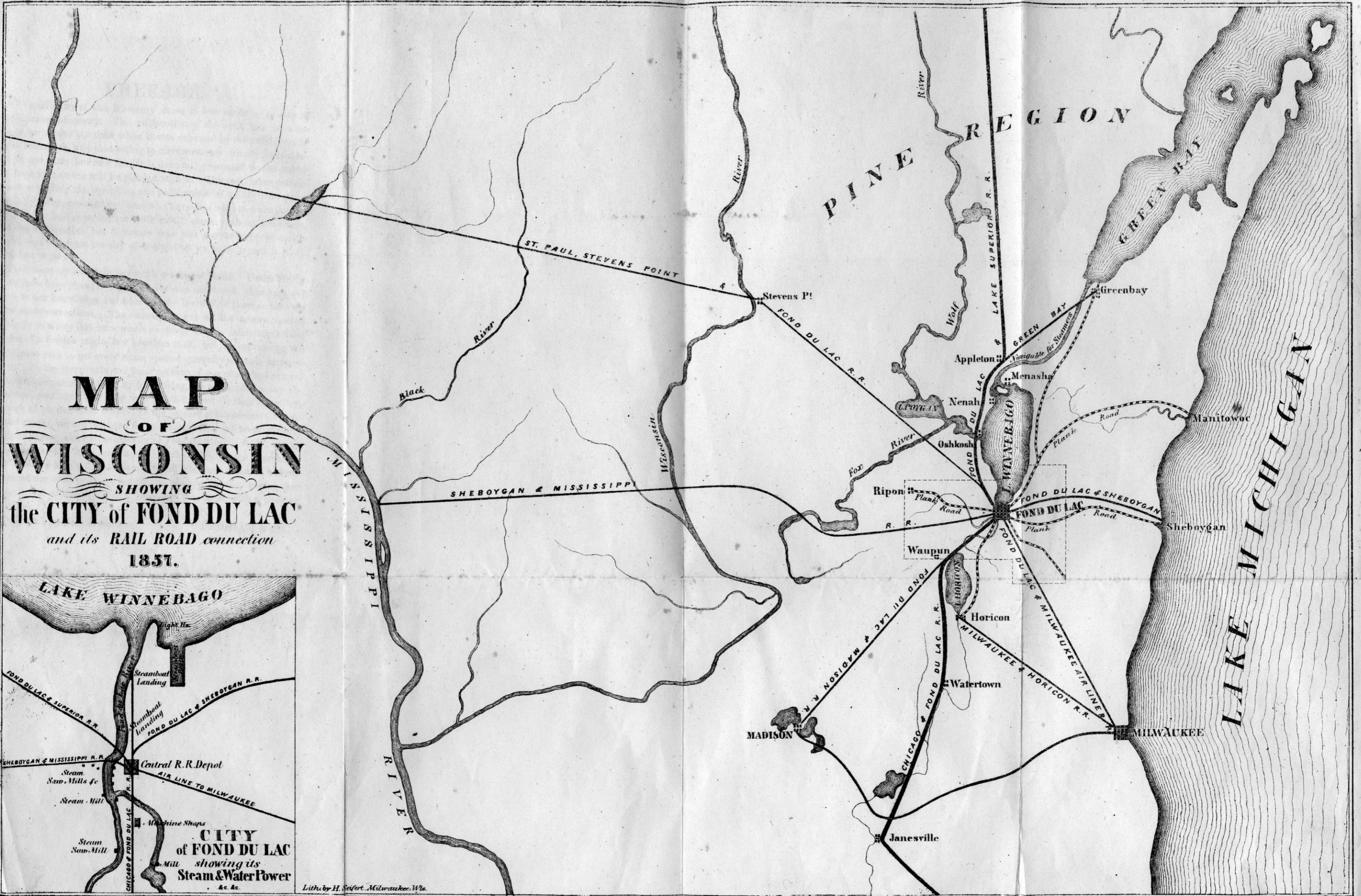

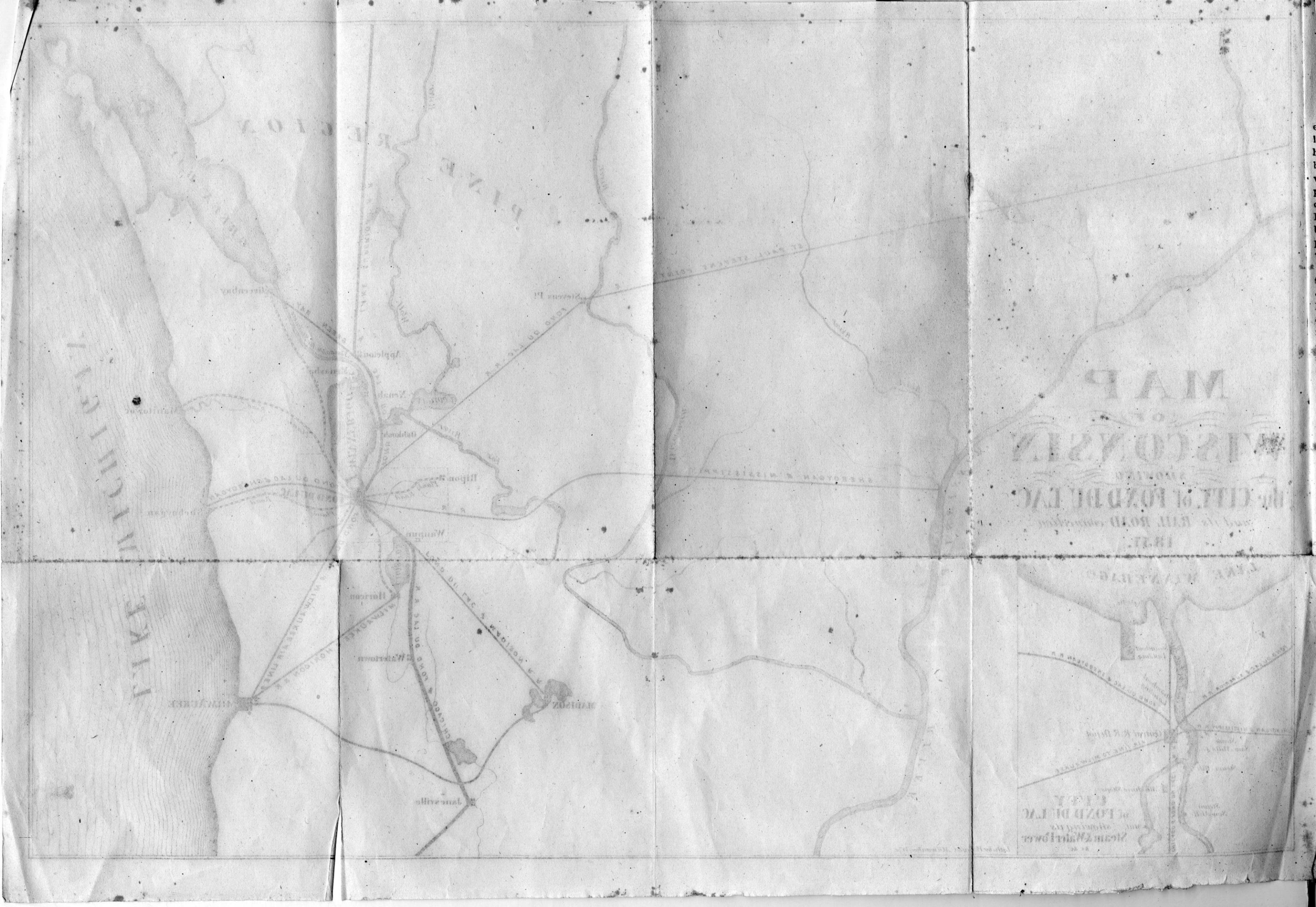
MAP

HISTORY OF FOND DU LAC.

INTRODUCTORY—ITS ORIGIN!

The City of Fond du Lac, like most of the cities of Wisconsin, is too young to assume the dignity of a veritable history. But in these fast times, when men of humble origin and more humble attainments, are puffing themselves into notice by flaming biographies, it can not be considered unwarranted assumption, for a young but flourishing city to come before the public with a brief sketch of herself. We commence with her origin, which is admitted to be very obscure—so much so that no one, not even the oldest inhabitant, knows whom she is indebted to for her name. The fact that the name is French, naturally leads one to think that it must have originated from some Frenchman; but who he was, where or when he lived, or at what particular time he gave the name, are unanswerable questions.* All that can be said about it is that the site of Fond du Lac City has been known by the name of Fond du Lac, so long “that the memory of man runneth not to the contrary.”

Shakspeare asks, “What’s in a name?” as if a name was of no consequence. But Solomon answered that question long before it was asked, by saying, “A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches.”

Is Fond du Lac a good name? That depends somewhat upon its signification. A name signifying “Poverty Valley,” or “Misery

Flat" would not be flattering even if disguised by some foreign tongue. The literal significance of the words is "Fond", bottom, "du Lac," of the Lake. Applied to a place, it was intended to designate the farthest extremity of the Lake.* The first settlement being made at Green Bay, in the direction of the opposite end of the Lake, this point was to the first visitors the far end or bottom of the Lake. The same name is applied to the upper extremity of Lake Superior, that being the extreme point reached from Sault St. Marie, where the first settlement was made.

The Indian name of the place is Winneco-me-yah, the meaning of which is unknown to the writer. As far as we can ascertain, there is nothing objectionable in the name Fond du Lac, a circumstance we should be thankful for, as it was not of our own selection.

THE SITE.

The City of Fond du Lac is situated upon a small prairie of about five miles in diameter at the southern extremity of Lake Winnebago. A ridge of limestone rock, in many places coming to the surface, borders the prairie in a semi-circular form, leaving it open towards the Lake. Through the middle of the prairie a stream of water with two branches meeting in the city, flows northward to the Lake. Along either branch of the river is a thrifty growth of forest trees, consisting of the usual variety of hardwood, such as hickory, maple, oak, elm, &c.

When the spot was first visited by the whites, and even in the memory of the present inhabitants, the prairie was the most attractive portion of the landscape. The bright green of the prairie grass, enlivened by the brilliant colors of innumerable wild flowers, reminded one of a cultivated flower garden miles in extent. It was perhaps even more brilliant and picturesque, presenting the fine touches of nature without the rude traces of art. But civilization has changed the scene materially and of whatever else it may boast, it has not added to the natural beauties of the prairie. With its herds of cattle and plough-shares, its houses and fences, and ditches, it has trodden out and defaced the beauties of this fair carpet of nature.

