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

#### A PERFECT SENORIAL DAY SERVICE HELD IN EDGEWATER PARK BY VETS

The Memorial Day Services at Edgewater Park were largely attended by not only the villagers but by visitors to the Bay for the day.

The Northwestern Hilitary and Naval Academy Cadets with their western Military and Naval officers were met at the station when they returned from Chicago where they had participated in the Memorial Day parade, by a squad of Veterans of Foreign Wars and Boy Scouts. ...

Upon reaching the park the cadets took positions by companies and the hundred or more fine looking young men dressed in their parade uniforms made a very impress-

ive sight.

The cadets had been asked to assist the Geneva Lake Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars in their service of presentation to the village of Williams Bay of a flag pole and flag. #### COLLIUNITY PICNIC HELD MONDAY



# REGULATION OF MOTOR CRAFT ON LAKE (Con't)

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Section 18 gives the Lake Geneva Safety Patrol officers police powers in the village.

Section 19-It shall be unlawful for any person to drive or operate or cause to be driven or operated, any boat propelled by motor upon any part of the waters of Geneva Lake within the corporate limits of the village of Williams Day in a reckless or wanton manner, regardless of the safety and welfare of others lawfully using said lake by driving at an excessive rate of speed or in unduly close proximity to other beats or persons in or upon said waters or in any other manner dangerous to others, having regard to the number and direction of travel of others in and upon said lake in the vicinity of such boat.

Section 20- It shall be unlawful for any person to operate, or cause to be operated, a motor boat which is equipped with an internal combustion engine, whether such emgine be permanently built in or permanently attached fastened to said boat or whether said engine be temporarily attached thereto as, or in the nature of, an outboard motor, so-called, upon any of the waters of Geneva Lake within the corporate limits of the Village of Williams Bay, unless such motor or engine is equipped with an efficient muffler in good working order and in constant operation to prevent excessive or unusual noise and annoying smoke.

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Section 21- It shall be unlawful to use a muffler cut-out on any motor boat or on any boat equipp -ed with an out-board motor upon the waters of Geneva Lake within the limits of this village.

Section 22- It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat at a greater speed than at the rate of fifteen miles per hour on the waters of Geneva Lake within five hundred feet of the shore of said lake in this village.

Section 23- Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for the first offense, and for the second or each subsequent conviction within one year thereafter, by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (313.00 not more than Twenty-five Dollars (325.00) together with the costs of the prosecution, and on failure to pay said fine and costs be imprisoned in the county jail for Walworth County, Wisconsin, until said fine and costs are paid, not exceeding six months.

Section 24- This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and publication.
