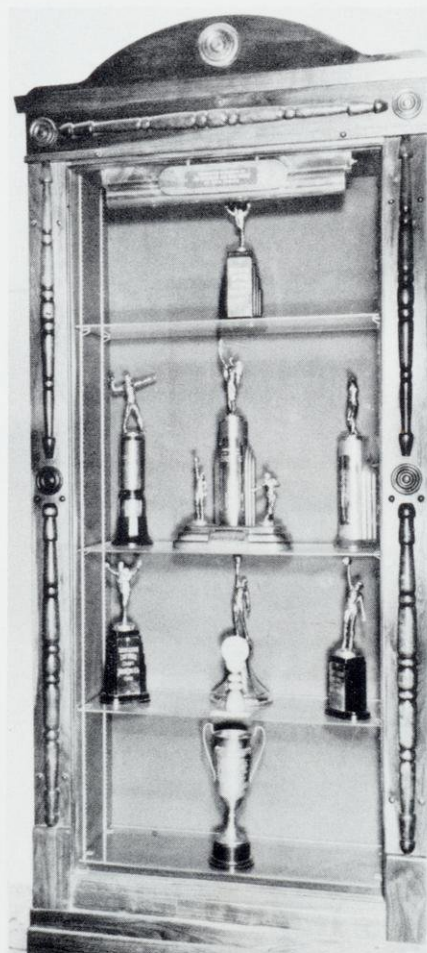
The faculty of Waterford High School chose Janet because she exemplified the character traits of leadership, patriotism, dependability, and service.