But few of the numerous prairie flowers are now to be seen. The remaining specimens to the number of about sixty have been lately collected and accurately copied upon canvas, in the form of a bouquet, by M. R. Harrison, Esq., an artist of this city. He has done ample justice to the subject producing an admirable picture as a work of art; besides he has conferred a lasting obligation upon Society by preserving specimens which will soon be extinct. The painting is in the possession of Mrs. Darling, of this city.

Protected by the surrounding ridge, and the growth of forest trees along the streams from the cold North West winds, the spot where the city now stands, became a favorite camping ground of the Indians. They had large villages on each branch just above the Forks, one near the residence of Geo. McWilliams, Esq., and one on the West Branch, below Forest Street Bridge, and probably another farther up the West Branch on the Bend of the River above Col. Tompkins' place. We are indebted to Gov. Doty for the following particulars of the occupation of this portion of the country by the Indians:

"The Hochungra or Winnebago nation of Indians occupied in 1828 the country around Fond du Lac, and along the West shore of the Lake to Menasha. They had large villages on each branch just above the Forks, and at the mouth of the second creek on the east side of the Lake. They appear to have succeeded the Kickapoos who occupied this point as early as 1680, and I believe as late as 1712."

Indian cornfields may still be traced in several places along the river, by the little hillocks. Upon the bank, just above where Bannister's warehouse now stands, is an Indian burying ground from which human bones have been taken in making excavations for building.

This point appears to have been in the exclusive possession of no particular tribe for a great length of time, and even while occupied by the Winnebagoes, it was visited by other tribes, and formed a centre for the Chippewas, (or Ojibwas, properly) and Menomonies on the East, the Pottawattamies on the South, and the Winnebagoes on the West of the Lake. They met at this point to trade

with the whites; for long before the country, between Lake Winnebago and Lake Michigan was explored by the whites, and before any settlements had been made upon Lake Michigan, all the important points upon the water communication between Green Bay and the Mississippi had been visited by Indian traders as early as 1680.— Indian traders crossed from Lake Superior to the Falls of St. Anthony and carried back their Furs to Green Bay by means of the Wisconsin and Fox Rivers.*

We have no further accounts of the trade carried on at that time at any particular points except at the Mission of St. Francis Xavier at "des Peres," and at Prairie du Chien, at the mouth of the Wisconsin, but it is reasonable to suppose that from about that time a regular trade was carried on with the Indians collected at Fond du Lac, as well as at other points along the same waters.

EARLY REMINISCENCES.

The first trace we have of any location at Fond du Lac, by the whites, is given by Governor Doty, in a letter to the writer, to whom it is hoped the reader will join me in making a bow. He writes, "Mr. Franks an Indian trader at Green Bay established a trading post at the Forks of the Fond du Lac River in the year 1787. Jacques Portier, now deceased, wintered there as his clerk that year; and was succeeded by John Lawe in the year 1791, subsequently Mr. Augustus Grignon, (now living at Butte des Morts) had a trading post on the West Branch of the river, a short distance below the first rapid. He showed me the site and remains of his house in the winter of 1828."

