






## Badgers Close Season With Non-Conference Game Against Buffalo

The Wisconsin football team (10-1, 7-1 Big Ten) plays its final regular season game today at Camp Randall Stadium against the University of Buffalo (2-8, 1-6 MAC. Kickoff is scheduled for 11:03 a.m. and the game will be televised by ESPNU. Clay Matvick and Chris Martin will handle the commentary.

The game will also be televised on a tape-delay basis by Wisconsin Public Television. Mike Heller and former Badger Scott Nelson will handle the commentary. The game will be shown statewide beginning at 10:30 p.m.

Fans can listen to the game on the 53station Wisconsin Radio Network. Locally in Madison the game can be heard on WIBA (1310 am/101.5 fm). Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas are on the

The Badgers closed the Big Ten portion of their schedule with a 24-21 win at lowa last Saturday. Quarterback Tyler Donovan, filling in for an injured John Stocco, completed 17-of-24 passes for 228 yards and two touchdowns and also rushed for 61 yards.

With the win, UW finished 7-1 in Big Ten play for just the third time in school history. It also gave the Badgers 10 wins for the fifth time in school history.

Buffalo lost to Akron, 31-16, last week on the road. The week prior, the Bulls snapped a seven-game losing streak with a 41-14 win over Kent State. Buffalo is led by running back James Starks who has accounted for 877 total yards and six touchdowns.

Today is Senior Day at Camp Randall Stadium as 19 Badgers will play their final home games. Those 19 players and their families will be introduced prior to the game.



# Today's Game at Camp Randall

# Notable, Quotable and Promotable Our top 10 items for this week ...

Last Saturday's win at Iowa was the seventh straight for Wisconsin. That is tied for the sixth-longest current winning streak in the country. It's the Badgers' longest winning streak since winning nine in a row to start the 2004 season.

Wisconsin is 10-1 this season. It marks just the fifth time in school history that the Badgers have won 10 games and it is only the second 10-win regular season in school history. Wisconsin has never won 11 regular-season games and has won 11 games in an entire season (bowl game included) just once, in 1998.

UW is one of just four teams in the country (along with Auburn, Texas and Boise St.) that have won at least nine games in each of the past three seasons. The only other times in school history the Badgers have accomplished that were in 1897-99 and 1998-2000.

4 UW has won 29 games over the last three years, the fifth-best total in the country over that span. The only time Wisconsin has won more games than that in a three-year span was 1998-2000 (30).

Wisconsin is third in the Big Ten and ranks sixth in the country in scoring defense, allowing just 12.7 points per game. The Badgers gave up just three points to Penn State, the fourth time this season UW's defense has not given up a touchdown. Wisconsin's defense has given up just 13 touchdowns this season.





Junior quarterback Tyler Donovan completed 17 of 24 passes for 228 yards and two touchdowns while also running for 61 yards in his first career start last week at lowa.

The Badgers won seven Big Ten games this season for just the third time in school history. The only other times that happened were in 1998 and 1999. UW won Big Ten titles in both of those seasons.

Www. is outscoring its opponents 81-16 this season in the third quarter. In the last seven games, Wisconsin has given up just two points in the third quarter.

Wisconsin, Florida, Ohio State and LSU are the only four schools in the nation with their football and men's basketball teams currently ranked in the top 10 by the coaches and/or A.P.

The Badgers lead the Big Ten in total offense in conference games, averaging 398.1 yards per game. They are also second in the conference in scoring during league games at 30.6 points per game. UW has converted 31 of 34 red zone opportunities in Big Ten games, best in the conference.

The Badgers are No. 2 in the country and second in the Big Ten in time of possession (33:46). Only Michigan has held the ball for longer than the Badgers. UW held a huge 38:48-21:12 edge in time of possession at Iowa last Saturday. That is the longest the Badgers have held the ball in a game since Nov. 6, 2004 when they held it for 44:31 in a 38-14 win over Minnesota.

Mark Zalewski is one of four senior starters on defense (Roderick Rogers, Joe Stellmacher and Joe Monty are the others) that will be playing his final game at Camp Randall Stadium today.

UW's last loss to a member of the MAC was a 24-14 setback against Western Michigan on Sept. 3, 1988 (since that game, UW has won 15 straight against MAC adversaries) ... UW is 19-1 in its last 20 regular-season non-conference games.

### **First Impressions**

Bret Bielema has set the Wisconsin record for victories by a first-year head coach with 10. The previous record was held by Phil King (7-1-1 in 1896) and William Juneau (7-0-0 in 1912).

Bielema also is the only rookie head coach in Big Ten history to win 10 games. With one more win, Bielema would join Larry Coker of Miami (12-0 in 2001), Gary Blackney of Bowling Green (11-1 in 1991), John Robinson of USC (11-1 in 1976), Bill Battle of Tennessee (11-1 in 1970) and Gregg Brandon of Bowling Green (11-3 in 2003) as the only coaches in Division I-A history to win at least 11 games in his first season. The NCAA record for wins by a first-year head coach is 12 by Coker in 2001.


# Going Out on a High Note

# **Moving up the Charts**

Freshman running back P.J. Hill leads the Big Ten and ranks fifth in the country in rushing at 131.5 yards per game. Hill's 1,447 total rushing yards are third-best in the country. His rushing total is 11th-best among freshman runners in NCAA history and 11th-best in UW annals. UW has had a 1,000-yard rusher in 12 of the past 14 seasons.

# Chancellor John D. Wiley





hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of isconsin-Madison, having been a gradue student, a professor, and an administor during his illustrious university reer. Assuming office on January 1, 001, he is the 27th person to lead the niversity since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer. Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.





# Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez





arry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of add football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez geded Wisconsin's football fortunes. He p oted the Badgers to three Big Ten Caference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn fiis master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer) and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson. Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet Alvarez.

- Grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999
- A finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18
  coaches named to a new position in 1990 and was the only one still at the school that hired
  him when he retired in 2005.
- Got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship.
- Named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by Hispanic Business in October of 2001
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, gave \$100,000 to support the opening of Gilda's Club of Madison, a free support center for families dealing with cancer.
- Numerous former Alvarez assistants at Wisconsin have gone on to success on the
  professional level, among them Bill Callahan (former Oakland Raiders head coach, now head
  coach of Nebraska), Brad Childress (Minnesota Vikings head coach), Jay Hayes (Cincinnati
  Bengals defensive line coach) and Jay Norvell (former Oakland Raiders tight ends coach,
  now with Nebraska)



# Head Coach Bret Bielema

Pret Bielema is in his first year as head football coach at the University of Wisconsin. The second-youngest head football coach in the Division I-A ranks, he brings a remarkably strong background to the position.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the

high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002-03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas
State, Bielema spent nine seasons
as an assistant coach at his alma mater,
Iowa, where he worked for head coaches
Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997
Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and
ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring
defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr
(first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 547 games and guide their teams to 41 bowl games, so the first-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business.



Bielema earned four letters (1989–92) after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bac elor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.



# Seniors Say Goodbye

Throughout the history of Wisconsin football, seniors have assumed the role of leaders on and off the field. This year's senior class is no different as they have epitomized all that it means to be a Badger.

"In coaching we often say that 'tradition' never graduates, only players do," said head coach Brett Bielema. "As a group these seniors have established a 'tradition' here at the University of Wisconsin that they all can be proud of for years to come."

In a pregame ceremony today we honor these seniors.

Captain John Stocco, who has started 35 games at quarterback, has compiled a record of 28-7 when under center for the Badgers. The Richfield, Minn., native is only two wins shy of tying the Wisconsin record for victories by a starting quarterback. Throughout his four years in Madison, Stocco has seen his name appear on a number of the school's career record lists. He is currently second in passing yards, completions, completion percentage and touchdown passes.

Lineman Joe Thomas has been a leader for the Badgers during his four years. Thomas has appeared in 46 games for the Badgers including 37 starts. The Brookfield, Wis., native has been an asset for UW both offensively and defensively. In 2003 Thomas started at defensive end vs. Auburn in the Music City Bowl. Two seasons later, against that same Auburn team. Thomas was again called upon to serve the Badgers' depleted defensive line in the Capital One Bowl. A knee injury suffered in that game did not stop Thomas from playing in his senior season. The 2005 All-Big Ten and 2006 Mid-Season All-American came back as strong as ever, making 11 starts this year as well as being named team captain. Thomas has succeeded off the field as well as he was awarded the National Football Foundation's Postgraduate Scholarship and named a finalist for the Draddy Trophy, awarded to college football's top scholar-athlete.

Wasau, Wis., native Mark Zalewski is a three-year letterwinner for the Badgers. The two-time captain has appeared in 49 games for UW, including 36 starts. For the past three seasons Zalewski has been a staple of Wisconsin's solid defense. Last season, in Wisconsin's memorable win over Michigan at Camp Randall, Zalewski led all Badgers with 11 tackles.

**Joe Stellmacher** is a two-year starter for the Badgers. In 2005, the Berlin, Wis., native was named honorable mention All-

Big Ten as well as earning UW's Tom Wiesner Award, which is given to a Wisconsin-born player on the team that displays loyalty, hard work, spirit and dedication. This season, Stellmacher has been a standout on Wisconsin's defense. He has started in all 11 of the Badgers games and is tied for the team lead with 76 tackles.

Four-year letterwinner


Zach Hampton has played in every game for Wisconsin dating back to the start of the 2004 season. The Lancaster, Wis., native has seen action this season as UW's fifth defensive back and punt returner. Earlier this year, in a game vs. San Diego State, Hampton recorded a career-long 29-yard punt return. He is averaging 5.9 yards on 28 punt returns this season.

Defensive lineman Joe
Monty joined the Badgers in
January of 2003. That same season, the Ft. Collins, Colo., native
earned Academic All-Big Ten honors. The
three-year letterwinner has played in 48
games for the Badgers including 24 starts.
Monty has recorded 79 tackles and 4.5
sacks while playing for UW. In this year's
game against Western Illinois, Monty was
named UW's co-defensive player of the
week, the second time in his career that
he has earned the honor.

Roderick Rogers is a two-year starter and four-year letterwinner for UW. The Stone Mountain, Ga., native was a second-team All-Big Ten selection in 2005 as his 1.08 passes defended per game ranked fourth in the Big Ten. Rogers has four career interceptions, including an 84-yard interception return for a TD which ranks as the fifth-longest in school history. Coming into the 2006 season Rogers earned national recognition by being named to the Lott Trophy and Thorpe Award watch lists.

Despite joining the Badgers as a walk-on, **Dywon Rowan** has seen action as a back-up running back this season. Rowan, a native of Erie, Pa., has played in all 11 games for UW, averaging 4.6 yards per carry and scoring two touchdowns.

Johnny White broke onto the scene in a big way for Wisconsin. In his first career start in 2004, White recorded a team-high seven tackles vs. UCF. White also had a critical interception and forced a fumble in the Badgers' upset of

Michigan last season. This year White has played in 10 games, appearing mostly on special teams.

Derek Konkol is a former defensive back who switched to wide receiver his senior season. Defensive lineman Mark Gorman has appeared in all 11 games for the Badgers this season. The three-year letterwinner from the Woodlands, Texas recorded his first career sack earlier this year against Indiana.

