
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
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Those who live in Williams Bay all year around look forward each Spring to your coming and regret to see you go in the Fall. Several of you are making your home here with us during the Winter. May your number increase. The Village is extending the water mains there this fall as many have expressed the desire to come earlier and stay later; also to come up in the winter for the Winter Sports.

As now you are enjoying the beauty of the so called "Paradise of Lake Geneva" so did the Indians who dwelt here before you. In fact they had a word which meant the same thing as their name for it. George Williams said his folks had planned to settle over there but the Indians made it so unpleasant for them that they moved across the Bay.

The original grant from the Government was taken by Julius Wadsworth and Thomas Duyer on Feb. 28th, 1839. This took in all the lake shore around to Conference Point.

Fairbank's Woods, as it was called, was a popular place for camping parties and picnics. It was easy to go out and get a mess of fish and fry it right there. Birch trees abounded in the early days. Al Pederson first came to the Bay 38 years ago and was one of the boys who spent a lot of time on the Point in camping or picnicing. His dream of a home there finally came true.

Alfred Pederson and C. P. Jaeger first bought and laid out the Beidler Farm into lots in 1923 and in 1925 purchased Fairbank's Woods and gradually subdivided that.

Now there are 458 possible home sites on which already there are 132 homes. There are seven miles of road and eight Parks. The streets are named after the Parkways in Chicago. From the very beginning the partners determined to keep undesirables out and selected their purchasers. Speculation was discouraged and as far as possible lots were sold to those wishing to establish homes.

Most of the purchasers are from Chicago and suburbs. M.T.Peterson and R.E.Burton have lots there and hope some day to build there. There is a renewed interest of buyers and last Sunday both partners were kept busy showing prospective purchasers around the Park. There are still a few choice lots and a few homes for sale.

The lot owners have their own Association called Cedar Point Association. N.W.Burris is President; Thos.A.Knight, 1st Vice Pres.; E.A. Baumback, 2nd. Vice Pres.; B.B.Spencer, Treas. and Financial Sec'y; F.J.Koch, Ass't.Treas.; Peter Nitchell, Rec. Sec'y; E.J.Geiger, Ass't. Rec. Sec'y. Other trustees besides the officers are M.T.Lenney, L.A.Mc Kenzie, W.F.Bazner, and Dr. J.A.Pfister.

VISITORS AT YERKES OBSERVATORY

While other years, the Yerkes Observatory has been open to visitors only on Saturday afternoons, this year through cooperation with the Men's Community Club of Williams Bay, it is open daily from five to six P.M. except Sundays as well as Saturday afternoons from one-thirty until four.

The Observatory has been open to the public under this new schedule ever since the 29th day of May. The last three days of May, there were 322 visitors. During June, there were 2,071; and during July, there were 4,812. The total attendance this year during these visiting hours from and including the 29th day of May to and including the 31st day of July was 7,205 or a daily average of 131.

The total for June and July alone was 6,883. This is the largest number of visitors for the months of June and July of which the Observatory has any record.



The Village Board will hold it's next regular meeting on next lion. night at 7:30 in the Library. At the beginning of the meeting there will be an opportunity to ask about the 1933 Assessments and present reasons for any changes. The Board meets as an adjourned Meeting of the Board of Review in hearing these. The Board has a lot of work to do at its regular meeting so it will be well for anyone wishing to take up assessment matters to send word to the Village Clerk in advance so a committee might study the assessments in advance.

Very few requests have been made from year to year for changes as the Assessor has given a lot of thought to the roll and usually made the assessment with the knowledge of the property owner. It is generally understood that a general lowering of valuations would not help matters as it would simply mean a raising of the tax rate as so much has to be raised for the upkeep of the Village, School, County and State no matter what the valuation. The school budget is lower and the Village Board will keep down expenses to a minimum.

The Village has had some unusally good publicity lately from the Chicago papers and it has brought many new people up here. The Village appreciates publicity of the right kind.

The Churches have had very good attendance this Summer. All report an unusual interest. At the Congregational Church the Auditorium was well filled at the Organ Recital at 10:15 and very few came after the regular service began.

Joins All-State Orchestra

For the past three weeks Michelene Van Biesbroeck has been attending the meetings of the All-State Orchestra, Band and Chorus at Madison, Wis. High School pupils from all over the state came there to rehearse together. At the end of the 3 weeks a concert was given by each organization first at Madison and then at Chicago. Last Friday and Sat. the students all went in a special train from Madsion to Chicago where they wound up their session by playing at the World's Fair in the courts of the Hall of States and of Science. There were about 200 in the band, 75 in the orchestra and 40 in the chorus. During their work in Madison, the students were under the leadership of . some of the country's outstanding musicians. Although the period was short, the students, through intensive practice each day, have profited much from this experience and spent an agreeable time at the University of Wisconsin.


