PRESENT: Regents Arveson, Gelatt, Jones, Laird, Renk, Rennebohm, Steiger, Werner.

ABSENT: Regents Wanvig and Watson.

Regent Wanvig was absent due to absence from the state; and Regent Watson was absent on account of meetings of Regents of State Colleges.

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Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was  
VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on September 12, 1953, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

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At the request of President Fred, Dean Ritchie appeared before the Regents to discuss briefly matters relating to the Law School. Dean Ritchie stated that he would discuss the purpose of the Law School and explain its component parts. He said it was the responsibility of the Law School to provide training in the practice of law, to carry on research, and to provide public service by serving public organizations of the state and the State Bar by assisting in effecting law revisions and reforms. He pointed out that the law is an expression of the basic concepts and values of our way of life.

With reference to statistics concerning the Law School, he pointed out that the enrollment of law students is 489, with 21 students enrolled in other

aches of the University taking one or more courses in the Law School. Last year 527 students were enrolled in the Law School. There are 217 students in the first year class this year as compared with 194 a year ago. Dean Ritchie estimated that the Law School enrollment during the next several years would reach a total of approximately 600, at which figure he hoped it could be stabilized. He pointed out that it was significant that there was a large enrollment of nonresident students in the Law School in view of the highest nonresident tuition in the country. He reported that the faculty consisted of 21 full-time members and 3 part-time lecturers; and that the faculty-student ratio was one to 26 (in the discussion following his presentation he pointed out that if the several vacancies on the faculty were filled, the faculty-student ratio would be about one to 24). He reported that the Law Library consisted of 73,817 well selected volumes, but that it was a relatively small library in comparison to the enrollment.

Dean Ritchie reported that the most critical need of the Law School is for additional facilities, stating that the Law School has occupied the present building since it was built in 1893. Additional facilities were requested but not obtained in 1916. In 1940 the Law Library Addition was completed and paid for entirely out of non-state funds. The Law Library Addition was constructed at a cost of \$182,638, of which \$82,638 was a P.W.A. grant, and \$100,000 was borrowed from the William F. Vilas Estate, the latter being currently repaid from student fees. Dean Ritchie stated that Wisconsin has the most inadequate physical facilities of any standard Law School in America. However, he stated that we have a great Law School, because of its great faculty, and because of the quality and interest of its student body. In conclusion Dean Ritchie quoted the following statement regarding the University of Wisconsin Law School made by Professor Harry Jones of the Columbia Law School: "No law school has a finer tradition or a better rounded and more able faculty."

Dean Ritchie distributed copies of a statement regarding the Law School Building Situation and a statement of Law Library Statistics comparing the law libraries and enrollments of various law schools. (Copy on file.)

#### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in EXHIBIT A, attached, be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the faculty of the School of Pharmacy, honorary recognition citations be awarded at the Wisconsin Pharmacists' Institute to Mr. Max N. Lemberger, of Milwaukee, and to Mr. Oscar Rennebohm, of

Madison, for their outstanding contributions to the welfare of their fellow men and to the advancement of the profession of pharmacy. (Confirming written approval by the Regents.)

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Actions by the President of the University, since the

September 12, 1953, meeting of the Board of Regents, covering appointments, resignations, and changes in status or salary of personnel (EXHIBIT B attached) be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

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At the request of President Fred, Vice President Little distributed copies of a statement of enrollment for the Madison Campus for the first semester of 1953-54 and a summary comparison of enrollment with the two previous first semesters. (EXHIBIT D attached)

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At the request of President Fred, Vice President Little made the following statement in presenting an additional contribution of \$10.00 by Mrs. Anne Steytler, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, to be added to the David Stimple Memorial Scholarship Fund:

"I have here another gift, too late to be listed in the usual accounting of gifts and grants. Its uniqueness, however, is not in this but in the two great devotions it represents: the one of a young wife to the memory of a husband and the 'ten good years' in marriage with him; the other to the helping of other idealistic scholars like the late David Stimple toward the goals of a higher degree at Wisconsin and a lifetime in the service of humanity.

"Walter David Stimple, a Milwaukee boy, and the girl he was to marry were both University of Wisconsin students. Fifty-two months service with the armed forces interrupted David's first University years but in that time Anne gained her degree and began to teach in the French department. When David returned to the campus, they took up their married life in the expanded confidence of youth--and the crowded quarters of the Monroe Trailer Camp. Their first child was born to them there while Anne, among the legion of campus wives, added cheerfully to the family funds with on-and-off-the campus jobs.

"As a serious student, David Stimple made plans for graduate work in history. During the four years in the trailer camp he completed his residence requirements for the Ph.D. and found time to be an exemplary citizen as well. He served as mayor of Monroe Park and chairman of the steering committee which organized the trailer village into a self-governing unit of the University. He was also on the Board of Directors of the Veterans' Cooperative Buying Club which cut down the cost of living for the student inhabitants of the village.

"G.I. funds began to run out and the student took a teaching position at Virginia Polytechnic Institute until he might save enough to return for additional work at Wisconsin.

