Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was
VOTED, That the minutes of the postponed regular meeting of the Board held
on July 17, 1954, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Laird, it was
VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in EXHIBIT A, attached, be ac-
cepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign
the agreements.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That resignations and terminations on pages 1 and 2, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That appointments on pages 2 to 24, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That leaves of absence, increases in salary or appointment, decreases in salary or appointment, and changes in title on pages 24 to 26, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

The above actions by the President taken since the July 17, 1954, meeting of the Board and approved by the Regents in the foregoing resolutions are made a part of the records of this meeting.

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Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Laird, it was

VOTED, That the resignation of Clifford S. Liddle, as Associate Dean of the School of Education, effective September 8, 1954, be accepted; and that he be granted leave of absence, without pay, as Professor of Education, for the period beginning September 8, 1954, and ending with the beginning of the 1956-57 academic year, in order to accept the request of the Foreign Operations Administration for his services in India during that period, with the understanding that the leave of absence for this length of time is granted only because of the nature of the foreign service involved and is not to be considered as setting a precedent for the granting of leaves of absence of such duration.

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President Fred presented the following recommendation relating to the schedules of building needs to be presented to the State Building Commission:

"That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, and with the inclusion in Schedule I of an additional item of \$38,500 for the replacement of the elevator in the east wing of Wisconsin General Hospital, the schedule of proposed priority of construction projects for the 1955-57 biennium requests to the Legislature (Schedule I attached), the schedule of new construction and improvement projects for the second, third and future biennia (Schedule II, attached), and the schedule of needed new construction to be financed from other than State appropriations (Schedule III, attached), be approved for presentation to the State Building Commission."

Regent Rennebohm requested that before the Regents ask for more funds

for the replacement of Hospital elevators, in addition to those included in Schedule I, a study should be made of the usage of the elevators in the Hospital, including information as to the amount of traffic on the elevators to be replaced and also the effect of the new elevators installed in connection with recent new construction on the need for replacing the old elevators.

The adoption of the recommendation presented by President Fred was moved by Regent Steiger and seconded by Regent Jones.

Regent Watson stated that he gathered, from the previous day's informal discussion by the Regents of the development of the higher educational facilities in Milwaukee, that there is to be a movement to expand the activities of the University in Milwaukee. He pointed out that Schedule I includes \$400,000 for two additional stories on the new building at the Milwaukee Extension Center. He raised the question whether all of the anticipated facilities on the Madison campus would be required if the University facilities in Milwaukee are to be expanded. He inquired whether the \$400,000 requested in Schedule I for the Milwaukee Extension was needed for the present enrollment. He was advised that this request was made to cover the present needs and will provide space which will replace that which is presently being rented. Regent Watson stated that information had been furnished that additional facilities at Milwaukee, costing about \$2,500,000 would be needed for an enrollment of about 3000 students, which would very soon be reached if the University program in Milwaukee is expanded. The discussion brought out that the expansion of the University program in Milwaukee might rather rapidly increase the enrollment there to 6000 but no estimate was made of the effect on the enrollment at the University at Madison. Regent Watson pointed out that such an increase in the University program at Milwaukee would need large additional appropriations for physical facilities.

Regent Rennebohm agreed that Regent Watson had raised an important question, and stated the Regents must be very careful in expending funds for construction in Milwaukee until the Legislature determines what is to be done in developing the higher educational facilities in Milwaukee. He pointed out that there were important questions involved, including whether the facilities in Milwaukee could be expanded in the small area now available, and the possibility that the Regents would be requested to provide other facilities, such as football fields, which would require a great deal of additional land. He stated that a definite program of development would have to be followed in Milwaukee, but that it could not be determined until the Legislature acts on the Milwaukee situation.

Regent Watson inquired whether, if the University program in Milwaukee is to be expanded, the Regents were going to give the Legislature any idea of what they have in mind in the way of physical facilities in Milwaukee. He pointed out the need to be very careful in expending funds for physical facilities and expansion of programs in view of the future budget prospects. It was pointed out that the Regents were required by the statutes to submit these building needs to the Legislature through the State Building Commission and that whatever change is made in the program in Milwaukee will necessitate changes in the long-range requests for appropriations for physical facilities.

The question on the above motion was put and the adoption of the recommendation was voted.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Wanvig, Actions 1 to 4, inclusive, listed under the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) were approved, ratified and confirmed.