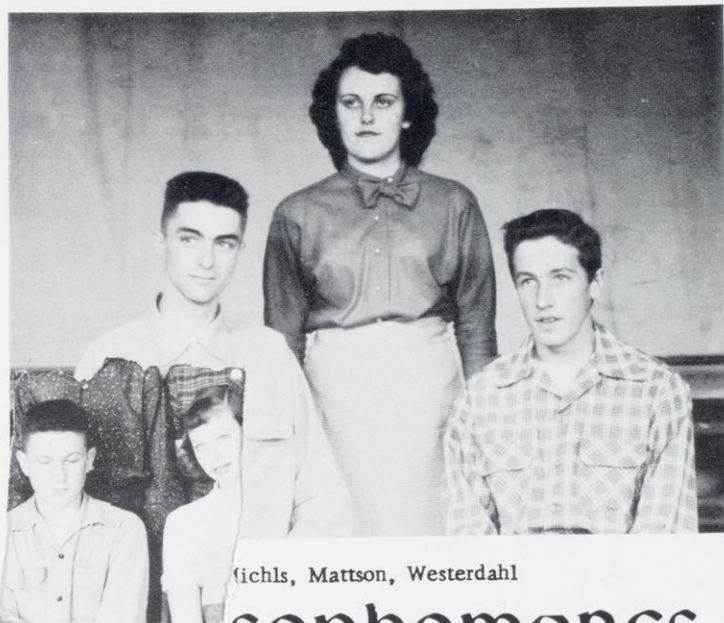

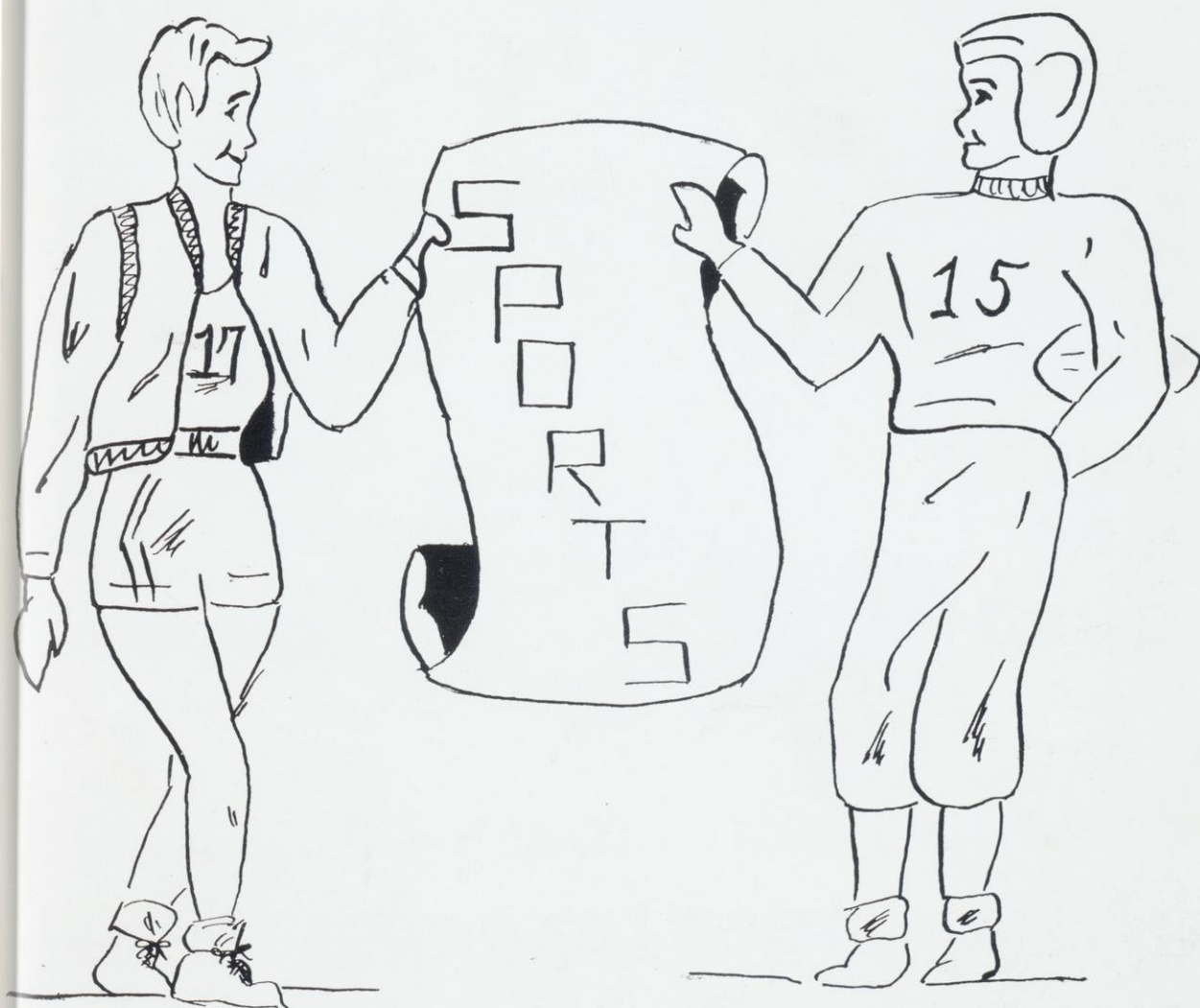


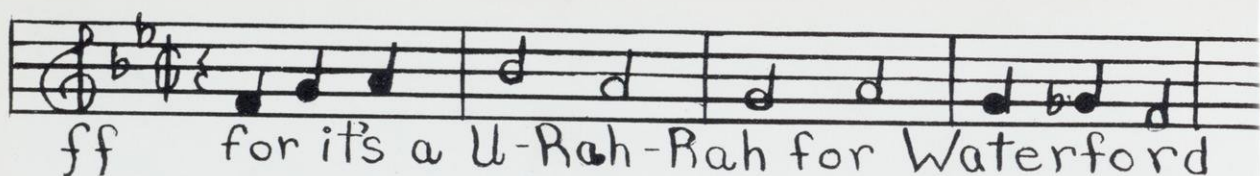

football season highlights

With only five returning lettermen, Coach McCulloch was forced to rely on many inexperienced underclassmen in the 1952 football season. Early in the season, one of the five, Chuck Shanks, received a broken finger in practice and was out of action for the first three games.

In the first clash of the season, Waterford lost to a powerful Pewaukee eleven 26-0 in a non-conference game.

The following week opened the conference season when the Wolverines defeated Walworth 26-6. The highlights of the game came in the second half when Waterford's aerial attack started to click. Jack Michl gathered in two touchdowns passes, and halfback, Don Peterson, scored two touchdowns. This was Waterford's most decisive victory of the season.

The Union Grove game had the most exciting climax of the season. It was close, with Union Grove leading at the intermission, 6-0. Waterford scored in the second half but the extra point try failed, making it a

tie score. On the last play of the game, Gordie Modrak intercepted a Union Grove pass and ran it back 45 yards for the winning touchdown. The final score was 12-6.

In the next game, Waterford lost a heart breaker to East Troy by a score of 6-2, in a game that saw the Wolverine bobble many scoring opportunities. In the closing minutes of the game, Captain Dave Rockrohr tackled an East Troy back in the East Troy end zone for a safety to give the Wolverines their only score of the game.

