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


Post-event Interviews







WISCONSIN IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

First Round-Madison, Wis.

The UW has appeared in the "Big Dance" the last six years in a row and eight out of the last nine years. In the last 12 years, Wisconsin has made 10 appearances in the NCAA tournament and are 18-10. Wisconsin's best finish came in 2000 when it advanced to the NCAA championship for the first time in program history. The Badgers have also made three appearances in NCAA regional finals (elite eight).

In addition to NCAA post-season play, the Badgers also won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship twice during its seven-year history. Wisconsin won the inaugural NIVC in 1989 and the final championship in 1995.



2001 Champions Record: 19-1

For the first time in program history, Wisconsin won back-to-back Big Ten titles. The 19-1 record tied the 1997 team for best conference record in program history. Wisconsin joined Penn State and Illinois as the only schools to win outright (not shared with another school) back-to-back conference titles since 1985 when double round-robin play was initiated.

The Badgers opened the conference season with 11 straight wins including 3-0 wins over No. 10 Penn State, No. 11 Ohio State and No. 21 Minnesota. Wisconsin began the second-half of the Big Ten season with a 3-1 win at No. 10

Ohio State before falling at No. 13 Penn State in five games. The Badgers won the remaining eight league matches to clinch their fourth Big Ten title.

2000 Champions Record: 18-2

Wisconsin won its third Big Ten Conference title in 2000 and its second outright championship. The Badgers battled Minnesota all season long for the league title with teams sharing the conference lead most of the year.

The Badgers opened the 2000 league season with a 3-0 win over defending NCAA and Big Ten champion Penn State in front of 3,549 fans in the UW Field House. Wisconsin won its next two

matches by 3-0 scores before falling in five games to 19th-ranked Ohio State. The UW won its next 11 matches including a 3-0 win at No. 5 Minnesota, a 3-1 win over No. 19 Michigan State at home, a 3-1 win over No. 7 Minnesota in the Field House and avenged its earlier loss to Ohio State with a 3-1 win in Columbus. The winning streak came to an end as Wisconsin lost at 11th-ranked Penn State, 2-3.

The Badgers wrapped up the Big Ten season with four straight wins and clinched a share of the title with a win at Michigan State on Nov. 25. A loss to coleader Minnesota at Ohio State gave Wisconsin the title outright.

1997 Co-Champions Record: 19-1

Wisconsin shared the 1997 Big Ten Conference with Penn State as both teams finished with 19-1 records.

The Badgers opened the season with three straight wins, all over ranked teams, before travelling to State College, Pa., for their first match-up with the Nittany Lions. Penn State, which was ranked No. 1 at the time, came out on top 3-0 to take the league lead.

Wisconsin rebounded by winning its next six matches before facing Penn State at home on Halloween night. This time it was the Badgers who came out on top 3-1 in front of 6,118 fans in the UW Field House. The UW won its last nine matches of the season and clinched a share of the title with a 3-0 win over Iowa at home on Nov. 29.

BIG TEN VOLLEYBALL CHAMPIONS 1990

1990 Champions Record: 16-2


Wisconsin won its first Big Ten Conference title in 1990, when there were still only 10 teams in the league.

The Badgers won their first four matches of the season before losing at Indiana, 0-3. Wisconsin rebounded with eight straight wins including a 3-1 win over league-leading Purdue in the Field House. The Boilermakers returned the favor in November with a 3-1 win in West Lafayette, Ind.

The Badgers maintained a one-match lead over the Boilermakers throughout the last two weeks of the season. Wisconsin clinched the title on the road with 3-0 wins at Michigan and Michigan State in the last weekend of the conference season.

ALL-AMERICANS



SHERISA LIVINGSTON

First Team—2000, 2001 Simi Valley, Calif.

Livingston became the first Wisconsin player to earn first-team All-American honors in 2000. In 2001, she became the Badgers first two-time first-team All-American

Livingston wrapped up her career as the UW's all-time kill leader with 1,912. She also set the career hitting percentage mark at .366.

During her four years with the Badgers, she aided the team to four NCAA tournament appearances including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish. Wisconsin also won three Big Ten Conference titles during her career.

Livingston was named the 2000 co-Big Ten Player of the Year and the 2000–01 Wisconsin Female Athlete of the Year. She is a three-time All–Big Ten selection and a four-time AVCA all-region selection. Livingston was also named the 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

A nine-time all-tournament selection, Livingston was a member of the U.S. Junior National Team in 1998 and 1999, and was named the best blocker at the 1999 World Junior Championships.



LIZZY FITZGERALD

Second Team—2000, 2001 New Orleans, La.

Lizzy Fitzgerald earned second-team All-America honors in 2000 and 2001. She joins Sherisa Livingston and Kelly Kennedy as the only two-time All-Americans in program history.

During her four years with the Badgers, Fitzgerald was a member of four NCAA tournament teams including the 2000 NCAA runner-up squad. She was also a member of three Big Ten Conference championship teams.

As a junior and senior, Fitzgerald was one of the top setters in the country. She ranked fourth in assists per game in 2001 with 13.72. Fitzgerald set the UW four-game match record for assists with

Fitzgerald was a two-time AVCA National Player of the Week, earning the first-ever honor for a Badger in 2000. She was the 2001 Big Ten Player of the Year and also earned All–Big Ten honors in 2000. Fitzgerald was a two-time AVCA all-region honoree and a four-time all-tournament selection.

Fitzgerald is currently a member of the U.S. National team and also trained with the U.S. National A-2 program during the summers of 1999 and 2001.



JENNY Maastricht

Second Team—1999 Silver Lake, Wis.


