Alvarez-era Offense

Noteworthy Achievements

- Wisconsin boasted a 1,000-yard rusher in 10 straight seasons (1993-2002), a Big Ten record.
- Two Badgers – **Brent Moss** and **Ron Dayne** – have been named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year.
- **Ron Dayne** (2,109 yards) and **Lee Evans** (1,545 yards) own Big Ten single-season records for rushing and receiving, respectively.
- The Badgers have generated more than 5,000 yards of total offense six times since 1993.

Running Backs

- **Michael Bennett**: first-round NFL draft pick by Minnesota; Big Ten track champion (100 and 200 meters).
- **Anthony Davis**: first-team All-Big Ten; set an NCAA record with 10 games of at least 100 yards rushing as a freshman.
- **Ron Dayne**: Heisman Trophy winner, Maxwell and Doak Walker Award winner, college football's all-time leading rusher; unprecedented three-time Big Ten rushing champion; first-round NFL draft pick by the New York Giants.

Alvarez-era Defense

Noteworthy Achievements

- Wisconsin led the nation in scoring defense (10.2 ppg) on the way to winning the Big Ten title in 1998.
- Badgers led Big Ten (ranked ninth in the nation) in turnover margin in 2003.
- Three UW defenders – **Troy Vincent**, **Tom Burke** and **Jamar Fletcher** – have been Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year.
- Defensive end **Tom Burke**, defensive backs **Jamar Fletcher** and **Jim Leonhard** and linebacker **Nick Greisen** were NCAA leaders in sacks, interceptions and tackles, respectively.

Defensive Linemen

- **Wendell Bryant**: first-team All-American; Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year as a junior and senior; three-time first-team All-Big Ten; first-round NFL draft pick by Arizona.
- **Tom Burke**: first-team All-American; led nation in TFLs and QB sacks; Big Ten Defensive Player and Defensive Lineman of the Year; third-round NFL draft pick by Arizona.
- **Don Davey**: only four-time first-team Academic All-American in university-division history; played in the NFL for Green Bay and Jacksonville.
- **Tarek Saleh**: first-team All-American; UW career leader in TFLs and QB sacks; two-time first-team All-Big Ten.
- **Mike Thompson**: first-team All-Big Ten; fourth-round NFL draft pick by Jacksonville.





- **Jamar Fletcher**: Jim Thorpe Award winner; led the NCAA in interceptions as a freshman; established UW career record for interceptions in only three years; Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year; first-round NFL draft pick by Miami.
- **Jeff Messenger**: Big Ten interception leader in 1993 for Rose Bowl champions.
- **Troy Vincent**: highest draft choice (No. 7 overall by Miami) in Alvarez era; Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year; semi-finalist for the Jim Thorpe Award; five-time NFL All-Pro with Philadelphia; 2002 NFL Man of the Year.









Alvarez-era Special Teams

Noteworthy Achievements

- Wisconsin established a Big Ten record for net punting (42.5 yards) in 2000.
- The Badgers had the conference's top kick return average (26.0 yards) in 1998.
- UW had the Big Ten's first-team all-league placekicker three straight years (1997-98-99).
- The Badgers led the Big Ten in punt return average with a 14.3-yard norm in 2003.

Kickers


- **Matt Davenport:** semi-finalist for Lou Groza Award; consensus first-team All-Big Ten in 1997 and 1998; scored 99 points as a senior, the most in school history for a placekicker; career field goal percentage (.868) is No. 1 at Wisconsin; two game-winning kicks in career.
- **John Hall:** second-team all-league kicker; made a 60-yard field goal at Minnesota, the longest in NCAA history without the use of a kicking tee; currently plays for the Washington Redskins; established an NFL record for touchbacks on kickoffs.
- **Vitaly Pisetsky:** finalist for Lou Groza and Mosi Tatupu Awards in 1999; consensus first-team All-Big Ten in 1999; made game-winning field goal at Minnesota in 1999 for UW's first-ever overtime win.


- **Kevin Stemke:** won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to college football's top punter; first-team All-American; two-time, first-team All-Big Ten; owns every Wisconsin punting record; 43.5-yard career average is fourth in Big Ten history.


- **Jim Leonhard:** set school record for punt return yards in a season in 2002 and 2003; three career punt returns for TD.
- **Brandon Williams:** set school record for kickoff return yards in a season in 2002.
- **Nick Davis:** finalist for the Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams Player of the Year) twice in career; led the Big Ten in punt (1998) and kickoff (1999) returns; UW's career leader in both kick return categories; signed free agent contract with Minnesota.
- **Mike Schneck:** three-year long snapper at Wisconsin; signed free agent contract with Pittsburgh and currently plays for the Steelers.
- **Mike Solwold:** made rosters for the Minnesota Vikings and Dallas Cowboys in 2001 as a free agent long snapper; currently plays for the Baltimore Ravens.
- **Troy Vincent:** led Big Ten in punt returns; owns the longest punt return (90) in school history.









Bowl Success in the Alvarez Era

Wisconsin's success in bowl games during Coach Barry Alvarez's tenure has been nearly unparalleled.


Alvarez has guided the Badgers to a 7-2 (.778) record in bowl games. That winning percentage is among the best in history.

Among those seven bowl victories are two Bowl Championship Series wins. Wisconsin is one of only four schools that remains undefeated with more than one BCS appearance. The others? Ohio State, LSU and Southern California.

Wisconsin's most recent bowl win was an upset of 14th-ranked Colorado, 31-28 OT, in the 2002 Alamo Bowl.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.

With nine bowl appearances in the last 11 seasons, it's easy to see why Wisconsin has become a favorite choice among bowl games nationwide.






Camp Randall Stadium



Home of the Badgers

Camp Randall Stadium, built in 1917, is home for Wisconsin's football team. Distinguished by its double-deck structure and unique design, Camp Randall Stadium is the nation's fourth-oldest, college-owned facility. Its seating capacity is near 80,000 which ranks among the top 20 largest school-run facilities in the nation.

During the Barry Alvarez era, the Badgers have been a formidable opponent at Camp Randall. Wisconsin is 56-31-3 at home under Alvarez's guidance, including undefeated home slates in the Rose Bowl seasons of 1993 and 1998.

Camp Randall houses the athletic department offices, lounges and study areas for student-athletes, as well as

video, training and weight rooms, the training table for team meals and a display of football memorabilia.

The stadium, which is in the midst of a \$107 million renovation project, is a cornerstone of the school's athletic complex. Located on the same block are the McClain Athletic Facility and the Wisconsin Field House.

Renovations at Camp Randall

The University of Wisconsin Department of Athletics is working on the renovation of historic Camp Randall Stadium. Plans to improve the 87-year old facility focus largely on making gameday a more enjoyable experience for the spectators.

The renovation will fully conclude in 2005.

The \$107 million renovation project, when completed, will include:


- increased seating capacity to nearly 80,000;
- installation of FieldTurf, the highly popular artificial playing surface used in many NFL and major college stadiums;
- creation of new and wider concourses and the addition of elevators to provide safe and convenient fan access;
- renovation of old (and the addition of new) restrooms throughout the facility;
- addition of larger and more conveniently located concession stands;
- installation of video replay boards plus improved sound and lighting systems;

- addition of private suite and club level seating areas on the east side of the stadium;
- construction of a new ticket office with convenient on-site parking;
- development of a consolidated office building for athletic department staff;
- expansion of accessible facilities for disabled fans and visitors.

Separate from the above amenity improvement was a \$10 million refurbishing project for the stadium's infrastructure which was completed in the summer of 2002. Improvements were made in the electrical, plumbing and chilled water services at Camp Randall.

Badgers giving back








GOOD WORKS

TV Exposure

When Big Ten fans aren't packing stadiums, they're watching the most comprehensive college football package on television. A partnership with ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 and ESPN Regional will allow the Big Ten to televise a record number of games again this fall. More than 90 percent of all Big Ten games will be shown on live TV in 2004, making the Big Ten the most-watched conference in the nation.

