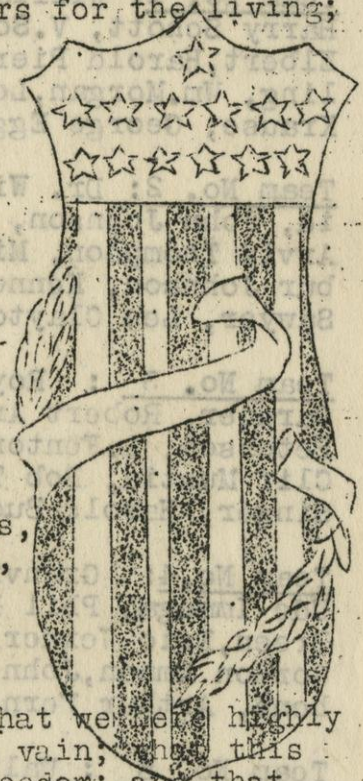
"Peace in the crowded town;

AT WORK ON HIGHWAY 36 AT LAST

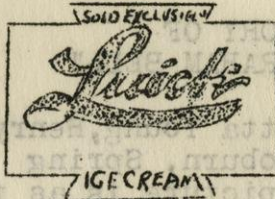

CITIZENSHIP DAY AT MANITOWOC A COLORFUL EVENT

Col. J.E. Atkins, Village President of Williams Bay and the editor drove up to Manitowoc Sunday, a distance of 150 miles through the scenic Lake Winnebago country.

It was a beautiful day and warm and balmy until within a few miles of Manitowoc when a lake breeze of Lake Michigan swept over the warm plowed fields and made a mist to rise which made them look like the trees were setting in lakes.

For a while during the parade it was very cool and the folks in their Spring attire felt a breath of Winter. Before the ceremony in the bowl in front of the beautiful new Lincoln High School commenced the sun came out and helped make it a very attractive occasion.

The streets were decorated with flags and banners saying "Manitowoc Welcomes You". The parade was a real credit to the city and the other communities in Manitowoc County. They seemed to have vied with one another in decorating the floats, all of which had an historical setting. The quotations from the "Bill of Rights" were much in evidence in the banners and placards.

There were many bands, the Manitowoc Marine Band, Vocational High School Band, the High School Band, and others from other communities.

Seven hundred young people who had attained their twenty-first birthday during the year ending May 21 in whose honor the day was held marched in the parade.

On the plaza in front of the High School the young citizens had the seats of honor. At the signal of an aerial bomb, the ceremonies began with addresses of welcome, an invocation and a chorus, "Thanks Be to God" by the Meistersingers, who won first place last year at the Chicago Musical Festival.

The Induction Ceremony was administered by Chief Justice Marvin B. Rosenberry who after a brief address had them repeat the oath, "I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin and the laws enacted pursuant thereto, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties and obligations of a citizen of the State of Wisconsin to the best of my ability, so help me God."

The certificates were handed to them by George P. Hambrecht, a Lake Geneva boy who made good in the educational world and is now State Vocational Director.

The main address was delivered by Dr. Clarence A. Dykstra, President of the University of Wisconsin. A response for the young people was made by Jerome A. Mahlberg one of the group. A Washington Elm, a direct descendent of the elm under which George Washington took command of the first American Army on Cambridge Common on the morning of July 3, 1775, was planted as a memorial of the occasion.

Our County has appropriated the sum of \$300 suggested by the University Extension Division to get a Citizenship program started in Walworth County. Dr. R.J. Colbert, who suggested the idea to a group in Manitowoc is known in our County and helped with our getting the University Extension branch in Williams Bay.

It is worthy of emulation and with some modification the plan can be carried out in our County another year.

"Wholehearted cooperation from the churches, schools, lodges, boy-scouts, patriotic organizations and all was the secret of the success of the occasion," said Mr. C.A. Groffman, former mayor whom we met.

A Citizenship Day in 1940 for Walworth County should be a reality.

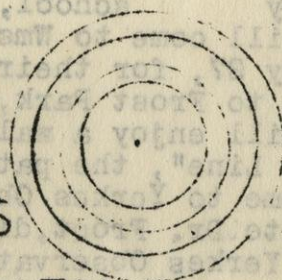
