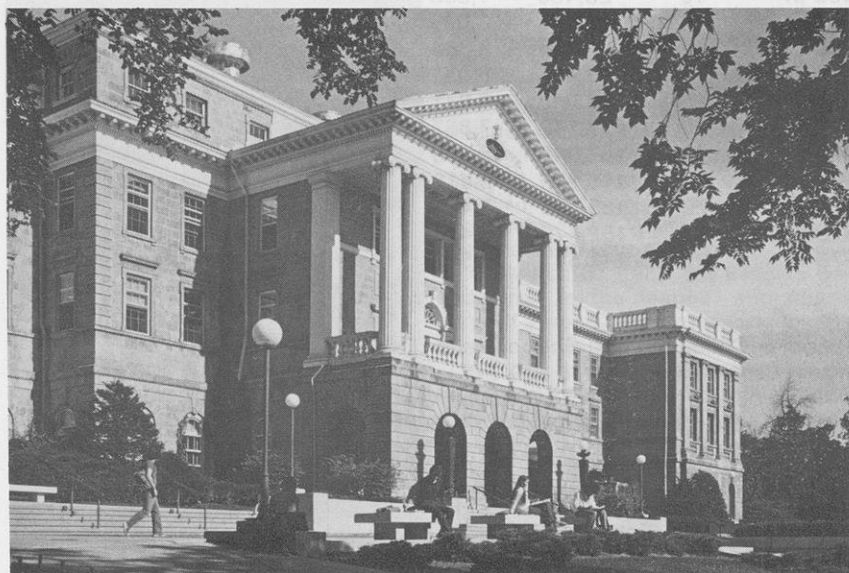

The DANE COUNTY MEMORIAL COLISEUM

Wisconsin plays its home games in the beautiful and spacious Dane County Memorial Coliseum. There are 8,000 theatre type seats and space for 630 additional seats and standing room making the capacity for hockey 8,630. It is the largest college hockey arena in the nation. The ice surface is regulation 85 x 200 feet.



RECORD ATTENDANCE

Wisconsin hockey has attracted record crowds to the Coliseum ever since the Badgers joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Ass'n in the 1969-70 season. Wisconsin fans have set college hockey attendance records for 8 consecutive seasons starting with 1970. The 1976-77 season total of 217,532 fans that saw 27 home games was the most fans ever to watch a college hockey team during a single season at home.

Wisconsin Hockey History

The "modern" era in Wisconsin hockey history began in March of 1962 when then Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced that the Badgers would return to intercollegiate hockey competition for the 1963-64 season — after a 28-year layoff.

Long-time Madison hockey backers, John Riley and Art Thomsen, coached the early Badger icers; and quickly formed a respectable hockey club. On the night of December 6, 1963, Wisconsin's Chan Young scored at 5:10 of the first overtime period to give the Badgers their first win of the modern era, 3-2, over Macalester College of St. Paul, Minn.

Wisconsin went on to post an 8-5-3 record in its first year, playing mainly teams from small colleges in Minnesota, Michigan and Illinois.

The following season the Badgers won 14 games and lost nine. That year the Badger icemen, in an effort to upgrade the level of competition, added eight games against opponents from the Western Collegiate Hockey Conference (WCHA). They lost all eight.

Undaunted by their lack of success, the Badgers in 1965-66 scheduled six games against WCHA foes. True to form, they

lost the first five; but the final margins were decidedly closer than they had been the previous year — 3-2 to Colorado College, and 3-1 and 5-3 to Michigan State.

Then on the evening of February 22, 1966, it finally happened. The Badgers had battled back from a three-goal first-period deficit to pull even with the Minnesota Gophers at the end of regulation time, 4-4. Barely two minutes into the sudden-death overtime period, junior wing Jim Petruzates snared an errant Gopher pass and unmolested, fired a 20-foot slapshot past the sprawling Minnesota goalie. Wisconsin hockey had come of age.

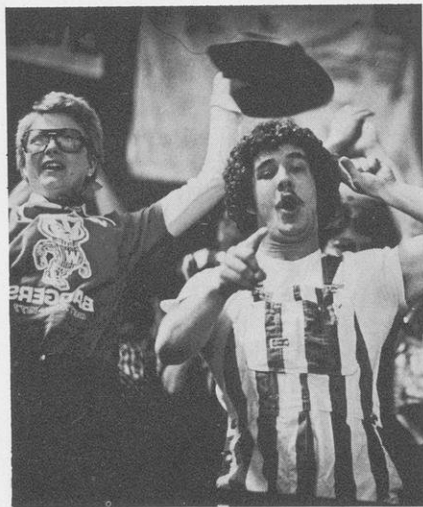
John Riley retired as coach after the 1965-66 season and was replaced by 35-year-old Robert N. Johnson; a Minnesota native, a former professional baseball player, and the hockey coach at Colorado College.