Attendance Leader

College football fans flock to Big Ten Conference campuses each fall to watch the nation's premier teams. At UW, the crowds at Camp Randall Stadium number nearly 80,000 each week. The Big Ten leads the nation in college football attendance year after year and routinely draws more than four million fans to games on its campuses. The Big Ten has led the nation in attendance every year since the NCAA began keeping records in 1949, a string of 55 consecutive seasons.

Drawing a Crowd

The state of Wisconsin is "football-crazy" and the Badgers are at the top of everyone's priority list each Saturday during the fall. It is not uncommon to have representation from 20-25 newspapers, 10-12 television stations and 15-20 radio stations – all from Wisconsin – in attendance at Badger home games. Every home game also is televised on a tape-delayed basis by Wisconsin Public Television.

The Wisconsin Radio Network consists of more than 40 stations around the state that broadcast Badger games to a statewide audience and over the internet. The "Voice of the Badgers," Matt Lepay, is recognized as one of the best in the business.


Additionally, the UW Department of Athletics has one of the nation's most comprehensive web sites. Gameday coverage at uwbadgers.com features audio, photos, notes and statistics, interviews and much more. The site is "hit" more than two million times a month.

Big Ten Bowl Games For 2004

The Big Ten boasts one of the deepest college bowl lineups in the nation. The Big Ten is one of six conferences with an automatic berth into the Bowl Championship Series (BCS), which was established five years ago to determine a national champion. The Big Ten also has six other bowl bids guaranteed for member schools each year.

"The Big Ten's association with our bowl partners stabilizes the Conference's post-season future," says Commissioner James Delaney. "They also provide fans with terrific bowl destinations and games with quality opponents."


Wisconsin Walk-ons

Non-scholarship players have made major contributions at Wisconsin



Below is a partial list of some of the individuals that joined the Badgers as non-scholarship players, only to make major impacts at the UW and beyond.



- **Chad Cascadden, linebacker:** named the team's Special Teams Player of the Year in 1994; Academic All-Big Ten selection his senior year; letterwinner on UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; played for the NFL's New York Jets.
- **Matt Davenport, placekicker:** semi-finalist for Lou Groza Award; consensus first-team All-Big Ten in 1997 and 1998; scored 99 points as a senior, the most in school history for a placekicker; career field goal percentage (.868) is No. 1 at UW.
- **Jason Doering, safety:** team captain in both 1999 and 2000; led Badger defensive backs in tackles his final three seasons; ranks fourth all-time in career solo tackles (250); starter on two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; currently plays for the NFL's New York Giants.
- **Jim Leonhard, safety:** first-team All-Big Ten selection as both a sophomore and a junior, leading the conference in interceptions both seasons; first-team All-American according to CNN/SI.com as a sophomore; team captain in 2003 and 2004; single-season leader in punt return yardage.
- **Joe Panos, offensive tackle:** team captain in 1993; starter on the Badgers' 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; first-team All-Big Ten and second-team AP All-American in '93; played for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles and Buffalo Bills.
- **Mark Tauscher, offensive tackle:** three-year letterwinner; member of two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squads, including a starter on the 1999 team; helped Ron Dayne become NCAA all-time leading rusher; currently a starter for the NFL's Green Bay Packers.
- **Donnel Thompson, linebacker:** team captain in 1998 and 1999; starter on a pair of UW Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; ranks 10th all-time in career tackles; two-time team-leader in tackles; played for NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers and Indianapolis Colts.
- **Mike Schneck, long snapper:** three-year letterwinner at Wisconsin; member of 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; signed free agent contract with Pittsburgh and currently plays for the Steelers.
- **Sam Veit, punter:** four-year starter and letterwinner; member of UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; ranks third all-time in career punts (209) and career punting yards (8,016); three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.









Barry Alvarez enters the 2004 season just one win shy of No. 100 in his career.




Head Coach/Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez, the winningest football coach in Wisconsin history, has completed 14 seasons at the head of the program he transformed from a perennial second-division finisher to one that is nationally respected and is a fixture on the postseason bowl scene.

Alvarez, whose overall record with the Badgers is 99-67-4, became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April of 2004. He is one of just two people (UAB's Watson Brown) at the Division I level who serves as head football coach and athletic director.

Alvarez's list of accomplishments at Wisconsin is remarkable. Consider just a few of the most notable ...

- winningest coach in school history
- coached three Big Ten and Rose Bowl champions
- only Big Ten coach ever to win the Rose Bowl in consecutive seasons
- needs one win to become just the 10th coach in Big Ten history with 100 victories at one conference institution
- has coached five national award winners, including Ron Dayne (Heisman, Doak Walker, Maxwell), Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe) and Kevin Stemke (Ray Guy)
- guided UW to back-to-back Big Ten titles in 1998 and 1999 (hadn't happened at Wisconsin since 1896-97)
- bowl record of 7-2 (.778)
- coached the three winningest teams in school history



When Alvarez arrived in Madison in 1990, Wisconsin had compiled a 9-36 record during the previous four seasons and attendance at Camp Randall Stadium had dipped to an average of 41,734 per game (54 percent of capacity). The program sorely needed a boost and got it when new Director of Athletics Pat Richter hired Alvarez from Notre Dame, where he had been an assistant coach under Lou Holtz.

Following is a year-by-year look at the Alvarez era ...

2003 (7-6): Wisconsin won six of its first seven games, including a 17-10 upset victory that ended No. 3-ranked Ohio State's 19-game winning streak. Four Badgers earned first-team All-Big Ten mention, including WR Lee Evans who finished his career ranked No. 2 on the all-time Big Ten receiving yardage list. The Badgers qualified for their ninth bowl game in 11 years, a run of success matched in the Big Ten by only Michigan and Ohio State. UW lost to Minnesota on a FG as time ran out; to Purdue on a FG with 0:03 left; and to Iowa when the Badgers were unable to score on a last-minute drive.


2002 (8-6): A season-opening five-game winning streak and league wins over Michigan State and Minnesota qualified the Badgers for their eighth Alvarez-era bowl game, a 31-28 OT win over 14th-ranked Colorado in the Alamo Bowl. First-team All-American Jim Leonhard led the nation with a Big Ten record-tying 11 interceptions. Anthony Davis (1,555 yards) gave UW a 1,000-yard rusher for a Big Ten-record 10th straight year.

2001: (5-7): Several individual achievements highlighted a season in which the Badgers never won or lost more than two straight games. WR Lee Evans set the Big Ten record for receiving yards in a season with 1,545 and RB Anthony Davis led the conference in rushing. Evans and Davis were All-Americans and six Badgers earned first-team All-Big Ten acclaim,

including DL Wendell Bryant who became a first-round NFL draft choice. The Badgers lost by a field goal to both Oregon and Michigan.

2000 (9-4): A five-game winning streak to end the season highlighted the Sun Bowl champions' 9-4 season. Fighting injuries and suspensions, the Badgers had a difficult time getting consistency in the early part of the league season. Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe Award) and Kevin Stemke (inaugural Ray Guy Award) allowed UW to be the only school in the nation with two different players winning major awards.

1999 (10-2): A 17-9 win over Stanford in the Rose Bowl allowed Wisconsin to become the first Big Ten school in history to win the "Granddaddy of Them All" in back-to-back campaigns. The 10-2 Badgers finished fourth in both the media and coaches final polls. Wisconsin defeated five nationally rated foes for the first time in school history and concluded the year with eight consecutive victories. The Badgers led the Big Ten in both scoring offense and scoring defense. Ron Dayne became the NCAA's all-time leading rusher and then walked away with the Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award and Doak Walker Award. Chris McIntosh (Outland Trophy) and Vitaly Pisetsky (Mosi Tatupu and Lou Groza Awards) were major award finalists. Alvarez was forced to coach from the press box or hospital in eight games after mid-season knee surgery.

1998 (11-1): The winningest season in school history ended in dramatic fashion with a thrilling 38-31 upset of sixth-ranked UCLA at the Rose Bowl. Game MVP Ron Dayne keyed the win with 246 yards rushing. Wisconsin led the nation in scoring defense and turnover margin. The Badgers' nine-game win streak to open the season tied a school record. Tom Burke (NCAA sack leader) and Aaron Gibson (a finalist for the Lombardi Award and the Outland Trophy) were consensus All-Americans. Alvarez was Big Ten Coach of the Year.

