

HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.
That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 65 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over, they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.


Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it

to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University had had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.


Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 63,435, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers; the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horse shoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and boxing matches.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR IVAN B. WILLIAMSON

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR IVAN B. WILLIAMSON

THE MAN who put Badger football on a solid foundation and who established a winning tradition, now heads up the University of Wisconsin intercollegiate sports program as its athletic director.

He is Ivan Baum Williamson, considered by many as the most successful coach in the modern era of Wisconsin football and hailed by many more as a resourceful, imaginative, and firm leader under whose direction the intercollegiate athletic program can continue its well-ordered, planned growth.

Ivy, as he is popularly known, succeeded to the athletic directorship following the untimely death of Wisconsin's beloved Guy Sundt, Oct. 25, 1955. Williamson was appointed as Guy's successor on Nov. 12 by the board of regents but did not take office until Dec. 1. Ivy is the sixth person to hold the position of athletic director. Others were Thomas E. Jones (1916-1924), George Little (1925-32), Walter Meanwell (1933-35), Harry Stuhldreher (1936-1950), and Guy Sundt (1950-55).

Williamson first came to Wisconsin in February, 1949, to take over the head football coaching responsibilities. In his seven seasons, Wisconsin won 41 games, tied four, and lost 19 against all opponents. His Big Ten record was just as impressive, the Badgers winning 29 against 13 setbacks and four ties. In addition, Wisconsin tied for the championship in 1952, played in the Rose Bowl, and for the first six years was in title contention or Rose Bowl consideration right up to the final gun of the season.

He came to Wisconsin with an excellent background. He played football at Michigan during the seasons of 1930 through 1932, won honors as an all-conference end, and captained the team in his senior year. In that three-year span, Michigan won or shared three Big Ten titles and lost only one game while winning 24 and tying two.

At Michigan, "Ivy" also earned two basketball letters and his football coach at that time, Harry Kipke, said, "Ivan Williamson is the smartest player I have ever had or hope to have."

Before coming to Wisconsin, Williamson was head coach for two years at Lafayette College. His 1947 team won six games and lost three, while in 1948, his charges won seven games out of nine, bowing only to Army and Rutgers.

Born in Prairie Depot, Ohio (now called Wayne), on Feb. 4, 1911, Williamson was graduated from Bowling Green high school after excelling in both scholarship and athletics. He entered Michigan and upon his graduation had not only won laurels as one of the outstanding athletes in Wolverine history but wound up with special honors in scholarship. He also holds a masters' degree from Michigan, obtained in 1940. He is married and has twin sons, Jack and David, age 22.

Following his graduation in the spring of 1933, Williamson coached football and basketball at Roseville, Mich., high school, producing an unbeaten eleven. In the spring of 1934, he accepted a position as assistant coach on the Yale football staff, serving there under Raymond "Ducky" Pond through 1940, and under Emerson "Spike" Nelson in 1941.

In June of 1942, he entered the Navy and put in a season of coaching under Potsy Clark at Pensacola, Fla., Navy base. His war-time service also included duties at the naval station in Sanford, Fla., the Gunnery school in Hollywood, Fla., the Cadet Selection board at Detroit, Mich., and the training carrier, USS Wolverine, Chicago.

After his discharge in 1945, he resumed his former football duties at Yale, this time assisting Howie Odell. He left there in 1947 to take over head coaching duties at Lafayette.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH MILTON BRUHN

WISCONSIN'S football fortunes rest in the capable guidance of Milt Bruhn, who is starting his fourth season as head coach, hoping to keep his Badgers on the winning path he and his staff of able assistants have established in the past two years.

The Badgers of 1958 followed up their successful 1957 campaign with a sparkling 7-1-1 record, good for second place in the Big Ten, and a 7th place ranking in the national polls, the best showing by a Wisconsin team in the national rankings since the 1942 team placed third.