The next conference game was with the Aggies at Rochester. The loss of three regular backs hurt greatly in this 26-0 defeat. The Aggies found the Waterford pass defense very weak and connected frequently on long passes.

After losing to Wilmot for the past seven years, Waterford finally came through and tied them in our homecoming game with a score of 13-13. Waterford was ahead 7-6 at the half.

With five seniors playing their last game, the fighting Wolverines showed themselves to be Mukwonago's toughest conference foes of the season. After a long string of victories, the Indians were favored by at least 20 points. Mukwonago drew first blood by scoring the first time they had the ball. The Wolverines bounced back and scored on a long pass play, but Mukwonago again tallied with Waterford following with a long 70 yard run by Modrak to make the score 14-13, with Mukwonago in front. Before the half ended, Mukwonago tallied again, and the score stood at 20-13. In this game Waterford scored more points against the Indians than all the rest of the conference teams together.

Thus the season ended with the Wolverines holding third place in the Southeastern Conference with a record of 2 wins, 3 losses, and 1 tie.



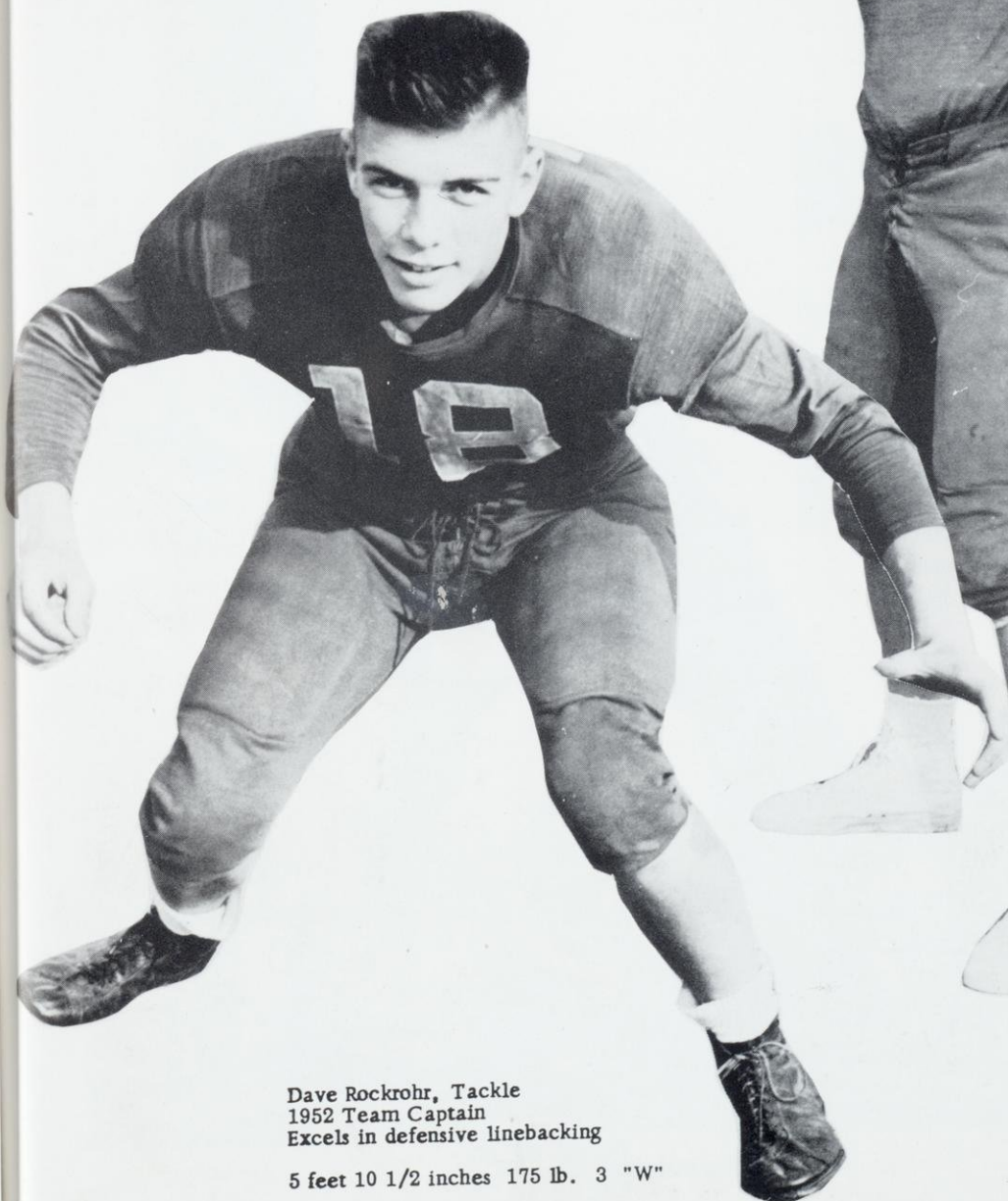

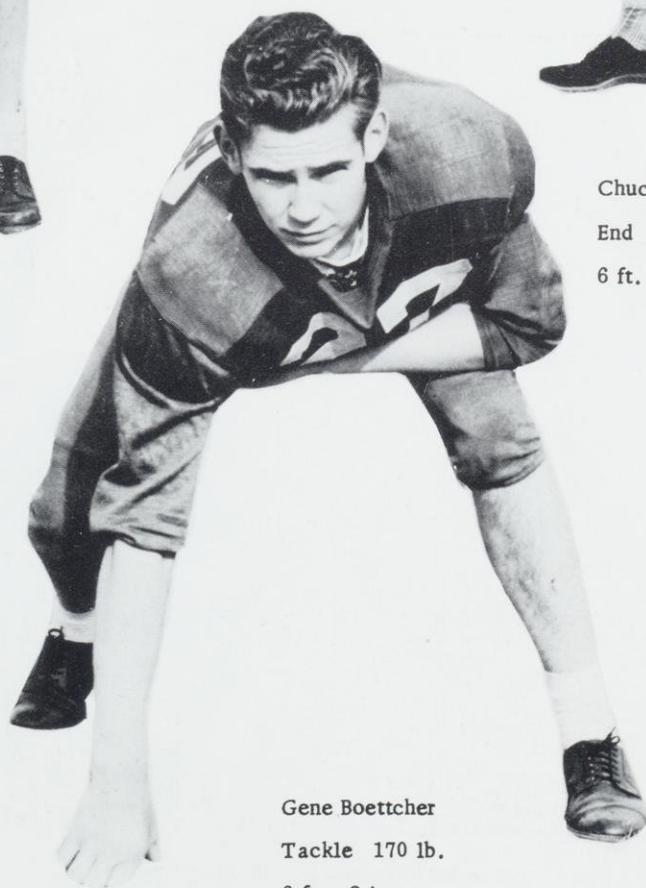

VARSITY BASKETBALL