Barron, Wis., native **Josh Balts** appeared as a fullback in two of the Badgers' games this season. **Nate Egholm**, a native of Oconomowoc, Wis., switched from running back to defensive back while with the Badgers. **Jeff Holzbauer** joined the Badgers as a walkon in 2002. Since then the Germantown, Wis., native has seen action in 11 games.

Paul Joran is a two-time Academic All-Big ten honoree and three-year letter-winner from Apple Valley, Minn. Offensive lineman Luke Knauf is from Stratford, Wis. Madison, Wis., native Matt Brown is a tight end who joined the team as a walk-on in 2003. Mike Van Someren is an offensive lineman from Somerset, Wis. Finally, Defensive lineman Derek Yentz hails from Wauwatosa, Wis.

# **Bob Bostad Tight Ends**

Bob Bostad (pronounced BO-stad), a state of Wisconsin native who coached the offensive line at New Mexico from 1999-2005, is in his first season as an assistant football coach at Wisconsin.

Bostad coaches the Badgers' tight ends. Bostad's 2005 offensive line featured a pair of first-team all-conference selections, including center Ryan Cook and guard Robert Turner. New Mexico averaged 200 yards per game on the ground in 2005. Cook was a second-round draft choice of the Vikings, while tackle Terrance Pennington was a seventh-round pick of the Bills.

During Bostad's tenure at New Mexico, 14 Lobo offensive linemen earned all-conference mention. Among the players Bostad coached at New Mexico were: tackle Claude Terrell, a third-team A.P. All-American and fourth-round draft choice of the St. Louis Rams (he started as a rookie for the Rams in 2005) and tackle Jason Lenzmeier, who became the first offensive lineman in conference and school history to earn MWC offensive player of the week honors in 2003.

Bostad was offensive line coach (1997-98) and offensive coordinator (1998) at San Jose State prior to his years at New Mexico.

Bostad coached the offensive line at Cal State Northridge in 1995-96 and spent three seasons (1992-94) as an offensive line graduate assistant at Minnesota under head coach Jim Wacker.

Bostad got his coaching start at his alma mater, UW-Stevens Point, where he coached the offensive line from 1990-91.

Bostad graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1989 with a degree in physical education. He was a four-year starter as a linebacker for the Pointers and earned all-conference mention each year. Bostad earned a master's degree in kinesiology from Minnesota in 1994.

Bostad, 39, is a native of Pardeeville, Wis. He and his wife, Cara, have three daughters: Rachel, Bryn and Annika, and a son, John Robert.

# Paul Chryst Off. Coordinator / QBs

Paul Chryst is in his second consecutive season at Wisconsin and his third overall as an assistant coach for the Badgers.

Chryst, UW's co-offensive coordinator and tight ends coach last season, is now the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Chryst, the Badgers' tight ends coach in 2002, returned to Wisconsin in 2005 and his impact on the UW offense was immediately evident. The 2005 Badgers set school records for points scored in a season (446) and for season scoring average (34.3 ppg). The Badger passing game was much improved, with QB John Stocco setting school season records for passing yards, passing TDs and pass completions.

Chryst was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon State in 2003-04. He helped the Beavers rank No. 6 nationally in passing yardage per game and 10th in total offense in 2003. The 2003 Beavers became the first team in Division I history with a 4,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers.

Chryst came to Wisconsin in 2002 after serving as an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers, where he developed Freddie Jones into one of the NFL's top tight ends.

Previously. Chryst was an assistant coach at Oregon State (1997-98), the Saskatchewan Roughriders (1996), Illinois State (1995), the Ottawa Rough Riders (1994), UW-Platteville (1993) and the World League's San Antonio Riders (1991-92). He was a graduate assistant at West Virginia (1989-90).

Chryst was a three-time football letterwinner at Wisconsin, where he earned a degree in political science in 1988. He added a master's degree in educational administration from West Virginia in 1990. Paul's late father. George. was a longtime head coach at UW-Platteville and a former Badger player and assistant coach.

Chryst and his wife, Robin, have three children: Katy, JoJo and Danny.

# Kerry Cooks Defensive Backs

Kerry Cooks, defensive backs coach at the University of Minnesota last season, is in his first year as defensive backs coach at Wisconsin.


Cooks comes to Wisconsin after one year coaching the Golden Gophers' secondary. Minnesota qualified for the Music City Bowl last season, while Cooks' unit allowed opponents to complete just 56.8 percent of their passes (fourth-best in the Big Ten). That figure dropped to 55.3 percent in conference games, tied for second in the league with Penn State.

Prior to his year at Minnesota, Cooks coached defensive backs and assisted or special teams for one season (2004) at Western Illinois. Under Cooks' direction, the Leathernecks limited opponents to a Gateway Conference-best 157.2 passing yards per game; held opponents to the lowest completion percentage (45.4) in the conference; and finished second in the league with 17 interceptions.

Cooks began coaching at his high school alma mater. Nimitz High (Texas). In 2003 before joining the staff at Kansas State as a graduate assistant for the 2003 campaign. While at Kansas State, Cooks worked mostly with defensive game plan preparation and assisted with the Wildcats' secondary. Kansas State registered an 11-4 record in 2003 and won a Big 12 title with a defense that was sixth nationally in total defense.

Cooks was a four-year letterwinner and two-year starter as a strong safety at Iowa from 1994-97. He was a team captain as a senior and earned All-Big Ten honors and a spot in the East-West Shrine Game. A fifthround draft choice of the Minnesota Viking in 1998, Cooks also played for Green Bay. Atlanta and Jacksonville before retiring from the NFL in 2001. He also played for the Chicago Enforcers of the XFL in 2001.

Cooks has played or coached in six bowl games. A 2000 graduate of lowa with a bachelor's degree in sociology, Cooks' wife's name is Valencia.