II. Budget Transfers

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of budget transfers for July, 1954, for the information of the Regents. (EXHIBIT C attached)

The Secretary reported that the annual meeting of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions will be held in New York City from November 15 through November 19, 1954; and that the Regents usually designate a member of the Board to represent them at the annual meeting of the Association. Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That Regent Gelatt be designated to represent the Regents at the

annual meeting of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions to be held in New York City from November 15 through November 19, 1954.

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The Secretary reported that the Regents on the previous day had informally considered the possibility of changing the dates of the Regent meetings during the fall in order to have Regent meetings on the dates of certain home football games and that, if the dates of the meetings were to be changed, the By-Laws of the Regents would have to be suspended. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was

VOTED, That, in order that the football team might have the full personal support of the Regents at as many football games as possible, the By-Laws of the Regents be suspended and the regular meetings of the Regents be postponed as follows: from September 11, 1954, to September 25, 1954; from October 9, 1954, to October 16, 1954; and from November 6, 1954, to November 20, 1954.

Regent Laird presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

1. That Ricardo B. Quintana, professor of English, be granted leave of absence, without pay, for the first semester of 1954-55.
2. That William S. Middleton, Dean of the Medical School, be granted leaves of absence, without pay, for the periods July 26 to July 31, 1954, inclusive, and September 16 to September 30, 1954, inclusive.
3. That the appointment of Henry S. Sterling, associate professor of geography, be reduced from full time to half time for the first semester of 1954-55; and that his salary be reduced accordingly from \$3,275 to \$1,637.50 for the semester; 1954-55 budget, page 71 (teaching).
4. That Paul F. Clark, emeritus professor of medical microbiology, be employed on a special service contract, on a part-time basis, for research in the Medical School during the period July 1, 1954 to December 31, 1954, inclusive, at a total salary of \$1,920 for the period to be charged to Fund 1-B, President's Unassigned.

5. That Della F. Wilson, emeritus professor of art education, be employed on a special service contract, on a part-time basis, for research in the School of Education during the period July 1, 1954 to December 31, 1954, inclusive, at a total salary of \$1,250 for the period, to be charged to Fund 1-B, President's Unassigned.
6. That, in order to express more fully the original intent of the Regents, paragraph (4) of the action of the Regents on October 24, 1953, approving the location of the proposed Indoor Practice Building, which reads as follows:

"(4) The Legislature is to be requested by the Board of Regents to make the remainder of Camp Randall Memorial Park a perpetual memorial for the Union Veterans of the Civil War and provide for a permanent committee to supervise the management and care of such park."

be revised to read as follows:

(4). The Legislature shall be invited by the Board of Regents to dedicate the remainder of Camp Randall Memorial Park as a perpetual memorial to the Union Veterans of the Civil War. To that end this Board will suggest to the Legislature that it take appropriate measures to assure that no structures shall henceforth be built in the remainder of that Park except those which depict Camp Randall during the years 1861-1865, or which might house meetings of patriotic organizations which have a special interest in that historic struggle. The attention of the Legislature will be invited to the fact that during the forty-one years which have elapsed since the creation of the Camp Randall Memorial Park out of lands owned by the University since 1893, it is the University which has furnished the care of the grounds and its memorials. To help assure proper planning and care of an area so rich in its historic associations, this Board will also recommend to the Legislature that it create a permanent commission to plan the development and maintenance of the Park and any structures or memorials which it may contain and that it appropriate sufficient funds to permit the fulfillment of these desirable purposes.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the College of Agriculture, the plans and specifications for the Auditorium and Service Building at the Ashland Branch Agricultural Experiment Station developed by the Agricultural Engineering

Department and dated August 1954 be approved, and that authority be granted to advertise for bids - estimated cost \$40,000.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for the preparation of plans and specifications for the construction of a new, three-bedroom residence for the superintendent, on a new site west of the new office building, at the Marshfield Experiment Station in Wood County - estimated cost \$20,000. (Note: The State Building Commission has requested that the cost of this project be limited to from \$15,000 to \$16,000.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for the preparation of plans and specifications for the following construction and improvement projects at the Branch Agricultural Experiment Stations:

- a. Construction of a new type experimental swine farrowing house at the La Crosse Experiment Station in La Crosse County - estimated cost \$6,600.
- b. Repair, remodelling, and improvements to the two houses used by the superintendent and by the agronomist at the Spooner Branch Experiment Station in Washburn County - estimated cost \$8,400.

(The State Building Commission on July 27, 1954, appropriated \$75,000 from the State Building Trust Fund for improvements at the Ashland, Marshfield, La Crosse, and Spooner Experiment Stations.)