In his first season, Johnson expanded the Wisconsin schedule to 26 games; adding eastern powers Brown, Providence and Army, plus the Austrian National team; and finished at 16-10.

The following year, led by national scoring champion, Bert DeHate, the Badgers improved their season mark to 21-10. DeHate, a sophomore from St. Paul, Minn., finished the year with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists, including seven hat tricks. A mid-term graduate in 1969-70, DeHate played in only 20 games that year, but still ranks as the all-time leading Wisconsin scorer with 188 career points.

Wisconsin's hockey fortunes continued to improve as the Badgers won 22, lost 10 and tied two in 1968-69; including, for the first time, a winning record (11-9-2) against WCHA competition. With his team's record to show, Bob Johnson began lobbying for Wisconsin's admittance into the prestigious conference.

On March 30, 1969, the Badgers were admitted to the league, and quickly proved a worthy entry by placing fourth in the standings. All first-year teams previously had finished dead last. It was also the year the Badgers made their initial appearance at the NCAA Tournament in Lake Placid, N. Y. Led by the "Freshman Flyer" line of Max Bentley, Tim Dool and Norm Cherrey, the Badgers finished third in the tourney, and became recognized as a national power.

Following the tournament, defenseman John Jagger, from Sault St. Marie, Ontario, became Wisconsin's first hockey All-American.

In 1970-71, the Badgers again played well, finishing with a record of 20-13-1; but Wisconsin fans, who were packing the Dane County Coliseum in record numbers, had another goal in mind — a national championship. It was not to be that year; or the next, when Wisconsin again placed third at the national tournament.

With a blazing start in 1972-73, the Badgers won 10 of their first 11 contests. They finished 18-9-1 in league play and earned the right to travel to Boston for their third try at the NCAA title. In one of the most electrifying games in tournament history, Wisconsin beat semi-final opponent Cornell, 6-5 in sudden-death overtime. Sophomore Dean Talafous scored with five seconds left in regulation time; and again just 33 seconds into the extra period to send the Badgers into the championship game for the first time ever.

Although they fell behind league rival Denver early in the title game, the young Badgers were determined to leave Boston a winner. With workmanlike precision, the Cardinal and White came back to muster a 4-2 decision; and with it, the national championship.

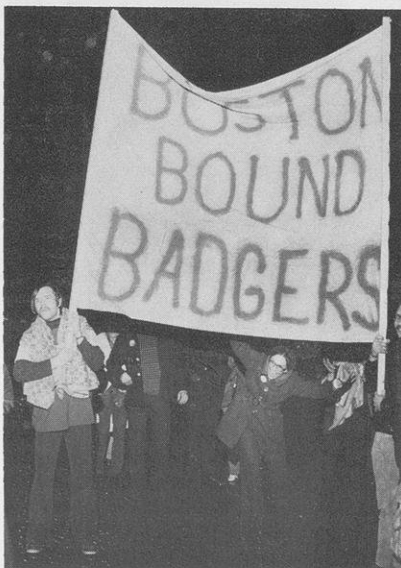
The Badgers did not return to the NCAA meet until four seasons later. In each of the three years in between, the Badgers were eliminated in WCHA play-off battles with Michigan State. Those seasons were not failures by any stretch of the imagination. In 1973-74 the team finished with a fine 18-13-5 record and in '74-75 the Badgers won 24, lost 12 and tied 2 and Brian Engblom became the school's 3rd All-American defenseman. Even during the 1975-76 season, when the Badgers suffered through their first losing season of the modern era, there were bright spots. Interim coach Bill Rothwell, with a young and inexperienced team made a late-season surge and moved from 10th to 7th place in the WCHA to make the play-offs.

The Badgers were determined not to let the Spartans or anyone else stop them from playing in the NCAA meet in '77. The Badgers downed Colorado College and Minnesota in the 1st two rounds of the play-offs and then had to face Michigan in the WCHA's 1st play-off Champi-

onship series. Wisconsin had beaten the Wolverines 3 of 4 times during the regular season and once again the Badgers proved to be the better team by sweeping the total goal series 9-4.

Winning the NCAA meet for the second time was no easy task for the Badgers. It took two overtime victories in Detroit's Olympic Stadium before Wisconsin could claim it's second title. In the first game against New Hampshire, it was Les Grauer and Mike Eaves who scored the tying and winning goals that enabled Wisconsin, once more, to play Michigan, this time for the NCAA Championship. Senior Steve Alley, scoring on a rebound only 23 seconds after the overtime began gave the final victory to the Badgers and triggered a celebration that lasted for days.

1976-77 was a season long to be remembered. The Badgers were the 1st team ever to win the NCAA Championship, the WCHA title and the Big Ten crown in the same year. Three players were selected to the All-American team, Julian Baretta, also MVP in the NCAA meet, Mike Eaves, and Craig Norwich, for the second year in a row. Bob Johnson was the WCHA's Coach of the Year and his son Mark Johnson was tabbed as the league's Rookie of the Year. All this, plus the school's best record ever of 37-7-1 and a total of 18 other school records that were established add up to Wisconsin's finest year in hockey.

