## THE KOHL CENTER

he home of the Badger hockey team is the Kohl Center. It is the second-largest college-owned hockey arena in the country with seating for 15,237.

The facility is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million towards the construction of the arena. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in UW history.

Albert "Ab" Nicholas, a former all-Big Ten basketball player for the Badgers, and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's basketball practice gymnasium is called the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion.


The Kohl Center, which cost \$76.4 million, is also the home to both the men's and women's basketball teams as well as concerts, guest speakers, shows and sporting events.

Entertainers who have already performed at the Kohl Center include Elton John, Shania Twain, Cher, the Moody Blues, the Dave Matthews Band and the Backstreet Boys. The Dalia Lama has also been at the Kohl Center.




## THE BOB JOHNSON

## UW-Madison Rankings

Wisconsin was named the eighthbest public national university in the 12th annual "America's Best Colleges" guidebook, published by U.S. News & World Report last summer.

Money magazine ranked the UW-Madison fourth in academic reputation among public universities. Wisconsin tied with UCLA in fourth place, behind Cal-Berkeley, Michigan and Virginia.

The School of Education is ranked No. 1 in the nation according to a study conducted at the University of Illinois in 1990. In departmental rankings, Wisconsin placed second in educational administration and policy studies.

U.S. News & World Report's annual graduate school rankings, published in 1993, ranked the UW-Madison in the top 12 of six science programs. The rankings were: computer science (tied for eighth), biology (tied for ninth), chemistry (10th), nursing (tied for 11th), health services administration (tied for 12th) and engineering (12th). Additionally, the magazine rated the UW's sociology department No. 1 in the nation.

The School of Business' MBA program ranks in the top five percent among all schools in a 1993 U.S. News & World Report survey. The school's real estate program ranks third and the risk management program ranks fourth, the publication added.

UW Hospitals and Clinics is among the leading transplant centers in the nation. In 1993, U.S. News and World Report ranked the hospital among the top three percent in the U.S.

The plant pathology department tied for first with the University of Cal-Davis in a 1986 study by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences.





Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities today. The Univ-ersity of Wisconsin is one of the few institutions that has earned praise for its work in the classroom and on the playing fields.

The Association of American Universities (AAU) was founded in 1900 by a group of 14 universities, which included the UW-Madison, offering the Ph.D. degree. Today the AAU consists of 62 American universities and two Canadian universities. Membership is by invitation only.

#### THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

A first-class education. A world-renowned university. One of the most beautiful campuses in the nation. Outstanding cultural and social life. The University of Wisconsin has it all.

Founded in 1848, the University of Wisconsin has been recognized as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning. *U.S. News & World Report*, ranked UW-Madison as the eighth-best public university in its 1999 rankings. UW-Madison tied for third in the much narrower category of academic reputation among 147 public universities.

From the initial class of 17, the student population has grown to a current enrollment of more than 40,000 students, the seventh-largest school in the U.S.

The Wisconsin Alumni Association is the second-largest independently financed group in the United States.

Wisconsin is one of just 60 members of the Association of American Universities, the most prestigious organization of higher education in the U.S.

The University Research Park, which opened in 1984, now has more than 63 companies as tenants, with nearly 1,800 employees and more than 700,000 square feet of office and laboratory space. It generates more than \$1,000,000 in property taxes for Madison annually.

The Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation has obtained more than 800 U.S. patents for the university since its founding in 1925, resulting in more than \$342 million in gifts to the university.

University libraries house more than 5.5 million volumes, 14th-most in the nation according to the Association of Research Libraries.

At any one time, about 9,500 research projects are being conducted at UW-Madison.

The UW had \$415 million in research and development funds in 1995-96, third-most in the nation according to a National Science Foundation survey.

The University was a runner-up in the 1993 Rochester Institute of Technology/USA Today Quality Cup competition.

Wisconsin received \$164 million in voluntary support for the 1994-95 school year, ranking first nationally among public colleges and universities.

According to a Standard & Poor's survey, Wisconsin is one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.

The 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States reported that 15 departments on campus were rated in the top 10 in the nation.

The University boasts the top-rated department of education in the nation according to 1990 and 1994 studies conducted at the University of Illinois.

Throughout its history, the UW-Madison has produced 13 Nobel Prize winners, 22 Pulitzer Prize winners, 46 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 15 members of the National Academy of Engineering and three members of the National Academy of Education. Nine faculty have won the National Medal of Science and three are Searles Scholars.

This city within a city has its own police force, food service, maintenance staff and hospital — not to mention a dairy plant and store. In addition to 2,300 faculty members, there are 7,700 classified staff and 5,400 academic staff.

## CHANCELLOR DAVID WARD



avid Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in June 1993, becoming the 25th individual to serve as the university's chief executive. Ward had served as interim chancellor since January 1993.

Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education. Changes inspired by Ward include: enhanced student advising, particularly for freshmen and sophomores; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

The next step, says Ward, is to redefine undergraduate education, not simply through improvements of existing programs and processes, but by developing new ways for learning to occur on college campuses. To that end, he has published a comprehensive strategic planning document, outlining priorities for the next decade as the uni-

versity works toward balancing its teaching, research and outreach missions. One way the university can unify its activities, Ward says, is by emphasizing learning as a central goal.

This development of campus learning communities recently was echoed by the Kellogg

Commission on the Future of State and Land-Grant Universities. In its first report, this 25-member group of university chief executives, on which Ward serves, called on public institutions to become "genuine learning communities" that are student-centered, support and inspire learners of all kinds, and sustain a healthy learning environment.

During his tenure, Ward has given new expression to The Wisconsin Idea, the venerable philosophical framework for the university's public service role. The Wisconsin Idea is embodied

by a vast array of partnerships between the university and both the public and private sectors, says Ward, from economic development activity and sharing of faculty expertise, to educational collaborations with K-12 schools.

"The university's commitment to the citizens of Wisconsin is stronger than ever as we approach the 21st century," says Ward.

Ward was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963.

Ward served as chair of the geography department from 1974 to 1977 and as associate dean of the Graduate School from 1980 to 1987. He became vice chancellor for academic affairs at UW-Madison in 1989, and in 1991, he was also named provost, chief deputy to the chancellor. His UW-Madison faculty career spans more than 30 years, and he holds the

Andrew Hill Clark Professorship of Geography.

As a scholar, Ward is a recognized authority in historical urban geography and has pioneered research on English and American cities during their rapid growth of the 19th and early 20th centuries. He has authored two books, edited two books and contributed many articles in leading academic journals. In recognition of his postdoctoral research, Ward was awarded the degree of Litt.D. by his undergraduate alma mater.

Ward's wife, Judith, is executive associate director of the Waisman Center, a university research facility dedicated to the study and care of children with developmental disabilities. The couple have two sons: Michael, who works with Firstar Bank in Milwaukee, and Peter, an independent producer in Los Angeles.

#### **World Class**


The University of Wisconsin-Madison is a world-class center of research and learning, one of the most comprehensive and highly ranked universities in the world. It is one of only a handful of public universities to re-ceive a five-star rating from the *Fiske Guide to Colleges*. Its schools and departments annually rank in the top 10 in the U.S.

Madison's nearly 40,000 students come from more than 115 countries and every state in the U.S. It has one of the largest international student enrollments of any U.S. university. The UW-Madison is internationally renowned for its research. In recent years it has ranked in the top five among all U.S. universities in terms of funded research, according to the National Science Foundation. Its faculty have won the most highly regarded of awards, including the Nobel Prize, the Pulitzer Prize and the National Medal of Science.

As one of the nation's major research institutions, the university maintains extensive research facilities—more than two dozen libraries, 35 specialized collections, three museums and numerous research centers.

Madison was one of only eight universities nationally chosen for Total Quality Management partnership with top American corporations. "Professors at UW-Madison are certainly among the nation's best, with Nobel laureates, National Academy of Science members and Guggenheim Fellows scattered liberally among the departments."



## THE FETZER CENTER

The Wade Fetzer Academic Learning Center opened in the Spring of '97 to aid Badger student-athletes in the pursuit of their scholastic goals.

The fully-equipped facility includes study rooms, a computer work-room equipped with 22 computers, a 55-seat auditorium, conference rooms and offices for the academic affairs staff.