Coach! Team! Pep! Steam! That's the familiar chant still ringing in the rafters as the curtain has fallen on another successful season for the fighting Wolverines. After the final whistle had blown and the noise subsided, Waterford was firmly entrenched in third place in the Southeastern Conference. The season showed a respectable record of 10 wins and 9 losses in over-all play.

The 1952-53 varsity was composed of six seniors, four juniors, and one freshman. The starting five through most of the season had Capt. Chuck Paulson, three-year letterman, who was third in conference scoring and an all-conference forward as a junior, and Paul Dettmann, a transfer student, playing his first year of varsity ball at the forwards. At the guards were Joe Kuzmic, who won his letter as a junior, Lee Hegemann, ace dribbler and play-maker, who also lettered his junior year. At the center post was lanky Jack Michl, a junior, who led the team in scoring with 236 points. He won his letter as a sophomore.

The team was quite well balanced with three of the starting five over 6 feet. Jack Michl being the tallest-6'3", Chuck Paulson 6'2", and Paul Dettmann 6'. This height plus the speed and ball handling of two other players, Lee Hegemann and Joe Kuzmic, rounded out a team that could fast break and rebound well.

The loyal reserves throughout the season were Dave Rockrohr, Jim Dahl, Dick Franke, Chuck Shanks, Ronnie Westerdahl, and Gerry Choinski, who all earned their first basketball letter.

At the basketball banquet, Chuck Paulson was elected honorary captain for the 1952-53 season by the members of the squad.



