





**Dr. Kit Saunders**, the former Director of UW Women's Athletics for nine years, assumed a new role in the Wisconsin Athletic Administration in 1983. As the Associate Director of Varsity Sports, Kit oversees the policies and direction of the 22 men's and women's non-revenue sports.

Kit's long association with Wisconsin includes serving as the women's club sports coordinator, lecturer in physical education and women's tennis coach prior to her appointment as Director of Women's Athletics in 1974.

She has held positions of athletic leadership on the state, regional and national level. As one of the founders of the Wisconsin Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Kit served in numerous state offices including that of president. She was formerly a commissioner for the six-state Midwest Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (MAIAW), and was elected vice-president for Division I schools of the former Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW).

In 1984, Kit was honored as the first member of the Wisconsin Women's Athletics Hall of Fame in recognition of her contributions to intercollegiate athletics for women on the UW campus. Paula Bonner became the Assistant Athletic Director in charge of the Wisconsin Women's Intercollegiate Athletics Program in 1983. Now in her ninth year of administrative association with the UW program, Paula oversees the complete operation of the 11-sport Badger women's program including budget preparation and expenditures, financial aid, special events arrangements, and recruiting.

She served as the chairperson of the State and Midwest Regional AIAW ethics and eligibility committees, and heads the UW Athletic Board Women's Sports Committee. She is also a charter member of the Wisconsin Task Force on Women's Sports which is affiliated with the Wisconsin Women's Network, and serves on the steering committee for the Association of University Community Women.



## Sports Information

The responsibility for disseminating all information and publicity materials for the 11-sport women's athletic program lies with **Tamara J. Flarup**, Director of Women's Sports Information.

Now in her 10th year, Tam has been able to observe Wisconsin women's sports gain stature and recognition both regionally and nationally. Under Tam's direction, the sports news staff coordinates sports results, plans brochures and other publicity materials, and writes weekly sports releases and additional features on the women athletes. She also assists the Women's Intercollegiate Sports Booster Club (W.I.S. Club) in its promotions and publications.

Active in concerns of sports publicists nationally, Tam organized and chaired the College Sports Information Directors (CoSIDA) "Publicists for Women's Sports Committee" two years, served as a coordinator for the CoSIDA Publications Contest Committee, and is currently serving on the CoSIDA computer committee. She has been a contributing writer on women's sports in the NCAA Public Relations Manual the past two editions.

In 1983, Tam was selected as one of 34 sports information directors to serve as a media liaison director for the National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs.




## Academic Counseling

Academic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the men and women student athletes.

Assistant Athletic Director Dr. Diane Johnson and Counselors Alan Zussman and Mary Weaver are responsible for the Wisconsin Athletics counseling program which is offered to the nearly 900 Badger athletes. As former members of the academic dean's office, Diane and Alan have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

For those athletes that do request assistance, Diane, Alan, and Mary offer counseling sessions on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether the needs be personal or academic in nature.



## Sports Medicine

The care, prevention and treatment of injuries to all Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of National Athletic Trainers Association certified athletic trainers. Gordon Stoddard, Jan Tappon, Joe Baer, Dennis Helwig, Sherri Springer, and Jim Bossany are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff utilizes training rooms in the Stadium, Armory, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.



## Weight Training

Ray Moran begins his fourth year of coordinating Wisconsin's extensive weight-training program for all men and women UW student athletes. Ray and his staff assist the coaches in planning and executing individual strength programs for each athlete and team.

The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a newly expanded, fully-carpeted room in Camp Randall Stadium.



## Head Coach—Steve Lowe

Steve Lowe begins his first year as the head coach of the University of Wisconsin women's volleyball team.

A native of Iowa City, Iowa, Steve has been the assistant coach at the University of the Pacific since 1983. As the first assistant and primary recruiter, Steve aided the Tigers in winning the 1985 NCAA Division I Championship title. UOP also claimed 1985 championship titles in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association League, the PCAA Tournament and the NCAA Northwest Region. The Tigers placed third in the NCAA Championship in 1984, and fourth in 1983.


In addition to his coaching duties, Steve works as a technical consultant in sports psychology with the United States National Women's Volleyball team. Teaching techniques in goal setting, concentration and motivation, Steve develops individual mental preparation programs for each national team player. He has also worked as a mental preparation consultant with university and high school athletes.

