President Werner suggested that suitable pictures be taken of the house before it is razed, because of its historic importance.

Members of the University Campus Planning Commission may be represented at meetings of the Commission by substitutes designated by them from time to time, and said substitutes shall have the same powers as the members by whom appointed.

b. STEERING COMMITTEE OF THE UNIVERSITY CAMPUS PLANNING COMMISSION

The Steering Committee of the Campus Planning Commission shall be appointed from the membership of the Commission by the Chairman of the Commission.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the State Building Commission be requested to appropriate \$18,000 for the purchase of the property located at 820 Irving Place and \$16,000 for the purchase of the property located at 434 Sterling Court.

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Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the State Building Commission be requested to approve the use of unexpended balances in appropriations and allotments for permanent improvements and balances in contract research overhead funds for various remodeling and improvement projects approved by the President of the University.

In answer to a question as to the amounts involved under the above action, Vice President Peterson reported that the unexpended balances in appropriations and allotments for permanent improvements amounted to approximately \$10,000 and the balances in contract research overhead funds amounted to approximately \$89,000.

Regent Laird inquired as to progress made in obtaining data regarding the employment of campus planning experts at other universities. President Werner stated that a report on this subject had been made at the meeting of the Business and Finance Committee on October 15, and, at his request, Vice President Peterson reviewed the information contained in that report. Vice President Peterson stated that the Business and Finance Committee had concluded that the matter should be studied further and discussed with the appropriate state officials. President Werner pointed out that a particular board of regents cannot bind the hands of subsequent boards regarding plans for the development of the University campus. Regent Arveson stated that he was not interested in obtaining the advice of a consulting architect regarding the designing of individual buildings, but rather in regard to the long-range overall design of the campus; and he stated he believed reasonable men would be bound subsequently by a well thought out plan. There was mention made of the various long-range campus development plans which had been adopted in the past, including the Paul Cret plan of about 1908, the State Planning Board plan of 1941, and the long-range campus development plan, which included development south of University Avenue, which was adopted by the Regents in 1946. There was discussion of the crowded condition of the buildings on the present campus and the futility of developing a long-range campus development plan as evidenced by the rejection by the Legislature of the plan for campus expansion south of University Avenue. It was suggested that the question of further expansion of the University south of University Avenue should be discussed with state officials and members of the Legislature. Regent Arveson suggested that the matter of development of the long-range plan be referred to the Educational Committee of the Regents. Regent Watson suggested that the University Campus Planning Commission study the question of whether the old campus has been developed as best it can be. There being no objection, President Werner referred to the Educational Committee of the Regents for study the matter of the long-range development of the University campus.

President Werner announced the appointment of the following Regents to the Special Regent Committee on the School of Education Deanship:

REPORT ON

MIDWESTERN UNIVERSITIES RESEARCH ASSOCIATION

1. Last spring the Regents accepted \$10,000 from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to be used as the University of Wisconsin's contribution to the working capital of a cooperative organization of midwestern universities established for the purpose of doing research in physics and particularly for the purpose of obtaining a high voltage accelerator, or cosmotron, for the midwest.
2. The organization, known as the Midwestern Universities Research Association, now has been incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation under the laws of Illinois.
3. The By-Laws of the Corporation provide that the cooperating institutions, which are the universities of Minnesota, Iowa, Iowa State, Illinois, Indiana, Purdue, Michigan, and Wisconsin, shall be associated members. Each of these universities is to name two persons, one with scientific training and one with administrative experience, who will be the individual members of the corporation. The associated members have no vote. All voting rights are vested in the individual members. This arrangement has been made in order to avoid any possibility of institutional liability for the acts of the corporation.
4. Furthermore, the By-Laws of the Corporation provide as follows:

"Article XIII Limitation Upon Liability of Associated Members

Except for the obligation to contribute funds to the working capital of the corporation as an initial condition to membership, associated members do not assume any responsibility or liability either in their individual capacities or jointly, financially or legally, for any action taken or not taken by the corporation or its board of directors. The persons elected by the associated members to be individual members of the corporation have no power or authority, individually or collectively, to act as agents for or to make any commitments binding upon any associated member."

The question of whether the University of Wisconsin may legally participate in the Midwestern Universities Research Association has been discussed with Assistant Attorney General Warren Resh, who has informally advised as follows:

"The Regents of the University of Wisconsin have very broad powers under ch. 36 of the statutes and so far as we are aware it has never been considered improper for the Regents to participate as members in associations made up of similar institutions, e.g., association of land grant colleges and I believe there is some national association to which the University belongs that has something to do with the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

"Neither the Regents nor University officials nor the new corporation could create any indebtedness on the part of the state or give away property under trusteeship but it is the personal view of the writer that there is nothing in the articles or by-laws of the new corporation which would preclude, without additional legislation, participation therein by the Regents on the limited basis provided in the documents submitted."

Consequently, unless there is objection, we would like to have the record show that this report was made at this meeting and that the University of Wisconsin will participate in the Midwestern Universities Research Association.

I should mention that there are no new developments with reference to a site for the cosmotron. If funds for the equipment are made available, and if the generator is not placed at a national laboratory, there is a good chance that Wisconsin can have it if we want it.