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the Administrative Committee, the funds in the reserve for termination of government contracts and the uncommitted contract overhead funds previously allocated to the various schools and colleges totalling approximately \$87,000, be allocated for the purchase of necessary capital equipment, and that the President of the University be authorized to make the allotments.

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The approval of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee was moved by Regent Jones and seconded by Regent Wanvig:

That the Regents accept the offer of the Trustees of the Memorial Union Building Association, Inc., to make a gift of \$7,000 to the University for the purpose of preparing engineering and archi-

tectural study and cost estimates of various alternatives for improved delivery facilities for the Memorial Union Building, including the possibilities of underground parking in the area east of the Memorial Union Building, and that, subject to the approval of the State Chief Engineer and the Governor, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement with Mead and Hunt, Inc., for the said study.

Regent Jones noted that the Memorial Union Building Association is a voluntary organization whose funds are derived from contributions by alumni and friends of the University.

Regent Rennebohm questioned the making of plans for underground parking on land which the University does not own. Regent Jones indicated that the recommendation only called for a study of what might be done to improve the delivery facilities for the Memorial Union Building and the possibility of providing underground parking in the area now occupied by the Y.M.C.A. Building when that property is subsequently transferred to the University by the University of Wisconsin Foundation. Regent Rennebohm suggested that the proposal should be taken up with the University of Wisconsin Foundation and that the recommendation should be amended to provide that the action taken by the Regents be subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin Foundation. Regents Jones and Wanvig agreed to the proposed amendment and upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Laird, the recommendation, as amended to read as follows, was voted:

That, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin Foundation, the Regents accept the offer of the Trustees of the Memorial Union Building Association, Inc., to make a gift of \$7,000 to the University for the purpose of preparing engineering and architectural study and cost estimates of various alternatives for improved delivery facilities for the Memorial Union Building, including the possibilities of underground parking in the area east of the Memorial Union Building, and that, subject to the approval of the State Chief Engineer and the Governor, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement with Mead and Hunt, Inc., for the said study.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the following budget for the National Teachers Seminary Trust Fund for 1954-55 be approved:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the Fund 16C Agricultural Extension budget for 1954-55 be increased as follows:

(The above budget increase is a result of an increase in the 16C Federal Extension funds which are assigned to the "Farm and Home Development" program.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the Fund 16B Agricultural Research budget for 1954-55 be increased as follows:

(The above budget increase is a result of an increase in the 16B Federal Research funds and is assigned to fifteen research projects in fourteen departments of the College of Agriculture.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the Governor and of the State Chief Engineer, authority be granted to employ architects for the preparation of plans and specifications for greenhouses, with basements to include space for plant culture rooms, for the Soils Department, to be located on the site of the present Soils Department greenhouses; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract for architects' services for this project. (The State Building Commission on July 27, 1954, authorized the expenditure of not to exceed \$90,000 for this project from the federal contract overhead funds of the University.)

The approval of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee was voted by Regent Jones, and seconded by Regent Steiger:

"That not to exceed \$40,000 be allocated for landscaping and developing the lower campus in accordance with the plan approved by the Regents on February 6, 1954, and in accordance with the following estimated schedule of costs:

(The State Building Commission on July 27, 1954, authorized the use of federal contract overhead funds of the University for this purpose.)"

A sketch of the plan approved by the Regents on February 6, 1954, for the landscaping and developing of the lower campus was presented to the Regents. Regent Rennebohm expressed the opinion that the open area of the lower campus, as shown on the plan, appeared to run in the opposite direction to that which it should in order to conform to the plan for a mall running from Johnson Street to Lake Mendota, as had been envisaged by the group of alumni and friends of the University who were interested in the long-range development of the University. It was pointed out that the plan shown was somewhat misleading and that at the present time only low-growing shrubs would be planted so that the view to the lake would not be obstructed. Sub-

ject to the understanding that the Vice President of Business and Finance would present the plan for the landscaping and developing of the lower campus at the next meeting of the Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin Foundation, the question on the above motion was put and it was voted unanimously.

