The UW has appeared in the "Big Dance" the last seven years in a row and nine out of the last 10 years.

In the last 13 years, Wisconsin has made 11 appearances in the NCAA tournament and are 19-11. Wisconsin's best finish came in 2000 when it advanced to the NCAA championship for the first time in program history. The Badgers have also made three appearances in NCAA regional finals (elite eight).

In addition to NCAA post-season play, the Badgers also won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship twice during its seven-year history. Wisconsin won the inaugural NIVC in 1989 and the final championship in 1995.

2001 Champions Record: 19-1

For the first time in program history, Wisconsin won back-to-back Big Ten titles. The 19-1 record tied the 1997 team for best conference record in program history. Wisconsin joined Penn State and Illinois as the only schools to win outright (not shared with another school) back-to-back conference titles since 1985 when double round-robin play was initiated.

The Badgers opened the conference season with 11 straight wins including 3-0 wins over No. 10 Penn State, No. 11 Ohio State and No. 21 Minnesota. Wisconsin began the second-half of the Big Ten season with a 3-1 win at No. 10

Ohio State before falling at No. 13 Penn State in five games. The Badgers won the remaining eight league matches to clinch their fourth Big Ten title.

2000 Champions Record: 18-2

Wisconsin won its third Big Ten Conference title in 2000 and its second outright championship. The Badgers battled Minnesota all season long for the league title with teams sharing the conference lead most of the year.

The Badgers opened the 2000 league season with a 3-0 win over defending NCAA and Big Ten champion Penn State in front of 3,549 fans in the UW Field

House. Wisconsin won its next two matches by 3-0 scores before falling in five games to 19th-ranked Ohio State. The UW won its next 11 matches including a 3-0 win at No. 5 Minnesota, a 3-1 win over No. 19 Michigan State at home, a 3-1 win over No. 7 Minnesota in the Field House and avenged its earlier loss to Ohio State with a 3-1 win in Columbus. The winning streak came to an end as Wisconsin lost at 11th-ranked Penn State, 2-3.

The Badgers wrapped up the Big Ten season with four straight wins and clinched a share of the title with a win at Michigan State on Nov. 25. A loss by coleader Minnesota at Ohio State gave Wisconsin the title outright.

1997 Co-Champions Record: 19-1

Wisconsin shared the 1997 Big Ten Conference title with Penn State as both teams finished with 19-1 records.

The Badgers opened the season with three straight wins, all over ranked teams, before travelling to State College, Pa., for their first match-up with the Nittany Lions. Penn State, which was ranked No. 1 at the time, came out on top 3-0 to take the league lead.

Wisconsin rebounded by winning its next six matches before facing Penn State at home on Halloween night. This time it was the Badgers who came out on top 3-1 in front of 6,118 fans in the UW Field House. The UW won its last nine matches of the season and clinched a share of the title with a 3-0 win over Iowa at home on Nov. 29.

BIG TEN VOLLEYBALL CHAMPIONS 1990

1990 Champions Record: 16-2


Wisconsin won its first Big Ten Conference title in 1990, when there were still only 10 teams in the league.

The Badgers won their first four matches of the season before losing at Indiana, 0-3. Wisconsin rebounded with eight straight wins including a 3-1 victory over league-leading Purdue in the Field House. The Boilermakers returned the favor in November with a 3-1 win in West Lafayette, Ind.

The Badgers maintained a one-match lead over the Boilermakers throughout the last two weeks of the season. Wisconsin clinched the title on the road with 3-0 wins at Michigan and Michigan State in the last weekend of the conference season.


Byrd earned second-team honors in 2002 becoming only the second UW left-side hitter to earn the honor.

Byrd was a four-year starter for the Badgers and ranks among their best allaround players. She ranks among the top UW players in career kills (sixth with 1,270), attack attempts (6th/3,527), service aces (8th/120) and digs (2nd/1397). Byrd became only the fourth player in UW history to record over 1,000 kills and 1,200 digs

During her four years, Byrd aided Wisconsin to two Big Ten Conference titles, four NCAA tournament bids including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish.

Byrd was an unanimous All–Big Ten selection in 2002 and earned honorable mention honors in 2001. As a senior, she was named to the all-region team and picked up four all-tournament honors. She was also named to the Big Ten All-Freshman team. Byrd was a three-time Academic All–Big Ten honoree.

A member of the 2003 U.S. National Training Team during the spring, Byrd also trained with the U.S. National A-2 program in 2002.



MORGAN SHIELDS


Third Team—2002 Watertown, Wis.

Shields became the third UW setter to earn All-America honors when she was selected to the third team in 2002 as a junior.

Shields ranked fourth in the nation and led the Big Ten Conference with 13.91 assists per game. She was also among the nation's top servers averaging 0.52 aces per game.

As a junior, she earned All–Big Ten and all-region honors. Shields was twice named the Big Ten Player of the Week in 2002 and was also named the MVP of the InnTowner Invitational. She is a two-time Academic All–Big Ten honoree.

Shields has been a member of two Big Ten championship and four NCAA tournament teams.



SHERISA LIVINGSTON

First Team—2000, 2001 Simi Valley, Calif.


Livingston became the first Wisconsin player to earn first-team All-America honors in 2000. In 2001, she became the Badgers' first two-time first-team All-American.

Livingston wrapped up her career as the UW's all-time kill leader with 1,912. She also set the career hitting percentage mark at .366.

During her four years with the Badgers, she aided the team to four NCAA tournament appearances including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish. Wisconsin also won two Big Ten Conference titles during her career.

Livingston was named the 2000 co-Big Ten Player of the Year and the 2000–01 Wisconsin Female Athlete of the Year. She is a three-time All–Big Ten selection and a four-time AVCA all-region selection. Livingston was also named the 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

A nine-time all-tournament selection, Livingston was a member of the U.S. Junior National Team in 1998 and 1999, and was named the best blocker at the 1999 World Junior Championships.



LIZZY FITZGERALD

Second Team—2000, 2001 New Orleans, La.

Lizzy Fitzgerald earned second-team All-America honors in 2000 and 2001. She joins Sherisa Livingston and Kelly Kennedy as the only two-time All-Americans in program history.