1997 (8-5): A six-game winning streak catapulted the Badgers to a second consecutive eight-win season and berth in the Outback Bowl vs. Georgia. The Badgers joined the '37 Michigan team as the only squads in league history to win three one-point decisions. Ron Dayne earned first-team All-America honors and Matt Davenport won two games with last-second field goals.

1996 (8-5): The Badgers opened quickly with a 3-0 non-league slate before losing four games (three by a combined total of 10 points) to highly ranked foes. The UW closed 4-1 and posted a 38-10 win over Utah in the Copper Bowl. Ron Dayne set an NCAA freshman rushing record and had 2,109 yards, including the bowl win.

1995 (4-5-2): With the most inexperienced squad in the Big Ten and facing the nation's most difficult schedule (according to the *Seattle Times*), the Badgers posted a 4-5-2 mark. Darrell Bevell broke several passing records at the UW. The 17-9 upset at Penn State broke the NCAA's longest win streak (20 games).

1994 (8-3-1): Wisconsin won its second straight January bowl game by defeating Duke in the Hall of Fame Bowl. The regular season featured a win at Michigan for

the first time since 1962. Center Cory Raymer was a consensus All-American. Seven players were drafted by the NFL.

1993 (10-1-1): The 10-1-1 Badgers were Big Ten co-champions, beat UCLA in the Rose Bowl and were ranked as high as fifth (coaches) in the final polls. The UW had the NCAA's largest attendance increase, and its .875 winning percentage was the best by a Big Ten team since '79. A school-record eight players were named first-team All-Big Ten. Brent Moss was the Badgers' first Big Ten MVP since 1962.

1992 (5-6): The UW was 5-6 and climbed in the Big Ten standings for the third season in a row. The Badgers upset 12th-ranked Ohio State, the first win over a nationally rated foe in eight years. Wisconsin received votes in the national polls for the first time in Alvarez's career and ended the year one victory short of a bowl bid. Three of the losses were by a total of four points.

1991 (5-6): Wisconsin improved its win total by four games, the fourth-largest improvement in the NCAA. Troy Vincent was an All-American, runner-up for the Jim Thorpe Award and the No. 7 pick in the NFL draft. A victory at Minnesota broke a 23-game road losing streak.

1990 (1-10): Wisconsin was within striking distance entering the fourth quarter in 10 games, although its only victory was over Ball State. UW had the third-best attendance gain nationally.

Alvarez's coaching career began at the high school level. He served as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High from 1971-73 before taking over as head coach at Lexington (Neb.) High from 1974-75. His last prep coaching stop was at Mason City (Iowa) High where he was head coach from 1976-78 and where his team won a 4A state title in his final year.


Iowa's Hayden Fry hired Alvarez as an assistant coach in 1979. The Hawkeyes played in six bowl games (two Rose Bowls) during Alvarez's eight years in Iowa City, compiling a 61-33-1 mark in the process. Alvarez's standout player with the Hawkeyes was LB Larry Station, a two-time All-American and two-time Academic All-American.

Alvarez left Iowa after the 1986 season to become linebackers coach at Notre Dame. He was promoted (linebackers to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach) by Holtz each of his three seasons as the Fighting Irish went 32-5 and won



- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW-Madison's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Barry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Alvarez, a big baseball fan, helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999.
- Alvarez was a finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18 coaches named to new positions in 1990 and is the only one still at the school which hired him.
- Barry Alvarez got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship. 

- Hueber also coached running backs for three seasons (1992-94) at UW. He tutored Big Ten MVP Brent Moss and Terrell Fletcher in 1993 when that duo combined for 2,633 yards.

E.K. Franks starts his first season as a graduate assistant at UW. He assists with the defense. Franks spent a year as defensive line coach at Southwest Texas before joining the Badgers. Franks assisted the football program at Kansas State for three years in a variety of roles. He lettered as a wrestler at Oklahoma and also played football at Coffeyville C.C. and SW Missouri State. He is a graduate of Central Oklahoma.

Jamie Pollard Deputy Athletic Director



Jamie Pollard was named deputy athletic director for the UW-Madison in 2003 and serves as the No. 2 administrator in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is responsible for the overall administration of the Badgers' 23-sport, \$60 million athletic department and represents Barry Alvarez at all national, conference and university meetings when necessary.

Prior to being name deputy athletic director, Pollard served as the division's chief financial officer and senior associate athletic director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and allowed the university to move forward on the \$107 million renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the

development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program that is generating more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is the largest collegiate contract in the country.

Pollard has been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02 and served as the Tournament Manager when the UW hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first college sports administrator honored by the magazine. Pollard is the president for the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the Year.

Pollard is the campus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign that benefits more than

300 non-profit organizations. He led the 2003 campaign for the Athletic Department, which resulted in a 100 percent increase in participants and a 78 percent increase in contributions.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as associate athletic director for administration at Maryland (1994-98) and associate athletic director for internal operations at St. Louis (1989-94).

In addition to his role at Wisconsin, Pollard founded Collegiate Financial Services, LLC, a private data research company that provides strategic financial planning and research services to athletic administrators and university presidents.

Pollard, the 1987 NCAA Division III national champion in the 5,000-meter run and a two time Division III All-American, has a B.S. degree in business administration from UW-Oshkosh (1987). Pollard and his wife, Ellen, have four children, (Thomas, Annie, Maggie and James).

David Harris, director of academic services at Wisconsin since 2002, was named associate AD for academic services in July of 2004.


Harris came to Wisconsin after serving as director of academic support for the athletic

John Chadima Operations





2004 BADGERS

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Anthony Davis has 3,703 rushing yards in his three-year career, good for third place in UW history. He enters the 2004 season just six yards shy of Billy Marek for second place.



2004 Items of Interest

For the first time in 10 seasons, the Badgers have a new defensive coordinator. Bret Bielema joined the Wisconsin staff in February after two seasons at Kansas State. Bielema replaces Kevin Cosgrove, who left Wisconsin for a similar position at Nebraska.

Wisconsin returns 18 of the 22 players who started in the 2003 Music City Bowl against Auburn. That total includes nine players on each side of the ball. UW will look to replace departed starters Jim Sorgi (QB), Lee Evans (WR), Alex Lewis (LB) and Jeff Mack (LB).

Wisconsin returns five players who earned some level of All-Big Ten recognition in 2003. That list includes DB/PR Jim Leonhard (consensus first team), DL Anttaj Hawthorne (media first team), OL Dan Buenning (media second team), OL Donovan Raiola (consensus honorable mention) and RB Dwayne Smith (coaches honorable mention)

The Badgers also return all but one of their regulars on special teams, including placekicker Mike Allen, punter R.J. Morse, punt returner Jim Leonhard and kickoff returner Brandon Williams.

Wisconsin qualified for its ninth bowl game (Music City) in the past 11 seasons in 2003, joining Michigan and Ohio State as the only three Big Ten teams to play in at least nine bowl games in the past 11 years.

Wisconsin has won at least seven games in nine of the past 11 seasons, joining Michigan and Ohio State as the only Big Ten teams to accomplish that feat.

Attendance at the Wisconsin-Iowa game in Madison on Nov. 22 was 79,931, the third-largest crowd in Camp Randall Stadium history. That marked the 69th straight game at which the Badgers have drawn a crowd of at least 70,000 fans at 76,634-seat Camp Randall Stadium. Among those 69 games, 59 have been sellouts.

Wisconsin's total home attendance of 549,404 in 2003 is the second-highest total in school history for a seven-game season. UW totaled 550,974 during the 2000 campaign. Wisconsin's per-game home attendance average of 78,486 in 2003 is the second-highest average (regardless of number of home games played) in school history. The highest average is 78,711 from the 2000 season.

Paced by Jim Leonhard, Wisconsin led the Big Ten and ranked No. 8 nationally with a 14.3-yard punt return average in 2003. Wisconsin and Iowa were the only two Big Ten teams with at least three punt returns for TDs last season.