#### **Academic Affairs Office**

The primary objectives of the Department of Academic Affairs are to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes and to promote the best possible academic experience for those student-athletes. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record of many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to them.

The Wisconsin Student Affairs program is offered to the nearly 700 UW student-athletes. The advising staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments. They are available to assist student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitor progress toward degrees and offer career guidance.

As part of this effort, the Academic Affairs Office coordinates study groups for selected courses, provides access to tutors, and plans a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the academic year. Examples of such events are career nights devoted to resume writing and interviewing skills; freshmen seminars which cover topics of special interest to student-athletes (i.e. nutrition, health and safety issues, dealing with the media); and faculty/advisor night which provides academic program information prior to registration.

For those athletes who request assistance, counseling sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. More than 100 tutors are available for student-athlete utilization.

Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether they be personal or academic.








## Strength & Conditioning Program

The Badger hockey team has one of the best strength and conditioning programs in the country guiding them both in and out of season. The program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game.

During the off-season, hockey players work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to the continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

When athletes appear on campus, measures of body composition, plus weight and frame size are recorded. With this information, personalized workout plans are established for each individual players.

The fully equipped weight room recently added on \$80,000 Sport Impact rubber floor to help provide better traction and support for athletes when lifting.

## THE TRAINING ROOM

The Wisconsin sports medicine staff utilizes a wide variety of facilities and equipment to help athletes rehabilitate and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time

Student-athletes have the use of a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters and Fitron Bicycles, during times of rehabilitation and recovery.

### **Athletic Training Staff**

The Wisconsin Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals. The UW Sports Medicine staff, heading by dennis Helwig, employs seven full-time certified athletic trainers, three graduate assistants and one part-time athletic trainer/physical therapist.


Combined, the athletic training staff brings more than 50 years of experience in providing health care to intercollegiate athletes. Olympic Games, World Championships, Olympic festivals and extensive foreign travel highlight the varied and unique backgrounds and experiences the staff brings to the University and its student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provides dietary analyses, measures physiological capacity and outlines programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.





Wisconsin returns 20 letterwinners off last year's team. Five players were lost to graduation and one — Dave Tanabe — gave up his remaining three years of collegiate eligibility to sign with the Carolina Hurricanes.

The Badgers return five of the top six scorers from last season's team, including over 75 percent of the goal scoring and 77 percent of the point production.

#### **UP FRONT**

"This is the position we have the most experience at,' said Sauer. "I said to the team at the end of last season that the success of this year's team is in the locker-room right now."

Steve Reinprecht and Dustin Kuk enter their senior seasons as the Badger keys on offense and as two of the league's top-returning veterans at forward. Last year, the duo finished first and second, respectively, in team scoring. Reinprecht led the team in both goals (16) and

points (33) and Kuk led with 22 assists, a personal-best for a season.

Reinprecht, the Badgers' co-MVP the last two years, has not missed a game since coming to Wisconsin, playing in 117 consecutive games. He is also just four points away from reaching the Century Club.

Kuk is coming off his best year of offensive production at the UW, tallying 10-22=32 while defensively ranking third in plus-minus among Badger forwards with a +6

"Many guys were hampered by injuries last year that bothered them for a good part of the season and a lot of potential wasn't reached," said Sauer.

Junior center Kevin Granato (thigh bruise) and senior winger Niki Siren (knee) are two of the players that were hampered by injuries a year ago. Granato missed 13 games and Siren eight.

"We need Kevin Granato to come through and put up the kind of numbers he had his freshman year (14-11=25) and get back on track offensively for us," said Sauer.

Chad Stauffacher and Mike Cerniglia are the other returning upperclassmen at forward for Bucky.

Seven of the Badgers' 16 forwards are sophomores. As freshmen, those seven forwards accounted for over 30 percent (30-24=54) of the UW's goals.

Matt Hussey led his classmates in scoring with 10-5=15 and was one of the league's top goal-scoring rookies. He finished fifth in Badger scoring.

Matt Doman, a candidate for the 2000 U.S. National Junior team, had 5-5=10 and is looking to improve his contributions offensively.

Walk-on Matt Murray, voted the team's Most Improved Player last year, was a pleasant surprise a year ago and earned a regular spot in the lineup.

Kent Davyduke, David Hukalo, Dave Hergert and Andy Wheeler round out the sophomore forwards.

#### THE BLUELINE

Wisconsin features an interesting mix at defense. Juniors Alex Brooks and Jeff Dessner and senior Dan Bjornlie (converted to defense last season) return as three of the more talented and experienced trios in the league. Dessner (+9) and Brooks (+8) ranked first and second, respectively, in team plus-minus and Bjornlie proved his versatility last year when called on to make a change to the defensive side when the Badgers lost all-league selection Craig Anderson to a season-ending neck injury.

"I would rate any of these three players with any other defensemen in the WCHA. That group has been invaluable throughout their careers in the leadership they have provided and all three have given us nothing but consistency and solid play from the blueline," said Sauer.

Junior Rick Spooner and sophomore Rob Vega add experience to the Badger defense. Vega played in 30 games last year, while Spooner saw limited action in nine games.

"Both Spooner and Vega have come back in great shape and in training camp have stepped it up a notch. They have made that next step and I'm pleased with what they have shown," said Sauer.

Three of the six newcomers are defensemen — Brian Fahey, Mark Jackson and Jason Reimers. "As a group they are very skilled and I think they bring more mobility and size to the team than we had last year," said Sauer. "Coming in right off the bat, they do have a lot of experience having played a lot of junior hockey last season, but they are freshmen and they are young (all are true freshmen)."

Fahey and Reimers were teammates last season (along with forward Brad Winchester) on the U.S. National Under-18 Team. Fahey scored 9-9=18 to rank second in goals scored by a defensemen.

Graham Melanson will anchor the Badger defense. He enters his junior campaign having played over 3300 minutes in goal at Wisconsin with 1,519 stops.

Melanson ranks among the UW's top-10 goaltenders in several categories (all records are for a season).

Melanson ranks ninth with 2,189 saves (1998-99), 10th with a winning pct. of .722 (1997-98), fifth (1997-98) and seventh (1998-99) in lowest goals-against average with 2.76 and 2.80 marks, respectively, and fifth (1997-98) and eighth(1998-99) in best save percentage with .911 (1997-98) and .906 (1998-99), respectively.

Backing up Melanson will be freshman Scott Kabotoff, who has been very impressive in training camp. He played last season with the St. Albert Saints of the Alberta Junior Hockey League where he tied a league record for most shutouts in a season with four. His 2.60 goals-against average a year ago ranked him third in lowest goalsagainst average in the AJHL.

Sophomore Mark Baranczyk, a walk on from Green Bay, Wis., will also compete for playing time.

#### **NEW FACES**

"We have everything in this class," said Sauer. "Size, skill, speed, and all are confident in their abilities. Every one of these guys has played on a winning team and knows what it takes to win."

Dany Heatley (father Murray) and Brad Winchester (father Gary) come in carrying on a family tradition as both their fathers played for Wisconsin.

Heatley was named the Tier 2 Canadian Junior A Hockey Player of the Year in 1998-99. He scored 96-73=169 in 78 games where he became the second highest-scoring player in AJHL history with 70 goals in the regular season. It was the most points by a league player since the 1979-80 season.

His 126 points also ranked as the most points in a single season since 1979-80.

Winchester was fourth in team scoring last season for the U.S. Under-18 team with 21-23=44. He was a key figure on the power play for the U.S. team over the last two seasons, scoring 19 power-play goals in that span.

"Heatley and Winchester are special," said Sauer. "They both are very complete players and have just tremendous potential."

Erik Jensen is the third member of the rookie class at the forward position. The power forward has worked hard to come back from a knee injury and with his size and strength adds to the depth the Badgers have at this position.

The new faces on defense (talked about earlier) —
Brian Fahey, Mark Jackson and Jason Reimers — complement the blueline upperclassmen extremely well and all will compete for playing time.

Goaltender Scott Kabotoff backs up Melanson and joins former Badger goaltender Julian Baretta as the only UW netminders to hail from Alberta.