Jenny Maastricht earned second-team All-American honors in 1999 after leading the Badgers with 3.80 kills and 0.32 service aces per game. The right-side hitter also ranked second on the team with 1.11 blocks per game

Maastricht was one of the Badgers' most versatile players ever. She came to the UW as a middle blocker and switched to right-side hitter as a sophomore. After playing two years in that position, the 6-1 Maastricht was switched to left-side hitter as a senior.

Maastricht was a two-time All–Big Ten and all-region selection. She was named the AVCA National Player of the Week on Oct. 30, 2000, and was also a two-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Maastricht earned six all-tournament honors during her career.

Maastricht trained with the U.S. National Team during the winter and spring of 2001. She was also part of the A-2 program in 1999.






Second Team—1997, 1998 Barrington Hills, III.

Kelly Kennedy is Wisconsin's only two-time All-American earning second-team honors in 1997 and 1998. She led the Badgers to back-to-back appearances in NCAA regional finals and a share of the 1997 Big Ten Conference title.

Kennedy ranks second on the UW's career list for hitting percentage at .339. She also ranks third in kills (1,406), third in block assists (454) and third in total blocks (555).

The 6-4 middle blocker was a three-time All–Big Ten selection and a two-time allregion honoree. She was a five-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week.

Kennedy trained with the U.S. National Team A-2 program in 1999 and is currently a member of the Chicago Thunder of the USPV.



AMY LEE


Second Team—1997 Milwaukee, Wis.

Amy Lee earned second-team All-American honors in 1997 after leading the Badgers to a share of the Big Ten Conference title and an appearance in the NCAA regional final.

Known for her powerful left-handed kill, the 6-0 opposite hitter led the Badgers with 3.74 kills per game as a senior. She also ranked third on the team with 1.05 blocks per game.

Lee ended her career as the UW's all-time kill leader with 1,661 and ranks first in total attempts with 4,129. She also ranks fourth in block assists with 430 and seventh in total blocks with 454.

Lee was a unanimous pick for the 1997 All-Big Ten team and also earned allregion honors. She was a eight-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree. She currently serves as an assistant coach at Marquette University.




LAURA ABBINANTE

Second Team—1996 Itasca, III.

Laura Abbinante became Wisconsin's second All-American and its first setter to earn the honor in 1996. She guided the Badgers to the NCAA regional semifinals in 1996 and to the NIVC title in 1995. Abbinante averaged 13.32 assists per game as a senior, which ranked 19th in the nation.

The 5-9 setter is the UW career record holder for assists with 5,833. She also ranks in the top 10 in service aces, digs, block assists and total blocks.

Abbinante is a two-time All-Big Ten and two-time all-region selection. She was an 11-time all-tournament selection and competed in two U.S. Olympic Festivals.



LISA BOYD


Second Team—1990 Dalton, III.

Lisa Boyd set a number of firsts for Wisconsin Volleyball. She was the first All-American earning secondteam honors in 1990 leading the Badgers to their first NCAA tournament appearance. She was the first Big Ten Player of the Year leading the UW to its first conference title.

The 6-0 middle blocker ended her career ranking among the top 10 in every career category except assists. She still ranks third in block solos (113), fourth in total blocks (523) and fifth in block assists (410).

Boyd was a unanimous All-Big Ten selection in 1990 and an all-region honoree. She led the Big Ten in blocking in 1989 and 1990 and was a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Boyd was named the most valuable player of the inaugural NIVC in 1989 as the Badgers won the team title. She was also named the UW's Female Athlete of the Year for 1990–91.







U.S. National A-2 Team




Junior National Teams

Minnesota Chill



WISCONSIN FIELD HOUSE

The first time you walk into the UW Field House during a volleyball match, you feel the excitement that is Wisconsin Volleyball. The band is playing, the fans are yelling "Point Wisconsin," Bucky Badger is dancing, and the UW team is on the court winning!

Badger fans make the UW Field House one of the loudest and most intimidating venues for opposing teams in the nation. Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top five in the nation in attendance, and Badger fans are known for being very knowledgeable about the sport of volleyball.

Badgers' Home

The Wisconsin Field House has been the permanent home of the Badger volleyball team since 1986. In 1998, the volleyball team took over sole possession of the Field House adding a Sport Court and improving its locker room facilities.

The first volleyball match played in the Field House was on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin played host to the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship on Oct. 29.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to two tournaments. Wisconsin's play in the Field House was sporadic

until 1986 when the official move to the Field House occurred.

A Tough Place to Play

Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten title and competed in their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become one of the toughest places to play in the country. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance


for the last 12 years including third-place rankings in 1997, 2000 and 2001. In 2001, the Badgers set the Big Ten Conference regular-season record with 3,745 spectators per match. Wisconsin has led the league in attendance six years—1990, 1991, 1994, 1997, 2000 and 2001.

1993 NCAA Championship

The Field House was the site of the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship which drew then-record crowds. A total of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 for the championship match. That figure set the NCAA single-match attendance record

and still ranks as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

The Field House was also the site of the No. 7 attendance of all time when 10,935 fans watched the Badgers defeat Illinois in the first round of the 1990 NCAA tournament.

Volleyball Specific

With the Kohl Center opening, the Badger volleyball team is the sole occupant of the Field House in the fall. One significant improvement is a permanent Sport Court for all UW home matches and practices. The Badgers also moved into new locker room facilities with a team lounge and study area separate from the team's home locker room. A complete renovation of the locker room area, including a photo display of Big Ten championship teams, is scheduled to be completed this winter.