Senior RB Anthony Davis will enter the 2004 campaign having gained the third-most yardage (3,703) in the nation over the past three seasons combined (despite missing five full games and most of four others in 2003 due to ankle injuries). Davis needs just seven yards to become UW's No. 2 career rusher behind Ron Dayne (college football's all-time rushing leader).

The Badgers' next victory will be head coach Barry Alvarez's 100th at Wisconsin. He will become just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. Alvarez last spring became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics, serving in the dual role.

Wisconsin's starting offensive line from 2003 returns intact for 2004 and the defensive line returns three starters.

Senior DB Jim Leonhard, a 2003 second-team CoSIDA Academic All-American and consensus first-team All-Big Ten selection, has led the Big Ten in interceptions for each of the past two seasons. Leonhard has picked off 18 passes during his career, just three behind Jamar Fletcher's school record of 21 interceptions. Leonhard has also broken the school record for punt return yardage each of the past two seasons.

Wisconsin fans will notice several big changes at Camp Randall Stadium this fall. As part of the facility's ongoing renovation, 72 suites, club seating, an athletic department office building, new scoreboards and video boards, wider concourses and additional restrooms will be in place. The renovation is set for completion in 2005.

The Badgers' 2004 schedule features four of the first five games at home, but just two home contests among the final six. UW is scheduled to play just 11 regular-season games for the first time since 1999.

Season Review

Several significant items to remember about the 2003 season:

1 Wisconsin concluded its season with a 7-6 overall record and a 4-4 mark (T7th) in the Big Ten. The Badgers' league record was their best since 2000.

2 Wisconsin qualified for its ninth bowl game (Music City) in the past 11 seasons, joining Michigan and Ohio State as the only three Big Ten teams to play at least nine bowl games in the past 11 years.

3 Wisconsin has won at least seven games in nine of the past 11 seasons, joining Michigan and Ohio State as the only Big Ten teams to accomplish that feat.

4 WR Lee Evans and DB Jim Leonhard both garnered All-America mention. Evans was a second-team choice of collegefootballnews.com and an honorable mention selection by SI.com. Leonhard earned first-team mention from ESPN.com.


5 Only twice in Big Ten history has a team had a 200-yard rusher and a 200-yard receiver in the same game. It happened for the Badgers both times in 2003. RB Anthony Davis rushed for 247 yards and Lee Evans piled up 214 receiving yards against Akron on Sept. 6. Later in the season, RB Dwayne Smith rushed for 207 yards and Evans set a school record with 258 receiving yards against 21st-ranked Michigan State on Nov. 15.

6 QB Jim Sorgi's 99-yard touchdown pass to WR Lee Evans vs. Akron was a record-setting play. It set the school record for longest play from scrimmage, tied the Big Ten record for longest pass completion and tied the NCAA record for longest play from scrimmage (it was only the 14th 99-yard pass completion and 19th 99-yard play from scrimmage in NCAA history).

7 Wisconsin's four Big Ten defeats in 2003 came by a total of just 21 points (5.3 per game). No. 13 Purdue kicked a game-winning field goal with three seconds left; No. 24 Minnesota kicked a game-winning field goal as time ran out; and Iowa prevented the Badgers from scoring on a last-minute drive that could have won the game for UW.

8 The Badgers rolled up 630 yards in total offense and 385 passing yards against Michigan State on Nov. 15. Both figures are third-highest in school history. UW also tied a school record with five TD passes against the Spartans.

9 Wisconsin broke the school record for passing yardage in a season with 2,833. The old mark of 2,556 was set in 2001. Not coincidentally, WR Lee Evans was the Badgers' leading receiver those two seasons.



Quarterback Jim Sorgi set a Wisconsin career record for pass efficiency rating last season. One of the highlights of the 2003 campaign was Sorgi's five-touchdown pass performance (all to Lee Evans) against Michigan State.

10 Wisconsin's victory over third-ranked Ohio State on Oct. 11 was its first over a top-five rated team since a 12-7 win over the No. 3 Buckeyes on Nov. 15, 1986.

11 Coach Barry Alvarez and four Badger players were selected to participate in various postseason all-star games. LB Alex Lewis (East-West Shrine game) and DB Ryan Aiello (Las Vegas All-American Classic) were both chosen for games in early January. Lewis was also invited to play for Alvarez (head coach for the North team in The Villages Gridiron Classic) with LB Jeff Mack and QB Jim Sorgi.

12 Wisconsin's 56-21 victory over Michigan State on Nov. 15 gave the Badgers their most lopsided win since a 41-3 verdict over Iowa on Nov. 13, 1999.

13 Wisconsin is 53-5 during the Alvarez era (3-1 in 2003) in games in which it rushes the ball at least 50 times.

14 The Badgers began the 2003 season by going 6-1, their best start through seven games since the 1998 squad put together a 7-0 mark. Wisconsin also won its first two conference road games for the first time since 1950.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Two late fourth-quarter touchdowns snapped a 14-14 tie and gave Auburn a 28-14 victory over Wisconsin in the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl presented by Bridgestone.

Wisconsin scored first, ending a 65-yard scoring drive with a 20-yard field goal by Mike Allen. The Tigers responded with a 10-play, 79-yard drive that produced a 1-yard TD run by Ronnie Brown.

Historical Highlights

Nov. 15, 2003

WR Lee Evans breaks Wisconsin records for receiving yards (258) and touchdowns (five) as the Badgers rout 21st-ranked Michigan State 56-21 in Madison.

Oct. 11, 2003

The Badgers snap third-ranked and defending national champion Ohio State's 19-game winning streak with a 17-10 victory under the lights and in the rain at Camp Randall Stadium.

Sept. 6, 2003

Wisconsin becomes the first team in Big Ten history to have a 200-yard rusher and 200-yard receiver in the same game. Anthony Davis rushes for 247 yards and Lee Evans registers 214 receiving yards in a 48-31 win over Akron. Evans and RB Dwayne Smith repeat the feat against Michigan State later in the season.

Dec. 28, 2002

Wisconsin wins its seventh bowl game in eight tries during the Alvarez era with a 31-28 OT victory over 14th-ranked Colorado at the Alamo Bowl in San Antonio.

Anthony Davis rushes for 301 yards and five touchdowns in a regular-season ending 49-31 win at home over Minnesota. Davis nearly duplicates Billy Marek's 304-yard, five-TD performance in a 49-14 win over the Golden Gophers on the same date in 1974.

WR Lee Evans registers a then Camp Randall Stadium-record 228 yards receiving in a 42-28 loss to Michigan State.

Michigan edges the Badgers 13-10 before 111,341 fans at Michigan Stadium. It is the largest crowd ever to see the Badgers play football.

Jan. 1, 2000

Wisconsin opens the new millennium with its second straight Rose Bowl victory, a 17-9 win over Stanford. Ron Dayne is named game MVP.

Ron Dayne becomes Wisconsin's second Heisman Trophy winner.

Oct. 9, 1999

In one of the most emotional wins of the Alvarez era, the Badgers defeat Minnesota 20-17 in Minneapolis in the UW's first-ever overtime game. Vitaly Pisetsky boots the game-winning field goal as Alvarez

follows the game from a hospital bed due to an ailing knee.

Jan. 1, 1999

Ron Dayne rushes for 246 yards to key the Badgers' 38-31 upset win over sixth-ranked UCLA in the Rose Bowl.

Nov. 21, 1998

The Badgers clinch a Rose Bowl berth with a 24-3 victory at home over Penn State.

Dave Crossen sets the Wisconsin record for tackles in a game with 28 against Purdue.

Nov. 23, 1974

Billy Marek rushes for 304 yards and five touchdowns in a regular-season ending 49-14 win at home over Minnesota.



Camp Randall Stadium has hosted six night games, including last year's upset win over No. 3 Ohio State.

Sept. 20, 1969

Badger RB Alan "A Train" Thompson rushes for a then-school-record 220 yards on 33 carries in his collegiate debut against No. 6 Oklahoma.

Jan. 15, 1967

Ken Bowman becomes the first former Badger to play in the Super Bowl. He plays for the Green Bay Packers in the first Super Bowl.

Jan. 1, 1963



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-American end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.


Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.




Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference's MVP in 1942.