#### THE GAMES

The Badgers open the season with a six-game homestand in October. Wisconsin opens with league series against Michigan Tech (Oct. 15-16) and Minnesota-Duluth (Oct. 22-23) followed by a non-conference set with Hockey East member Northeastern (Oct. 29-30). It will be the first games with a team from Northeastern since 1989.

Wisconsin is at home just one weekend the month of November against arch-rival Minnesota (Nov. 12-13). November is also highlighted by the College Hockey Showcase with games at Michigan State (Nov. 26) and at Michigan (Nov. 27).

#### The Preview

The only exhibition game is set for Tuesday, Nov. 14 against Valerenga from Norway. It is the first time the Badgers meet a Norwegian team.

The first half of the season ends with the 11th annual Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown tournament (Dec. 27-28) at Milwaukee's Bradley Center. Making up the field is North Dakota, Nebraska-Omaha (coached by former UW assistant coach Mike Kemp) and Miami University. Wisconsin faces UNO in semifinal action on Dec. 27 at 8:05 p.m.

St. Lawrence comes to Madison (Jan. 7-8) for the first time since 1983 (NCAA Playoffs). Defending league champion North Dakota is in Madison on Jan. 14-15 in the only meetings between the two schools during the regular season. Bucky plays three other league opponents just twice — at Minnesota State, Mankato (Jan. 21-22), at Denver (Nov. 5-6) and Minn.-Duluth (Oct. 22-23).

#### **KOHL CENTER**

Wisconsin set NCAA, WCHA and school recods at year ago when 267,375 fans came through the turnstiles for an average of 12,153 per game. Those numbers are records for both total and per-game attendance.

The Badgers hope to improve on their home-ice mark of 8-10-3 in their

inaugural season in the 15,237-seat facility.

"The majority of this team knows what the building is about and were very disappointed that we didn't establish ourselves well at home last year. We have an excellent opportunity to do that right from the start this season with our first six games at the Kohl Center," said Sauer.

#### JEFF SAUER



#### The "Dean"

eff Sauer, the winningest coach in WCHA history, nears the end of his third decade in the college hockey coaching ranks. His 29-year tenure is the longest in WCHA history.

One of the most-respected coaches in the game, he continues to be a consummate diplomat for the game of hockey. Sauer remains involved at all levels of hockey, from instructing kids at summer camps to speaking at high school assemblies to coaching international-level athletes in world tournaments.

On the ice, Sauer holds numerous coaching records including those for longevity and for most games coached. Sauer begins the year having coached 1,123 games as a WCHA head coach. At Wisconsin, he has coached in 720 games over 18 years.

Sauer begins the 1999-2000 season needing just 14 victories to reach the 600-win plateau and become just the fourth coach in college hockey history to achieve that level of success.

His 586 wins rank fifth (fourth among active coaches) on the all-time coaches victory list.

#### At Wisconsin

No other coach has enjoyed the successes Sauer has had at the UW. His teams have flourished both in conference play and on the national scene.

He became the first coach in college history to win a national title in his inaugural season at a school when the 1982-83 Badgers won the school's fourth NCAA championship.

Sauer has recorded three 30-win seasons (1982-83, 1987-88, 1989-90), the most of any UW coach. In WCHA play, the UW has finished in the league's top three 13 times during his tenure.

During the 1997-98 season, Sauer became the first coach in UW history to win 400 games (in any sport) and just the third coach in WCHA annals to win that many games at one school.

Sauer's teams have averaged 25 victories per year and posted at least 24 wins 11 times. Under Sauer, Wisconsin teams have earned NCAA tournament bids in nine of the last 12 years, including eight consecutive seasons (1988-95).

#### The Playoffs

Over the years, Badger teams have been very successful in the playoffs and have a reputation of peaking when the postseason arrives.

Under Sauer, UW teams have amassed a stellar 63-32-2 (.660) mark in the postseason. Noted for their second-half surges, the Badgers own a cumulative 230-135-21 (.623) record from Jan. 1 through the playoffs since 1982-83 and a mark of 140-82-13 (.623) from Feb. 1 through the playoffs in that same time period.

#### International Ice

In addition to being one of college hockey's top coaches, Sauer has had a noticeable presence on the international scene.

He is very active in USA Hockey and is dedicated to its commitment to the development and promotion of hockey at all levels in the U.S. Sauer has been chosen frequently to coach U.S. select teams in international competition.

In August of 1998, Sauer was head coach for the first-ever WCHA All-Star Team that competed against elite teams from Germany and Switzerland in the Kolin Cup Tournament in Switzerland. It was the first time in collegiate hockey conference history that a league sent an all-star team overseas.

During the summer of 1997, Sauer was one of two coaches for the U.S. Select Team which played at the Tampere Cup in Finland. The team, made up of 20 of the top American-born collegiate players, competed against top international teams.

In the spring of '95, Sauer was chosen to be head coach of the U.S. National Team at the World Championships in Sweden. The U.S. team finished first in Group B, emerg-

ing from first-round action with a 3-0-2 record. With wins over Austria (5-2), Norway (2-1) and the Czech Republic (4-2) and ties against Sweden (2-2) and Finland (4-4), the United States advanced to the medal round, before losing its first game to Canada (4-1).

Sauer was a finalist for both the 1992 and 1994 U. S. Olympic coaching jobs. In April of 1992, Sauer was an assistant coach for the U.S. at the World Tournament in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

At the 1990 Goodwill Games, Sauer served as head coach of Team USA. Prior to the Games, Team USA beat the Soviet Union's National Team in an exhibition contest at the Oakland Coliseum. It

was the first time since 1980 that a U.S. squad had beaten a team from Russia.

That Goodwill Games team advanced to the gold medal game against the Soviet Union, but lost a 4-3 decision in a shootout at the end of sudden death.

In 1989, Sauer coached the USA Select Team at the Pravda Cup in Leningrad. During the spring of 1985, he served as an assistant coach to the late Dave Peterson for the USA Hockey team that participated in the IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Czechoslovakia.

Sauer has also coached at the Olympic Festival (1987), served on the U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee (1984) and been a member of the NCAA Rules Committee.

#### In the Offseason

During the summer, Sauer works various hockey camps throughout the country, including his own Wisconsin hockey schools which are located in Madison and St. Louis.

He assists at the Bob Johnson Hockey School in Aspen (Colo.) and works as a counselor for Stan Mikita's hockey camp for the hearingimpaired in Chicago every summer.

#### As an Assistant

Sauer began his coaching career at Colorado College as an assistant to the legendary Bob Johnson in 1966. In addition to his coaching duties with the hockey program, Sauer was also an assistant baseball coach.

In 1968, he followed Johnson to Wisconsin becoming his first full-time assistant at the UW. Sauer was an

#### **Elite Company**

With a 3-1 victory over Alaska Anchorage on Jan. 6, 1995, Sauer became just the seventh coach in NCAA history to win 500 games. He is currently one of only four active Division I coaches to surpass the 500-win mark. During the 1995-96 season, Sauer coached in his 1,000th game on Feb. 17 at Northern Michigan, becoming the third coach in NCAA history to win 500 games and coach in 1,000 games.

assistant coach for the Badgers when the UW made its first ever appearance in the NCAA tournament in 1970. He served in that capacity until 1971, when he accepted the head coaching job at Colorado College.

At CC, where he served as head coach from 1971-82, Sauer won 166 games and was twice named WCHA Coach of the Year. His first award came following his rookie season, and the second followed the 1974-75 campaign when Colorado College posted a 23-16-0 record. The Tigers' third-place WCHA finish that season was the highest in 15 years for a CC team.

#### **Career Highlights**

**1990-91** — Recorded the Badgers' 11th consecutive 20-win season (ninth in a row for Sauer) and received a fourth straight bid to the NCAA tournament • with a 3-0 victory over St. Lawrence at the Bank One Badger Showdown, Sauer won his 400th game.

**1991-92** — Finished as the NCAA runners-up • became the lowest seed (sixth in the West) in NCAA championship history to advance to the title game • the second time in three years the UW played for the national title.

**1992-93** — WCHA second-place finishers • received the school's sixth straight NCAA bid • the Badgers came within seconds of making their third final four appearance in four years but fell to Michigan, 4-3 in overtime, at Joe Louis Arena.