The likeable Bruhn is the twenty-first coach to head up varsity football at Wisconsin since that sport was inaugurated in 1889 on the Madison campus. Bruhn realizes the big job that faces him in keeping the Badgers among the nation's football elite, and knows it will not be an easy task. He and his staff have again prepared diligently for the coming season, and are thoroughly familiar with the abilities of each of the squad members they will be working with in the 1959 season.

Under Bruhn, the Badgers feature the "finesse" attack on offense, operating off the straight-T formation, and use a rock-ribbed defense to contain the opponents. Only once in Bruhn's three previous years as head coach has an opponent tallied more than three touchdowns against his Badgers, that by Michigan State in a 33-0 game in his first year as coach in 1956.

The "finesse" attack is a simple one as far as assignments and techniques are concerned, and is basically a control offense, differing from offenses that try to just control the ball in that the Badgers go for the long gainer when the right situation presents itself. As an example, in 1957, the Badgers scored touchdowns from scrimmage on runs of 86, 80, 73, 69, 57, and 54 yards, all of them instrumental in deciding the games in which recorded in Wisconsin's favor.

The theory of the Wisconsin "finesse" attack, which is a composite of several types of offenses that have been used successfully by various college teams, is to make everything—passes and runs from scrimmage—look alike. An important part of the "finesse" attack is flexibility of the offensive formations, utilizing the "inside" and "outside" finesse attack, and supplementing them with special plays to take advantage of individual talent, and necessary to round out a complete offense. Above all, Bruhn stresses to each player that toughness is an integral part and a definite requirement in the "finesse" attack. They must be conditioned to play 60 minutes of rough, tough, aggressive football.

Bruhn, graduate of the University of Minnesota in 1936, was appointed head football coach at Wisconsin succeeding Ivan B. Williamson, when the latter moved up to the position of Athletic Director following the death of Guy Sundt. Bruhn, however, did not assume responsibilities until Jan. 1, 1956. He had been varsity line coach at Wisconsin since 1949.

Bruhn was born July 28, 1912, at St. Boni's, Minn., and attended Mound, Minn., high school where he won letters in both football and basketball. He enrolled at Minnesota in 1932, winning letters in both his favorite sports.

He was left guard on the Gopher elevens, winners of Big Ten Conference championships in 1934 and 1935 and also claimants of unbeaten records for those two seasons. Milt also was catcher on the baseball team which won the Big Ten championship in 1935 and he captained the team in his senior year.

FRED MARSH

Assistant Coach

Fred E. Marsh, graduate of Bowling Green University in 1933 with a B.S. degree in Education, was appointed as assistant coach on Feb. 14, 1956 by Milt Bruhn. Prior to that, Marsh had been coach of junior varsity and chief scout under Ivy Williamson since February of 1949.

Fred was born August 24, 1910 at Bowling Green, Ohio, and attended the same high school as Williamson. PAUL SHAW

Assistant Coach

Paul R. Shaw, graduate of Pittsburgh in 1938 and also holder of a master's degree in education at his alma mater in 1947, was appointed assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin in February, 1949.

Prior to that, Shaw had served in a similar capacity for three years at Lafayette College, the last two of which were under Ivy Williamson, and Shaw followed Ivy to Wisconsin when the latter took over the head coaching reins.

Shaw was born Nov. 3, 1914 at Bradford, Pa., starring in all sports at the high school there. At Pittsburgh, he played end on the Panther football teams of 1935, 1936, and 1937 coached by Jock Sutherland whose gridiron success was phenomenal during that era.

Following graduation, Shaw assisted in coaching at Hazelton, Pa., high school from 1938 through 1941, then entered the army Air Corps. He was a lieutenant from 1942 to his discharge in July, 1946.

He went to Lafayette College as end coach in September of 1946 and since then has been associated with both Williamson and Milt Bruhn, the present Wisconsin head coach.

Others who were rated highly in conference and midwest all-star selections included Gene Felker (1950), Bob Wilson (1949), Ron Locklin (1953), James Temp (1954), Dave Howard (1955), and Dave Kocourek (1958).