Prior to his stint at Arizona, Hankwitz was the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Texas A&M (1997-2002) where he guided the Aggies' famed "Wrecking Crew" defense. Among Hankwitz's standout players at Texas A&M was Dat Nguyen, who won the Lombardi and Bednarik Awards, as well as being named Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year.

Hankwitz spent two seasons (1995-96) as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Kansas after enjoying a highly successful 10-year run as defensive coordinator at Colorado from 1985-94. Colorado put together the nation's fifth-best record (58-11-4) from 1989-94, including a national title in 1990, three Big 8 titles, two appearances each in the Orange and Fiesta Bowls and six national top-20 rankings (including three top-five finishes).

Hankwitz was defensive coordinator at Western Michigan from 1982-84 and outside linebackers and punting coach at Purdue from 1977-81. Prior to his time at Purdue, Hankwitz was the outside linebackers and secondary coach at Arizona from 1973-76.

Hankwitz began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1970-72) at his alma mater, Michigan, under head coach Bo Schembechler.

The 58-year-old Hankwitz is a native of Ludington, Mich. He was a three-year football letterwinner for the Wolverines and started on the 1969 Big Ten championship squad. Hankwitz earned a B.S. in education in 1970. He and his wife. Cathy. have a son. Jacob. 12.

# Henry Mason Wide Receivers / Assistant Recruiting Coordinator

Henry Mason is in his 12th season coaching wide receivers at Wisconsin.

Under Mason's guidance, Wisconsin has consistently produced some of the nation's best pass-catchers since the mid-1990s.

Mason's most recent standouts were Brandon Williams and Jonathan Orr, both of whom were selected in the 2006 NFL Draft. Williams, a 2005 second-team All-American, finished his career ranked first in receptions (202) and second in yards (2.924) at Wisconsin. Orr is third all-time at UW with 19 touchdown catches and eighth in school history with 1.824 receiving yards.

Mason also coached Bedford, Ohio, products Lee Evans and Chris Chambers. Evans, a 2001 Biletnikoff Award finalist and first-team All-American, is UW's career leader in receiving yards (3,468) and touchdowns (27) and was a 2004 first-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills. Chambers, a second-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 2001, is fourth on the school's list for career receiving yards with 2,004.

Early in Mason's career at Wisconsin. Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes developed into standout receivers and eventual NFL draft picks.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin in 1995, Mason coached receivers at Western Michigan from 1991-94. Mason was head coach at Smith-Cotton (Mo.) High School from 1982-90. His 1988 team became the first in 13 years at the school to post a winning record. Mason also was an assistant coach at Baker University (1981) and was an assistant coach at Lexington (Mo.) High School (1979-80).

Mason, who has coached in nine bowl games with the Badgers, is a 1979 graduate of Central Missouri State, where he lettered in football and baseball. He was drafted by the Baltimore Colts and played one season with the St. Louis Cardinals.

He coached the 1993 UCLA offensive line that matched up against the Badgers in the 1994 Rose Bowl. Palcic tutored the Southern California offensive line in 1992 and helped the Trojans to a Freedom Bowl appearance. He was offensive line coach at Ohio State from 1986–91.

Arizona's offensive line was under Palcic's direction from 1984–85 (the Wildcats played in the Sun Bowl during that time). A two-year stint (1982–83) with the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts (1983 Grey Cup title) was preceded by a four-year (1978–81) stop as Wisconsin's offensive line coach under head coach Dave McClain.

Palcic was Ball State's offensive line coach in 1976–77 (he went to Wisconsin with McClain, who was Ball State's head coach) and Dayton's linebackers/offensive line coach in 1974–75. He got his college coaching start guiding Ball State's linebackers as a graduate assistant in 1973.

Palcic, 58, is a native of Gowanda, N.Y., and has a bachelor's degree in education (1971) and a master's degree in education (1974), both from Dayton. He was a line-backer for the Flyers from 1968–70. He and his wife, Theresa, have three children: Joe (currently the defensive coordinator at Indiana); Amy (an assistant in the Cleveland Browns media relations office) and Monica, who is married to Philadelphia Eagles LB Mark Simoneau.

# John Settle Running Backs

John Settle is now in his first season as running backs coach at Wisconsin. Settle most recently served eight seasons as running backs coach at Fresno State, where he tutored six 1,000-yard rushers, including Wendell Mathis, who rushed for 1,313 yards and 15 touchdowns along with making 19 catches for 156 yards and a TD for the Bulldogs last season. Rodney Davis set the school rushing record with a 1,586-yard campaign in 2002. Settle also developed Derrick Ward, the 1999 team rushing leader, freshman All-American and current New York Giant. In addition, Settle coached 1998 WAC Pacific Division Offensive Player of the Year Jamie Kimbrough.

Settle went to Fresno State after a three-year stint (1995-98) as an offensive assistant with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens franchise under head coaches Bill Belicheck and Ted Marchibroda. Settle began his coaching career at his alma mater, Appalachian State, where he assisted with running backs in 1994.

Settle was a four-year letterman (1983-86) as a running back at Appalachian State. Settle finished as the school's career rushing leader with 4.409 yards (then third-most in NCAA Division I-AA history) and 43 touchdowns. He was the Southern Conference Player of the Year as a senior after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 TDs.

Settle signed with the Atlanta Falcons as a free agent and played a total of six seasons in the NFL, four with Atlanta (1987-90) and two with the Washington Redskins. He accumulated 1,594 yards of total offense in 1988, becoming the first free agent in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He was named to the Pro Bowl and the All-Madden Team in 1988. He also played for the Redskins' Super Bowl championship team in 1991.

A 1989 graduate of Appalachian State with a degree in criminal justice, Settle and his wife, Karen, have three children:
Jonathan, Leighton and Devynn.