The Field House has a total of four locker rooms for hosting

tournaments as well as an athletic training room and equipment room.



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HEAD COACH PETE WAITE

Ver since Pete Waite came to Wisconsin, the Badgers have reached a new level of success. In his three years as head coach, Wisconsin has advanced to the NCAA tournament all three seasons, including a second-place finish in 2000; won two Big Ten Conference titles; and garnered two Big Ten Players of the Year.


In 2001, the Badgers won the Big Ten with a 19-1 mark. Wisconsin was ranked among the top 10 teams in the nation all season, advancing to the regional semifinals and ending its season at 27-4. Waite was named the Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Regional Coach for the second consecutive year.

In 2000, Waite guided the UW to the NCAA championship match, the NCAA Mideast Regional title and the Big Ten title. Wisconsin finished the season 34-3 overall and 19-1 in the Big Ten.

In his first year at Wisconsin, he led the Badgers to a 23-9 overall mark, advancing to the second round of the NCAA tournament. Wisconsin tied for second in the Big Ten at 15-5.

Waite, 42, has coached three All-Americans, seven AVCA All-Region selections, five conference players of the year, and 24 first-team all-conference honorees. He has had six athletes on all-newcomer teams and two earned newcomer of the year recognition.

In 2001, Sherisa Livingston became the first UW player to earn consecutive first-team All-America honors, while



Lizzy Fitzgerald earned her first firstteam honor after receiving second-team honors in 2000. Fitzgerald was also named the Big Ten Player of the Year, following in the footsteps of Livingston who captured the award in 2000.

Waite came to Wisconsin from Northern Illinois University where he was the all-time winningest volleyball coach in program history. He had an 11-year record of 266-102 (.723 winning percentage) including nine 20-win seasons. The Huskies were 81-19 (.810) in his last three years including three consecutive NCAA tournament bids. Northern

appeared in four NCAA tournaments under Waite, advancing to the second round three times including in 1997 when it lost to national runner-up Penn State. The Huskies also appeared in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1991, '92, and '94, and declined an invitation to the NIVC in 1995.

Northern Illinois won eight regularseason conference titles and six conference tournaments under Waite. The Huskies won the 1998 Mid-American Conference regular season title and the 1997 MAC Tournament. He has earned three conference coach of the year honors including the 1997 Mid-American Coach of the Year.

Prior to being named the head coach at Northern Illinois, Waite spent two years as an assistant coach at Illinois State. In 1984 and 1985, he was the head coach at Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, Ill., leading the Cyclones to the 1985 North Central Community College Conference championship. Waite was named the conference coach of the year in 1985.

Waite spent one year as the director and coach of the Chicago Power Junior Volleyball Club in Orland Park, Ill., and two years as a coach with the 2nd City Junior Volleyball Club in Chicago. He started his coaching career in 1981 at Muncie (Ind.) Northside High School and spent the next year as a junior varsity coach at his alma mater, Monona Grove (Wis.) High School. Waite also coached one year at Bremen High School in Midlothian, Ill.

Waite played volleyball and graduated from Monona Grove High School. He played volleyball at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., from 1977–81 with a team that consistently ranked in the top 10 nationally. The 1979 Cardinal squad finished fourth in the NCAA tournament after winning the Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title with a perfect 14-0 record. Waite received all-MIVA honors his junior and senior years, and was named team co-captain and co-MVP in 1980. He received his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1981.

Waite and his wife, Carrie, have two sons, Ryan, 18, who is a freshman at the UW, and Eric, 15.

Q&A WITH COACH WAITE

Thy should a student-athlete choose to attend the University of Wisconsin?

I've seen a lot of other schools and I think the University of Wisconsin ranks among the best in the nation. Besides having some of the best academic programs, it has two important areas that put it above many other schools. Being surrounded by two large lakes and the state capital, it's one of the most beautiful campuses anywhere. Along with that, we have a very loyal and large fan base that makes the Field House a fantastic place to play. Our program can offer a great education, a beautiful city, a well-balanced social life, and fans that other schools wish they had. I could go on and on, but the UW has the whole package.

What kind of student-athletes are you recruiting to the University of Wisconsin?

Players who are serious about their academics. People who are here to get a degree they will be proud of while playing for a team they will remember forever. I want people who love the game now and who will love it when they're done. People who are well-rounded academically, athletically and socially.

What goals have you set for the Wisconsin program and each individual player?

Some goals we set are private, between the players and the staff. That's important in order to keep everyone focused on the task. We ask each player to leave her comfort zone and grow as a person and as a member of the team.

We will always aim to be the top team in the Big Ten along with being one of the top teams in the country. We want to prepare ourselves for the opportunity to succeed.

How would you describe your coaching style?

I'm a teacher, it's always been a part of me even before I became a coach. I look for our weaknesses and do everything I can to eliminate them. I'm firm and fair, not a yeller. I expect a lot of my players, while at the same time, I'll work hard to help them enjoy their time with the program. It's a game; it should be fun. I offer them a lot of variety in practices so that time flies by. I want players to love the game, play from their hearts, and dare to

dream. When they do that, the wins will come.

You chose to return to your hometown of Madison after coaching in the collegiate ranks for over 10 years. What made you want to come back and accept this position?

Part of my decision to return was for my wife Carrie and my sons, Ryan and Eric. Madison is such a great place to live that I wanted them to be able to enjoy it too. The other part was the excitement of the high level of play and the great athletes the University of Wisconsin attracts. The Big Ten is the best conference in the country, and that makes our players raise their level of play higher than they could ever imagine.

You have almost 20 years of coaching experience. What have you learned in your years of coaching that you bring to the UW program?