DERAL TETEAK

Assistant Coach

Deral Teteak, a 1953 University of Wisconsin graduate in physical education, was appointed assistant coach on March 6, 1958, moving up to the varsity to fill the vacancy created by the departure of Bob Odell. He served in 1957 as freshman coach.

Teteak, nicknamed "Little Bull", gained lasting fame in the memory of Wisconsin football fans as a member of the famed "Hard Rocks" of the 1951 season, starring as a linebacker on the defensive platoon. He was a regular in 1949, 1950, and 1951, and capped his senior year by being named to the All-Big Ten and All-Midwest honorary first team, and to a second team berth on the Chicago Tribune's All Player's All-American squad. His greatest collegiate football thrill occurred in the 1951 Pennsylvania-Wisconsin game when he scored a touchdown from his linebacker position on defense by recovering a Penn fumble in the end zone. Teteak played in the North-South Shrine game at Miami, Fla., following the 1951 season.

He enrolled at Wisconsin in 1947 after gaining All-State honors as a fullback at Oshkosh high school. His first high school rushing attempt netted 72 yards and a touchdown from the fullback position as a junior. He was a member of the North team in the second Wisconsin All-Star high school football game (continued on page 11)

Clark Van Galder, newest member of Wisconsin's football coaching staff, returns to familiar surroundings to embark on another phase of his interesting career.

Born on Feb. 6, 1911, at Janesville, Wisconsin, Clark graduated from Janesville High School in 1928, and from LaCrosse State in 1932, with a B.A. degree. He participated in football, basketball, baseball, and track in his high school and collegiate days.

His first coaching job was at South Milwaukee high school, from 1932 to 1938, enjoying good success in football, basketball, and track. His 1934 football team won the Milwaukee Suburban conference title, his 1937 and

1938 basketball teams made the state tournament, the former placing second in Class B to Beaver Dam, and his 1935 track team won the state Class B title.

He then moved to Racine Washington Park high school, staying ten years, winning the 1939 Big Eight conference football title, the 1943 State High School Basketball crown, and his cage teams won or tied for five Big Eight titles.

In 1948 he moved to his alma mater to coach football and basketball, winning state college football crowns in 1949, 1950, and 1951, and compiling a 31-5-1 mark. The lone tie came in the 1950 Cigar Bowl game against Missouri Valley, 6-6. His basketball teams won state collegiate titles in two of his four years at the helm.

He took over at Fresno State College, Fresno, California, in the autumn of 1952, and in seven years his teams won 44, lost 25, and had two tie games. His 1958 team won the California Collegiate Athletic Association football title with a 4-1 mark, though the season's record was 5-5.

Van Galder is married and has five sons, the oldest being Gary, a Stanford football star in 1956-57 at end, and he will enter an eastern medical school this autumn.

The new Badger assistant received his M.A. degree in education from the University of Southern California in 1952.

FRED JACOBY

Freshman Coach

A highly successful high school coach at Madison West high school, Fred Jacoby was appointed Wisconsin freshman coach on March 6, 1958. His appointment followed the naming of former Badger assistant coach, Bob Odell, as head coach at Bucknell University, and the promotion of Deral Teteak to the varsity staff.

Fred is a 1948 Ohio State graduate in Physical Education. He hails from Logan, Ohio, is 31 years old and married. He entered Ohio State with the intention of playing varsity football, but an injury sustained in his freshman year ended his playing days.

He has coached at Bremen, Ohio high school, Washington Court House, Ohio high school, and Madison West high school. His record at Bremen was 24-3 for three years, and at Washington Court House was 9-0 in his only season, 1952, at that school. Only his 1950 Bremen team did not win a championship.

Summer school study for his master's degree in Physical Education brought him to Wisconsin where he received the advanced degree in 1953. That same summer he was appointed to the head football coaching job at Madison West.

His five years at West produced the same success that marked his Ohio coaching career. A mediocre first season (1953) netted only three wins, five defeats, but in four ensuing seasons his teams won 27 of 32 games, winning one undisputed Big Eight conference title, sharing another, and finishing second the other two years. His 1957 team was the first unbeaten, untied team ever produced at West.