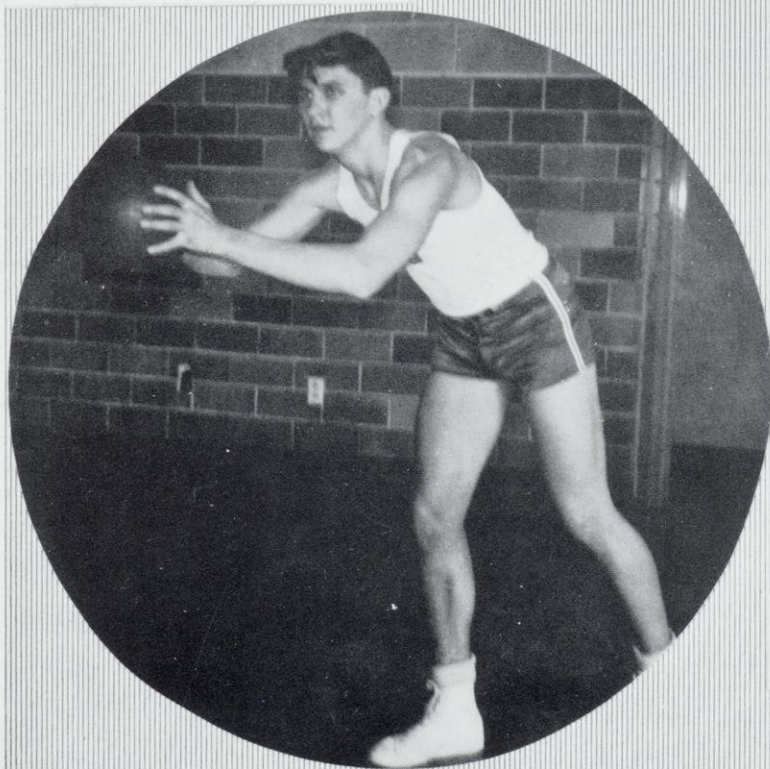

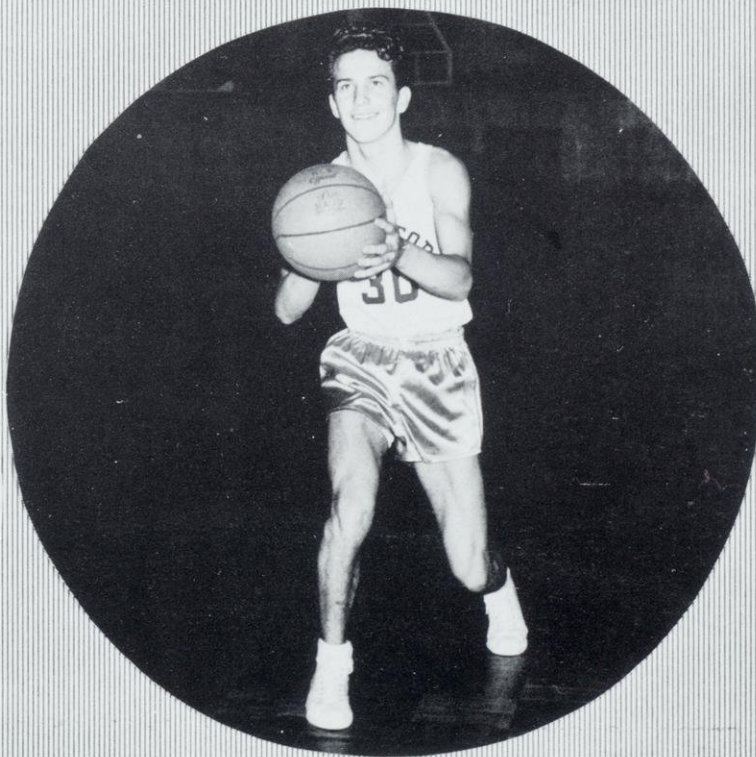

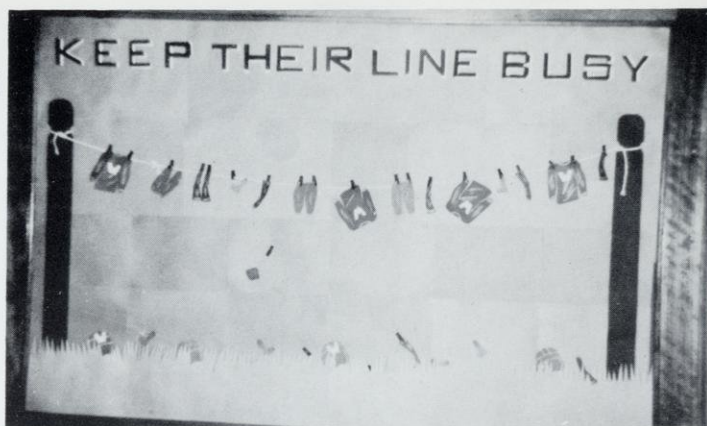


Golf
