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The Board has discontinued the publication of the proceedings of the Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture in Annual Convention in connection with the Annual Report of the Board, in order that the several papers presented might be published in pamphlet form for immediate distribution.

## SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT

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To His Excellency, the Governor, and Members of the Wisconsin State Board of Agriculture:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit, herewith, my report as Secretary of the State Board of Agriculture covering the fiscal year ending January 31st, 1914.

The Crop Statistics gathered and compiled in this office during the past season would indicate that never in the history of the State have crops been more abundant nor prices, as a rule, better. Government reports confirm this statement. Their figures show that Wisconsin is not only the Greatest Dairy State, but that the yield per acre of nearly all farm crops equal or exceed the yield reported from other states. Greater interest among those interested in securing land for agricultural purposes is shown in the increased demand for the Crop Reports published monthly by this Board. The demand for copies of the last Report issued in 1913 exceed the demand of one year ago by over seven thousand copies. With ten million acres of rich agricultural lands awaiting development in the Northern Section of Wisconsin, this Board can lend valuable aid in attracting those interested in securing agricultural lands, through furnishing reliable crop statistics, and I would recommend that this work be extended and improved. In corresponding with the Boards of Agriculture in various states that are doing work along this line, we find that the average expense for collecting and compiling the statistics for their monthly Crop Reports averages approximately eight hundred dollars annually. I merely call your attention to this fact in order that you may compare their expense with the expense of collecting and compiling the statistics in this office.

The 1913 State Fair proved the greatest in the history of the State in the number and quality of its exhibits, and it is to be regretted that the Board was compelled to meet with a deficit at the end of the year. This is accounted for by reason of the fact that the Board was required to meet numerous bills for permanent and temporary improvements and equipment. The Legislature passed a bill in the latter days of the 1913 Session, repealing former acts appropriating money for specific purposes on the grounds, wherein the balances remaining in the several special funds were remitted to the General Fund, thereby requiring the Board to meet all of these extraordinary expenses from the State Fair

receipts. A recent opinion from the Attorney-General holds that the Board is liable for contracts entered into for material and labor during the period previous to July 31st, the date on which this particular law went into effect, for the reasons that such appropriations were available only to meet such obligations as mature within the fiscal period for which they are voted.

The Board also voted an increased amount for premiums and special attractions and per diem paid to clerks holding responsible positions in various departments. The amount paid for premiums in 1913 exceed the amount paid in 1912 by the sum of \$5,000, and the increased amount paid for attractions approximately the same amount. The attractions furnished for evening entertainment, the illumination of the Grand Stand, track, and in-field, cost several hundred dollars more than was received through increased sale of tickets at the gates, and I would recommend that the Board discontinue night entertainments at the State Fair.

The Legislature of 1913 made an appropriation of \$255,000.00 for improvements upon the Grounds. The money appropriated, however, is not available at this time to meet much needed improvements and will not be available until the Board is in a position to file with the Secretary of State and the State Treasurer a statement that Milwaukee county has conveyed, granted, or donated in a manner authorized by Sub-section (9-t) of Section 669, to the State of Wisconsin, lands which in the judgment of the Board are sufficient in amount, suitable in location, and otherwise satisfactory for State Fair purposes, etc. It is further provided that the \$25,000.00 appropriated for sanitation and sewage and \$10,000.00 for repair and construction of fences is available immediately upon filing of such certificate; \$75,000.00 for construction of grand stand is available eight months after filing of such certificate; \$20,000.00 for the construction of Poultry Building, \$75,000.00 to complete the construction of the Grand Stand, and \$50,000 for the construction of a Woman's and Art Building, is available twenty months after such filing.

The attendance at the 1913 State Fair for the six days was 118,288. Heavy rains throughout the southern and south-western part of the state on Wednesday and a continuous downpour of rain on Thursday precluded several thousand people from attending the Fair. Regardless of weather conditions during the 1913 Fair, the attendance for the first five days of the Fair was 3,521 greater than the attendance at the 1912 Fair, with almost perfect weather conditions. This would indicate that greater interest is shown in the Wisconsin State Fair, and with the hearty coöperation of the people of Milwaukee and the assured assistance and coöperation on the part of the members of the Association of Wisconsin Fairs and the business and farming interests of Northern Wisconsin, by redoubling our efforts, the Wisconsin State Fair can be placed in a position second to none in the way of attendance and exhibits.