**1994-95** — Claimed Sauer's fourth WCHA playoff title defeating Denver (5-4) and regular-season champion Colorado College (4-3, ot) in St. Paul • in the NCAA West Regional at the Dane County Coliseum, Wisconsin defeated Michigan State (5-3) before losing to Michigan (4-3) in the quarterfinals.

**1995-96** — Recorded an 11-game unbeaten string (9-0-2) from Jan. 27-March 2 • it was the longest non-losing streak since the ′82-83 team won 11 games in a row and the fourth-longest string in UW history.

**1996-97** — Played in the longest game in men's collegiate hockey history • in a first-round WCHA playoff game at Colorado College (March 9, 1997), the teams played 129:30 minutes (four overtimes) of scoreless hockey • the game took over five hours to play.

**1997-98** — Won the 1998 WCHA Playoff Championship with wins over Colorado College (5-2) and defending NCAA champion North Dakota (3-2) at the Bradley Center • the 11th playoff title in school history and the fifth under Sauer • finished second in the WCHA with an overall mark of 26-14-1 • the 14th 20-win season and 13th top-three league finish for Sauer at Wisconsin • made the UW's 17th NCAA tourney showing.

**1998-99** — Badger hockey opened play in the Kohl Center on Oct. 3, 1998, in front of a record crowd of 13,398 • the UW set NCAA and WCHA attendance records, playing in front of 267,375 fans (22 dates), an average of 12,153 per game.

# ASSISTANT COACH PAT FORD



at Ford begins his ninth year as a collegiate coach in 1999-2000 and his sixth season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. His duties as top assistant and recruiting coordinator include the identification and evaluation of top prospects, arranging official visits, monitoring of NCAA compliance issues as well as written correspondence with all potential prospects.

He also works closely with the academic affairs office setting up class schedules and monitoring academic programs for the squad. On the ice, Ford works with both the forwards and defensemen along with special teams.

#### **Coaching Background**

Ford served as an assistant coach at Northern Michigan University under Rick Comley for two years (1992-94), before returning to his alma mater. During those two seasons, the Wildcats posted a record of 43-34-5, which included an NCAA playoff appearance in 1993.

During the 1991-92 season, Ford came to Wisconsin to serve as a graduate assistant coach. The Badgers went 27-14-2 that year and lost in the NCAA Championship game to Lake Superior State.

As an assistant coach at Madison Edgewood, Ford aided former Badger Ken Keryluk for two years (1989-91). The Crusaders captured two state titles and registered a 27-1-0 mark in 1990-91.

#### **Playing Days**

A four-year letterwinner at Wisconsin, Ford played for Coach Jeff Sauer from 1984-88 and scored 48-78-126 in 155 career games as a center. Ford was named to the WCHA allacademic team in 1987 and was voted honorable mention all-WCHA in 1988. He was a member of the Badger team that won the first-ever WCHA Playoff Championship (1988). Ford's best campaign for the UW came during his senior year. He ranked third in team scoring with 17-31-48 in 45 games, helping the Cardinal and White to a 30-13-2 record.

Following college, Ford had a brief stint with the Canadian National Team as well as playing professionally in a premier league in England for the Swindon Wildcats.



ark Johnson begins his fourth season as a Badger assistant coach in 1999-2000. He is the third Johnson to coach at Wisconsin after his father, the legendary Bob Johnson (head coach from (1966-82) and his brother, Peter (assistant coach under Jeff Sauer from 1987-91). On the ice, he works with the forwards and defensemen as well as special teams. Off the ice, he is involved in identifying and recruiting top

prospects and overseeing off-ice conditioning programs.

#### **Coaching Background**


Before joining the Badger staff, Johnson coached both at the high school and pro levels. After retiring from professional hockey, he served as an assistant coach at Madison Memorial (1993-94) before taking over as head coach at Verona High School (1994-95). He moved into the pro ranks as the head coach and general manager of the Madison Monsters for the 1995-96 season, where he was responsible for all hockey operations including player contracts and transactions. As the Monsters' head coach, Johnson was the 1995-96 Coach of the Year in the Colonial Hockey League, guiding the club to a 37-30-7 mark, the best ever achieved by an expansion team in the CoHL.

#### **Playing Days**

Johnson remains the Badgers' second all-time leading scorer with 125-131=256 in three seasons (1976-79). He holds UW records for most goals in a career (125) and season (48). In 1978-79, he tallied 41-49=90, setting the school mark for points in a season which still stands. He was part of the '76-77 NCAA Championship team and earned two first-team all-America distinctions (1978 and 1979). He was the NCAA Player of the Year (1979) and inducted as a charter member of the UW Athletic Department Hall of Fame in 1991.

Johnson was the leading scorer (5-6=11) for the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team in their "Miracle on Ice" gold medal-winning effort in Lake Placid, N.Y. He scored two key goals in the game against the Soviets and tallied the game-winning score in the final game against Finland.

After the Olympics, he enjoyed an 11-year career in the NHL (1979-90), amassing 219-317=536 in 669 games, including scoring 16-12=28 in 37 NHL playoff games. In 1983-84 he scored a career high 35-52=87 as captain of the Hartford Whalers and tied an All-Star game record with three assists. During his NHL career, Johnson was a member of seven different U.S. National teams in addition to playing in three Canada Cup tournaments. He returned to international play in 1998 as a member of Team USA in the World Championship Pool A qualifying tournament in Austria. This past September he was inducted into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame. Johnson also serves on the Athletic Advisory Committee for USA Hockey.

B ill Howard, a veteran of all five Wisconsin NCAA titles, has been a key figure in the Badgers' continued success in goal. This season will be his 26th as a member of the Badger coaching staff.

During the off-season, Howard is actively involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including intensive goaltending

schools in Chicago, Madison, Milwaukee, Minneapolis and St. Louis. He teaches high school classes (business law) on a full-time basis at Madison Memorial. Howard has also served as color commentator, both on radio and TV, for Badger hockey.

#### At Wisconsin

During his tenure at the UW, Howard has helped develop all-Americans Julian Baretta (1977), Roy Schultz (1980), Duane Derksen (1992) and Kirk Daubenspeck (1997) plus eventual NHL standouts Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (Toronto Maple Leafs) and Jim Carey (Boston Bruins).

#### **Coaching Background**



During the summer, he has been a clinician at UW hockey camps.


Goodman is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association and is a certified strength and conditioning specialist.




ark King is in his third year working in the UW video department and his third season as the head video coordinator for the



n the ever-changing and challenging world of athletic administration, the steadying hand in charge of Wisconsin's thriving department is Director of Athletics Pat Richter.

#### At Wisconsin

Richter, the former Badger all-America gridiron star, three-sport letterman and successful business executive, is in his 11th season leading the sports program at his alma mater.

As Director of Athletics, he is responsible for 22 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes and more than 160 employees. During his administration, the dean of Big Ten Athletic Directors ....

- inherited a division that was \$2.1 million in debt in 1990 and eliminated the red ink on the ledgers in less than four years.
- watched the football, men's and women's basketball and hockey squads set season attendance marks during his administration.
- oversaw plans for significant facility improvements, most notably the construction of the 17,142-seat Kohl Center (15,285 for hockey) and the Fetzer Academic Center.

#### **Under Richter**

On the field of play, the Badgers have been highly successful during Richter's administration.

The football squad has appeared in five bowls and won two Big Ten championships during the Barry

Alvarez era. The 1998 club registered an 11-1 mark and once again caught the state's fancy as more than 50,000 Badger fans attended the '99 Rose Bowl.

The men's and women's basketball teams, under the direction of Dick Bennett and Jane Albright, have excelled as well. Each has become a perennial post-season play participant.

Wisconsin won the Big Ten composite all-sports rankings in 1999 led by its football and men's basketball teams, which set school season win records.

The varsity sports teams have also continued the long-standing excellence that Badger fans have come to expect. Wisconsin has claimed three — hockey (1989-90), men's soccer (1995) and men's crew (1999) — national titles and 33 Big Ten championships during his tenure.

#### **Playing Days**

As a player, Richter earned all-America (1961-62) and academic all-America (1962) honors as an end.