The first location mentioned above must have been nearly opposite the present Rail Road Shops—the latter just above Col. Tompkins' residence on the school section.

It is curious that about these spots where houses were first erected, particularly if they were on the Prairie, the white clover came up in place of the prairie grass, soon after they were occupied and before the seed could have been brought to the country.

The date of the location made by Augustus Grignon is probably

about the year 1820, nearly the same time that Solomon Juneau settled at Milwaukee. This could not however be considered as a settlement for the house was erected for the temporary purpose of trading with the Indians. And it seems that the place was not continually occupied from that time, but was visited often by itinerant traders, who carried their packs of Indian merchandize and furs upon their backs, Solomon Juneau has frequently spoken of starting from Milwaukee with a pack of eighty lbs. weight upon his back, going to Saukville, Sheboygan striking into Lake Winnebago and returning by the way of Fond du Lac to Milwaukee.

In 1836, Rolette an Indian trader, (now living at Prairie du Chien,) informed George McWilliams, Esq., then a resident of Green Bay, but now, of Fond du Lac, that he had paddled canoes loaded with Indian goods, up the Fond du Lac river, taken them across into Rock River and descended that to the Mississippi. This was not the route usually taken, but it brought them in contact with Indian villages, they would not otherwise have reached. The distance of portage between the East Branch of the Fond du Lac River and Rock River is about two miles, the shortest distance being in the vicinity of the Brewster Farm.

For the details of the first positive settlement of Fond du Lac we are indebted to Martin Mitchell who published a History of Fond du Lac County in 1854, from which we take the following extracts relating to Fond du Lac City.

“February 17th 1836, Edward and Colwert Pier from Green Bay visited Fond du Lac for the purpose of selecting a location for a residence. There was not a house in the county and they slept on the bank of the river near where the city now stands. A tract of several thousand acres had been purchased by the Fond du Lac Company in 1835. The company was composed of James Duane Doty, afterwards Governor of the Territory, Geo. McWilliams, present Mayor of the City (in 1834) J. P. Arndt, H. S. Baird, and several others. At the mouth of the river and within the present city limits, though not in the most populous portion a village plat of something more than a square mile was surveyed into lots by this company and a Block House erected in the spring of 1836. Into this house

Colwert Pier and his wife removed June 6th 1836. At that time there were no other inhabitants in the county."

This was the first permanent location for the purpose of settlement and for several years but little progress was made in peopling the village. Under all the privations they endured the few families who first settled may be said to have staid rather than lived.

"On the 21st of June, the same year, Messrs. Calvin and Edward Pier, father and brother to Colwert arrived at Fond du Lac on a visit to Colwert. They reached Colwert's house after much difficulty, having to swim the creek upon a dark and rainy night. In December following Edward again left Green Bay to visit his brother; there was no road; he succeeded in getting near the head of the Lake upon the ice, when his horse broke through. It was very cold and the horse soon perished but Mr. Pier succeeded in reaching his brothers' his hands badly frozen. He returned to Green Bay, made arrangements, and on the 11th of March 1837 removed to Fond du Lac with his wife and two children, the youngest about four weeks old. These two families composed the whole population of the county until June 1st, the same year when Norman Pier from Middlebury and Albert Kendall from Rochester, Vermont, young men without families were added to the number. They had plenty of neighbors such as they were, but being Indians and wolves they were neither profitable nor desirable. Their depredations were a constant annoyance, and a source of uneasiness to the few who had commenced to cultivate the soil and produce the means of support. Their hardships were neither few nor small; provisions were not to be had nearer than Green Bay. Pork was \$30 per barrel at that place and Breadstuffs equally high: and added to that was the difficulty and expense of transporting them sixty five miles over an Indian trail.

"The Indians were very troublesome, stealing the produce of their little fields and their pigs. Mr. Pier had, with careful watching succeeded in raising a hog, weighing nearly three hundred pounds; his expectations were high that he should have pork of his own raising, but unfortunately his porker disappeared without even leaving a grease spot. He afterwards learned how the Indians contrived to steal it. They also stole a horse; but the theft most keenly felt,

was the only milch cow of Edward Pier, which the Indians stole and killed, leaving him very destitute of support for his family. This was far the severest pecuniary loss Mr. Pier ever sustained; for a time it almost crushed his hopes; as he had placed his main dependence upon his cow for the daily support of his family. There were other inconveniences and troubles incident to a pioneer life, which they felt. On the 9th of December 1839, Oliver Webster, son of Colwert Pier, nearly severed his foot, by a blow with an axe, just forward of the instep; there was no doctor nearer than about sixty miles; every effort to stop the blood was unavailing and death seemed rapidly approaching, when his brother Edward recollecting a story of staunching a wound with dog's hair, made an application of it which stopped the blood entirely. For twenty days and nights the parents never undressed themselves for rest, and it was not until the following February, that he was able to leave his room on crutches. These are a few of the incidents related for the purpose of giving one an idea of pioneer life.

“ June 17 1837, Miss Harriet Pier, (afterwards Mrs. Raymond.) came from Middlebury, Vt., to her brother's in this place. There was now a female circle of three in the county.

On the 3d of September the same year, Mr. Calvin Pier with his wife and son, Oliver W., from Middlebury, joined the new settlers, and partook of their fortunes.

“ March 1st 1838, Mrs. Fanny, wife of Colwert Pier, died after a short illness. She was the pioneer woman in the county and also from the county to the spirit world. The funeral was attended by the few inhabitants, all mourners; a sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Marsh. Missionary to the Stockbridge Indians.

“ On the 3d of March 1838, Mr. John Bannister brought his family to the neighborhood. There was no white person then living between Green Bay and Chicago excepting Mr. Juneau at Milwaukee. Mr. Bannister surveyed the county of Fond du Lac and several other counties in this portion of the state. He helped to raise the first three framed buildings in Milwaukee—did the first grading ever done in that city, built the first framed building in the county of Fond du Lac, held the first Judicial Office, that of Justice of the Peace, was

the first Register, County Surveyor and Marshal, Member of the first Board of Commissioners for the County and performed the first marriage ceremony in the county. His son John A. Bannister was born June 30th 1839 being the first birth in the county.*

“About the first of June 1838, Mr. Joseph Brower settled with his family at Fox Lake, in Dodge County, 28 miles from Fond du Lac, when there was great rejoicing that another settlement was commenced so near.

The first road through the settlement was opened in 1836, from Green Bay to Fort Crawford, known as the Military Road, though it seems to have had small claim to the name of road. The streams which were otherwise absolutely impassable, were covered with poles laid upon fragile foundations, a little above low water mark.”