The Secretary reported that the Inter Higher Education Boards Committee, which included in its membership a special committee of three University Regents, had submitted its report, dated July 1, 1954, pursuant to Joint Resolution 49,S of the 1953 Legislature; that the consideration of the report had been discussed by the University Regents at their meeting at La Crosse on July 17, 1954; that the report had been considered informally by the Regents on the previous day; and that at that time the Regents had agreed that Regent Wanvig should prepare a motion for consideration by the Regents at this meeting. The Secretary also reported that a communication had been received, addressed to the Regents by the Young Republications of Milwaukee County, urging that a merger of the higher educational facilities in Milwaukee be under the Regents of the University of Wisconsin. (Copy of communication on file.) Regent Wanvig stated that he had a motion relating to the report of the Inter Higher Education Boards Committee, and pointed out that the motion did not include a recommendation putting the two state-supported higher education schools in Milwaukee under one board. At the request of Regent Wanvig, the Secretary read the following motion, the adoption of which was moved by Regent Wanvig and seconded by Regent Laird;

That this Board of Regents register its disapproval of the recommendation, contained in the report of the Inter Higher Education Boards Committee, dated July 1, 1954, which reads as follows:

"All publicly supported institutions of higher education in Milwaukee should be under one board. That one board should be the Board of Regents of State Colleges.";

and that this Board of Regents recommend that a more appropriate solution would be for the Legislature to authorize the University to develop a more nearly complete branch of the University of Wisconsin in Milwaukee, for the following reasons:

- (1) It meets the apparent need and desire of the people of Milwaukee for a university connected four-year institution.
- (2) It would make directly available to the Milwaukee area the great body of experience in university education represented by the faculty and administration of the University of Wisconsin.
- (3) It would satisfactorily meet the specific needs of the Milwaukee region for university adult education programs, and for graduate instruction in such fields as

engineering, commerce and social work. These programs have been carried by the University in Milwaukee for many years.

- (4) Control by the same University President and Board of Regents that are responsible for the Madison campus would be the best insurance against unnecessary duplication of the University's more expensive and specialized facilities. The University of Wisconsin branch in Milwaukee should be given the degree of autonomy necessary for the proper development of its program."

A called vote was taken with Regents Jones, Laird, Rennebohm, Steiger, Wanvig and Werner voting "Aye" and Regent Watson voting "No". The motion was declared carried.

Regent Watson stated that he was voting against the motion for the reasons that (1) it does not solve the problem of so-called duplication of programs and facilities at Milwaukee; and (2) it does not point out the types of programs which it is proposed be developed in Milwaukee. Regent Werner stated that he would vote in favor of the motion, although he agreed with Mr. Watson that it does not solve the problem.

Vice President Peterson reported, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands, as to the progress since the last Regent meeting in the matter of studying the sale of the University Hill Farms. He stated that a Special Committee of the Madison Board of Realtors had been appointed to assist the University in this matter. He also stated that representatives of the Federal Housing Administration and the State Planning Division had been contacted and both agencies are willing to assist the University in planning the development of that area. He stated that it was not reasonable to obtain an appraisal on the Hill Farm area, for which appraisal funds had been appropriated at the last Regent meeting, until the land development plan for the area is decided upon. Regent Jones stated that in his opinion the first step is to obtain the unbiased appraisal by competent, disinterested persons as to what this property is worth. He stated that the University cannot divide the land into lots and go through the long drawn out and uncertain procedure of selling individual lots. Regent Rennebohm pointed out that there were so many unknown factors at this time, such as what areas would be withheld from initial sale, what areas would be developed for churches, schools and other general purposes, what restrictions are to be placed on the property as to use and as to the value of houses to be constructed in various areas, that it was not possible to make an appraisal as to what the University might receive for the property until the development plans are determined. He stated that this viewpoint was concurred in by the Committee of the Madison Board of Realtors which was made up of persons long experienced in the real estate business in this community. Regent Jones thought that a person experienced in such matters could envisage in a broad way the type of development which would take place and would be able to arrive at a sound appraisal of the property. Regent Rennebohm pointed out that the \$1000 appropriated by the

Regents to cover the cost of the appraisal is not sufficient in the opinion of the Committee of the Madison Board of Realtors. He requested that the Regents give the Special Regent Committee more time to work on this problem, and stated that a request would be submitted to the Regents for additional funds for the cost of the appraisal when the plans are more fully developed.