I've been a college coach for over 16 years, and was a full-time club coach for three years before that. I've learned that patience pays off. I enjoy seeing a player learn a new skill just as much as I enjoy the championships. I bring the philosophy that building a quality program means taking care of the players, not taking short cuts and leaving players in your wake.

I know that developing winners is not just about me. There has to be a great staff and we have that. The players need to believe, trust, and try. I'm here to guide them and give them the freedom to blossom when they're ready to grow.

What strengths does your coaching staff bring to the University of Wisconsin program and its athletes?

We have one of the best coaching staffs in the country.

Christy brings the wisdom of a person who led her team to a national championship in college. She has an analytical eye to break down opponents and find ways for us to win.

Rod is a great addition to our staff. He has a wealth of experience as a coach and player on the national and international levels.

This is a great staff who loves what they do. The Badger players and I are lucky to be able to be in the gym everyday with these coaches. They are both winners.

The Big Ten Conference is one of the toughest leagues in the nation for women's volleyball. What does it take for athletes to compete on the Big Ten level?

Not just one of the toughest, it is the toughest! Players have to battle and fight to stay on top. That's what makes it great. You have no choice but to play your best because there are so many good players and teams. Those are the players we want to become Badgers: those who love a challenge and are ready to fight. To be the best, you have to play the best.

Wisconsin made it to the NCAA championship match in 2000. What has this done for the program? What is it going to take to remain at this level?

Earning a trip to the NCAA championship match really gave us a lot of respect nationally. As we go out on the recruiting trail now, we hear a lot of comments from people who were pulling for us. Making it to the final match showed people that we were for real, that we had really earned our way there by beating some great teams.

To stay at the elite level, we need to bring in the top recruits who can see themselves playing for the national championship in a Badger uniform. We've been getting some attention from the top players in the country already, so I'm excited about the future of the program.

What do you enjoy most about coaching at the University of Wisconsin?

The players, the staff, the support, the Field House, the Band, Bucky, the huge fan turnout, all the other great sports and coaches, the lakes, State Street, the Capital, the zoo, the Big Ten, my family nearby . . . You name it, I love this place!

ASSISTANT COACHES

Christy Johnson

Christy Johnson, a two-time All–American at the University of Nebraska, enters her sixth year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. She spent her first two years as an assistant under John Cook and is in her fourth year under Pete Waite.

Johnson, 28, guided setter Lizzy Fitzgerald to two AVCA All-America honors and a spot on the U.S. National Team roster. She also coached Colleen Neels, a two-time All-Big Ten honoree and professional player in the USPV.



Johnson provides the Badgers with crucial NCAA experience. She earned All-America honors for the Huskers in 1994 and 1995. She was the starting setter on the 1995 Nebraska team that won the NCAA championship. The Huskers made four NCAA tournament appearances and won three Big Eight titles during Johnson's years. A two-time all-district selection and two-time all-Big Eight Conference honoree, Johnson was also named to the 1995 NCAA Championship all-tournament team, the 1994 and 1995 NCAA Regional all-tournament team, and the 1994 and 1995 Big Eight Conference all-tournament team. In addition to her athletic honors, Johnson was a 1995 second-team Academic All-American and a three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree.


Johnson has international experience as a member of the 1989 U.S. Junior National team and as a member of the 1993 U.S. National "B" Team. She played with the Nebraska Tornadoes of the National Volleyball Association for two seasons, leading the Tornadoes to the league championship in 1998.

A 1996 graduate of Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in education, Johnson spent one year coaching at Millard North High School in her hometown of Omaha, Neb. She also served as a coach in the River City Juniors Volleyball Club program for two years.

Rod Wilde

Rod Wilde, a member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic gold medal team and a NCAA champion as both a player and coach, is in his second season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Wilde, 44, was a member of the United States volleyball team that won a gold medal at the 1984 Olympics. A member of the U.S. National Team from 1982–84 and again from 1989–91, Wilde also served as an assistant coach with the U.S. men's national team from 1993–2000. He



was selected as an assistant coach to both the 1996 and 2000 Olympic teams. He also aided the U.S. to a bronze medal at the 1994 World Championships. In 1999, Wilde was the head coach of the U.S. Pan-American team.

The former manager of the High Performance Programs with U.S.A. Volleyball (USAV), Wilde oversaw all aspects of the USAV programs for high school athletes including the Junior and Youth National teams.


Wilde was a three-time All-American at Pepperdine University, setting the Waves to the 1978 NCAA Championship. He returned to Pepperdine as the men's head coach from 1985–87 leading the Waves to the 1986 NCAA Championship. Wilde also served as the head men's coach at UC San Diego from 1991–93 and as the head women's coach at Drake University from 1984–85.

Wilde is a 1980 graduate of Pepperdine University with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and a minor in physical education. He is a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and his wife, Kris (Hey), is a native of Milwaukee. She was an all-state volleyball and basketball player at Wauwatosa East High School and led the Red Raiders to the Wisconsin state high school titles in both volleyball and basketball in 1980.


Sarah Mikla, a native of Hammond, Wis., begins her first year as the Badgers' Director of Volleyball Operations.



REBUILDING THE BADGERS

"We can rebuild them. We have the technology. We can make them better than they were better, stronger, faster."

Borrowing from the introduction of the 1970's series, "The Six Million Dollar Man," the Wisconsin volleyball team has a similar mission in 2002. The Badgers must rebuild after losing two All-Americans and three starters.

"T'd have to describe it as retooling," says fourth-year head coach Pete Waite. "We did lose three strong starters but we actually return seven players who have had starting roles in the past. The talent is still here. We just have to find out who plays best together on the court."