Sports Illustrated on Campus said last fall that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. 

bers (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 for 81 consecutive home games and 71 of them have been sellouts. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game. A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Roooonnn Daaaynnne!", from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez. 



### **Badger Nickname**

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

### **Bucky Badger**

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a

cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-māché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

### **Bud Song**

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

### **Fifth Quarter**

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On. Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

# On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

### **Hall of Fame**

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

# Camp Randall Stadium

# 35 AMECHE 33 DAYNE

ne of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.

#### Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst



# Parents Proud

P.J. Hill's season has surprised some people, but not those who have been around him the longest

here are a few different sides to P.J. Hill. First, there's the 19-year-old East Elmhurst, N.Y., native who, away from the football field, doesn't take himself too seriously. Just ask anyone who calls P.J.'s cell phone.

"If you ever call his cell phone he's got an answering machine saying 'they say beauty is in the eye of the beholder, that's why I look in the mirror every morning and realize how fly I am'," P.J.'s father, Parrish Hill, Sr. said with a laugh. "He loves himself, that's the funniest thing about P.J."

Next, there's the University of Wisconsin student that's always worked hard in the classroom and already has a space reserved on his mother's wall for his college diploma. Prior to UW, Hill attended the prestigious Brooklyn Poly Prep High School and maintained a B or C average while developing a football career.

"Academically he was a good student and that's what we look for here at a school like Poly Prep," Hill's former high school coach Dino Mangiero said. "The work here is very hard so when you find a big kid that's a good football player that's also good academically, you're finding a diamond. Because there's a lot of kids, especially in New York City, that are good athletes, but academically, the 're not strong.'

Then of course, there's P.J. Hill—running back for the Wisconsin Badgers. Aft r shouldering a majority of the 2006 UW offense, Hill has become a househo name amongst Badger fans and in just his first season on the field, is alr ady gaining national attention and Heisman Trophy buzz.

The long road to reach the top of the Hill started when P.J. was eight, playing in a Pop Warner football league in New York. While his mother, Pamela Mo s, never remembers her son struggling on the football field, she does recall a mo nent during the early years where she was worried for her son's safety.

"He was playing football and all of a sudden this kid comes out of no where and pops him one, and he lays out," Moss said. "So I'm running and I'm think-Ing something's wrong because I didn't want him to play football. I'm charging acr ss the field to get to him to see what's happened. He looks up at me and say, 'Mom, get away from me, you're embarrassing me.' So after that, I don't bot ler to go on the field anymore. No matter what happens, I always know he's going to be OK." something's wrong because I didn't want him to play football. I'm charging

Eventually, Hill received recognition while playing Pop Warner, most notably by Mangiero who eventually offered him a scholarship to Pol Prep after being impressed with "the big kid with a big smile".

For Parrish, this was a huge help to jump start his son's football career.

"The school was like \$25,000 a year; I didn't have that," Parrish said. "I've got five children so it paid off to get that little scholarship to go there and ever since then, it just took off from there. He was blessed to go to good schools, always played on good teams, never had a losing season. He just loved the game."

Once P.J. enrolled at Poly Prep, actually getting to school was quite a journey. Hill recalls the sometimes two-and-a-half hour journey on a bad day just to get to school.

"I'd get up at least five in the morning to get myself ready, leave my house like six," Hill said. "Walk to the train station, If I missed the express, I'd have to get on the local, so that's why I'd have to get up real early. But I'd take the express train to Manhattan and then another express train that goes over the bridge to Brooklyn and I'd just catch a train from there and go to the last stop.

"I'd still end up late," he laughed. "I'd wind up at school about 8:30 a.m."

At Poly Prep, Hill did much of what he does on the field at Wisconsin - score ... a lot. In four years, Hill carried 464 times for 4.012 ards and 48 touchdowns. While some recruiters knocked Hill for not having blazing speed, Mangiero still saw him as a very advanced player.

"He was a coach's dream," Mangiero, who coached Hill for one year at Poly Prep before serving as an assistant coach at Indiana, said. When I had him here, he did everything you asked him to do. He was just a real tough, good football player."

Hill hoped to continue his momentum last year with his first season on campus at UW, but after breaking his leg during the Badgers' summer football camp, he was forced to redshirt. For Moss, the injury didn't phase her much since she knew, ever since that Pop Warner ame, that her son would be OK. For Parrish, who Moss jokingly calls the less tough one of the two, watching his son sit on the sidelines was difficult to bear.

"It was hard and I didn't like it but what can you do? I had my whole plans on coming out here last year," Parrish said. "I got my chedule cleared from work and everything, I had my crew coming with me, my brothers and friends and then I had to give them the bad lews that P.J. got hurt, he's going to be out for the whole year. But you move on and he'd say the same thing. Things happen for a reason, you put that behind you."

Now that Hill is a constant fixture on the field, Parrish has his expectations set high. He claims he's never seen his son fumble the all, in any league, and after Hill's 148-yard rushing performance against Penn State and 50 yards against Illinois before leaving early in he game with an injury this season, Dad still wanted more.

This is the first time too since he played Pop Warner football that he hasn't scored a touchdown in two weeks," Parrish said after the enn State game. "That's not P.J. I've got to talk to him about that. I've got to get a touchdown a game, at least one."

In just one year, Hill has done an enormous amount. He became just the third freshman in UW history to reach 1,000 yards, leads the g Ten in rushing, scoring, and touchdowns, but most importantly, has made his parents proud.

"I am amazed," Moss said. "I love the fact that he's doing something that he loves doing. I love the fact that he wants to do this. whatever he wants for himself, I'm going to help him out, stand by him and see that he gets what he needs."