In the first ever college football game between No. 1 and No. 2-ranked teams, Richter and his Badger teammates dropped a 42-37 decision to USC in one of the greatest Rose Bowls ever. He set a Rose Bowl game-record with 11 receptions.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and his name is still prevalent in the Badger record books. As a senior, Richter won Wisconin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor.

Richter was recognized for his college gridiron exploits in 1997 with his induction into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame.

He also earned all-league honors in baseball and led UW in hits, homers and RBI three times. The 6-foot-5 center received his scholarship for basketball.

Pat was a first-round draft pick of the Washington Redskins and played from 1963-71. Richter earned his B.S. degree from the UW-Madison in landscape architecture (1964).

#### **Professional Career**

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to UW-Madison to earn his law degree (1971). After working at a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Corporation and was V.P. of personnel.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame and the NFL Player Alumni Associations. Pat was enshrined into the UW Athletic and Rose Bowl Halls of Fame in '91 and '94, respectively. In 1995, he became the second Badger to gain induction into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame. The Sales & Marketing Executives of Madison named Richter their "Executive of the Year" in 1997.





# 1998-99 IN REVIEW

# THE 1998-99 SEASON



#### OVERALL RECORD

The Badgers finished the 1998-99 season with an overall mark of 15-19-4.

#### **LEAGUE RECORD**

In WCHA play, the UW finished with a winning mark of 13-12-3, good for 29 points and fourth place in the final league standings. It marked the 15th time that Jeff Sauer has guided the Badgers to a top-four finish in his 17 years at the UW.

#### **RECORD NUMBERS**

Wisconsin drew a record 267,375 fans to 22 home dates in '98-99 for an average of 12,153 per game. Those numbers are NCAA, WCHA and school records for both total and per-game attendance.

#### KC DEBUTS

The Badgers opened their new home — the Kohl Center — on Oct. 3, 1998 in the annual College Hockey Hall of Fame Game against Notre Dame. Despite the 2-1 setback, the UW played in front of 13,398 fans in its Kohl Center debut. It was the largest home hockey crowd in Badger history.

#### WHAT JINX?

The 1998-99 Badger team became the first since 1990 to beat a Minnesota team on its home ice. On March 5, the UW handed the Gophers a 6-4 loss at Mariucci Arena. Wisconsin not only won the first game, but tied (2-2 in overtime) the series finale to win a series in Minneapolis against the Gophers for the first time since 1983.

#### TOP-NOTCH OPPOSITION

Wisconsin played 12 of its 38 games (31.6 percent) in '98-99 against teams ranked in the final (April 5) USA Today/American Hockey Magazine College Hockey Poll. The Badgers were a combined 3-7-2 (.333) against those teams which included No. 3 Michigan State (0-1-0), No. 5 North Dakota (1-3-0), No. 6 Colorado College (1-1-0), No. 7 Michigan (0-0-1) and No. 8 Denver (1-2-1).

#### TEAM DEFENSE SETS MARK

The Badger defense finished the 1998-99 regular season having allowed just 102 goals through 36 games for a 2.83 GAA.

In league play, the UW allowed 81 goals for a 2.89 goals-against average, the lowest team goals-against average in UW history. Listed below are the top five lowest team goals-against averages in UW history (since 1963-64).

17 — The Badgers went 17-126 (13.5 percent) on the man-advantage, recording the fewest number of powerplay goals in UW history. Prior to the 1998-99 season, the '65-66 UW team notched 20 power-play goals. In addition, the 12 power-play tallied scored in league play also set a school mark for fewest man-up scores in Badger history.

**25** — The number of times the Badgers have finished fourth or better in the WCHA since joining the league (1969-70).

29 — The number of games the Badgers played that were decided by two or less goals. Wisconsin was 12-13-4 in those contests. The UW was 6-8-4 in games decided by a single goal or that ended in a tie.

41 — The number of goals UW rookies scored accounting for 42 percent of all team goals. Dave Tanabe (10) and Matt Hussey (10) paced their classmates in goals and were two of the top goal-scoring rookies in the WCHA.

**496** — In league play, Wisconsin was 13-12-3 in 1998-99 to increase the school's all-time WCHA win total to 496.







The 1999-2000 season will mark the 16th time the WCHA has consisted of 10 schools. The league also had 10 members for the 1971-72, 1972-73, 1973-74, 1974-75, 1975-76, 1976-77, 1977-78, 1978-79.





## The Pre-Modern Erg: 1921-35

Hockey officially became a sport at the University of Wisconsin in 1922, after operating on an informal basis since 1914. The earliest mention of hockey at the UW is a reference to a hockey club in 1892.

Wisconsin, along with Michigan and Minnesota, formed the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) prior to the 1922 season. Following the 1933 season, hockey was dropped as an intercollegiate sport by the University, but Badger teams continued playing in the WIHL until the last half of the 1935 season, when the players disbanded.

BADGER hockey was dropped as an intercollegiate sport in 1933, due to the depression, although the UW hockey team continued to play in the WIHL until 1935.

At an athletic board meeting in March of 1962, then Athletic Director lvan B. Williamson reinstated ice hockey as an intercollegiate sport at he University of Wisconsin. On ov. 29, 1963, seven days after the gic death of President Kennedy, the g dgers took on St. Mary's College of ona, Minn., signaling the return ckey to the UW-Madison after a ear absence.

# **BADGER DATELINE**

#### 1920's

1922 — Hockey officially becomes an intercollegiate sport at the UW. Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota form the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL).

**January 14, 1922** — Wisconsin's first hockey game is a 4-1 loss to the Milwaukee Athletic Club.

**January 20, 1922** — With a 1-0 decision over visiting Michigan, the Badgers notch their first victory.

**January 21, 1927** — The Badgers play their first international game, losing to the University of Manitoba, 7-0.

March 4, 1927 — Wisconsin and Michigan play in the first American intercollegiate hockey game ever played outside the United States.

#### 1930's


1931 — Art Thomsen takes over as head coach, leading the team until the 1935 season. Nearly 30 years later, Thomsen becomes a co-coach for the 1963-64 squad when hockey is reinstated at the UW.

1933 — Due to the depression, hockey is dropped after 12 years as an intercollegiate sport. The Badgers continue to play in the WIHL until 1935.

#### 1960's

March 1962 — Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announces the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence.


November 29, 1963 — Wisconsin suffers a 13-6 loss at the hands of St. Mary's



1928-29 — Under head coach John Farquhar, the UW records its first and only 10-win season of the pre-modern era with a 10-7-2 mark.

APRIL 1, 1966 - Following John Riley's retirement, Bob Johnson becomes the ninth coach in Wisconsin hockey history. He would go on to guide Badger teams to three NCAA titles — 1973, 1977 and 1981 - in his tenure at the UW accumulating a 267-175-23 record over 15 years. Johnson coached arguably one of the best college hockey teams to ever take the ice in 1976-77 when that team registered a 37-7-1 mark, capturing both WCHA regular-season and playoff titles and the NCAA championship.





MARCH 16, 1973 — With a 6-5 overtime win over Cornell in the semifinals, the Badgers advance to the 1973 NCAA Championship game, beating Denver, 4-2, to claim the school's first national title.

(MN) in the first game played in the modern era. The game was played in front of 695 fans at Hartmeyer Arena.

The Badgers' first modernera goal came off the stick of Ann Arbor, Mich. native Tom French on a penalty shot.

December 6, 1963 — A rebound goal by Madison native Chan Young gives Wisconsin its first modern era collegiate victory, a 3-2 overtime decision vs. Macalaster.

**December 11, 1964** —To upgrade the program, the Badgers schedule eight games against WCHA teams, but lose all eight.

February 22, 1966 — After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers post a 5-4 overtime victory over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scores on a breakaway two minutes into overtime.

March 1968 — Bert DeHate, a sophomore center, wins the national scoring title with 77 points (47 goals and 30 assists). DeHate has seven hat tricks, a record that still stands today.

March 30, 1969 — The Badgers join the WCHA, becoming the ninth member of the league.

November 14-15, 1969 — Wisconsin plays its first-ever WCHA series at North Dakota, sweeping the Sioux, 8-4 and 7-4.