"He died suddenly in May, 1951, at Blacksburg, Virginia. Added to the great personal grief of his wife and two children was the loss to us of a very promising young scholar.

"With her first contribution of \$1,100 for the establishment here of the David Stimple Memorial Scholarship, the widow specified that scholarship candidates be majors in American or Modern European history, must have broad interests, including philosophy and religion, must be firm exponents of the ideas on academic freedom expressed in the 'sifting and winnowing' plaque on Bascom Hall, must need financial help, and must be male and married.

"Since that initial offering, small sums have been forwarded steadily out of limited finances to make the total fund, including interest, \$1,310.48. The most recent contribution, this ten dollar check, was accompanied by a letter, a portion of which I think you would like to hear:

'Dear Mr. Fred:

Today is David's birthday, so we send along a small check to add to the fund. Curiously enough, only this week the children, Jeanne and Alan, wanted to know if their daddy had a monument. We had been walking past various statues and stones....So I explained that he didn't like stone monuments and for that reason we had found a different way to remember him. I told them about the fund, and Jeanne said approvingly, "He was famous, wasn't he?--At least in the History Department." He wasn't famous, but I don't think that matters, and after awhile Jeanne will agree that it doesn't really matter....'

"The scholarship at Wisconsin,' this devoted wife and Wisconsin alumnus had explained when she began the fund, 'is a small thing....but it symbolizes our belief that a man is remembered by the good he does his fellows. The terms of the grant further express this idea, I think. It is the only kind of memorial David would have wanted.'"

Regent Jones stated that the Regents did not have a previous opportunity to consider this gift and that some special consideration should be given to this contribution. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was

VOTED, That the gift of \$10.00 by Mrs. Anne Steytler of Chapel Hill, North Carolina, to be added to the David Stimple Memorial Scholarship Fund, be accepted; and that the statement presented by Vice President Little regarding this gift, including the extract from Mrs. Steytler's letter to President Fred, be spread upon the minutes of this meeting.

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# RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

## I. Recommendations

1. That, upon the recommendation of the State Director of Purchases, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a contract with the E. A. Wright Company, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for University diplomas required during the period October 1, 1953 to October 1, 1955, at a unit cost of thirty-two cents per diploma.
2. That the request of the Madison Water Department for permission to construct an underground water main across the lower campus between State Street and Langdon Street without expense to the University be approved, subject to the approval of the location of the main by the University.
3. That, in accordance with a request by the City of Fond du Lac, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a memorandum of agreement between the City of Fond du Lac and The Regents of The University of Wisconsin for a special investigation of the ground water resources of the City of Fond du Lac, the agreement to provide for payment by the City of Fond du Lac to the University of \$11,250 over a three-year period ending July 1, 1955, to cover approximately one-half of the cost of the work; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a supplemental agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey to provide for the payment of the other half of the work.
4. That Mr. Joseph F. Lawrence be deputized as a University police officer.
5. That, upon recommendation of the Vice President of Student Affairs, the penalty for late payment of fees by Mr. Cyrus Butt, for the first semester of 1953-54, be waived.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, recommendations 1 to 5, inclusive, listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Recommendations) were adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jones, Actions 1 to 3, inclusive, listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Report of Actions Taken) were approved, ratified and confirmed.

President Werner raised a question as to why space is rented in Milwaukee for performances of the Pro Arte Quartet when space is provided by the local communities for performance of the Quartet in all other communities outside of Madison. It was agreed that this question should be given further consideration.

### III Budget Transfers

Regent Renk presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

1. That John T. Emlen, Jr., professor of zoology, be granted leave of absence, without pay, for the academic year 1953-54; and that he receive \$1,000 from the Graduate School as a travel subsidy.
2. That Glenn T. Trewartha, professor of geography, be granted leave of absence for the second semester of 1953-54, without pay.
3. That Joseph O. Hirschfelder, professor of chemistry, be granted leave of absence for the period October 1 through December 15, 1953; that he be paid \$334.16 from 16D-684 and \$668.61 from 16D-501, Navy Contracts; and that his leave be without pay from University and Army funds.
4. That Mabel G. Masten, professor of neuropsychiatry, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from October 6 to December 6, 1953.
5. That the retirement of Gladys Stillman, associate professor of home economics (foods and nutrition), be approved; to take effect September 30, 1953; and that she be granted emeritus status on the same date.
6. That Don D. Lescohier, emeritus professor of economics, be employed on a special service contract for the academic year 1953-54, on a part-time basis, to teach a course in social studies for engineers; at a salary of \$3,775.00 for the year; charge to L & S Undistributed.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That \$2000 be allotted from the Anonymous Trust Fund for the payment of expenses in connection with the Memorial Library dedication ceremonies.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the bid by Sturgeon Bay Boat Works, Inc., Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin, to provide a new life-saving boat for the University at a cost of \$13,400, be accepted, and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be directed to sell the old boat at the best price obtainable.