Steve is a 1978 psychology graduate of the University of Iowa. He received his master's degree in applied behavior analysis with a specialization in athletics from the University of the Pacific in 1981. He served as a lecturer in psychology of coaching and volleyball at the University of the Pacific two years.

Active in the USVBA, Steve augmented his UOP coaching duties as head coach of the Stockton Volleyball Club and assistant coach of the Cascade Steelers, two United States Volleyball Association teams.

He has also been active in writing performance enhancement curriculum, and is a frequent speaker at symposiums and clinics. He has produced several videotape training packages for use in university and high school volleyball programs.

Steve and his wife Lori have two children—lan, four, and Jeffrey, seven months.



#### Lowe's Coaching Philosophy

"Central to my philosophy of coaching is the belief that coaches are primarily teachers, and that their main task is to provide a positive learning environment. In this environment, the players should be rewarded for developing and improving their skills. The players should be challenged to maximize their potential. They should be presented with new creative ideas that will challenge them to be the best they can be.

"As a coach, I must try and develop the total person—physical, mental, social and emotional. In collegiate athletics, a coach must never lose sight of the academic, social and athletic needs of the athletes. I truly believe in the concept of the student-athlete.

"Finally, I believe sports should be fun. I love my job because it is both challenging and fun. I want the players who play for me to feel the same way. I feel they will play to the best of their ability if they truly enjoy playing. There are numerous rewards from athletics, and it is my job as a coach to make sure my players receive these rewards. I will have succeeded as a coach if I can honestly say I provided as positive an experience as possible for each one of my athletes."



#### Assistant Coach—Therese Boyle

A new assistant coach will also work with the Wisconsin volleyball program. Therese Boyle, a 1986 graduate of University of the Pacific, begins her first year with Wisconsin women's athletics.

Boyle was the team captain of the 1985 NCAA National Championship UOP team where she was a four-year starter. She was named to the *Volleyball Monthly* All-American team as a senior, and named MVP of the Wendy's Classic which featured the top four teams in the country. Boyle holds the single game kill record at UOP with 31 kills. She gained national playing experience and recognition as a member of four National Sports Festival teams from 1979–83, and as a member of the United States Junior National Team in 1980.

A native of Oak Lawn, Ill., Boyle was a prep All-American at Mother McAuley High School. She led her team to two undefeated seasons during her junior and senior years. Her teams won the Windy City junior national championships in 1981 and '82. Boyle was also named the Mayor Byrne Chicago Player of the Year in 1982.

"I couldn't be more excited to have Therese at Wisconsin," says Coach Lowe. "She's a great player and she is going to be a super role model for the rest of the players. I feel that she is going to be a great addition to the program."

## 1986 Season Preview



As in the Rodney Dangerfield movie "Back to School" filmed at Wisconsin, Coach Steve Lowe believes his Badger team will "get some respect" this season.

And this year we'll get respect.

Unlike Rodney Dangerfield in the movie "Back to School," the University of Wisconsin women's volleyball team is out to earn some respect this year. In the movie, filmed on the Wisconsin campus, Rodney stuns the population of Grand Lakes University. The Badger spikers have similar plans in surprising the Big Ten and other opponents with an improved team.

"We'll utilize the talent that we have to do things we've never done before," says first-year head coach Steve Lowe. "With a team that hasn't been that successful in the past, you want to try something different."

Hopefully something different will pull the Badger program up from their second division finishes of the past few years. Last year, the Badgers finished 7–24 overall and 2–16 in the Big Ten for ninth place.

"I feel like we could do real well," says Lowe of the 1986 season. "I definitely feel we'll have an improvement over last year and will be an improved team in all aspects of the game."

Lowe feels he has the talent to improve last year's record. With the return of five starters and nine letterwinners, the Badgers have the depth and experience they haven't had in previous years. Two talented new coaches with national championship experience also give the Badgers added incentive for an exciting year.

Lowe, a former assistant coach at the University of the Pacific, aided the Tigers to the 1985 NCAA National Volleyball Championship. He also works with the United States National Team as a psychological consultant. His assistant, Therese Boyle, was the captain of the 1985 National Championship team and was a four-year starter at UOP.

"We should be mentally tough with my background in psychology," says Lowe. "I really believe that we will not have a team that will quit or not play up to their full potential. As long as they give 100 percent, we can compete with anyone.

"I feel good about our team. I feel that in the spring we made quite a few strides and the attitude (of the team) is excellent."