#### 1970's

March 1970 — Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and third at the NCAA championships in the school's first national tournament appearance. Defenseman John Jagger (Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario), becomes the first Badger all-American.

March 1972 — The Badgers make their second appearance at the NCAA Championship in three seasons. The team finishes third.

March 16, 1973 — Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6-5 in overtime, to advance to the finals of the NCAA Championship. A goal with five seconds left in regulation by Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

February 19, 1977 -

Wisconsin captures the MacNaughton Cup, with a 6-4 win over Minnesota-Duluth.

March 25, 1977 — The Badgers make it to college hockey's final four. Les Grauer scores the tying goal and Mike Eaves gets the game-winner over New Hampshire (4-3, ot) in the NCAA semifinals.

March 26, 1977 — Steve Alley culminates the Badgers' finest season with a goal 0:23 into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA Championship.

Wisconsin finishes the season at 37-7-1, and is the first team to capture the Big Ten,

WCHA and NCAA titles in one season. Bob Johnson is named national coach of the year, while his son, Mark, is named freshman of the year.

March 25, 1978 — Wisconsin fans take Providence, R.I., by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championship, and are proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans" by the city. Mike Eaves concludes his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earn all-America acclaim.

March 1979 — The Badgers play before 21 sellout crowds. The average crowd of 8,654 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum is eight short of a sellout. Mark Johnson, the collegiate player of the year, closes out his Badger career as the top goal scorer (125) in UW history.

#### 1980's

March 27, 1981 — Wisconsin returns to the NCAA championship for the sixth time since 1970 after defeating the best team in the east, Clarkson (9-8 in a total goal series) at Potsdam, N.Y.

TWO-TIME MVP - Badger netminder Marc Behrend was named the NCAA Tournament's Most Outstanding Player in both 1981 and 1983. He is the only player in college hockey history to be named the tourney's MOP on two occasions and one of just four goaltenders to be named to the alltournament team twice. Lorne Howes (Michigan, 1956-57), Gerry Powers (Denver, 1968-69) and Marty Turco (Michigan, 1996, '98) join Behrend as the only two-time selections to the alltourney team.

MARCH 6-7, 1988 — Wisconsin defeats North Dakota (2-1) and Minnesota (3-2) to claim the Broadmoor Trophy and the first WCHA Playoff Championship in St. Paul.

After a 5-1 win over Northern Michigan in the semifinals, the Badgers advance to the finals for the third time in history.

March 28, 1981

— The Badgers win the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 decision over Minnesota. The Badgers defeat the No. 1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and

March 27, 1981 — Wisconsin makes its seventh NCAA championship appearance, finishing second to North Dakota.

the WCHA (Minnesota).

June 1, 1982 — Bob Johnson resigns after 15 years at Wisconsin. He guided the Badgers to three NCAA titles, seven NCAA tourney appearances and the best attendance of any program in the country.

July 8, 1982 — Jeff Sauer, former assistant to Bob Johnson, is named the school's fourth coach (modern era). He becomes the 10th coach in the history of the program.

March 5 1983, — Sophomores Chris Chelios and Paul Houck score the tying and game-winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota, 6-5, in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA playoff championship. At the time, it was the longest game in school history.

March 12-13, 1983 — The Badgers sweep past Minnesota, 5-1 and 3-2, in Williams Arena to gain the league playoff championship and the No. 1 seed in the West.



#### March 24-26 1983 -

Wisconsin advances past St. Lawrence in the NCAA quarter-finals to make its third straight appearance in the NCAA championships. In Grand Forks, N.D., the Badgers claim their fourth NCAA title beating Providence (2-0 in the semifinals) and Harvard (6-2 in finals). Senior goaltender Marc Behrend is named the NCAA tournament MVP for the second time in his career.

January 7, 1984 — Wisconsin becomes the only American college team to defeat the 1984 U.S. Olympic team (4-2) on its preparation tour.

#### November 23, 1985 —

Wisconsin records its 500th modern-era victory with a 6-2 win over North Dakota in the Dane County Coliseum.

#### December 30, 1987 —

Wisconsin beats CCHA members Michigan and Michigan State to win the 23rd annual Great Lakes Invitational tournament before 19,482 fans at Joe Louis Arena.

## **Badger Dateline**

December 28-29, 1989 — Wisconsin hosts the inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. The Badgers defeat Notre Dame (9-3) and Boston College (6-5) to capture the Pettit Cup.

#### 1990's

February 16, 1990 — Wisconsin plays its 1,000th game since the resumption of the program in 1963, a 6-3 victory at Minnesota.

March 12, 1990 — Wisconsin defeats Minnesota, 7-1, to claim the 1990 WCHA Playoff Championship. It is the UW's ninth WCHA playoff title and second in three years.

March 24, 1990 — Wisconsin completes an NCAA quarterfinal sweep of Maine with a 4-3 overtime win. The win sends the Badgers to Detroit for the 1990 NCAA Championship.

March 30, 1990 — The Badgers down Boston College, 2-1, in an NCAA semi-final game in Detroit as Chris Tancill scores both goals. More than 8,000 Badger fans make their presence felt at Joe Louis Arena.

April 1, 1990 — Coach Jeff Sauer's Badgers whip Colgate, 7-3, to claim the school's fifth NCAA title. Senior John Byce records a hat trick in front of 15,034 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit. The Badgers finish with a 36-9-1 record, the second-most wins in school history. Gary Shuchuk is named first-team all-American, while Chris Tancill is the tournament MVP.

April 2,1990 — More than 5,000 enthusiastic Wisconsin hockey fans turn out at the UW Field House for a pep rally to honor the 1989-90 NCAA Champions.



**FEBRUARY 24, 1990** — Wisconsin defeats North Dakota 5-4 in overtime on Chris Tancill's goal to earn the Badgers' second league title since 1977.

December 29, 1990 — The Badgers claim their second Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown title, defeating North Dakota (3-2). The contest draws 17,671 fans, setting a WCHA record for attendance.

December 28-29, 1991 — Wisconsin wins its third straight Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown title. The Badgers defeat No. 1-ranked Maine (3-2) for the title.

April 2-4, 1992 — Wisconsin defeats Michigan (4-2) to move into the NCAA championship game against Lake Superior State. The Badgers lose (5-3) but become the lowest seeded team to advance to the title game. It is the UW's second final four appearance in three years.

March 26-27, 1993 -

Wisconsin receives its sixth straight NCAA bid, traveling to Detroit for the NCAA regionals. The UW defeats Miami (3-1) before dropping a 4-3 overtime decision to Michigan.

March 25-26, 1994 — With its seventh consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament, Wisconsin travels to Albany, N.Y. for the East Regional. The Badgers handle Western Michigan 6-3, but lose to top-ranked Boston University, 4-1.

March 17-18, 1995 — With victories over Denver and league champion Colorado College, the Badgers claim the 1995 WCHA playoff championship. The title earns Wisconsin its eighth straight NCAA appearance and 12th league playoff title.

March 8, 1997 — Wisconsin and Colorado College make college hockey history playing in the longest collegiate men's game ever. The game lasts 5 hours and 24 minutes, ending at 12:59. The teams play until the 9:30 mark of the fourth overtime before the Tigers score to win 1-0. Badger Kirk Daubenspeck sets a league and school record with 75 saves.

January 4, 1998 — Coach Jeff Sauer becomes the WCHA's all-time winningest coach when the Badgers win at Denver, 7-3. Sauer wins his 556th game as a league coach and surpasses the legendary John MacInnes (Michigan Tech, 1956-82) who previously held the mark.

March 14, 1998 — With a 6-2 win over Alaska Anchorage, the Badgers play their last game in the Dane County Coliseum. It had served as the home to Badger hockey for more than 30 years. Wisconsin moves its home games to the Kohl Center with the start of the 1998-99 season.

March 20-21, 1998 — The Badgers take the 1998 WCHA Playoff Championship with 5-2 and 3-2 wins over Colorado College and North Dakota, respectively. The playoff title is the 10th in school history and the fifth under Coach Jeff Sauer.

October 3, 1998 — Wisconsin opens the Kohl Center in the College Hockey Hall of Fame against Notre Dame. Despite a 3-2 loss to the Fighting Irish, a record 13,398 fans turn out to see the Cardinal and White debut in its new home.