You will note from the attached sheets, showing receipts by departments, that there was a small increase in gate receipts over the previous two years, while there is a falling off in the grand stand receipts; \$2,500 was lost from this source of revenue by reason of the heavy rains on Thursday. The increased receipts from concessions is accounted for by reason of increased receipts from space in Machinery Hall over previous years. The receipts from rentals of stalls and Grounds is notably less than for the previous two years. To the amount of this year's receipts, however, should be added the amount of \$126.30, as this amount was received on January 30th for deposit with the State Treasurer, but he having closed his books for the month, was unable to receive same, so that this amount will be credited to the Grounds receipts for the year 1914. The increased amounts received from this source the previous two years were for rental of Grounds for aeroplane flights, automobile races, etc.

The total receipts for the year were \$120,694.32, balance on hand January 31st, 1913, \$617.26, making a total of \$121,311.58. The total disbursements were \$121,673.30, making an overdraft of \$361.72. Bills Payable \$8,289.21; Bills Receivable \$4,933.33, showing a deficit of \$3,717.60.

At the close of the 1913 State Fair the Mayor of Milwaukee gave an interview to the Press, wherein he criticised the officers of the Board severely for allowing exhibits to leave the Grounds as early as Thursday of the week of the State Fair, after the officers had agreed to compel all exhibits to remain on the Grounds until 6 o'clock P. M. Friday. This statement was absolutely at variance with the facts. No exhibitor was even allowed to take down or pack his exhibit until the hour agreed upon, and not an exhibit was removed from the Grounds until 6:00 P. M. Friday, with the exception of one stable of horses, the owner having satisfied the officers of the Board that it was necessary for him to load at 5:15 P. M. on Friday, in order to make train connections to his home in Iowa. By reason of these newspaper criticisms, the Citizens' Business League of Milwaukee deemed it advisable to call a meeting of those interested in the State Fair, for the purpose of discussing ways and means of improving the Fair and offering such advice and suggestions as would be of service to the State Board of Agriculture. This meeting was called at the Plankinton House in Milwaukee on September 29th, and the State Board of Agriculture invited to attend. Many valuable suggestions were offered that will no doubt be of benefit to this Board, but it was very evident, however, that many of the speakers were not very familiar with the activities of the Board. One of the speakers in particular called the Board's attention to the fact that there were approximately 400 newspapers in Wisconsin, outside the City of Milwaukee, and it might be advisable for the Board to get a little publicity through these newspapers by paying to each of them a small sum of money. It is only too evident that this gentleman was not familiar with the facts, as the Board paid to 370 newspapers out-

side of Milwaukee County sums ranging from \$3.00 to \$17.50 each, for carrying State Fair publicity matter from July 8th to September 8th, 1913. These papers gave 38,960 inches of publicity boosting the Fair. Another one of the speakers compared the attendance of the Wisconsin State Fair with other State Fairs, speaking particularly of the Illinois and Texas State Fairs. We found upon investigation that the railroads of Illinois and Texas coöperate with the State Fair officials of these two states in bringing out a large attendance from throughout their respective states by offering reduced railroad rates and numerous special trains, and further, all trains run direct from and to the Grounds. If the Railroads of Wisconsin could be induced to give the same coöperation to this Board, there is no doubt but what the attendance at the Wisconsin State Fair would be materially increased. The business men and commercial clubs of Springfield and Dallas unite in their efforts to secure the very best transportation facilities for their State Fair, and through their hearty coöperation with the State Fair Managers, get results. If the business men of Milwaukee will only coöperate with this Board in seeking better transportation facilities for the Wisconsin State Fair, there is no doubt in my mind that the railroads of Wisconsin can be induced to grant us the same privileges as are granted the State Fairs of other States.

The President and Secretary of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association were among those who voiced their sentiments in favor of putting forth every effort to aid the Wisconsin State Fair. Both gentlemen offered some valuable suggestions and advise, but subsequent to said meeting it seems that the M. & M. Association has come to the conclusion that the Wisconsin State Fair is of no benefit whatever to Milwaukee, the President of the Association declaring that they were tired of being the "angel" for the Fair, and that they had already contributed the sum of \$30,000 for its support. I made a thorough investigation of the records in the office and I am unable to find any record of any contributions by this Association, but the records do show that in the past four years they disposed of State Fair tickets to the amount of \$5,964.00.