His combined record for nine years of high school coaching stands at 63 wins, 13 defeats.

Fred is in charge of recruiting for the Wisconsin staff, and devotes much hard work in attracting to Wisconsin boys of high calibre, both in playing the game of football, and in accomplishing the scholastic work necessary for being eligible at Wisconsin.



CO-CAPTAINS 5th TIME FOR BADGERS

The University of Wisconsin's football team will have co-captains for the second consecutive year when it takes the field in 1959. Co-Captains are two Illinois boys, Bob Zeman, Wheaton, Illinois right halfback, and Jerry Stalcup, Rockford, Ill., right guard.

Badger football teams have had co-captains only four times previous since the sport began in 1889, with the first time being in 1938 when Howard Weiss, fullback, and Vince Gavre, quarterback, were twin leaders. In 1942, Dave Schreiner, end, and Mark Hoskins, halfback, were the co-captains, while in 1953, Roger Dornburg, linebacker, and Jerry Wuhrmann, end, shared the job. Last year, Dave Kocourek, end, and Jon Hobbs, fullback, were the co-captains.

Each of the four previous co-captained teams produced winning marks in Big Ten and overall season play. The 1938 record was 5-3 (3-2); in 1942, 8-1-1 (4-1); in 1953, 6-2-1 (4-1-1), and 1958, 7-1-1 (5-1-1).

WISCONSIN FOOTBALL PROSPECTS FOR 1959

Wisconsin again looms as a team to be reckoned with for the 1959 Western Conference championship. The Badgers return 23 lettermen for the 1959 campaign, with sixteen of them seniors that gained their initial varsity "W" award with the 1957 team that surprised by finishing in a tie for fourth place in the Big Ten and followed up with a 1958 second place Big Ten finish.

The Badgers will have lettermen at each position—four at end, seven at tackle, four at guard, one at center, one at quarterback, and two each at wingback (right half), leftback (left half), and rightback (fullback).

And this could be a championship team! Badger fans well recall the 1951 'Hard Rocks' which posted a 7-1-1 season record, and the same 5-1-1 Big Ten record, placing third in the Big Ten (Purdue played two less games and lost its only game to Wisconsin) and eighth in the final national football polls. However, it was the 1952 team that gained a share of the conference title—Wisconsin's first football share since winning it outright in 1912—and played in the Rose Bowl on January 1, 1953.

Here it is 1959, the year following a season mark of 7-1-1, and a second place Big Ten record of 5-1-1 (the tie games in each season were against Ohio State) and the Badgers have to be reckoned with as a definite title threat. They could repeat 1952.

At end, four lettermen return—Jim Holmes, Henry Derleth, Jim Rogers, and Allan Schoonover. Holmes has won letters the past two seasons; Derleth, a junior, won a letter in 1958, and Rogers and Schoonover, both seniors, lettered in 1957, but failed to see enough action last year. Schoonover has the potential to become a fine end, especially with his speed, but he has yet to live up to his ability. End Coach Paul Shaw hopes to develop some depth in Chuck Vesel and Mike Stanki, both promising sophomores.

Seven lettermen are available for the tackle positions, though Head Coach Milt Bruhn will experiment with one of them—Charles Sprague—at a guard post in early autumn drills. Veterans Jim Heineke—a top notch All-American candidate—Lowell Jenkins, and Dan Lanphear all have won two varsity awards, and will carry the load here. Lanphear had a spectacular sophomore year, but an injury slowed him last season after mid-year. Jenkins missed part of 1957 with a wrist injury, but became a late season starter last year and should prove to be a valuable asset this year.

Backing them up are Terry Huxhold, a 1957 'Red-Shirt', who won a "W" award last season, and two 1957 letterwinners, John Allen and Karl Holzwarth. Sophomores Barry Armstrong, a 5-11, 260 pounder, and Brian Moore, figure to help if they develop fast enough.