The biggest question mark with the Badger team is that of setter. With the loss of last's year starting setter **Sue Gilmeister** to knee surgery, the Badgers have a big gap in their offense. Sophomore **Lori Lang** of Libertyville, Ill., set for the Badgers during the spring season, but freshmen **Susan Temple**, San Clemente, Calif., and **Mary Johnson**, Lafayette, Calif., will also challenge for the starting position.

Several new surpises are in order for Badger opponents. A quicker offense with more middle hitting will be instituted. New serve receive formations will prevent opponents from knowing where the hitters are. Lowe will also have the hitters attack from different locations within the offense.

"I think it's extremely important to be creative," says Lowe. "With the type of student-athletes we have here, we can get into a offense that is very complex and complicated because they're such intelligent players."

The Badgers will be led by senior captain Julie Fautsch. Fautsch, from Spring Lake Park, Minn., is the only senior on the team this year. She led the team in blocks with 36 block solos and 96 block assists in 1985. She finished fifth in the Big Ten in blocks per game with a 1.2 average and should be one of the best blockers in the Big Ten. Fautsch finished the season with 222 kills and 23 service aces.

Returning All-Big Ten honorable mention selection Margi Kaminski, led the Badgers in hitting percentage last season at .268. Kaminski, a junior from South Bend, Ind., led the team in service aces with 38 and finished second on the team in kills with 278. An aggressive competitor for the Badgers, she was also second in digs with 307.

Last season's team kill leader Kristen Roman returns again as one of the Badgers most potent hitters. She led the Badgers with 358 kills, finishing seventh in the Big Ten. Roman, a junior from Barrington, Ill., led the team in digs with 322 and finished second in service aces with 32.

Connie Venzke finished second on the team in blocks with 19 block solos and 71 block assists. The junior from Athens, Wis., finished the season with 164 kills and 22 service aces, and should have her best year in 1986.

Playing in 105 games for the Badgers last season, junior **Beth Sweeney** recorded 101 kills and 216 digs. Sweeney, from Columbia, Mo., also scored 19 service aces and 30 block points. An excellent defensive player, Sweeney should see even more playing time in 1986.

Injuries kept Tracy Tiffany out of part of the season, but the junior from Richland, Mich., came back to score 98 kills. She also finished the year with 39 block assists and nine block solos. A very good short set hitter, Tiffany will see additional play in the backcourt and at service.

Junior Amy Lienhard saw limited playing time in 1985, but hard work has improved her position on the team. Lienhard, from Lawrence, Kan., recorded 39 kills and 84 digs on the year. One of the most improved servers and blockers on the team, Lienhard scored 13 service aces and 14 block points last season.

Two freshmen gained experience last season and will be ready to contribute more in 1986. Lori Lang will challenge for the starting setter position, a new role for her this season. As an outside hitter, Lang scored 78 kills and 17 block points last year. A clean setter, Lang can set a variety of sets and should develop into an outstanding setter.

Lisa Davan, a sophomore from Kalamazoo, Mich., recorded 19 kills last season and six block assists. A year of experience has helped Davan become a good right side blocker and has improved her hitting.

Three newcomers add much talent to the Badger squad. Transfer Liz Potempa, competed for two years at Western Michigan University. A prep volleyball All-American, Potempa helped the Broncos to two MAC conference titles and two NCAA postseason appearances. Potempa, a junior from Palatine, Ill., will be an integral part of the Badger offense and one of the key hitters.


Freshman **Susan Temple** will challenge Lange for the starting setter position. A very good setter, Temple is also an excellent defensive player. A California player from San Clemente, Temple should immediately contribute to the Wisconsin program.


Wisconsin's other top recruit is Mary Johnson. A freshman from Lafayette, Calif., Johnson was a four-time all-league selection and league MVP her junior year. A good all-around player, Johnson could play anywhere on the court.

A solid group of talented players and a new coaching staff should help turn the Badger spikers record around in 1986.

"One of the real keys is to instill self-confidence," says Lowe. "Self-confidence is the most important thing in mental training. They need to believe that they can succeed."

This year they'll earn that respect.

## **Volleyball History and Highlights**



Volleyball was one of the original 12 sports established in 1974 when the University of Wisconsin–Madison created a varsity program of women's intercollegiate athletics.

In the initial years of competition, UW–Madison was a member of the Wisconsin Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Conference competing against other state universities. The Badgers joined the Big Ten Conference in 1981 and have competed against conference members since then. In 1985, the Big Ten switched from a tournament format to double-round robin, home and away competition in order to determine NCAA qualifiers.