October 17, 1998 — With a 3-2 win over leaguemate Michigan Tech, the Badgers record their first win in the Kohl Center.

THE BRADLEY CENTER

#### INTRODUCTION

The Bradley Center is a multi-purpose, public assembly facility located in downtown Milwaukee. A \$90 million venue which opened Oct. 1, 1988, the construction of this showcase for sports and entertainment was a gift from Jane and Lloyd Pettit to the people of the State of Wisconsin. The two city blocks which serve as the site for the Bradley Center were provided by the City of Milwaukee.

The building is named in honor of Jane Pettit's father, Harry Lynde Bradley, industrialist, inventor, philanthropist and co-founder of the Allen-Bradley Company.

#### THE SITE

The Bradley Center neighborhood was part of Kilbourntown, one of three 1835 settlements that united in 1846 to form the city of Milwaukee (the other two were Juneau town and Walker's Point). Early residents of Kilbourntown included German immigrants. Usinger's and Turner Hall, neighbors of the Bradley Center, still house the work of several members of the German Panor-ama painters who had studios in the area in the late 19th century.

The Bradley Center site is approximately six acres and is within walking distance of such luxury hotels as the new Hilton Hotel (formerly the Marc Plaza), the Wyndam and the Hyatt Regency.

#### **ACCOMMODATIONS**

The Bradley Center is an accessible facility with a variety of accommodations for guests with limited mobility and other special needs.

The Bradley Center Administrative Office is equipped with TDD, call (414) 227-0445 to receive event information or to place a ticket order. The Center has a transmitter that allows patrons with hearing impairments to hear the home team's radio broadcast. Any patron who wishes to bring his own radio may do so. Limited wheelchair transport service to and-from entrances to seating areas can be made available.

Special ticketing arrangements, such as orders for wheelchair platforms or aisle seating, can be made by calling (414) 227-0893 or by mailing an order to the Bradley Center Ticket Office.

#### **SEATING**

Seating in the Bradley Center is comfortably arranged in an oblong octagon, which provides spectators with an unrestricted view of the playing surface and the centrally-located four-sided Sony JumboTron scoreboard.

The Lower Level (200 level) begins behind the hockey dasherboards and extends 21 rows up to the Suite Level (300 Level). The Upper Level (400 Level) extends to a maximum of 21 rows up from the Suite Level. Fans reach the three concourses via 16 escalators and two elevators. In addition, there are 12 concession stands, four merchandise stands, and 28 public restrooms. The arena houses separate team facilities for the IHL's Milwaukee Admirals, the NBA's Milwaukee Bucks and the Marquette Golden Eagles.

The seating capacity for hockey is approximately 17,800.

30,000 fans per year and 15,000 spectators a day.

The Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown is contested at the state-of-the-art, 17,800-seat Bradley Center sports facility, which was the site of both the 1993 and 1997 NCAA Hockey Championships. Considered by many to be the premier hockey facility in the nation, the Bradley Center is located in the heart of downtown Milwaukee.

Wisconsin has enjoyed much success at the Showdown, winning six of the 10 championships. The Badgers have defeated hockey powers Boston College (1989), North Dakota (1990), Maine (1991), Northern Michigan (1993 and 1997) and Bowling Green State (1994) to win titles. Boston University (which has won two Pettit Cups — 1992 and 1995) and New Hampshire (1996) have won championships for Hockey East, while last season Bowling Green State became the first CCHA team to win the Showdown.

#### TOP COMPETITION

Strong competition and top-notch fields have been a trademark of the tourney, featuring teams from Alaska to Maine. Consider that ...

- The Showdown has featured the defending NCAA champion three times. Lake Superior State was part of the field in 1994 after winning the NCAA title earlier that year and in 1996, Boston University entered the tournament as the defending NCAA champions. The Badgers entered the 1990 Showdown as the defending NCAA titlists.
- In addition, the field has included several teams that advanced to the NCAA semi-finals in the same year. In 1995, Boston University went on to win the NCAA championship after taking part in the Showdown. The 1996 field included Colorado College, Vermont and New Hampshire, all of whom went

on to compete in NCAA postseason play. Colorado College and Vermont made it to college hockey's national semi-finals that year.

In 1997, the Bank One Showdown field included Boston College, which went on to play for the national title against Michigan.

This year's field includes Nebraska-Omaha, making its first appearance in the Showdown, Miami (Ohio) and North Dakota. Both MU (1992) and UND (1990) are participating for the second time in the tournament.

Nebraska-Omaha is the newest member of the CCHA, joining the league this season. The Mavericks are coached by former Badger assistant Mike Kemp.

Miami University, coached by first-year coach Enrico Blasi, finished third in the 1992 Showdown after losing 4-3 to Boston University and then defeating Boston College, 6-3.

WCHA rival North Dakota, the three-time defending league champions, lost in the 1990 tourney championship game to the Badgers, 3-2.

#### **5 HOURS AND 24 MINUTES**

Wisconsin and Colorado College set the NCAA record for the longest men's collegiate hockey game during a WCHA playoff game on March 8, 1997. The four-overtime affair at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo., lasted five hours and 24 minutes. The Badgers and Tigers played 129:30 minutes of scoreless hockey shattering the previous mark of 102:09 set in1968. CC eventually won, scoring the game's only goal at the 9:30 mark of the fourth overtime period.

#### 316 GAMES

Wisconsin went nearly seven years — 316 games — without being shutout from Jan. 14, 1972 to Dec. 28, 1979. Michigan Tech snapped the streak with a 1-0 win over the UW in the Great Lakes Invitational in Detroit. The longest Badger streak without being shutout against WCHA competition is 276 games. Wisconsin avoided being blanked for over 10 years from Jan. 8, 1972 to Jan. 29, 1982.

#### 9 GOALS

The record for most consecutive games scoring at least one goal is held by Steve Alley and John Byce. Alley scored in nine straight games from Oct. 15, 1976 through Nov. 19, 1976. Byce matched the mark notching a goal a game from Jan. 6, 1990 through Feb. 3, 1990.

#### **46 POINTS IN 21 GAMES**

Mike Eaves scored at least one point in 21 straight games during the 1977-78 season. The senior center tallied 18-28-46 in 21 games from Nov. 12, 1977 through Feb. 3, 1978. Eaves scored in 39 of 43 games (90.7 percent) that year. The streak included back-to-back five-point games vs. Michigan State on Dec. 9-10, 1977.



- The Badgers lead the WCHA with 29 all-America honors since 1970
- John Jagger, a defenseman from Sault St. Marie, Mich., was the first all-American at the UW.
- Three players in Wisconsin history Craig Norwich, Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson have two first-team all-America distinctions.
- Six forwards, nine defensemen and two goaltenders have been named to the all-America first team at Wisconsin.
- Badger blueliners have earned the most all-America honors (12).
- The last Badger to be selected to the all-America first team was defenseman Brian Rafalski (1995).
- The first five UW all-Americans (all first-team selections) were defensemen.

# **COVERING THE BADGERS**

#### **Credentials**

Requests for credentials must be placed with the UW Sports Information Office in writing, at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Requests should be made by the media agency's sports editor or sports director and addressed to Julie Kluge, Assistant Men's Sports Information Director, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. If faxing your credential request, the fax number is (608) 262-8184. Media covering the Badger beat may request credentials for road games through Kluge.

Credentials are issued according to the following guidelines:

- National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication.
- All newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director.
- (3). Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast.
- (4). Television and radio stations covering for nightly news.
- (5). All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin hockey.

Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not allowed in any of the media areas.

#### **Credential Pickup**

Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed, made available at the Sports Information Office or left with the parking attendant at the entrance to Lot 91 off of Bedford Street on gamedays: A map showing parking locations is on page 173.

#### Media Entrance / Seating

The media entrance at the Kohl Center is located on the northeast corner next to Gate A off of Frances Street. The media area in the Kohl Center is in section 208.

#### Radio Originations

Radio stations wishing to broadcast Badger hockey games should contact the UW Sports Information Office at least one week in advance to place their credential requests. Radio talent work from the top row of the press area in section 208 of the Kohl Center.