Co-Captain Jerry Stalcup solves the problem at right guard, and will anchor the Badgers' five man line; an inspirational leader, he is a fiery competitor who rated second team All-American mention in 1958. Lettermen Ron Perkins and Gerald Kulcinski, both juniors, plus returned service man Pete Zouvas, a 1957 "W" winner, complete the returning guard quartet with experience. Perkins should be the regular left guard, with help from the veteran Charles Sprague, if his conversion from tackle works out,

and sophomores Don Schade and Dick Pauley. Schade is extremely quick and hard-charging; Pauley is being tried at guard after serving the freshman team as an end.

A problem arises at center where only Bob Nelson has ever seen game action, winning a junior varsity award in 1957, and a "W" last year. Sophomores John Gotta and Dick Wittig are the newcomers counted upon to give the Badgers depth and reliability at this position as the season progresses.

At quarterback, only the veteran Dale Hackbart is returning with experience, but he is a good one, perhaps the best Big Ten quarterback, and certainly a prime candidate for All-American honors. Hackbart is a good rusher and passer, a threat on punt returns, and a top notch defensive back—he led the Big Ten with five pass interceptions last year, and had seven for the year, setting a new school record in this category.

An injury prior to the start of spring drills did not allow highly touted sophomore Jim Bakken to display his full potential, but the coaching staff feels he can develop into a top grade quarterback and will make his presence felt as the season progresses.

At the other three backfield posts, the Badgers have lettermen two deep available, and sophomores with ability standing ready behind them to take over—provided they blossom forth ready for Big Ten football. Wingbacks (right half) Bob Altmann and Co-Captain Bob Zeman, rightbacks (fullbacks) Ed Hart and Tom Wiesner, and leftbacks (left half) Ronald Steiner and Billy Hobbs. All are seniors and have lettered twice with the exception of Wiesner, a junior who won a major award in his sophomore season.

Main problems stemming from the loss of ten lettermen from the 1958 team include finding a pair of ends to match the consistency of Dave Kocourek and Earl Hill, and to develop linebackers to match the brilliancy of Dick Teteak and Jon Hobbs, who performed so well in their final season that their teammates voted them co-Most Valuable Players—unprecedented in Badger football history.

Defense was Wisconsin's trump card in 1958, and Coach Bruhn figures it will be the defense that will carry the Badgers again in 1959. That phase of the game will be stressed in the early autumn drills, with the emphasis on developing good, consistent linebackers.

Stanford: Indians Feature Aerial Circus

A new gridiron rivalry has its inauguration at Madison as Stanford's Indians meet Wisconsin's Badgers in the season's opening game for the latter. The Indians open a week earlier against Oregon at home. Stanford, in Coach 'Cactus Jack' Curtice's second

season, will depend greatly on its air arm, meaning the passing arm of quarterback Dick Norman, the second leading passer in the Pacific Coast conference last au-

tumn—behind teammate Bob Nicolet—and the eighth leading thrower in national averages.

Norman and Nicolet filled the air with 279 passes between them last season, completing 153 of them for 1,441 yards and six touchdowns, in ten games. The Indians were able to rank seventh in forward pass offense in the nation, averaging 158 yards per game in that phase of offense. Stanford topped the Pacific Coast in 1958 in forward passing, had the top two passers, and the top two pass receivers in the league. Norman hit on 57 per cent of his 133 attempted passes, good for 717 yards, and three tallies.

Curtice faces a big rebuilding job in the face of losing seventeen lettermen, including seven regulars. The entire starting interior line—from tackle to tackle—was graduated last spring.

The Indians have a great pair of pass catching ends returning in Captain-elect Chris Burford, who ranked third in the nation in pass receiving last year with 45 catches for 493 yards and 2 touchdowns, and Irv Nikolai, the seventh best receiver in the country on 32 catches for 343 yards, but no scores.

Other returning regulars include right halfback John Bond, left halfbacks Rick McMillen and Skip

Face—they shared the starting assignments here—and Norman. The latter started out as Stanford's regular quarterback last year, slumped off in mid-season, giving way to senior Nicolet, then coming back strong to pace the Indians to a near-upset over PCC champion California, losing 16-15, in the season's finale.