The position was taken by the Merchants & Manufacturers' Association, in a report published in Milwaukee papers on January 15th, that the Fair is of little commercial value to Milwaukee excepting that it yields some patronage to the hotels and restaurants for a few days, but that it has not increased the sales of the local business houses to any perceptible degree, nor have the manufacturers and jobbers been benefited by the Fair, and that the observance of Milwaukee Day has proven detrimental rather than beneficial to them, etc. Your representatives some weeks prior to the action of the M. & M. Association on January 14, had asked the officials of said Association to consider the State Fair matter a closed deal so far as their Association was concerned, and had opened negotiations with the Citizen's Business League, an organization of business men of Milwaukee who have at all times

stood by the Fair and never lost sight of an opportunity to boost it. A statement of this character coming from so large and influential a body as the M. & M. Association is surprising indeed. For many years the Fair has been self-supporting aside from the appropriations made by the Legislature from time to time for improvements on the Grounds, and the annual state aid to cover a part of the operating expenses. Several of the counties throughout the State have recognized the benefit of the State Fair to the people of the State, and have coöperated with the Board in bringing out large displays of the products of their counties, the Boards of Supervisors of these counties making liberal appropriations to cover the expense of collecting and placing very attractive and educational exhibits.

The Hotel Men's Association took exceptions to the action of the M. & M. Association, and as further proof of their confidence in the State Fair making good, raised a guaranty fund to the amount of \$15,000 to promote the 1914 State Fair, offering to increase the amount if necessary. The Citizen's Business League also offered to increase the amount, if needed. There is no question but what this Board will receive stronger support from the business interests of Milwaukee in the future than they have at any time in the past.

I believe that this Board has no desire to impose any burdens on the M. & M. Association, and the further fact that the Citizen's Business League has always been ready and willing to boost the Wisconsin State Fair and assist this Board in every way possible, I would recommend that the State Fair tickets printed and sold as the M. & M. Tickets, heretofore, be changed to Citizen's Business League Tickets and the Citizen's Business League intrusted with the sale of said tickets.

Ten thousand copies of the general premium list of the 1913 Fair were issued and distributed among the live stock breeders, agriculturists and horticulturists of the State, 2,500 copies more than were ever sent out by this Board heretofore. The results speak for themselves. The 1913 Fair secured, and I believe almost wholly by reason of the activities along this line, 145 more exhibitors at the 1913 Fair than we had the previous year. The number of exhibits in nearly all departments increased from 10 per cent to over 100 per cent. The number of Horses exhibited were not as numerous, but the quality was greatly improved. The Cattle show was much stronger than the year 1912, the dairy type predominating. The Sheep classes were likewise well represented, and with further effort can be made much stronger. A much larger showing of Swine was made at the 1913 Wisconsin State Fair than the showing heretofore. The Poultry Department was crowded to its limits, and it is to be regretted that the Board is not in a position to furnish much better housing facilities for this class of exhibits. I would recommend to this Board that the exhibitors in the Poultry Department be limited to 50 birds each, and that many of the so-called fancy breeds be stricken from the premium list and the money added to the more popular breeds by extending the premiums in these