“Through timbered land there were some definite marks to inform the traveller of the road's locality; through openings, prairies and marshes, he had a wide field for selecting his route, provided he could find the bridge over the next stream.

This was the general state of the roads for many years. In 1837 and '38 there was a road opened from Sheboygan. In the Fall of 1838 there was a road opened and bridged to Fox Lake. This road had been previously surveyed by Mr. Brower.”

In the winter of 1839 there was a road opened by way of Waupun to Madison, and a settlement commenced by Mr. S. Wilcox, at Waupun, 18 miles from Fond du Lac, and one at Taycheedah by F. D. McCarty and Reuben Simmons. In 1842 a road was opened from Fond du Lac to Milwaukee.

In the month of April 1838, Dr. Mason C. Darling came to Fond du Lac to reside, and on the 14th of June following his family joined him. He soon built and opened a house for the accommodation of travellers, on the site now occupied by Darling's Block on Main Street. He purchased a mill site where a mill had been commenced

*He died in the Fall of the present year, called away just as he was entering the sphere of manhood. Possessed of more than common natural abilities, ambitious and enthusiastic in literary pursuits, he had raised himself to the first rank among scholars. High minded and generous in his impulses he had endeared himself to a large circle of friends. We are indebted to his pen for many of the details collected here, taken from a sketch prepared by him shortly before his death, and kindly furnished by his father.

“Death loves a shining mark.”

on the West Branch, which is now known as "Clark's Mill." This he soon prepared for business and commenced sawing and furnishing lumber for the inhabitants. He also rebuilt the bridge, which had been swept away by a freshet, across the East Branch on the Military Road.

"The first mail brought to Fond du Lac was on the 5th of February, 1838. A half blood Indian travelling on foot, brought it once in two weeks, and afterwards once a week.

"Colwert Pier was the first Post Master. He was succeeded by John Bannister, who informs me that when he came to the office, the revenue was about three dollars a year. The next year Dr. Darling was appointed to the office, and the revenues increased to over twenty dollars. In 1857 the Revenues amounted to three thousand six hundred and twenty five dollars and sixty eight cents.

The first political meeting held in the county was at the Fond du Lac House September 10, 1848. It deliberated in regard to the organization of the county. September 26, 1838, the first marriage in the county took place, Mr. Alonzo Raymond to Miss Harriet Pier, by John Bannister, Esq.

May 6th 1839, a meeting was held at the Fond du Lac House to organize the county, for all but Judicial purposes. The territory previously belonged to Brown County, with the county seat at Green Bay.

August 6th 1839, the first election for county officers was held. Three county commissioners were chosen, John Bannister, Edward Pier and Reuben Simmons. A. Raymond, was chosen Treasurer, and John Bannister, Register.

On the 7th of August the County Commissioners organized their Board, by the election of Reuben Simmons, chairman, and Mason C. Darling, clerk.

During this season, 1839, Messrs Rogers of Green Bay and Stevens of Fox Lake established a stage route from Green Bay to Fort Winnebago, making a trip every week.

From this time up to 1846 we have been unable to gather any incidents of general interest.

October 1, 1846, Messrs J. O. Henning and E. Hooker, commenced the weekly publication of the "Fond du Lac Journal," a paper

of medium size. On the 23d of March following, Mr. E. Beeson purchased the interest of Mr. Hooker and the publication was continued by Henning & Beeson, until the following July, when Mr. Beeson purchased the interest of Henning and continued the publication in his own name until March 1849. It having been enlarged to a seven column paper the 22d of June previous, it was purchased by Messrs Eastman & White, under whose auspices it was controlled until September when Mr. Beeson again resumed the proprietorship by purchasing the interest of Mr. White. It was then conducted by Eastman & Beeson to May 29th 1851, when Mr. Beeson purchased the whole establishment, and published the paper in his own name until June 23d 1853, when Mr. Thomas purchased an interest in the establishment and changed the name to the Fond du Lac Union, and the publication of the paper was continued by Thomas & Beeson until June 16th, 1854, when Mr. Reed purchased Mr. Beeson's interest and from this time until Feb. 14, '56, it was published by Thomas & Reed, when Mr. Thomas bought Mr. Reed's interest and published the paper in his own name until March 1857, when he sold a part of the office to Mr. S. C. Chandler, and the paper was published by Thomas & Chandler until July 14th, 1857. Mr. Chandler then sold his interest to Mr. W. H. Brooks, and the Union is now successfully conducted by Thomas & Brooks.

December 17, 1846, James M. Gillett, Esq., commenced the publication of the Fond du Lac Whig. As its name indicates it was devoted to the interests and measures of the Whig party. It was published for one year, and then discontinued. The establishment was afterwards purchased by Mr. Hooker.

March 1, 1847, officers were elected under the first village charter of Fond du Lac. Mason C. Darling, President, John A. Eastman, W. T. Gibson, T. L. Gillett, Isaac Brown, S. S. N. Fuller and J. J. Driggs, Trustees. E. W. Dury, Treasurer, W. A. Dewey, Clerk, and Carmi Wright, Constable.

January 6, 1848, Mr. Samuel Ryan commenced the publication of the Fond du Lac Republican; the following spring Mr. William McGee became a partner in the establishment. In July 1850, the

name was changed to the Fountain City. This paper advocated the principles of the Whig party, and continued until April 1851, when it was discontinued.

April 30, 1851, Mr. John D. Hyman, commenced the publication of a weekly sheet, imperial size, called the Fond du Lac Patriot. He continued it to Jan. 31, 1852, when it was purchased by Mr. Amos Reed, who changed the name to National Democrat, and continued to publish it till June 1853, when it was purchased by Mr. M. J. Thomas and with the Fond du Lac Journal merged into the Fond du Lac Union.

April 6th 1852, the village charter was superseded by another called a City Charter, and the first election was held under it on that day. The officers elected were Mason C. Darling, Mayor, J. M. Taylor, Treasurer, W. A. Dewey, Clerk, C. N. Snell, Marshall and E. Hodges, Superintendent of Schools.

The population of the village in 1850, being only nineteen hundred and in 1852, less than three thousand, the inquiry naturally arises, why was the change from a village to a City Corporation? The reasons given at the time were that the act of Incorporation for the village was very defective and not adapted to the wants of Western villages rapidly increasing in population. The subject was examined and such changes in the Act of Incorporation agreed upon as were considered essential for Fond du Lac. It then became necessary to give it a name and the question occurred whether if it should be called a village charter, the Legislature would not insist upon the sufficiency of the general statute for the incorporation of villages, and refuse to pass a special act for the purpose. To avoid any question of that kind and in part, perhaps, because the act was somewhat similar to City Charters, the term City Charter was agreed upon.