Other letter winners who will be on hand are: Dean Hinshaw, tackle; Ron Ferrandes, Larry Lacey, and Gary Pike, guards; Doug Purcell, center; Sid Garber, quarterback; Dick Bowers, halfback; and Gil Dowd, fullback. In addition, three men who lettered in 1957, but were sidelined by injuries or illness last season will be available—Ben Robinson, end; Phil Burkland, tackle; and John Thomas, center.

Several youngsters from the fair 1958 freshman squad are expected to help, including Dave Nolan and Tom Walsh, guards; Chris Cottle, center; Gary Craig and Hal Steuber, backs.

Greatest problems facing Curtice are the rebuilding of the Redskin line, development of reserves, and discovering some backfield speed. The Indians' chief offensive threat, of course, will be the forward pass and Stanford doubtless will present another wide open and spectacular attack.

Marquette: Warriors to Bounce Back Under Blackbourn?

Coach Lisle Blackbourn returned to Marquette last winter as head football coach following a five year absence for a tour in the pro and small college ranks.

With the return of Blackbourn to Marquette, it is hoped that the likeable Warrior coach can bring a

return to winning ways again—a feat that has not been accomplished since he last turned the trick with a 6-3-1 record in 1953.

Purdue: Solid Defense—Rose Bowl Ahead?

Purdue retains 23 holdover major lettermen from last fall's balanced combination which wound up the season with an impressive record of six victories, two ties, and a single loss, but Coach Jack Mollenkopf is still faced with some real replacement problems.

The Boilermakers, who ranked second nationally in total defense last fall when they topped the Big Ten in the same department, are expected to stick to the same alternate two-way unit system of substitution employed so successfully by Mollenkopf during the 1958 campaign.

Mollenkopf inherits a strong contingent of sophomores, with a dozen or so recruited from Ohio high schools. If he can come up with a sparkplug running halfback, to join with the talents of fullback Jarus, the Boilermakers may finally gain that coveted trip to the Rose Bowl.

Iowa: Hawkeyes Strong Again Despite Loss of Veterans

Another strong offensive football team is in prospect at the University of Iowa, built around 18 returning lettermen and some promising sophomores.

However, losses by graduation and ineligibility have sapped some strength, both in the backfield and

in interior line positions, and new men, or veterans who were reserves last fall, must develop fast to help out.

Iowa's strongest points will be ends, led by All-American Curt Merz and Co-Captain Don Norton; speed at the halfbacks with good breakaway ability; and power and speed at fullback. The center spot also is strong.

The Hawkeyes must develop tackles and guards and also reserve strength to go along with the starters. Both regular tackles and guards from the 1958 Big Ten championship are gone.

Quarterback is a key worry spot. All-American Randy Duncan, who set many Iowa passing records, is graduated and his No. 2 replacement, Mitchell Ogle, has signed a professional contract.

Therefore, the quarterbacking must be handled by letterman Olen Treadway, who actually has played little in two seasons; and sophomores Edward Trancygier and Wilburn Hollis.

Another backfield complication is the loss of right halfback Willie Fleming, an all-conference man, by ineligibility. Fleming, although not a usual starter, averaged 7.1 yards per carry, led scorers and scored on five long runs. His Big Ten average of 8.8 yards per carry was a new league mark.

Returning starters from the 1958 title team and Rose Bowl winner are: Curt Merz and Co-Captain Don Norton, ends; Bill Lapham, center; Bob Jeter, left halfback; Co-Captain Ray Jauch, right halfback; and Don Horn, fullback. However, Horn's definite availability will not be known until summer session ends in early August.

Jeff Langston and Al Miller are top replacements at ends. Three major lettermen are available at tackles: John Sawin, Charles Lee and Bob Hain. Don Shipanik and Gerry Novack have experience at guards, along with Mark Manders. Lloyd Humphreys is a center close to Lapham.