Wisconsin was originally a member of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) competing in regional and national competition until 1982, when Wisconsin became associated with the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

In 1974, the Badger spikers had a successful first year with a 28–4 record, which still holds as the fewest match losses and highest winning percentage (.875) in Wisconsin volleyball history. In 1975, the Badgers finished sixth in the Big Ten tournament and fifth in the region. A second-place Big Ten finish highlighted 1977 as the Badgers finished the season 30–14–8.

A new coach in 1978, brought even more records for the Badger volleyball program. Under Kristi Conklin, Wisconsin won 40 matches on the year including 15 consecutive match wins, both records which still stand.

The Wisconsin program has struggled since 1981 failing to have a winning record though several outstanding individual performances have been achieved since then. In 1983, Megan Scott was named to the All-Big Ten first team and in 1985 Margi Kaminski earned All-Big Ten honorable mention honors.

The Badgers enter a new era under first-year head coach Steve Lowe in 1986. Lowe brings a strong background of physical, technical and mental preparation to the Wisconsin volleyball program.







## Madison: All-American City









The Wisconsin campus is located just one mile from the state capitol on a series of hills overlooking scenic Lake Mendota, the largest of the chain of lakes.

The campus covers over 900 acres—most within two blocks of Lake Mendota. Many of the residence halls have the lake in their backyard, and there are numerous bathing beaches along the Mendota shoreline. In addition, the UW Arboretum, a nature study and hiking area, offers another 1,224 acres to the campus community. Also located near the campus is Picnic Point, a 129-acre park-like peninsula which extends into Lake Mendota and is used for nature study and recreation. Jogging paths and bike trails extend along the entire campus shoreline of Lake Mendota.



## **Wisconsin Sports Facilities**

Athletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from some of the finest sports facilities found anywhere in the country. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its women athletes.

The basketball and volleyball teams practice and compete in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse which seats 12,000. The Fieldhouse features four remodeled locker rooms and a modern athletic training area. Other recent Fieldhouse additions include a new lighting system and new sound system.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage in their ability to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States. Ranked by the USTA as the number one tennis facility in the country, the two-million dollar Nielsen Tennis Stadium seats 1,500 spectators. It features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, and one squash doubles court.

The stadium, located close to the lakeshore dormitories, is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916–18 while a student in electrical engineering.


Wisconsin's track teams benefit from practicing and competing during the indoor season in the Camp Randall Memo-


rial Sports Center. Located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, the "Shell" contains a 220-yard Mondo rubber track, throwing and jumping areas in the infield, and a seating capacity of 2,500.

During the outdoor season, Wisconsin track and cross country athletes have the opportunity to utilize one of the finest tracks in the Midwest. The newly-renovated 400-meter, Mondo-rubber outdoor track is located on the west side of campus. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, dedicated in honor of the former Wisconsin head men's track and cross country coach, was










the site of the 1986 Men's and Women's Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Planning and fund raising are underway for the next phase of construction; the addition of permanent spectator seating with press box and locker room facilities.

The swimming and diving team has the luxury of having two pools in which to practice and compete—the Natatorium adjacent to Unit II, and the new Unit III facility or SERF. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped





with a fully automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50'x40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The recently completed Unit III facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

The Wisconsin men's and women's gymnastics teams train and compete in the renovated Armory located on central campus along Lake Mendota. Better known on campus as the Red Gym, the facility provides over 15,000 square feet of training space and specatator seating. Gymnasts are provided plenty of working space and equipment, including a large foam training pit, 10 balance beams, four sets of uneven parallel bars, and ample floor exercise practice space.

Outdoor facilities at Wisconsin include soccer fields adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium. The crew boat house, situated on Lake Mendota, provides the Badger crews with a modern facility including an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice. Construction was just completed on an additional shell storage area, and other construction plans include a second indoor rowing tank, and additional locker room space.

Our teams also have access to several other facilities on campus. The Natatorium and SERF feature numerous multi-purpose gyms, weight rooms, running tracks, and other athletic facilities for practice and competition.

Other facilities which are an integral part of the athletic program are the coeducational weight training and sports medicine rooms in Camp Randall Stadium. The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a spacious, fully carpeted room in Camp Randall. Two full-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The care, prevention and treatment of injuries to all Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of N.A.T.A. certified athletic trainers. They are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff utilizes training rooms in the Stadium, Armory, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists associated with the UW Medical School and assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.