During her four years with the Badgers, Fitzgerald was a member of four NCAA tournament teams including the 2000 NCAA runner-up squad. She was also a member of two Big Ten Conference championship teams.

As a junior and senior, Fitzgerald was one of the top setters in the country. She ranked fourth in assists per game in 2001 with 13.72. Fitzgerald set the UW four-game match record for assists with 78.

Fitzgerald was a two-time AVCA National Player of the Week, earning the first-ever honor for a Badger in 2000. She was the 2001 Big Ten Player of the Year and also earned All–Big Ten honors in 2000. Fitzgerald was a two-time AVCA all-region honoree and a four-time all-tournament selection.

Fitzgerald played professionally in Puerto Rico and is currently a member of the U.S. National team. She also trained with the U.S. National A-2 program during the summers of 1999 and 2001.



JENNY Maastricht


Second Team—1999 Silver Lake, Wis.

Jenny Maastricht earned second-team All-America honors in 1999 after leading the Badgers with 3.80 kills and 0.32 service aces per game. The right-side hitter also ranked second on the team with 1.11 blocks per game

Maastricht was one of the Badgers' most versatile players ever. She came to the UW as a middle blocker and switched to right-side hitter as a sophomore. After playing two years in that position, the 6-1 Maastricht was switched to left-side hitter as a senior.

Maastricht was a two-time All–Big Ten and all-region selection. She was named the AVCA National Player of the Week on Oct. 30, 2000, and was also a two-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Maastricht earned six all-tournament honors during her career.

Maastricht trained with the U.S. National Team during the winter and spring of 2001. She was also part of the A-2 program in 1999.



KELLY KENNEDY


Second Team—1997, 1998 Barrington Hills, III.

Kelly Kennedy was a two-time All-American earning second-team honors in 1997 and 1998. She led the Badgers to back-to-back appearances in NCAA regional finals and a share of the 1997 Big Ten Conference title.

Kennedy ranks second on the UW's career list for hitting percentage at .339. She also ranks third in kills (1,406), third in block assists (454) and third in total blocks (555).

The 6-4 middle blocker was a threetime All–Big Ten selection and a two-time all-region honoree. She was a five-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week.

Kennedy trained with the U.S. National Team A-2 program in 1999 and played with the Chicago Thunder of the USPV.



AMY LEE

Second Team—1997 Milwaukee, Wis.


Amy Lee earned second-team All-America honors in 1997 after leading the Badgers to a share of the Big Ten Conference title and an appearance in the NCAA regional final.

Known for her powerful left-handed kill, the 6-0 opposite hitter led the Badgers with 3.74 kills per game as a senior. She also ranked third on the team with 1.05 blocks per game.

Lee ended her career as the UW's alltime kill leader with 1,661 and ranks first in total attempts with 4,129. She also ranks fourth in block assists with 430 and seventh in total blocks with 454.

Lee was a unanimous pick for the 1997 All–Big Ten team and also earned all-region honors. She was an eight-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Academic All–Big Ten honoree.

Lee currently serves as an assistant coach at Marquette University.



LAURA ABBINANTE

Second Team—1996 Itasca, III.


Laura Abbinante became Wisconsin's second All-American and its first setter to earn the honor in 1996. She guided the Badgers to the NCAA regional semifinals in 1996 and to the NIVC title in 1995. Abbinante averaged 13.32 assists per game as a senior, which ranked 19th in the nation.

The 5-9 setter is the UW career record holder for assists with 5,833. She also ranks in the top 10 in service aces, digs, block assists and total blocks.

Abbinante is a two-time All–Big Ten and two-time all-region selection. She was an 11-time all-tournament selection and competed in two U.S. Olympic Festivals.

LISA BOYD


Second Team—1990 Dalton, III.

Lisa Boyd set a number of firsts for Wisconsin Volleyball. She was the first All-American earning second-team honors in 1990 and leading the Badgers to their first NCAA tournament appearance. She was also the first UW Big Ten Player of the Year leading Wisconsin to its first conference title in 1990.

The 6-0 middle blocker ended her career ranking among the top 10 in every category except assists. She still ranks third in block solos (113), fourth in total blocks (523) and fifth in block assists (410).

Boyd was a unanimous All–Big Ten selection in 1990 and an all-region honoree. She led the Big Ten in blocking in 1989 and 1990 and was a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Boyd was named the most valuable player of the inaugural NIVC in 1989 as the Badgers won the team title. She was also named the UW's Female Athlete of the Year for 1990–91.










WISCONSIN FIELD HOUSE

The first time you walk into the UW Field House during a volleyball match, you feel the excitement that is Wisconsin Volleyball. The band is playing, thousands of fans are yelling "Point Wisconsin," Bucky Badger is dancing, and the UW team is on the court winning!

Badger fans make the UW Field House one of the loudest and most intimidating venues for opposing teams in the nation. Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top five in the nation in attendance, and Badger fans are known for being very knowledgeable about the sport of volleyball.

Badgers' Home

The Wisconsin Field House has been the permanent home of the Badger volleyball team since 1986. In 1998, the volleyball team took over sole possession of the Field House adding a Sport Court and improving its locker room facilities.

The first volleyball match played in the Field House was on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin played host to the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship on Oct. 29.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to two tournaments. Wisconsin's play in the Field House was sporadic until 1986 when the official move occurred.



Wisconsin ranks among the top three teams in the country in attendance and has led the Big Ten Conference in attendance six times including in 2001.

A Tough Place to Play

Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten Conference title and competed in their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become one of the toughest places to play in the country.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance for the last 13 years including third-place rankings in 1997, 2000, 2001 and 2002. In 2001, the

Badgers set the Big Ten regular-season record with 3,745 spectators per match. In 2002, Wisconsin set the Big Ten attendance record for conference-only matches with 3,954 fans.


Wisconsin has led the league in attendance seven years—1990, 1991, 1994, 1997, 2000, 2001 and 2002.

1993 NCAA Championship

The Field House was the site of the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship which drew then-record crowds. A total of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 for the championship match. That figure set the NCAA

single-match attendance record and still ranks as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

The Field House was also the site of the No. 7 attendance of all time when 10,935 fans watched the Badgers defeat Illinois in the first round of the 1990 NCAA tournament.