November 9, 1852, Mr. Royal Buck commenced the publication of the Fountain City Herald, on the large double medium press, and materials upon which the Wisconsin State Palladium had formerly been published at Madison. In the summer of 1856 this paper was united with the Western Freeman, published by J. A. Smith, and the name changed to Fond du Lac Commonwealth, which has since been published by Smith & Orvis.

The Western Freeman was established at Fond du Lac, October 5, 1854, by Mr. J. A. Smith, who continued its publication till it was united with the Fountain City Herald.

In February 1857, the present Fond du Lac Journal was started by Messrs Beeson & Smead it soon after came into the possession of Smead & Strong, the present proprietors.

The papers now published in Fond du Lac, are the Fond du Lac Union and Journal, both democratic, and the Commonwealth, republican, weekly papers.

In 1850, the population of Fond du Lac, then a village was 1940. In 1855 it was 4000. The census has not been taken since, but the population is now estimated at about 8000. This is probably a low estimate as the increase was greater during the year 1856 than for any former year.

The increase of population and business has not been so rapid as to indicate a fictitious basis. The city has only kept pace with the country around it. The products and real wealth of the country have been vastly increased. The money panic which has nearly paralyzed the business of the whole country and the consequent reduction in the price of the products of the soil, has had its effect upon the business of the city, but the Banks are all sound and the business men have so far withstood it beyond expectation.

Many buildings have been erected during the past season ; among the rest a Block of stores by S. B. & J. Amory equal to any in the state. The building would be an ornament to any city. It was designed and the work superintended by Thomas H. Green a young architect of this city. It contains one of the finest Halls in the state, a description of which is thought worthy of a place here.

AMORY HALL.

The Block of which this Hall forms a distinguishing feature is seventy feet wide by ninety six deep. The Hall is in the third story above the basement, and with the exception of thirteen feet taken off the back end for the entrance, stairway, and two ante-rooms, is of the entire size of the building. After deducting the walls and inside finish the room measures sixty six by eighty feet. The ceiling

is twenty-five feet from the floor, and finished with sixteen large panels recessed sixteen inches deep, and moulded with dentals and large rich mouldings. The margins between the panels are ornamented with egg mouldings and rosettes. In the centre of the ceiling is a Dome, thirty eight feet in diameter arching twelve feet in height to a sky light ten feet in diameter, in the centre of which is an ornamented ventilator.

The ceiling of the Dome is divided into twenty eight panels by moulded ribs portions of which are painted light blue, while more prominent parts are of a darker blue. The panels are painted a light French Gray. These colors contrast with each other admirably, giving the whole Dome a rich mellow tint like an Indian Summer's Sky.

The Room Cornice is supported by large ornamental brackets richly carved and placed against an ornamental Panel Frieze.

The Orchestra is at the back part of the room and is twenty two feet long and eight feet deep, five feet of which is recessed back of the finish of the Room. The front of the Stage is raised three and a half feet above the floor and is built in a circular form and supported by Roman pillars with pannels between. The seats around the outside of the Hall are so arranged that they let down into the wall when desired, the remainder of the seats are chairs. Twelve hundred persons can be seated with ease and if occasion requires fifteen or sixteen hundred can be accommodated with seats.

This spacious apartment is warmed by hot air furnaces in the basement.* There are two sets of double entrance doors at each end of the stage, each set ten feet wide. Over the entrances are two parlors or sitting rooms, each thirteen by twenty feet, with an open front to the Hall and finished with an open work balustrade.

The entrance Hall and stairs are so spacious and conveniently arranged that twelve hundred persons can disperse from the Hall in eight minutes, and in case of a fire in much less time as there is a back stairway that could be used. The doors open outward so that the pressure of a crowd would not have the tendency to keep them closed.

*As soon as the Gas Works are completed, it will be lighted by eight beautiful chandeliers with six burners each, and four side burners.

ARTESIAN WELLS.

Fond du Lac is bountifully supplied with pure water from Artesian Wells, or Fountains as they are usually called. They are obtained in all parts of the city and at so small an expense that nearly every family has one at the door. People who came here at an early day before they were obtained can appreciate their importance. When the water was obtained from wells sunk a few feet in the earth as is usual, there was much sickness among the people. Fevers and agues prevailed at times alarmingly, and the location began to be looked upon with suspicion except by physicians.

So desirable was it thought to obtain other water than the ordinary well water, that the project of obtaining it from the springs on the Ledge was about being adopted. Measures were taken to form a company for the purpose of conducting water from a spring on the farm owned by Col. Conklin, now belonging to Mr. Phillips—about a mile east of the town. But like many other projects of settlers in new countries, which requires a great outlay of capital to start them, the work had not been accomplished or even commenced, in August 1848, when the glad tidings were announced that water was flowing from the ground at the Badger Hotel. The children of Israel were probably not more surprised and delighted at the water in the wilderness flowing from the rock than were the good people of Fond du Lac at the sight of the first Artesian Well.

Water was obtained at the depth of 85 feet and it continued to discharge according to estimates then made at the rate of 21,600 gallons in 24 hours.

The result has shown that there was real cause of rejoicing at the discovery of this water. For since it came into general use fevers and agues have been unknown to the residents, and for health, Fond du Lac is unsurpassed upon the continent. By many, the water is thought to possess medicinal qualities of great value. In order to determine its properties, Mr. George McWilliams sent a bottle of it taken from his well, to a practical chemist to analyze and received the following reply.

“It affords me pleasure to inform you that the contents of the water sent me, gives evidence of its chalybeate properties, unsurpass-

ed by any known spring, either in this country or in Europe. Indeed it exceeds the celebrated German Spa. by at least 63 per cent. The analyses has been made with great care and may be depended upon."

"If the spring should continue to preserve its integrity I should deem it of almost priceless value. As a remedy to assist digestion, as a mild cathartic, and as an exhilarating tonic, and especially in diseases of the skin, I deem it very valuable. Those suffering from loss of tone and power in the nervous system, ought to be made acquainted with its life giving properties."

The spring of George McWilliams, Esq., from which the water above analyzed was taken is 90 feet deep and discharges 60 gallons per minute, or 86,400 gallons in 24 hours. There are others in the city which discharge a much larger volume. They range from 50 to 120 feet in depth according to the locality; those adjacent being nearly of the same depth.

There are but few localities where these wells can be obtained. They were first obtained at Artois, in France, from which place the name of Artesian Well is derived.

The philosophy of these Artesian Wells is quite simple and easy of comprehension. We start with the well known law, that water when poured into a vessel of any shape whatever, will rise to the same height in every part of it, and also that it will continue to rise until it reaches the height of the fountain head or overflows the vessel. In order to obtain these wells a peculiar formation is required. There must be a basin or reservoir, which must be supplied with water from a source as high as the mouth of the well. That

basin or reservoir must have no outlet lower than the surface where the well is to overflow.