"I'm real proud of my son," Parrish said. "I knew he had the talent playing football but I didn't think he was going to get this high this ast. He's excelling and I just wish the best for him. My dream is that he goes all the way and I told him if anything ever happened to me, God forbid I'm not here, promise me you'll make it. He says to me, 'Daddy, that's one thing I'm going to keep.' And so far he's keeping that promise.'





In Wisconsin's 1961 home finale, the Badgers faced last-place Illinois. The fact that UW trounced the Fighting Illini 55-7 was notable for a number of reasons.

It was the most points UW had scored since putting up 60 against Marquette in the 1957 season-opener. It was also the Badgers' biggest win over a Big Ten opponent since beating Indiana 52-0 on Oct. 20, 1923.

However, what made the day truly memorable was the performance of junior receiver Pat Richter. Richter went to work early, opening the scoring with a 28-yard touchdown reception just 5:50 into the game. In the second quarter he caught a pair of TD passes.

Before halftime Richter already had seven catches for 149 yards and three touchdowns. He added two catches for 21 yards after the break. His totals of nine receptions for 170 yards were both school records and his three TD catches tied the UW record set by Dave Howard in 1955 vs. Iowa.

His 170 yards stood as the single-game school record until Al Toon had 252 yards vs. Purdue in 1983. It is currently the 11th-best mark in school history. Richter is one of only five Badgers to have caught at least three touchdowns in a game (Lee Evans did so twice).

Prior to suffering the injury, the third-round draft pick had moved to the No. 2 position on the Lions' depth chart at running back. For the season, Calhoun had seven rushes for 19 yards and two receptions for 20 yards.

# Daniels Continues to Bill Impress Und

Making his seventh start of the season for the Houston Texans, tight end Owen Daniels helped lead the Texans to a season sweep of division rival Jacksonville. On the day, Daniels hauled in a teamleading four receptions for 55 yards against the NFL's seventh-ranked pass defense in the 13-10 victory. Earlier this season, in the Texans' 27-7 victory over the Jaguars in Houston, Daniels also found success, catching two passes for 20 yards and a touchdown.

The fourth-round pick ranks among the top for rookies in nearly every major receiving category. Daniels currently ranks second in touchdowns (five), fourth in receptions (25) and fifth in yards (262). New Orleans Saints' rookie wide receiver Marques Colston leads all rookies in each category. Daniels currently leads the Texans in touchdowns and ranks third on the team in both receptions and receiving yards.

His success this season has not gone unnoticed by Houston head coach Gary Kubiak. "He's really been special in his own way," Kubiak told houstontexans. com. "He's got a lot of confidence for a young kid. He's going to have a great

very great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

The most well-known of those players is former running back Ron Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior. Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.




Maxwell Award watch list and DE Matt Shaughnessy is on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list.



# Camp Randall Stadium Policies



#### **Conduct Code**

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, the owing objects, and possession of alcohol) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

#### **Smoke-Free Facility**

S oking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including on p Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located whin the stadium perimeter.

#### Entry / No Re-entry

Plase enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most elected eight entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick of Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the gate. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

#### Acohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may re ult in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

#### **Guest Services Center**

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

#### **Emergencies**

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

#### **Lost and Found**

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

#### **Items Not Permitted**

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.



# Nov. 13, 1999 - Wisconsin 41, Iowa 3

Senior Ron Dayne became college football's all-time rushing leader and the Badgers claimed their first undisputed Big Ten championship since 1962 with a 41-3 rout of Iowa before a delirious crowd in Madison. The win also gave Wisconsin at trip to the Rose Bowl.

Dayne's record-breaking 31-yard carry came with 4:32 left in the opening half. Dayne, who needed just 99 yards entering the game to claim the mark, played only through the third quarter and left the game to standing ovation with 216 yards rushing.

The special day ended when head coach Barry Alvarez accepted the Big Ten championship trophy and an invitation to Pasadena. Dayne was honored when a tarp was removed from the facade at the stadium, revealing "33 Dayne" in a tribute to the tailback.

# Nov. 6, 2004 - Wisconsin 38, Minnesota 14

Wisconsin scored touchdowns on its first four possessions to claim a 38-14 win over Minnesota at Camp Randall Stadium. First-year starting quarterback John Stocco got things started with a 1-yard run on the Badgers' opening possession. Stocco then threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to Jonathan Orr to go up 14-0. Anthony Davis scored twice, once at the end of the first quarter and against early in the second quarter, as UW jumped out to a 28-0 lead. The two teams played in front of 83,069 fans in Camp Randall, the second-largest crowd in the stadium's history. The win gave the Badgers an undefeated 6-0 mark at home and also improved the team's overall record to 9-0 on the year.

# Nov. 21, 1998 - Wisconsin 24, Penn State 3

The 13th-ranked Badgers got on the board late in the first quarter when Nick Davis returned a Penn State punt 82 yards for the first touchdown of the game. Wisconsin went on to upend the Nittany Lions, ranked 14th in the nation, 24-3. The victory clinched a spot in the Rose Bowl for UW.

In the second quarter, Chris Chambers made it 14-0 when he caught a 26-yard pass from quarterback Mike Samuel. Just before halftime, Matt Davenport converted a 38-yard field goal to put Wisconsin up 17-0. The Badger defense was just as stingy in the second half of play, and Penn State was only able to get a field goal in the third quarter. An insurance touchdown came with just under 12 minutes to play in the final period. Samuel took it in himself with a 1-yard run to put to game out of reach.

Ron Dayne collected 95 yards on the afternoon while Samuel rushed for 89 yards of his own. On the defensive side of the football, Jason Doering tallied 13 tackles while Donnel Thompson had 12 and Chris Ghidorzi recorded 10.