Volleyball Specific

Since 1998, the Badger volleyball team has been the sole occupant of the Field House in the fall. One significant improvement is a permanent Sport Court for all home matches and practices. The Badgers also moved into new locker room facilities with a team lounge and study area separate from the team's home locker room. A complete renovation of the locker room area, including a photo display of Big Ten championship teams, is in progress.

The Field House has a total of four locker rooms for hosting tournaments as well as an athletic training room and equipment room.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

ne of the premier volleyball leagues in the country, the Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. Teams play a double round-robin schedule facing each other at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

The league champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 2002, a record-tying eight Big Ten universities competed in the NCAA volleyball championship.

Members of the Big Ten have competed in the NCAA Championship match 12 times including Wisconsin in 2000. Penn State won the 1999 NCAA Championship and is a six-time championship participant. Illinois and Ohio State have each made two championship appearances and Michigan State one.

Did You Know?

The Big Ten Conference has led the nation in total volleyball attendance nine out of the last 12 years including in 2001 and 2002.

In 2001, the league drew a total of 227,232 spectators for the season for an average of 1,438 fans per match, which was first in the nation. Five schools ranked in the top 25 nationally for average attendance. Wisconsin ranked third in the nation and led the Big Ten with an average of 3,527 spectators per match.

Minnesota and Penn State both ranked in the top 10 nationally with averages of 2,333 (5th) and 2,122 (7th), respectively. Michigan State ranked 12th (1,802) and Illinois ranked 21st (1,251).

Athletic programs in the Big Ten ...

- ♦ had more than 8,500 student-athletes playing on over 270 teams in 2001-02.
 Those student-athletes received over \$68 million in direct financial aid.
- graduate at a rate 10 percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.
- annually recognize more than 1,400 student-athletes who achieve a "B" grade point average or better on the Academic All-Conference teams.
- have won more than 185 team titles and 1,250 individual titles.
- ♦ are some of the most competitive in the country. The Big Ten has placed four schools among the top 20 in the final NACDA Directors' Cup standings, which annually recognizes the nation's top athletic programs, in six of the Cup's eight years of existence.
- were all ranked among the top 29 in the country in a first-of-its-kind analysis by *The Sporting News* (September 1999) of all 112 Division I-A athletic programs (that play football and men's basketball).
- showcases more than 250 events that are televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 550 hours of programming.
- are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball and wrestling. During the 2002-03 season, more than 8.5 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE MISSION STATEMENT

STEVE LOWE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Then Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, its first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball All-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors.

Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.


Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten home opener is designated "Steve Lowe Night" in honor of the former coach. This year's match is Friday, Sept. 26 vs. Northwestern.

In addition, a Badger volleyball player who exemplifies Steve's love of the game is named the recipient of the Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship.





native of the Madison area, Pete Waite is happy to be home and the Badgers are happy he returned. Ever since he became the UW's head coach, Wisconsin has reached a new level of success. In his four years, the Badgers have advanced to the NCAA tournament all four seasons, including a second-place finish in 2000; won two Big Ten Conference titles; and garnered two Big Ten Players of the Year.


With four straight NCAA tournament appearances under his belt, Waite has done what no other UW coach could accomplish. The Badgers best finish came in 2000 when they advanced to the NCAA championship match. Wisconsin advanced to the regional semifinals in 2001 and to second-round action in 1999 and 2002.

Wisconsin won Big Ten titles in 2000 and 2001 and has never finished lower than second in the conference. In 2000 and 2001, the Badgers won the Big Ten with 19-1 marks. Wisconsin tied for second in 1999 and 2002.

Waite was named the Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Regional Coach in 2000 and 2001.

Waite, 43, has coached five All-Americans, nine AVCA All-Region selections, six conference players of the year, and 24 first-team all-conference honorees. He has had eight athletes on all-newcomer teams and two earned newcomer of the year recognition.

In 2001, Sherisa Livingston became



the first UW player to earn consecutive first-team All-America honors while Lizzy Fitzgerald earned her first first-team honor after receiving second-team honors in 2000. Fitzgerald was also named the Big Ten Player of the Year, following in the footsteps of Livingston who captured the award in 2000.

Waite came to Wisconsin from Northern Illinois University where he was the all-time winningest volleyball coach in program history. He had an 11year record of 266-102 (.723 winning percentage) including nine 20-win seasons. The Huskies were 81-19 (.810) in his last three years including three consecutive NCAA tournament bids. Northern appeared in four NCAA tournaments under Waite, advancing to the second round three times including in 1997 when it lost to national runner-up Penn State. The Huskies also appeared in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1991, '92, and '94, and declined an invitation to the NIVC in 1995.


Northern Illinois won eight regularseason conference titles and six conference tournaments under Waite. The Huskies won the 1998 Mid-American Conference regular season title and the 1997 MAC Tournament. He has earned three conference coach of the year honors including the 1997 Mid-American Coach of the Year.

Prior to being named the head coach at Northern Illinois, Waite spent two years as an assistant coach at Illinois State. In 1984 and 1985, he was the head coach at Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, Ill., leading the Cyclones to the 1985 North Central Community College Conference championship. Waite was named the conference coach of the year in 1985.

Waite spent one year as the director and coach of the Chicago Power Junior Volleyball Club in Orland Park, Ill., and two years as a coach with the 2nd City Junior Volleyball Club in Chicago. He started his coaching career in 1981 at Muncie (Ind.) Northside High School and spent the next year as a junior varsity coach at his alma mater, Monona Grove (Wis.) High School. Waite also coached one year at Bremen High School in Midlothian, Ill.

Waite played volleyball and graduated from Monona Grove High School. He played volleyball at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., from 1977–81 with a team that consistently ranked in the top 10 nationally. The 1979 Cardinal squad finished fourth in the NCAA tournament after winning the Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title with a perfect 14-0 record. Waite received all-MIVA honors his junior and senior years, and was named team co-captain and co-MVP in 1980. He received his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1981.