In boring for these fountains the strata penetrated are loam, red clay, hard pan nearly as hard as rock, then rock. The water is found below this rock and seems to be contained in a layer of gravel and sand which also rests upon rock. It is supposed that the lower rock forms a basin as high at least, as the water rises in these wells which is known to be several feet above the surface. The next layer of rock above, sets inside of this basin which holds the water, like one earthen basin within another. The space between them which contains a layer of coarse gravel, is filled with water poured in from the top of the basins. The inner basin is filled with different layers of earth. When these layers of earth and the upper layer of rock are penetrated the water rises up to a level with the water between the two basins.

Water springing from the ground, struggling upward to minister to man's necessities, in spite of the mysterious law of gravitation, dragging it downward, it rises up from the hidden recesses of the earth and furnishes man and beast with a life sustaining beverage. It mounts to the hill-top and feeds the brook that babbles down its side, going on its life-cherishing errand and bestowing alms all the way to the sea side.

How wonderful are the most common things when appreciated! How curiously adapted to the wants of man is this Globe of ours? Without this arrangement in nature water could only be collected in stagnant pools, unfit for the use of man.

But man multiplies the store which nature supplies. The spring bubbles out from the crevice in the rock here and there. Man sets about imitating the processes of nature and a whole city full of bubbling fountains spring out of the earth. Before each man's door the treasure sparkles. None so poor they cannot partake; none so rich that they need not.

GEOGRAPHICAL POSITION AND TRANSPORTATION ADVANTAGES.

Fond du Lac, from its location upon Lake Winnebago, commands a large extent of water communication. Being at the southern extremity of the Lake, which extends into a fine agricultural country,

It is a natural point for a large surrounding country to meet this water communication. It is connected with Lake Michigan and the Eastern markets by the lower Fox, which flows from the foot of Lake Winnebago into Green Bay, and with the Mississippi country by the upper Fox and Wisconsin rivers, united by a canal of about two miles in length. This line of water communication has been known as a public highway since Father Marquette, a Jesuit Missionary, first passed over it, starting from Green Bay, to explore the upper Mississippi in 1763. This water course through a fertile and unsurpassed agricultural country, naturally attracted the attention of the first settlers of the State, for the facilities it afforded for commerce, and manufactures, and the first settlements in the State were made, one at Green Bay, at the mouth of Fox river, and the other at Prairie du Chien, at the mouth of the Wisconsin. At an early day it became apparent to the settlers of this country that this channel of communication between the Mississippi and the great Lakes might, without great expense, be so improved as to become a great highway for commerce through a rich agricultural country. In 1838, it attracted the attention of the General Government, and Mr. Poinsett, Secretary of War, called the attention of Congress to its value as a route for military communication and transportation, and urged an appropriation for the construction of locks around the rapids of the lower Fox, between Lake Winnebago and Green Bay, and a canal to unite the rivers at the Portage. To effect this object, in August, 1846, Congress granted to the State of Wisconsin alternate sections of land on each side of the Fox river, and, in 1848, the State accepted the grant and appointed a Board, which were charged with the execution of the work. The Constitution of the State forbids the creation of any public debts; the Board were therefore limited in their expenditures to the receipts from the sale of lands granted by Congress. As the population of Wisconsin was then comparatively small, and the public lands had not been taken up by settlers, their receipts were not sufficient for a vigorous prosecution of the enterprise.

On the 6th of July, 1853, the Legislature transferred the remainder of the grant and all the works of improvement to an association,

consisting of Mason C. Darling and Benjamin F. Moore, of Fond du Lac; Otto Tank, Morgan L. Martin, Edgar Conklin, Joseph G. Lawton and Uriah H. Peak, of Green Bay; and Theodore Conkey, of Appleton, and their associates, named and styled the "Fox and Wisconsin Improvement Company," allowing them all the benefits from the unsold lands of the grant, and all the profits of the work when completed (restricted only by a maximum price for tolls), on condition that they were to assume all the indebtedness and liabilities of the State incurred in the prosecution of the work, and were to complete the same within a given time.

The work has been successfully prosecuted, though not completed. Steamboats of light draft have passed through the whole line; and during the present season boats have made regular daily trips between Fond du Lac and Green Bay, doing a successful and profitable business. The practicability of the entire route is no longer doubtful, as the most difficult part is now open to steamboat navigation.

The company have about 400,000 acres of land remaining unsold, which have been selected. It is contended, on the part of the company, that they are entitled to about 350,000 acres more, and the Legislature of the State have petitioned Congress to confirm the additional grant. Should the additional grant go to the company, they will have subject to sale about thirty-two townships of land. The company have lately located their office, for the sale of these lands, at Fond du Lac, and are still engaged in prosecuting their work on the upper Fox and Wisconsin rivers.

This work has been regarded with great interest by the people of Fond du Lac; for whatever means of transportation may be afforded, this must be a competing line for a great portion of the business. Aside from this improvement, these waters furnish Fond du Lac with an extensive lumber business. Logs are floated down the Wolf and Fox rivers, rafted to Fond du Lac and manufactured into different kinds of lumber, to the amount of twenty millions of feet per year. The great extent of country in Southern Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, and even farther South, dependent upon these great pineries to the North of us for building material, will add immensely

to this branch of business as soon as the line of transportation is opened South, and into the interior of the State.

The Chicago, St. Paul and Fond du Lac Railroad is the most desirable route for that purpose. It is now constructed from Fond du Lac south as far as the junction with the La Crosse and Milwaukee road, furnishing a line from Fond du Lac to Milwaukee. It is also built from Janesville south to Chicago. From the La Crosse Junction to Janesville, much work has been done; but it is not yet finished. This season has been unfavorable for all railroad operations, and to this cause alone must we attribute the delay, in the entire completion of this line, beyond the present year.

In connection with the railroad south, is another road, running north from Fond du Lac to the Copper and Iron mines of Lake Superior. This is called the Fond du Lac and Lake Superior Road. The first twenty miles of this road is nearly finished, and will soon be in operation. For the completion of this road, Congress has granted an appropriation of land thought to be sufficient to build the road. It is, no doubt, sufficient to secure its completion.

This road is particularly important to Fond du Lac. It unites, by the shortest possible route, the richest of mining and agricultural countries. The mining business upon Lake Superior is yet in its infancy, and already the capital invested is considerable. There is every reason to believe that it will give employment to a very large population, and furnish an extensive market for agricultural products. This demand can be supplied to better advantage from Northern Wisconsin, with a railroad direct from Fond du Lac, than from any other section.

