OUANANISCHE ? !

No wonder an Indian up in Maine exclaimed " Ouananische ?!", meaning " What is it? " when he happened to catch a Land-locked Salmon. They are certainly beauties to behold.

And now we have them in Lake Geneva. This fall there has been quite a bit of excitement along the Bay when beautiful fish have been seen jumping five or six feet out of the water. Some were real large.

Then one morning late in October Dewey Denton, a fisherman guide, at the Bay found a beauty lying in his boat. He called over Vic Hansen who so admired it that he took it to Burlington and Waterford trying to get some one to mount it. No one would mount it as it was believed to be a Brown Trout and it was out of season. It was brought back and put on ice and Game Warden Elliott of Whitewater was called. He came and took it to Madison for examination and classification.

A week later, Charles D. Mc Commons of Elkhorn, who is an amateur ichthyologist, on hearing about it came over to the Bay and found a similar fish which Joe Ambrose and Ned Grimm had caught. This he took to his home and checked up with Jordan and Evans 1904 Fish Text-book and became convinced that it was a Land-locked Salmon.

At Fontana two similar specimens were found in the creek leading to the marsh and Mc Commons was notified. These he took to Milwaukee and the curator of lower mammology at Milwaukee Public Museum, Dr. T.E.B. Pope pronounced them true *Salmo Salar* Sebago.

These fish are of the species of Atlantic Salmon which have been so plentiful along the coast of Maine and north. For centuries they have been the sportsman's lure along the coasts of Ireland and Scotland and the streams leading into the ocean.

Some time many years ago they were transplanted into Lake Sebago, Maine and from there to other nearby lakes and were given the name *Salmo Salar* Sebago, or Landlocked Salmon. It has been a fishermen's paradise for years and meant thousands of dollars annually to the State of Maine.

Many of these fish have been caught through the last twenty-five years in Lake Geneva varying in size from four or five pounds to sixteen pounds but it was Charles D. Mc Commons who took the trouble to find out the answer to the Indian question, "Ouananische? ".

The editor has been investigating the answer to the question, " How did they get here " and though he has interviewed many and found a lot of information, there are a few points yet to clear up before making a definite statement. So next issue you will find more about the *Salmo Salar* Sebago or " Quinet Salmon ".

Meantime the editor welcomes any stories you may have about those you may have caught or about the origin of them in Lake Geneva.

SENT BY MR. J.S. HOTTON FROM
PORT ANGELES, WASHINGTON.

"By this mail in separate enclosure, we are sending a pair of oyster shells showing the kind that are planted and harvested in the oyster beds of Puget Sound. They call these large ones Japanese oysters. We ate the oysters from the shells. One oyster fried makes a meal. Fried or in soup, they are delicious; so fresh and so rich in flavor from the tang of the sea. Marge serves them one way or the other for supper about twice a week. When she fries them I think I like them best fried; when she puts them in milk stew, I think I like them best stewed.

One of the pleasant experiences out here is the abundance of salt water food fresh from the sea—salmon, cod and halibut steaks, sole, smelts, trout and mackerel are in the list, and in shell fish, clams, scallops, shrimps and crabs, beside the wonderful oysters—all in the list of table delicacies when properly prepared and served.

Before long we shall be moving down to Southern California which is full of old friends."