classes. An effort should be made to bring out a stronger exhibit in the Agricultural Department. No state in the Union is in a position to make a showing equal to that of Wisconsin. This Department is also handicapped by not having a proper building in which to display the products of the soil. Over 100 per cent increase was made in the County Exhibit Department at the 1913 Fair, and the several counties making up the exhibit are to be commended for the high quality of the products shown and the artistic manner in which they were displayed. The County Exhibit Building should be given over entirely to this exhibit, and as soon as possible, addition made to the building or a new building furnished, so that all of the County Exhibits can be shown under one roof. The Bee and Honey exhibit proved to be one of the best ever shown at the State Fair. The Live Bee demonstration in itself proved to be one of the leading attractions. Never in the history of the State was there such a splendid showing made of the horticultural and floricultural products. The State Horticultural Society is to be commended for the coöperation and earnest endeavor to make this department one worthy of the name. The Dairy Department was fully up to the standard of previous years by way of exhibits of butter and cheese, and the dairy appliances shown far exceeded that of any previous year, filling every inch of available space in the building. The demand for Wisconsin dairy products extends to every part of the Union. Since the close of the 1913 Fair this office has furnished hundreds of copies of the lists of exhibitors of butter and cheese at the State Fair to parties throughout the country who are desirous of getting in communication with the manufacturers of these products. Farm machinery, implements, vehicles, etc. occupied practically every foot of space set aside for such exhibits at the 1913 State Fair. It proved to be the largest single and most attractive exhibit of the Fair. The Wisconsin State Fair is sadly in need of a Liberal Arts Building. Applications for space in such a building were received by the Secretary from numerous manufacturers, and a building of large dimensions could readily have been filled to overflowing. It is hoped that the Legislature will see the great need of such a building and make a liberal appropriation therefor. The exhibit of Automobiles, Motorcycles, and Automobile parts in Machinery Hall was another exhibit that proved most interesting to State Fair visitors, Machinery Hall being crowded at all hours of the day and night with people interested in the several displays made therein. The exhibit in the Fine Arts Department was of much higher quality than that of previous years. The buildings for Woman's Work and Art are in a deplorable condition, and while, as heretofore stated, an appropriation of \$50,000 was made for the erection of a building to house these exhibits, the money is not at this time available. We sincerely hope that arrangements can be made whereby a building will be erected within a short time. The Educational Department, as usual, brought out a splendid showing of the work being accomplished in the schools throughout the state. The present building is inadequate for

properly displaying the exhibits, and, as suggested by Judge Williams of Milwaukee, I would recommend, that the Board authorize the Superintendent of this Building to secure the services of an educator who could explain the various exhibits to the people, visiting the building. The Spelling Contest that was inaugurated at the 1913 State Fair, while started late in the season, proved to be very successful. Twenty-six contestants representing twenty-six different counties met at State Fair Park for an old-fashioned spell down. The successful contestant, Miss Mildred Gutweiler, of Grant county, was awarded the Gold Medal as Champion Speller of Wisconsin. The Board authorized the Secretary to continue this Contest at the 1914 Fair, and copies of the rules and regulations together with a list of the words to be used in said Contest have at this time been placed in the hands of the teachers in about sixty counties. The indications are that nearly every county in the state will be represented in the Spelling Contest for the 1914 State Fair. This feature of the State Fair work is to be highly commended, and I would recommend that the contests be extended in coming years to include mathematical, declamatory, judging contests, etc.

A complete and satisfactory record of the Woman's Rest and Hospital during the Fair is filed in the office. The Superintendent in charge made an exhaustive and detailed report showing a complete checking system. The Rest Room and Hospital not only was self-sustaining, but showed a surplus on the right side of the ledger to the amount of \$12.72. Dr. Newmann, the Official Physician, proved very efficient and was on the job day and night.

With a splendid track and the best of stabling facilities for both winter and summer, pasture unexcelled, the State Fair Park at West Allis should be the headquarters of many of the leading trainers of this country. A Superintendent of Speed with a wide acquaintance among the horsemen and the support of the Board would undoubtedly solve this problem.

The expense of the Public Safety Department was considerably more than I anticipated when recommending that a Company of the State Guard be secured to police the Grounds in place of a Marshal's force selected from civilians throughout the state. The full force of men was employed, however, for six days in 1913 as against five days in 1911 and 1912, at the additional expense of approximately \$300.00.

The Board has been severely criticised for the shows that were allowed to operate upon the Grounds at the 1913 Fair. This can be avoided if the Superintendent of Concessions is careful in selecting his shows. The State Fair Park is no place for gypsy fortune tellers, snake eaters, monstrosities, and such alleged attractions. I believe it possible to secure high class animal acts and other clean attractions for the State Fair. There is no question but what the State Fair attractions can be made clean and kept clean. I would not, for a moment, advise the elimination of all attractions, and in this connection I might quote from the address of Dewitt C. Wing on "The Mission of State

*and writer of "Bruder Bayette"*

Fairs" (and in my judgment there is no higher authority on State Fairs) as follows:

"In the future the state fairs must be increasingly instructive, inspirational and entertaining. My own emphasis would be on the last two words, for the two things that inspire and entertain, inevitably educate. Moreover, our emotions, no less than our minds, need cultivation. We crave more play and amusement than we give."