The most northerly portion of the State is almost entirely unsettled; it is heavily timbered and less fertile than the central and southern portions. North of Fond du Lac, all that is raised, or will be for years, will be required to supply new settlements and for the lumbering population. Fond du Lac is the first point on the route where a surplus can be obtained. South and west of it, is one of the best wheat-growing sections in the world, furnishing an immense surplus, now shipped to the eastern market. Much of this surplus

is at present needed upon Lake Superior, and the demand must increase in a rapid ratio to their railroad communications.

Another important demand for the agricultural products south of Fond du Lac is yet to be made at the other extremity of Lake Winnebago. An immense water power has been improved and made ready for use, by the Improvement Company on the lower Fox. The power is sufficient to manufacture for the whole continent, and can be furnished at a small expense. Should this water power be used as the wants of the country absolutely require, no inconsiderable portion of the surplus produce will find a market here.

The operatives in the factories of Massachusetts and other Eastern States are supplied with food from the West, and all their manufactured goods needed at the West are transported more than a thousand miles to find a market. There is every reason to believe that the time is not far distant when the goods will be manufactured where provisions can be furnished, and a market found without the immense cost of transportation.

The opening of new and improved markets for the country will naturally increase the business of the towns. Fond du Lac, with her plank and gravel roads extending out in every direction, may reasonably expect a great increase in business from the opening of these markets to the north of her. Her railroads to the South and West will be employed in transporting the manufactured products of the North and returning the agricultural products of the South.

In addition to these railroads, Fond du Lac has several others already commenced and in contemplation. The Sheboygan and Mississippi road furnishes the shortest route to Lake Michigan, the whole distance being but forty miles. Twenty miles of this road is graded. The Milwaukee Air Line road furnishes an outlet by way of Milwaukee—distance sixty miles. Some work has been done upon the road the past season.

The roads now in process of construction will give to Fond du Lac railroad advantages unsurpassed by any interior town in the State.

Meets every Tuesday evening in Templars Hall, Marshalls Block, Second street near Main. Is much the largest Lodge of Good Templars in the state and increasing weekly.

At the time of its organization there were over sixty licensed places of selling liquors in the city, and at this time there are only about thirty five showing a decided decrease in the liquor traffic among us.

WINNEBAGO LODGE, No. 58, organized Nov. 28, 1857, with eleven Charter members. Meets every Wednesday evening, in Sexsmith's Hall, corner Arndt and Brooke Sts. It bids fair to flourish and be an influential Lodge.

CHURCHES.

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH, (EPISCOPAL,)

Corner of Follett and Bannister Sts. Rev. GEO. B. EASTMAN, Rector.

St Paul's Parish was organized under the missionary labors of the Rev. Joshua Sweet on the 3d day of September, A. D. 1848. It was duly incorporated on the 4th day of September, 1849, and the following vestry elected: John Hamilton and Newell Carr, Wardens, N. P. Tallmadge, Geo. McWilliams, A. D. Bonesteel, S. W. Beall, G. D. Ruggles, Carson Graham, Nathaniel Waterbury and A. G. Ruggles, Vestrymen.

The present church edifice was completed and occupied in the spring of 1852. The first Rector, the Rev. Joshua Sweet, resigned in June 1854, and was succeeded by the present Rector in October of the same year. The present Vestry are T. F. Strong, and Thomas W. Dee, Wardens; M. K. Stow, Robert A. Baker, A. D. Bonesteel, N. P. Tallmudge, G. W. Findeisen, M. J. Thomas, Geo. P. Lee, and Jas. W. Partridge, Vestrymen.

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

This Church was organized in February, 1855, with twelve members, and now has forty-one. The present pastor is Rev. R. Frame, residence on Marr near Second St.

Their elegant Church edifice is situated on Main St., and is an ornament to our city. It was erected in 1855—6, through the enterprize of three or four members of the Church, and is highly creditable to their taste and energy, as it is to its Architect, THOS. H. GREEN, Esq. It is a fine specimen of Church architecture both on the outside and inside. The beauty of its fine spire we have seldom seen surpassed.

FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

This church was organized in July 1845 and at the date of its organization numbered only nine members. At present it has one hundred and fifty members.

Its first pastor was Rev. L. C. Spofford, who was installed in September 1846, and continued his labors until September 1852.

Rev. Silas Hawley, jr., commenced his pastoral labors with the church in June 1853 and continued to July 1857. At present the church is temporarily supplied by Rev. Edward Brown.

The church now occupied was completed March 1850, and is situated on the corner of Marr and Second streets.

Hours of service 10½ A. M. and 7 P. M.

PLYMOUTH CHURCH.

The Plymouth Congregational Church was organized on the 21st of December, 1856, consisting of thirty five members—a colony from the First Congregational Church.

It numbers at present fifty eight. Its place of worship hitherto has been a Hall in Warner's Block on Main street. But it expects soon to take possession of a new and handsome chapel, now nearly completed on First street, directly in the rear of Darling's Block, and a few steps only from Main street. This edifice to be called "Plymouth Chapel," is 35 by 60 feet, having a gallery in front, and capable of seating nearly four hundred persons.

The Pastor elect of this Church and Society, is Rev. WILLIAM L. MATHER.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH,

CORNER of Forest and Union streets, Rev. C. H. REMINGTON, Pastor. James Hook, Wm. Williams, J. R. Smith, Deacons. E. Perkins, Clerk. Services on Lord's Day 10 1-2 A. M. and 2 P. M.

The First Baptist Church was constituted by Rev. P. Conrad, May 1st 1845. November 10 1846, Rev. W. H. Card was called to take charge of the church as Pastor and continued to labor with them until the spring of 1850 when he resigned his office and removed from the place. The church then remained destitute of a minister for one year, when they called Rev. S. Cornelius to the Pastorate, who continued with them four years. During his ministry, measures were taken, which resulted in the erection of their present house of worship. The preparatory steps to the work of building were taken May 26th 1851 and the church edifice was completed and dedicated to the worship of God, December 29th 1853. H. Conklin, E. Perkins, J. Hook, J. Barnett and Geo. Soule, were chosen Trustees and still remain in office.

The Rev. S. Cornelius having resigned his Pastorate, the church invited Rev. R. Jerrard to become their Pastor, which he did Oct. 21st 1855, but his health failing he resigned at the end of six months

and after a lingering illness died in the Spring of 1857. In Sept. 1856, Rev. C. H. Remington became Pastor of the church and still holds that office.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

THE first Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Fond du Lac, was formed by Rev. H. S. Bronson, in 1843. The pastors have been Revs. H. S. Bronson, J. Lewis, M. L. Noble, H. R. Colman, H. Requa, J. S. Prescott.

In 1852, the Society was divided into two separate congregations, and two Church edifices erected.

Marr Street Church, cor. of Marr and Third Sts. Divine worship is held at half past 10 in the morning, and at half past 6 in the evening. The pastors of this Church have been, E. Tucker, E. S. Grumley, T. C. Golden, T. T. Kutchin and C. Scammon, who is the present pastor.