# Nov. 23, 2002 - Wisconsin 49, Minnesota 31

Anthony Davis racked up 301 yards and a school record-tying five touchdowns on 45 carries as Wisconsin defeated Minnesota 49-31 to become bowl eligible and regain Paul Bunyan's axe.

Fellow sophomore Jim Leonhard picked off two passes late in the game to seal the victory. Leonhard's two interceptions gave him 10 for the season, which set a program record. Quarterback Brooks Bollinger, playing his last game at Camp Randall Stadium, produced his eighth career fourth-quarter comeback by leading the Badgers to three touchdowns in the final frame. Bollinger scored the eventual game-winner with 10:21 remaining on a quarterback sneak.

Wisconsin rushed for a season-high 416 yards and had 550 yards in total offense.

# Bowling with the Badgers

ver the last 13 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' eight bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College, Nebraska and Ohio State. UW has participated in 11 bowl games over the past 13 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made seven appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its second consecutive January bowl game, trouncing seventh-ranked Auburn 24-10 to capture the Capital One Bowl. That contest marked the final game in the head coaching career of Barry Alvarez.

It was fitting that Alvarez's last game was a bowl victory since he led UW to an 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games. That is the best bowl winning percentage in NCAA history among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.







## **Badgers Give Back**



In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a community service project to give back to Madison.




Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.




Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.



## The Big Ten Conference

#### This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$89 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2005-06, the Big Ten distributed over \$117 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

 Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.

- Big Ten Universities have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- Big Ten Universities house on their campuses nine of the nation's 30 largest academic libraries. Conference libraries hold more than 66 million book volumes and institutions freely share their materials with other league members.
- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Based on the federal graduation rate average for the 1995-98 freshman classes. Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 70 percent compared to 62 percent for all Division I student-athletes. As a conference, student-athletes tend to graduate at rates consistent with the general student body (71 percent). In 2006, the NCAA also introduced a new calculation—the Graduation Success Rate (GSR)—that accounts for transfer student-athletes. The Big Ten's GSR was 81 percent compared to the Division I average of 76 percent.

- The Big Ten recognized 1.992
  Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2005-06 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged nearly 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- The Big Ten has claimed at least four team national championships in seven of the last nine full seasons, including six national titles during 1999-2000 alone, the most for the conference in more than a decade. Big Ten national champions in 2005-06 included Northwestern women's lacrosse and three national crowns for Wisconsin in men's cross country and men's and women's ice hockey.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally regionally and locally last year, represent ing over 600 hours of programming.
- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2005–06 more than 8.2 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

#### BIG TEN INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

Beginning with this season, all Division-I conferences and independent institutions will have the option of using a version of instant replay standardized by the NCAA – a system based upon an instant replay model created by the Big Ten Conference three years ago.

The objective of football instant replay is to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during games. Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of <u>indisputable video evidence</u> is met can a play be overturned. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

Head coaches may now utilize a timeout to request a review of a play no more than once per game. A coach initiates this challenge by taking a timeout before the ball is in play and informing the official that the ruling on the previous play is being challenged. If the ruling is overturned, the timeout will be returned to the team. If the ruling is not overturned, the team will lose that timeout. A team must have a timeout in order for the coach to challenge a play and a coach can only challenge one play per game. Head coaches may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped by the Technical Advisor and a decision has already been made on that specific ruling. If a head coach requests a timeout to challenge a ruling and the play is not reviewable, the team will lose that timeout. The Technical Advisor will continue to examine all reviewable plays during a game.

The Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game can initiate reviews throughout the game. The head coach can initiate one review per game by calling a timeout. Game officials may not ask for a review.

## **NCAA** Guidelines





#### hat Every Badger Fan hould Know

n increasing numbers of NCAA rules erning outside intervention in recruitcoaches cannot afford to have any ca "help" in recruiting elite studentletes to the University of Wisconsin. In penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... for are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

 b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

 c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

 d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications

with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

#### What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

#### **Extra Benefit Rule**

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;

 b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect; d) providing use of an automobile;

 e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing:

 f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above:

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.


#### **Employment**

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;
- Compensation for only work actually performed; and
- Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. ## What's Happening on Campus

## UW Student Rescues Animals

In her spare time, Tracey Hageny, a fourth-year veterinary medical student at the UW-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine, rescues animals.

Although that may sound routine for someone about to enter the veterinary medical profession, Hageny takes her commitment a step further. She just attained federal nonprofit status for an animal rescue group that she established several years ago.

Hageny is the founder and executive director of Animal Rescue and Veterinary Support Services (ARVSS), an organization committed to rescuing and providing veterinary care to animals in need.

"It certainly has been a challenge starting and running a rescue while doing all that paperwork (while) being a full-time veterinary student," Hageny admits.

The nonprofit status gives ARVSS legitimacy. The organization is local, though they work with the national Petfinder online database to adopt out their available animals. Its first grant will allow the organization to treat heartworm-positive dogs in both its and other rescue organizations in the area.

ARVSS finds animals on trips with the Rural Animal Veterinary Service, a nonprofit arm of the Humane Society of the United States and the Fund for Animals that brings veterinary services to underserved rural communities. In addition, Hageny works with an online national network of people who want to find adoption options for animals that will otherwise be euthanized.

"We monitor the online notices, and when we have an open foster slot and there is an animal in need that we can help, we ask that the animal be sent to us," she says. "Then we organize transportation to Madison."

Upon arrival, the animals are spayed or neutered, fully vaccinated, checked for heartworms, placed on flea, tick and heartworm preventative, and given identification microchips.

To date, they've found permanent homes for more than 70 dogs. Rescues have ranged from puppies produced by non-neutered dogs on the Red Lake Reservation in Minnesota (where adoption rates are low due to poverty) to dogs scheduled for euthanasia in overcrowded Ohio shelters.

"It's a lot of work, but the animals seem to thrive," she says.