Waite and his wife, Carrie, have two sons, Ryan, 19, who is a sophomore at the UW, and Eric, 16.



Waite has led the Badgers to four NCAA tournament appearances and two Big Ten Conference titles in his four years at Wisconsin.

Q&A WITH COACH WAITE

Why should a student-athlete choose to attend the University of Wisconsin?

I want people who love the game now and who will love it when they're done. People who are well-rounded academically, athletically and socially.

What goals have you set for the Wisconsin program and each individual player?

Some goals we set are private, between the players and the staff. That's important in order to keep everyone focused on the task. We ask each player to leave her comfort zone and grow as a person and as a member of the team.

We will always aim to be the top team in the Big Ten along with being one of the top teams in the country. We want to prepare ourselves for the opportunity to succeed.

How would you describe your coaching style?

I'm a teacher, it's always been a part of me even before I became a coach. I look for our weaknesses and do everything I can to eliminate them. I'm firm and fair, not a yeller. I expect a lot of my players, while at the same time, I'll work hard to help them enjoy their time with the program. It's a game; it should be fun. I offer them a lot of variety in practices so that time flies by. I want players to love the game, play from

their hearts, and dare to dream. When they do that, the wins will come.

You chose to return to your hometown of Madison after coaching in the collegiate ranks for over 10 years. What made you want to come back and accept this position?

Part of my decision to return was for my wife Carrie and my sons, Ryan and Eric. Madison is such a great place to live that I wanted them to be able to enjoy it too. The other part was the excitement of the high level of play and the great athletes the University of Wisconsin attracts. The Big Ten is the best conference in the country, and that makes our players raise their level of play higher than they could ever imagine.

You have almost 20 years of coaching experience. What have you learned in your years of coaching that you bring to the UW program?

I've been a college coach for over 16 years, and was a full-time club coach for three years before that. I've learned that patience pays off. I enjoy seeing a player learn a new skill just as much as I enjoy the championships. I bring the philosophy that building a quality program means taking care of the players, not taking short cuts and leaving players in your wake.

I know that developing winners is not just about me. There has to be a great staff and we have that. The players need to believe, trust, and try. I'm here to guide them and give them the freedom to blossom when they're ready to grow.

What strengths does your coaching staff bring to the University of Wisconsin program and its athletes?

I think we have one of the best coaching staffs in the country.

Christy brings the wisdom of a person who led her team to a national championship in college. She has an analytical eye to break down opponents and find ways for us to win.

Rod has been a great addition to our staff. He has a wealth of experience as a coach and player on the national and international levels.

Sarah is really the person that keeps everything we do on track. Her organizational skills behind the scenes with travel, meals, and hotels really lets us concentrate on volleyball.

I'm excited to have Trudy join us as a volunteer assistant coach. She has an extensive playing and coaching background and will be a great role model for the players.

This is a great staff who loves what they do. The Badger players and I are lucky to be able to be in the gym everyday with these coaches.

The Big Ten Conference is one of the toughest leagues in the nation for women's volleyball. What does it take for athletes to compete on the Big Ten level?

Players have to battle and fight to stay on top. That's what makes it great. You have no choice but to play your best because there are so many good players and teams. Those are the players we want to become Badgers: those who love a challenge and are ready to fight. To be the best, you have to play the best.

Wisconsin made it to the NCAA championship match in 2000. What has this done for the program? What is it going to take to remain at this level?

Earning a trip to the NCAA championship match really gave us a lot of respect nationally. Across the country, a lot of people were really pulling for us. Making it to the final match showed people that we were for real, that we had really earned our way there by beating some great teams.

To stay at the elite level, we need to bring in the top recruits who can see themselves playing for the national championship in a Badger uniform. We've been getting commitments from some of the top players in the country, so I'm excited about the future of the program.

What do you enjoy most about coaching at the University of Wisconsin?

The players, the staff, the support, the Field House, the Band, Bucky, the huge fan turnout, all the other great sports and coaches, the lakes, State Street, the Capital, the zoo, the Big Ten, my family nearby . . . You name it, I love this place!

ASSISTANT COACHES

Christy Johnson

Christy Johnson, a two-time All–American at the University of Nebraska, enters her seventh year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. She spent her first two years as an assistant under John Cook and is in her fourth year under Pete Waite.

Johnson, 29, guided setter Lizzy Fitzgerald to two AVCA All-America honors and a spot on the U.S. National Team roster. She also coached current setter Morgan Shields to All-America honors in 2002.



Johnson provides the Badgers with crucial NCAA experience. She earned All-America honors for the Huskers in 1994 and 1995. She was the starting setter on the 1995 Nebraska team that won the NCAA championship. The Huskers made four NCAA tournament appearances and won three Big Eight titles during Johnson's years. A two-time all-district selection and two-time all–Big Eight Conference honoree, Johnson was also named to the 1995 NCAA Championship all-tournament team, the 1994 and 1995 NCAA Regional all-tournament team, and the 1994 and 1995 Big Eight Conference all-tournament teams. In addition to her athletic honors, Johnson was a 1995 second-team Academic All-American and a three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree.


Johnson has international experience as a member of the 1989 U.S. Junior National team and as a member of the 1993 U.S. National "B" Team. She played with the Nebraska Tornadoes of the National Volleyball Association for two seasons, leading the Tornadoes to the league championship in 1998.

A 1996 graduate of Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in education, Johnson spent one year coaching at Millard North High School in her hometown of Omaha, Neb. She also served as a coach in the River City Juniors Volleyball Club program for two years.

Rod Wilde

Rod Wilde, a member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic gold medal team and a NCAA champion as both a player and coach, is in his third season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Wilde, 46, was a member of the United States volleyball team that won a gold medal at the 1984 Olympics. A member of the U.S. National Team from 1982–84 and again from 1989–91, Wilde also served as an assistant coach with the U.S. men's national




team from 1993–2000. He was selected as an assistant coach to both the 1996 and 2000 Olympic teams. He also aided the U.S. to a bronze medal at the 1994 World Championships. In 1999, Wilde was the head coach of the U.S. Pan-American team.