On behalf of the Business and Finance Committee, Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendation and the motion was seconded by Regent Relatt:

- a. That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, the location of the Indoor Practice Building in the Camp Randall area east of the Stadium be approved; subject to the following conditions:
  - (1) The Indoor Practice Building is to be designated as a memorial to the Union Veterans of the Civil War (the specific wording to be determined later).
  - (2) A plaque is to be affixed to the building giving appropriate facts concerning the history of Camp Randall.
  - (3) The Guard House in Camp Randall is to be placed under a roof for better protection.
  - (4) The Legislature is to be requested by the Board of Regents to make the remainder of Camp Randall Memorial Park a perpetual memorial for the Union Veterans of the Civil War and provide for a permanent committee to supervise the management and care of the park.
- b. That, subject to the approval of the Governor, and to the approval of the State Building Commission pursuant to Joint Resolution No. 22, S (1953 Legislature), authority be granted to revise the plans and specifications for the Indoor Practice Building to fit the new location east of the Stadium and to advertise for bids; and that the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be requested to explore methods of financing the cost of construction and to report thereon to the Regents at the earliest opportunity.

In response to a question by Regent Laird, it was pointed out that the provision to request the Legislature to make the remainder of Camp Randall Memorial Park a perpetual memorial for the Union Veterans of the Civil War and to provide for a permanent committee to supervise the management and care of the park was included at the request of representatives of organizations concerned with matters relating to the Union Veterans. In order to remove any ambiguity as to what should be included in the park to be designated as a perpetual memorial, it was unanimously agreed that the motion should be amended to substitute the word "such" for the word "the" in the last line of a. (4) of the motion.

The question was put on the motion to read as follows:

- a. That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, the location of the Indoor Practice Building in the Camp Randall area east of the Stadium be approved; subject to the following conditions:

- (1) The Indoor Practice Building is to be designated as a memorial to the Union Veterans of the Civil War (the specific wording to be determined later).
  - (2) A plaque is to be affixed to the building giving appropriate facts concerning the history of Camp Randall.
  - (3) The Guard House in Camp Randall is to be placed under a roof for better protection.
  - (4) The Legislature is to be requested by the Board of Regents to make the remainder of Camp Randall Memorial Park a perpetual memorial for the Union Veterans of the Civil War and provide for a permanent committee to supervise the management and care of such park.
- b. That, subject to the approval of the Governor, and to the approval of the State Building Commission pursuant to Joint Resolution No. 22, S (1953 Legislature), authority be granted to revise the plans and specifications for the Indoor Practice Building to fit the new location east of the Stadium and to advertise for bids; and that the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be requested to explore methods of financing the cost of construction and to report thereon to the Regents at the earliest opportunity.

The motion was carried with Regent Jones voting "No". Regent Jones gave as the sole reason for his voting "No" his belief that the site selected is not a proper site for the Indoor Practice Building.

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Regent Jones moved and Regent Gelatt seconded the approval of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee:

That, in view of the urgent need for additional University dormitories in order to provide adequate student housing, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized and directed to request the approval of the Governor and the State Chief Engineer to employ architects for the preparation of preliminary plans for the replacement of Chadbourne Hall with a new dormitory for approximately 600 women to be located at the northwest corner of University Avenue and Park Street and that not to exceed \$50,000 be allotted from the 5-A Residence Halls revolving fund for this purpose.

Regent Renk stated that although he was in favor of providing additional dormitories, he believed that the northwest corner of Park Street and University Avenue should be used for classroom buildings; and that he, therefore, would have to vote against the recommendation.

Regent Laird stated that she was not convinced that this was the best site for a dormitory; that she believed it was a better site for classroom buildings; that she was inclined to prefer smaller dormitories for women, including dormitories in which the girls can do some of the work to reduce their expenses; and that she would, therefore, have to vote in the negative.

A called vote was taken - Regents Arveson, Gelatt, Jones, Rennebohm, Steiger and Werner voting "Aye"; Regents Laird and Renk voting "No". The motion was declared carried.

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Regent Rennebohm reported that the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands had made many trips inspecting land that might be suitable for acquisition for the College of Agriculture; and that the Special Committee soon would have a report to submit to the Board.

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Regent Rennebohm reported, with reference to the bill on salaries (Substitute Amendment No. 1, A to Bill No. 759, A of the 1953 Legislature), that he had been unable to contact the author of the bill, but would do so as soon as possible.

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In connection with discussion in the matter of removal of the chicken yards from the University Avenue location, Regent Rennebohm reported that funds were being raised through<sup>out</sup> the state in honor of Professor James G. Halpin and that he hoped that this fund-raising project might be expanded to provide part of the needed facilities for the Department of Poultry Husbandry.

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Regent Arveson requested consideration of nominations for the Regent appointment to the Board of Visitors for the term beginning July 1, 1953. Regent Rennebohm stated that the Board should give further consideration to this matter before taking action. Regent Jones asked that this matter be held over to a subsequent meeting, and Regent Arveson agreed to the request.

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Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:05 A.M.