Dayne and Ameche honored at Camp Randall Stadium

The University of Wisconsin began a tradition in 1999 to honor outstanding achievement in Badger football history. The school has displayed the names of two of its greatest gridiron heroes — Ron Dayne and Alan Ameche — on the facade of the second deck at Camp Randall Stadium.


The tradition began during a special post-game ceremony on Nov. 13, 1999, when the Department of Athletics saluted the accomplishments of Dayne by putting his name on the upper deck facade. It was Dayne's last game in Camp Randall Stadium, a contest in which he became college football's all-time rushing leader.

Ameche became the second Badger honored when his name was added to the facade prior to the Badgers' game vs. Oregon on Sept. 9, 2000. The Kenosha, Wis., native was represented by his widow and son at the ceremony.

Additional names will be added to the facade as warranted.





HISTORY

Wisconsin's Ron Dayne



Ron Dayne is the most decorated player in Wisconsin football history. He capped his remarkable career by winning the 1999 Heisman Trophy, as well as the Maxwell and Doak Walker Awards. Dayne became Division I football's career rushing leader in his final regular-season contest as a Badger.

Honors, awards and records were never the focus of Ron Dayne's career. "I just tried to do what I could to help the team win," is what the soft-spoken tailback repeated many times throughout his career. Helping the Badgers win may be Dayne's favorite personal legacy, but other witnesses to his career will forever marvel at his on-field accomplishments.

Here's a look at some of his achievements:

- college football's most-decorated player after winning the 1999 Heisman Trophy, Maxwell and Doak Walker Awards.
- national player of the year by Associated Press, *Football News*, *The Sporting News* and Walter Camp.
- first player in college history to run for more than 7,000 career yards (bowl play included).
- college football's all-time leading rusher with 6,397 yards (no bowls). He bettered the old mark of 6,279 on a 31-yard run in his last game (vs. Iowa).
- three-time bowl game MVP (1996 Copper, 1999 Rose and 2000 Rose).
- first three-time Big Ten rushing champion.
- second nationally in rushing (by only 16 yards) as a senior despite sitting out six full quarters in large-margin wins.
- tied NCAA record for career 200-yard games (bowls not included) when he gained 216 yards vs. Iowa. Dayne, along with Marcus Allen (USC) and Ricky Williams (Texas), had 11 such games.
- Big Ten career leader in rushing and scoring.
- an average of 148.8 yards rushing per game (career) ranks fifth all-time in the NCAA.
- Big Ten offensive P.O.W. four times in 1999 (equaled the conference record).
- only player to lead the Big Ten in three categories (rushing, all-purpose yardage and scoring) during the 1999 season.
- recorded five games of at least 200 yards rushing in 1999, a national-best figure.
- had his name and number unveiled on the facade of Camp Randall Stadium after the Iowa game on Nov. 13, 1999.
- personally outrushed the opposing team 29 times in 43 career starts.
- joined Amos Lawrence (North Carolina), Tony Dorsett (Pitt) and Denvin Manns (New Mexico State) as the only players (at the time) in history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in four consecutive years.
- recorded 2,000-yard seasons as both a freshman and senior (counting bowl games).
- gained just over 50 percent of his career yardage after contact.
- landslide winner in the Heisman Trophy balloting. His 2,042 votes were the 10th-most of all time.
- honored with "Ron Dayne Days" as proclaimed by Governor Tommy Thompson, Madison Mayor Sue Bauman and Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist.





Was a consensus All-American...named first-team All-Big Ten in both 1912 and 1913...played on the 1912 team which was

undefeated and won the Big Ten championship (the 1912 defensive unit registered four shutouts and allowed only 29 points)...went on to play professionally with the Canton Bulldogs...in 1972, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame



Ray "Tubby" Keeler Guard, 1913

Consensus All-American...first-team All-Big Ten in 1912 and 1913



Arlie Mucks Guard, 1914

Was also a track star at the UW...undefeated in college career in the discus and shot put...competed in the 1912 Olympic Games in Stockholm, Sweden

and placed second in the discus...became a Big Ten football official following his playing days



Howard "Cub" Buck Tackle, 1915

Was a consensus All-American...captain of the 1915 Badger team...named first-team All-Big Ten in both 1914 and

1915...played for the Canton Bulldogs from 1915-19 and the Green Bay Packers from 1921-25...member of the Green Bay Packers' Hall of Fame...was the head coach at Lawrence College in 1924-25 and at the University of Miami from 1926-28



Paul Meyers End, 1919

Consensus all-American...first-team All-Big Ten in 1916 and 1919



George Bunge Center, 1920

A two-time All-American at center, he earned first-team honors in 1920



Frank Weston End, 1920

First-team All-Big Ten in 1919 and 1920...captain of 1920 squad which went 6-1...also played basketball for the Badgers...served on the Wisconsin Athletic

Board from 1948-63



Ralph Scott Tackle, 1920

Consensus All-American...played for Chicago Bears, 1921-25



Marty Below Tackle, 1923

Consensus All-American...Badger captain in 1923...first-team All-Big Ten in 1922 and 1923...Red Grange called him "the greatest lineman I ever played

against"...elected in 1988 to the College Football Hall of Fame



Milo Lubratovich Tackle, 1930

Consensus All-American...was named first-team All-Big Ten in 1930...missed the 1929 season with a broken leg...played in the 1930 East-West Shrine

Game...played with the Brooklyn Dodgers from 1931-35



Howard Weiss Fullback, 1938

Given the "Silver Football" for being the Big Ten MVP in 1938...Badger co-captain...first-team All-Big Ten in 1938...also played linebacker for

UW...played professionally for the Detroit Lions from 1939-40



Dave Schreiner End, 1941-42

Was a consensus All-American in 1942...also in 1942, was awarded the "Silver Football" as Big Ten MVP...named first-team All-Big Ten in 1941 and 1942...Badger

captain in 1942...first Badger ever to catch three touchdowns in one quarter in a win over Marquette in 1942...his number 80 was retired by the university...was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1955...was killed in 1945 in World War II



Pat Harder Fullback, 1942

Was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941...named first-team All-Big Ten in 1941 and 1942...was MVP of the 1943 College All-Star Game,

scoring two touchdowns in the game...was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1993...drafted second overall by the Chicago Cardinals in 1944, the highest UW draft pick in history...went on to a very successful NFL career with the Cardinals from 1946-50 and the Detroit Lions from 1951-53...led the NFL in scoring in 1947 and 1948, and was the co-leader in 1949...finished

career with 33 TDs and 3,016 yards rushing...member of the Lions' 1952 NFL championship team...a 1953 Pro Bowler...after playing days, became an NFL referee



**Earl Girard
Quarterback,
1944**

A versatile player, with the ability to run and pass, while also a punter and a safety on defense...was only 17 years old in the 1944 season...set a Big Ten and NCAA record with two punt return touchdowns in a game against Iowa in 1947...drafted in 1948 in the first round by the Green Bay Packers...played for the Packers from 1948-51, the Detroit Lions from 1952-56 and the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1957



**Ed Withers
Defensive Back,
1950-51**

Had eight career interceptions for the Badgers...All-Big Ten defensive back in 1951...in a 1950 game at Iowa, he intercepted three passes for 103 yards returned



**Hal Faverty

Starred on the top defensive unit in the country in 1951...was a defensive specialist and one of the top linebackers in the nation...twice was named United Press Lineman of the Week...earned all-conference honors as a senior in 1951...played in the 1951 East-West Shrine Game...played professionally for the Green Bay Packers in 1952

End, 1951**

Member of the famed "Hard Rocks" defensive unit, which was the best in the nation in 1951, setting school records for least points, rushing yards and total yards allowed per game...was an All-Big Ten defensive end in 1951...played in the 1951 Blue-Gray Game and was a member of the 1952 College All-Star team...played for the San Francisco 49ers in 1952 and the Green Bay Packers in 1955



**Dave Suminski
Tackle, 1952**

Played offensive and defensive tackle for the Badgers...blocked for standout running back Alan Ameche, who led the Big Ten in rushing in 1951...member of the 1952 Big Ten Championship team...played for the Washington Redskins in 1953...became an all-pro in the CFL from 1957-59, playing for the Hamilton Tiger Cats