The former manager of the High Performance Programs with U.S.A. Volleyball (USAV), Wilde oversaw all aspects of the USAV programs for high school athletes including the Junior and Youth National teams.

Wilde was a three-time All-American at Pepperdine University, setting the Waves to the 1978 NCAA Championship. He returned to Pepperdine as the men's head coach from 1985–87 leading the Waves to the 1986 NCAA Championship. Wilde also served as the head men's coach at UC San Diego from 1991–93 and as the head women's coach at Drake University from 1984–85.

Wilde is a 1980 graduate of Pepperdine University with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and a minor in physical education. He is a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and his wife, Kris (Hey), is a native of Milwaukee. She was an all-state volleyball and basketball player at Wauwatosa East High School and led the Red Raiders to the Wisconsin state high school titles in both volleyball and basketball in 1980.





Sarah Mikla

Sarah Mikla, a native of Hammond, Wis., begins her second year as the Badgers' Director of Volleyball Operations.

Mikla graduated from St. Croix Central High School in 1992 where she earned all-state honors. She was a four-year letter winner at the University of Pittsburgh from 1992–95. The Panthers won the Big East Conference and advanced to the NCAA tournament in 1992, 1993 and 1994. Mikla earned sec-



ond-team All–Big East honors in 1994 and was a two-time Academic All–Big East selection. As a senior, she was the team captain and named a Student-Athlete of Distinction.

Mikla graduated from Pittsburgh in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in movement science. She received her master's degree in teaching health and physical education from Pittsburgh in 1997 while also serving as a graduate assistant coach. Mikla also coached with the Pittsburgh Elite Volleyball Club in 1977.

Following her college career, Mikla served as a health and physical education teacher and varsity volleyball coach at Oak Creek High School in Oak Creek, Wis., from 1997–2000. She also coached with the Milwaukee Sting Volleyball Club for two years from 1997–99.

In 2000, Mikla was named an assistant coach at the University of Dayton. The Flyers finished fourth in the Atlantic 10 Conference in 2000 and were 18-11 overall. In 2001, Dayton won the Atlantic 10 Conference and was 21-8 overall. During her two years with the Flyers, Mikla helped coach seven all-conference and four all-region athletes. She also coached with the Dayton Juniors Volleyball Club for two years.

Mikla currently coaches with the Wisconsin Power Volleyball Club.

Trudy Vande Berg

Trudy Vande Berg begins her first season as a volunteer assistant coach at Wisconsin.

A native of Brandon, Wis., Vande Berg comes to Wisconsin from the University of North Florida where she served as an assistant coach for two seasons. The Ospreys qualified for the NCAA Division II national tournament in 2001 and 2002 losing in the second round both seasons. UNF also won the Peach Belt Conference regular-season title both years.



Prior to joining the UNF coaching staff, Vande Berg coached one season with the Sky High Volleyball Club in Crystal Lake, Ill. During the summer of 2002, she was a member of the coaching staff for the Jacksonville Juniors Volleyball Association and was an assistant coach for the High Performance Team Florida (16-and-under), which advanced to the national tournament in Park City, Utah.

She has also continued to play volleyball, participating in the United States Volleyball Association Adult Nationals in 2001 and 2002.



2003 SEASON PREVIEW

Then Wisconsin takes to the court for the first time in 2003, it will have an almost completely different team from 2002. The Badgers lost three starters to graduation and four other athletes who did not return to the team in 2003. But the four starters and nine letterwinners who return as well as one of the top recruiting classes in the nation should provide Badger fans with an even more exciting team in 2003.

Wisconsin finished the 2002 season with a 24-9 record and ranked 18th in the final *USA Today* / AVCA Top 25 poll. The Badgers tied for second in the Big Ten Conference at 14-6 and advanced to their seventh consecutive NCAA tournament, losing in the second round. The UW's second-round NCAA loss is the first time since 1999 that it has not advanced to a regional. Wisconsin also suffered several other losses to unranked teams last season including losses at Illinois, Indiana and Northwestern.

The 2003 version of the Badgers will be tighter-knit group with great team chemistry. Wisconsin, under fifth-year head coach Pete Waite, is looking to challenge for the Big Ten title it won in 2000 and 2001 this season as well as make a run in the NCAA tournament.

Setter

The Badgers return co-captain and 2002 AVCA third-team All-American Morgan Shields at setter. Last season, the 5-11 senior ranked fourth in the nation and led the Big Ten with 13.91 assists per game. She also ranked second in the conference with 0.52 service aces per game using her powerful jump serve. Shields was also one of the team's top defensive players averaging 2.42 digs per game and was a strong offensive threat with 1.05 kills per game.

Redshirt freshman Katie Lancing-Lorenzen will provide backup. Lorenzen, who did not play last season, is a former all-state player from Pagosa Springs, Colo.

Outside Hitter

Senior Lisa Zukowski started the 2002 season at left-side hitter but switched to libero halfway through the year. She was averaging 2.72 kills per game before the switch but was still not fully recovered

from ACL surgery. The 2003 team co-captain improved her defensive skills at libero and finished second on the team with 2.83 digs per game. Zukowski is expected to be one of the team's top all-around players following a strong spring season at the net.

Junior Jill Odenthal started the season at right-side hitter but switched to the left side when Zukowski moved to libero. The 6-0 Odenthal ranked second on the team with 3.16 kills per game and connected on .304 percent of her attacks as a southpaw. She spent the 2003 spring season on the right side, improving her defense and passing skills.

Junior Marian Weidner and redshirt sophomore Aubrey Meierotto both picked up a great deal of experience on the left side this past spring.

Weidner played in 39 games last season on both the left and right sides. She averaged 1.05 kills and 0.87 digs per game. The 6-2 Weidner has great passing skills and could get the starting nod on the left side based on her defense.

While Weidner is stronger defensively, the 6-1 Meierotto has the most powerful attack of any Badger. She started three matches last season and averaged 2.24 kills per game. Meierotto was a key to Wisconsin winning at Penn State for the first time ever with her careerhigh 18 kills.

Freshmen Lindsey Boler and Maria Carlini were both middle blockers in high school but could see time on the outside in college.