The Badgers don't have the advantage of bionic legs to jump higher or a bionic arm to spike harder but they do have the history of a successful program to rely on. Wisconsin is the two-time defending Big Ten Conference champion and has competed in the last six NCAA tournaments.

The UW won the 2001 Big Ten title with a 19-1 record and finished the season 27-4 overall, advancing to an NCAA regional.

"We want to win another Big Ten Championship and go after a national title," says Waite of his team's goals for 2002. "This group knows how much hard work there will be along the way to even have a shot at those goals. They've been working hard since the end of last season and I think that they're in for some battles."

Part of the battle will be replacing two-time, first-team All-American Sherisa Livingston, who is the Badgers' career leader in kills and hitting percentage, and two-time, second-team All-American Lizzy Fitzgerald, who was Wisconsin's starting setter the last two years. Waite must also find a replacement for Sara Urbanek, who was one of the team's top passers and defensive players.

That group was talented enough to earn the attention of the U.S. National Team. Fitzgerald has been training with the squad since February while Urbanek spent almost five months training with the team.

"It's always hard to fill the holes left by such talented players," says Waite. "They all made huge contributions in their separate ways and we'll certainly miss having them on the court.

"The exciting part comes when we watch our returning players step up their games and become a whole new team. I

think this group will bring a different style to the court that will surprise a lot of people."

Without Livingston as the UW's go-to player, Waite will have to rely on several players to fill her offensive hole.

"Sherisa carried a big load for us offensively during her career. With her gone, we'll have to spread out the sets to more hitters and that will actually be tougher for our opponents to defend," says Waite. "I know that all of our hitters are excited that they'll be taking more swings at the ball."

OUTSIDE HITTER

Swinging the most at the ball should be senior tri-captain Erin Byrd. The 6-0 outside hitter is a three-year starter for the Badgers and improved her offensive output tremendously in 2001. Byrd ranked third on the team with 3.46 kills per game while maintaining her role as the team's defensive leader. She earned honorable mention All–Big Ten honors last season and was also recognized by the U.S. National program by being selected to the A-2 program during the summer of 2002.


Junior Lisa Zukowski also returns after tearing the ACL in her left knee in late October. The 5-10 outside hitter had started 19 matches prior to her injury and ranked second on the team with 3.70 kills per game. She also had a team-leading 0.41 service aces per game and was averaging 2.44 digs per game.

"With Zuke's knee injury, it allowed us to see how talented Jill Odenthal was," says Waite. "Now that Zuke will be back, we'll have three starting leftsides returning and they all did a great job last season."

"Add to that depth, the strong play of Marian Weidner and Aubrey Meierotto and we've got a lot of outside hitters we have confidence in."

Odenthal, a 6-0 left-hander, had seen limited playing time as a back-up opposite hitter in her first year prior to Zukowski's injury. She moved to the right side and averaged 3.49 kills and 2.00 digs per game after becoming a starter. Odenthal was named to the 2001 Big Ten All-Freshman team for her play.

Weidner, a 6-2 outside hitter, also saw only limited playing time as a true freshman. Most of her action

was in the back row serving and playing solid defense. During the 2002 spring season, Weidner saw considerable time in the front row and improved her offensive output.

Meierotto, a 6-1 outside hitter, was the Badgers' most promising freshman last year but chronic knee pain forced her to redshirt. She had improved enough during the 2002 spring season to start several matches at outside hitter.

SETTER

An area that the Badgers will still be strong at despite losing a two-time All-American, will be at setter where redshirt junior Morgan Shields returns.

"Redshirting was perfect for Morgan even though she was itching to play in every match. It gave her time to mature as a person and player. I think she really settled into who she is and now she's a much better player than she was," says Waite.

The 5-11 Shields started 13 matches as a true freshman and four matches as a sophomore. She averages 9.83 assists per game for her career and also has a powerful jump serve which will challenge opponents

"Some people don't remember that Morgan had beaten Lizzy out for the starting (setter) spot in 2000. When Morgan turned her ankle in the third week, Lizzy took over and went on to become an All-American," explains Waite.

"Morgan has been patient during her redshirt year and now she's really ready to lead this team. She brings a high intensity and a focused outlook to the court. Morgan also has a pure excitement about the sport that becomes contagious among the team. We're all excited to see her take over. I know she's going to do a great job."

Shields was slowed last spring by a broken left pinky finger but by the end of the spring season, she was able to set from the back row.

"With Morgan breaking her finger, it actually gave us an opportunity to see Jill Odenthal in the setting role," says Waite. "We were happy to see how comfortable she is in that spot and it will help us be more versatile in our play. The only thing this group needs now is time playing together in our system. I think they're just going to get stronger and stronger as each week goes by."

The Badgers will also have two freshmen who will serve as back-up setters.

Katie Lancing-Lorenzen, a native of Pagosa Springs, Colo., was named the 2001 *Denver Post* 3A Player of the Year. The 6-0 setter also earned all-state honors from the *Denver Post* and *Rocky Mountain News*. Lancing-Lorenzen is a two-time conference player of the year and led Pagosa Springs High School to a second-place finish in the 2001 state tournament.

Katie Kohnen is the younger sister of former Badger, Meggan Kohnen. The 5-7 setter from Dubuque, Iowa, was named the 2001 Iowa Preps National Player of the Year and is the two-time Iowa state player of the year.

"Katie Lancing-Lorenzen and Katie Kohnen really shore up our setting spot," says Waite. "It's hard to say until they step in the gym with us, but I really like what each one brings to the team."

