This startling mortality, due to the terrific struggle that goes on in a forest for light and water would certainly provide us with Christmas trees, provided that careful fores tation, and intelligent thinning out of the trees that
will die anyway and leaving only the healthiest trees, will insure for our forests a healthy future.
This, then, is the real solution of the problem and a measure such as was proposed at the recent conproducts, which suggested the passing of a federal law against the sale of Christmas trees, would not only take away one of the best loved symbols Christmas, but would be a great waste. For what use are these small pines which will die if they are
not thinned out, if they are not used as Christmas

## JAZZ AND ART

Jazz music has a new champion in no less a personage than Otto H. Kahn. In a recent address, which naturally caused a good deal of comment, Mr. Kahn said: "While it is easy to deride jazz, any movement, which in its rhythm and in other respects, bears so obviously the American imprint, which has divulged new instrumental colors and values, which
has taken so firm a footing in our own country, aroused so much attention abroad, and is an object of such great interest to foreign musicians
visiting here-any such movement has a right to be taken seriously." This tribute was qualified when Mr. Kahn said that jazz was "a

## ously alive."

This estimate of jazz comes from a man whose opinions will probably carry more weight than even those of a professor of music, as he is a musical
connoisseur as well as a munificent and outstanding patron of the opera. Mr. Kahn believes, however, that jazz has a future, that is if it tends towards the higher levels which it has sometimes reached. The
Springfield Republican, which dealt with this probem recently, points out that the greatest point in favor of jazz is the fact that it can be well presented by a comparatively small group of musicians and has terrible performances of the former orchestras, which were too smail for their duties.
All these comments on jazz are unusually favorable, as most criticisms of jazz are usually adverse
rather than favorable. Mr. Kahn, when he spoke of "new instrumental colors and values," made a very
good point. The "doubling", that is, the playing of more than one instrument by a player, which is so common today, especially with saxophone and cornet modern dance. The "new instrumental values" refer duced by the brass section by means of mutes, tin cans, and derbies. All these things are modern; they probably shall not last, but who knows to what they its infancy, and no one knows what will result

The jazz band is a departure from the usual con cert band in that it eliminates all stringed instruinstead. The piano has come to the front, sharing honors with the trombones and saxophones, without which no jazz band of today can exist. dance today could exist without it. Certainly a muic critic and lover of Mr. Kahn's calibre would not have placed jazz with art, had he not good reason to do so. Mr. Kahn, knowing music as he does, would not have expressed such hope for its future had he
not given the matter due consideration. Now the question is, will jazz climb to the higher levels of which it is capable and thus insure itself a future, or will it tend towards a "depraved noise"? Jazz, even
though Mr. Kahn be too hopeful, will have a future well worth watching whether it survives or perishes.

Colleges of Agriculture and Engineering Have Decrease in Numbers

The university enrollment figures for this fall show that there has been a continued increase in the enrollment of the College of Letters and Science, while the College of Ag Engineering and the College 48 rericulture ha
spectively.
The College of Letters and Scienee has an enrollment of 5,574
students as compared with 5,458 last year. The new total includes 3,037 men and 2,537 women, just 500 more men than fellows, 19 scholars, 544 graduate students, 890 seniors, 1,088 juniors, 1,262 sophomores and 46 special students. In the Medical school there are 5 students, including last year The School of Music lays claim to 88 students, approximaelical school. the number in the Medical schoo. are women and nine are men.
The Graduate school shows an increase of 85 this year, giving a to-
tal of 788 students, of which 235 are women and 553 are men. Their distribution among the various colleges shows Letters and Science A griculture second, with 156 ; and the College of Engineering third with 41 .
The present enrollment of the Cluding of engineering is 1,032 , clading o fellows, 1 scholar, 37 256 sophomores, 329 freshmen, and special students.
The enrollment in the College of Agriculture shows 39 more men than women, 364 men and 325 women, making a total of 689 students, 138 graduates, 130 seniors 131 138 graduates, 130 seniors, 131