Boler was a *Volleyball* Fab 50 selection and the 2002 Gatorade state player of the year for Louisiana. The 6-0 Boler was also a member of the 2002 USA Junior National team A2 program. She has great quickness and should be a very explosive attacker.

Carlini is a former captain of the Canadian Junior National team. She was named the most valuable player of the 2002 Can-American Tournament. The 6-2 Carlini, who has great all-around skills, was a four-time all-star selection.

Middle Blocker

A member of the 2002 Big Ten All-Freshman team, Sheila Shaw is the team's top returning blocker. The 6-1 Shaw averaged 0.83 blocks and 2.04 kills per game while hitting .310 percent last season. She started 18 matches last season and spent

the 2003 spring season improving her backrow skills.

Freshmen Amy Bladow and Carlini will battle for the other starting spot. Bladow was a *Volleyball* Fab 50 selection and ranked among the top 12 middle blockers in the nation by *Student Sports Magazine*. The 6-1 Bladow earned numerous all-state honors at Lewis Palmer High School in Monument, Colo., leading her team to two state championships.

Libero

Senior Jill Maier leads the race at libero after playing backrow for the Badgers' left-side hitters last season. The 5-7 Maier averaged 1.69 digs per game.

Senior Angie Sanger and freshman Kirin Swanson could also see time on defense. The 5-4 Sanger saw limited time as a defensive specialist last season while Swanson is a former all-area player from Glenview, Ill.

SEASON PREVIEW WITH COACH WAITE

Pollowing a second-place finish in the Big Ten Conference and their seventh-consecutive NCAA tournament appearance, the Badgers will have a new look in 2003. Wisconsin lost three starters to graduation as well as four athletes who did not to return to the team. But with a solid nucleus of experienced players and the addition of one of the nation's top recruiting classes, the Badgers and coach Pete Waite are looking forward to the season.

How would you describe the 2003 Wisconsin volleyball team?

"This team's going to have a great mix of talent and personalities. I see it as a group that will be tighter than last season and become a closer-knit team every week. I think the fans will see much better team chemistry on the court and if the team really comes together, it will make a huge difference in close matches."

What are your team goals for the season and how is the team preparing to achieve these goals?

"We want to go after the Big Ten title. What's different this year though is that we are not the defending champions. Now we are fighting to get back to the top and we'll have to really battle every day to get there. We have to play with an edge, a real attitude."

The team loses three starters to graduation. What do these losses mean to the team?

"Anytime you lose half of your starting lineup you know some new people will have to step up. We'll have to work really hard during the early part of the season to establish a new team."

Which athletes do you expect to step up to fill the graduation losses or to play a bigger role in 2003?

"We're going to need to have a number of people stepping up their games. Erin Byrd was such a key figure in our offense and defense that we'll have to come out with more balance. Morgan Shields, Jill Odenthal and Lisa Zukowski come in with the most experience and they'll have major roles. Aubrey Meierotto and Marian

Weidner will bring us experience on the outside and Sheila Shaw will be our experience in the middle. I'm expecting Jill Maier to really control the court for us with her serve receive and defense."

Will the team's style of play be different this season?

"We're not going to be a really big team so we're going to have to be faster with better ball control. We've all worked hard on communicating better and the players will work better with each other. Everyone is going to have to be on the same page with the same intentions.

"I think the fans will see that this team is here to play hard for each other and they're all willing to put what's best for the team in front of any individual agendas."

The Badgers went through several position changes early last season. Will the players who were effected last season—most notably Jill Odenthal and Lisa Zukowski—return to their original positions?

"Odie has shown that she can do well from the right or left side of the court. She had a great spring on the right side and she should be getting a lot more balls out of the back row this year.

"Zuke has raised the level of her game and has become a great all-around player. Using her at libero last year was mostly because she was still recovering from her knee surgery. Doing that really solidified her defense and passing so now that her knee is strong, she is ready to be a major factor in all aspects of the game."

The team suffered some unexpected losses in 2002. How did the team regroup this spring and summer? Did the team address the issue or just move forward?

"I think we really made some huge strides during the spring season. We addressed some major issues that had caused us some of the losses in the fall and by mid spring, we were moving forward in a more positive direction.

"As a team and staff, we learned a lot more about each other and how important it is to be a giving member of the group.

"Also, we all were reminded about how hard it is to win on the road and in the Big Ten. We need to be more consistent from match to match to get those road wins this year."

The team went through a lot of changes this past spring with a number of athletes deciding not to return. How did the team handle the athletes leaving? How will this affect the team this fall?

"Any time you have a change in personnel, it will take some time to adjust. Whether it's a coach, a player or a trainer, everyone brings a different dimension to the team dynamic. I think the team handled it all very well and they'll be a stronger group because of it."

All-American and co-captain Morgan Shields returns for her final season as starting setter. What strengths does an experienced setter bring to the program?

"Morgan is an excellent athlete who will be running the show for us on the court. She has worked very hard over the course of her career and I'm confident she'll have a great senior year. Since she redshirted two seasons ago, she really brings even more experience. I think this year she'll be even more relaxed and confident in her own game which will allow her to focus on making her teammates better." Senior co-captain Lisa Zukowski has battled back from injuries during her career. How has her tenacity helped this team?

"Tenacity is a great word for Zuke. After coming back from an ACL tear her second season, she also had to deal with dislocating three finger joints while blocking in the spring. Players less tough than Zuke may have given up and quit. She is such a fighter that she not only comes back, but she does it with a positive attitude and returns to being a major factor on the court. She really exemplifies what it means to be a Badger and to give everything you can for the team."

Last season was the first year for the libero. What did you learn last year about the new position?


"Going into our second year of using the libero, I've realized what a major factor that player can be on the outcome of the game. Great defensive ball control is the key ingredient to winning championships and a libero who can handle that responsibility is invaluable. Consistency in serve receive from contact-to-contact and gameto-game is a role the libero has to love. Liberos can influence the outcome of the match, but they have to be willing to sacrifice their bodies to touch everything hit their way.

Talk about the freshman class. What are their strengths? How do you expect them to fit in with the team?