The publicity work for the 1913 State Fair was placed in the hands of the Secretary, and with the consent of the Board, the services of Mr. Frank Cleveland, a man who had been connected for several years with Milwaukee newspapers, was secured to take charge of the work under the direction of the Secretary. An advertising campaign was started early in the season, and as heretofore stated, 370 newspapers, outside of the city of Milwaukee, for several weeks prior to the opening of the Fair, carried from one to three columns each of State Fair matter. The entire Press of the State, including the Agricultural Press, is to be commended for their generous support. In addition to the newspaper publicity, your Secretary followed the usual custom of billboard advertising and banner tacking. We have on file in the office a most complete record of this work showing the location of every billboard and the number of sheets posted, and the location of every banner tacked throughout the entire state. The expense for billboard and banner advertising was kept within the amount appropriated by the Board. The amount paid for billposting, banner tacking, and the material for same, was \$4,507.20; the amount paid for newspaper advertising \$4,670.56. Two or three bills outstanding will bring the cost of billposting and banner tacking up to approximately \$5,000, and a like amount for the newspapers. After as complete an investigation of the State Fair publicity as it was possible for me to make, I have come to the conclusion that a large percentage of the money expended for billboard advertising is thrown away. I would therefore recommend that this Board make no appropriation for billboard advertising, but instead that the full sum appropriated heretofore for both newspapers and billboard advertising be used in securing publicity through the Press of the State. A limited amount of the appropriation could be used by the Board in issuing from time to time during the year, a paper along the same lines as is issued by a great number of the managers of State Fairs throughout the country. The cost of printing 45,000 copies of "Greater Iowa," averaging eight pages each, for the year 1913 was \$364.40.

A motion picture film was secured of the recent State Fair and numerous photographs of the agricultural, live stock and horticultural displays. There is no question but what the moving picture houses would be only too glad to show this film in their theaters and pay all express charges in transporting same from city to city. In addition to showing the motion picture films in the cities and villages, I would recommend that slides be obtained from the photographs of other exhibits

at the Fair, an operator secured for exhibiting the motion pictures and slides in a number of the town halls and schoolhouses in the country districts throughout the state free of charge. I believe this can be done at very little expense and will prove to be one of the best and cheapest methods of publicity for the State Fair.

I would further recommend that so far as possible the superintendents of the various departments of the State Fair be selected from among the officers of County Fairs holding membership in the Association of Wisconsin Fairs.

The expense of wiring and illuminating the Grounds for the 1913 Fair was materially increased, the Board being compelled to install additional wiring to the amount of \$852.43. Heretofore, it has been the custom of the Electric company to string the wires and remove them each year, which entailed a heavy expense on the Board. At the close of the 1913 Fair the Electric company was instructed not to remove any wires excepting those running to the North East Gate. The expense of wiring for the 1914 Fair should show a considerable decrease over that of 1913.

It has been suggested that it might be well to hold the Fair for more than six days. If it is decided that this is advisable, it would necessitate holding the Fair over Sunday. In that case a first-class musical program could be arranged and a speaker of national reputation secured for the entertainment of the patrons. It would of course be entirely out of the question to include horse racing and open shows.

The Board made no mistake in securing the services of Mr. M. J. Sweeney for Custodian and Superintendent of Grounds. The buildings and grounds are in as fine a condition as it is possible to place them with the limited funds at his command. The fence is in a deplorable condition and should be replaced with a new iron fence as soon as available funds can be secured. Mr. Sweeney has filed in this office a complete inventory of all personal property upon the grounds.

An effort has been made by your Secretary and his associates in the office to install a more complete system of accounting, and we believe the system now in use to be most complete and practical for the requirements. A thorough filing and card index system has been established. This has taken considerable time and study, but I believe the time well spent, as a complete record is made of every transaction, the same being properly indexed and filed. Mr. Kalbus has in addition to giving such of his time as was needed for State Fair work, compiled all of the crop statistics and assisted in improving and extending this work. He has also prepared a most complete mailing list covering the names of over ten thousand farmers in Wisconsin. The work in the office was handicapped by reason of being compelled to move all of the office effects into temporary quarters three times during the year. Office correspondence has increased thirty per cent over the past year.

In conclusion we desire to thank each and every member of the Board for the assistance and hearty coöperation throughout the year.

It will be necessary to amend the Law and provide a penalty where the assessors fail in their duties in collecting and reporting these statistics. While the present Law provides that the grain and live stock statistics shall be filed with the Secretary of the Board of Agriculture on or before August 15th of each year, it is usually six to eight months later before we are able to get all of these reports on file.