Vice President Baldwin reported on the request received from the Legislative Council's Committee on Higher Education that the University Regents give consideration to the possibility of including the Wisconsin Institute of Technology under the University Regents for operation as an extension center. (See letter dated July 22, 1954, attached as EXHIBIT D.) He reported that following the receipt of the request he had visited the Wisconsin Institute of Technology at Platteville with Dean Wendt and Director Adolfson and that they then presented their findings to President Fred and to the Administrative Committee. He read the recommendation of the Administrative Committee of the University relating to this matter and upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was

VOTED, That the following recommendation of the Administrative Committee of the University be approved:

The administration of the University of Wisconsin has explored the possibilities of including the Wisconsin Institute of Technology under the direction of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin, as requested by the Committee on Higher Education of the Legislative Council on July 20, 1954. While recognizing some possible advantages of such a combination to the State, it nevertheless believes that it would not be in the best interests of the State for the University of Wisconsin to operate a separate program in a community the size of Platteville in such close proximity to the Platteville State College, and therefore recommends that the administration of the Wisconsin Institute of Technology not be assigned to the University of Wisconsin.

President Werner read the following letter which had been handed to him by President Fred:

Dear President Fred:

At the July 27, 1954, meeting of the Legislative Council there was some discussion regarding interstate compacts in the field of higher education. As you know, the Council of State Governments is making a study of that problem in the midwest. Senator W. W. Clark, a member of our Council, suggested that the boards of regents of the four institutions of higher learning in Wisconsin each designate a representative from the faculty or administrative staff and form a group which could work with our committee and our council on this problem.

I have discussed this matter orally with Dr. Ira Baldwin so he already has some familiarity with the situation.

Vice President Baldwin reported that the University of Wisconsin had been invited to send a representative to the meeting of the North Central Legislative Conference which was held in St. Paul, Minnesota, in June, 1954, but was unable to do so because the conference was held at the time of our Commencement. The question of forming an interstate compact for higher education was considered at that meeting which was attended by Senator W. W. Clark and Assemblyman J. R. Stone, members of the Wisconsin Legislative Council. Vice President Baldwin stated that he had informed Senator Clark and Representative Stone that it was questionable that there is a need in this area for a formal organization of the type which has been found to be useful in the south and in the west, but that there would be value in developing cooperative programs in certain of the highly specialized fields. He stated that the North Central Legislative Conference had suggested that the Council of State Governments study the need for limited interstate compacts covering certain

specialized fields of higher education in the north central states. He explained that under the interstate compacts, such as have been used to a considerable extent in the south, each state pays the costs for its students who are sent to the specialized schools in each of the other states which are parties to the compact. These interstate compacts cover such specialized fields as medicine, architecture, forestry, etc., in which many of the states cannot afford to provide instruction because of the high cost and the limited demand.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the President of the Board and the President of the University designate a representative to work with representatives of the other institutions of higher education in Wisconsin and the Legislative Council, as requested, and to report back to the Regents regarding anything requiring the action of this Board.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the proper authorities be requested to draw up plans for a dormitory for women on the lakeshore.

Regent Rennebohm stated that a great deal of time had been spent on plans for new dormitories; that the Regents had approved building a new women's dormitory on the Chadbourne Hall site; and that all that is required is the Governor's signature on the contract for architects' services. He stated that a dormitory could be built on that site for 193 more students than could be accommodated by the expenditure of the same amount in another location. He stated that he did not feel the Regents should hesitate to proceed with the project on the Chadbourne Hall site because of a single objection, and stated that he would not be a party to spending \$350,000 more to provide for the same number of students at a different location.

Regent Rennebohm presented a proposal which had been made to him for the development of the road along the lakeshore between North Park Street and Willow Drive. He showed a map giving the location of such a proposed road. He stated that he hesitated to make a recommendation regarding this proposal because of the objections which are raised by small pressure groups when such proposals are made. President Werner suggested that the proposal might be referred to the University Campus Planning Commission for study, and, there being no objection, it was so ordered.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:55 A.M.

The Legislative Council's Committee on Higher Education at its meeting Tuesday, July 20, 1954 considered briefly the report of the institutions committee (operating pursuant to Jt. Res. 49, S.). The report among other things recommended the inclusion of Wisconsin Institute of Technology under the jurisdiction of the board of regents of state colleges. The institute has raised objections to this recommendation.

During the discussion our committee requested the exploration of the possibilities of including the institute under the board of regents of the university for operation as an extension center. Our committee requested that the board of regents give consideration to this proposal at its next meeting August 7.

I telephoned to Mr. Milton A. Melcher, president of the institute, today, advising him of the action of our committee and informing him that it would probably be necessary for the university to have at least a preliminary conference with him at Platteville in order to get sufficient facts to make an intelligent presentation of this problem to the university regents. He will therefore expect to hear from you or representatives of the extension division or the college of engineering within the next few days, and he stated that he will be pleased to cooperate in every respect in furnishing information. He is fully aware of the fact that this proposal arose from our committee and not from the university.