**Don Voss
End, 1952**

Member of famed "Hard Rocks", top-defensive unit in the country in 1951, allowing only 6.6 points per game, 66.8 rushing yards a game, 154.8 total yards per game...played in the 1952 Rose Bowl...member of 1952 Big Ten Championship team...was also a track All-American in 1952...could not play professionally due to a career-ending knee injury



**Alan Ameche
Fullback, 1952-53-54**

Wisconsin's first Heisman Trophy winner in 1954...was a consensus All-American in 1954...named the Big Ten MVP in 1954...won the Walter Camp Award in 1953 as outstanding college player of the year...led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in the game...was the Big Ten rushing champion in 1951 and 1952...had the first 1,000 yard season by a Badger in 1952 as a sophomore... named first-team All-Big Ten in 1952, 1953, and 1954...set the NCAA career rushing mark of 3,345 yards...inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1975...was the second overall pick in the 1955 draft by the Baltimore Colts, which is tied for the highest UW player selected...played for the Colts from 1955-60...participated in four NFL Pro Bowls...scored the winning touchdown in the Colts 23-17 overtime win over the Giants in the 1958 NFL title game


Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

After opening the season with seven victories, the Badgers tied Northwestern 6-6 and lost to the Carlisle Indians. Despite the late-season swoon, the Badgers claimed the inaugural Western Conference title. The Badgers' tough defense registered shutouts in six of its seven victories. The loss to the Carlisle Indians was the first night game in school history (played indoors at the Chicago Coliseum).




1897 Western Conference Champions

Wisconsin won its second straight conference title and registered eight shutouts on the way to a 9-1 mark. The only loss was a 6-0 decision to the UW Alumni. Victories over Minnesota, Chicago and Northwestern propelled the Badgers to the Western Conference title. Australian kicker Pat O'Dea, the famed "Kangaroo Kicker," booted 14 field goals. It was the second league title for Coach Phil King.




1901 Western Conference Champions

Phil King's Badgers won nine straight games to become the first undefeated team in school history. Using a potent offense and stingy defense, Wisconsin defeated every opponent by at least three TDs and recorded eight shutouts. The Badgers outscored the opposition 317-5. Wisconsin's slate included two wins over high school teams and conference wins over Chicago and Minnesota.




1906 Western Conference Champions


1912 Western Conference Champions

Wisconsin registered four shutouts and allowed only 29 points all year.




1952 Big Ten Conference Champions

1959 Big Ten Conference Champions


Needing a victory in the regular-season finale to clinch a league title, Wisconsin beat Minnesota 11-7. It was the Badgers' first undisputed title since 1912. At the Rose Bowl, Washington scored 17 points in the first quarter on the way to a 44-8 win. All-Big Ten QB Dale Hackbart and All-Big Ten guard Jerry Stalcup were stars on a club that finished the season ranked sixth by AP and UPI.



1962 Big Ten Conference Champions


Although USC defeated Wisconsin 42-37 in perhaps the most exciting Rose Bowl ever, the Badgers finished the storybook campaign with an 8-1 record and ranked second nationally in both the AP and UPI polls. 
1993 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1993 Badgers established a new standard of excellence, shattering school records and earning numerous honors. After claiming Wisconsin's first Big Ten title in 32 years (a co-championship with Ohio State), the Badgers defeated UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl. The 10-1-1 club set a Wisconsin record for wins and boasted eight first-team All-Big Ten players, including Big Ten and Rose Bowl MVP Brent Moss. Wisconsin ended the season ranked fifth and sixth by the coaches (CNN/USA Today) and media (Associated Press), respectively.




1998 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1998 Badgers concluded the winningest campaign in school history with a 38-31 Rose Bowl victory over sixth-ranked UCLA. The 1998 club opened the season with a nine-game winning streak and registered the best winning percentage (.916, 11-1) in the modern era at the UW. Aaron Gibson was a finalist for the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy and Ron Dayne was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award. Tom Burke led the nation in sacks and Jamar Fletcher topped the NCAA in interceptions. Wisconsin was first nationally in turnover margin and scoring defense.



1999 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1999 Badgers ended the season with an eight-game winning streak after splitting their opening four contests. A 17-9 win over Stanford in the Rose Bowl allowed UW to become the first Big Ten school in history to win consecutive games in "The Granddaddy of them all." Wisconsin won its first undisputed Big Ten championship since 1962 and finished fourth in each of the final national polls. Ron Dayne was the consensus national player of the year and won the Heisman Trophy. Chris McIntosh and Jamar Fletcher joined Dayne as first-team All-Americans.



1953 Rose

PASADENA, Calif. — USC scored the game's only points on a 22-yard pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael in the Trojans' 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl.

The Badgers dominated the game from a statistical standpoint, outgaining USC by 120 yards. Led by Alan Ameche's 133 yards rushing, Wisconsin had a 211-48 advantage on the ground. However, both defenses rose to the occasion when necessary.

One of Wisconsin's best scoring chances came in the opening minutes of the third quarter. Ameche broke loose for a 54-yard run as the Badgers got to the USC 21-yard line. On third down, Archie Ray Burks fumbled on an end run and USC recovered.

The Trojans then put together the game-winning drive (73 yards), which ended with Bukich's TD pass. Wisconsin countered with a 13-play, 84-yard drive that ended at the Trojan two-yard line when Jerry Witt was stopped a yard short of a first down on a fake field goal play.

Coach Ivy Williamson's club was the first in Badger history to play in a bowl game.

Washington tallied the first TD on a 6-yard run by Don McKeta 10 minutes into the game. George Fleming booted a 26-yard field goal after the Huskies recovered one of four Wisconsin fumbles. Fleming then returned a punt 53 yards for a score on the final play of the period for a 17-0 Husky lead.

Badger fullback Tom Wiesner tallied Wisconsin's only points on a four-yard run with 5:27 left in the opening half. Dale Hackbart connected with Al Schoonover for a two-point conversion that cut the lead to 17-8.

Washington quarterback Bob Schloreidt, who shared game MVP honors with Fleming, tossed a 23-yard TD pass to close the first-half scoring. Schloreidt completed four passes for 102 yards and rushed for 81 yards.

Wisconsin mounted a challenge in the third quarter, but four plays inside the Husky 10-yard line failed. The Badger defense entered the bowl with a defensive average of barely 10 points allowed per game for the regular season.

USC had a 21-7 halftime lead and extended it on the first play of the third stanza, before Ron Vander Kelen led one of the biggest charges in bowl history.

Vander Kelen reached paydirt on a 17-yard scamper to reduce the margin to 28-14. USC responded with a pair of touchdown passes by Pete Beathard and the Trojans led 42-14.

Lou Holland (13-yard run) and Gary Kroner (four-yard reception) tallied for the Badgers within three minutes. A bad snap on a punt resulted in a UW safety. After the free kick, Vander Kelen hit three straight passes, including a 19-yard score to Pat Richter for the final 42-37 margin.

Vander Kelen, the game MVP, set both school and Rose Bowl records with 401 yards passing. Richter caught 11 of those aerials for 163 yards. The 79 total points scored was a Rose Bowl record that stood for 28 years.

SHREVEPORT, La. — Wisconsin won its first bowl game with a 14-3 decision over Kansas State in the Independence Bowl.

Randy Wright threw a game-record two TD passes and the Badger defense set a scoring record before 24,684 fans. The anticipated crowd was more than 49,000, but a 23-mile-per-hour wind dropped temperatures to 10 degrees below zero.

Wright, the game's offensive MVP, completed nine of 24 throws. However, his 87-yard pass play to Tim Stracka was the longest in UW and Independence Bowl history. The Wisconsin defense limited Kansas State to 192 total yards in the Wildcats' first-ever postseason appearance.

KSU had taken a 3-0 lead on Steve Willis' 29-yard field goal before the Badgers scored 14 straight points. Tim Krumrie was the game defensive MVP. He helped limit the Kansas State running attack to less than two yards per carry.

PASADENA, Calif. — The Wisconsin defense forced six turnovers, while the offense churned out 250 yards rushing as the Badgers downed UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl. It was the Badgers' first-ever New Year's Day bowl victory.