"I'd say this is a really versatile group. Three of the four have middle blocking experience, but may also see time as outside hitters. They all have strong, outgoing personalities that will really blend in well with the returners. Since we have some openings on the court, they should all have a shot at getting some court time this season."

Your 2003 schedule features 13 teams that competed in the 2002 NCAA Tournament including eight Big Ten teams. The schedule also has eight teams which were ranked in the AVCA Top 25 at the end of last season. How tough will this schedule be?

"Anytime you play in the Big Ten, you can expect to be in some amazing matches. I think the conference teams are stronger from top to bottom than ever. Our non-conference competition is strong too. Washington, Georgia Tech and Pepperdine are just a few of the great teams we'll be playing. Every team we play is another opportunity for us to improve as a team."

Bottom: Wisconsin first played host to the NCAA Championship in 1993 drawing a then-record crowd of 11,155 in the UW Field House.


WISCONSIN SETS ATTENDANCE RECORDS


The University of Wisconsin has served as the host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship twice in the last seven years. Wisconsin is only the third university to play host to the championship more than once.

In 1998, the UW set the NCAA single-match attendance record when 13,194 spectators watched the finals of the championship. Wisconsin also set the NCAA semifinal attendance record of

12,327 bringing the two-day total to 25,521, which broke the championship record of 21,086 set in 1997 at the Spokane Arena.

Wisconsin first played host to the championship in 1993, drawing record crowds to the UW Field House. A then-record attendance of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 who watched Long Beach State defeat Penn State in the championship match. That figure still stands as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.









BADGERS ADVANCE TO NCAA TOURNAMENT

BADGERS WRAP UP SEASON IN

NCAAS Wisconsin (24-9) ended its season with a 1-3 loss to Miami (Fla.) in the second round of the 2002 NCAA Tournament. The Badgers, who were seeded 14th in the championship bracket, swept Alabama A&M in the first round before losing to the Hurricanes in the UW Field House.

It was the first time Wisconsin has not advanced to a regional since 1999, coach Pete Waite's first season at the UW, and the first time it has lost at home in the NCAA tournament since the 1997 regional final vs. Florida.

BADGERS END SEASON RANKED

18TH Wisconsin ended the 2002 season ranked 18th in the final USA Today/ AVCA poll. It was the sixth straight year and the seventh year overall that the Badgers ended their season in the top 25.

The Big Ten Conference landed five teams in the final top 25 poll. 2002 conference champion Minnesota (32-6) ended the season ranked 11th while Ohio State (21-11) finished 13th. Penn State (25-8) was ranked 16th with the Badgers coming in at 18th. Michigan State (21-12) ended the season ranked 22nd.

In the final Ballicora Computer Rankings, Wisconsin ended the season tied for 21st and in the final Division I Women's Volleyball poll, the Badgers were ranked 16th.



BYRD, SHIELDS TOP HONORS LIST

Senior Erin Byrd and junior Morgan Shields led the list of post-season honors for the Badgers.

Byrd, a 6-0 outside hitter, earned second-team All-America honors. She was also a unanimous All-Big Ten selection and an AVCA All-Mideast Region honoree.

Shields, a 5-11 setter, earned thirdteam All-America honors. She was an All-Big Ten and AVCA All-Mideast Region selection.

Sheila Shaw was named to the Big Ten All-Freshman team.

WISCONSIN TIES FOR SECOND IN

BIG TEN Wisconsin and Penn State tied for second place in the Big Ten standings with 14-6 records. Minnesota won its first Big Ten title with a 17-3 mark.

WAITE REMAINS MOST SUCCESS-FUL UW COACH EVER Pete Waite wrapped up his fourth year as the Badgers' bench leader with a 108-25

(.812) record. He won his 100th match at the UW on Nov. 1 with a 3-0 victory over Indiana. Waite is 374-127 (.747) in 15 years as a head coach and was on the bench for his 500th collegiate match when Wisconsin hosted Alabama A&M in the first round of the NCAA tournament. Waite reached 100 wins faster than any volleyball coach in UW history and has the highest overall and Big Ten winning percentage of any UW leader.

Under Waite, Wisconsin has appeared in four NCAA tournaments including a runnerup national finish in 2000. The Badgers won back-to-back Big Ten titles in 2000 and 2001, and finished second in 1999 and 2002. Waite was named the Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Regional Coach of the Year in 2000 and 2001.

BADGERS RANKED AMONG

NATION'S BESTS Wisconsin ranked among the top teams in the country in three statistical categories according to the final NCAA statistics.

The Badgers ranked fifth in the nation in kills per game with 17.29 and sixth in assists per game with 15.59. Wisconsin also had the 17th-best hitting percentage at .280.

Individually, Morgan Shields ranked fourth in assists per game with 13.91.

WISCONSIN SETS BIG TEN

ATTENDANCE RECORD The Badgers set the Big Ten record for attendance in conference-only matches during the 2002 season. In 10 matches, Wisconsin totalled 39,541 spectators for an average of 3,954. The old mark was 39,016/10 = 3,901 set by Penn State in 1998. The previous UW best was 37,900/10 = 3,790 in 2001.

Overall, Wisconsin averaged 3,527 fans per match which ranked third in the nation behind Hawai'i (7,309) and Nebraska (4,395). The average was second on the UW attendance list behind the UW record of 3,745 spectators per match set in 2002.

BADGERS LEAD THE BIG TEN

Wisconsin ended the 2002 season leading the Big Ten in kills and assists per game. The Badgers averaged 17.30 kills per game and 15.59 assists per game, which rank third and first, respectively, on the UW season lists.

Individually, junior Morgan Shields led the conference in assists per game with 13.91.

LOSSES TO UNRANKED TEAMS

The Badgers dropped four matches to unranked teams and lost to lower-ranked teams twice during the 2002 season. Wisconsin defeated only one higherranked team-ninth-ranked Penn State on Oct. 26.

BIG TEN ROAD RECORDS Wisconsin defeated Penn State for the first time ever in State College on Oct. 26 highlighting an up-and-down conference road season.

The Badgers went 6-4 on the Big Ten road losing at Northwestern for the first time since 1988 (28 straight wins); at Indiana for the first time since 1995 (12 straight wins); and at Illinois for the first time since 1999 (five straight wins). Wisconsin split their first four Big Ten road trips and didn't earn a sweep of their conference opponents until the last weekend of the regular season vs. Michigan and Michigan State.