Arndt Street Church, on Arndt St. Services usually at half past 10 in the morning, and half past 6 in the evening. The pastors of this Church have been Revs. M. Himebaugh, Wm. Shell, J. C. Robbins, and T. C. Golden.

INDEPENDENT CHURCH.

This is a Society organized in September, 1857, Rev. T. T. Kutchin, pastor. Services in Amory Hall, at half past 10 A. M., and at 7 P. M.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH, (Catholic.)

Rev. Louis Dael, pastor, Rev. Thomas David, curate. The Church contains about 2,500 members. Its present place of worship is situated on the corner of Marr and Second Streets but a new and beautiful edifice is being erected on the corner of Follett and Marquette Streets. At present the French, Germans and Irish worship together, but as soon as the new Church is completed the French will occupy the old Church, and the Germans and Irish, the

new one. The name of the Church situated on the corner Marquette and Follet Sts., has been changed since the publication of the late City Map. It was originally intended to convert the old Church into an Academy, but it will remain for the use of the French by the name of St. Louis Church, and an Academy will be built near the new Church.

CEMETTERIES.

RIENZI CEMETERY ASSOCIATION.

Incorporated in August 1853.

Trustees: N. P. Tallmadge, President; Robert A. Baker, Treasurer; A. D. Bonesteel, Secretary; A. G. Butler, M. J. Thomas, Isaac S. Tallmadge and N. Boardman.

This Cemetery is located on the side of the Ledge, and commands a fine prospect of Fond du Lac, Lake Winnebago, and the surrounding country, and is approached by a gravel road from the city, three miles from Fond du Lac.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Buffalo, more direct and cheaper than by any other route. Several steamboats have been running from the upper Fox and Wolf Rivers, and Fond du Lac to Green Bay and back, daily during the past summer. Two of these steamers, the Appleton Belle and Aquilla, were built at Pittsburgh and came upon these waters via the Ohio, the Mississippi and the Wisconsin Rivers. RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

RULE 1st. At the hour of meeting or adjournment of the Council, the Mayor or in his absence the President, shall call the Council to order, and preside over the same.

RULE 2d. The following standing committees shall be appointed by the Mayor, viz: A committee on Finance, to whom shall be referred all claims and amounts for their investigation and report. An Improvement committee, to whom shall be referred the improvement of streets, side walks, and sewers, and all other improvements, and a Committee on Miscellaneous Business.

RULE 3d. All questions to be decided by vote, shall be put in the usual parliamentary form, unless a division be called for.

RULE 4th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated previous to debate.

RULE 5th. When any person is about to speak in debate, or present a subject to the Council, he shall address himself to the Chair, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid all personalities.

RULE 6th. No member of the Council shall interrupt another in his remarks, unless to call him to order for a violation of a rule of order.

RULE 7th. All motions—except a motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table—and all resolutions, shall be reduced to writing if required.

RULE 8th. Any motion may be withdrawn by consent of the Council, before any decision or amendment to the same.

RULE 9th. Every member present when a question is put, shall vote, unless the Council for a special cause, excuse him.

RULE 10th. Any member of the Council who voted with the majority, may move a reconsideration of the vote at that or the next succeeding meeting.

RULE 11th. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone indefinitely, or to a certain period, to refer or to amend, shall always be in order, and be decided without debate.

RULE 12. Any three or more Aldermen may demand the ayes and noes on any question, and when so demanded the same shall be entered upon the records.

RULE 13th. Every resolution, order, or other action of the City Council by which an appropriation is made, or debt, or liability against the city will be incurred exceeding \$100 shall be passed by a majority of all the members elect; unless there be two or more of members absent, in which case such acts shall be passed by a two thirds vote of the members present.

RULE 14th. Except as above provided, the common parliamentary rules shall be applicable to the City Council in its deliberations.

RULE 15. Any of the foregoing rules may be suspended for the time being, by a vote of two thirds of the Aldermen present.

RULE 16th. These rules may be altered and amended at any meeting of the Council: Provided, however, that a notice of such alteration or amendment shall have been given at a previous meeting.

RULE 17th. No account or claim shall be allowed at a meeting of the Council when the same is presented, but shall be referred to the appropriate committee, and lie over till the next meeting.

POLICE JUSTICE.

AN ACT, defining the duties, powers, rights and jurisdiction of Police Justices in the City of Fond du Lac.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Sec. 1. The Police Justices of the city of Fond du Lac, shall have and possess all the authority, powers and rights, and jurisdiction of a Justice of the Peace in civil proceedings, and shall have sole and exclusive jurisdiction to hear all complaints, and conduct all examinations and trials in criminal cases within the city, and shall have exclusive jurisdiction in all cases to which the city shall be a party, and shall have the same power and authority in cases of contempt of Court as a Court of Record; Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be deemed to divest the Judges of the Circuit or County Courts of their authority as conservators of the public peace; nor to affect in any manner the powers or jurisdiction of the Circuit or County Courts of Fond du Lac County. The Police Justice shall be entitled to receive for his services, the same compensation in fees as is allowed by law to the Justices of the Peace for similar services, and no other. But the city shall not be liable to said Police Justice for his said fees, except such as shall accrue in prosecutions for the violation of the charter or ordinances of the city, wherein the defender shall have been discharged from imprisonment or custody by the authority of the Common Council. In case of the absence, sickness, or other inability of the Police Justice, the Mayor may appoint and authorize by warrant, any Justice of the Peace within said city to perform the duties, and shall give notice of

such appointment to the City Attorney, City Marshal, and Common Council. The Common Council may confirm or reject such appointment, and the Justices so appointed and confirmed, shall, for the time being, possess all the authority, powers and rights, and discharge all the duties of the Police Justice. Appeals, and Writs "Certiorari," may be taken from the Police Justice, to the Circuit Court in the same manner as from the Justices of the Peace.

Sec. 2. The Police Justice shall quarterly report to the Common Council a list of all proceedings instituted before him in behalf of the city, and the disposition thereof, and shall, at the same time, account and pay over to the Treasurer the amount of all penalties and fines collected which may accrue to the city. The city shall not be liable or pay any costs for violations of any law of this State, but such costs shall be a county charge as heretofore.

SEC. 3. All acts or parts of acts contravening or conflicting with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect immediately after its passage.

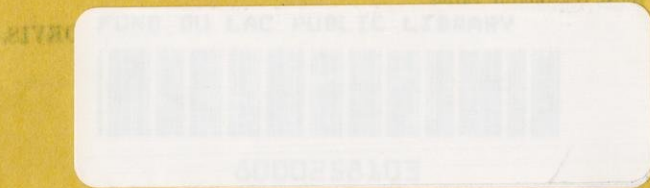