MIDDLE BLOCKER

With the graduation of four-year starter Livingston, the Badgers will have a different look at middle blocker.

Waite returns 6-3 middle Amy Hultgren, who transferred from the University of Texas and earned a starting spot. Hultgren ranked second on the team with 1.10 blocks per game and also had the second-highest team hitting percentage at .312.

Fifth-year senior Lori Rittenhouse spent much of the 2002 spring season in the other middle spot. The 6-1 Rittenhouse spent the 2001 season as the Badgers' starting opposite hitter. She averaged 1.91 kills, 2.38 digs and 0.75 blocks per game as a junior. Rittenhouse also led the team with 38 service aces.


"That was Lori's position in high school and she has great foot speed and a quick arm," explains Waite of Rittenhouse's move to the middle. "We also have two strong freshmen middles in Sheila Shaw and Lauren Ford. They are both great athletes who have a chance to see some court time."

Shaw and Ford both earned Volleyball Fab 50 honors. The 6-1 Shaw was ranked ninth on the impact she is expected to make in college volleyball over the next four years, while the 6-2 Ford was ranked 28th.

Shaw was named the 2001–02 Gatorade High School Player of the Year for Wisconsin and is a two-time all-state player. She was twice named the best blocker at the National Junior Classic Tournament.

Ford was a member of the 2001 U.S. Youth National training team and is a two-time all-country selection.





Lisa Zukowski started 19 matches for the Badgers last season before tearing her left ACL. She averaged 3.70 kills and 2.44 digs per game.

"There's a good chance Sheila and Lauren will see some court time their first year," says Waite.

DEFENSE

The libero comes to college volleyball in 2002 which will bring a new look to the game.

"The libero will be an exciting change for the college game," says Waite. "We can keep our best defensive player on the court more often and that should help our ball control."

The libero is a designated back-row player who is allowed to replace any player in the back row without counting as a substitution. The libero wears a different color jersey from the rest of the team and is not allowed to serve, attempt to block or attack a ball.

Teams got to experiment with the libero during the 2002 spring season.

Junior Korie Gardner is the Badgers' top returning defensive player. She averaged 1.91 digs per game, including eight matches with double-figure digs.

"When you add Korie, who has been a defensive starter for us, to our starting line-up, we have a lot of experience on the court," says Waite.

Junior Jill Maier made some big strides in the spring according to Waite,

"It's going to be great to see the battle for that spot," says Waite.

With such a talented group of returnees and newcomers, Waite just needs to find the right combination of players on the court.


"I think our team chemistry is going to be great," says Waite. "The personalities and attitudes we're putting on the court this year are going to be a great blend. This group knows how to play hard and they'll do whatever they can to help the team win. There is an energy they have between each other and the fans. It's really great to watch."

Among the ranked teams on the Badgers' schedule are No. 11 Texas A&M, No. 12 Ohio State, No. 17 Penn State, No. 19 Michigan State and No. 20 Illinois. Minnesota, North Carolina and UC Santa Barbara all received votes in the final poll.

All eight ranked teams participated in the 2001 NCAA Tournament and will be joined on the schedule by postseason qualifiers Duke and American. "Our schedule is strong but not quite as tough as last year," says Waite. "We'll see teams like Duke and North Carolina who are really making a move into the top echelon of the sport. UC Santa Barbara is always tough and Texas A&M knocked us out of the NCAA tournament last year."



Lori Rittenhouse started all 31 matches for the Badgers last season at opposite hitter. She could see some playing time at middle blocker this year.

Wisconsin opens its 2002 season on Aug. 30-31 at the Carolina Classic against St. Johns, New Mexico State and host North Carolina. The InnTowner Invitational in the UW Field House on Sept. 6-7 will pit the Badgers against Texas A&M, Illinois State and the University of Montreal. The Badgers make another trip to the East Coast when they participate in the Duke Classic against Duke, American and UC Santa Barbara. Wisconsin returns home for the Badger Invitational against Bowling Green, Illinois-Chicago and Tulane before the conference season.

Wisconsin opens Big Ten play on the road at Purdue on Sept. 27. Wisconsin plays six of its first-half Big Ten matches on the road and ends the regular season with four out of six matches at home.

"As always, you can go down the list of all the tough Big Ten teams and we know we're going to have to fight our way to every win," says Waite.

BADGERS WIN BACK-TO-BACK BIG TEN TITLES


BADGERS ADVANCE TO NCAA REGIONAL Wisconsin (27-4 overall, 19-1 Big Ten) competed in its 10th NCAA tournament in 2001, losing in the regional semifinals for the fourth time.

The Badgers swept UW–Milwaukee and Michigan State in the first and second rounds, respectively, to advance to a regional in Palo Alto, Calif. Wisconsin lost to 15th-ranked Texas A&M, 3-0, in the semifinals. The Aggies went on to play eventual NCAA champion Stanford in the regional final, losing 0-3.

FITZGERALD, LIVINGSTON NAMED ALL-AMERICAN Lizzy Fitzgerald and Sherisa Livingston were named to the 2001 American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) and ASICS/Volleyball Magazine All-America teams.

Fitzgerald, a 6-1 setter, was named the 2001 Big Ten Conference Player of the Year. A 2000 second-team All-American, Fitzgerald ranked among the top setters in the nation with her 13.72 assists per game average. She ranked third on the team with 0.89 blocks per game and also averaged 0.98 kills, 0.21 service aces and 2.45 digs per game. A three-year starter, Fitzgerald ranks third on the UW career list for assists with 3,923.