More than 70,000 Badger fans attended the game and provided a distinct home-field advantage in the Bruins' home facility.

Tailback Brent Moss, the Rose Bowl MVP, helped the UW to a 14-3 halftime lead by scoring on a pair of short runs. Moss rushed for 158 yards on 36 carries.

Wisconsin extended its lead to 21-10 when Darrell Bevell provided the game's most unlikely play. On second down from the UCLA 21, Bevell broke containment and weaved his way to the end zone for the game-winning points.

Trailing 21-16, UCLA's final drive made it to the Badger 18-yard line before Wayne Cook was stopped and the clock expired before the Bruins could run another play.

"The win, as much as it was for our players and coaches, was for our fans," said Coach Barry Alvarez. "They supported us all the way."

In a game that featured two of the nation's best runners — Wisconsin's Ron Dayne and Georgia's Robert Edwards — the Bulldog ballcarrier was the most effective. Edwards rushed for 110 yards and, more importantly, scored three TDs.

Georgia's multi-threat receiver Hines Ward caught a bowl-game record 12 passes (122 yards), threw one pass (incomplete) and rushed seven times (for eight yards).

"I don't think we played our best game," Wisconsin Coach Barry Alvarez said. "But I think Georgia had an awful lot to do with that."

In truth, the Badgers' Ron Dayne rambled his way to four touchdowns and the UW defense got a stop in the final minute to earn a hard-fought 38-31 Rose Bowl triumph over the sixth-ranked Bruins.

UCLA's defense struggled to stop Dayne, whose 246 yards rushing were one yard shy of the game record. The Badgers mixed in some timely running (65 yards) and passing (154) from QB Mike Samuel in building a 31-21 lead in the third period.

The Bruins cut the lead to three on Jermaine Lewis' second TD and were driving again when freshman Jamar Fletcher intercepted All-American Cade McNown and returned the pick for a TD.

Once again, UCLA battled back and pulled within 38-31. The Bruins' last drive started on their 46-yard line with 1:42 left. Three incompletions by McNown set up Wendell Bryant's game-clinching sack on fourth down.

More than 55,000 Badger fans enjoyed the school's second Rose Bowl win. Dayne's record-setting performance earned him bowl MVP honors.

Badgers vs. Golden Gophers

There is more at stake than just a win or loss on the team record when Wisconsin and Minnesota face each other on the gridiron. The most-played rivalry in NCAA Division I-A football (113 meetings, including every year consecutively since 1907) is also a battle for possession of Paul Bunyan's Axe. The winner of the game each fall gets to keep the Axe on its campus.

"The records can be thrown away when these two rivals meet on the football field," said Coach Barry Alvarez. "It didn't take very long for me to understand the importance of the game and the history associated with it."

Probably not many people in attendance realized the history they were watching on Nov. 15, 1890. That was the first time that bordering state universities from Wisconsin and Minnesota met on the gridiron in Minneapolis.

The game was just the Badgers' fourth gridiron battle ever. The Golden Gophers won the inaugural battle 63-0, but the start of one of college football's hottest rivalries was born.

The schools met for 15 consecutive years after that (the Badgers won seven and the Golden Gophers won eight) before the series took a one-year hiatus in 1906.

The resumption of the series was a 7-7 tie in 1907 and the schools have met every year since. It is the longest-running rivalry in Division I-A football.

Madison and Minneapolis have alternated hosting the historic matchup since the beginning of the modern era in 1946.

Much prestige has always been associated with the game, but another factor was added in 1948. After Minnesota won

a hard-fought 16-0 decision in 1948, the Wisconsin letterwinner's group (the National W Club) presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by legendary lumberjack Paul Bunyan.


Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the Axe, complete with final scores painted on its handle, for display on its campus.

The Badgers have taken seven of the last nine games from their border rivals. Wisconsin also won six straight in the series between 1978-83.

In the all-time series, Minnesota holds a 59-46-8 advantage. Wisconsin has a 28-22-6 mark in Madison and the Gophers have registered a 37-17-2 mark in Minneapolis.

There have been many notable contests between Wisconsin and Minnesota. Consider these:

- In 1961, Wisconsin intercepted three Gopher passes and upset No. 3-ranked Minnesota 23-21. The loss was Minnesota's only conference defeat of the season and cost it a share of the Big Ten title.
- No. 3 Wisconsin met fifth-ranked Minnesota in 1962 at Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers, playing for a league title and Rose Bowl berth, won a 14-9 decision. Ralph Kurek scored the winning TD with just 1:37 left.
- Fifth-ranked Wisconsin dropped a 28-21 verdict at the Metrodome in 1993, costing the Badgers an undefeated season.



Wisconsin will look to win back Paul Bunyan's Axe this season.

"The loss to Minnesota in '93 might have cost us a national championship," said Alvarez. Wisconsin got a school-record 423 passing yards from Darrell Bevell, but UW had six turnovers.

• With Alvarez watching from a hospital bed after knee surgery, the 1999 Badgers escaped with a 20-17 win. Kicker Vitaly Pisetsky ended the first overtime game in school history with a 31-yard field goal.

"There are a lot of folks who have personal attachments to this matchup," Alvarez said. "The game is a critical one each season for our players and supporters."

SLAB OF BACON TROPHY

The Slab of Bacon Trophy was the precursor to Paul Bunyan's Axe as the prize for the winning team in the Wisconsin-Minnesota football series.

Apparently the trophy was given to the winning school by a sorority from the losing institution. The trophy was discontinued in the 1940s and was eventually discovered in a storage room at Camp Randall Stadium by an intern from the UW Men's Sports Information Office during a cleanup project.

The Slab of Bacon trophy is currently housed in the football offices at the UW. "We took home the bacon," Coach Barry Alvarez said in 1992, "and kept it."







The Athletic Department site is the most visited one on the UW-Madison campus, averaging more than two million page views monthly.



Coverage Guidelines

We have continued to try and add relevant materials to this publication each year and would welcome additions or corrections with proper documentation. Additional information on Wisconsin football will be produced throughout the year by the Sports Information Office. We also encourage you to regularly check the department's Web site (uwbadgers.com) to get updated information on the team. Our staff looks forward to working with you this fall.

Interview Requests

All regular-season Badger practices, including Friday walk-throughs, are closed to the media. Interviews are conducted as follows:

Alvarez Interviews

Barry Alvarez holds a weekly media conference Mondays at 1 p.m. during the fall. Those sessions are live video-streamed on uwbadgers.com. Alvarez's comments are available on uwbadgers.com late Monday afternoon as both a video archive and a transcript.

Additionally, Alvarez is available every Tuesday from 11:50-noon CT on the Big Ten Teleconference.

Assistant Coach Interviews

Wisconsin assistant coaches are available after practice on Tuesdays and Wednesdays in the lower level of the McClain Center. If you wish to arrange a special interview with an assistant coach during the week, contact Brian Lucas in the Sports Information Office at (608) 263-5052.

Player Interviews

Badger players can be interviewed during the week on Tuesdays and Wednesdays after practice (approximately 6 p.m.) in the lower level of the McClain Center outside of the Wisconsin locker room area.

Phone calls by players to out-of-town media are made at the players' convenience between 7:30-10 p.m. CT on Tuesdays and Wednesdays only. Interviews should be arranged through Nick Brilowski of the Sports Information Office at (608) 265-3545. Home numbers will not be made available to the media, and players have been instructed not to conduct interviews when contacted without prior approval from the SID staff.

Ordering Phone Lines

Several courtesy phone lines (credit card and collect calls only) on level four of the press box are available on a first-come, first-served basis for the news media. News organizations requiring their own

phones should call Jamie Buchanan at (608) 265-8546 or email him at JB2@athletics.wisc.edu to order lines.

Credential Guidelines

Communications Center & Sideline Passes

Requests for credentials to cover Wisconsin football should be sent on company letterhead to: Sports Information Office, University of Wisconsin, Kellner Hall, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. The fax number is (608) 262-8184. Requests should be received at least 10 days in advance of the game.