At left halfback the sole letterman is Bob Jeter, but he is a good one. Jeter averaged 7.2 yards on 65 carries last fall, caught 8 passes for 117 yards and two touchdowns and in the Rose Bowl win over California he set records for total rushing yards, longest touchdown run, and average yards per carry. He was named the outstanding player in the Rose Bowl and last spring won the Iowa coaches' award for attitude, attendance and hard work.

Co-Captain Ray Jauch is a fine right halfback who was Iowa's No. 1 rushing gainer last fall, average of 6.8, total of 524 yards. He also led Iowa in punt and kickoff returns.

Averager of 3.9 yards per carry last fall, Horn is a hard-driving fullback. John Brown, the Big Ten 440-yard outdoor champion, also is a letterman at that position.

Graduation took Gene Cherney and Bob Henderson, team's top two centers last season, but Eliot hopes that Dave Ash, a converted guard, or sophomores Stan Yukeyich, Tony Parrilli, or Bob Mountz can handle the position.

Illinois' halfback corps should provide more break-away threat than the 1958 team had. Marshall Starks, leading ground gainer last year, returns as do veterans Doug Wallace and Dejustice Coleman and reserve halfback Joe Krakowski, who showed flashes of brilliance last year when he wasn't injured. Newcomers Johnny Counts, who may be one of the Big Ten's fastest, and Ethan Blackaby seem to have break-away ability.

Illini will have few worries at fullback if the brother combination of Jim and Bill Brown remains healthy. Both lettered last year as they shared the position.

Quarterbacking should be steady, with three lettermen, John Easterbrook, Bob Hickey, and Russ Martin available. Mel Meyers, a sophomore who runs and passes well, could see more action as the season progresses.

Minnesota: Warmath Faces Tremendous Rebuilding Task

Minnesota suffered through its worst Big Ten season since 1945 and its worst overall season record since 1950 when it won just one football game—that a resounding 39-12 romp over Michigan State—in compiling a 1-6 conference record and losing two non-

conference games by narrow margins to Washington, 24-21, and Pittsburgh, 13-7.

To top off such a season, the Gophers lost eight so-called 'regulars'

among the eleven non-returning lettermen. Only regulars returning include guard Tom Brown, right halfback Bill Kauth, and fullback Roger Hagberg.

Thus as Coach Murray Warmath prepares for his sixth season at the Minnesota football helm he faces a major replacement problem, particularly in the line from which six of the seven senior "iron men" who did such a heroic job last season will be missing. They are ends Perry Gehring and Ken Schultz; tackles Gerald Wallin and Norm Sixta; guard Ev Gerths; Capt. Mike Svendsen, All-Conference center.

This fall the 1958 freshman crop will play a more important role than any yearling group at Minnesota in many years because major replacements, particularly at end, tackle, center, and quarterback must come from these newcomers.

Key veterans upon whom Coach Warmath will be counting are Captain Mike Wright, tackle; Tom Brown and Jerry Shetler, guards; Greg Larson, center; Bill Kauth and Arlie Bomstad, halfbacks; and Roger Hagberg and Jim Rogers, fullbacks.

Indications are that the Gophers will have a little better over-all speed than in 1958, and will "open up" somewhat on offense because of expected improvement in passing and receiving.

Badger football fans can attest to this opening up of the Gopher offense from last year's game with Minnesota when quarterback Larry Johnson

opened up in the second half and completed nine of 18 passes for 175 yards, one a 77 yard pass play to end Dick Johnson for a touchdown. Johnson also hit end Tom Moe three times for 53 yards in a fourth quarter 90 yard march that gave Minnesota its final score.

At this early date and on paper it appears that the best fortified positions talent-wise will be END where newcomers Tom Hall, Jim Wheeler, Ed Kelly, and Ted Rude will press lettermen Tom Moe, Jerry Friend, and Dick Johnson for starting assignments; and FULLBACK where sophs Tom Wagner and Ken Wold will supplement three junior lettermen—Roger Hagberg, Jim Rogers, and Tom Robbins.








Wisconsin's 1958-59 athletic school year was highlighted by the performances of the athletes pictured on this page.