Livingston, a 6-2 middle blocker, was a unanimous selection to the 2001 All-Big Ten team. She led the league with a .402 hitting percentage and ranked second with 5.13 kills per game. Livingston

ranked among the top-10 nationally in both categories. She also led the team with 1.17 blocks per game. A 2000 first-team All-American, Livingston recorded double-figure kills in all 31 matches this season. A four-year starter, she set the UW career record for kills this season and ranks seventh on the Big Ten career list with 1,912 kills.

Year by media members.

In only three years at Wisconsin, Waite has become the most successful volleyball coach in UW history. He has a record of 84-16 with the Badgers for a .840 winning percentage. Waite also has the highest Big Ten winning percentage at .883 (53-7) of any UW volleyball coach. Under Waite, the Badgers have appeared in three NCAA Tournaments, including a second-place finish in 2000, and won back-to-back Big Ten titles in 2000 and 2001.

WISCONSIN WINS BIG TEN TITLE

For the first time in program history, the Badgers won back-to-back Big Ten titles in 2000 and 2001. Wisconsin won the 2001 title with a 19-1 record, tying the 1997 team for best conference record in program history.

Only three schools have won outright (not shared with another school) back-to-back conference titles since 1985 when double round-robin play was initiated. Only Penn State and Wisconsin have won outright back-to-back confer-

ence titles since the Nittany Lions joined the league in 1991.

FITZGERALD NAMED BIG TEN PLAYER OF THE YEAR Senior Lizzy Fitzgerald became the UW's third Big Ten Conference Player of the Year when she was honored by the conference coaches. She joins Lisa Boyd (1990) and Sherisa Livingston (co-2000) as the Badgers other players of the year.

Fitzgerald and Livingston were unanimous selections to the All-Big Ten team while Erin Byrd earned honorable mention honors. Iill Odenthal was named to the Big Ten All-Freshman Team while Pete Waite picked up his second consecutive Big Ten Coach of the Year award as selected by the media.

WISCONSIN ENDS SEASON SEV-

ENTH The Badgers ended the season ranked seventh in the final USA Today/ AVCA Top 25 Coaches poll. The ranking ties the third highest season-ending rank for the UW program.

NCAA champion Stanford (33-2) ended the season ranked first and picked up 62 of 65 first-place votes. Long Beach State (33-1) picked up the other three first-place votes to finish second. NCAA semifinalists Nebraska (31-2) and Arizona (25-5) were ranked third and fourth, respectively, while USC (25-4) rounded out the top five teams.

Among the Big Ten, five teams ended the season ranked among the top 25 schools. Ohio State (27-4) ended the season 12th while Penn State (22-8) was ranked 17th. Michigan State (21-8) and Illinois (21-9) were ranked 19th and 20th, respectively. Minnesota (19-13) received votes.

HOME SWEET HOME The Badgers ended the 2001 home season with a 14-1 record, marking the second straight year that Wisconsin has lost only one home match. The Badgers are 83-10 (.892 winning percentage) in the UW Field House since 1996.

Wisconsin ended the 2001 season on a 16-match Big Ten home-winning streak dating back to Sept. 29, 2000, when it lost to Ohio State in five games. The Badgers were 10-0 at home in Big Ten matches, only their third undefeated conference home season in program history. Wisconsin was 9-0 at home in 1990 and 10-0 at home in 1997, also Big Ten Championship seasons.

The Badgers were 16-1 at home in 2000; 12-3 at home in 1999; 16-1 (3-0 in the Kohl Center) at home in 1998; 16-2 in 1997; and 12-2 in 1996.

WISCONSIN SETS ATTENDANCE

RECORD The Badgers set a season record for attendance during 2001 averaging 3,745 spectators per match. Wisconsin drew a total of 56,180 fans in 15 matches. The UW also set the Big Ten season-only attendance record with an average of 3,790 spectators per match.

The season's total breaks the previous average of 3,457 set during the 1997 season. The Badgers drew a total of 62,227 fans in 18 matches that season. For Big Ten matches, the previous mark was 3,497 spectators per match in 1997.

The Badgers' attendance ranked third in the nation marking the 12th straight year that Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance.

FITZGERALD, LIVINGSTON AMONG NATION'S BEST In the final women's national statistics, Lizzy Fitzgerald ranked fifth with 13.72 assists per game and Sherisa Livingston was seventh in hitting percentage at .402. Livingston also ranked fifth in kills per game with 5.13.

As a team, Wisconsin ranked sixth with 17.35 kills per game, 13th with 15.39 assists per game, and 12th in hitting percentage at .289. The Badgers were also tied for 11th in win percentage at .871.

SEASON RECORDS FALL The Badgers set three overall season records during 2001.

Senior Sherisa Livingston broke her own record for hitting percentage connecting on .402 percent of her attacks in 2001. As a team, Wisconsin hit .289 percent, breaking the previous mark of .281 percent in 1998. The Badgers also set the single-season attendance record of 3,745

spectators per match.

Wisconsin set both the individual and team season hitting percentage records for Big Ten-only matches.

The Badgers also set a UW record for attendance in Big Ten matches with 3,790 spectators per match. The mark breaks the old average of 3,497 set in 1996. Wisconsin's average ranks second on the Big Ten list behind Penn State's record of 3,901 set in 1998.









STEVE LOWE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Then Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, its first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball All-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors.

Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.


Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten home opener will be designated "Steve Lowe Night" in honor of the former coach. This year's match is Friday, Oct. 4 versus Minnesota.

In addition, a Badger volleyball player who exemplifies Steve's love of the game is named the recipient of the Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship.