Hagney's work has paid off in more ways than one, earning her the Patricia Hassemen Fellowship in 2006, which provides \$1,500 in tuition.

"I realize the need for affordable veterinary care for rescues and shelters and the need for practices to make money, rather than give services away," Hageny says. "I believe our federal nonprofit can act as a middleman for these services."



#### Famous Alums Laud Political Science

Despite different views on many issues, some leading politicians from both ends of the political spectrum have agreed on at least one thing: A UW-Madison political science degree is instrumental in their lives and public service careers.

Several well-known political science graduates, including Vice President Dick Cheney, a Republican, and Democratic U.S. Sen. Russ Feingold, contributed brief essays for the department's alumni newsletter focusing on what their UW-Madison education means to them.

"I can draw a straight line from my decision to study at the University of Wisconsin to the career in public service that I've found so deeply rewarding," wrote Cheney, who completed all but a dissertation while studying for his doctorate at UW-Madison in the 1960s.

Feingold, who has served Wisconsin in the Senate since 1993, wrote that excellent faculty has given the department its strong reputation.

"The debates and conversations I had in class more than 30 years ago still come back to me, and they still help guide my decisions as the Senate deliberates both domestic issues and foreign policy," he wrote.

Other notable UW alumni, including Roberta Draper, producer of congressional news at NBC, and Ron Bonjean, press secretary to U.S. House Speaker Dennis Hastert, offered similar perspectives.

Graham Wilson, professor of political science and department chair, says the essays point to how classroom experiences can translate to the world of public policy and life in general.

"The education we offer is valued by both liberals and conservatives, both Republicans and Democrats," Wilson says. "These essays demonstrate how students over the years have used their political science educations as a springboard to public service, and how their knowledge has transformed public policy and public dialogue in very meaningful ways."





## Excerpts from "Don't Flinch"



July 29, 2005, Barry Alvarez announced that he was stepping down as head coach at the end the season and Bret Bielema would succeed him.

hen I took the athletic director's job, I wanted to make sure I had the opportunity to name my successor.

Chancellor John Wiley agreed and said, "Nobody has invested as much in the p ogram as you have, and you should have that right."

During the 2004 season, I watched the way Bret Bielema handled things. And I started thinking, "This is a guy who's going to be a head coach. He has an air about him."

If possible, I wanted to hire somebody from my staff.

I thought it would be easier on the players — as long as it was the right guy and I felt it was somebody who could be successful at Wisconsin.

Potentially you could protect more coaches that way, too.

This is a state and university where you have to have the right person in place. You'll have a problem if that person doesn't understand the nuances of how things work here.

You'll also have a problem if that person has a personality that doesn't fit and there isn't a chemistry or mesh with the people.

I thought Bret Bielema was the right

I have always kept a short list of coaches, and I would occasionally put them in a pecking order. Every year the list would change because my hottest guys were moving on.

Each week the Badger Football Gameday Program will print an excerpt from "Don't Flinch - Barry Alvarez: The Autobiography" written by UW Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez with Mike Lucas of the Capital Times. It never got to the point where I actually talked to somebody else.

I saw everything I needed to see in Bret Bielema.

He was a very progressive thinker. He was very passionate about what he does. He was a guy who lived it 24/7. And he knew how to win.

I have been asked if I saw myself in Bret.

Yeah, I did.

But I wasn't looking for that.

Some things are different, some things are similar.

I had some things that were important to me as I was looking for a head coach.

One of the most important was having a presence.

If you don't have that, you're vulnerable. Bret has a presence as well as an ability to look at the big picture.

Not many assistants do.

Most assistant coaches worry about their own world.

When you discuss issues and you're trying to make decisions for the program, most assistants are going to make recommendations that are self-serving because it fits them better — it fits their personnel and what they want to be doing — even if it may not be best for the overall program.

In all of Bret's recommendations, in all of the things that he brought up and talked about, he was always focused on the big picture and winning — as a program. He was also very perceptive.

I had a chance to visit with Purdue athletic director Morgan Burke at the Big Ten meetings and we discussed their transition in basketball from Gene Keady to Matt Painter.



We talked about the benefits of Painter serving one year as an assistant under Keady — to learn the ropes — before taking over the program himself. That sold me on the process.

Over a period of time, I got together with Bret and we just talked; whether it was in my office, on the field or during our noonhour walks to Picnic Point.

That gave me a feel for how he would handle certain things. I finally said, "You know what? I'm planning on stepping down as head coach. I like what you've done. I want you to be the next head coach here."

I think he was thrilled and dumb-founded.

Bret later said, "When Barry first threw that out at me, we were alone and yet we weren't — we were still in a public environment with people around us, and I didn't know whether to high five or hug him.

"There was so much emotion. It took me by surprise. I still can't remember exactly what happened. I was caught totally off-guard."

\*\*\*

I don't ever want Bret looking over his shoulder.

This is his show.

"Go with your heart, go with what you believe," I told him, "and have a little vision and confidence in what you see.

"Don't be overwhelmed. Don't make it bigger than what it is. This job is about solving problems and breaking them down to their simplest form."

Seems to me another young coach — who was taking over a college program for the first time — got the same advice from Lou Holtz.

It seemed to work out.



#### Badger Billboard: Grapplers Take to the Mat



Returning All-American Craig Henning led the Badgers with a 29-10 record last season.

The Wisconsin wrestling team launches its 2006-07 campaign with 16 returning letterwinners, some excellent transfers and an acclaimed group of young freshmen. If these groups can blend together, the Badgers should develop into a solid team by tournament time.

Head coach Barry Davis returns five NCAA qualifiers from a year ago, including junior All-American Craig Henning at 157 pounds. Henning led the Badgers with a 29-10 record last season.