#### **Photographers**

Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Sports Information Office and are granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis. Photographers are free to shoot from most locations in the Kohl Center but are reminded to be considerate of patrons. Credentials must be prominently displayed at all times.

Strobes are also available for use by photographers and will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis. Cost per event is \$200.

#### **Phone Lines**

All requests for installation of phone lines should be made to Mike Huffman, Deputy Director of Facilities at (608) 265-4702. Cost per line per event is \$100 (\$140 for an unrestricted analog line or an ISDN line). Broadcast locations are assigned by the UW Sports Information Department based on involvement with the coop line arrangement. If you are not part of the WCHA co-op agreement, you must make your phone line requests (especially if you need ISDN lines) at least one week in advance of the game(s). There are courtesy phones made available by the UW Sports Information Office in the press area and in the media room.

#### **Scouting Tickets**

Per the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's policy, professional hockey scouts must purchase tickets through the UW Ticket Office at 1-800-GO-BADGERS or (608) 262-1440.

#### **Media Workroom**

The Kohl Center features a large media workroom that contains the following:

- post-game interview area
- · numerous working locations from which media can file stories
- platform for video cameras
- · copy machine
- pre-game dining area
- = photo darkroom
- men's and women's restrooms

Game programs, line charts, game notes and media guides are available in the workroom.

Media may store personal belongings in the workroom from the time they arrive at the Kohl Center until after the game.

The workroom is located at the northeast corner of the arena at ice level. To access the workroom from outside the arena, enter through the media gate and proceed down the stairs on your right.

#### **Video Services**

#### **Practice Coverage**

The Wisconsin hockey team has three different practice locations — the Kohl Center, the Dane County Coliseum and the Dane County Arena. Please call the UW Sports Information Office for site and specific times of Badger practices.

Many times the Badgers conduct split practices and most players only participate in one of those sessions. If you need to interview a specific player, please call ahead to make sure he will be available.

Typical practice times are from 3:15-6:15, Monday-Wednesday. Thursday practices (during weeks of home games) normally run from 3:15-5:00. Practice times are subject to change.

#### 1999-2000 Rule Changes

Rule 3-7: If a team requests an official to measure or check a player's equipment (including mouthguards) and the equipment is found to be legal, the challenging team shall be assessed a bench minor penalty.

**5-4-d:** Assistant referees can disallow an illegal goal not observed by the referee.

**6-1-m:** A misconduct penalty shall be assessed to any player who attempts to draw a penalty by their actions (i.e., diving).

**6-18-c**, **d**: When a player strikes a puck with a stick above four feet there will be a stoppage of play and the resulting face-off shall be in the offending player's defensive zone.

**6-19:** A minor or major penalty may be assessed, at the discretion of the referee, to a player who instigates or escalates an incident after play is stopped.

**6-24-e:** If the puck touches any part of a player of the opposing team or the skates or stick, or touches the goalkeeper or the skates or stick at any time before crossing the goal line extended, it shall not be considered icing the puck and play shall continue. (*Note:* eliminated the "puck travelling through the goal crease" waiver on icings.)

**6-48-b:** For regular-season tournaments only, any game that results in a tie may be broken by use of a shootout under the following conditions:

- (1). Teams play a standard five-minute overtime.
- (2). If game remains tied, it shall officially be recorded a tie.
- (3). Teams participating in the tournament must be notified no later than October 1 of the upcoming season that the shootout option will be used.

(*Note*: If the game remains tied after the five-minute overtime, each team is credited with a tie for NCAA purposes. Shootout would only decide advancement (or trophy) in the tournament. No "W" or "L" will be awarded via the shootout.)

#### NCAA Guidelines & the Media

Media members should be aware of several NCAA rules that apply to student-athletes. If there is ever a question whether any media-related activity or event including a Wisconsin student-athlete could be a possible NCAA violation, contact Tim Bald, UW Director of Compliance, or Katie Ahrens, Assistant Director of Compliance, for an interpretation. Areas of concern include:

- Coaches and university officials cannot make comments on prospective student-athletes until they sign a national letter of intent. A coach cannot comment on a prospective student-athlete who verbally commits to an institution. They can merely confirm the name of someone that they are recruiting.
- Coaches and athletic staff are not permitted to write guest columns for publications.
- Do not ask student-athletes to list or endorse products.
- Student-athletes may not be used in advertisements or endorsements of products, including media-related publications.
- Student-athletes are not permitted to conduct interviews for 1-900 services.

#### **Points of Emphasis**

The NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee has determined that the 'Points of Emphasis' for the 1999-2000 hockey season are:

- 1. **Interference** Rule 6-25: A strict standard of interference *MUST* be adhered to in all areas of the rink. Players who impede or seek to impede the progress of opponents by hooking with the stick or holding the stick or any piece of equipment or clothing with the hand or arm *MUST* be penalized.
- 2. Contact with the Goaltender It is the responsibility of the attacking player to avoid contact with the goaltender in the privileged area, particularly in the crease.
- 3. Cross Checking/Slashing: Rules 6-8 and 6-42 Officials and coaches must continue to emphasize these violations with zero tolerance. Stick fouls (e.g., high-sticking, cross-checking and slashing) have become pervasive and *MUST* be eliminated from the game.
- 4. Hitting From Behind: Rule 6-20 Officials *MUST* continue to penalize this violation with zero tolerance. The Rules Committee is steadfast in its effort to eliminate hitting from behind from the game.







#### From the Dane County Airport

Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Avenue (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Avenue, which changes to Pennsylvania Avenue, Johnson Street, Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

### From West I-90 / 94 (from Minneapolis)

Take I-90 / 94 to Highway 151 South (East Washington Avenue). Continue on East Washington Avenue to the State Capitol Building. Turn right onto Butler Street, proceed to Gorham Street and turn left. Continue on Gorham Street, which becomes University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

#### Radio Coverage

The talent team features long-time Madison radio personality Michael Bahr, now in his second year of calling the play-by-play for the Badger hockey team. He is currently the morning host on WIBA Radio and has been with the station since 1988. In the past, Bahr has called the action for UW football as well as anchored WIBA's extensive pre-game and post-game coverage of Badger football. He has also filled in on men's basketball broadcasts and done the delayed hockey telecasts for WHA-TV for the past two years.

The University of Minnesota graduate majored in communications arts. Prior to coming to Madison, he served as sports director for Phillips Broadcasting in the Menomonie-Eau Claire market.

Bill Brophy has been covering Badger hockey for 22 years. This season marks his 10th as the color analyst on radio broadcasts. He has done color for UW hockey with WTSO (1990-95) and the Wisconsin Radio Network (1995-96). The former sports editor of the Wisconsin State Journal (1984-96) is now the Communications Director for the Diocese of Madison. Brophy has covered the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) for nearly 25 years.

WIBA will carry all home and away UW hockey games, including all postseason action. Badger Coach Jeff Sauer will also have a weekly one-hour show on WIBA and will be featured on weekly morning conversations with Bahr during his morning show.

#### **Midwest Sports Channel**

Midwest Sports Channel is a major television partner of UW sports, having entered into an agreement with the University of Wisconsin in the summer of 1998. MSC will televise 12 UW hockey games this season.

Paul Braun (play-by-play) and John Johannson (color) team up for the second straight year to call Wisconsin hockey action for MSC. Paul Braun has been calling Badger action for over 25 years and has been at the mike for four of the five UW NCAA hockey championships. Braun helped start the statewide tape-delayed telecast of Badger hockey in 1973-74 along with WHA-TV Assistant Director of Radio and TV Jim Santulli. He has called the game for both radio and television hockey broadcasts as well as being the play-by-play announcer for WHA-TV for delayed UW football and basket-ball telecasts.

John Johannson, a native of Rochester, Minn., played center at Wisconsin from 1980-84. He was a member of both the 1981 and 1983 Badger hockey championship teams, scoring 64-112=176 in 171 games. He is the only player in UW history to be named to the NCAA Division I all-Academic team back in 1984.

He was drafted by the New Jersey Devils in 1981 and after a short stint in the NHL, returned to the Twin Cities. Since college he has been involved in real estate development and is currently employed by Welsh Companies, Inc. out of Minneapolis.