■ WISCONSIN SETS ATTENDANCE RECORDS

The University of Wisconsin has served as the host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship twice in the last seven years. Wisconsin is only the third university to play host to the championship more than once.

In 1998, the UW set the NCAA single-match attendance record when 13,194 spectators watched the finals of the championship. Wisconsin also set the NCAA semifinal attendance record of 12,327 bringing the two-day total to 25,521, which

broke the championship record of 21,086 set in 1997 at the Spokane Arena.


Wisconsin first played host to the championship in 1993, drawing record crowds to the UW Field House. A then-record attendance of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 who watched Long Beach State defeat Penn State in the championship match. That figure still stands as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

Did You Know?

The Big Ten Conference has led the nation in total volleyball attendance eight out of the last 11 years including in 2001.

. . .

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$63 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 7,500 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In total, Big Ten Conference institutions sponsor more than 250 athletic programs.

Athletic programs in the Big Ten Conference:

- provide an avenue for more than 140,000 young men and women to pursue higher education while competing in sports.
- had more than 7,500 student-athletes playing on over 260 teams in 2000-01. Those student-athletes received over \$63 million in direct financial aid.
- graduate at a rate of 10 percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.
- annually recognized more than 1,300 student-athletes who achieve a "B" grade point average or better on the Academic All-Conference teams.
- have won more than 185 team titles and 1,250 individual titles.
- are some of the most competitive in the country. The Big Ten has placed four schools among the top 20 in the final Sears Directors' Cup standings, which annually recognizes the nation's top athletic programs, in six of the Cup's eight years of existence.
- were all ranked among the top 29 in the country in a first-of-its-kind analysis by *The Sporting News* (September 1999) of all 112 Division I-A athletic programs (that play football and men's basketball).
- showcased more than 250 events that are televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 550 hours of programming.

• are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball and wrestling.

The Big Ten sponsors championships or tournaments in the following sports: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, football, men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's swimming & diving, softball, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track & field, wrestling and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. Teams play a double round-robin schedule facing each other at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

The conference champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 2001, the Big Ten was represented by five universities in the NCAA volleyball championship.

Members of the Big Ten Conference have competed in the NCAA Championship match 12 times including Wisconsin in 2000. Penn State won the 1999 NCAA Championship and is a six-time championship participant. Illinois and Ohio State have each made two championship appearances and Michigan State one.

For eight of the last 11 years, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in volleyball total attendance. In 2001, the league drew a total of 227,232 spectators for the season for an average of 1,438 fans per match, which was first in the nation.

Seven schools ranked in the top 30 nationally for average attendance. Wisconsin ranked third in the nation and led the Big Ten with an average of 3,745 spectators per match, setting the conference record.

Minnesota and Penn State both ranked in the top 10 nationally with averages of 2,373 (6th) and 1,966 (9th), respectively. Illinois ranked 16th, Purdue was 22nd, Michigan State 25th and Ohio State 29th.





STUDENT HOUSING

The University Residence Halls provide you with a comfortable, smokefree living environment and many resources to help you succeed academically at the university.

Computers—All rooms are wired for you to connect your computer for access to email or the internet.





John Wiley was named chancellor of Wisconsin in January 2001, becoming the university's 27th leader.


Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

In his positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He has also been deeply involved in fundraising.

As provost, Wiley was chief operating officer and deputy chancellor working in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at Wisconsin as a National Science Foundation fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.




PAT RICHTER

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, became Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An All-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963–71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic All-America honors in 1962. He was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. Richter received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., becoming vice president of personnel prior to joining the athletic department staff.



DAVID MCDONALD

David McDonald, the former chair of the UW Athletic Board, is in his second year as the special assistant to the chancellor for athletics.

McDonald, a professor in the history department, was a member of the board since 1994 and chaired the personnel committee for one year.

A UW professor since 1988, McDonald offers courses in the history of pre-revolutionary Russia, as well as modern Europe. His research and publications cover a variety of topics including: bureaucratic politics in the early twentieth century, nineteenth century Russian thought, and the social history of the eighteenth century nobility.

A native of Saskatoon, Sask., in Canada, McDonald earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Toronto. He received his Ph.D. from Columbia University.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS














In the last eight years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sellout in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.



WISCONSIN ATHLETICS MISSION STATEMENT

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Wisconsin-Madison dedicates itself to the mission of providing athletic opportunities to a wide range of students and an environment in which all student-athletes can achieve their academic and competitive goals. BADGER NICKNAME

The nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

BUCKY BADGER

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

BUD SONG

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

FIFTH QUARTER

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

ON WISCONSIN

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

ACADEMIC & STUDENT SERVICES

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. Wisconsin student-athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system.

Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors and three learning specialists who conduct the program offered to the nearly 750 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Thomas Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda and Alan Zussman along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic All–Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.



SPORTS MEDICINE

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.


The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 11 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jan Helwig, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Laura Walluk, Ian Wood, and Chad Gabbard utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician Dr. John Orwin while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component of all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Head strength and conditioning coach John Dettmann along with assistant coaches Brian Bott, Ryan Feek, Paul Goodman, Scott Hettenbach, Kerri Ariens, and Jim Snider work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Camp Randall Stadium and Kohl Center.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Badger Den is comprised of purely free weight equipment. There are five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a station to do dips. There is also three lat-pull machines and seated row machines. The Stadium weight room has a complete set of dumbbells from five pounds to 85 pounds. There is also a set of plyometric boxes for plyometrics and for alternative leg exercises.



Again, in 1998 *Money* magazine rated Madison the best mid-sized city in the Midwest. The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. *A&E Network* cited it as one of the Top 10 Cities to Have It All.


