## A RESIGNATION AND NEW APPOINTMENTS

Roger Rodzen, who has been associate director for the past five years, resigned as of the end of June. Assigned to fill the responsibilities he leaves are Tom Smith, formerly operations manager, who becomes assistant director - operations, and Bob Serrano, building use coordinator, who assumes the position of assistant director - Memorial Union. Tom will oversee such services as food, personnel, maintenance, fiscal services, Commons desk, games room, guest rooms and outing center. Bob will be responsible for central reservations, building use, building supervision, the main desk, info booth, travel center and craftshop.

## MRS. CARYL MILLER RETIRES AFTER 45 YEARS

Holding perhaps one of the longest term service records in the history of the state and the Union, Caryl Miller, administrative secretary for the Union for more than 45 years, will retire September 15.

She started her Union service in the business office August 1, 1928, a month before the new Memorial Union building opened to the public. She became secretary to Porter Butts, Union director, on April 1, 1929 and has served continuously as his secretary until her retirement. She assisted in fund-raising for improvements in the Memorial Union building. Along with Director Butts, she has prepared a semi-annual newsletter mailed to more than 800 former student officers and staff members of the Union, and is well known to most of them -- many of whom come in to see her when they revisit the campus.

## RIDE THE SHOPPERS SHUTTLE TO THE UNION

The 5¢ shoppers shuttle bus that started last year has expanded its service and now operates two buses from 10 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday. A third bus is added from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on weekdays. The route is around the square and down State Street, Lake Street to Langdon and Langdon to Park and back up State. The bus stops in front of the Union at the corner of Langdon and Park Streets.

## QUICK NOTES ---

The UW Board of Regents has granted Professor Emeritus status to Porter Butts, retired Union director.

The latest on parking around the Memorial Union is that lots 1 (between the Union and Red Gym) and 6 (first floor of Helen C. White Library) will be metered from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday. Lot 6 in the lower level of the Helen C. White will have attendant parking on theater nights. The lot at the corner of Park and Johnson streets will have permit parking but will be open at night to the public.

The popular Mini-courses, ranging from earth food cooking to sandal making, were an experimental program sponsored by the Union this past year. The response was so good that plans are underway to expand the program next year so it is possible for non-student Union members to participate. ## HOOFERS PLANNING A BIG YEAR

The six Hooper clubs are getting into gear for the 1973-74 season and have announced a number of activities.

One area traditionally of interest to our annual and life members is the skiing activity. Among the highlights of the snow season for the Ski Club are: a trip to Kitzbushel, Austria scheduled for January 5 through 13; trips over Christmas break are being planned to areas such as Vail, Keystone, Jackson and Targhee; the traditional semester break trip to Michigan will leave January 11, 1974. Later in the season there will be day, evening and weekend trips. Beginning early in the second semester will be the popular Learn to Ski series. The Ski Club's annual kick-off meeting is October 10 in the Memorial Union.

The Hooper Sailing Club, the largest and best equipped in the country, will have a fall sailing season and plans to have its opening meeting on August 29 at 7:30 p.m. in Great Hall.

Outing Club, which meets every Tuesday at 7 p.m. in Hoopers quarters, engaged in quietwater and whitewater canoeing, kayaking, bike trips, backpacking, dayhiking, cross-country skiing and snow-shoeing. And, you don't have to be an expert, they offer free instruction in all areas of activity.

Other Hooper clubs are: Riding Club, which meets Wednesdays at 7 p.m.; Mountaineering, which holds meetings every Thursday at 7 p.m.; and the Ecology Club.