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and reporters on assignment. You must display both a credential and an armband prominently to be on the field level. Your media credential alone will not give you access to the sidelines. Armbands can be picked up in the Media Room under the stands at the south end of the stadium. Media members cannot work between the 25-yard lines as recommended by the NCAA in its game management manual.

Credentials will be mailed if time permits. Those passes which cannot be mailed will be left with the parking attendant (white vehicle) at the entrance of Lot 17 on Engineering Drive (north end of the Stadium).

Credentials will be issued according to the following priorities: 1) TV and radio stations originating a live broadcast; 2) national publications, newspapers filing for the following day's publication and news outlets designated by the visiting SID; 3) TV and radio stations covering for nightly news; and 4) other requests, which will be evaluated on a space-available basis. Spouses, friends, non-workers and children are not allowed in the media areas as dictated by the NCAA. Anyone violating these standards will be denied credentials to future games.

Media Parking

A very limited number of parking passes in the Lot 17 ramp (north of Camp Randall Stadium) are available for working media. Make your request to the Sports Information Office for consideration.



Driving Directions

From Dane County Regional Airport

Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Avenue (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Avenue, which changes to Pennsylvania Avenue, Johnson Street, Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue through campus until Randall Avenue (look for Milan's Sub Shop on the left side). Turn left on Randall Avenue. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). The Stadium is located on the right side on Monroe Street.

From west via I-90/94 (from Minneapolis)

Take I-90/94 to Highway 151 South (Washington Ave.). Continue to the State Capitol Building. Turn right on Webster Street and complete half a square around the Capitol (Webster to Dayton to Fairchild). Turn right on West Washington Avenue and follow it to Regent Street. Turn right onto Regent Street. Follow Regent to Camp Randall Stadium.


From east via I-94 (from Milwaukee)

Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to its end at Highway 113 South. Turn left onto 113 South, which becomes Packers /

Pennsylvania Avenue. Continue on Packers / Pennsylvania Avenue, which changes to Johnson Street, Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue through campus until Randall Avenue (look for Milan's Sub Shop on left side of University). Turn left on Randall Avenue. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take right fork (Monroe Street). The Stadium is located on the right side on Monroe Street.

From south via I-90 (from Chicago)

Take I-90 to the Madison beltline (Highway 12/18). West on the beltline to Park Street. Exit right (north). Take Park Street to Regent Street. Turn left on Regent Street, then approximately six blocks to Camp Randall Stadium.

Radio coverage

For the 11th year in a row, exclusive radio coverage of Badger football can be heard on the 46-city Wisconsin Radio Network. The Department of Athletics and Learfield Communications / Badger Sports Properties entered into an agreement for radio broadcast rights for football and basketball in 1994.

WIBA-AM (1310 AM) and WIBA-FM (101.5 FM) are the rights holders in the Madison market, and WTMJ (620 AM) carries the games in Milwaukee.

Entering his 10th season handling play-by-play duties for Wisconsin football is Matt Lepay, named the state's Sportscaster of the Year for 1997, 2000 and 2003. Lepay has also called Badger basketball the past 15 seasons. A 1984 graduate of Ohio State, Lepay was sports director at WTSO in Madison before joining WIBA in 1994. He previously served as sports director at WNCI in Columbus, and prior to that worked at stations in Athens and Piqua, Ohio. Lepay is host of the Barry Alvarez Show (Badger Sports Report), both on WIBA Radio and WISC-TV.

Color commentary on radio broadcasts is provided by Mike Lucas, long-time sports columnist at *The Capital Times*. Lucas, who worked previously on the broadcast team for the Badgers' delay television package on the Wisconsin Public Television Network, also provides sports commentaries on WIBA. Lucas and Lepay are co-hosts of the popular WIBA Sports Review and Lucas also hosts "Sidelines", a talk-show on UPN14. He has reported on Badger sporting events for *The Capital Times* since 1971. Lucas has been a color analyst (radio and TV) for Badger football, men's basketball and men's hockey during his career.

The Barry Alvarez TV Show







Chancellor John D. Wiley has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea and build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the University of Wisconsin so rich in accomplishment and tradition.


Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.

Barry Alvarez**


Barry Alvarez began his head football coaching duties at Wisconsin in 1990, and in April of 2004 began a dual role when he assumed the responsibility of Director of Athletics.

Alvarez has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He has guided Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (99-67-4 record).

His 7-2 (.777) record in bowl games with the Badgers is among the best in college football history. The 1993 national coach of the year, he is a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and was a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.







In the last 11 years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional.








The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.



Badger Nickname

The nickname “Badgers” was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the “Badger State.” The name didn’t come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to “live like Badgers” in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot’s name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song “You’ve said it all,” a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like “On, Wisconsin” and the Bud song.

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Badgers in the Community



NCAA Compliance

As a member of the Big Ten Conference, Western Collegiate Hockey Association, and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the University of Wisconsin must abide by many rules and regulations. Below is general information on how these guidelines apply to prospective student-athletes and representative of athletics interests.

Definitions

A prospective student-athlete is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, one becomes a prospective student-athlete if a college gives the individual (or his/her relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A prospective student-athlete is recruited at a particular university when its coach approaches the prospect (or any member of the prospect's family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college by any one of the following three ways:

- Providing an official visit to the university's campus;
- Having an arranged, in-person, off-campus encounter with a prospect or the prospect's family; or
- Placing more than one telephone call to a prospect or any other member of his/her family.

A representative of the UW's athletics interests ("booster") is anyone who . . .

- is an alumnus of the UW
- has contributed to a Badger athletic program
- has helped arrange employment of enrolled and prospective UW student-athletes
- has been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

The Recruiting Process

Institutional staff members have very specific recruiting guidelines that vary by sport. The major areas are: telephone calls, contacts, evaluations, campus visits, correspondence, and highlight films/videotapes.

In addition to general recruiting regulations, no booster can be involved in recruiting (e.g., no phone calls, letters, or in-person contacts).

Eligibility

Prospects who intend to participate in Division I intercollegiate athletics must register with and be certified by the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. Please contact your high school counselor for more information on this process, especially regarding the requirements to be eligible.

Extra Benefits

By NCAA definition, an extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional

employee or a booster to provide a student-athlete or a student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit that is not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. This is prohibited. If the benefit is demonstrated to be generally available to ALL UW STUDENTS or their relatives or friends determined on a basis unrelated to athletic ability, it is not a violation of NCAA rules.

Extra benefits are also not permissible for prospective student-athletes. They are called offers and inducements, and include any benefit such as cash, clothing, cars, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA university. UW Compliance On-Line Training Program Compliance Rules and Regs is a compliance training program available on the Internet. Student-athletes, coaches and designated athletic department staff are required to complete the program, while boosters are encouraged to participate. Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center


The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all student-athletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are eight study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, is networked to allow access to email, the library system's electronic catalog and the web while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Associate Athletic Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists and a tutor coordinator who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutorial coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt (assistant director), Dan Ott, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. Study groups, tutors and a variety of academic and career planning are available throughout the year.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists whose offices are located in the center. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play.



The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Services Center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes eight study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

- Use athletics as preparation for success in life.
- Meet the changing needs of student-athletes.
- Promote respect for diversity among student-athletes.
- Enhance interpersonal relationships in the lives of student-athletes.
- Assist student-athletes in building positive self-esteem.
- Enable student-athletes to make meaningful contributions to their communities.
- Promote ownership by the student-athletes of their academic, athletic, personal and social responsibilities.
- Enhance partnerships between the NCAA, member institutions and their communities for the purpose of education.
- Encourage the development of leadership skills.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care.

Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Greg Ehlers, Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Andy Hrodey, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Kristen Walker, Laura Walluk, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Holli Schaible and Nicole Gehrich utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility.


Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, Dr. Tom Best and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.



Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.


The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.



Top: Camp Randall Stadium is the home of the football Badgers and has a seating capacity of nearly 80,000. The stadium is in the midst of a \$107 million renovation that includes a new office building, video scoreboards, suites and club seating as well as other improved fan amenities.

Whatever your preference for recreation or relaxation, you'll find plenty to do in Madison and encounter a diverse group of individuals who all call this place home.




Top: The State Capitol is the center of Madison's isthmus between Lakes Mendota and Monona.