BOB JOHNSON **Head Coach - 11th Season**

Badger Mentor Bob Johnson returned for his 10th season last year and made it the most memorable one of his first decade as Wisconsin hockey coach. Johnson's 10th team gave Wisconsin its second NCAA Championship, won the WCHA Title and captured the Big Ten crown. The team also established 18 new school team and individual records. The Badgers' '76-'77 record of 37-7-1 boosted Johnson's record at Wisconsin to 237-105-14. Since coming to Wisconsin Johnson has moved hockey from a non-revenue sport to one of three income-producing sports at the school. During his tenure as coach Wisconsin has won two NCAA Championships, four Big Ten Titles, one WCHA crown, led the nation in attendance every year since 1969 and saw seven players selected to the All-American team.

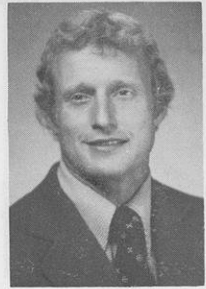
Johnson took over the coaching reins at Wisconsin in 1966. For three years the team operated as an independent before joining the tough Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) for the 1969-70 campaign. That young band of upstarts surprised the hockey world that year by finishing fourth in the league when all other first-year teams previously had finished last. The Badgers then went on to their first NCAA tournament and finished third.

From 1973 through 1976 Johnson coached the U. S. National teams and the U.S. Olympic team which took fourth place in the 1976 Winter Games held in Innsbruck, Austria. Johnson's teams gained respect of the hockey community around the world and received the 1976 Meritorious Service Award from the Amateur Hockey Ass'n of the United States. Currently Bob serves as a consultant to the President's Commission on Olympic sports. This past season Bob was named the WCHA Coach of the Year and the Madison Pen & Mike Club's Sportsman of the Year.

The 46-year-old Johnson is a native of Minneapolis, Minn. He played hockey and baseball at the University of North Dakota in 1950-51; and at the University of Minnesota 1952-54. Bob started his coaching career in 1956 at Warroad, Minn., and started a three-year stint at Colorado College in 1963 as hockey and baseball coach. His hockey teams at CC compiled a 29-51-3 record. In baseball, Johnson was named the Coach of the Year for NCAA College division Rocky Mtn. District in 1964 and '65.

Bob received a Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota in '54 and holds a Master of Education degree, also from Minnesota. Along with his coaching duties at Wisconsin, he is also a professor in the Physical Education Department.

Bob and his wife Martha are the parents of five children.

GRANT STANDBROOK Assistant Coach - 2nd Season

Grant Standbrook starts his second season at Wisconsin with Coach Johnson and has quickly gained a reputation as a stickler for physical fitness and conditioning. Coach Johnson gives Grant's off-ice conditioning program much of the credit for the Badgers' success during the past season.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin Standbrook was Johnson's assistant coach for three years with the U.S. National and Olympic teams. A native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Standbrook graduated from the University of Minnesota-Duluth in 1961. He lettered in hockey two years at UM-D, and was an alternate captain in 1960-61.

Standbrook, 40, began his coaching career at Churchill High School in Winnipeg in 1961. In 1963, he took over the coaching position at Greenway High School in Coleraine, Minn., and in three years his teams posted a 56-21-2 record.

Grant entered the college coaching ranks in 1966 when he joined the Dartmouth College staff; he became that school's head coach in 1970—a position he held for five years. At Dartmouth Grant also coached soccer and lacrosse. Grant was a member of the Canadian championship soccer team in 1963.

Grant and his wife Joy have three children.

Coach Bob Johnson Looks at the Badgers . . .

GOALTENDING—"As last year, goaltending appears to be solid for '77-78. All three goalies return from the Championship team. Jr. Julian Baretta was a pleasant surprise last season becoming Wisconsin's 1st All-American goaltender. Mike Dibble, the veteran who has been steady throughout his career will be eligible for the opening 22 games. Dave McNab gives us a strong back-up and will replace Dibble after the first semester. This threesome should give us solid goaltending."

DEFENSE—"The blueliners for '77-78 are a question mark. The loss of John Taft by graduation and of Craig Norwich, 2-time All-American, to the pros leaves a big void. Regulars Bob Suter and Norm McIntosh give us a good starting base along with Ron Griffin and John Suter. The remaining spots will be hotly contested by holdovers Brad Mullens, Ian Perrin and Tom Lundeen. The development of these skaters will be a key to Wisconsin's success."

CENTER—"The Badgers are blessed with outstanding center icemen. Mike Eaves, the school's first All-American forward and our leading scorer 2 of the last 3 years, returns and gives us great leadership.