GOPHERS END BADGERS' HOME

WINNING STREAK Wisconsin's home loss to Minnesota on Oct. 4 snapped the Badgers' 26-match Big Ten home winning streak. The conference winning streak dated back to Oct. 29, 1999. (Note: Ohio State was forced to forfeit a win over Wisconsin on Sept. 28, 2000, due to an ineligible player.)

The loss also ended Wisconsin's 17match overall home-winning streak. The Badgers had not lost in the UW Field House since a 2-3 loss to Northern Iowa on Sept. 21, 2001.

LINEUP, LINEUP - WHO'S GOT THE

LINEUP? The Badgers played with seven different starting lineups during the 2002 season and had to go to their bench a number of times. In 33 matches, 11 athletes started at least two matches. Only two started in the same position for all 33 matches—setter Morgan Shields and outside hitter Erin Byrd.

RECORDS FALL Wisconsin set five match or season records during the 2002

Freshman Lauren Ford set the singlematch record for hitting percentage at .875 when she connected on 14 of 16 attempts with no errors against Bowling Green.

In Big Ten matches, Morgan Shields set the season record for assists with 1,062. The Badgers also set team records for kills with 1,301 and for assists with 1,184.







John Wiley

John Wiley was named chancellor of Wisconsin in January 2001, becoming the university's 27th leader.

Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.


In his positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He has also been deeply involved in fundraising.

As provost, Wiley was chief operating officer and deputy chancellor working in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at Wisconsin as a National Science Foundation fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.

Wiley is married to Georgia Blanchfield and has a 19-year-old stepson, Kai Kennedy, and a 17-year-old stepdaughter, Blythe Kennedy.



Pat Richter

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, became Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An All-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963–71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic All-America honors in 1962. He was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. Richter received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., becoming vice president of personnel prior to joining the athletic department staff.

Pat and his wife, Renee, have four sons: Scott (wife Khaki and grandsons J.P. and Cole), Brad (wife Chrissy and grandson Max and granddaughter Samantha), Barry (wife Kim, grandson Blake, granddaughter Alexandra) and Tim.



In the last 10 years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sellout in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.



WISCONSIN ATHLETICS MISSION STATEMENT

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Wisconsin-Madison dedicates itself to the mission of providing athletic opportunities to a wide range of students and an environment in which all student-athletes can achieve their academic and competitive goals. The Division strives to provide equitable opportunities for all student-athletes and staff, regardless of gender or ethnic background. To honor its academic mission and that of the university, the Division supports the educational aspirations, academic progress and general welfare of the student-athlete. In competition, the Division fosters principles of sportsmanship, respect and fair play. In all of its activities, the Division insists on integrity, ethical conduct and accountability.

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.



The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

BADGERS IN THE COMMUNITY

The Madison community is extremely supportive of the University of Wisconsin athletic teams and its many student-athletes. In return for that support, many student-athletes take time out of their busy schedule s to show their appreciation and involvement in the city of Madison and Dane Country through their community service efforts.

Student-athletes have assisted in a variety of service projects including the AIDS Support Network, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Habitat for Humanity, Special Olympics, United Way, Very Special Arts, visiting children in local hospitals with the Amanda the Panda program, and volunteering at local schools in the Bookin' It with Bucky program. The athletic department also donates a number of tickets and memorabilia to local charities for fund-raising purposes.



NCAA Compliance

As a member of the Big Ten Conference, Western Collegiate Hockey Association, and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the University of Wisconsin must abide by many rules and regulations. Below is general information on how these guidelines apply to prospective student-athletes and representative of athletics interests.

Definitions

A prospective student-athlete is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, one becomes a prospective student-athlete if a college gives the individual (or his/her relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A prospective student-athlete is recruited at a particular university when its coach approaches the prospect (or any member of the prospect's family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college by any one of the following three ways:

- Providing an official visit to the university's campus;
- Having an arranged, in-person, offcampus encounter with a prospect or the prospect's family; or
- Placing more than one telephone call to a prospect or any other member of his/her family.

A representative of the UW's athletics interests ("booster") is anyone who...

- is an alumnus of the UW
- has contributed to a Badger athletic program.
- has helped arrange employment of enrolled and prospective UW student-athletes.
- has been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

The Recruiting Process

Institutional staff members have very specific guidelines when it comes to recruiting that vary by sport. The major areas are: telephone calls, contacts, evaluations, campus visits, correspondence, and highlight films/videotapes.

In addition to general recruiting regulations, no booster can be involved in recruiting (e.g., no phone calls, letters, or inperson contacts).

Eligibility

Prospects who intend to participate in Division I intercollegiate athletics must register with and be certified by the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. Please contact your high school counselor for more information on this process, especially regarding the requirements to be eligible.

Extra Benefits

By NCAA definition, an extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional

employee or a booster to provide a studentathlete or a student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit that is not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. This is prohibited. If the benefit is demonstrated to be generally available to ALL UW STUDENTS or their relatives or friends determined on a basis unrelated to athletic ability, it is not a violation of NCAA rules.

Extra benefits are also not permissible for prospective student-athletes. They are called offers and inducements, and include any benefit such as cash, clothing, cars, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA university. UW Compliance On-Line Training Program Compliance Rules and Regs is a compliance training program available on the internet. Student-athletes, coaches and designated athletic department staff are required to complete the program, while boosters are encouraged to participate. FETZER STUDENT-ATHLETE CENTER

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-theart facility serves the needs of all studentathletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55seat auditorium. A computer room houses 40 PCs while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors and three learning specialists who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 800 student-athletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experi-

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are located in the center.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.


Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Greg Ehlers, Chad Gabbard, Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Andy Hrodey, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Laura Walluk, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Greg Marcotte and Tracy Poro utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, Dr. Tom Best and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Kerri Ariens, Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Mike Potenza and Jim Snider work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardio-vascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.











Top: Camp Randall Stadium is the home of the football Badgers and has a seating capacity of 76,634.






